### FROM RABBI PRIESAND

As many of you know, I love to go to the movies. I usually prefer drama over comedy, but sometimes I am not fully prepared for the intensity of the experience that awaits. Such was the case when I went to see THE GREEN MILE, a powerful film about capital punishment and the way in which it is often administered in this country. There were certain scenes in which I had to close my eyes, reaffirming my own belief that capital punishment is barbaric. I left the theater that day wondering, as I often do, where the justice is in our justice system and how killing people who kill people (assuming they are actually guilty) proves that killing people is wrong.

At long last, America seems ready to take a closer look and grapple openly and honestly with the flaws of a death penalty system in which mistakes are constantly being made. I admire the wisdom and integrity of Governor George Ryan of Illinois, a Republican supporter of capital punishment, who recently declared a moratorium on executions in his state after realizing that far too many innocent people had been condemned to die. Indeed, over the course of the past two decades, twelve death row inmates have been executed by the state of Illinois. while thirteen have been exonerated and set free. In the last decade alone, DNA tests have proven that sixty-nine people from communities across America were sentenced to death for crimes they did not commit, and that number continues to rise at a rate of more than one a month. What a shameful record for a country that calls itself civilized!

Many people base their support for capital punishment on passages in the Hebrew Bible. What they fail to understand is that "an eye for an eye" was always interpreted by our sages to mean monetary compensation and not physical punishment. Moreover, the reason why Torah decrees death as the consequence for certain acts is to underline the severity of the action itself. It may interest you to know that in the Bible capital punishment was the penalty for a rebellious child, as well as for one's failure to observe Shabbat. We can be grateful that society and its laws have evolved over time; otherwise, most of us would be in trouble! I always remember an article I read once about Sister Helen Prejean, upon whose life the thoughtprovoking film, DEAD MAN WALKING, is based. She listened while a friend explained to his child why those on death row had to be killed. Her friend, a lawyer, said that because they had taken someone's life, they had to be executed by state officials. And the child asked: "So who kills them?"

It seems to me that killing people is wrong, whether it is done by individuals or by the government. I hope America will take advantage of the opportunity Governor Ryan has provided us to study and correct a system so flawed that it can no longer ensure that innocent people are spared. Only then can we seek forgiveness from those families whose loved ones have been taken from them and wrongly executed for crimes they did not commit. Remember we, the people, are ultimately in charge. We can no longer afford to turn our heads while justice is forsaken and destroyed. The time to act is now.

Do you have Jewish friends or colleagues who do not belong to a synagogue or have little or no connection to Jewish life? Many unaffiliated Jews who attended Shabbat Across America in the past point to that experience as a turning point in their religious growth.

### FROM THE PRESIDENT

At the UAHC biennial held last December, I attended several sessions on the topic of long term financial planning and setting up an endowment fund. On returning to NJ, I learned that MRT had been considering setting up an endowment fund for many years, but it just hadn't gotten going. In contrast to our year-to-year budget (which covers all the costs of Temple staff, building maintenance, programming, etc.), an endowment fund is intended for long-term investment. At some point in the future, the Temple can draw on the proceeds from these investments, without dipping into the principle. These funds could be used for many programs which could not otherwise be held. At some temples the endowment funds are used to keep down the total cost of membership. However the funds are disbursed, all the temples who had endowment funds reported a feeling of greater financial security for the future. To help MRT get started, I am creating an ad hoc committee, chaired by Martin Cole, to evaluate all the materials I collected at the biennial and to put together a charter and guidelines for an endowment committee. At the conclusion of their work the ad hoc committee will end, and the endowment committee will be established. If you have a particular expertise in long-term planning and would be interested in helping out, please give me or Marty a call.

machinations of the court minister *Haman*. The story is related to us in the Book of Esther, which is traditionally chanted to special cantillation and introduced by special blessings. Aside from singing, dancing and other festivities, the holiday also includes a *Purimspiel* or *Purim* play which usually takes the form of a spoof, parody, or mock-up of a service. The tradition of the *Purimspiel*, as we know it, originated in the Ashkenazic Jewish communities of Germany and Eastern Europe. Over the centuries, its has retained its farcical nature, often providing comic relief in times and places where it was greatly needed.

# From the Library .....

The Nazi Officer's Wife by Edith Hahn Beer, reviewed by Sheila Leavitt

This is a compelling and courageous story of an out-spoken young woman during the Holocaust, the events that turned her life upside down, and her efforts to survive. An excellent student studying law in Vienna and anticipating her future with her beloved Pepi, she and her mother are suddenly forced by the Gestapo from their home into a ghetto. She endures hardship in a work camp, returning home only to find her mother deported and Pepi and her Jewish friends living in fear. Fearing for her own life she decides to go underground and chronicles those days in great detail-homeless, alone, searching for food. A Christian woman provides her with identity papers and she flees to Munich. There she meets a Nazi party member who falls in love with her and marries her despite her confession that she is Her life as Werner's wife is safe and a Jew. somewhat normal, but filled with uncertainty.

A remarkable and very different story, this book is not the usual tale of a Holocaust survivor, but one of extreme courage and determination. Edith's remarkable collection of documents, photographs, and letters are now part of the permanent collections of the Holocaust Museum in Washington, D.C.

In my February article, I included a graphic representation of the Tzdakah collected on Sunday mornings by each class. I failed to thank Brian McMullen for creating the chart and for collecting and counting the money every Sunday. I am embarrassed that I forgot to give credit to a Temple member who gives countless hours of time to free me from the other bureaucratic necessities that come with my position.

The same could be said for many other Temple members who serve as class parents, sit on the Religious Education Committee, help in the parking lot during dismissal, and assist with oneg Shabbat duty after class-conducted services.
