CORPS OF SERVICE TO THE JEWISH PEOPLE

As you know, Glenn Stein has expressed an interest in serving, on a non-compensated staff basis, as our staff member responsible for the Corps of Service. Glenn's specific interest is to pursue the project from a social justice perspective -- to identify projects in the Third World (and perhaps domestically) needing volunteers, and then make those opportunities known to our congregations. As such its purpose would not be to serve Jewish communities, unless they sought assistance in social justice organizing. Naturally, over the long term the UAHC would be free to build on any relationship created through this endeavor with Jewish communities from abroad.

Since Glenn will be working in a professional capacity on a similar project for the American Jewish World Service, it is anticipated that we will benefit from their experience and resources, as they will from our significant potential for volunteers. We do not, at this point, suggest any formal relationship between the two groups, other than a mutually cooperative one.

For our part, the Corps of Service would continue to function as an exclusively UAHC program, with decisions made jointly by its staff, chairs, and UAHC leadership. We would not be responsible for any financial costs save the specific costs for projects, such as mailings or ads, that would have to be approved through normal channels.

Glenn suggested that oversight of this project be placed under the umbrella of the Commission on Social Action. Evelyn Schlensky has said that there are provisions in the organization of the Commission to provide a seat for the chair of a related committee (i.e. the UAHC Soviet Jewry Committee headed by Betty Golomb). Therefore, even if formal oversight was not transferred, the chair of the Corps of Service would be welcomed on to the Commission.

Glenn and I met with Larry Sherman and Jerry Daniels during the last Executive Committee meetings to discuss this proposal. Both Larry and Jerry were supportive of the idea, especially since we anticipate very little activity otherwise. They were hesitant, however, to shift oversight to the Commission on Social Action at

this point, even if they would serve as the chairs under the Commission structure. They did not rule out the possibility of making the move in the future. So too, they were unaware of the possibility of Larry sitting on the Commission without shifting oversight.

Both Larry and Jerry requested that I share this information with you to ask for your input. If you have no objection, Larry, Jerry, Glenn and I recommend that we proceed along the lines outlined above.

GENERAL CONCLUSIONS

Our major emphasis over the last several months has been to organize a domestic pilot program in synagogue development. This weekend, our first domestic volunteers, Robert and Sylvia Dreyfus of Temple Israel of Greenville, SC, left for their assignment as volunteers in Synagogue Development in seven small communities in Montana and Washington -- Billings, Bozeman, Butte, Great Falls, Kalispell and Missoula, Montana and Everett, Washington.

We have also continued to seek individuals and host communities for volunteer work abroad, and are in the final stages of placing an Educator/Youth Worker in Guatemala City.

Our experiences over the past year have taught us that our movement has large numbers of eager, qualified volunteers. Our challenge is to expand the number of positions available so we can place our applicants and more fully serve Jewish communities overseas. We are therefore most pleased that Mr. Gerard Daniel has agreed to join our program as our Corps of Service Chairman for International Development.

DOMESTIC ACTIVITIES

We are pleased to report that this weekend, our first domestic volunteers, Robert and Sylvia Dreyfus of Temple Israel of Greenville, SC, left for their assignment as volunteers in Synagogue Development in seven small communities in Montana and Washington -- Billings, Bozeman, Butte, Great Falls, Kalispell and Missoula, Montana and Everett, Washington.

Bob is a regional and national board member, as well as a member of the national Dues Policy Review and Small Congregations committees.

The Dreyfuses trip comes after several months of planning in conjunction with Rabbi Norman Kahan of the Small Congregations Department and the host communities.

Originally, we identified four small congregations in the Northwest -- Bozeman, Great Falls, Missoula and Kalispell, Montana -- that were seeking assistance in synagogue development. We then matched an available volunteer with considerable background in synagogue development and UAHC operations. As the project gained momentum, three other communities -- Billings and Butte, Montana and Everett, Washington -- also sought their help.

We have charged our first volunteer with the tasks of (1) developing strategies and programs for internal congregational development and synagogue administration; and (2) presenting the host community with an overview of the UAHC. The host communities will provide the Dreyfuses with home hospitality.

We believe we possess the ability to duplicate this process in other regions and areas of expertise.

EDUCATOR/YOUTH WORKER IN GUATEMALA

The Jewish community of Guatemala City seeks to host a North American volunteer to perform youth work and teaching (kindergarten, supplementary school and in the youth movement) for a period of one year. As this position entails working with young children, a thorough knowledge of Spanish is required. In addition, the volunteer should be a college graduate.

COST ACCOUNTANT IN ISRAEL

Kibbutz Yahel, a Reform Movement settlement in Israel's Negev Desert, seeks a specialist in Cost Accounting in order to improve its management analysis of costs. The ideal candidate will have both a basic knowledge of Hebrew and extensive experience with cost accounting tools. The individual must commit to a minimum term of service of one year, during which time he or she will conduct educational programs for both youth and adults, including seminars, camp weekends, and teaching of Jewish subjects in more traditional settings. The new

volunteer will take over for our current volunteer, Elsie Stern.

SYSTEMS OPERATOR IN ITALY

In conjunction with the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, the Corps seeks a Computer Systems Operator/Manager MICRO VAX II for their office in Rome, Italy. Suitable candidates for this volunteer position will possess a degree or certificate in computer science or data processing, or equivalent experience. The ideal candidate will have two years of experience in programming, preferably on mini-computers. James Rothman, our Corps of Service volunteer, worked for over year at the JDC's nerve-center in Italy.

I wish to update you on the progress of the Corps of Service to the Jewish People, which is co-sponsored by the UAHC, the World Union for Progressive Judaism and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee. The Corps, open to all adult Jews, facilitates the use of North American Jewry's professional and technical skills in service to other Jewish communities.

Our major emphasis over the last several months has been to develop an infrastructure, to permit expanded growth over the next year. We are beginning to see the fruit of this effort, as as our number of placements has begun to increase.

Our top priority for the next year will be to increase the number of positions available. If you know of a potential host community in search of skilled or professional volunteers, please contact Eric Polokoff at (212) 249-0100, extension 209.

In this report, we have broken down Corps activities into six distinct areas. They are as follows:

- I. Corps History and Overview of Current Developments
- II. New Placements
- III. Upcoming Placements
- IV. Available Positions
- V. Sampling of Applicants to the Corps of Service
- VI. Applications for Host Communities and for Volunteers

The Corps is administered in New York by Rabbi Daniel B. Syme and Eric Polokoff. On behalf of Rabbi Syme and Eric, I look forward to receiving your comments.

I. CORPS HISTORY AND OVERVIEW OF CURRENT DEVELOPMENTS

HOW THE CORPS WAS CREATED

In his speech to the UAHC Biennial Convention in November 1985, Rabbi Alexander Schindler called for the establishment of a Corps of Service. Rabbi Schindler envisioned such a Corps expanding Reform Judaism's global sense of peoplehood and communal responsibility. The Corps would produce generations of Jews for whom the word mitzvah would evoke "a stunning set of memories and experiences."

In response to this charge, the Biennial Assembly unanimously authorized a task force to study the Corps' feasibility. This Task Force examined in great detail how a new Reform Jewish service corps should be constituted. Following the recommendation of experts from the U.S. Peace Corps and other organizations, the Task Force determined that the Corps would proceed cautiously in finding positions in host communities abroad, and in recruiting and screening volunteers for any such openings.

THE THREE QUESTIONS

Task Force members identified the three crucial issues necessary for a successful Corps:

Question 1. Would people really volunteer? Would the Corps of Service be able to attract dedicated and skilled adult Jews for long term volunteer assignments overseas?

Answer. North American Reform and liberal Jews are eager to help Jewish communities abroad.

The response of the Reform Movement has been overwhelming. More than 60 individuals and couples of all ages have come forward to offer their time and skills to the Corps of Service.

Question 2. Would the Corps be able to find positions? Could the Corps of Service find host communities able to support the volunteer program?

Answer. Progressive Jewish communities in Israel, Africa, Europe, and elsewhere are working with the Corps of Service to find responsible and dynamic volunteers.

The Corps now seeks volunteers for eight positions in Israel, Europe, and Africa, and expects to increase this number significantly in the future as the success of Corps volunteers in Israel, Italy and Switzerland, becomes more widely known. We also anticipate growth in other organizations' requests for Corps assistance in finding capable candidates for their international volunteer efforts.

Question 3. Could the Corps of Service match volunteers? Would the Corps be able to match host communities and volunteers of various skills, time requirements, geographic preferences, beliefs and lifestyles?

Answer. The Corps is not just an excellent vehicle for providing volunteers for host communities; it is truly a "matchmaker" between dedicated North American Reform Jews and Jewish communities overseas.

The first two Corps volunteers placed, Jonathan Meyer and James Rothman, serve as paradigms for Reform Jewish activism.

Jonathan Meyer, a specialist in Jewish Education, was sent to Geneva in 1988. In Switzerland and France, Jonathan shared the riches of North American Jewry's long and highly developed experience in informal education. In contrast, many of the communities Jonathan served developed as communities only after 1945.

James Rothman, a computer specialist formerly on the staff of our Religious Action Center, was placed into the JDC's office in Italy immediately prior to the mass emigration of Soviet Jews. There, working in the JDC's nerve center, James currently helps to coordinate the records of the thousands of Jews residing temporarily in Italy.

Through its unique ability to match the interests of communities and individuals, our Corps enables North American Jews to express their bond to Jews of other lands; to strengthen the Jewish programs and services of communities in other lands; to enhance the appreciation and respect for Jews in other lands by North American Reform Jews; and to participate in the growing appreciation of and respect for Reform Judaism by Jews in other lands.

STAFFING

In September 1988, Eric Polokoff, a 5th year rabbinic student at HUC-JIR began assisting Rabbi Daniel Syme as the Corps' Coordinator. Eric is charged with overseeing the day-to-day administration of Corps activities and developing proposals for the Corps' growth.

RECRUITING VOLUNTEER APPLICANTS

We have spent the last several months developing the necessary infrastructure for the Corps. Advertisements in Reform Judaism and in the Jewish media have generated the resumes from over sixty individuals or families of various ages interested in volunteering in the Jewish community. (See the statistics below, as well as the sampling from our "Data Base," the List of Applicants to the Corps of Service in Part V.) Generally, the level of accomplishment of our potential candidates -- academic background, professional skills, experience in helping others -- is quite high.

A recent statistical breakdown of the applicants to the Corps is as follows:

SEARCHING FOR HOST COMMUNITIES

We have also sought to expand the number of positions available. In addition to our Reform/Progressive Judaism contacts, we have embarked upon joint projects with the American Joint Distribution Committee (JDC). A Corps volunteer, James Rothman, is currently serving the JDC in Italy as a computer systems designer. The JDC has interviewed and is considering other volunteers for placement in either Italy and Hungary.

We are currently discussing the potential for joint projects with the Jewish National Fund, and have established contact. We have also corresponded with other organizations, such as the LifeLine for the Elderly in Israel and the American Jewish World Service regarding the potential for providing them with skilled volunteers.

OUR NEXT STEPS

Over the next year, we are planning the following steps:

- o Developing new materials, programs and brochures for use at regional biennials;
- o Surveying the WUPJ and other international Jewish organizations to learn their personnel and programmatic needs;
- o An international letter writing campaign to find host communities in need of volunteers; and
- o Attempting to match volunteers serving in non-rabbinic functions with congregations in North America (perhaps in conjunction with the UAHC Regional Directors and/or UAHC Department of Small Congregations).

A analysis of the Corps activities, direction and scope will be conducted over the fall.

II. NEW PLACEMENTS

YOUTH PROGRAMMER FOR SWITZERLAND

Elsie Stern has been selected as the second volunteer to serve as a Specialist in Programming and Informal Jewish Education for the Jewish Community Center in Geneva, Switzerland.

Elsie will begin her Corps of Service position in the early Fall. She will conduct educational programs for both youth and adults, including seminars, camp weekends, and teaching of Jewish subjects in more traditional settings, and will also be available for temporary projects with youth of other French-speaking communities. She has made a year's time commitment to the Congregation, and will live with a host family throughout her term of service.

Elsie is well suited to share new educational skills and programs developed in America, given her extensive background in all aspects of formal and informal Jewish education, including camping, day and religious schools. She is currently a teacher at the Bernard Zell Anshe Emet Day School in Chicago, IL and the Program Director of the UAHC's Camp Swig Institute in Saratoga, CA. She has also been extremely active in theater in Chicago and New Haven, CT.

Elsie graduated Summa Cum Laude with a B.A. Degree in Literature from Yale University. She is the daughter of Rabbi Jack and Priscilla Stern of Scarsdale, NY.

ACCOUNTING SPECIALIST FOR KIBBUTZ YAHIEL

Fred and Marlene Zimmerman of Beverly Hills, California, were selected as volunteers for Kibbutz Yahiel, located in Israel's arava region. The couple have made a three month time commitment to live on the kibbutz.

On the kibbutz, Fred will serve as a specialist in cost accounting systems and economics. Drawing from more than 30 years of experience in computer applications, cost control, and systems and procedures for management, he will coordinate the establishment of an efficient cost monitoring system for the entire kibbutz. Marlene, an internationally renowned artist, will develop a pottery-art studio at the kibbutz. The Zimmermans are members of Temple Emanu-El of Beverly Hills.

DENTISTS FOR KIBBUTZ YAHIEL

Dr. Morris and Ruth Silver of South Orange, NJ served for a week in July as volunteers in the kibbutz's dental clinic. The couple are no strangers to kibbutz life -- they have previously volunteered at Kibbutz Kfar Menachem. The Silvers are members of Temple Sharey Tefilo-Israel of South Orange, where Morris serves as the ARZA chairman.

Dr. Arnold and Bee Glashow of Uxbridge, MA will also serve at Yahiel in the dental clinic. The Glashows, members of Temple Beth Am of Springfield, have made a commitment to live on the kibbutz throughout the month of October.

III. UPCOMING PLACEMENTS

The following placements are expected shortly:

- o DENTIST FOR KIBBUTZ YAHIEL. We are discussing the potential for short term assignments on Kibbutz Yahiel with other dentists and are assisting the kibbutz representative in coordinating their possible assignments. In addition, we have received from ARZA a list of potential dentists to contact should anything impede the candidacies of our current applicants.

- **PHYSICIAN FOR ETHIOPIA.** In response to our advertisement in Reform Judaism, a semi-retired physician with extensive experience in Third World Medicine, currently living in Texas, has begun the interview process for serving in Gondar, Ethiopia. This position is being coordinated by Glenn Stein of the Religious Action Center.
- **SCHOLAR IN RESIDENCE FOR KIBBUTZ YAHIEL.** We are currently searching for a Scholar in Residence for Kibbutz Yahiel. Several excellent candidates are interested in this position.

SPECIALIST IN COST ACCOUNTING SYSTEMS AND ECONOMICS IN ISRAEL

Kibbutz Yahel seeks a specialist in cost accounting systems and economics to set up efficient cost monitoring system for the entire kibbutz. The ideal candidate will have a basic knowledge of Hebrew, strong experience with computer programming in terms of real time accurate management tools, and some experience in establishing such systems.

The candidate must make a minimum time commitment of two to three months to learn and to implement the system. The kibbutz will provide housing, meals, and a stipend equivalent to that of other kibbutz members.

SPECIALIST IN ZIONIST PROGRAMMING IN SOUTH AFRICA

The South African Union for Progressive Judaism seeks two volunteers to work with Netzer Maginim, the South African Reform Zionist Youth movement, in Cape Town and Durban.

Both leadership positions require individuals with the skill and experience to guide the activities of Netzer Maginim and motivate participation by its members, who range in age from ten to twenty.

The ideal candidate will be a college graduate at least twenty-five years of age, with a strong Zionist background and ideology, some Hebrew ability, and extensive youth work experience.

The minimum time commitment is one year, commencing as soon as possible. All travel and living expenses will be covered.

PROGRAMMING SPECIALIST IN SWITZERLAND

The Jewish Community Center of Geneva, Switzerland seeks a Jewishly literate, French-speaking specialist in Jewish studies and informal education. The individual selected must commit to a minimum term of service of one year, during which time he or she will conduct educational programs for both youth and adults, including seminars, camp weekends, and teaching of Jewish subjects in more traditional settings. All travel and living expenses will be covered by the community.

SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE IN ISRAEL

Kibbutz Yahel seeks a rabbi or professor capable of conducting seminars for visiting groups of high school and college students. The seminars, on subjects ranging from Reform Judaism to the history of Zionism, will be conducted primarily in English. Knowledge of Hebrew, French, or Spanish is not required but will be advantageous. Applicants will be required to make a minimum commitment of three months. The kibbutz will welcome families with children if the volunteer commits for a minimum of a complete school year. The kibbutz will supply housing, food, and an allowance equivalent to that of other kibbutz members.

DENTIST IN ISRAEL

Kibbutz Yahel, a Reform Movement settlement in Israel's Negev Desert, seeks dentists to work in its dental office. Qualified candidates visiting Israel for even a short period of time are requested to apply.

The kibbutz will welcome families with children if the volunteer commits for a minimum of a complete school year. The kibbutz will supply housing, food, and a small allowance.

DIRECTOR ETHIOPIA MEDICAL PROGRAM

A challenging opportunity for a physician, preferably a pediatrician with Third World experience (with/without an MPH) to manage a medical team in Health Center in Gondar, Ethiopia. Responsibilities: Supervision of all aspects of the operation of the center including preventive, outreach, and training programs. Transportation and stipend provided. No language requirement. Preference for one year but will consider six month assignment.

The Corps of Service to the Jewish People is open to all adult Jews. It has no age restrictions. At present, communities seeking Corps of Service volunteers are in greatest need of individuals possessing professional skills in such areas as teaching, youth work, engineering, computers, medicine and dentistry, and synagogue administration.

Volunteers to the Corps are placed into specific jobs outside of the United States and Canada of varying times of service. Most Corps positions require a minimum of six months time commitment. Current openings include positions in Israel, Italy, Guatemala and Switzerland. Housing, food, transportation and a small stipend are provided in most Corps of Service positions.

The Corps of Service to the Jewish People is co-sponsored by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (UAHC) and the World Union for Progressive Judaism. The Corps also undertakes projects in conjunction with the American Joint Jewish Distribution Committee. The Corps is administered in New York City by Rabbi Daniel B. 



I wish to update you on the progress of the Corps of Service to the Jewish People, which is co-sponsored by the UAHC, the World Union for Progressive Judaism and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee. The Corps, open to all adult Jews, facilitates the use of North American Jewry's professional and technical skills in service to other Jewish communities.

Our major emphasis over the last several months has been to develop an infrastructure, to permit expanded growth over the next year. We are beginning to see the fruit of this effort, as as our number of placements has begun to increase.

Our top priority for the next year will be to increase the number of positions available. If you know of a potential host community in search of skilled or professional volunteers, please contact Eric Polokoff at (212) 249-0100, extension 209.

I. CORPS HISTORY AND OVERVIEW OF CURRENT DEVELOPMENTS

HOW THE CORPS WAS CREATED

In his speech to the UAHC Biennial Convention in November 1985, Rabbi Alexander Schindler called for the establishment of a Corps of Service. Rabbi Schindler envisioned such a Corps expanding Reform Judaism's global sense of peoplehood and communal responsibility. The Corps would produce generations of Jews for whom the word mitzvah would evoke "a stunning set of memories and experiences."

In response to this charge, the Biennial Assembly unanimously authorized a task force to study the Corps' feasibility. This Task Force examined in great detail how a new Reform Jewish service corps should be constituted. Following the recommendation of experts from the U.S. Peace Corps and other organizations, the Task Force determined that the Corps would proceed cautiously in finding positions in host communities abroad, and in recruiting and screening volunteers for any such openings.

THE THREE QUESTIONS

Task Force members identified the three crucial issues necessary for a successful Corps:

Question 1. Would people really volunteer? Would the Corps of Service be able attract dedicated and skilled adult Jews for long term volunteer assignments overseas?

Answer. North American Reform and liberal Jews are eager to help Jewish communities abroad.

The response of the Reform Movement has been overwhelming. More than 60 individuals and couples of all ages have come forward to offer their time and skills to the Corps of Service.

Question 2. Would the Corps be able to find positions? Could the Corps of Service find host communities able to support the volunteer program?

Answer. Progressive Jewish communities in Israel, Africa, Europe, and elsewhere are working with the Corps of Service to find responsible and dynamic volunteers.

The Corps now seeks volunteers for eight positions in Israel, Europe, and Africa, and expects to increase this number significantly in the future as the success of Corps volunteers in Israel, Italy and Switzerland, becomes more widely known. We also anticipate growth in other organizations' requests for Corps assistance in finding capable candidates for their international volunteer efforts.

Question 3. Could the Corps of Service match volunteers? Would the Corps be able to match host communities and volunteers of various skills, time requirements, geographic preferences, beliefs and lifestyles?

Answer. The Corps is not just an excellent vehicle for providing volunteers for host communities; it is truly a "matchmaker" between dedicated North American Reform Jews and Jewish communities overseas.

The first two Corps volunteers placed, Jonathan Meyer and James Rothman, serve as paradigms for Reform Jewish activism.

Jonathan Meyer, a specialist in Jewish Education, was sent to Geneva in 1988. In Switzerland and France, Jonathan shared the riches of North American Jewry's long and highly developed experience in informal education. In contrast, many of the communities Jonathan served developed as communities only after 1945.

James Rothman, a computer specialist formerly on the staff of our Religious Action Center, was placed into the JDC's office in Italy immediately prior to the mass emigration of Soviet Jews. There, working in the JDC's nerve center, James currently helps to coordinate the records of the thousands of Jews residing temporarily in Italy.

Through its unique ability to match the interests of communities and individuals, our Corps enables North American Jews to express their bond to Jews of other lands; to strengthen the Jewish programs and services of communities in other lands; to enhance the appreciation and respect for Jews in other lands by North American Reform Jews; and to participate in the growing appreciation of and respect for Reform Judaism by Jews in other lands.

STAFFING

In September 1988, Eric Polokoff, a 4th year rabbinic student at HUC-JIR began assisting Rabbi Daniel Syme as the Corps' Coordinator. Eric is charged with overseeing the day-to-day administration of Corps activities and developing proposals for the Corps' growth.

RECRUITING VOLUNTEER APPLICANTS

We have spent the last several months developing the necessary infrastructure for the Corps. Advertisements in Reform Judaism and in the Jewish media have generated the resumes from over sixty individuals or families of various ages interested in volunteering in the Jewish community. (See the statistics below, as well as the sampling from our "Data Base," the List of Applicants to the Corps of Service in Part V.) Generally, the level of accomplishment of our potential candidates -- academic background, professional skills, experience in helping others -- is quite high.

SEARCHING FOR HOST COMMUNITIES

We have also sought to expand the number of positions available. In addition to our Reform/Progressive Judaism contacts, we have embarked upon joint projects with the American Joint Distribution Committee (JDC). A Corps volunteer, James Rothman, is currently serving the JDC in Italy as a computer systems designer. The JDC has interviewed and is considering other volunteers for placement in either Italy and Hungary.

We are currently discussing the potential for joint projects with the Jewish National Fund, and have established contact. We have also corresponded with other organizations, such as the LifeLine for the Elderly in Israel and the American Jewish World Service regarding the potential for providing them with skilled volunteers.

OUR NEXT STEPS

Over the next year, we are planning the following steps:

- o Developing new materials, programs and brochures for use at regional biennials;
- o Surveying the WUPJ and other international Jewish organizations to learn their personnel and programmatic needs;
- o An international letter writing campaign to find host communities in need of volunteers; and
- o Attempting to match volunteers serving in non-rabbinic functions with congregations in North America (perhaps in conjunction with the UAHC Regional Directors and/or UAHC Department of Small Congregations).

A analysis of the Corps activities, direction and scope will be conducted over the summer.

II. NEW PLACEMENTS

YOUTH PROGRAMMER FOR SWITZERLAND

Elsie Stern has been selected as the second volunteer to serve as a Specialist in Programming and Informal Jewish Education for the Jewish Community Center in Geneva, Switzerland.

Elsie will begin her Corps of Service position in the early Fall. She will conduct educational programs for both youth and adults, including seminars, camp weekends, and teaching of Jewish subjects in more traditional settings, and will also be available for temporary projects with youth of other French-speaking communities. She has made a year's time commitment to the Congregation, and will live with a host family throughout her term of service.

Elsie is well suited to share new educational skills and programs developed in America, given her extensive background in all aspects of formal and informal Jewish education, including camping, day and religious schools. She is currently a teacher at the Bernard Zell Anshe Emet Day School in Chicago, IL and the Program Director of the UAHC's Camp Swig Institute in Saratoga, CA. She has also been extremely active in theater in Chicago and New Haven, CT.

Elsie graduated Summa Cum Laude with a B.A. Degree in Literature from Yale University. She is the daughter of Rabbi Jack and Priscilla Stern of Scarsdale, NY.

ACCOUNTING SPECIALIST FOR KIBBUTZ YAHIEL

Fred and Marlene Zimmerman of Beverly Hills, California, have been selected as volunteers for Kibbutz Yahiel, located in Israel's arava region.

On the kibbutz, Fred will serve as a specialist in cost accounting systems and economics. Drawing from more than 30 years of experience in computer applications, cost control, and systems and procedures for management, he will coordinate the establishment of an efficient cost monitoring system for the entire kibbutz. Marlene, an internationally renowned artist, will develop a pottery-art studio at the kibbutz.

The couple have made a three month time commitment to live on the kibbutz while they develop the cost monitoring system and the studio. Kibbutz Yahiel will provide them with room, board and a stipend equivalent to that of its members.

Fred is currently a management consultant. He spent twenty years in top management positions at the System Development Corporation, most recently as Director of Management Analysis. He holds a Master's degree in Applied Physics and a Bachelor's in Electrical Engineering. He has also pursued studies in Economics and Hebrew.

Marlene is a self-taught artist who has had major exhibitions both in the U.S. and abroad. She has received numerous awards and prizes for her work. Her art is part of museum collections in the United States and Europe.

The couple has been married for thirty seven years and have four children.

Today the Seminar Center is expanding the range of its programs which run from one day to two weeks on subjects including Reform Judaism, Reform Zionism, kibbutz and communal settlements in the desert. The seminars are given primarily to high school and college age youth from English speaking countries who are in Israel on short and long term programs. The scholar will also participate in the design and implementation of a long term Israel program at Yahiel (3-6 months) which will include work, Hebrew study and Zionist and Jewish studies.

Teaching and programs will be primarily in English. Knowledge of Hebrew, French or Spanish will also be advantageous.

Yahiel can absorb a single person or family. Families with children cannot be absorbed for less than a complete school year. The kibbutz will supply housing, food and an allowance equivalent to that of other kibbutz members.

In addition to being an expression of the commitment to fostering the ideas and values of Reform Zionism; the Seminar Center at Yahiel is also an important income producing branch of the kibbutz. Assistance in helping to develop the Seminar Center will be greatly appreciated. Pioneering in Jewish education in this pioneering community will be an unforgettable personal experience.

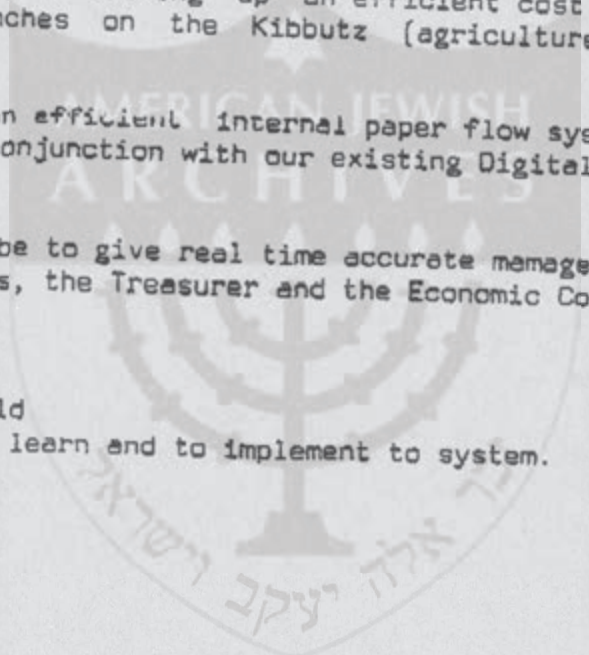
