At the approach of Rosh Hashanah, I convey heartfelt best wishes for a New Year of life and health, of contentment and achievement.

Rabbis approach High Holiday sermon preparation very seriously. We spend a good portion of the summer months in meditation and research for the ideas which we share with our congregations during the most sacred days of the year. Not merely are we overwhelmed by the sanctity of the season,

but on a more empirical level, we fully realize that this may be the only occasion during the year when a rabbi can communicate and possibly touch the majority of his congregation.

We always attempt to select topics that are relevant and appropriate. We strife for sermons that are uplifting and inspirational. But on the other hand, the content should also be informative, provocative and even controversial. It is no easy matter to appeal to congregants who differ vastly in age, educational background, interests and commitment.

What are some of the most vital Jewish issues today? I personally feel that the recent unrest in Israel; Black anti-Semitism; Jewish identification; and the emptiness, alienation and frustration of personal life are subjects worthy of consideration this particular year. Therefore, I have chosen the following five topics which you may want to consider before we meet each other in the Sanctuary on the High Holidays:

Eve of Rosh Hashanah - Sunday, September 11: YOU CAN MAKE IT A HAPPY YEAR How to add content and meaning to our individual lives.

Rosh Hashanah Morning - Monday, September 12: BLACKS AND JEWS
The challenge of Black anti-Semitism. How serious is it? What can we do about it?

Second Day Rosh Hashanah - Tuesday, September 13: A SECOND CHANCE
What would you do differently in your personal life if you had a second chance?

Kol Nidre - Tuesday evening, September 20: SEPARATE NOT THYSELF FROM THE COMMUNITY Jewish identification, Jewish pride, dignity and self-respect.

Yom Kippur Morning - Wednesday, September 21: THE UNREST IN ISRAEL
The media has manipulated and distorted the Intifada. What does it all mean? What are the prospects for peace?

I look forward to sharing the high Holidays with you.
