MESSAGE FROM MARK SASS, PRESIDENT, BOARD OF TRUSTEES ...

(Editor's note: This is an edited version of the message that Mark Sass gave at the Erev Rosh Hashonah service.)

Typically, I don't begin each New Year planning to deliver a state-of-the-temple address. But this year, it seemed smart to use this time, when we're all together, to update everyone on where things are and where they're going.

It's not possible to face the departure of someone after 32 years of leadership without significant anxiety. It's even tougher when that rabbi has been a close friend and advisor to so many of us. Since learning earlier this year that we would face the daunting task of replacing Rabbi Greenberg, the leadership of Valley has had to come to terms with several issues.

First, what happens during the period between Sol's departure and his successor's arrival? Second, how do we identify what we're looking for in our next rabbi and conduct such a search? And third, what can we be doing now so that Sol's successor assumes leadership of a thriving, involved, and enthusiastic congregation?

Tonight, I'll explain where we are regarding each of these issues. As an aside, I realize that I could be doing a better job of regularly keeping everyone up-to-date on our progress. Going forward, I can't promise more correspondence but I <u>can</u> promise that if anyone contacts me with questions or concerns, they'll find me extremely attentive and responsive.

To the <u>first</u> issue...what happens during the period between Sol's departure and his successor's arrival? This has involved making several decisions, some immediate, some over time. Many temples consider hiring a full-time, interim rabbi. There are pros and cons to this approach but there was broad agreement that David Kaufman, Valley's current senior rabbinic intern, represented our best choice for interim rabbinic leader-ship. David, who is in his final year at HUC, was already familiar with Sol's rabbinic style and the workings of Valley, and known to many in the congregation. Thanks to David , along with our intern for youth programs, Jeremy Baras who is a 4th year HUC student and former teacher in our Sunday school, the religious responsibilities of the temple have been met, uninterrupted.

The decisions over time have been more complicated. Do we ignore the perspective David brings as someone trained in the most current Reform thinking? Said differently, do we stay frozen in time while waiting for our next rabbi?

It comes down to a choice, <u>not</u> between changing or staying exactly the same but rather, between what I'd describe as "constant improvement" vs. "delayed perfection." In theory, both get you to the same place. Nevertheless, we've chosen constant improvement and I think right now, that sends the <u>right</u> message, both to the temple membership as well as to rabbinic candidates who might consider Valley as their next home. It says that we recognize change as inevitable and that we're ready to approach it confidently and enthusiastically. So to that end for example, the religious school, guided by Laura Beasley, has moved forward on an exciting and innovative curriculum, one designed to substantively improve the Jewish education of our children of all ages and in all grades. And yes, there *have* been a few changes in the scheduling and content of Shabbat services. But as with the direction of Reform Judaism itself, these are evolutionary, not revolutionary changes.

With that said, I should add that Valley Temple has, to some degree, always danced to it's own music. I suspect we always will. But that doesn't mean we can't update some of the songs every twenty or thirty years. It seems sensible then that during this time of transition, Valley recognizes and begins to embrace, within reason, some of these changes.

<u>Next</u>, how do we identify what we're looking for in our new Rabbi and conduct such a search? Well, speaking from a personal perspective, you form a search committee representing as wide a cross-section of temple membership as possible, you gather wisdom and guidance, not to mention a ton of paperwork from the UAHC and the Central Conference of American Rabbis, and you get comfortable with the fact that at every step in the

process, you're bound to annoy someone. The good news though, is that the process seems to be going smoothly. It began with a detailed application that asked a number of provocative yet critical questions. The search committee and board spent numerous evenings pondering and occasionally debating the answers to these questions.

One asked about our temple's core values. Another asked simply, what we were looking for in a rabbi. I thought that tonight, I'd share the answers to both of these, since they provide excellent insight into what we believe Sol's successor must understand and support. First, as to core values, we identified four:

1. To function as a small, intimate congregation where all members can have a close personal relationship with each other and the Rabbi.

2. To serve as a Jewish home for all congregants including interfaith families.

To be a source for Jewish literacy and education for all members of all ages.

4. Dedication to a Reform Jewish philosophy that's progressive, tolerant, and embracing.

And in a rabbi, we're looking for ...

--A leader with multi-generational appeal with the personality and drive necessary to establish great "chemistry" and energize the congregation to be more committed and responsive.

--A teacher/educator and spiritual leader/counselor.

--An individual accepting and embracing of Interfaith families/comfortable with a diverse congregation.

In keeping with long-established procedure, our opening was formally posted in the CCAR newsletter beginning in early Spring. This is a national publication that reaches virtually every ordained reform rabbi in the U.S. To give you some perspective, we are one of over 50 congregations nationwide currently engaged in such a search.

And even more challenging right now, the overall number of congregations exceeds the number of available rabbis. Nevertheless, we are well into the process, having spoken with several candidates, and it looks like a clearer picture should emerge before Thanksgiving. As you've probably observed, this process is *very* long and *very* involved. Realistically, whomever we hire will probably not be in place before June of next year. We have little control over this due to the contractual obligations most rabbis have with their existing congregations as well as the fact that *our* gain is another congregation's loss. Accordingly, they require 4-6 months notice while they initiate their *own* search.

If I'm to leave you with any final impression about where things stand however, it's that the task of replacing Rabbi Greenberg is being taken very seriously by an extremely dedicated search committee and board and that we are very optimistic about reaching a successful outcome.

<u>Third and finally</u>, what can we be doing now so that Sol's successor assumes leadership of a thriving, involved, and enthusiastic congregation? As background, I have felt for some time that the success and vitality of Valley Temple rests as much on the congregation as it does on the quality of our next rabbi. And the timing now is *especially critical…* keep in mind that courtship works both ways. Prospective candidates are evaluating *us* as much as we're evaluating *them*. They want to know what they're getting into. Is the culture one that's moving forward, backward, or standing still? Is participation in services, events, and activities reasonably broad or limited to just a few congregants? Are there enough members willing to serve on the board and guide the affairs of the temple? And when the office needs volunteers to help get things done at peak periods, are there members willing to get involved?

Frankly, I think it's the answers to <u>these</u> questions that will determine our future. I said last year that the tasks related to staging and running various temple events and activities continue to fall on the shoulders of just a handful of members.

Unfortunately, that's still true. In fairness, it's *also* true that virtually no one here is sitting around with a lot of spare time. So, what do we do? Well, building on an idea from a New Jersey congregation as well as something that already is circulated by our sisterhood, you'll be receiving a letter from me sometime in the next 8 weeks. In it, I'm going to describe different areas of need at the temple, the time that might be involved, and present you with opportunities to perform what we'll call "Millennium Mitzvahs". Some may involve just an hour or two once during the year. Others, like board service, might require a couple of hours a month. This isn't a contract, just a way to identify where you *might* be willing to participate. Then, when we *do* need some extra help in the office, when we *are* looking for new board members, when we *do* need assistance at a holiday dinner, we know where to turn.

This not only assures a bright future for Valley, it sends a clear and unmistakable message...that this <u>entire</u> <u>congregation</u> plays an active role in making this temple what we believe it is., an intimate congregation where we all know each other, a Jewish home for all members, a source of Jewish literacy and education, and a model for everything Reform Judaism strives to be.

If you ask me, that sounds like a place the very best reform rabbis in America will want to lead.

Project TLC: Caregivers Together in Learning & Coping

Caring for a spouse, a parent, or other older adult is often stressful and lonely. Caregivers trying to find support and information will now have easier access to those services through a new program called Project **TLC**: *Caregivers Together in Learning & Coping* Introduced by Jewish Family Service as a program of the Older Adult Department and funded by a grant from the Ohio Department of Aging, this innovative new project follows a national movement focusing on caregivers' needs. Project **TLC**: *Caregivers Together in Learning & Coping* Offers three areas of support to caregivers:

- + Peer support by pairing together caregivers that share similar caregiving experiences and interests.
- + Internet support that includes interactive "chat" rooms, professional advice, and information.

.. Education on issues related to aging and caregiving, including information on community resources.

The heart of Project TLC: Caregivers Together in Learning & Coping is the peer support relationship among caregivers. Caregivers are paired with another person who shares common interests and, most importantly, is in a similar caregiving situation. The peer relationship is a mutually supportive relationship that allows the caregiver an emotional connection to someone who truly understands the experience of caregiving. This relationship, along with the educational programs and Internet support that Project TLC offers, enables caregivers to access the support and information they need more readily and at their convenience.

New Year Begins With Violence

Happy New Year to all and Shalom.

I wish that I could bring you all tidings of joy and peace, news of a ratified peace agreement between Israel and the Palestinians. Unfortunately, as we enter the New Year, 5761, Israel is once again embroiled in violence. Since the end of September, Palestinians have begun what they are calling the Al-Aksa Intifada, an uprising over a perceived violation of the sanctity of the Temple Mount, which is known to Muslims as Haram Al-Sharif, Noble Sanctuary. Palestinians contend that the visit of Israeli politician Ariel Sharon in a demonstration of Israeli sovereignty over the site caused the Palestinians to revolt.

I say "contend" because there is so much misinformation and propaganda being put forth on both sides that truth has been largely subjugated. When Sharon visited the Temple Mount, he was accompanied by a large contingent of police, not as a show of force, but simply to ensure his safety. This fear of harm was reinforced when upon entering the Temple Mount complex, the group found large piles of stones waiting to be thrown at Israeli police and worshippers at the Western Wall. In other words, this revolt was planned well before the events of that day, may have occurred that day regardless of Sharon's visit, and intending violence, Sharon's safety was in question.

Yassir Arafat continues to argue that the Palestinians are not inciting violence, that the stone throwing and assaults upon Israeli border policemen are spontaneous acts resulting from pent up anger, yet these actions are largely being instigated and directed by the Tanzim, a guerilla unit connected to Yassir Arafat's own Fatah movement. Furthermore, not only Palestinian Muslim clerics throughout the world, but even the official Palestinian radio and television stations continue to call for violence, to call for an intifada, until Jerusalem is in Palestinian hands. The terrorist group Hamas, which does not take direction from Yassir Arafat, is calling for a Jihad, a holy war against not Israel, but against Jews and Americans around the world.

The Palestinians contend that the Israelis are using undo force to subdue protesters. Yet though they are being attacked by mobs of hundreds of Palestinians shooting M-16s, throwing Molotov Cocktails and hurling stones not only with their hands, but with potentially deadly high powered sling shots, and small numbers of Israeli troops have found themselves under siege by a thousand or more people armed with these weapons, relatively few people have been killed on either side.

Palestinian mothers are actively sending their children to zones of conflict in order that they might become "holy martyrs" of the people. This has been going on for more than two weeks. Though it is horrible that dozens of Palestinians have been killed, including several under 16 (two 12), and numerous Israeli's as well, it is a testament to the extreme restraint used by the Israelis that we are not looking at hundreds of Palestinian dead. Following the gruesome and barbaric lynching of Israeli soldiers by a mob of Palestinians in Ramallah on Oct. 12, the details of which are too sickening to print here, this is particularly true.

Where two months ago we hoped for a lasting peace, now we only hope for a temporary one, a cease-fire, so that we may once again begin to talk of lasting peace. At this time when propaganda and lies are so widespread, let us not be quick to condemn Israel for its actions. We must stand strongly behind Israel, particularly at a time, when even in New York, Palestinian protesters chant not against the state of Israel, nor call for peace, but instead chant, "Kill the Jews, Kill the Jews, Kill the Jews." At this time, when Jews everywhere are threatened by violence, synagogues firebombed around the world (Paris and Buffalo recently), we recall the words that have comforted the Jewish people for generations, "Oseh Shalom Bim'ro'mav, Hu Ya'aseh Shalom, Aleinu v'al Kol Yisrael. V'imru Amein." May the one who makes peace on high, make peace descend upon us and upon all of the people Israel. And let us say, Amen.
