<u>From the Rabbi</u>

NOW THAT THE SNOWBIRDS HAVE RETURNED

In some ways, May is the beginning of my year. While religious school is almost over and people are actively thinking of summer vacations, for Beth El, May is the time

when our snowbirds have returned from warmer climes down South. In the next few weeks, there will be a flurry of activity. Following on the heels of Tracey Atin's sermon in song and the Windsor Jewish Film Festival, we will hold our Scholar-in-Residence weekend and the Negev Dinner. The Windsor Jewish Community comes alive like no time other than the High Holydays.

It's also a time to look at what needs doing and what can be done. We are well on the way of exploring the initiative with regards to weddings between Jews and non-Jews which was announced at High Holydays last fall. At our first session, held a few months ago, over twenty congregants attended to explore this initiative. Our second skull session on the subject will be held on Thursday, May 7th. So far, those in attendance have been positive towards the idea, although some have said they would not like to see interfaith weddings held in our sanctuary. Please make every effort to attend the May 7th session, where we will continue to explore this important matter. The congregation will have a chance to give their input on the matter before a vote of our Board of Directors later in the year.

With the return of our snowbirds, we will work to revive the Caring Committee, begun a few years ago, but which has lain fallow over the winter months. As our congregation ages, we have a greater need to reach out to shut-ins and others who could benefit from our presence. But we want to reach out to others, such as those who are new to our community. Can you think of other ways we can reach out to our congregants and the Jewish community at-large? Please think seriously about attending our next meeting of the Caring Community on Thursday, May 14th at 7:00 pm.

What other ways would you like to engage? Israel is more beleaguered than ever, as it enters into a new government. There will undoubtedly be a push for BDS (Boycotts, Divestment, and Sanctions) at the University of Windsor next school year. How can we support Israel and the students at the university as the next wave of attacks comes in? Let me know if you would like to become involved.

That's really the point of this article. How would you like to become more involved? Is there an area of Jewish civilization that you would like to study? Is there a project with which you'd like to get involved with congregants? Are you willing to give of your time to a modest project, such as a Beth El cleanup day planned for early June? Or something more time-intensive and meaningful?

Spring is a time for new growth. How can we help you grow to your fullest Jewish and menschlich potential?




TORAH STUDY

She teaches, lectures, and publishes on a range of topics concerning Yiddish language and literature, modern Jewish culture, Jewish American literature, and Holocaust literature.



Like Dreamers by Yossi Halevi



This is a book we have been waiting to have for our Book Club for over a year, and now that it is finally available as an inexpensive paperback, we are able to turn our attention to it. Yossi Klein Halevi's achievement in Like Dreamers stands out as the story of modern Israel—in his case, from 1967 to the present day—from the point of view of a small group of archetypal characters. But his book is fact, not fiction, and his characters are all real. Mr. Halevi follows seven soldiers in Israel's elite 55th Paratroop Brigade, as they fight in wars, win astonishing victories, pay the price of those victories, age and part ways—sometimes bitterly—over the political dilemmas the young nation faces.

"From time to time," Halevi wrote, "I thought about interviewing veterans of the battle of Jerusalem How had the war changed their lives? What role

did they play in trying to influence the political outcome of their military victory?" He has spent the past 10 years following the lives of the paratroopers, becoming very close to several. He watched as they split into leaders and activists of the peace and settlement movements: the former culminated in the Oslo and Camp David Accords, while the latter built and built until today 300,000 Israelis live beyond the 1967 lines.

Halevi explains, "In 1967, Israelis were celebrating existence. For Jews to have learned to fight so well, so soon after they died in their helpless millions, was an affirmation of their life force." But Israel was changing in the 1970s: "The pioneering momentum had shifted to the Orthodox," and the secular Zionism of the founders of the state was being overrun.

The June 6, 1967, Battle of Jerusalem is widely seen as the seminal event of modern Israeli history. The David Rubinger photograph of paratroopers reclaiming the Western Wall is among the most iconic Israeli images: the soldiers' "expressions are a combination of exhaustion, tenderness and awe," writes Halevi, who uses the classic photo on the cover of Like Dreamers, "which he describes as "a story about the fate of Israel's utopian dreams, the vast hopes imposed on this besieged, embattled strip of land crowded with traumatized Jewish refugees." We turn to this book in May.



CEMETERY NOTICE



The Beth El Cemetery gates are open on Tuesday, Thursday, and Sunday from 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m., with the excep-

tion of Jewish Holidays. Please Note: even though the gates are open on the days and hours stated above, you will notice that there are chains wrapped around the gates and they appear to be locked. In the past few years, due to youths in the area gathering at the cemetery on occasion, the caretaker had closed the gates with a chain to make it appear they were locked. Unfortunately at times this chain and lock were difficult to remove by our members, and has now been removed on the above mentioned days when the cemetery will be open.

LET US KNOW WHO IS IN THE HOSPITAL

Over the years, we have tried to work with the hospitals to develop an effective way of knowing which Jewish patients are in hospital. For the most part, it has been a losing battle and now privacy laws do not permit the hospital to call and advise who is a patient in the hospital.

The bottom line is, if you do not let us know when a Jewish patient is in hospital, we will only know when Rabbi Ableser visits the hospitals, once or twice a week. The easiest way for you to help is to call us and let us know who is in hospital. It's even easier if you call after hours, and leave a message on the answering machine.

"Visiting the sick" is a prime Jewish virtue. The best way is to do it yourself. But, for thirty seconds of your time on the telephone, you can help us perform this mitzvah. Please keep it in the back of your mind.




