

ADULT EDUCATION

I am delighted to invite you all to take part in discussion of the book, *The Sh'ma and its Blessings*, edited by Rabbi Lawrence A. Hoffman. I will let the notes on the book's cover tell you all about it: "*The Sh'ma and Its Blessings* features the authentic Hebrew text with a new translation designed to let people know exactly what the prayers say. Introductions tell the reader what to look for in the prayer service, as well as how to truly use the commentaries, to search for-and find-meaning in the prayer book." The very accessible but powerfully meaningful essays by "10 of today's most respected Jewish scholars from all movements of Judaism examine *The Sh'ma and Its Blessings* from the perspective of ancient Rabbis and modern theologians, as well as feminist, halakhic, medieval, linguistic, biblical, Chasidic, mystical, and historical perspective."

This is a relatively short book and is divided into five parts. We have, therefore, chosen five dates for our discussions: October 21 and 28, and November 4, 11 and 18 at 8:00 PM. While we realize that not everyone can make all five dates, we just ask you to read the section before we get together on that particular evening (part 1, October 21, etc.). There is a copy available in the Temple library and the book may be ordered from Amazon.com for \$19.32, including shipping (2-3 days). It is a savings over the \$21.95 list price. Let me know if I can answer any questions for you or help with getting a copy of the book.



When I as visiting my mother this summer, I noticed an article in THE CLEVELAND PLAIN DEALER, written by Charles A. Radin of the BOSTON GLOBE, describing the little-known role that the Jews of Sarajevo played in bringing to safety nearly 2500 of their non-Jewish neighbors during the Bosnian Civil War. Apparently they were the only ethnic community in the besieged city capable of dealing with all three sides – the Muslims, the Croats, and the Serbs – and only now are the details of what they did beginning to emerge.

The rescue effort was organized by La Benevolencija, a social service organization founded by the Jewish community in 1894. Jewish leaders volunteered to lead secret convoys in and out of the city of Sarajevo, taking refugees along the perilous route from the Bosnian capital, through Croatia, to the Adriatic port of Split from which they were able to reach the refugee camps of Europe. The Jews would then return to Sarajevo, bringing medicine and other necessary supplies.

La Benevolencija also organized and operated a soup kitchen that remained open throughout the siege and at which everyone was welcome. An especially nice meal was available on Shabbat, making everyone in Sarajevo aware of the meaning of this sacred day. "The Sabbath crowd still averages around 300 people," said Jewish community leader Jakob Finci. "Eighty are Jews, the rest are friends."

Something similar happened in the Sunday School started by the Jewish community during the siege. After the second Sunday, a Jewish child said, "Can I bring my best friend next week? We've spent the last six months in a shelter." By the end of the siege, there were 20 Jewish children in the school and 30 best friends.

Before World War II, there were 12,000 Jews in Sarajevo, nearly 20% of the overall population. At the time of the Bosnian Civil War, there were approximately 1500 Jews still residing in the city. They were the ones who organized these rescue missions, saving people who would otherwise have been condemned and helping Sarajevo survive. Their actions are an example of the mitzvah we call *tikkun olam*, repairing the world. What they did is a reminder that people working together can accomplish extraordinary things. Save a life, taught our sages, and you will save the world.

On Yom Kippur morning, I asked you to support the Concert for Kosovo and Turkey which will be held on Sunday, November 14, at Monmouth Regional High School. I am gratified by the initial response, but help is still needed if we are to reach our goal and make a truly significant contribution to the work of the International Rescue Committee and the American Jewish Joint Distribution, two of the many organizations providing humanitarian relief to those in need. Please call the Temple office today and volunteer to help, as we seek to make life a little bit better and easier for those who suffer still, and please know how grateful we are for your cooperation and assistance.

A Note from Cantor Daniel M. Rosenfeld

Shalom. One of the things I've come to appreciate most about the High Holy Day season is the sense of humility I gain from the whole experience. The act of *Cheshbon Hanefesh* or literally the accounting of the soul, forces me to look at my life and take an accounting of it, in this case, on a yearly basis. What I did right, what I did wrong, what I can do to improve, and so on and so forth. As a Cantor, I'm fortunate enough to have the privilege of leading the congregation in prayer, and in doing so, taking a few steps toward *tshuva* or repentance which is the ultimate goal of the Holy Days. This is a privilege as well as a heavy and often daunting responsibility, especially at this time of the year.

For me, one of the two main prayers that best expresses that sense of humility and awe is the Hineni, the other being Sh'ma Koleinu. Coming at the beginning of Erev Rosh Hashanah, Hineni's text as well as the haunting tunes to which it's chanted set the tone perfectly for the ensuing Days of Awe: "Behold me, of little merit, trembling and afraid, as I stand before You to plead for Your people. O gracious God, the One enthroned by Israel's praises..." The cantor here pleads on behalf of the people saying that though we realize how small and insignificant we are, we still hope that God will hear our prayers and show us love and mercy as in the past. It is interesting to note that according to Halacha (Jewish law), the Shaliach Tzibbur, literally messenger of the public, in this case, the cantor, was expected to stand in a place below the congregation. The reason for this was so that the cantor would not place himself above anyone else, thereby bringing the proper humility to his davening or prayer. How much more meaning this has in the context of the High Holidays and particularly, the prayer, Hineni.

It is in that vein that I express my heartfelt gratitude to the Choir, to Alice Berman who directed them so exquisitely, and to Ken Clayton who, as always, held everything together so masterfully. I must also thank Rabbi Priesand for providing great inspiration with her unmatched eloquence, and you the congregation for bringing the right kind of spirit to your worship this year. I believe we all acted as partners in prayer. And that made the Holy Days especially meaningful for me. From my heart, I wish you all a sweet and fruitful New Year. L'shanah Tovah Umetukah.

L' shana tova from your Ritual Committee

Writing this as I am between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, thereby reflecting on the work of the Ritual Committee over the last several months, it seems that much of our work and thought has been on matters cantorial. In mid-June, for example, a contingent from Ritual traveled to the School of Sacred Music in New York to meet with the Director, Israel Goldstein and Deans Dreskin and Spasser. We sought the meeting because we wanted to know more about what the School was doing to modify its curriculum so that students and graduates would possess more of the skills we feel are essential for Student Cantors and graduates to possess.

While the meeting started out a little uneasy, it quickly opened up into a positive, frank and open discussion of common concerns. The information shared was reciprocal, ranging from descriptions of how the School was modifying its admissions guidelines and curriculum content as well as ideas about what MRT might do to enhance the way students and graduates perceive us. We left New York reassured that the School of Sacred Music and Monmouth Reform Temple remain dedicated partners, each reaffirming its commitment to support the work and the needs of the other.

Here at home, a subcommittee of Ritual has been operating as a liaison group devoted to meeting regularly with Cantor Rosenfeld in order to help him define specific goals for his diverse areas of responsibility, provide feedback on his progress toward those goals and to act as a sounding board for him to share his experiences and points of view. 

Temple member Ellen Goldberg proudly showed me an article from a local paper praising her sons' efforts to make life a little better for sick children. The article reported how Josh, 9, and Jeremy, 6, worked diligently for three years collecting pull-tabs from soda cans. When they finished, they donated about 20,000 pieces of the recyclable metal to the Ronald McDonald House, Long Branch. This was a family project. The boys gathered the pull-tabs with the help of their parents, who collected them from work, grandparents and neighbors. The article quoted Kate Pandolpho, Executive Director of the House, "When you add all the schools participating in this program, it generates approximately \$5 - \$6,000 each year."

Last November, I reported on MRT's 6th grader Steve Hayet's carnival to benefit the Ronald McDonald House. I enjoy publicizing our students' *tikkun olam* (repairing the world) endeavors. Please inform me whenever your child does something to ease the burdens of others.

The brothers' Goldberg is a perfect segue into our Temple's 3rd Annual Mitzvah Day scheduled for October 17th. This event will provide your family the opportunity to perform the mitzvah of *tikkun olam*. There will be activities for all ages. This day is not for volunteers. Mitzvah means commandment; therefore, we are supposed to help others as Jews. The logistics involved in creating a program in which hundreds of people participate is daunting. Coordinators are still needed to insure the day's success. Contact Pam Burke at 671-2243 to offer your assistance. As in the past, Religious School attendance counts for Mitzvah Day and parents must join their children at Temple on that day. Our teachers will be leading various activities and will not be available for regular class assignments.

Our building addition is tremendous and just about fully completed. The second floor is absolutely wonderful and I couldn't be more grateful to the many Temple members who have put in countless hours to bring the project to fruition. Carpeting was added to the classrooms above the library and the second floor hallway has also been fully carpeted. Many members are still working on this project to insure that the contractor meets the full terms of our contract.

Joining our staff this year are the following: Temple member Lisa Calderwood (2B), Rita Colodin (1st gr.), Jan Weser (4th), Aime Simon (4th) and returning to our school is Sandi Weingroff (2A) and Larry Weingroff (resource room teacher.) A word about the Weingroffs -- Larry and Sandi have been full and part-time teachers at MRT since 1990. They are both licensed Special Education Teachers and have worked in the public school sector for the past ten years. Both are Hebrew Language teachers and have been teaching language and religion for the past 15 years. Sandi is also the Head Teacher at Temple Beth Or in Brick Township. They have lived in Israel and have graduated from an Israeli State Language School. (Other teachers will be highlighted in future articles.)

I do understand how difficult it is for parents to share their children's learning disabilities with our Religious School staff. We want to help all children who are in need of extra help with their Religious School assignments, whether they have formal Individual Evaluation Plans (IEP) or their parents believe that a resource situation would be beneficial. Mr. Weingroff is in a position to help your children in several ways. As an experienced resource room teacher, he will assist children in need of organizational skills, act as a buffer between the child and his/her teachers, work with parents to help them help their children, tutor when necessary and be a friend to his students. To a learning disabled child or any youngster unable to comprehend Hebrew studies, 2.5 to 4.5 additional school hours coupled with the associated classwork and assignments can be quite stressful. I invite all parents who think that Mr. Weingroff could be helpful to their children to contact me and I will put you in touch with him for a confidential discussion.

Remember, there is no school on October 10 to allow our Temple to host a workshop for the teachers of Monmouth County's five Reform Temples. The other principals and I met throughout the summer to organize the sessions for the expected 90 participants. The workshop is sponsored by the Continuity Commission of the Jewish Federation of Greater Monmouth County through a grant that I proposed for this purpose.

On Saturday, October 2, your children will have the opportunity to participate in our always festive Simchat Torah service. We will march around the sanctuary with flags and Torahs as Rabbi Priesand completes and begins the annual cycle of Torah readings. All students new to the Religious School, regardless of grade, will be invited to the bema during this service for Rabbi Priesand's blessing and will be given a special gift at the conclusion of the service. Following the service, the congregation will enjoy a cooperative style luncheon.
