From the Rabbi...

Navigating the New Year



Last year in a bulletin essay, I said that kayaking was like prayer moving through water. I had been boating on a spiritually quiet NE lake. This year I think kayaking is more like life moving through life. This new assessment is probably influenced by my last excursion out of Boothbay Harbor. As I started out, the water was smooth, I saw ospreys feeding their young. Halfway through my itinerary, I stopped at friendly deserted island with a soft beach to stretch.

Appearances proved to be deceiving. Climbing out of the kayak, I immediately sunk knee-deep in this sticky black sedimentary muck that sucked the shoes right off my feet. To retrieve them, I had to dig with my hands, which I then had to wipe on my clothes.

You get the picture.

So then I tried to clean up some in the ocean. This was only partly successful and I failed to notice several strands of seaweed still clinging afterward.

Heading back, I had to paddle against the tide and a strong headwind. It was a long way and the harbor had grown choppy. Suddenly, from out of nowhere, a yacht pulled up close beside me. A woman yelled down at me, "I just want you to know, your form is excellent." Then she saw me covered with mud and seaweed up close, and she added, "I mean, your paddling form, you know, is really good." Then she shut the cab door and the vacht disappeared. Though the whole thing was just a little odd, I still felt energized and sang the rest of the way back to port.

Sometimes our year is kind of like that kayaking trip. We set out knowing that there are challenges but we are

not really worried. Then things happen and suddenly we're knee deep in muck and getting out requires going in deeper and getting really messy. The year that started with such promise becomes nothing more than a long hard haul.

We've all been there, and many of us are very much there now.

Then the High Holy Days appear like a calm harbor. These days are, to paraphrase Abraham Heschel, an island in time. Hopefully, in their guiet calm, we will find the healing, the energy, the strength, the inspiration, and the courage to engage our lives once again on the other side.

One thing, however, that is absolutely necessary for the success of the holidays is the very thing that is most often forgotten. It is not something really under the rabbi's or cantor's or board president's control. That is for each of us to turn to the people in our families and in our lives, the board and volunteers here at the temple, people we meet as we enter the sanctuary, and even the stranger passing by in a tallit, a pair of slacks, or a kayak, and say:

Good Job

You look good. You are doing great. Thank you for being an inspiration to me.

This is how it starts. I turn to everyone here at the temple, our board, and committees and volunteers, all our wonderful congregants and friends and especially my family, and say,

Thank you, everyone. Good Job. You're LookinGood, You are an inspiration to me.

In July's bulletin I wrote about the visioning rainbow, which stretched across the wall at Temple Emanuel's annual meeting last June. I mentioned some of the treasured experiences and cherished times at TEMV that members shared about on post-it notes, which filled the left side of the rainbow. I promised to later explore with you, the other side of the rainbow, which is covered in notes of visions for TEMV's future.

Through the arts, music, study, entertainment and fun, we want to honor the past and envision new ways to grow our faith community. We want to compliment our rabbi's services with a permanent cantor, the feel of community at well-attended services, and greater financial resources.

I am very pleased to be president of TEMV's Board of Trustees. As the Board we are committing to working together in a covenantal relationship of respect and best intentions as a group and for TEMV. With you, we can build on the strengths of this congregation. We can creatively forge a strategic plan to ensure a vital and successful future for Temple Emanuel as our faith community, and as beacon of Jewish light in the Merrimack Valley.

Please indicate your preference for whether you prefer to observe their Yarzheit based on the Hebrew or Gregorian calendar. Unless told otherwise, we use the Gregorian calendar.. We are happy to accommodate any special instructions. Members receive a Yarzheit remembrance card, names are printed in the monthly bulletin, read during weekly Shabbat services, and read during the Yizkor service on Yom Kippur afternoon.

Elsewhere in the Bulletin is information on including names in the Yizkor Book of Remembrance.

There will also be time for walks on the beach, collecting sea shells, wading in the surf, swimming for the very hardy, and most important of all, spending the morning with friends.

The drive from Temple is about an hour, so we'll be leaving the Temple parking lot at 5:00AM to make sure we have time to make the drive and walk to the beach.

In the past we have tried to caravan, but in the dark of 5:00AM it is too hard to keep track of the cars behind you. Therefore, please bring your GPS (set to Parker River Wildlife Refuge or Plum Island) or bring these directions.

We hope you will join us for this beautiful, fun, inspiring service. Getting up is hard but it IS worth the effort! To see the sun rise over the ocean in a clear blue sky (maybe with a few fluffy white clouds) is AWE-SOME and AWE-INSPIRING!! DIRECTIONS: I-495 North toward Haverhill/Salisbury. Take Exit 55 to Rt. 110 towards I-85 South (Salisbury/Boston). At the end of the ramp merge onto Rt. 110 East then turn right onto Fridge Rd./US-1. You will go over the bridge, take the first left onto Merrimack St. Merrimack St. will bring you into Newburyport. Take a slight left onto Water St. which becomes Plum Island Turnpike when you cross the bridge over to the island. Take the first right after the bridge onto Sunset Dr. and drive into the refuge. The first parking lot (#1) is on the left and the boardwalk is in the back right corner. There are bathroom facilities adjacent to the parking lot.
