





OUR NEW RABBI
SANDFORD KOPNICK

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article about our new Rabbi Sandford Kopnick recently appeared in The American Israelite. We are reprinting it in case you have not seen it.)

Kopnick discusses Reform Judaism, rabbi's role

The Valley Temple will welcome Rabbi Sandford R. Kopnick as their new spiritual leader in August. He will replace Rabbi Solomon Greenberg, who has served the congregation for 32 years.

"We feel extremely fortunate to have attracted someone of Sandford's caliber," says Mark Sass, president of Valley Temple. "We realized when we began our search that replacing a rabbi like Sol Greenberg was not going to be easy, and would require someone of unique skill and ability. Unanimously and enthusiastically, those involved in the search feel that Sandford is that person.

Kopnick, who currently serves as spiritual leader of Congregation Achduth Vesholom in Fort Wayne, IN, is not entirely new to Cincinnati. He was ordained in 1990 from the Cincinnati campus of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion and his wife, Nancy Magnus Kopnick, is a Cincinnatian. They were introduced while he was a student at HUC-JIR.

Kopnick is originally from Oak Park, Ml. He graduated from the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor with an honors degree in communication, and had considered attending graduate school in that field before deciding to enter the rabbinate. "I am a Reform Jew inside and out," he says, explaining his choice between the two fields.

"I spent my high school years working in the religious school office at Detroit's Temple Israel, and thought that I would love the various things rabbis got to do," Kopnick says. "I enjoyed being there and loved the people with whom I was able to interact. I was especially close to and inspired by Temple Israel's education director."

Interestingly, Greenberg also had an influence on a young Kopnick at the Union of American Hebrew Congregations' Goldman Union Camp Institute in Zionsville, IN. "My desire for the rabbinate was strengthened when I attended Jewish summer camp and met rabbis like Sol Greenberg," Kopnick recalls.

Kopnick himself helps to influence young people through various initiatives. During his career in Fort Wayne, he has focused on several youthorientedsocial actions. Central chairman of the Conference of American Rabbis' Committee on Youth, he says, "We advocate for rabbis working with youth. We support the UAHC's Youth Division and the North American Federation of Temple Youth. We present the annual Rabbi Samuel Cook Award for Lifetime Achievement in Youth Work.

"In the five years that I have served as chairman," he says, "my greatest frustration is the number of rabbis who feel that youth work is for the so-called 'junior colleagues.' The more rabbis who create meaningful relationships with kids, the better off the future of Judaism will be."

Kopnick doesn't focus only on young people, however. His master's thesis was on the applications of adult learning theory to Jewish adult education. In addition, he helped create a Catholic/Jewish dialogue group in Fort Wayne and has been outspoken on the separation of church and state. He is an adjunct faculty member at St. Francis College in Fort Wayne, where he also serves on the board of Vincent House homeless shelter and on the advisory council of public radio station WBNI-FM.

During his years at HUC-JIR, Kopnick earned prizes in Jewish education, congregational programming and preaching. He served as the NFTY Ohio Valley rabbinic advisor, and was a staff member at Goldman Union Camp, where he continues to serve on the board and faculty.

Kopnick and his wife, a consultant in developmental disabilities, were married at Valley Temple in 1990, with Greenberg officiating. They have three "active and wonderful" sons, Jonathan, 8, Danny, 5, and Alex, 2. He is currently meeting with committees as he prepares to move to Cincinnati.

"I see Judaism as a vibrant and dynamic religion whose tradition serves both Jews and God," Kopnick says. "Meaningful customs are helpful, and those of minimal relevance can be dropped. New traditions can be created.

"Jewish communal life must enhance the lives of Jews, and the synagogue is the main vehicle for achieving that goal. Our people seek balance in their modern lives and meaningful Jewish activity can help them accomplish that. Torah can be transmitted through the medium of positive worship services as well as interesting classes and social opportunities."

Kopnick sees the rabbi's role in a Reform Jewish congregation as "its spiritual chief operating officer, implementing various programs, classes and service styles which enhance Jewish life and take the congregation in the direction that it has determined.

Kopnick says he has considered further education for himself, but that would be "down the road. Now, I want to focus upon working with my new congregation, on my marriage and on being a great dad to my children. Informally, every day is another opportunity to study and learn. That doesn't change.

"I am very much looking forward to being a part of the vibrant Cincinnati Jewish community," Kopnick says.

SHAVUOT



Shavuot occurs on the sixth of the Hebrew month of Sivan. The name Shavuot ("weeks" derives from its celebration seven weeks (a week of

weeks) after Pesach. In the Torah it is also designated by the names Chag Hakatsir, the Harvest Festival and Chag Habikurim, the Festival of First Fruits.

Shavuot is the traditional birthday of the Torah. The Law was said to have been given on this Festival. Therefore it is called "Zeman matan toratenu." the season of the giving of the Torah. On Shavuot, the Jewish people celebrate their covenental relationship with God and reaffirm their commitment to a Jewish life of study (Talmud Torah) and practice (mitzvah). It was originally the celebration of the completion of the barley harvest with the sacrificial offering of the first fruits of the Temple. Later, it came to commemorate the giving of the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai.

It is customary to decorate one's home and the synagogue with greens and fresh flowers on Shavuot. The greenery is a reminder of the ancient practice of bringing first fruits to the Temple in Jerusalem. It also calls to mind our hopes for an abundance harvest.

It is a mitzvah to reaffirm the covenant on Shavuot. Through the reading of the Ten Commandments at services, which recalls the establishment of the covenant and the contemplation of the importance of Torah and its lifelong study (Talmud Torah), the individual Jew and the community renew their commitment to be a Covenant People (am Berit). Some congregations have revived the old custom of studying Torah late into Shavuot night. This Torah vigil is called "Tikun Leil Shavuot."

The ceremony of Confirmation is a Reform innovation and has added a new dimension to the meaning of the Festival. It provides an opportunity for students of post Bar/Bat Mitzvah age to affirm their relationship to Judaism and the Jewish people. When the Temple stood, Jews brought offerings of first fruits, "Bikurim," to the Temple on Shavuot. Today, parents bring their children to participate in Confirmation. These young people represent the hope and promise of tomorrow. During the service the confirmands reaffirm their commitment to the covenant. The Confirmation's purpose is to encourage the intellectual and spiritual growth of young people, and to strengthen

the bonds between them and the Israelites who received the Torah at Sinai and to stimulate their love for God and the Jewish people.

The Book of Ruth is read on Shavuot. The story of Ruth takes place during the barley harvest at the Shavuot season. More important, Rabbinic tradition has seen a parallel between Ruth's willing acceptance of Judaism and the Jewish people's acceptance of Torah.

It is customary to eat dairy dishes on Shavuot. At this time of year, late May or early June, such foods are eaten because of the large amount of cheese produced. Churning and cheese making are common features of spring harvest festivals the world over, when goats, sheep and cows begin to graze more and thus produce more mil. Rabbinic tradition draws an analogy between the sweetness and physical nourishment the Jew receives from milk and honey to the sweetness and spiritual nourishment of the words of the Torah.

While it is the practice of Reform congregations to recite Yizkor only on Yom Kippur and the seventh day of Pesach, some congregations follow the tradition in reciting Yizkor. It memorializes our deceased friends and relatives as well as the martyrs of our generation and previous generations.

RECIPES TO MAKE WITH YOUR CHILDREN ...

French Toast

1/2 tsp. cinnamon 3 eggs 1/4.c. milk 1/2 tsp. vanilla I tsp. orange rind butter or margarine or oil for frying 6 slices challah or bread Beat the eggs well. Add the vanilla, orange rind, cinnamon and milk. Pour into a 9 " x 13" pan. Add the challah/bread slices and let sit about 15 minutes. Turn and let sit for a few minutes more. Heat a griddle or frying pan with butter or margarine or oil, about 1 tbs. altogether for each slice. Fry the egg drenched challah/bread on both sides and serve with maple syrup.

Easy Cheese Blintzes

6 slices white bread
8 tbs. cream cheese
8 tbs. butter
Preheat toaster oven to 350 degrees. Roll out
bread with a rolling pin, as thin as possible. Using
a sharp knife, cut bread into circle. Smear bread
with cream cheese and a bit of cinnamon. Roll up
like a jelly roll. Melt butter in baking pan. Roll blintz
butter; put it in baking pan and bake for 10 minutes.
