Subject Most NFTY Groups Flying Tower Air This Summer - Pressure from El Al

For a range of very good reasons, most summer groups will fly Tower Air. We have used Tower extensively for 5-6 years. We have great confidence in their safety and service. This year, a critical year from a dollars perspective, the Tower Air ticket cost per participant is almost \$200 less than El Al.

I'm updating you because there is great pressure on us at present to switch back to El Al. You may hear of this as well.

Below is the brief history of our contact with El Al this past winter.

Smitty and I met in December and January with David Shein and Leon Hasdai (#1 and #2 managers of El Al - North America). We told them that we were prepared to fly El Al if:

- A) We were a party to the negotiations on price with El Al and the Jewish Agency.
- B) The price per ticket would be the same for all youth organizations.
- C) The fare during the peak period (mid June-mid July) would be competitive.

Shein and Hasdai, in two hours of conversation, made it clear that El Al would do all it could, in a difficult year, to work with us and to respond to our concerns.

Six weeks later (after <u>not</u> receiving an invitation to participate in negotiations) a summer youth fare structure was announced by El Al. They raised the peak season fares by 20% over Summer 1990. We knew then that Tower Air was the only viable option this year.

After the initial 20% fare increase was announced, there was an outcry from all groups, youth and adult. El Al rolled back the fare 5 or 6%. This new fare is the \$200 more per ticket than Tower fare. (Please see letter of February 28 to El Al attached.)

We were unhappy about the price and not having input into the price negotiation.

We communicated with El Al and AZYF our displeasure with the above and our intention to fly most groups on Tower Air.



Just last Friday (May 10) I received a call from the #3 guy at El Al (Adi Zacharia). He states that, faced with the stark reality of our planning to fly Tower, El Al is now willing to offer us a lower price.

My reaction is that this is not the "shuk". We stated directly in December and January our needs and expectations. El Al continues to treat North American youth organizations with little regard. This is a shabby way to conduct business.

Smitty and I feel that no matter the pressure we may encounter in the weeks ahead, we will stick with Tower Air. Tower published a fare in November and will stand by their fare.

Finally, even a compromise on El Al's part would leave us with an El Al fare at least \$100 more per kid than Tower.

In May Rabbi Jonathan Stein, Chair of the Commission on Jewish Education wrote to a number of the leaders of our Movement and a cross section of current and past Commission members and asked them to share their thoughts regarding

1. The purposes, goals, scope and authority of the Commission, and

2. The type of structure which might encourage and promote a truly Movement-wide Commission.

The purpose of this exercise was to embark upon a process to develop a Mission Statement and structure which would serve the needs of Jewish education in the Reform Movement for the 90's.

Twenty-nine responses to Jon's letter were received and I have spent considerable time this summer reviewing these comments and suggestions. Several issues became clear as a result of this survey:

- 1. There is a need to clarify the mandate of the Commission.
- 2. There is an overwhelming need for the Commission to serve as a center of communication for and about Jewish education.
- 3. There is a strong desire that the Commission serve as the setting for policy planning as related to Jewish education in the Reform Movement.

Based on our findings, I have prepared a <u>DRAFT</u> of a Mission Statement and suggested Structure and Procedures for the Commission. Copies of these documents are enclosed.

Although a deliberative process for developing these statements would have been preferred, because of serious time constraints at Commission meetings Jon, Howard and I determined that developing a draft for you to review would be a more efficient approach.

We would, therefore, appreciate it if you would please review the drafts attached as we will be discussing them in depth at our next Commission meeting and adopting a version upon which we can agree.

I look forward to seeing you at the next meeting.

- 3. Two (2) Appointees from each of the following Organizations:
 - A. American Conference of Cantors
 - B. Association of Reform Zionists of America and Kadima
 - C. Council of Reform Jewish Day Schools
 - D. National Association of Temple Administrators
 - E. National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods
 - F. National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods
 - G. North American Federation of Temple Youth
 - H. World Union for Progressive Judaism
- 4. The Director and/or an Appointee from each of the following UAHC Commissions:
 - A. Family
 - B. Outreach
 - C. Religious Living
 - D. Social Action
 - E. Others as deemed important
- 5. The Director of each of the following UAHC Departments:
 - A. College Youth
 - B. Publications
 - C. Religious Education
 - D. Social Action
 - E. Others as deemed important

All Commission appointments will be for a three year term. No one may serve more than two terms unless they are appointed Chair or Co-Chair of the Commission.

The Commission will meet at least once a year and at National

Biennials of the UAHC. When possible, additional meetings will be held in conjunction with Regional UAHC Biennials.

The Director of the Department for Religious Education of the UAHC will staff the Commission. Other professional staff members of the Department will assist as delegated by the Director. The Chair of the Commission and Co-Chair(s) will each serve a three year term.

An Executive Committee will be responsible for setting the agenda of Commssion meetings and for supervising and/or carrying on the business of the Commission between meetings. The Executive will meet immediately before or after each Commission meeting and, at least, one other time during the year. The Executive will consist of the following, each serving a three year term:

- 1. The Chair and Co-Chair of the Commission.
- 2. The Chairman of the UAHC, and the presidents of the CCAR and NATE.
- 3. One representative of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Insitute ot Religion (to be decided by the representatives of the College-Institute.
- 4. Five members of the Commission elected at a full meeting f the Commission. At least three of those elected must be "non-professional leaders."

Other Committees of the Commission may include:

- 1. Program Committee which will assist in creating the actual program of the full Commission meetings.
- 2. Communications Committee which will be responsible to find vehicles for insuring that the Communications Goals of the Commission are fulfilled.
- 3. Budget Committee which will <u>initially</u> be assigned the task of finding an equitable way to fund the work of the Commission. This Committee will consider what financial commitment can be reasonably expected from constituent organizations.

These and other Committees and Task Forces will be appointed as the Executive Committee deems necessary.

Alex,

Just so you understand the history and background of the Daf Shavuah Project, herewith is an explanation.

Four years ago, when Gary was still with the NYFRS, its Committee on Religious Commitment played around with the idea of a Daf Yomi. It was intended for the leadership of the NYFRS and was structured around six short readings that arose from the Parashat HaShavuah. The seventh day, Shabbat, was intended for reading the parasha. The six days would each have a theme. They were:

1) A reading on Shabbat observance; 2) A reading on doing Mitzvot; 3) A reading on up-coming Haggim; 4) A reading on Belief; 5) A reading on Tzedakah; and 6) A reading on Torah study. Hence the initials of each of the six categories (Shabbat, Mitzvah, Haggim, Emunah, Ma'aser, Torah) spelled out its title Simchah v'Emet (if one changed a shin to a sin).

Because the committee felt that it was incapable of authoring such a project and it was felt that Gary should not write the whole thing, the project was abandoned.

Last year, at a Board meeting, Phil came up with the idea of writing a Daf Yomi and mentioned it to Gary, who told Phil about the abandoned project and suggested that he take a look at the original format. Phil decided to put together a committee of people that could write a Daf Yomi. The committee was comprised of Phil, Gary, Sandy Seltzer, Steve Chatinover and Manny Gold. This committee met several times, suggested other formats and finally settled on an enhanced version of Simcha v'Emet -- which would really be a Daf Shauvah -- one page per week. All participated in writing the material with Phil making additional contributions on heretofore seldom celebrated holidays (i.e. A'sara b'Tevet, Tzom Gedaliah, etc.) and special parts of the parashah that should be noted.

What you received was just the six readings per week for a ten week period. What was missing was an Introduction, which would instruct the reader on how to employ the text in personal or synagogal settings.

The questions that have been only recently been settled centered on who would publish the text. At first, Brotherhood was

contacted and was unable to make a commitment. Sisterhood was also contacted as they already publish a calendar, and it could be published in tandem. Dept. of Rel. Ed. has an Adult Ed. budget line which could bear part of the costs. Ellie just informed us that they would like to share the costs of publication and use it in Sisterhood settings.

At this point, it is our intention to demonstrate its use in the Adult Ed. workshop that Gary will run at the Biennial and Ellie will have it shown off at a similar workshop for Sisterhood. It would be described as a work in progress that will be available for next program year.

In the mean time, Sandy will take it to the Commission on Religious Living to see if there are members who would like to make contributions to finish off the parashiot. Phil is writing the Introduction and Usage Guide.

It is intended to be a pocket size text that could be carried in a purse or jacket pocket. It would be small and inviting and direct the reader to additional sources.

We hope this fills in some of the blanks that were created when you first received the text.
