

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REFLECTIONS

Of the many distinguishing features of the Jewish people, perhaps none is more consistent than a commitment to learning. As the late scholar Simon Rawidowicz once pointed out, Judaism is the only tradition that pictures God studying. Even the Almighty, in this fanciful depiction, leads the way for human beings to improve their minds and elevate their souls through learning.

When Rabbis Akiba and Tarfon had their renowned Talmudic dispute over which took precedence, study or practice, the resolution was that study took precedence, for it leads to practice. Judaism belittles study that does not change one's life, but at the same time it exalts periodic study lishma, for its own sake, for no other reason than the joy of exercising one's mind and expanding one's spirit.

There are more books on Judaism in English than in any other language at any other time in history. Even for those who do not (yet) know Hebrew, the tradition in all its wisdom awaits. "When I pray," said Louis Finkelstein, the late chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary, "I speak to God. When I study, God speaks to me." Rabbi David Wolpe

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

Only in America. That is the title of a book I read when I was a teen-ager. I still have my copy, a paperback that cost fifty cents. It was written by Harry Golden, a cigar-chomping journalist whose columns were hailed for their wit and wisdom and whose newspaper The Carolina Israelite was read by pundits all across the country. Only in America. I remembered the book when I heard Joe Lieberman use those words to describe his nomination for Vice President of the United States.

Only in America could a Jew, an observant one at that, be given the opportunity to run for such a high office with the possibility of being a heartbeat away from the presidency. Whether or not he is elected, all Americans, especially our children and grandchildren, will benefit from the lesson in tolerance and integrity that this campaign will undoubtedly provide.

Joe Lieberman is a man of faith, who represents what is best about both America and Judaism – a country where we are free to be different and a religion whose values are to be lived every day. Recently, I heard a story that illustrates the point. One Friday evening, the Senate remained in session until very late. Since Shabbat had already begun, Senator Lieberman was preparing to walk home, when Vice President Gore offered him a ride. Lieberman declined, indicating that he doesn't drive on Shabbat, at which point Vice President Gore said, "Then I'll walk with you." And so Al Gore and his Secret Service agents walked home with Joe Lieberman that night, enjoying together the peace and fellowship that is Shabbat.

One of Joe Lieberman's greatest strengths is that he knows who he is and he isn't afraid to be himself. We may have been a bit uncomfortable that first day when he talked so much about God and the Bible and prayer, but upon further reflection we realized that he was doing what any observant Jew, Orthodox or otherwise, would do on such a momentous occasion: reciting the Shehecheyanu and thanking God for yet another opportunity to make a difference in the world. The distinction between his religious commitment and that of so many others who invoke God's name is that he won't try to convert anyone. He understands that America is stronger when we rejoice in our similarities and respect our differences.

Ever since I was a little girl, it has been my custom to kiss the mezzuzah when I enter my home. Tears filled my eyes when I saw Joe Lieberman do just that, as he walked outside to greet the press. It was obvious that he does it all the time; it wasn't just for show. A mezzuzah is a sign of Jewish identity, a reminder that you take the values of our tradition with you wherever you go and that others will learn about Jews and Judaism through the way in which you behave. We are fortunate to have a man like Joe Lieberman, who has earned the respect of both Democrats and Republicans through his lifelong commitment to the task of tikkun olam (repairing the world), represent us in the pages of American history. I, for one, wish him well.

MISSION STATEMENT

The members of Monmouth Reform Temple strive to create and maintain a community that embodies the ideals and practices of Reform Judaism. To achieve this mission, we set objectives in four aspects of synagogue life: House of Learning (*Beit Midrash* בה-מבר), House of Worship (*Beit Tefilah* בה-מבלה), House of Assembly (*Beit Knesset*), and Repair of the World (*Tikkun Olam*).

House of Learning (Beit Midrash בה-מדרש)

A synagogue:

- that teaches Torah.
- that empowers its members to take responsibility for their own Jewishness.
- that provides Jewish knowledge and education for adults and children.
- that helps its members create Jewish homes and foster Jewish memories.
- whose teachers are knowledgeable about and committed to teaching Reform Judaism.

House of Worship (Beit Tefilah בַת-תַפְלָה)

A synagogue:

- that worships together as a community.
- whose members strive to understand God.
- whose members are familiar with its services and are comfortable participating.
- whose members recognize the sacredness of the Jewish calendar by celebrating Shabbat and Jewish holidays.
- whose liturgy reflects the needs and desires of its members.

House of Assembly (Beit Knesset בית-כנסת)

A synagogue:

- that strives to fulfill the role of extended family.
- where every member commits to contribute a fair share of time and money.
- where issues of daily life are discussed from a Jewish perspective.
- · where members and their families socialize in a Jewish environment.

Repair of the World (Tikkun Olam תקון עולם)

A synagogue:

- that provides a Jewish presence in the larger community.
- whose members participate in social action projects.
- whose members contribute to Jewish and non-Jewish charities.
- that partners with the local Jewish Federation and the institutions of Reform Judaism.
- that recognizes the importance of Israel to the Jewish people.
- that builds coalitions with other faith communities.

<u>A Note from Cantor Daniel M. Rosenfeld</u> Shalom!

Summer already seems to be a passing thought as we now find ourselves gearing up for yet another High Holy Day season. As the month of *Elul* approaches, I try to prepare myself mentally and spiritually for the holidays by considering ways in which I can make myself a better person. I take an honest look at the mistakes I've made in the past, specifically the past year, and I consider ways in which to keep from repeating those mistakes in the coming year. I also consider my immediate and long term goals, and pledge to do what is necessary to achieve them.

The period of Yamim Nora'im or the Ten Days of Awe offers a profoundly effective framework in which to achieve these goals by underscoring the themes of forgiveness or S'lichot and repentance or Tshuva. Before one can achieve these goals, one must be in the proper state of mind. In order to reach the proper state of mind, one must be willing to humble oneself before God and the congregation. And there is no one for whom humility is more important than the service leader or Shaliach Tzibbur, literally the messenger of the public. The Shaliach Tzibbur serves as a conduit between God and the congregation; he or she takes the prayers of the entire community and sends them to God. But they are meaningless unless he or she acknowledges the weight of this responsibility and includes the most plaintive cry for forgiveness on his or her own behalf.

The prayer which best expresses my view of how I see myself in the role of *Shaliach Tzibbur* is the *Hineni*, with which our Rosh Hashanah Evening service commences. The opening words demonstrate this so eloquently: "Hi-n'-ni he-a-ni mima-as, nir-ash v'-nif-chad mi-pa-chad yo-sheiv t'-hilot Yis-ra-el.." "Behold me, of little merit, trembling and afraid, as I stand before You to plead for Your people. O gracious god, the One enthroned by Israel's praises. "Implicit in this text is the link between humility and fear. Here, the word fear is synonymous with awe; a sense of wonder at the magnitude of God and God's creation. The *Shaliach Tzibbur* or Cantor pleads on behalf of the people saying that though we realize how small and insignificant we are, we still hope that God will hear our prayers and continue to shower us with love and mercy.

There are various musical settings of Hineni. Over the years, great Cantors have composed their own versions of this praver as they have done with other major sections of the liturgy. Traditionally, the various settings of Hineni are composed in a scale similar to that of the Ahavah Rabah mode with many variations. Briefly, the Ahavah Rabah mode is what I like to refer to as the "Fiddler" mode because it is heard throughout the show, Fiddler On the Roof. The most effective settings of this prayer always begin with a slow, intensely quiet introduction, rising to a peak on the words, "eh-yeh asher eh-yeh, sheh-ta-vo t'fi-la-ti lif-nei chi-sei ch'vo-deh-chah. . ." "I will be what I will be so that my prayer will come before the throne of your glory, for the sake of the just, the righteous, the pure and the honest. . ." In the end, the effectiveness of any rendition of this special prayer depends on individual interpretation. It is therefore incumbent on the Cantor to present it in as sincere and genuine a manner as possible, in short, from the soul.

As we approach the turn of the year, let us all work together to make our prayers as genuine as they can be so that they reach God's ears properly. I look forward to worshipping with you this High Holy Day season. May you all have a Sweet New Year.

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RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES Where parents set the example

Grades 4-7 will open the 2000-2001 academic year on Wednesday, September 13, followed by Sunday, September 17 for all students. The Temple's office has sent out this year's edition of the Religious School Booklet and the notification letter in which your children's class and room for the first day are indicated. If this letter does not reach you by September 5, please contact Elinor in our Temple office.

On the first Sunday, the Religious Education Committee will hold its annual Back to School meeting. Bagels and coffee at 9:30 am opens the proceedings. Jay Wiesenfeld, Religious Education Committee chair, Rabbi Priesand, representatives from other committees and your principal will make short presentations. My time will be used to introduce our new Hebrew program and spell out how parents can assist their children toward reading mastery.

At the conclusion of our meeting, parents will have the opportunity to meet their children's teachers as they explain their curriculum.

In last month's Bulletin article I gave you an encapsulated description of my three weeks in the Middle East. My knowledge of prayer Hebrew gave me a substantial comfort level when I attended services at Hebrew Union College and, a week later, at Kehilat Sulam Ya'akov (Jacob's ladder) in Zichron Yaacov. The prayers and songs in both services were very familiar and easy to follow. Sitting among strangers in Kehilat Sulam Ya'akov, I felt connected by our common worship rituals and liturgical language.

While conversational Hebrew instruction is prohibitive given our limited schedule, prayer Hebrew fluency is attainable by every student and is absolutely necessary as a unifying agent for Jews everywhere, a bridge to the past and as a means to understand Jewish values and philosophy.

This year, our Religious School is instituting a new Hebrew program for grades 3 through 6. This series Z'man Likro, <u>Time to Read</u>, and Z'man L'Tefilah, <u>The</u> <u>Time for Prayer</u>, fulfills criteria that I have had for our Hebrew instruction for a long time. It gives us a coordinated program so that work not completed in one grade can be the starting point in the next grade. It is gender neural material and respects Reform values and prayers. The program provides sample practice material and a practical methodology for developing a solid prayer vocabulary by the program's conclusion. In addition, the publisher offers excellent teacher support materials to enrich the basic textbooks. An added benefit is that the program has a narrow conversational component in grades 5 and 6 to help our children develop their ear for the language.

The best part of the whole process is that MRT is fortunate to have just the staff to put the program into practice. All four of our teachers are fluent in Hebrew and well trained in Judaica. Karen Kahn (grade 3 and a Temple member), Miriam Bougie (grade 4), Lea Ghidali (grade 5), and Cantor Rosenfeld (grade 6).

This program is ambitious. Our teachers will not give any more homework or study assignments than in past years--about 30 minutes per session, but it is imperative that parents supervise their children to complete the assignments and study the material.

Our teachers have done their part. They all attended a workshop conducted by the co-author of *Z'man L'Tifilah* series, Dina Maiben, and have studied the materials over the summer.

Hebrew instruction actually begins in the second grade. Each week these children receive a four page, colorful booklet describing one Hebrew letter. The booklet explains the letter through pictures and illustrative words.

Grade 2 spends about 30% of its time on learning the aleph-bet and grades 3 through 6 devote 50% of their sessions toward Hebrew prayer instruction.

Every year I revise and reissue the Religious School Booklet to keep school parents informed about our polices, routines and activities for the upcoming year. Of course, the new Hebrew program is the major change discussed throughout the booklet. Since the Booklet is mailed to school parents, I want to point out to the general membership that the Religious Education Committee re-examined the Ten Goals of Reform Jewish Education issued by the UAHC and reworded them to reflect our goals at MRT. As I said in the introduction to this year's Religious School Booklet, this process required several sessions, much discussion and compromise to form the philosophical basis for our curriculum and classroom lessons. These goals will be the basis of lessons in all classrooms.

The third major change is that <u>beginning in the</u> 2000-2001 school year, students in the third grade will be required to attend two Shabbat services during the academic year.




