
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

SOCIAL ACTION

The impact of Monmouth Reform Temple's "Gun Safety and Awareness Forum" held on March 4th continues to be felt. We have received several inquires from concerned parents who would like to have a program presented at their child's school for the students or for the Parent Teacher organization of that school. Those who attended the MRT program will always remember Mandy Patinkin gathering the children on the bema and having them turn to their parents and yell: "Please ask!" Please ask if there is a gun in the house where I am going to play. The message is clearly stated in the pamphlet "Asking Saves Kids" produced by PAX whose co-founders Dan Gross and Talmadge Cooley spoke at the March 4th event. According to the pamphlet, over 40% of homes with children have a gun. The pamphlet advises parents, before sending your child to someone's house (playmate, relative, neighbor), to ASK if they have a gun in the home. If there is not a gun in the home...great! That's one less thing you have to worry about. If there is a gun, make sure that the gun is stored unloaded and locked, ideally in a gun safe, with ammunition locked separately."

The Social Action Committee seeks the assistance of members of the congregation to spread this simple yet lifesaving message. We would like to be a resource for those who would spread the word: "Please Ask!" If you would be willing to participate as a speaker at a program, to arrange a program at a local school or business, to distribute the "Asking Saves Kids" pamphlet or to help in any other way, please contact me or call the Temple office. As Mandy Patinkin so eloquently put it on that snowy day in March, "Ask if there is a gun in the home; it's easier than picking out a coffin."

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FROM RABBI PRIESAND

What a joyful evening the 40/20 celebration was! The room was beautifully decorated, the food great, the music perfect for the occasion, the entertainment a wonderful showcase for the talent we have in our midst – from Havdalah to the final dance, it was indeed a festive occasion. I was particularly touched by the warm and heartfelt remarks of Gerald Reisner concerning my twenty years with the temple and very grateful for the beautifully handcrafted pin that was presented to me. I will wear it with pride and fond memories of all we have shared these past two decades. For those unable to attend, permit me to repeat here my message in the anniversary booklet:

Anniversaries, like birthdays, offer a special opportunity to look backward and ahead. Tonight's celebration evokes memories of days gone by, of people who once sat among us and are sorely missed, of dreams fulfilled and hopes realized. It also bids us look to the future, aware of new challenges, ready once again to bring our hearts and our hands to the many tasks that remain undone. As we mark this moment in time, we give thanks to God for the many blessings bestowed upon our congregation and for the sincerity and unselfishness with which so many volunteer their time and expertise. These three – God, blessing, sincerity – are foremost in my mind this night.

Every letter of the Hebrew alphabet has a numerical equivalent. The letter ש stands for forty. It also represents one of the many names we have for God - מקום (makom). Literally, מקום means "place," reminding us that God is present in every place if we but pay attention. That is the lesson we learn from Jacob who upon waking from his dream exclaimed in awe: "Surely God is present in this place (makom) and I, I knew it not." We all know that this is really the forty-second anniversary of our temple and so we add the letter \neg which has a numerical value of two. \neg stands for \neg which has a numerical value of two. \neg stands for (b'racha) which means "blessing." \neg is the first letter of Torah. Our sages taught that God began creation with the letter \neg in order to remind us that everything we do is an opportunity to bring blessing into the world. \neg is also a letter of duality. In the beginning, God created everything in pairs. Thus, we are partners with God and with each other in moving the world forward toward that purpose for which it was created. The letter \neg also calls to mind the rabbinic teaching that whenever two people sit to study Torah God's Presence dwells among them.

This is my twentieth year in your midst. The Hebrew letter \supset stands for twenty. It is the first letter of the word \supset (kavanah) which means "sincerity" in the sense of doing things with intention. I have tried to bring my heart to all my responsibilities and you have responded with yours. That is why our partnership has been so successful and has lasted so long. Thank you for your continued willingness to explore with me the eternal drama we call Judaism. May God continue to bless our efforts in the years ahead, and may we strive always to be the best that we can be.

<u>A Note from Cantor Daniel M. Rosenfeld</u> Shalom!

We truly have been blessed with a breath-I'm thinking of the magnolia taking Spring. blossoms which covered the walk in front of my apartment over the last few weeks. How fitting it is that our temple experienced so beautiful and joyous an occasion as the Dinner Dance on Saturday April 28th when we gathered together to celebrate Rabbi Priesand's more than twenty years at MRT and the congregation's fortieth anniversary. I offer my heartfelt congratulations to Sheila Leavitt and her committee for planning such a wonderful event. It was a sheer pleasure to share in the warmth and spirit of that occasion with our temple family. Again, congratulations to Sheila and all of those who made it happen.

In addition to the joy and beauty of this season's events, we were graced with the presence of one of the Reform Movement's foremost composers, my teacher and friend Bonia Shur. Professor Shur has served on the faculty of Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati since 1974. On Sunday, April 29th, he visited our area as part of the Jewish cultural series sponsored by the Strategic Plan Initiative Fund of the Jewish Federation of Greater Monmouth County, and four Reform Temples of Monmouth County, including our own congregation. In the afternoon at Temple Shalom, Professor Shur delivered a lecture entitled From Traditional To Jazz In The Synagogue, replete with humorous, colorful anecdotes and musical examples. During his presentation, he traced the evolution of Jewish music from Biblical times on up to our own era. Professor Shur demonstrated his intimate familiarity with the genres and conventions which have influenced the music of our people for centuries. In typical fashion, he opined on what he considered to be the worthy and less worthy among those influences. Whether or not everyone agreed with his comments, they came away from the presentation invigorated and with food for thought.

Later in the evening, Professor Shur conducted a special workshop for our Adult Choir here at the temple. And that's when the fun really began. He conducted the ensemble through nine of his compositions explaining in depth the various events and individuals who had inspired him. He shared stories of an intimate nature which revealed his beliefs and his life experiences, at times painful. He then went on to improvise a piece with the choir based on New Jersey traffic patterns. This is one of his trademarks, to compose on the spot with singers of all ages and musical backgrounds.

The choir was exhilarated by his presence and by the work he did with them. It was a genuine thrill for our members to meet and work with a *real, live* composer of his stature. Knowing Bonia, I can safely say that he also enjoyed the workshop immensely. In fact, he was so impressed by our choir that he sent them a letter in which he offered them glowing praise. I would like to share it with you:

"I truly enjoyed working with you both artistically and socially. I treasured every minute of sharing the inner structure of my compositions. Your total attention to my directions allowed me to take you through the maze of little notes and rhythmic constellations which form harmonic universes that move the listener through the entirety of the composition.

"I would love to be in touch with you. I would love to work with you again on a new project that would allow me to share with you again the pulse of my creative mechanism.

"Be blessed in your every day lives."

This letter gives an inkling of how rewarding an evening it was for both the composer and the choir. A number of our singers commented on how quickly the three hour workshop passed.

In closing, I would like to extend my deepest gratitude to all who were involved in this project, and I look forward to undertaking more like it in the year to come. *L'shalom v'ahavah*,


MEET OUR JUNE B'NAI MITZVAH

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES

where parents set the example

The five Monmouth County reform religious school principals are in the process of organizing the final details for their 3rd annual teachers' workshop. As with most yearly events, planning for the October 14, 2001 event began the month following our fall, 2000 teachers' gathering. We needed monthly meetings to first decide on a theme, the structure of the day and the facilitators for the sessions. The workshop will be held as usual at MRT.

The Holiness of Teaching is this year's theme. The workshop agenda includes coffee, a prayer service, a keynote address, two seventy-five minute sessions, lunch and a follow-up evaluation. Temple lay leaders are encouraged to attend, and frankly, you will enjoy the quality of instruction and discussion.

Rabbi Priesand and Cantor Rosenfeld will conduct the morning service. Rabbi Malinger of Temple Shalom, Rabbi Stanway of Temple Beth Miriam, Rabbi Sherman of Temple Shaari Emeth, and Rabbi Weber of Temple Rodeph Torah will act as facilitators for the first session. Each rabbi will select a favorite Jewish text that demonstrates that teaching is a holy endeavor. Certainly, we know through Rabbi Priesand's Mitzvah Program that Talmud Torah (studying Torah) is one of the highest commandments. Attention to learning is incumbent upon the teacher and the student. As principals, we hope that the rabbis' sessions are instructive and motivate their participants to strive even more to perfect their teaching skills.

The second session, with each of the principals leading a group, aims to provide additional methods to solving problematic classroom situations or altering teachers' behaviors. The five classes are the Holiness of Speech: how teachers speak to and about students; Derech Eretz: the holiness of proper conduct through textual clues on better classroom discipline; What do our sacred texts tell us about teaching: respect for the students by being prepared for their lessons; Creating a sacred space: developing spirituality in the classroom; and the Holiness of Hebrew: how language instills the message of Judaism.

A benefit from dialoging with the other principals during the past three years has been the exchange of ideas and knowledge regarding Judaism. Also, we candidly talk of areas of concern within our own schools and share our individual approaches to their solution. Similarly, I find the Religious School Committee meetings at MRT just as productive. A principal cannot know everything and, therefore, discussions are useful to clarify and refine topics raised at our monthly meetings. Often, I employ my experience to expand and utilize suggestions first presented by members of our committee. Please consider joining the Religious Education Committee. You will be surprised at the immediate impact your participation will have on the operation of our religious school. Contact Bob Gabel for more information.

It is important that uninvolved religious school parents realize that many members give freely of their limited time to make MRT a better experience for all children.

At the top of the list is Jay Wiesenfeld, past chair of the Religious Education Committee, for his insightful leadership and very well run committee meetings. Members of the committee coordinated holiday programs: Arthur George (Chanukah Celebration), Ilene Saporta (model seder) and Karen Grieco (shalach manot baskets). Karen Cole and Rachel Placitella have given many hours throughout the year on projects for the school. Now, long time member of the committee, Dr. Bob Gabel, has taken on the responsibility of chair.

For many, many years, Brian McMullen has been responsible for collecting the weekly tzdakah from each class, tallying the money, maintaining records and preparing a weekly graph that visually explains each class' contribution. This year, our class parents have been very helpful, especially the parents who have coordinated the 4^{th} , 5^{th} and 6^{th} grade oneg shabbat celebrations.

I want to mention our hard working class aides: Lauren Kramer, Lillian St. Lifer and Melissa Boskey for being friends to their children and providing superior support to their cooperating teachers. Recent confirmands Brianne Perlman, Randi Goldberg and Jason Ryterband volunteered their time on Sunday mornings to make the school more enjoyable for your children.

Matthew Amtzis, our Hebrew aide on Wednesdays and Sundays warrants individual mention. He acted like a big brother to the children and was very concerned about their progress. He helped Ms. Ghidali prepare the 5th grade classes for their services and was in attendance on those Shabbat evenings to provide assistance and support. He also helped at dismissal in the parking lot to add an extra pair of eyes and supervision in a potentially dangerous area.

I am very grateful to our magnificent office staff, Mindy (temple secretary) and Elinor (office Manager), for their assistance and friendship.

Our teachers deserve special praise. Many of our teachers extended themselves beyond their contractual obligations. Debbie Weissman organized trips for grade 5, 8 and 9. Our Comparative Religion curriculum took on new life in the hands of our dedicated 8th grade teacher, Beverly Gruensfelder. Through the energies and skill of Mark Winter, we added a Prophets course to our 5th grade curriculum this year. I would like to extend a very special thank you to Sidney Sandler for assuming the responsibility of our 4th grade Religious Studies program. As many of you may be aware Diane Gross left our school in March for medical reasons. We wish her a r'fua sh'leima. Lea Ghidali made Hebrew instruction on the internet a reality for her classes. Miriam Bougie raised Hebrew instruction to a very high level. Larry Weingroff made the parking lot safer for your children. Janet Bell showed her students that Torah study could be lively and relevant. Cantor Rosenfeld and Judy Raybon were instrumental in giving the 6th grade insight into Jewish history and our Shabbat service.

No principal could have asked for a more dedicated and cooperative group of early childhood teachers than Miriam Abramson, Rita Colodin, Lisa Calderwood, Karen Kahn and Barbara Borges. After many years of service, Mrs. Abramson, our marvelous kindergarten teacher, has decided that it is time to relax on Sunday mornings and will not return next year. Our school will miss her exuberant personality, level of professionalism, sense of Jewishness and love for our children.

Rabbi Priesand is a very involved member of the Religious Education Committee, teaches the confirmation class every Sunday, coordinates the classes' charity selections, writes the Mitzvah of the Month sheet, prepares B'nai Mitzvah students and finds time to discover new programs that expand our school's mission.




