We are very pleased to tell you that at its recent meeting, December 15-16, 1991, the NFTS Executive Committee voted to authorize an increase in the NFTS budgetary commitment for the Youth Department effective for your own 1992/93 budget. The increase is from \$80,000 to \$82,500.

Although that sum of \$82,500 has been contributed to the UAHC by NFTS over the past several years the actual commitment was \$80,000; we believe that the increased support for the YES Fund now justifies an increase in the budgetary commitment.

In addition, the Executive Committee voted a sum of \$2,500 over and above what has been contributed up to now, therefore, you will receive for the present fiscal year 91/92 a total sum of \$85,000. This is premised on the \$80,000 budgetary commitment in place at present for the remainder of this fiscal year, and a "plus" contribution of \$5,000. For the next fiscal year you may incorporate in the budget an expectation of \$82,500 and - if our optimism of continued support for the YES Fund continues we hope that there can be an additional grant of no less than \$2,500.

It is always a pleasure when Sisterhood efforts result in the kind of success that becomes a basis of increased support for our institutions of Reform Judaism.



I have seen her work and it is powerful. NFTS does not control the 5th Avenue windows, although, historically Jane was the one who handled the 5th Avenue windows. Jane was very involved and remains responsible today, but I don't know when a policy of only Jewish artists was established. It may be part of the conditions of the money left for the "Gallery."

But I do believe if the subject matter is Judaic, the art is powerful and in good taste, an exception can be made.

I believe it is especially relevant in this insistence if (persuming the art work is acceptable) it could be tied in with the re-emergence of our interreligious activities. It seems to me it would also provide a splendid PR opportunity since there is always a premiere showing.

As you see I am sending a copy of this to Jane because she is the only one who really knows the parameters of what can be in the windows.

Somewhere in her travels, Rhea came across the work of a Mary Constanza. I know she is held in high esteem by Nancy Berman of the Skirball Museum. Rhea had an opportunity to chat with Ms Constanza, who is a Catholic who was so deeply moved by the Holocaust that it has affected much of her work. When Rhea mentioned our windows, she was told that Ms Constanza had been in touch but was told that the windows are used only to display work of Jewish artists. While appreciate the reason for this, I do wonder why, on occasion, when a non-Jew creates work based on Jewish themes, we cannot have an exhibition of that work.

Is your rule hard and fast? You may want to give this matter a bit more thought for the future.



It is that time of year that NFTS is able to implement actions authorized by our leadership resulting from the fund raising efforts of the Women of Reform Judaism.

On behalf of the Officers and Board of Directors of NFTS, I am pleased to enclose five agency checks representing \$102,000 to be designated as follows:

- I. From the Youth, Education and Sisterhood Projects (YES) Fund
 - \$80,000 covering the \$75,000 budgeted commitment and a plus contribution of \$5,000 in support of the UAHC youth program. By action of the Executive Committee it is designated as \$65,000 for high school youth and \$15,000 for college youth activities.
 - \$10,000 as a one-time gift to be used by the UAHC for a special event and/or other celebration activities to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of NFTY at the 1989 Biennial Assembly.
 - \$6,000 towards the salary of a Legislative Aide, Religious Action Center, Washington, DC serving as NFTS liaison.
- II. From the NFTS Founders Endowment Fund

A \$1,000 contribution to co-sponsor the publication, in Russian, of a pamphlet about Reform and Progressive Judaism.

III. From the General Fund Budget of NFTS

\$5,000 towards the publication of REFORM JUDAISM.

Although NFTS is facing the most severe financial circumstances related to our General Fund income, we all feel very strongly that support for the publication REFORM JUDAISM is of prime concern and as an act of faith, while we are increasing our deficit, our leadership felt that this contribution was important.

We are also pleased that our family of Reform Judaism is adding the programmatic dimension to our advocacy role on behalf of Soviet Jewry and that NFTS is able to co-sponsor this important publication with the UAHC.

And, of course, our continued support for the UAHC Youth Department and the special allocation for the "NFTY is 50" represents the deep commitment that the Women of Reform Judaism have to temple youth. The splendid programs offered by the UAHC, particularly as they aid local congregations to provide a meaningful arena of activity and participation for high school youth within their own religious community, is of prime importance.

Each year we have striven to increase our support and each year our efforts and our hopes have been realized. That same hope is in place for the future.

A WORLD OF WOMEN

The United Nations End of Women's Decade Non-Governmental Forum, July 10-19, 1985 and Governmental Conference, July 15-26, 1985

"There's a lot of power in this group", said one young woman en route to Nairobi on a plane crowded with women. Women from the four corners of the world and from every race, creed, national and ethnic background travelled to Nairobi, Kenya in July 1985 for the United Nations End of Women's Decade Non-Governmental Forum (Forum '85), and the Governmental Conference.

On planes loaded with representatives of many organizations a bonding process began with the exchange of names, addresses and interests. A young filmmaker exercised in the aisle under the guidance of a physical therapist. A Jewish NGO representative talked with a young black woman whose trip to Africa was a long-held dream come true. An older woman, a Professor of Education in Bermuda, troubled by heart pains during the long-delayed plane departure, was helped into a wheelchair by a young United States woman she had just met. Each person had a story to tell, one hemming edges of embroidered strips of cloth from Mozambique and laying plans to help rural African women to market handcrafts, a Jewish woman defining Zionism to a black woman. These first encounters on the plane were later reinforced by smiling recognition as the travelers met each other by chance through the following days.

In Nairobi

Ten thousand women from over 150 nations! Some were in boldly printed long African skirts with wrapped head-dresses, others in jeans and T-shirts or gold-edged saris; short dresses, straw hats and headbands across the forehead made for a richly-hued tapestry of women.

Two meetings followed each other with some overlapping days: the Non-Governmental Forum '85 with representatives of organizations and citizen groups, from July 10 through July 19; and the Governmental Conference with official delegations chosen to represent their governments, from July 15 through July 26. Reported numbers were: over 10,000 at the Forum; at the Conference over 2,000 delegates from 159 countries (8 of them nations that are not members of the UN), 1,300 media people, 600 accredited Non Governmental Organization (NGO) representatives in consultative status with the UN. The purpose of both the Forum and the Conference was to assess the achievements and failures of the last ten years and to plot strategies through the year 2000.

The NGO Forum, a volatile gathering of diverse women with even more diverse interests, opened at the Kenyatta Conference Centre in the middle of the city, a large and handsome structure built to recall a many-sided tent. The remaining sessions of Forum '85 met at the University of Nairobi in classroom buildings, on the great lawn, or in buildings adjacent to the University complex. One area was called "Tech and Tools" with exhibits of technology appropriate to the needs of many women especially of the Third World. Another building was the Christian Leadership Centre. In a nearby Lutheran Church, a center for celebrations and dialogue was organized for women of all faiths: its name was the Swahili word for "Welcome", KARIBU.

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Queues

Security check-points were set up at the two open entrances to the University grounds. Long lines of participants moved slowly and patiently every day through specially-constructed wooden frames, as handbags and briefcases were placed on tables to be searched by women guards, while other police used beeper devices for body scans. Hotel entrances were also blocked for similar searches. Delegates passed daily through five or six security checks.

Lines also inched forward past tables where advance registration papers were exchanged for delegate name buttons with the Decade insignia of a dove of peace. Women moved slowly up narrow university stairways to stand for hours in hallways outside classrooms too packed to hold Workshop attendees.

The frustration of queues escalated at hotel desks when participants with confirmed registrations were told there were no rooms available because of the unexpected number of people attending Forum '85; government delegates were given priority for the scarce hotel housing. After several days during which many women took up week-long residence in University dormitories and other women were promised a bed for only one night at a time, large groups of NGOs negotiated with Kenyan officials to establish a pattern when necessary of three or four women in a room.

Workshops and Other Activities

The thousands of NGOs were soon caught up in the excitement of an unequalled world meeting of women, each with special agendas, differing experiences and distinct tasks. Opening Day ceremonies on July 10th brought overflow crowds to the Kenyatta Conference Centre to hear Kenyan officials and Dame Nita Barrow, Convener of Forum '85.

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Participants joined in singing the Forum theme song and African songs. In closing his speech, the Kenya Minister for Culture and Social Services said, "We women of the world (as I have now come to think) will overcome."

A daily newspaper reported highlights and human interest stories, announcements of changed schedules and coming events. Rapid word-of-mouth in crowded quarters speeded the passing of information. The listing of 1,000 different Workshops filled many pages of two program booklets, including the themes of the Decade: Equality, Development, Peace; as well as sub-themes of health, education, employment. Subjects were as varied as the wide scope of human interests, among them: Environment and Water, Children and the Family, Communication Skills, Business Building, Battered Women and the relationship of Domestic Violence to the Absence of Peace, Assertiveness Training, Older and Young Women, Employment and Economic Justice, Payment of Women for Domestic Work, Health and Education Needs, Poverty and Women, Refugee Problems, Peace. Former U.S. Congresswoman Bella Abzug ran a Workshop called "What If Women Ruled the World?" American feminist Betty Friedan conducted dialogues on women's issues under an immense tree on the university lawn.

The Leadership Conference of National Jewish Women's Organizations conducted a Workshop on Child Care. Organized from the United States, Norma Levitt was the chair and Barbara Leslie described the HIPPY Program in Israel, an acronym for Home Instruction for Parents and Pre-School Youth. Panelists were Eva Sussman from the U.S., Professor of Early Childhood Education; Rebecca Nyonyintono from Uganda who now is working in Kenya. She is a social psychologist who had attended a HIPPY training course in Israel and spoke of replicating the program in Kenya; and Mary Busharizi of Kenya, who conducts a program for children deprived of families. Vigorous discussion followed among the 85 attendees. Many African women asked

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for Eva Sussman's address, to write for advice. Appropriately, two Kenyan babies smiled from the safety of their mothers' arms.

In a Workshop on Continuing Dialogue between U.S. and U.S.S.R. women, there was a period of confrontation. After three hours of discussion, during which the issue of the rights of Soviet Jewry was kept on the agenda, finally a Russian woman promised a Jewish woman from Holland that she would work toward gaining exit permission for a Soviet Jewish refusenik. News of this success spread rapidly through the network of Jewish women.

Apartheid was a key issue for heated discussions and demonstrations against it. Highlighted also was the plight of women in the Third World. They handle not only domestic chores and care for children but also walk miles each day to fetch water and firewood as well as to grow subsistence food for their families on land that is owned by men. When the men, who control the marketing of cash crops, leave for cities to seek jobs, rural women are left alone in worse poverty. Priorities for Third World women are the basic needs: food, health care, clean water, clothing and shelter.

Hours were spent in dialogue among women of vastly different national and religious backgrounds, whether from the U.S. and U.S.S.R., Afghanistan, Palestine, Israel, Egypt or from any other part of this troubled world. There was dialogue, too, between fundamentalist Moslem women wearing the veil and those who, while adhering to the faith of Islam, were of more modern persuasion. French, English, Spanish and Swahili interpreters worked furiously.

With the best will in the world and the greatest energy as well as interest, no one person could possibly attend every activity presented. In addition to workshops and demonstrations, there were film presentations, handcraft exhibits, song and dance celebrations, poetry readings and theatre performances, and a Peace Tent on campus in which some battles took place between women of Iran and Iraq as

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well as between Jewish and Palestinian women. Gala receptions were given by many government delegations and some NGOs. Travel into the countryside to meet with and see the life of women in rural areas was an added learning opportunity.

While space will not permit naming all the distinguished women who were in attendance in Nairobi, three are particularly significant: Dame Nita Barrow of Barbados, Convener of the NGO Forum '85; and for the UN Governmental Conference, Leticia R. Shahani of the Philippines as Secretary General and Margaret Kenyatta of Kenya who was elected its President.

It was impossible to ignore the tensions of the contemporary world, especially when women from so many nations and backgrounds gathered. There were periods of heated confrontation. Too frequently, Palestinian women, concentrating on their own frustrations and strategies, interrupted Workshop dialogues and presentations with their agenda, whether relevant or not. Interestingly enough, Third World women joined both Jewish and non-Jewish representatives from North, South, East and West in stopping the interruptions and maintaining the main focus of the Decade themes.

Jewish Community, Other Jewish Concerns

Among the Jewish representatives were women from many different countries. They had been shocked by the equation of Zionism with racism at the Opening Conference in Mexico City in 1975. At Copenhagen in 1980 at the mid Decade, vituperation against Jewish women had been unrelieved and the denunciation of Israel over the Palestinian issue had brought the Conference to a virtual standstill. Determined to defend themselves and Israel, as well as to make the 1985 Conference both successful and more harmonious, Jewish women prepared themselves through the last five years. There were training

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sessions in parliamentary procedures and in dealing with the media, exchanges with government officials and delegations, meetings with non-Jewish agencies and umbrella Jewish groups, education and documentation about women round the world and ways to help them. At Forum '85, exchanges between Arab and Jewish women ranged from hostility to in depth personal dialogue, with a movement toward willingness to listen to each other.

Jewish representatives met daily at 1:00 PM at the Jewish Community Centre in Nairobi, Vermont Hall, to exchange experiences and discuss strategies for handling confrontations. They attended Sabbath Eve Services and a following Oneg Shabbat at the Synagogue, as well as conducting a special Sabbath morning service open to all at the Karibu (Welcome) Centre. Following the pattern of the Jewish National Fund, the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods (NFTS) provided certificates for the purchase of trees. Led by Constance Kreshtool, President of NFTS, and Norma Levitt, who were joined by Jewish women from other organizations and countries, trees were planted at a school as part of the Green Belt Movement, a reforestation project of Kenyan women.

Ine Land Animals at Amboselli National Park; Women and UNICEF

Traveling long hours in a minibus through Kenya makes vivid the vast dryness of the land. "Getting there" is part of the experience.

On a day's trip to Amboselli National Park near the border of Tanzania, there were seen tall, thin Masai men wrapped in rusty red blankets, walking across the dusty plain, where mirages of water hover over the earth. Masai women carried bundles on their heads, bearing themselves proudly. In the swamp lands surrounding the region of Lake Amboselli many animals came to graze. During a single day were seen:

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eagles, vultures, gazelles, ostriches, zebras, jackals, wildebeest, waterbucks, elephants with their young, giraffes and lions.

On another day's trip to projects of the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the effects of the dry land were visible in the deprivation of people's lives. James Grant, Director of UNICEF since 1980, in a briefing for NGOs and governmental delegates at the Kenyatta Conference Centre, spoke about the Implications for Women of Child Survival and Development Issues. At Copenhagen, he said, there was little discussion of the impact of children on women. Since then, the global recession, drought and starvation have grimly affected the Third World. In the intervening years, UNICEF has broadened its range of activities for women, who will carry the responsibility of what is called the Child Survival Development Revolution. Underutilized technologies are being rediscovered under the acronym GOBI: G for growth monitoring of children, to determine whether they are malnourished; O for Oral Rehydration Therapy, a simple formula of sugar and salt in water which, within hours, restores life to a child dying of dehydration caused by diarrhea; B for breast feeding instead of bottled formula which is often prepared with polluted water; I for immunization, to save 5 million children a year from death and an additional 5 million from permanent crippling. And what are the benefits for women? The average child in a low-income family in Africa is sick 160 days a year which means that, in a family of four, one child is always sick and in need of care as well as money which is not available for medicine. The Child Survival Development Revolution gives to women a set of practices to cut serious illness by two-thirds. The goal of UNICEF is universal immunization against six crippling, killing diseases by the year 1990.

The trip to UNICEF-funded projects brought to life the facts of desperation which fill written reports. Victor, a Kenyan specializing in appropriate technology, who had helped to set up the project to be visited, drove a UNICEF van two hours to the village of Kola in the district of Machakos. Part of the way up hillside roads, strewn with rock and through dusty red clay soil, Joshua Mukusya, Director of the project, met the van. Leading the visit, he explained with passion the pressing needs for clean water, sanitation, food production, health, soil conservation and income generation. He is filled with determination to overcome obstacles and to inspire the people to work hard toward specific goals.

In 1983 and 1984, there was famine and drought in the area, and it was called the Place of Hunger. Cattle and chickens died, some people died and others in desperation thought they must leave. The Ministry of Transport provided some water and in 1984, the rains came. The average family income is 500 Kenyan shillings per year, a little over \$30.00. Joshua's goal is nearly 10,000 shillings per year, over \$500.00.

Boy Scouts from England were working in the village for three weeks, building water tanks. Two scouts worked side by side with two villagers on each tank. Working from six AM to nine PM under Joshua's driving leadership, they had built ten water tanks in two days, with a goal of 60 tanks in 21 days.

In about three months 58 tanks had been built. Each holds 3,000 gallons collected from rain on roof cachements and pipes. Joshua's plan is to reach 400 families with clean available water instead of relying on a three hour walk by women to collect polluted water. It should be noted that the average Kenyan family is from eight to ten persons, so his goal was to aid several thousand people.

Victor's appropriate technology was visible in the village through the building of V.I.P.'s. This acronym is for ventilated improved pits for latrines, often timber-enclosed. A cement floor surrounds a hole; a pipe allows the wind to take the odor from underground to the outside. Flies are caught in the wire mesh of the pipe, reducing contamination and disease.

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At the village market, held twice a week, women were selling pots, baskets, clothes and produce. Each woman continued her basket-weaving as she walked or sat in front of her products. The small headquarters of this village's UNICEF project was a building filled with seeds, cement, small fuel-efficient stoves and baskets for sale. Joshua listed the nine project departments: storage, food production, livestock, water conservation, social problems (break-up of families), soil conservation and tree planting, family health, income generation, and technology. It is called the Utooni Development Project, covering 70 kilometers surrounding the village of Kola.

Walking down a hillside and along a dry river bed, we visitors saw an unforgettable sight: some 30 women in brightly colored dresses and headscarves, carrying baskets of sand collected for cement-mixing and singing together to ease their task. We stood on top of the unfinished wall of a dam, faced by the African women. A conversation was held through Joshua as translator: first introductions, then urgent questions and statements from the women. They said, "We need food for ourselves and our children. What will you do?" We answered with a pledge of support to raise money for UNICEF and admiration for their work and singing. We promised to tell their story. The response to our remarks was applause and a high call with pointed tongues wagging back and forth in open mouths, a sound which resembled "lululululu." After goodbyes, the women trudged on with their heavy baskets and continuing to sing. They left an indelible memory of dryness, colored cloth, decaying teeth in smiling, seamy dark faces -women of Africa working, working, working.

The Government Conference Document

History was made at the Government Conference in Nairobi by ameliorating United Nations attitudes against Zionism. Israel was

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determined to eliminate the listing of Zionism as an obstacle to peace and the advancement of women. Nevertheless, as the head of the Israeli delegation, Sarah Doron, began to speak, dozens of delegates chanting "Zionists go home. Palestine! Palestine!" marched out of the UN Governmental Conference. They returned after she finished.

On the day before the end of the Conference there was little hope that there would be a universally-accepted document, "unless there's a miracle", as one negotiator said. Both the U.S., under the leadership of Maureen Reagan as head of its delegation, and Israel had threatened to vote against the document if Zionism was cited. Kenya had offered a substitute that deplored "all other forms of racism and racial discrimination." Probably it is true that the adoption of this amendment had depended on some delegates interpreting the new wording as still alluding to Zionism. After its adoption Alan Keyes of the U.S. delegation stressed that no amount of repetition would render the lie that "Zionism is racism" truthful. Many booed and hissed from the floor, whether because of the timing of his remarks or in disagreement. The final marathon session lasted through the night until early morning. The Conference ended on a note of unity and a sense of commonality with the adoption of the document that no longer equated Zionism with racism. Twenty-one hundred government delegates burst into applause and continued clapping in unison.

While 1985 marks the End of the Women's Decade, strategies were explored to be carried through the rest of this century. The Decade has increased awareness of the state of the world's women as well as of a powerful international women's movement which deals largely with non-political problems faced by women and offers long-term strategies for overcoming them. The final document, "Forward-Looking Strategies" until the year 2000, contains more than 350 paragraphs. Two new resolutions were approved calling for the United Nations Development Program to spend five percent of its budget on projects specifically related to women. Another resolution urged governments to increase contributions to the United Nations Development Fund for Women, formerly called the Voluntary Fund. The document will be most useful to women of the developing countries, especially rural women.

Resolutions were also approved urging governments in estimating their gross national products, to place an economic value on the unrenumerated contributions of women, such as child-bearing, keeping house and raising crops. Recommendations also included "equal pay for work of equal value", government funding of women's organizations, accessible child care and flexible work schedules for working parents, legislation to provide minimum wage standards and insurance. Water was the basis for a call on governments to "relieve the burden placed on women by the task of fetching water" (often six hours a day in the Third World) by constructing wells, boring holes, building dams and other water-collecting devices.

Despite parliamentary manipulation, bitter vituperation and political rhetoric, the Governmental Conference did end in unity. The final document is non-binding and will be submitted to the United Nations General Assembly for approval along with 150 resolutions; nevertheless it has symbolic value as a world mandate for change for women's participation and equality in the political and economic systems. Implementation will depend on individual nations.

Companions On The Journey Of Years

At the meeting were thousands of women who had worked together through five or more years. Greeting each other, supporting mutual efforts, recalling events -- everywhere there were familiar faces for those who had undertaken the challenging journey to Nairobi. Women who, if not known personally, were names that had become or would be companions through the years. We had been and were sharers in a unique, stimulating, often difficult adventure.

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In Conclusion A New Wind Blowing

Perhaps there is a new wind blowing. Ten years ago only a scattered number of women believed that their relationship to special issues should receive separate attention. At the End of Decade Women's Conference in Nairobi in 1985, there was a change of emphasis. Africa, a continent desperate for development, exercised its influence not only through its needs but through the dignity of its women. They do not want their problems obsured by the political fights of governments over territorial or other rights. The Decade has changed the awareness of women, and women have changed themselves as they aim to change the world. "Harambee" is the word stressed in Kenya, "Together".

It is easy to think of a women's conference of the magnitude of Nairobi as being of significance only to women, even though the 2,020 government delegates included 357 men. On the contrary, the enlarged understanding of world issues created an enduring experience. Nairobi was and is a possible lasting contribution to the advancement of humanity in all its perplexing national, societal and personal tragedies.

In a Workshop on Environment, Professor Wangari Matthai, the first woman veterinarian in Kenya and a Professor at the University of Nairobi, noting world interdependence, quoted an African proverb, "The problems of the dry wood to be put on the fire are the problems of the green wood to be dried. The problems of the poor are the problems of the rich. The problems of women are the problems of men."

The Forum concluded with closing celebrations on the great lawn of the University, thousands and thousands of women sitting on the grass, calling "sit down" to men, listening and cheering Dame Nita Barrow, watching dancers from many villages, singing, clapping together, "Harambee". "The women of the world have won, and even the UN in spite of itself", said Rosario Manalo, a Filipino delegate who headed one of the two Conference drafting committees. "And it took women to do it."

Strangers before, colleagues now through efforts of the Decade, are marching forward. The journey to Nairobi continues into the future. June 21, 1985

Two weeks ago I received a telephone call from the U.S. Information Service saying that they had received a telex from their South African counterpart asking to arrange an appointment for me to meet with Ina Perlman who is the Executive Director of "Operation Hunger" in South Africa. They had no other contacts to give me except for the fact that Mrs. Perlman was most eager to meet with me. I could only presume that one of our leaders in South Africa gave her my name.

I met with Mrs. Perlman on May 14th. In fact she is a member of the Sisterhood and congregation Emanuel in Johannesburg, one of four groups that make up the United Hebrew Congregation. She is the top professional of the largest volunteer organization in South Africa which has been in existence for several years, spawned through what was the Inter-religious Council in South Africa. Mrs. Perlman first was motivated to work on the Inter-religious Council as part of her Sisterhood commitment since it is a programmatic project of the United Sisterhood of Johannesburg. It was this group that recognized the need to feed the starving natives and after a few years, spawned "Operation Hunger" as a separate organization which Mrs. Perlman has headed professionally.

She tells me that this is one of the fund-raising projects of the United Sisterhood and has received support from the Jewish community as well as the general community in the five or six years they have been in operation. They raised 25 million rand this past year. Their program is a self-help program, they insist upon a grass roots community request for assistance and participation in the role - the over-all organization provides food and some funding to lend people with expertise to help develop a grass roots organization. Their primary focus is malnutrition for very young children and they of course establish all the self-help groups particularly relating to women; included as part of their group is bringing water into each village, or tribal area, relatively simple but none the less efficient means of milling flour - absolutely similar to those programs which are sponsored by UNICEF in a variety of African countries but not South Africa. These are also the kinds of projects (and I haven't given you all of the aspects) which the US Aid to Developing Nations provides. In fact it was under a US AID grant that Mrs. Perlman was in the United States for several weeks meeting with leaders of groups that are working in world development programs. There is some chance she may be returning to the United States in the not too distant future to pursue this.

It was particularly interesting when she pointed out that it was our constituency that was the first of the Jewish community to engage in this activity so wholeheartedly. In fact the South African Union of Temple Sisterhoods has a place on their Board and the position is filled by Sybil

Abro who was the point of referral. Mrs. Perlman also reminded me that at one of the meetings that was set up during my visits with the leaders of various communal agencies she regrettably was out of the city and did not meet me while I was there last year.

She also pointed out that there was great response from the individual Sisterhoods, particularly in Johannesburg, following through on my recommendation on how they should be considered in a more activist role in relation to the United Sisterhood and that each one of them had undertaken a special fundraising activity for "Operation Hunger" and Rabbi Mendel, her own rabbi at Temple Emanuel who is now the chair of Progressive Rabbinic Council carried it one step further and every congregation has written letters to all of its members asking for financial support. It was really very nice to hear and Mrs. Perlman is a most interesting person and I would certainly look forward to the opportunity of spending more time with her as each of you would enjoy meeting her. No - she is not a particularly good speaker and I do not necessarily suggest that she be used in that context.

But over and above her agenda bringing greetings from Sybil Abro and praising the work of our Sisterhoods there in this support was another agenda item it didn't come up until the end of the meeting and it is somewhat troubling. It has to do with the increasing sensitivity of many of the Jewish communities that their security in South Africa is not necessarily guaranteed. She indicated that considering the tragic circumstances of the country and the "inextremist" position which many of the government leaders express and the impact on the native population, there is an emerging expression of anti-Semitism which is very uncomfortable. Her thrust though was one that disturbs me very much - she cited a recent meeting of the Jewish Board of Deputies in South Africa that was called for the purpose of discussing "what they could do about Israel and the Israeli leaders." I was not aware of it although she said it was in the U.S. press, but apparently Israeli officials representing the government of Israel in South Africa, as well as the government of Israel leaders in Israel have expressed support for the homeland concept. This is very disturbing to the more liberal levels of the South African society and what she was really asking was would I be a conduit (not the only one I'm sure) to try to point out to Israeli officials those uncomfortable situations in which the Jewish community finds itself. She has indicated that the general South African society is now beginning to view the Jewish community as interested only in their own self-interest and in Israel. She is concerned that the Jewish community will be increasingly perceived as "not good citizens."

I pointed out to her that no Jewish community outside of Israel can tell the Israel government what political or diplomatic positions it should have (I refrain from commenting on any unofficial or sub rosa opportunities for giving advice), I also pointed out the inaccuracies of Israel being criticized for being such a strong trading partner with South Africa (quoting some of the well-known statistics) and also pointed out that often in Jewish history the Jews became an excuse to be scapegoats and they were not the cause and that

in any given troubling situation, whether economic or social, the group in power always looks for a vulnerable group to blame.

Mrs. Perlman is a third generation South African on her father's side, her mother was a German refugee. She is very sensitive to the parallels of the Jewish communities in South Africa to what was the German Jewish community although she is obviously torn in her loyalties as a South African and her fears as a Jew.

I'm not quite sure what to make of what she said except - when you add it to the fact that as I commented to Connie, in the last few months I was receiving many visitors and telephone calls from South Africans who have rather precipitously left South Africa. This is in great contrast to those of our mutual friends and constituents who ten to fifteen years ago began to take the necessary steps to relocate their children, their capital and their loyalties.

In terms of Ms. Perlman's political and social attitudes she is one of the most progressive and enlightening persons that I have met from the South African community. She is also very astute. She would be a compelling spokesperson (forget that she does not speak well) in the sense that her project tells the story. In fact it is one of the private efforts in South Africa that is unsung. I make no apologies for the South African government but I do believe that most of us are unaware of some of the activities undertaken by people of good will. Operation Hunger not only does not receive any South African government aid but they know that they are viewed with a certain suspicion and dismay by government leaders and I don't believe that Mrs. Perlman would be too surprised if in the not too distant future the government takes action against this and other comparable citizens groups that are functioning.

I'll keep you informed if anything more like this comes along.

I did ask her to ask Sybil to write up the whole Sisterhood process in relation to Operation Hunger. Some of the South African women have mentioned this in the past but they've never given us the prominence or the details about it as they do for the Wyler school. I do think that it is important for us to give public notice to the work which our women and our congregants do as a Jewish community to help solve some of these awesome problems in South Africa.

One final point which I should have had a little earlier in this memo. She implied that at least our Progressive community and much of the secular Jewish community were fast moving toward making a more evident statement of their rejection of the homeland concept. Thus the Israeli support for this was a great embarrassment to the Jewish community and they are getting feedback from their own government just as the American Jewish community does from the White House in the U.S. Government. I don't think they know how to react!

Please keep this information confidential. I think Mrs. Perlman's effectiveness in her position might be negatively affected if she were identified with some of these reports about the Jewish community.

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

I am really deeply touched at the thoughtfulness of Don Millstone, Chuck and you for the memo.

Unfortunately there is a significant difference between what the Youth Department does and what NFTS does. The Youth Department is producing and merchandising its own goods. They are the ones making money - with an occasional opportunity for NFTY Region and/or Camp to pick up some additional money on T-shirts which carry the specific Regional identification. The Youth Department is not a centralized purchasing agency for hundreds of items which the NFTY Youth Region then in turn sells to its grass roots.

That is the process for the Sisterhood Judaica Shop. While it is true that each Judaica Shop does carry UAHC and NFTS publications (primarily books) it is only our own publications which are income producers for us nationally in addition to being income producers for local Sisterhoods. This merchandise represents less than 3% of the total Judaic merchandise carried by the local Judaica Shop.

NFTS does provide catalogues, names and addresses of vendors, etc., to the local Sisterhood, and we do set up a process, through our District Federations, for the local Sisterhoods to bond together, especially if they are smaller groups, in order to make joint purchases which allow them to pay at a lower cost.

The NFTS responsibility toward the local Sisterhood is to provide them with access to these suppliers and to provide them, through their Judaica Shop, with the means through which they can raise money locally to meet local responsibilities for particular programs and projects usually those done on behalf of the congregation.

Even if NFTS has a budget line of some \$50,000 (staff) we don't have the office space to set up a consolidated purchasing project. Further, the margin of profit is not really large enough for both NFTS and the local Sisterhood to make a profit. We believe that this is a responsibility that we have to the local Sisterhood to help it make the maximum sum of money since the pressure put on the local Sisterhood by the congregation for fund-raising is so intense. Incidentally the amount of money that Sisterhoods are now turning over to the congregations, whether for specified ear-marked projects

or for capital projects (few do it to the general operating budget since it is so frustrating and unsatisfying a process - the ear-marked freeze the congregation's operating budget) is keeping pace with the dollar amount which congregations are paying to the UAHC annually! That is one of those extraordinary coincidences, don't you think?

Again, thanks for thinking of us.





COMMITTEES OF THE UAHC BOARD OF TRUSTEES

<u>AWARDS COMMITTEE</u>: To nominate winners of the Biennial Bearer of Light Awards and any other special awards the Union may choose to give from time to time.

BIENNIAL PROGRAM COMMITTEE: To plan the program for upcoming Biennials of the UAHC.

BUDGET COMMITTEE: To prepare and implement the annual operational budget for the UAHC.

<u>CARING COMMUNITY</u>: To develop programs for our congregations focusing on the synagogue as a caring community. This includes the development of effective responses to the needs of our congregations in areas such as singles programs, single parent households, the aging, etc.

<u>COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE</u>: To bring the message of the UAHC to our congregations, and to the entire North American Jewish community, in a variety of ways, including radio and television.

<u>COMMITTEE ON CULTS</u>: To concentrate on the methods and means of combating the influence of cults, particularly on the youth.

TASK FORCE ON THE DISABLED: To assist congregations in making worship and program functions and facilities accessible to those whose sight, hearing or mobility is impaired.

<u>DUES POLICY REVIEW COMMITTEE</u>: To review the implementation and progress of the Biennial recommendations affecting the MUM program as recommended by the Special Biennial Committee on Proportional Dues.

ENDOWMENT AND TRUST FUNDS COMMITTEE: To supervise and oversee and invest the endowment and trust funds of the UAHC.

<u>ENERGY TASK FORCE</u>: To provide guidance to our congregations and congregants on how to reduce energy consumption and incorporate energy efficient techniques. To continue to call upon federal, state and local governments to adopt and fund serious programs of energy conservation.

<u>UAHC FUND FOR REFORM JUDAISM STEERING COMMITTEE</u>: To plan and develop fund-raising activities and techniques to raise the funds necessary for implementing programs of the UAHC.

INTERFAITH COMMITTEE: To plan cooperative programs with ogher religious groupings such as the National Council of Churches, the Evangelicals, the American Conference of Catholic Bishops, etc. in the interfaith realm.

LABOR RELATIONS COMMITTEE: To meet with the Community & Social Agency Employees Union to discuss the labor union contract for office, clearical, warehouse and print shop employees and maintenance staff. This contract is negotiated every two years.

LAW COMMITTEE: To advise and service the UAHC in legal matters.

LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE: To assist the Union and its constituent members by identifying and defining trends vital to the future of the Union. This committee will also seek to develop young leadership for the UAHC. MAINTENANCE OF UNION MEMBERSHIP: To deal with dues payments from congregations and recommend appropriate policies and actions with regard to individual congregations.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE: To supervise the administration of the physical facilities of the Union; specifically the House of Living Judaism. The committee will also make recommendations concerning executive salaries and is also charged with the supervision of the UAHC staff pension plan.

<u>NEW CONGREGATIONS</u>: To recommend policies and programs for organizing our congregations, to review applications for admission to the UAHC and to evolve standards for admission to the UAHC.

UAHC NOMINATING COMMITTEE: To nominate at-large members to fill vacancies during the period between Biennials and to nominate members to Joint Commissions when such vacancies occur.

UAHC SPECIAL NOMINATING COMMITTEE: To suggest nominees for at-large membership on the Board of Trustees for election at Biennials.

UAHC ORAL HISTORY PROJECT: To assemble and prepare an oral history of the UAHC and the Reform movement.

TASK FORCE ON REFORM DAY SCHOOLS: To consist of members of the Commission on Education and the Commission on Social Action, to study the provisions of the resolution submitted to the 1983 General Assembly by Congregation Rodeph Sholom of New York.

<u>RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE</u>: To discuss and review resolutions submitted by affiliates, congregations and commissions of the UAHC to present to the Biennial Assembly for consideration and acceptance.

<u>SMALL CONGREGATIONS COMMITTEE</u>: To deal with the specialized programmatic needs of small and isolated congregations, particularly those located away from large urban Jewish populations.

TASK FORCE ON SOVIET JEWRY: To assist our congregations in the development of programs to integrate Soviet Jews into the synagogue. This committee will work in close coordination with the Commission on Social Action.

UAHC TELEVISION AND FILM INSTITUTE: To enter into the television world by creating software for network, cable and home use, entirely on Jewish themes, with religious schools and camps as the primary target.

TIME AND PLACE FOR BIENNIALS COMMITTEE: To research favorable locations and facilities to be used for future Biennials and Board meetings, and to make recommendations to the Board.

TOUR AND TRAVEL COMMITTEE: To find suitable tour and travel programs to offer to all UAHC congregational members and the general public as a revenue producing function of the UAHC. YOUTH ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE: To serve as the umbrella organization of the entire youth program and to supervise the total spectrum of the youth programming of the UAHC and to consist of the three committes listed below:

- <u>COMMITTEE ON HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH (NFTY)</u>: To coordinate all activities for high school youth, to encourage the development of local temple youth groups, to direct and coordinate these activities through regional groups and to set standards for regional youth programs.
- <u>COLLEGE COMMITTEE</u>: To provide a visible Reform Jewish presence on college campuses and to institute programs for this presence.
- <u>CAMP-INSTITUTES COMMITTEE</u>: To oversee the maintenance, development and programs of UAHC camp-institutes.

JOINT COMMISSIONS OF UAHC AND CCAR AND/OR HUC-JIR AND UAHC AFFILIATES.

Membership on these commissions are sometimes limited in size due to our arrangements with the other constituent agencies. Nonetheless, we would like to know of your interests should openings develop.

<u>COMMISSION ON JEWISH EDUCATION</u>: To guide education in the Reform Jewish movement for children, youth and adults by formulating the philosophy and setting aims and objectives of that education.

TASK FORCE ON LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT: To implement and evaluate the experimental programs of congregational leadership training which it developed, functioning under the egis of the Commission on Synagogue Administration.

RABBINICAL-CONGREGATIONAL RELATIONS: To study and propose methods for promoting harmonious relations between rabbis and their congregations; to provide services to restore harmonious relations between rabbi and congregations when such relations have ceased to exist; to provide conciliation when rabbi and congregation request it and to offer arbitration services when all other attemps to settle conflicts fail. NOTE: THIS COMMISSION CONSISTS OF ONE RABBINIC AND ONE LAY MEMBER FROM EACH OF THE UACH REGIONS, AND THEREFORE, MEMBERSHIP IS LIMITED.

RABBINICAL PENSION BOARD: To act as Trustees of the Rabbinical Pension Plan.

<u>COMMISSION ON REFORM JEWISH OUTREACH</u>: To provide creative leadership to reach out to bring the message of Judaism to any and all who wish to examine or embrace it; to intensify Jewish educational programs to stimulate positive Jewish identification; to develop a program of welcome and to involve converts to Judaism; to develop a program by which the Reform synagogue can seek out mixed married couples to respond to their needs.

JOINT TASK FORCE ON RELIGIOUS COMMITMENT: To examine what religious commitment implies for UAHC congregations and Reform Jews, to engage in a two-year study, all within the context of the informed choices so precious to Reform Judaism, to generate a suggested programmatic response to the challenge and to present a comprehensive report to the 1985 Biennial for study and discussion and adoption as a central component of the Biennial program.

UAHC/HUC-JIR/CCAR RESEARCH COMMITTEE: TO embark on an extensive research study of the ramifications of interfaith marriage in North America from prominent existing research institutions and, if financially feasible, the study be undertaken as a decision-making guide for the Reform movement. Yes you can and that is retain an opinion which you have expressed and has been expressed by the Union for as long as I can remember -namely that there is room for only one womens organization in Reform Judaism and that is NFTS.

A small meeting was set up in Houston. Attached is a copy of Connie's memo on it. It evoked the long letter from Doris Panoff. Connie is rightly irritated, furious and not willing to spend too much of her time on this tedious business. Nevertheless there is a fundamental principle involved and I cannot afford to let it slip by.

You may or may not be aware of the fact that with NFTB encouragement local Brotherhoods have accepted women into membership. They have used the pretense that with equal rights they cannot be a sexist organization. To this nonsensical interpretation I have spoken with Av several times pointing out that the wives of Brotherhood members should certainly be supportive of their husbands but that they need not be members of Brotherhood. A co-educational group is either the congregation or young marrieds or whatever.

So if you read this far just remember we will appreciate your commitment to the principle of one womens affiliate in Reform Judaism.

How helpful it would be if we could talk, you and I, one to one, face to face. Perhaps we shall. I am willing to meet with you, as is my co-chairperson, Joan Warshaw, any time in New York (it is only a shuttle flight away from Boston) but to hasten things, let me answer a few of your concerns:

Regarding "formal structure", are we interpreting the words the same way? To you, it seems, <u>any</u> structure is a formal structure. To me, "formal" means a separate organization involving election of officers, monthly meetings, Annual Luncheons or other Annual Fund Raisers. Women for JCS is a Committee of the Jewish Chautauqua Society without any of the above.

You say, "any formal structure could become a competitive organization within congregations to the Sisterhood." I think you underestimate the fierce loyalty of your women to both National and local Sisterhood. At the same time, you misinterpret our purpose.

Yes, Connie, "Organizations do change as leadership changes." Our leadership in Women for JCS will change every two years with each change in NFTB administration. Since, however, there is a high degree of quality in NFTB leadership at the Presidential and Chancellor levels, we are not fearful that guidelines being established now will mutate into a power structure at the women's level which could threaten NFTS.

Of course, "there is no guarantee that the original concept of the organization would be maintained by those who follow." We have only our faith that this new committee, begun in hope and happiness, is satisfying

We are Jewish women, religious women, thoughtful women whose interest in what our husbands are doing must not flag if our husbands are to do their finest work.

Just this week, I heard from a dear friend whose daughter was in Holland with her husband on business. As she went about with her camera, she came on the memorial to Anne Frank. There, on the back of the statue, in red paint, was a Swastika.

Given this kind of world and, at the same time, given the Jewish Chautauqua Society which teaches non-Jews about Jews and educates against anti-Semitism, we women are more than willing to help the men of JCS.

It will not be easy to launch our committee, and with apprehension at the highest levels of NFTS, it will be even more difficult. All we can do is ask for your hand in friendship. There is enough anxiety in the world. May we find a common ground--and soon.



To: Critical Issues Liaisons, Board of Directors, District Critical Issues Chairwomen

In this world of ours the bureaucracy and the problems seem to have grown too complicated and overwhelming. We turn away because we don't understand the system, the issue or how we can become involved. We isolate ourselves, concentrating on our families and careers, losing sight of the community, the issues, and the people we live with.

The principle, "Don't seperate yourself from the community," (Ethics of our Fathers, 2:5) communicates to us as Jews our commitment to social action. Our commitment is translated into actions to ensure justice for others and to improve relationships between people.

As the Critical Issue liaison, you are that link between your Sisterhood and the community. You will keep your members informed and prepared to take quick and effective action. To assist you in the work that you will undertake, we have enclosed the "Guidelines to the Task Force on Critical Issues." Those who have been liaisons before are familiar with the Guidelines' content, but for those who are new, let me share with you a brief explanation of the text.

The Guidelines are just exactly what they say they are, a guide. They are a tool that can be of assistance to you in understanding the following:

- 1) Why are we involved in critical issues?
- 2) What critical issues are we involved in?
- 3) What action can we take?

From time to time we will develop programmatic material and aids that can be used as companion pieces when your Sisterhood studies the issue. Sisterhoods can use this background information in deciding what form their action will be.

The main function of the alerts remains to be to keep you informed on the issues and pending legislation. As in the past, the alert will include a suggested action to take.

Below is a list of issues that need attention in the upcoming months.

Issues of concern for:

- a) women... freedom of choice (abortion rights)
 - equal rights amendment
 - economic justice
 - domestic violence
 - rights of women in other countries
 - UN Decade for Women

- sex education
- prayer in the school
- tuition tax credits
- textbook censorship
- child pornography
- child labor laws
- c) the U.S. community...
 - reduction in human services through budget cutbacks...
 - military spending
 - energy
 - capital punishment
 - gun control
 - religious extremism
 - immigration
 - constitutional conventions

d) the world community ...

- world hunger
 - human rights
 - nuclear disarmament
 - religious intolerance
 - Israel

Remember the NFTS resolutions and the past Biennial conventions have dealt with topics which you may be interested in but are not listed above. Your Sisterhoods have received in the past, The Index of Resolutions and the text of resolutions. These should be kept for your permanent files. Check with your District or NFTS if you have any problems.

This has just come to our attention, so we are passing the information along to you. You will be receiving material which is similar to this from time to time. Please respond to the action requested.



S. 2148 AND S. 2372, THE HELMS AND HATFIELD HUMAN LIFE STATUTES

The time of confrontation approaches. Howard Baker (R-TN), Senate Majority Leader, has indicated that debate on a bill to raise the debt ceiling is likely to begin on <u>August 16</u>. PLEASE NOTE THAT IT IS ON THIS PIECE OF LEGISLATION THAT SEN. BAKER HAS PROMISED SENATORS HELMS AND HATFIELD THE OPPORTUNITY TO OFFER THEIR ANTI-ABORTION BILLS AS AMENDMENTS.

While the exact scenario is beyond anyone's ability to predict, a good guess is that Sen. Helms will be given the first crack at amending the debt bill. Pro-choice Sen. Bob Packwood (R-OR), has promised a long and intense debate against the Helms amendment, S. 2148. Once the Helms proposal is defeated, (and we are counting on each of you to assist in achieving that end), then Sen. Hatfield is expected to offer his bill, S. 2372, as an amendment. Since Sen. Hatfield is highly regarded by his colleagues, his attempts to represent S. 2372 as a moderate proposal intended merely to make the current funding restrictions permanent, may sound convincing to many Senators. It is imperative that during the debate, pro-choice Senators be prepared to point to the more significant intent and implications of this proposal - only then will we defeat this amendment too.

While Senators Helms and Hatfield may modify their amendments up to the last moment before a vote, they will be adament about retaining provisions to restrict the use of federal funds for abortion and related services, far beyond current restrictions, and to push the Supreme Court to reverse its 1973 decision and outlaw abortion. Thus, these bills will remain unacceptable to the pro-choice majority.

HATCH CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

In the meantime, Sen. Orrin Hatch (R-UT), continues to receive pressure from the Right-to-Life groups and as a result, continues to put public pressure on Sen. Baker to schedule debate on his constitutional amendment, S.J. Res. 110. The Senator is reported to be privately uncertain whether a vote on his amendment will help or hurt his reelection campaign. (There is an excellent chance that this amendment will at least reach the Senate floor, if not be voted upon, but the timing remains unknown.)

In fact, we have learned that several other conservative Senators are concerned that their constituents will construe debate on the abortion issue to be a terrible waste of time since the economy continues to crumble and other important issues go unresolved.

THE PROPOSALS

- The Hatch Human Life Federalism Amendment, S.J. Res. 110, stating that the right to abortion is not secured by the Constitution, and conferring upon both Congress and the states concurrent jurisdiction to limit or ban abortion;
- 2) A so-called "states' rights" amendment, not yet introduced, but expected as an amendment to S.J. Res. 110 when it reaches the Senate floor, that would grant states the authority to make abortion a crime, but would eliminate special "concurrent jurisdiction" for Congress to do so as well;
- 3) The Helms' Human Life Bill (originally introduced as S. 158, later reintroduced as S. 1741 and then S. 2148), defining "person" in the 14th Amendment to include the fetus from the moment of conception. S. 2148, called "Super Helms", also prohibits all direct and indirect use of federal funds for anything related to abortion, including counselling, research and data collection, and training in abortion techniques.

Prepared for and Distributed by the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods 4) A Hatfield Bill (S. 2372), similar to S. 2148 but with some changes. S. 2372 permanently restricts the direct use of federal funds for abortion and related services. While it does not overtly define "person", it nonetheless finds that "unborn children who are subjected to abortion are living members of the human species." On the basis of the findings, S. 2372 encourages states to pass laws prohibiting abortion - in direct contradiction to the 1973 <u>Roe</u> v. Wade decision by the Supreme Court.

WE CANNOT AFFORD TO LET ANY OF THESE PROPOSALS PASS THE SENATE. PLEASE KEEP THE PRESSURE ON BOTH OF YOUR SENATORS TO VOTE AGAINST THESE PROPOSALS. ENCOURAGE YOUR PRO-CHOICE SENATORS TO PARTICIPATE IN THE SENATE FLOOR DEBATE.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Communication with your Senators is vital. Please write (or call) to your Senators now! (In Washington, D.C. call, (202) 224-3121). Write to: The Honorable ______, U.S. Senate, Washington, D.C. 20510. The message must convey support for the 1973 Supreme Court decision, and opposition to any <u>measure</u> which seeks to overturn it or have it revised. No "compromise" or "moderate" proposal is acceptable, since even these are intended to lead to a reversal of Roe.

2) Activate phone trees, your own circle of friends, and any other network you may have access to. Literally thousands of letters are needed, and every one counts!

3) Share this alert with as many other people as possible. Post it on the social action bulletin board of your church or synagogue, or see if it can be mailed out with your church/synagogue newsletter. Reprint any portion of this alert, or call us and we will be happy to supply bulk quantities.

ARGUMENTS: 1. The present legal situation, governed by the Supreme Court decision in <u>Roe v. Wade</u>, permits every woman faced with a problem pregnancy to make a decision about whether to have an abortion on the basis of her own conscience and personal religious beliefs. This is the best possible system in our pluralistic society, which guarantees to each individual the free exercise of religion and prohibits governmental support for any one theological doctrine.

2. Contrary to the assertions of some, abortion is not a proper subject for debate and "compromise" by either the Congress or state legislative bodies. Because it involves both the First Amendment right of religious freedom and the right to privacy inherent in the Ninth and Fourteenth Amendments, abortion falls into the realm of individual liberties protected by the Constitution. In our democracy, such individual rights may not be removed by popular whim or political expediency.

3. Opinion polls have consistently shown that between 75 and 90 percent of Americans believe that abortion should be a private matter between a woman and her doctor and free from governmental interference. Given such a high degree of popular opposition to government involvement in this area, it is not only unnecessary but irresponsible to invite the Court to revoke constitutional protection of choice and once more sanction such governmental intrusion.

4. The pre-1973 situation, in which abortion was legalized in some states while severely restricted in others, allowed wealthy women to exercise freedom of conscience and choice, while those with limited incomes were coerced into carrying problem pregnancies to term or submitted to dangerous, illegal procedures. We cannot support a return to this discriminatory policy.

FACT: According to the U.S. Census Bureau, a higher proportion of women vote than men. In 1980 more women under the age of 45 voted than men in the same age group.

FACT: According to the same report, young women are more likely to vote than young men.

These are only a few facts that appeared in a recent New York Times article. Women's voting patterns are requiring candidates to revise their campaign strategies. Women are reviewing candidates' records, campaign promises and statements. It is becoming clear that women's vote counts and women are being courted for their vote. Women have become a political constituency to reckon with.

Women's groups are establishing priorities by re-evaluating their programs and strategies. Sisterhoods should be doing the same. Critical Issues programs can be planned to meet the new needs. To aid you this alert provides the most recent information on the equal rights movement and regulations mandating parental involvement in minor's rights to privacy to obtain prescribed contraceptives. Included are some concerns for Sisterhood programs. Those concerns include inclusive language, world hunger and "Issues of Conscience."

UPDATE ON EQUAL RIGHTS ACTIVITIES:

On July 1, 1982 women all over the U.S. took part in a kick-off to launch a vigorous new effort for achieving equality on a state-to-state basis through grass-roots activism. NFTS has been in the forefront concerning equal rights for women. NFTS is one of forty religious organizations that are members of R-NEW (formerly the Religious Committee for the ERA).

NFTS President Constance Kreshtool, said in a R-NEW press release that "RENEW (sic) affirms our religious commitment to equality of women and men, not only in the eyes of God, but within our legal and political systems. To believe otherwise, denies our Jewish mandate to accord dignity to each person."

R-NEW's focus for the next couple of months will be to mobilize religious women and men for the Fall elections. A meeting could be planned on the upcoming elections and the candidates. We have included a copy in this mailing of <u>Relay</u>, a resource prepared by R-NEW, which can be used as a guideline.

If you are not planning a full meeting on this issue, you may want to take some time to review your members' involvement with the equal rights movement.

Some questions to ask:

- What issues raised by the amendment were the most important to you and your members?
- 2) How do you see your Sisterhood members, collectively or individually, being involved in the equal rights movement in the future?

- 2) NFTS PROGRAMMATIC SUGGESTIONS AND RESOURCES
 - A. INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE FOR PRAYER: by Ronnie Horn and Judith Hertz

QUESTION: Can prayer utilize language that maintains a sense of God's presence, care, protection, and rule without using specific masculine or feminine images?

- QUESTION: Do masculine pronouns and metaphors reinforce a mental picture of God as male?
- QUESTION: Are our thoughts about God unconsciously shaped by the words that we use when we pray?

These are a few of the thought provoking questions this program addresses. This program is designed to help women clarify their feelings about exclusive (sexist) and inclusive (non-sexist) liturgical language. During this program women are able to explore their feelings about prayer through brain-storming, consciousnessraising and by developing a model worship service. The program's goal is to promote deeper awareness of worship and language.

- B. WORLD HUNGER: AT HOME AND ABROAD: by Marjorie Yudkin
 - FACT: Two out of three poor adults are women.
 - FACT: Families with female heads have a poverty rate six times that of maleheaded families.
 - FACT: One billion people, nearly five times the population of the U.S., are hungry individuals.

This manual is designed to be used as a study guide to explore the problem of world hunger within the context of Jewish traditions and Jewish imperatives. It could be used to create Sisterhood program events. The focus of the programs are study or action-oriented. Of particular interest are programs one and two. They explore personal moral conduct and Jewish values by studying <u>Pirke Avot: Sayings</u> of the Sages excerpts and Biblical passages. Any woman can coordinate the program using the study guides.

C. ISSUES OF CONSCIENCE: A SISTERHOOD SHABBAT SERVICE: by the Temple Israel Sisterhood, Stockton, California.

PEACE

We must begin with our family to show our love and to teach tolerance and kindness. We must demonstrate in our community willingness to accept and to lend a helping hand. We must be a voice in our country to show our concern for the human rights and personal dignity of people in all countries.

This excerpt is from a beautiful and creative Sabbath service written by Sisterhood of Temple Israel, Stockton, California. The service illuminates our interest and concern for domestic issues, global problems and world Jewry. There is a place within the service for a sermon written by one of your Sisterhood members. Your Sisterhood, congregation, or community concerns can be the topics for the sermon.

This is a model from which you can build. It can be used for Sisterhood Sabbath, for a social action day, or in conjunction with your Sisterhood's participation in the Women's Plea for Soviet Jewry.

3) UPDATE ON THE TITLE X-PUBLIC HEALTH ACT-PARENTAL NOTIFICATION FOR FAMILY PLANNING:

BACKGROUND:

On February 22, 1978, the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) proposed regulations requiring that the parents of adolescents be notified in virtually all instances when prescription birth control methods (the diaphragm, oral contracep tives, and the IUD) are provided under the Title X of the Public Health Act. These changes would reverse the original intent of Title X. The Administration's rationale is that this will discourage sexual activity.

The Title X family planning legislation was enacted in 1970. It is the backbone of the nation's effort to help unintended adolescent pregnancies. The purpose of the legislation was (and remains) to make "comprehensive voluntary planning services available to all persons requiring such services."

Over the 12 years of the program's existence, DHHS has required the services to be provided without discrimination with regard to age or sex and to be purely confidential and voluntary. The original text does not lend a detailed explanation on how parents should be involved. Since 1970, the issue has been discussed twice, in 1975 and 1980, pending the legislation's expiration. Each time the Congress amended the text to encourage and include parental involvement whenever feasible.

The following facts released by the Alan Guttmacher Institute reveal the impact of family planning clinics have had on teenage sexuality.

- FACT: Nearly 1.5 million sexually active teenagers attended family planning clinics in 1979. This number only represents one third of all sexually active teenagers who are in need of family planning services.
- FACT: In one year alone (1979), more than 400,000 unintended teenage pregnancies were averted through the national family planning program.
- FACT: In the last decade, contraceptive use by sexually active teenagers increased 35 percent. Before clinic enrollment, eight out of ten teenagers used one of the least effective contraceptive methods or no method at all. After enrollment 71% used one of the most effective methods.

MAJOR PROPOSED REGULATION CHANGES:

. Family planning projects would have to notify both parents or the legal guardian of all minors under the age of 18 after providing prescription drugs or devices to them for the first time. The notification would have to take place within 10 days of the clinic visit and the teenager would have to be informed of the notice requirement before services were provided to her. In addition, the clinic would have to verify (by means unspecified in the regulations) that the notice had been received by both parents or the guardian. If receipt of the notice could not be verified, no more prescription contraceptives could be provided.

- . The notification requirement would apply to all unemancipated minors, even in the 30 states and the District of Columbia that specifically affirm the rights of minors to obtain family planning services on their own consent. In these cases, the federal regulations would overrule the state laws. NOTE: On the other hand, state laws that are more restrictive than the federal regulations would have to be followed instead of the federal laws.
- . The notification requirement could only be waived when the project director found (it is not specified how) "evidence of a history of child abuse, sexual abuse, or incest, or where there are other substantial grounds to determine that notification would result in physical harm to the minor by a parent or guardian." However, the exception would not apply to cases where "notification could result in no more disciplinary actions of an unsubstantial action" (again not defined).
- . Projects would have to keep records for every notification and verification, on the number of waivers, and the 'factual basis' for each waiver.
- . The current regulatory requirement that teenagers who are concerned about confidentiality must be eligible for services based on their own income, rather than of their parents', would be revoked.
- . Notification would not be required for drugs and treatment for venereal diseases.

WHAT WOULD BE THE EFFECT OF MANDATORY PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT?

- Teens would be deterred from using effective contraceptives. A 1979/80 survey concludes that about one in four young people currently attending a clinic would stop coming.
- There would be an increase in teenage pregnancies, high-risk births and abortions.
- Adolescent sexual activity would not be curbed. Most teenagers wait almost a year after becoming sexually active to seek contraceptives.
- 4) The health of young people would not be protected.
- Many teenagers would resort to lying and forging their parents' signatures to circumvent parental involvement.
- 6) The regulation in many instances would seriously disrupt family life, particularly in cases where the adolescent does not have a good relationship with her parents or where the relationship between the parents is tenuous.

WHAT IS OUR CONNECTION AND POSITION TO THIS ISSUE?

Our children assure us of the perpetuation of the Jewish people.

The Jewish family is the model ...

- .. where our values and religious principles are formulated;
- ..where our responsibilities for ourselves, our family, and our community are defined and translated into actions;

... where our self-identity and self-confidence are reinforced;

.. where joyous occasions are shared and support is given in times of sadness and trouble. We nurture open communications. We encourage autonomous decision-making which can be translated into thoughtful, responsible action. We provide tools and skills which will enable our children to survive in this world. The institution of family is at the core of Jewish life.

For Reform Jewish women, the issue of parental notification creates complexity and confusion. The roles we have assumed, mother, wife, and advocate are now in opposition. As advocates, we are involved in issues that protect and sustain the rights of other women to have the freedom of choice over decisions that would affect their lives and their bodies. As mothers, we want to be aware and participate in the decision-making processes that affect the lives of our children.

In reality, however, every family cannot provide the necessary support system. Every family is not warm, sensitive and comforting. In many cases there is a lack of communication between husband and wife, parents and children, and siblings. When the time comes when a young woman wishes to become sexually active, who does she turn to. She may wish to obtain prescribed birth control. She may not feel comfortable or feels she cannot discuss it with her parents. In the past her alternative has been to go to a clinic where birth control is prescribed.

If the regulation, as it exists now, were to pass, a viable safe alternative would be eliminated. A young woman would not be able to take any precautions or have to leave it up to the boy. The result could be an unwanted pregnancy.

This would prove to be another example where women are subject to an outside agent, the federal government, to determine what she can do with and to her body.

SUGGESTED ACTION:

We are suggesting that your Sisterhood sit down and discuss this entire issue in the following ways:

- a. Bring in a guest speaker from Planned Parenthood and/or RCAR if they are in your area. They could discuss with your members the ramifications of the legislation. They could explain the services they provide to teenagers and how many teenagers they see. The could indicate what might be the projected effects of this legislation.
- b. Sponsor a program where Sisterhood members would have the opportunity to express, clarify, and share their feelings on this issue. How do they feel about teenage sexuality? How do they perceive their own children as sexual human beings?
- c. Sisterhood could sponsor a mother-daughter program. This program would provide an opportunity to open or reinforce existing communication between the two.

NFTS is a founding and continuing member of the Religious Committee for Abortion Rights (RCAR). RCAR advocates for women's rights to freedom of choice in accordance with her conscience and her religious beliefs. RCAR has state affiliates and coordinators across the country. Attached is an updated list. Please get in touch with your state coordinators for resource material, ideas and possible speakers and to offer your services.

Decisions demand a great deal--of energy, of thoughtful reflection on options, analysis of values, and deliberative strategizing. Faced with the reality which June 30, 1982, hoisted upon us, the Religious Committee for the ERA engaged in a prayerful and creative process designed to facilitate informed decision-making on our future and decide is what we did. In biblical language, we decided to "choose life so that we and our descendants might live."

The Religious Network for Equality for Women was a gentle although deliberate and creative evolution of RCERA. Recognizing that the deep and pervasive religious values of justice and liberation for all persons know no barriers of time, acknowledge no deadlines, respect no artificial boundaries, the forty member groups of RCERA assembled in Stony Point, New York to choose their preferred future.

The same religious values which energized and gave direction to our work for the Equal Rights Amendment will guide and inform the activities of RNEW in a broader but no less challenging arena--working for the elimination of economic and legal inequities which face women in every arena local, state, and national.

We recognize our responsibility as people of faith to participate in the political process in a serious and responsible way. We recognize our responsibility as people of faith to educate, to study issues, to explore options, to make informed decisions and to help others to do the same.

As the religious community, we have something specific to say: we speak out of a faith perspective. Therefore, when we produce a resource or have an event, it's not just another event or resource.

We recognize our deeply held values re-

ISSUES OF SPECIAL CONCERN TO WOMEN

RNEW is an interreligious network for equality for women. Here identified are the broad issues facing our elected officials that are of special concern to women. These issues will be specified in bills which will be submitted to our local, state, and national legislators. Groups <u>must</u> find out the specific piece of legislation that is drafted regarding these issues. Bills require careful study and the proposed amendments to the bills are often what make or kill a bill. (More on this in WOMEN VOTE - A Citizen Action Kit.)

Keep in mind that all these programs are being cut from the Federal Budget while the military budget is increasing at an unprecedented rate--a rate never experienced before in the history of this nation. These human services programs will be further limited in the future because of the cost of interest payments that the U.S. government must pay on loans to cover its deficit further aggravated by Reagan's refusal to cut the military budget. In the next few years state and local governments will be deciding if and how they will pick up cuts in these human services programs.

DEMOCRACY: A Political Process on the People

Our first and foremost concern as we attempt to influence society at large and our government in particular in favor of equality for women is to increase participation in the electoral process. A sense of powerlessness is immobilizing many of us. The apathy reflected in the last presidential election when only 53% of the electorate voted has set us in a suicidal course. We have abdicated our power to influence decision-making.

We all know that the present economicpolitical arrangement primarily benefits corporations, financial institutions, and wealthy individuals. Our apathy, our frustration, our "Why bother?" attitude simply makes their work very easy. Popular democracy requires widespread involvement from the bottom up. Grassroots participation is not optional in our democratic process. Without it we simply give in to those with vested interest in the present legal unjust/violent situation.

There are, contrary to the opinion of those who have thrown the towel in, concrete ways which we can take to bring about a true popular democratic system of government in this country. The following three avenues can be taken to bring about change in our political system.

- 1st. The government needs popular support. Often we fail to understand that silence is understood as consent. When we fail to express our dissent we passively tolerate what we really do not support. We need to network with others and say "no." There are many different non-violent ways of letting government know that we do not support their measures.
- 2nd. Corporations, financial institutions and wealthy individuals work adamantly to establish their own candidates in positions of power. We can exercise power also: we can support, work and contribute to viable incumbents or we can urge justice persons to run for political office.
- 3rd. Most states and cities have laws that allow for initiative and referendum. We can use such means to propose and pass the legislation necessary to undo the present oppressive structure.

It is our civil and moral obligation to participate actively in the political process. We must do all we can to reclaim substantial control over our lives and destinies. We must be concerned; we must be active. Only then will we be able to claim that we are politically responsible. (These ideas were taken from the editorial for Groundwork, Summer 1982.)



ERA Reintroduced in Congress

Proponents of the Equal Rights Amendment returned to halls of Congress on July 14, 1982, introducing a new ERA bill for passage through the House and Senate. Rep. Peter Rodino (D-NJ), chairman of the Judiciary Committee, is the chief House sponsor. Paul Tsongas (D-MA) and Bob Packwood (R-OR) are the chief sponsors in the Senate.

Most ERA supporters and organizations have turned their primary energy this fall to the November elections. The ERA appears to fall

MEMORANDUM

May 5, 1982

RE: UNION OF AMERICAN HEBREW CONGREGATIONS NFTB

On Tuesday, May 4th, I met in Chicago with David Krem, Bob Katz and Herb Panoff. The Meeting went very well.

I started the Meeting by reviewing with them the comments which Josh Dwork had made on the projected savings which the NFTB had reported they would be able to achieve in the event that they left 838 Fifth Avenue. I explained to them the potential termination pay and unemployment compensation liability and after reviewing in some detail Josh Dwork's other comments, Bob Katz interrupted to state that he was very much in accord with the figures which we were presenting and that as a matter of fact, his own study indicated that it would cost them \$50,000 to move. He accepted without much question the proposition that the Union would be about \$20,000 cash richer in the event that NFTB moved out of the building.

As a matter of fact, Bob Katz interrupted to make the point that he personally, and apparently Herb Panoff and David Krem as well, had been personally embarrassed with what had taken place at the Meeting in New York. They apparently felt that some of the previous reports were ridiculous and were personally unhappy with some of the remarks which had been made at that Meeting by representatives for NFTB.

It became very clear that Bob Katz, who is now chairing a Committee which will report to the NFTB at its Board Meeting in Chicago, will not recommend a move and will, in fact, endorse the figures which Josh Dwork has developed. He very much disassociated himself from Mort Kemper and stated very clearly that in his perception, (and he appeared to be talking for David Krem as well) the NFTB had for 7 years been influenced strongly by anti-Union people. They then asked me what basis we were willing to work out for the NFTB to remain at 838. I told them that we would expect (a) that the Union be reimbursed for all of the out of pocket costs advanced by the Union to carry their payroll and fringe benefits, (b) that the Union be reimbursed for all direct printing and other costs incurred on behalf of the NFTB to the extent that they used Union services, (c) that they pay \$9.00 per square foot rental for the 1,421 square feet of space occupied by them, (d) that they give up the \$30,000 annual support from the Union.


Bob Katz indicated that he would probably recommend this but that they wanted the right to reduce their space if the NFTB paid the cost of remodeling. This was last on the table since I indicated to them that I did not know whether the space (about 400 square feet), which they might consider giving up, and which is in the northeast corner of the building, would be usable by the Union. He responded that he thought that ARZA wanted it and that NFTB could, at its own expense, remodel its existing space into a much more efficient operation.

We then discussed my appearance at the NFTB Meeting in Chicago. They asked me to make a presentation to their Board and emphasize the willingness of the Union to give up and wipe out its \$170,000 receivable as an accommodation to NFTB in order to work out an arrangement to keep them in the present building. They need this support for political purposes. They also wanted me to emphasize the fact that the monies paid by NFTB to the Union were not being used by the Union to "support other organizations". Finally, they asked me to make a pitch to their Board to promote not only the NFTB and JCS but also the Union as well and try to undo some of the harm that has been done over the past 7 years.

Bob Katz plans to meet with Josh Dwork and go over additional figures with him in order to support Bob's own report to his Board. I am to alert Josh to expect a call.

I will also be hearing from either Av Bondarin or David Krem between now and the NFTB Meeting in Chicago as to how they want me to handle the matter with them at that time.



Is this an indication of the values NFTY is trying to transmit to our youth? If so, perhaps I should take my 15 year-old son out of the Youth Group.

I hope you will pay some attention to my concerns. I assure you that my feelings are not those of a minority.

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

We are especially pleased that it represents an increase of contributions over last year by several thousands of dollars. The contribution also represents a new factor, namely a designated sum of \$10,000.00 for the Youth Department's newly-developed campus outreach program.

I also want to remind each of you that, as I wrote to you several months ago, the NFTS Executive Committee has increased the base of our budgeted commitments to the UAHC from \$45,000.00 to \$50,000.00 per year. Our support for the Youth Department is in two parts the budgeted commitment and the fair share of the additional contributions received over the budgeted commitment. We hope that next year we are not only able to sustain the overall level of support but to increase it. That is a promise which Sisterhood can keep with the continued devotion of our affiliates and members, in spite of the increasingly dismal economic situation and the resultant pressure upon local Sisterhoods by their own congregations. But we can guarantee the \$50,000.00, which means that the present UAHC budget can be corrected to show a level of expectation higher than anticipated when that budget was adopted last June.

The NFTS Executive Committee met in Washington, D.C., following the Consultation on Conscience and the UAHC Board of Trustees meeting. I am writing to share with you some actions taken by the NFTS Executive Committee which will be of immediate importance to you:

1) Effective with the next NFTS fiscal year, which will start November 1, 1981, we have increased the budgeted allocation to the UAHC for youth work to \$50,000 per year. For the past several years, as you know, the budgeted allocation was \$45,000 plus an additional annual allocation which is made from YES Fund contributions received from local Sisterhoods in excess of the budgeted allocation.

We have had several years of experience with increases in contributions to the YES Fund and feel that it is only fair to be able to assure the UAHC of an increased base of contribution. We are certain you will share our pride and pleasure that the UAHC budget may now reflect this increased budgeted allocation.

2) The NFTS Executive Committee allocated contributions received through the YES Fund in excess of the presently budgeted \$45,000 and this additional allocation, the check for which it will be my pleasure to present to you at the fall meetings, is in the amount of \$17,077.05. Of this sum, \$10,000 is earmarked for the UAHC College Campus Outreach Program, and \$7,077.05 to be available for the general operations of NFTY.

Therefore, for the NFTS fiscal year 1980-81, NFTS will have contributed to the UAHC for youth work a total of \$62,077.05. This represents an increase of several thousand dollars over our previous allocations. We hope that each year we will be able to show significant increases for this important project.

If you are not going to Israel, stop right here, but just let me know.

If you are going to Israel, may we ask a favor of you, as well as providing you with a lovely opportunity. Three of the Israeli rabbinic students for whom NFTS provides scholarship assistance on behalf of the World Union will be ordained. We do not know on what day, and whether the Conference will be invited. But I would presume that you would be in attendance under any circumstances.

It is the NFTS custom to give a gift to the overseas rabbinic students when they are ordained. We give them silver tallit clasps with the President making a presentation. Wherever possible it has been done publicly at a World Union or some such meeting. When you were last in Jerusalem it was done at a World Union session because Fred was reluctant to have this "intrude" on the ordination ceremony.. We understand this. But should he change his mind, Lillian would be most honored if you would make the presentation on our behalf.

But if Fred does not want it, we are asking Joe Glaser if there is some appropriate occasion during the Conference when the presentation could be done -- perhaps -- if -- these rabbis are welcomed into the CCAR membership or something. 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
