

Passover

Background of Holiday

Passover celebrates the liberation of the Jewish people from Egyptian bondage and has become a powerful symbol of redemption - not only the redemption of the Jewish people but the redemption of the entire world. The *Haggadah*, reflecting the historic experience of the Jewish people, recognizes that slavery is not limited to physical bondage, but that spiritual slavery and social degradation are no less potent methods of depriving human beings of liberty. The highlight of Pesach observance is the *Seder* with its many symbolic foods and its elaborate liturgy, the *Haggadah*. The *Seder* is designed to recreate the events of redemption. The experience in the Passover celebration should inspire all Jews to assist in the future redemption of humanity. As the Midrash teaches, just as the Red Sea did not split until the Israelites stepped into it, so redemption cannot come unless we take the first step.

Special Mitzvot for Passover

•One is to observe *Pesach* for seven days, beginning on the eve of the 15th of Nissan.

•It is a mitzvah to remove all leaven from one's home prior to the beginning of Pesach. Leaven refers to products made from wheat, barley, rye, oats and spelt, which have been permitted to leaven.

•Searching for leaven (Bedikat Chametz) on the night before the first Seder is a Pesach custom that has special appeal for children.

•It is a mitzvah to prepare or attend a *Seder*. Even if you only attend, it is a mitzvah to prepare a dish for the meal. It is also a mitzvah to invite guests to your *Seder*, in accordance with the verse from the *Haggadah*, "Let all who are hungry come and eat, let all who are in want share the hope of Passover."

Activities for Family Learning and Enrichment

•Make Your Own Matzah Take flour and water and mix it together 3:1, flatten it on a cookie sheet with a rolling pin. Perforate it with a fork and bake it in a VERY hot oven, the whole process cannot take more than 18 minutes.

• Search for Charnetz After the house has been cleaned for Pesach, a symbolic search for the last remains of leaven is made. At various places in the home, pieces of leaven are hidden. The children, with flashlights, search them out in the dark. The bread is then gathered in a bag and burned with the following blessing:

Baruch attah Adonai Eloheinu melech haolam asher kideshanu bemitzvotav vetsivanu al biur chamets.

Blessed are you, Adonal our God, master of the universe, who sanctifies us with the mitzvot and commands us to burn Chametz.

•Make Your Own Seder Plate Take an inexpensive plastic plate or a heavy weight paper plate and decorate it with permanent markers. A nice touch is to use a clear plastic plate, so that the markers make it look like stained glass. You can also decorate small bowls for the various items that sit on the plate.

•Make Cheroset This mixture of apples, honey, walnuts, and sometimes raisins is made to represent the mortar used by the Hebrew slaves to make the bricks. Many recipes exist, come up with a special concoction unique to your family.

• Have a Matzah Taste Test During Passover buy all types of Matzah, blind fold your children and see if they can tell which is which.

•*Have A Chocolate Seder* Before Passover as a way to introduce your children to the rituals of the meal, have a mock Seder with all the items being chocolate. Use chocolate dipped Matzah, chocolate milk, etc.

(NOTE: The following was taken from a children's Passover Haggadah and is therefore a simplified discussion of Passover. It may, however, prove helpful in planning your own Seder.)

PASSOVER FOOD EXPERIENCES

MATZAH BALLS

Matzah balls for chicken soup are good to eat any time of the year. Your child can mix the ingredients, form the balls and watch for the bubbles to tell you when the water is boiling.

1/2 cup Matzah meal	fork
1/4 cup water	measuring cup
2 eggs	measuring spoons
3 Tablespoons melted shortening	mixing bowl and spoon
l teaspoon salt	large pot
Dash of pepper	Sector State

Beat the eggs lightly with a fork. Add the water, melted shortening, salt and pepper. Mix well. Add the Matzah meal and stir thoroughly. Refrigerate for one hour. Wet your hands and form mixture into small balls. Drop balls into a large pot filled with boiling, salted water (or boiling soup). Cover and simmer 20-25 minutes. Serve in chicken soup.

- HAROSET

2 apples	knife and paring knife
3/4 cup walnuts	measuring cup
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon	measuring spoons
2 Tablespoons concord grape wine	chopping jar
2 teaspoons honey (optional)	mixing bowl and spoon

Cut the apples into fourths and cut out the seeds. Pare the apples. The easiest way to make Haroset with your child is for him to chop the apples and nuts in a jar with a chopping top. The apples can also be grated; you will have to help when the pieces get small. The consistency may be coarse or fine, whichever you prefer. Add the cinnamon, wine and honey. Haroset with Matzah is a real treat! Store in refrigerator. Makes about 2 cups.

LIGHTING THE CANDLES

We light and bless the holiday candles.

Thank you, God, for the festival lights, and for bringing our family and friends together to celebrate Pesach.

KIDDUSH

We sing the Kiddush, the blessing over the wine. The cup of wine stands for the sweetness and joy of a holiday celebration.

בָרוּך אַתָּה יִיָ, אַלהֵיעו מַלָך הָעוֹלָם, בּוֹרָא פְּרִי הַנָּפָן.

Baruch ata adonai elohenu melech haolam borey pri hagafen.

Thank you, God, for the grapes that grow to make wine for our holiday celebration.

THE FOUR QUESTIONS

Why is this night different from all other nights of the year? מה נשמנה הלילה הזה מכל הלילות.

Ma nishtanah halailah hazeh mikol halaylot?

שֶׁבְּכָל הַלֵּילוֹת אָנוּ אוֹכְלִין חָמֵץ וּמַצָּה, הַלְיֵלָה הַזֶּה כָּלוֹ מַצָּה.

Shebechol halaylot anu ochlin chametz u'matzah. Halailah hazeh kulo matzah.

On all other nights we eat all kinds of bread and crackers. Why do we eat only matzah on Pesach?

Shebechol halailot anu ochlin she'or yerakot. Halailah hazeh maror.

On all other nights we eat many kinds of vegetables and herbs. Why do we eat bitter herbs, maror, at our Seder?

On all other nights we don't usually dip one food into another. At our Seder we dip the parsley in salt water and the bitter herbs in charoset. Why do we dip foods twice tonight?

On all other nights we eat sitting up straight. Why do we lean on a pillow tonight?

ANSWERING THE FOUR QUESTIONS



Why do we eat matzah on Pesach?

Matzah reminds us that when the Jews left Egypt, they had no time to bake bread for their journey. They put raw dough on their backs, and the sun baked it into hard crackers called matzah.

Why do we eat bitter herbs, maror, at the Seder?

Maror reminds us of the bitter and cruel way Pharaoh treated the Jewish people when they were slaves in Egypt.

Why do we dip foods twice at the Seder?



We dip bitter herbs into charoset to remind us how hard the Jewish slaves worked in Egypt. The chopped apples and nuts look like clay which the Jews used to make bricks for building Pharaoh's cities and palaces.

We dip parsley into salt water. The parsley reminds us that spring is here and new life will grow. The salt water reminds us of the tears of the Jewish slaves.




Why do we lean on a pillow at the Seder?

We lean on a pillow to be comfortable and to remind us that once we were slaves, but now we are free.

SHARING THE PESACH FOODS

MATZAH

Before we eat the matzah, we break the middle piece and put half of it away for our dessert. This piece is called the Afikomen. We hide it in a safe place so we can find it after the meal.



Now we each eat a piece of matzah. We say two blessings.

בְּרוּך אַתָּה יָיָ, אֱלהֵינוּ מֵלָך הָעוֹלָם, הַמוֹצִיא לֵחָם מִן הָאֵרִץ.

Baruch ata adonai elohenu melech haolam hamotzi lechem min haaretz.

ָבְרוּהְ אַתָּה יִיָ, אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֵלָהְ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קִדְשֵׁט בְּמִצְוֹתְיו, וְצְנֵט עַל אֲכִילַת מִצָּה. Baruch ata adonai elohenu melech haolam asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al achilat matzah.

Thank you, God, for the blessing of bread, and for the special matzah which reminds us of the Jewish people's hurried flight from Egypt.

PARSLEY

Let us each dip a piece of parsley into the salt water. Before we eat it, we say a blessing.



MAROR

Let us each dip a piece of maror in the charoset. We recite a blessing.





Baruch ata adonai elohenu melech haolam asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al achilat maror.

Thank you, God, for maror which reminds us of the bitterness of slavery.

THE EGG AND THE BONE

There are two other symbols on the Seder plate. The egg is another reminder of spring. The bone recalls the first celebration of Pesach, when the Jews roasted a lamb and ate it with matzah.



CUP OF ELIJAH

There is an extra cup of wine on the table. This is the Cup of Elijah. There is a story that Elijah, a great teacher who lived many years ago, visits every Seder to wish everyone a year of peace and freedom. We open the door and invite Elijah to come in. Watch his cup to see if any of the wine disappears. Let us sing a song welcoming Elijah:

Eliahu Hanavi

Eliahu hanavi, Eliahu hatishbi, Eliahu, Eliahu, Eliahu hagiladi. Bimhera biyamenu, Yavo aylenu, Im Mashiach ben David, Im Mashiach ben David.

As we open the door for Elijah, we also remember there are Jewish people in many places who cannot have a Seder tonight. We think of them and wish we could invite them to be at our Seder. We hope and pray that Jewish people all over the world will soon be free to celebrate Pesach and all of the Jewish holidays.

Let us sing a song thanking God for bringing the Jewish people out of the land of Egypt.

Dayenu

llu hotzi, hotzianu, Hotzianu miMitzrayim, MiMitzrayim hotzianu, Dayenu.

llu natan, natan lanu, Natan lanu et haTorah, Natan lanu et haTorah, Dayenu.

Now it is time for our Seder meal. B'tayavon, Good appetite!

AFTER DINNER

Whoever finds the afikomen is rewarded for bringing it back to the table. We break it into pieces and share it for dessert. We finish our Seder meal with a blessing.

Baruch ata adonai, hazan et hakol.

Thank you, God, for the food we have eaten.

WHO KNOWS ONE? "ECHAD MI YODEA?"-A PESACH NUMBERS SONG

Who knows one? One is our God in heaven and on earth.

Who knows seven? Seven days there are in a week.

Who knows two? Two are the tables of the commandments.

Who knows eight? Eight are the days to the service of the covenant.

Who knows three? Three is the number of the patriarchs.

Who knows nine? Nine is the number of the holidays.

Who knows four? Four is the number of the matriarchs.

Who knows ten? Ten commandments were given on Sinai.

Who knows eleven? Eleven were the stars in Joseph's dream.

Who knows five? Five books there are in the Torah.

Who knows twelve? Twelve are the tribes of Israel.


Who knows six? Six sections the Mishnah has.

Who knows thirteen? Thirteen are the attributes of God.

It is our tradition to have members sponsor an Oneg Shabbat which is the reception following services to celebrate the joy of the Sabbath.
