

## REFLECTIONS

A rabbinic legend teaches that as the Temple was being destroyed, and flames engulfed the entire structure, the High Priest took the key that opened the Holy of Holies. Desperately, he flung the key up to the heavens. Out of the clouds came a giant hand that closed over the key and drew it back into the sky to be returned when the Temple was rebuilt.

Recently in discussing that midrash with a colleague, I recalled first hearing about it from my father. He explained that what was significant was not what the High Priest threw into the heavens but what he did not throw – the Torah. No matter how great the catastrophe, the Torah was not being destroyed. Moreover, unlike the keys to the Temple, the Torah was given to human beings forever. It would always remain ours.

As Jews we struggle over the Torah in many ways: where it came from, what it means, how it should be enacted in our lives. But the midrash holds true in both ways: the Torah remains a Torat Chayim – it is alive and gives life, and it remains on earth, with the people who revere it.



## **FROM RABBI PRIESAND**

Elsewhere in the bulletin. Bob Blank has written a report on the Million Mom March. Those of us who went to Washington all agreed that it was an awesome experience. We were particularly proud that Rabbi Eric Yoffie, President of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, was chosen to represent the religious community. He spoke eloquently and forcefully, reminding everyone that gun control is a "solemn religious obligation," that we are "partners with God in shaping a better and more hopeful future for all of God's children," and that we intend to hold our elected officials "accountable" if they persist in doing nothing "while the carnage continues in our streets and our homes." The mothers of America gave birth to a movement on May 14th - we pray that it will continue to grow and bear fruit in days to come.

In recent weeks, I have been fulfilling some of my responsibilities as a member of the Board of Governors of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. At graduation ceremonies, I had the honor of serving as sponsor for my friend, Ruth Gruber, author, lecturer and photojournalist, who received an honorary doctorate. You may remember her visit to our congregation in 1983 when she had just finished writing her book HAVEN, the true story of how she, acting on behalf of our government, was able to rescue one thousand refugees during World War II and bring them to America. The story of her incredible mission is being made into a television miniseries which we will all have the pleasure of seeing next year.

Among the other honorees was Dr. Ruth Westheimer, who gave the graduation address. A longtime friend and supporter of the Reform Movement and an active participant in her own synagogue, she spoke with wisdom and humor. Much of what she said was good advice for everyone, not just rabbis and cantors. She suggested, for example, that when you come home at night you shouldn't bring with you any problems you are dealing with at work, so as not to allow them to distract your attention from your family. The best thing to do, she said, is to tie these problems in a little package and leave them outside your door. I guarantee, she continued, that no one will steal them during the night!

She also told us about what she calls her "rainy day drawer." Knowing that all of us have days when we are down in the dumps, she has a drawer filled with pictures and articles that never fail to bring a smile to her face. Whenever she feels depressed or despondent, she goes to that drawer, confident that the opportunity to relive the memories she finds there will help to lift her spirits. What a wonderful idea! I think we all should have a "rainy day drawer."

Three days after graduation, I attended, together with Myra Ostroff, the ordination and investiture ceremony in which we welcomed twenty-eight new rabbis and ten new cantors. Congratulations to Joel and Marilyn Morgovsky whose nephew, Seth, was ordained a rabbi! For me, the most meaningful and touching part of the nearly four hour service was the ordination of a woman named Helga Newmark. As a child, just prior to World War II, she fled Germany and lived in Amsterdam, a friend of Margot and Later, she would survive the Anne Frank. concentration camps of Bergen-Belsen and Terezin. Her father was murdered by the Nazis, but after the war, she and her mother came to America. She married, had children and grandchildren, and then decided to study for the rabbinate. As she came to the bima to be ordained, the entire congregation, some two thousand strong, stood and applauded her accomplishment and dedication. For me, it was not only another first - the first woman who had survived the Shoah to become a rabbi - but also an important reminder that despite the many attempts to destroy us we are an eternal people committed to living by the values of Torah and spreading God's message to all the world. May Helga's example inspire us to do our part in keeping the Jewish people strong and vibrant.

## A Note from Cantor Daniel M. Rosenfeld

Last night, I finally had a chance to see the film, "Prince of Egypt." It was a meaningful experience for two reasons: first of all, I was watching it at the home of my Israeli friends, and secondly, it was showing during the

period between Pesach and Shavuot, the period of the Omer. I thought the stunning animation captured the drama of the Exodus from Egypt.

One of the things which caught my attention was the presentation of *Shirat Hayam* or the Song of the Sea which the Israelites sang after crossing the Red Sea. Though I was unable to hear any real connection to the traditional trope and nusach by which this passage of the Torah is chanted, I was impressed by the joyful, uplifting nature of the tunes composed for the movie.

I then started reflecting on some of the issues with which Cantors often grapple, specifically authenticity and appropriateness. These issues usually give rise to questions like how true to the nusach is a given composition, or how effectively does a given tune express the text, and is it fitting for this setting. And it is these questions which strike at the core of an even more fundamental question, *what is Jewish music*?

The question of what is Jewish music first has to relate to what makes the music Jewish. Jews the world over have invariably been influenced by the conventions and aesthetics of their neighbors. What we know as traditional Ashkenazic nusach is based on musical scales which are practically identical to those heard in the music of the Ukraine, Russia, Poland, Germany and other parts of Europe formerly populated with Jews. The comments of Abraham Idelsohn, the first real pioneer in the study of Jewish music and a noted musicologist, support this claim. He states, "It is generally known that a composer creates his music on the established premises of the music prevalent in his immediate environment. His tonal elements he instinctively chooses from the folk- and art-music with which he is filled from folk-song, ...." Such examples in our own time are the music sung in the youth camps as well as that of Debbie Friedman, Craig Taubmann and other songwriters composing in the folk idiom.

Then what makes it Jewish? The composer's own ethnicity and religion, the text, the musical scales? I believe that much of what in fact makes a piece of music Jewish is its function and the intent of the composer. There are also the questions of language and aesthetics. Does a piece adequately express the text? Does it capture the rhythm of the Hebrew? And is the style of the composition appropriate? In many ways, this last issue provides me with a good part of the answer to the original question, what is Jewish music. The way in which I sing *Eili*, *Eili* will differ from the way I sing *Rocky Mountain High*, even though both have similar themes of nature and its splendor.

Another issue raised by the question of what makes music Jewish is tradition. And this becomes subjective and often contentious. I have often heard, "Oh you use different tunes than we do," from visitors to this and other congregations I've served. Congregants often ask for "the traditional" version of a prayer or song. The reality is that every community has developed a body of tunes and styles which bear their stamp. The frequency with which they are sung over a period of time is what ultimately determines their status as "traditional." From a cantorial point of view, the traditions of a given community or group of communities combines with the needs of service leaders and congregants to offer renditions of the liturgy conducive to worship. This, in turn, creates a discipline of study which Cantors transmit from one generation to the next.

It is fascinating to witness how all of these issues play into one another in our time. The age of high tech media and the internet have offered us access to a variety of influences more diverse and eclectic than ever before. Thus we are presented with the challenge of sifting through all of these myriad styles and conventions to seek out that which best suits our needs. Musical scores like that in "Prince of Egypt" address this challenge by combining tradition with modern aesthetics; the Israelites sing the text of Shirat Hayam to a contemporary melody accompanied by a modern orchestra. It may not sound like a typical reading of this Torah passage, but I believe it eloquently expresses the joy and awe experienced by the Israelites after the tumultuous events in Egypt and the Sinai. And I'd say that makes it Jewish. In the end, I wonder if God is looking upon us with awe and fascination at the new way in which we sing our praises. I'd like to think so.

## Social Action from Bob Blank

A filled bus departed Monmouth Reform Temple very early on Mother's Day morning and headed for the Million Mom March in Washington, D.C. Most of those riding on the bus were MRT members including several members of the Confirmation Class and several members of the Social Action Committee. Other MRT members traveled on their own and caught up with the group.

The event was awesome! The sight of a sea of an estimated 750,000 people sprawled out across the national mall was inspiring. The sheer numbers made a statement of which we were a part. We were involved in *tikkun olam* just by showing up!

Many nationally known people spoke. Rosie O'Donnell served as the mistress of ceremonies. Her voice was a powerful one, speaking of "kicking butt" in Congress, and sending the message to Congress that we have had enough of gun violence. She said that we demand sensible gun control legislation, including registration, licensing and child-proofing of hand guns. By far, the most moving moments of the afternoon occurred when people came to the rostrum who would never have imagined themselves addressing a national rally until a sudden and unexpected act of gun violence changed their lives forever. Some were shooting victims who spoke from wheelchairs. Others, very much victims in their own right, had lost a child or other loved one. Their lives would never be the same again. What a moving moment it was when James Brady, after whom the "Brady Bill" is named, was rolled onstage to add a few brief remarks to those of his wife.

On the stage was a 400-pound bell, in the shape of the Liberty Bell, made of melted handguns. It was inscribed with the words of the prophet Isaiah: "They shall beat their swords into plowshares . . ." Twelve boys and girls were called forward to ring the bell - symbolic of the twelve children who are shot and killed, on average, each day of the year in this country. One was a survivor of Paducha, Kentucky; another was a survivor of Columbine and so forth. One young man was so weak that it took all of his strength to pull the string. He could not make the bell ring. The emotion was intense throughout the afternoon. So many horrible episodes brought to light once again. Three mothers who had lost children in the nursery school shooting in Scotland in 1993, appeared and spoke. A nineteen year old woman, who had been a camp counselor at the day camp in Granada Hills, California, told of how, after being hit by bullets herself, she yelled to the five year olds in her care to run from the bad man with the gun. The list of incidents seemed endless.

For those old enough to remember the turbulent 1960's, the voices of Kerry Kennedy Cuomo and Maryland Lt. Gov. Kathleen Kennedy Townsend, each daughters of the late Robert F. Kennedy, brought back painful memories of his death by an assassin's bullet. Memories of the deaths of President John F. Kennedy and of Dr. Martin Luther King were triggered as well. One had to wonder what progress we have made in reducing gun violence in the years which have elapsed since those tragic deaths. Clearly, the time has come for our voices to be heard and our votes counted.

Permit me to express my deep gratitude to Rabbi Priesand for her support of a bus from MRT to the Million Mom March. Rabbi is a spiritual leader who always finds a way to inspire others to make things happen. Special thanks are also extended to Social Action Committee member Pam Burke for organizing the bus trip so efficiently. Mary Sullivan, of Temple Rodeph Torah, is to be thanked as well for all of her efforts. Sisterhood is to be commended for kicking off the Million Mom March weekend by inviting Bryan Miller, Executive Director of Ceasefire New Jersey, to speak at Sisterhood Sabbath.

#### Dear Temple family,

I didn't want to leave without saving an officia goodbye so I've written this short paragraph to tell you how much I've enjoyed working for MRT for the pas 4 years. #### **RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES**

#### where parents set the example

Final report cards will be mailed the week of June 5. The envelope will include summer assignments for students in grades 4-9 who have exceeded the allowable number of absences. A form will also be included for children in grades 4-6 who did not satisfy our Temple's service requirement.

Although classes are no longer in session, one major ceremony remains. No family can plead ignorant of our Temple's Confirmation ceremony on June 11, at 10:30 am. Invitations have been sent out to every family and the graduation exercise was described in my April column. As I always write, the Confirmation service is the warmest ceremony of the year and every student must attend at least one before experiencing his/her bar/bat mitzvah.

The observations and feelings of one especially perceptive student prompted me to conclude this year's Bulletin article with the following thoughts.

A few weeks ago, I visited our 8th grade class as the students were discussing the depiction of family life in Genesis, the first book of the Torah. This student politely informed his teacher, Jane Sandlar, that the topic was too depressing for him to maintain his interest in the discussion.

The youngster had difficulty understanding the reverence for Abraham, who after hearing voices from God, proceeded to take his son for an outing to a mountain with the intention of killing him. This irrationality was preceded by his wife's jealousy prompting Abraham to force his first born-son and the boy's mother from his house to wander in the desert and presumably die of thirst.

The dysfunctional biblical family is in evidence throughout Genesis. Abraham's son Isaac was fooled by his wife, Rachel, and younger son, Jacob, to deny his first-born's natural right to a full inheritance. Abraham's great grandchildren, Jacob's children, sold one of their brothers into slavery as a jealous reaction to their father's affection for this child.

We use the term dysfunctional in a modern sense. I explained to the class that the only way to understand the apparent inhumanity described in our bible is to look at the people, places and events in a historical reference. Thankfully, rabbis have a way of transforming these seemingly ugly biblical scenes into worthwhile and practical lessons for us to internalize into our own value system.

The bible is full of other sad stories. Passover is about slavery, infant death and plagues. The entire

generation that escaped Pharaoh's tyranny had to die out before God permitted entrance into Canaan. Chanukah and Purim end happily but the integral part of the story is about the destruction of Jewish tradition.

The student is partially correct if he feels that our school's curriculum highlights the negative in Jewish history. American, world and Israeli history classes raise issues of anti-Semitism, the Holocaust and escape from persecution. It is easy to understand why students must be thick skinned to study a heritage and tradition whose adherents have so often been the victims. I agree with the 8th grader's observation that events in our tradition when taken literally create a disheartening image of our experiences as a people.

Lessons on the Holocaust invariably raises the question, "If God exists, why did so many innocent people perish?" A class on Israel is equally disturbing to teach. Students continuously raise the question as to why Israeli leaders haven't made peace with the Palestinians. Students are generally sympathetic to the Palestinians and feel, as the dominant people in the country, Israelis have treated Palestinians unfairly. Our school's role is to balance the negativity and help the 8th grade boy feel good about his Jewish identity.

The whole idea of mitzvot revolutionized western faith by making it obligatory on Jews to improve the world. When students ask, "What did we do wrong to cause so much hatred aimed at us?" I ask, "What did we do right to have survived?" Pride in our faith comes from our contributions to the world in so many fields in spite of persecution. Ethical monotheism replaced blind loyalty to a deity. We view God as just and a force for good, not revenge.

Reform Judaism does not mandate rules of belief; rather we analyze, discuss and use reason to make what happened in the past relevant for today. Students who only see the negative have missed the point.

I do not know what good a teacher can cull from the 6 million lost in the Holocaust except to show the resiliency of our people and as an impetus to the founding of a modern Israel.

No, the bad should not be swept under the proverbial rug. I invite parents to discuss the unpleasantness of our history with their children and try to find the lessons that will help us grow individually and as a people. Our Religious School pledges to do its best to help each child achieve a positive Jewish selfimage. Have a safe and healthy summer,
