

Think about the last time you watched a candle – really watched a candle. The silent, flickering candle has enormous power. It draws us in, invites our full attention, beckons us to be still.

The candle is endlessly fascinating, constantly changing, yet somehow absolutely constant. Its flame is fragile and it can be easily extinguished. Yet it is also awesomely powerful. It can bring light and warmth. It can also unleash enormous destruction.

The midrash says that we are God's candle. We too are endlessly fascinating, ever-changing, exquisitely vulnerable, and enormously powerful. We embody a hint of God's power and radiance, yet we can be extinguished in a moment. We can create light and hope and joy, and we can unleash rage and hate. We change moment by moment, and yet some part of us – the divine part – is eternal.

Sometimes it is easy to look into the eyes of another person and see the reflection of the Divine. We can see the light in the eyes of a lover, brimming with passion and tenderness. We can see the twinkle in the eyes of a laughing child. We can see the light go on as a child learns to read or as an adult discovers new possibilities. We can see the inner glow as a friend speaks the truth with deep genuineness. We are warmed by the light as an older person radiates vitality and wisdom.

The midrash invites us to look deeply for the divine light in others and to honor the light within ourselves. If we could see each person as a divine candle – exquisitely beautiful, vulnerable yet powerful, changing yet eternal – perhaps we would treat other people and ourselves with more respect and greater care. Perhaps we would more readily see them as a treasure, a gift, a wonder. Perhaps if we saw each other in this way, we would bring more light to the world.

FROM RABBI PRIESAND

One of the privileges of serving as president of Interfaith Neighbors is the opportunity to see firsthand the wonderful work being done in our community. Recently, Max Singer and I attended the dedication of a renovated house in Asbury Park as part of Interfaith Neighbors' Home Ownership The house had been purchased by Program. Interfaith Neighbors for \$1 from the City of Asbury Park and beautifully restored by volunteers from AmeriCorps and the New Jersey Youth Corps. Generous support was also provided by the New Jersey Natural Gas Company in coordination with the Governor's Adopt-A-Neighborhood Program whose primary goal is to help residents improve the quality of life in their neighborhoods by working with corporations that have the appropriate resources.

The new homeowner is a single mother with three children, ages five, seven and eight. She came to Interfaith Neighbors three years ago when she needed help paying her rent. Little did she know then that one day this same group would help her realize her dream – the dream of every family – owning a home for herself and her children. Despite working two jobs, that dream seemed out of reach, but now, with the help of so many caring people, it has become a reality. It was a pleasure to meet her at the dedication ceremony and to see her face aglow with joy and gratitude.

Interfaith Neighbors was founded in 1988. Its original purpose was to fight homelessness by providing rental subsidies for those in need of a helping hand. We at Monmouth Reform Temple were among the founders, seeing this as an opportunity to make a difference in our community by fulfilling the teaching of Maimonides who said that the highest form of tzdakah is helping people help themselves. In the last year alone, 211 families have been assisted.

In addition to its Homelessness Prevention Program and the Home Ownership Program begun in 1996, Interfaith Neighbors operates a Senior Meals Program which serves 425,000 nutritious meals each year to senior citizens in Monmouth County. During the summer months, it also runs a

Summer Food Service Program, serving more than 20,000 meals during the summer months to children in Asbury Park.

I am proud that our congregation continues to be associated with such a worthwhile organization, and I thank all of you for the contributions you make to our Fund for the Homeless which supports the work of Interfaith Neighbors. Working together with others in our community, we have fulfilled countless dreams, nurtured untold hopes and touched numerous lives. May Interfaith Neighbors go from strength to greater strength, and may the time come, speedily and soon, when hunger and homelessness are no more, allowing all God's children to know the joy of freedom.

A Note from Cantor Daniel M. Rosenfeld Shalom!



On Sunday afternoon, March 18th, our adult choir performed with ten other volunteer choirs from various temples in the New Jersey/West Hudson region on the annual UAHC choral festival known as the Zimriyah. Our choir performed beautifully, singing two selections, Mi Chamocha by Salomone Rossi and Shalom Rav by Beth Abrams-Schafer, an acquaintance and former student of our director, Alice Berman. All of the choirs together sang two pieces, Halleluyah (from Psalm 150) by Louis Lewandowski, and Samachti Libi (from Psalm 122) by Charles Osborne. The theme of this year's Zimriyah was Shirei Torah or Torah through song.

I must say that I personally find these events extremely inspiring, rewarding and invigorating. There is nothing like hearing volunteers from congregations around the region stand up in public and share the joy of prayer in song. This is the essence of Jewish prayer, for without music, prayer loses its power not only to move worshippers, but to reach God's ears. In fact, the rabbis of old insisted that all Scripture and prayer be intoned through song rather than simply spoken.

This brings to mind other comments which I have made in the past concerning the role of the choir. In an earlier article, I discussed the role of the choir as Sh'lichei Tzibbur (Messengers of the Public). The term, Shaliach Tzibbur traditionally denotes the one who leads the service, performing the function of sending the congregation's prayers to God. In singing the liturgy along with the Cantor, the choir is performing the vital function of leading They are not there to show off their worship. musical virtuosity which is indeed impressive in our adult choir. Rather they are there to co-lead worship in partnership with myself and the Rabbi. The most stirring example I can remember of this partnership is from this year's Shabbat Shirah service when I, the Rabbi, and the choir together led a rousing rendition of Yism'chu by Cantor Robert Solomon. In closing. I would like to allude to remarks made by Cantor Jessica Levitt of Temple Ner Tamid, the host for this year's Zimriyah. She passionately called for the proliferation of choral singing in our syngogues. In response to the notion that the choir may deter congregants from praying, she stated to all of us there, specifically the choirs, "you are the congregation." It warmed my heart to hear a colleague make such a statement, for it underscores what I consider to be the most important concept of our worship: simply put, we're all in this together. Here at Monmouth Reform Temple, I am grateful to be part of a community which not only supports, but values its choir. It makes for a truly moving worship experience for all of us every time.

SOCIAL ACTION

A hundred children crowded onto the bema, circled around Mandy Patinkin, Jon Corzine, our newly elected U.S. Senator, and Matthew Small. At Patinkin's request, they turned to their parents and shouted: "PLEASE ASK!"" That was the essential message of the day at the Gun Safety and Awareness Forum held at Monmouth Reform Temple on Sunday, March 4, 2001.

The program commenced with words of welcome from Rabbi Priesand who stressed the theme of accepting responsibility. Social Action Chair Bob Blank joined in words of welcome and stated that the event was an extension of MRT's participation in the Million Mom March last Mother's Day with the themes of the speakers of that day having been brought home by a tragic accident involving eleven year old Matthew Small, a member of our Temple family.

Michael Small, Matthew's father, related the story of how he and his wife Kelly came to learn of the serious eye injury Matthew had sustained when he was accidentally shot with a BB gun while away with a friend's family in upstate New York. Matthew has lost all vision in that eye and may lose the eye itself.

Bryan Miller, Executive Director of Ceasefire New Jersey, who assisted in the organization and promotion of the event, spoke of the need for legislation requiring that all handguns sold in New Jersey be childproof.

Daniel Gross and Talmage Cooley, co-founders of PAX, the movement to end gun violence, explained the "A.S.K." (Asking Saves Kids) campaign. That campaign educates parents to ask if there are guns in the homes where they send their children to play. On a 60" television screen, they showed a few of the spot commercials which PAX has developed as part of the "A.S.K." campaign.

Mandy Patinkin remarked that the Temple reminded him of the one where he attended Hebrew School as a youth growing up on the south side of Chicago. He tied his involvement in PAX to the Jewish values which were instilled in him early in life. We must have concern, he learned, not only for the safely and welfare of Jews, but for all people.

Jon Corzine identified himself early in his campaign for the U.S. Senate as a friend of the movement to reduce gun violence. He has already

co-sponsored several pieces of legislation in that regard. He spoke from the heart. His very presence underscored the importance of the issues.

An audience of about 300 people filled the sanctuary to overflowing. Many of the children attending brought toy guns to exchange for stuffed animals or other nonviolent toys.

Special thanks are extended to the entire Small family for their willingness to go public with their story and to share their pain with the hope that something positive would come out of the tragic accident which befell Matthew. Special thanks are also extended to Rabbi Priesand for her support of the event, to Pam Burke who coordinated the toy gun exchange, and to the members of the Social Action Committee, and to all of those who attended, making the forum an overwhelming success.

ROBERT C. BLANK ATTORNEY AT LAW

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I have been following a story reported in the New York Times about Chancellor Harold Levy's battle with the Bronx High School of Science over the selection of its new principal. It appears that the students, faculty, alumni and anyone else connected to the school favored the permanent appointment of the current acting principal. Chancellor Levy publicly advocated finding a person of immense scientific stature to head the school. According to sources from the Board of Education, Mr. Levy was hoping to attract a noble laureate who would bring immediate national prominence to the school. As the debate ensued, the acting principal secured a principal's position in a Long Island school district at an increase in salary. Coincidentally, his appointment to the Bronx High School of Science came through several days after the resignation was conveyed to the chancellor's office. Mr. Levy's office claimed that the letter of appointment was delayed by the postal service. (Believe whatever you wish.)

Clearly, Chancellor Levy erred. He permitted a man who spent his entire career at the Bronx high school and, by all accounts had proven himself to be an excellent teacher, communicator and administrator, to take his experience and leadership ability to a school outside of New York City.

Yet, I am sympathetic to Chancellor Levy's reasoning. A nationally recognized scientist would attract an even better faculty, an even more academically competitive student body and, certainly, huge donations from the private sector. In keeping with this logic, a professor of mine in graduate school advocated that such an approach as proposed by the chancellor should be applied to all New York City high schools as a means to slow down the exodus of the more talented students to the suburbs. The professor felt that by placing prominent scholars in leadership positions on the high school level, cities could stem the flow of "white flight."

Many of our MRT students attend private schools. I wonder if the areas' public schools had nationally recognized leaders as their principals if parents might reconsider their choice of private school vs. public education.

A sports reference along the same theme adds credibility to Chancellor Levy's position. Can you imagine what kind of draw Joe Torre's name would be to any little league program? What would happen if it were announced that only the first 25 eighth graders to

register could play on Joe's team? Sports minded parents would wait on line for days just to have their children managed by such a legendary individual. Parents of children not selected would probably sue claiming all sorts of abuse.

What does Chancellor Levy and Joe Torre have to do with MRT and me? I am certainly not nationally recognized in any capacity. I am happy to say that our school has on its staff a nationally recognized teacher, whose opinions are sought by colleagues on a regular basis. It is not uncommon for our rabbi to receive a hundred e-mails in a 24-hour period, many of which seek her counsel on significant Jewish and lay issues. When I attend educator conventions, I often introduce myself as Sally Priesand's principal. In every situation, a smile comes to my listener's lips with instant recognition of her name. Not because she is the first, but because in the rabbinic community, Rabbi Sally is respected as a person who always speaks from an informed point of view and expresses herself in clear and insightful prose.

We know that Sally's sermons are unusally well reasoned, with an easy to follow beginning, middle and end. Whether giving a formal speech, a casual introduction, a brief or lengthy dvar torah, or leading a discussion group, our Rabbi is consistently well prepared. Out of respect to her students, she is equally ready in the classroom.

If this is all true, then why do some parents allow their children to drop out of Religious School after their Bar/Bat Mitzvah or in the 8th and 9th grades? Parents often tell me that it is their children's choice to continue. Frankly, I never cease to be amazed by that statement. No parent would allow a child to exercise the same poor judgement in secular school.

Rabbi Priesand could earn thousands of dollars on the lecture circuit. Her intellect and understanding of current issues have resulted in appointments to many prestigious committees, and your children may access her talents by just remaining in Religious School until Confirmation.

True, Sally is my close friend, but she is also my rabbi and mentor. Your children would do well to sit at her proverbial feet for 30 Sundays.


