From the Rabbi...





7:00 PM Yom Kippur. The final service of the day begins, making us about one hour from food, water, and our wonderful annual schmooze-fest. Ordinarily, a congregation limps over the finish line, fixated on beverage and food. (Close the Gates, already. We're hungry!)

If you were among the worshipers at TEMV, however, you remember an entirely different last hour of Yom *Kippur*. Ours brimmed with lively singing, clapping (!), and amazement over Cantor Sparr's sparkling pyrotechnics. Digging deep inside past hunger and weariness, we rediscovered our capacity for spirited enjoyment and delight, even on a so-called empty tank. Joy was everywhere in the room.

8:00 PM, we celebrated havdalah in the cozy darkness. A single flame leapt atop a single tall, braded candle. Dy, dy, dy-dy-dy-dy-dy-.... The whole sanctuary swayed to the rhythm. It was better than that first taste of food, though, indeed, the next great joy was that first taste of -I think Devora's--bread pudding.

Judaism teaches us that when we reach deep inside for more strength, joy is there as well. It leaks out and spreads all around.

Before we have time to catch our communal breath, the sukkah is raised—thank you David E. and friends! Though it is an absurd little dwelling with no door and holes in the roof, we are commanded to "live" in it: eat, study, pray, and shake shake shake the lulav. Looking up through the *skak*, the corn stalks which make up the ceiling along with the stars, we are reminded that our best efforts as humans are frail and temporary. Our lives are better off in God's hands, which are firm an ever

present. The perilousness and the security, recited blessings in the rain, all this brings a quiet, peaceful security.

Our tradition teaches us that joy is not about having everything. It is learning that we are a part of Everything.

After camping a week in the sukkah, Simhat Torah comes as a challenge and a guandary. How are we supposed to lift the heavy, unwieldy, most precious and fragile sacred object and dance? There is such meaning and joy in this insanity, but you have to really do it to even begin to get it.

Now it is the month after the Yamim Noraim. How do we keep the depth and joy? How do we stay connected to those profound places inside us? What will make us reach that reservoir deep inside, of strength and calm and energy?

As they say in the Talmud, Come and hear:

-----Any Shabbat is greater than Rosh Hashanah. (So keep the Shabbat) Come join us. We can be just as profound but much less formal....

-----The created world is here all the time (As is the Creator)

The one who trusts in YHVH Will be surrounded by loving-kindness (hesed) Psalms 32:10

Your thoughts determine you reality... Therefore, absorb yourself in thoughts of God, R Dov Baer of Mezerich, God in All Moments





Simple Oneg Ideas: The Recipe Corner.

We all know that hosting an *Oneg* can feel overwhelming but it doesn't have to be! We have developed a new section in the bulletin that has simple *Oneg* recipes if you want to be a bit adventurous. None of these recipes take more than a few minutes to make and only require a few simple ingredients you probably have at home already. These two actually come from Ivy's mother, Jean. They are her suggestions for cream cheese two ways: sweet and savory.

Olive Cream Cheese Spread

One 8oz package of cream cheese

- 3 T. Sliced green olives
- 3 T. Sliced black olives
- I clove of garlic, minced

A dash of Tabasco sauce



Let cream cheese soften to workable consistency. Add all ingredients to a bowl and combine. Serve with crackers or on bagels. You can also add more or less olives according to taste. If you want a finer spread, mince the olives as well as the garlic.

Easy Carmel Cream Cheese Dip

Ingredients:

One 8oz package of cream cheese

1/4 c white sugar

3/4 c brown sugar

2 tsp. vanilla extract

Let cream cheese soften to workable consistency. Add all items to a medium sized bowl and combine with hand mixer or (*for more of a workout*) a wooden spoon. Serve with sliced apples.

Religious School Corner

Sunday marked the first day of a brand new school year at TEMV, which coincidently, lots of firsts:

- It was my first day as Principal. I loved it! The teachers worked collaboratively to make sure all the students were engaged and happy throughout the day.
- 2) It was the first time we rolled out a model of inviting the parents in for breakfast at 9:30, where they learned about the teaching plan for the day and the family assignment for the week. They were also treated to a min-lesson on Sukkot by our very own teacher, Dr. Ivy Helman.
- For the first time, we're developing a curriculum around Torah parshot. All topics (Torah, Judaism and Hebrew) will relate to each other around that theme.
- It was also the first time this year that our students enjoyed their snack and a lesson in the sukkah
- 5) For the first time, Paris joined us as a teacher assistant. Toni helped out as well.
- 6) And last, but not least, it was the first of many music lessons that Rahel will be teaching to Aleph through B'nei Mitzvah classes. She will join us monthly in this role.

Our new Sunday School model is reminiscent of the old one-room school house. We can take advantage of our size and use our older students to model behavior and knowledge acquisition for the younger ones. An additional advantage is that each teacher will take the lead on a topic (Torah, Judaism, Hebrew) and other teachers will help to guide the students' learning and monitor their behavior.

We look forward to this exciting new year and to connecting to parents on a regular basis.

First Film of the Year *The Last Morranos* Sunday, Dec 8 at 10:30 am

Introduction and discussion with Marjorie Short

During the reign of Spanish rulers, Ferdinand and Isabella, it was decided in 1492 to expel the Jews first from Spain and then from Portugal, otherwise Jews were forced to convert to Christianity. Those who remained secretly practiced a form of hybrid Judaism saying Jewish prayers at home but attending Catholic services. They were very secretive and when discovered in the 1990's it was difficult to get anyone to talk. This dramatic film captures what remains of Judaism there by interviewing some of the remaining families. A brief introduction prior to the film followed by Question and Answers and an update of what has happened to the town now.

Marjorie is a retired Professor of Middlesex Community College, member of the Jewish Heritage Society of the North Shore and The Jewish Genealogy Society of Greater Boston. She is a frequent speaker on selected early Jewish topics.
