At the semi-annual meeting of the Hebrew Benevolent Society held on the 16<sup>th</sup> of October 1864, the following resolutions were offered and unanimously adopted.

Whereas; Our lamented brother M. M. Spiegel, Colonel of the 120<sup>th</sup> Ohio Regiment was killed aboard the steamer City Belle on the Red River May 2<sup>nd</sup> 1864, while nobly performing his duty to our adopted country, and

Whereas; The members of the Hebrew Benevolent Society of Chicago desire to give expression to the feelings of high esteem and love they entertained towards their late brother and former President.

Be it therefore,

Resolved: That the members of the Hebrew Benevolent Society feel proud of the heroic conduct of their late brother M. M. Spiegel, he having been one of the first to offer his services to our country in time of danger.

Resolved: That the Hebrew Benevolent Society has watched and felt proud of the noble deeds performed by their late brother who by good behavior and courage rose from a Second Lieutenant to Colonel, and who though wounded by a shell before Jackson, Mississippi, and scarcely able to mount his horse, came forward again to battle the enemies of his country.

Resolved: That we deeply sympathize with the bereaved widows and children of our late brother and hope that they may find consolation in him who never forsakes widows nor orphans.

Resolved: That the Secretary of this Society be instructed to forward a copy of these resolutions to the widow of
