# Warsaw Ghetto's mourners urge New York Holocaust memorial

New York political figures Governor Senator Patrick Moynihan Hugh Carey. and New York City's Mayor Edward Koch called for the creation in New York City of a Holocaust Memorial, during last Sunday's 36th Annual Warsaw Ghetto Memorial Uprising commemoration at Manhattan's Temple Emanu-El.

Following an invocation by Emanu-El's Rabbi Ronald Sobel, Governor Carey, who had taken part in the liberation of the Nordhausen concentration camp, proposed the memorial, stating: "I vow before you today I will not accept degradation . . . I will fight for the dignity of all God's children The State will join in the Memorial."

Mayor Koch echoed his sentiments, noting: " A Holocaust Memorial must rise here ... It belongs here, and will be built here." And Senator Moynihan delivered a scathing denunciation of the United Nations for the "enormity of its complicity" in promoting world wide terrorism.

Commemoration Chairman Benjamin Meed, a Ghetto survivor and president of the Warsaw Ghetto ResistanceOrganization (WAGRO) which sponsored the commemoration under the auspices of the President's-Commission on the Holocaust, also addressed the over 15,000 dignitaries, survivors' families and friends of Holocaust victims gathered both in the Temple's sanctuary and outside, on Fifth Avenue and adjacent side streets.

Speaking in both Yiddish and English, Meed stressed the importance both of perpetuating memories of the dead, and documenting Nazi evil "while there are stillsurvivors alive, who can testify."

#### Attacks nazis' acquitted

He also expressed outrage at the recent German court decision to acquit four nazi murderers in the Majdanek concentration camp, despite incriminating testimony of over 250 eyewitnesses.

Noted also, was the plight of Jews of the Soviet Union, Iran and the Arab countries. The latter group was represented at the commemoration by the Iraqi-born Dr. Heskel M. Haddad, newly elected president of the World Organization for Jews From Arab Countries (WOJAC), who attended to pay tribute to both Jews of North Africa who died in Europe's gas chambers. and lews of Arab countries who died in local programs instigated by pro-Nazi regimes.


Several Holocaust eye-witnesses made brief remarks, including Abe Foxman, now associate national director of the Anti-Defamation League, and United Nations Ambassador Yehuda Blum, who had celebrated his Bar Mitzvah in Bergen Belsen.

Then, as children from Manhattan's Ramaz School and several Solomon Schechter schools on Long Island came to-wards the bima bearing Yahrzeit candles, Russian-born Metropolitan Opera tenor Misha Raitzin, whose elder brother had perished in the Holocaust, chanted "El Mole Rachamim" to the accompaniment of muffled sobs from the audience. And Raitzin brushed tears from his own eyes as he concluded the lament.

#### Candle lighting ceremony

There were also readings by Chaim Grade of his Yiddish poetry of the Holocaust, and by Jack Eisner of the last message ever sent from the bunker command post of Ghetto resistance leader Mordecai Anielewicz, who, knowing that the Ghetto was doomed, never-the-less expressed joy that "something beyond our wildest dreams," had occured. A fighter to the last. Anielewicz noted that he was sending a patrol out for the acquisition of more arms.

After a candle lighting ceremony in which survivors, accompanied by members of "the next generation," commemorated

partisans and victims of concentration camps and Babi Yar, Several other participants, including President Carter's representative, Edward Sanders, Rabbi Baruch Silverstein and Theodore Mann, made brief remarks. Mann, who is chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major Jewish Organizations mentioned Israel, noting: "without Israel, we are perpetual victims of everything evil."

Coming forward again. Meed, who had earlier cautioned against demonstrations, now called on survivors of Majdanek concentration camp to rise, as he read a WAGRO sponsored declaration demanding that the statute on limitations for Nazi war crimes be abolished so that "history shall not repeat itself." At the conclusion of the reading, he asked the survivors to express their outrage at the proposed statute of limitations, and they responded: "We do protest!"

The commemoration concluded with the singing, in Yiddish by Temple Emanu-El's Cantor, Howard Nevison of Hirsch Glick's Partisan Hymn. This work, which refers to Iraq, "the land of the dates," is also sung, in Hebrew, by Jews of Arab lands.

#### Begin's appearance stirs Warsaw Ghetto rally to enthusiasm

The presence of Israel's Prime Minister Menahem Begin at last Sunday's 35th annual commemoration of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising aroused a demonstration of solidarity with, and affection for the Prime Minister by many of the 2,000 Holocaust survivors, community members and Government officials including Mayor Koch and Governor Carey gathered in the sanctuary of Manhattan's Temple Emanu El.

As Begin, accompanied by Moshe Davan, Ambassadors Dinitz and Herzog and Consul General Uri Ben-Ari. entered the sanctuary mid-way in the proceedings, people began to strain forward in their pews, as if attempting to touch him. Realizing this was impossible, many began to applaud, and had to be cautioned against further demonstrations.

In opening remarks, in Yiddish and English, Warsaw Ghetto survivor and Commemoration chairman Benjamin Meed had said that the question put by "so-called Holocaust specialists" as to why the Jews waited so long to rise up is "the highest form of disrespect. As if grenades were more important than schools." He noted that "all Jews had been united in a struggle for dignity and humanity."

In reference to NBC's "miniseries." "Holocaust," Meed said, "We are grateful for this achievement, but we watched with anger. It was only a facsimile which could not come close. . .... He continued. 'what was not conveyed was the life in the Ghetto. We need to remember how our people were in life and we must protect that memory from vulgarization."

#### Day school students march

In a candle-lighting ceremony that brought tears to the eyes of many, students from several Jewish day schools marched solemnly to the Bimah as Metropolitan Opera tenor Misha Raitzen, who also performed Ghetto songs, chanted. In another candle lighting ceremony, six Holocaust survivors, accompanied by six youngsters, representatives of "the second generation," paid tribute to the victims of Babi Yar, the Warsaw and Lodz Ghettos, the Auschwitz and Bergen-Belson concentration camps, and the partisans.

Mayor Edward Koch, who praised the Warsaw Ghetto resisters who

. for three incredible weeks battled professional murderers to a standstill," added that although there has been a resurgence of Nazism. "these lies will never take root. Nazis are marching again and seeking protection by law . . . our laws will protect us." The Mayor also called for 'free, strong, defensible borders,' for Israel.

Governor Carey gave testimony of what he saw as his army unit arrived at the Nordhausen concentration camp in the closing weeks of the war. "I kept thinking of the children," he said, and I made a lifelong vow to fight against any kind of discrimination or violence." The Governor suggested 'how appropriate it would be," for New York to have a Holocaust museum, similar to Yad Vashem, in

Also giving testimony, his voice cracking with emotion, was Col. Walter Fellenz, U.S. Army, retired, whose unit had liberated Dachau. "I feel very humble in your presence," said the Texan, who recalled that it was exactly 12,045 days ago that his battalion, "stumbled in the back door and saw Lucifer at work and looked the SOB in the face and saw what man could be." Recalling the horror of discovering 240,000 bodies the Nazis hadn't had time to burn in the "still hot crematoria" before they fled, Fellenz told how he and his buddies, spotting 17 watchtower guards who 'hadn't gotten the word," ". . . lost control of our emotions and stormed the towers and killed every one." Concluding, he said, "I'm still affected by it . . . and this happened for live forever and ever in dignity."

#### Lauds Ghetto resisters

Actor Theodore Bikel, referring to Fellenz' remarks, added, "To all Jew haters and Jew baiters who try to minimize what happened . . . they have heard from one who saw."

Distinguished author, professor and Holocaust survivor Elie Wiesel asked. "How many kingdoms of malediction can the human mind absorb? Speaking of the tailors, the teachers, mothers with small children, the Hassidim and poets, he asked, "How does one remember without sinking into an abyss? . . . As a teacher, how can I explain the silence of the heavens? Let HIM remember, for we have no strength left, for our message has been distorted and cheapened. survivors feel more misunderstood than ever."

After the candle lighting, Begin spoke in praise of the Ghetto resisters and cautioned against asking why there was not more resistance. "Never ask that question. We were not there . . we can't comprehend that situation . . . the terror, humiliation, demoralization." He added, "there was a resistance. In those doomed Ghettos people tried to live a Jewish, even a cultured life, to the last moment." Begin cited the partisans and concentration camp resisters, adding, "They didn't fight for life, or liberty. . . They knew their fate. They did it for the dignity of the Jewish people."

He cautioned, ". . . When we still have enemies, bent on our destruction . . be ready to defend outselves always, to strive for peace and make sure the Jewish State and its people

# Nazi rally eyewitness 'saw' Auschwitz again; says outlawing needed

As a boy of 11 in pre-Nazi Warsaw, Henry Zinns trembled in terror as he listened to the threats of Polish anti-Semites. Only a few years later he fought in the Warsaw Ghetto uprising and then lived through some of the worst the Nazis could deliver at Auschwitz. He didn't tremble again for 30 years — until on Sunday, July 9, he found himself in a Nazi-cheering crowd in Marquette Park, Chicago.

"I was there on business so I thought I'd take a look at this Nazi, Frank Collin. As I came toward the place where he was speaking I couldn't hear him. I could only hear applause and cheers. He had thousands of supporters there! They far outnumbered the demonstrators against him. I felt I was in another world — the unreal world of that TV show, 'Twilight Zone.' I couldn't believe such a thing was possible again. I started to shake like a leaf and I didn't say a word. I was too scared."

Zinns said he had witnessed several skirmishes in which a few demonstrators hurled epithets, and Collin's supporters yelled back, "Kill them! Get them!" But he said that the police, particularly the plainclothesmen moving through the crowd, were extremely alert and were able to prevent serious outbreaks. If the city had not had more than 1,000 policemen on the job, Zinns said, there is no doubt that there would have been "a blood bath."

#### Supporters mostly youthful

Chicago is reported to have spent \$175,000 on police protection the day of the neo-Nazi rally. Police Superintendent James O'Grady said he felt a good job had been done: "We made sure that a man who had a permit to make a speech in a park was able to do so." The police made 72 arrests for disorderly conduct and battery and six policemen had minor injuries.

Zinns said that most of Collin's supporters were young men in their 20's and many wore "White Power" T-shirts.

The police kept a coalition of more than 1,500 Blacks, Jews, civil-rights and church leaders

from marching into the park, but some groups broke away from the main body of marchers to, approach the Nazi supporters. As the marchers were led away Collin's supporters shouted, "Gas them!"

Zinns reported that Blacks, living on one side of the park "didn't come near the place — they were too scared." He said from what he could hear around him people were yelling more against Blacks than against Jews. A Chicago

resident told *The Jewish Week* that the whites in areas around the park have been extremely hostile to what they regard as Black encroachments in their neighborhoods. Most of the insults against Jews referred to them as "nigger lovers"

Zinns is on the executive committee of the Warsaw Ghetto Resistance Organization and came to *The Jewish Week* to report on his experience with the president of the organization, Benjamin Meed. Both said they felt it was time for a public outcry, which would lead to "an amendment to the Constitution to prevent people who want to destroy the American Constitution from accomplishing what they want — we should believe what they say."

#### Says Collin is clever

Meed said he believed that Collin was extremely clever and had negotiated things in a way that prevented protestors from mobilizing in full force.

"First he said he'd march, then he said he wouldn't march. It was hard to figure out what to do," he said. "This Collin isn't a small man."

The day after the demonstration Collin appeared on the Phil Donahue morning television show, along with David Duke, grand wizard of the Ku Klux Klan. He said he was well satisfied with the success of his campaign to be heard in public. "It cost the Jews of Skokie a lot of money."

Collin denied emphatically that his father was Jewish. In fact, police authorities have established that Collin changed his name from Cohen and that his father was an immigrant from Po-

land and had been a prisoner at Dachau. Collin also denied that Jesus was a Jew and compared Jesus' "beating the Jews out of the Temple" with his own actions.

"When I tried to do that in Skokie they tried to put me away." The studio audience howled with laughter when he said he didn't believe Jesus was a Jew. He offered, as a bewildering explanation of this notion, that "Jesus was born in Galilee." He didn't offer amplification of this deviation from New Testament narratives, placing Jesus' birth in Bethlehem, which is in Judea.

Collin said he didn't advocate genocide. He wanted to "repatriate Jews in Israel," and suggested that Rabbi Meier Kahane "would be on our side in that." He spoke as if Jews did not belong to the white race, saying he was for an all-white America.

#### Would isolate races

When Donahue suggested that he had done very well in his publicity, getting himself on the front pages of papers all over the world, he replied that "the hysterical reaction of my opponents is what created the media fuss." He said that the American media is controlled by Jews, adding that Jewish "internationalist communists" made him concerned for "the safety of my country." He insisted that his use of the swastika didn't mean he wanted to "exterminate" anybody. He said "they want to exterminate me." But he added "if they attack us we'll kill them."

College-educated Duke spoke in what superficially appeared to be a cooler, more "rational" manner. He said he was opposed to "forcing races to be together" and wanted to give them choice in their way of life. He wanted to send Blacks back to Africa. He thought Indians could be left around. He blamed Jews for being civil rights activists.

But it was the silent presence of the survivors, rather than the speeches of political and church dignitaries, that seemed to most move those gathered for the tribute.

It was on a Passover eve, April 19, 1943, that the Jews of Warsaw, confined to one small corner of the city by German barricades, began their rebellion against the Nazi forces with homemade weapons and contraband guns. Some of those who had survived the fighting were at the temple yesterday, among them Benjamin Meed, president of the Warsaw Ghetto Resistance Organization, which sponsored the memorial service. Mr. Meed wept yesterday as Kaddish was recited for those who died in the camps and in the uprising.

Tears came, too, when the choir sang the "Ani Maamin" ("I Believe"), the avowal of faith that had been sung by those who perished and that accompanied the processional of two dozen women to the front of the sanctuary. Dressed in black and carrying white tapers, they lightes the memorial votive candles that banked the altar. All were survivors of the Holocaust; one woman wore a shortsleeved dress revealing the tatlooed identification number onher arm.

And Elie Wiesel, the writer, who is a survivor of Auschwitz, spoke over sobs as he said at the end of the memorial service, "As a teacher, how can I teach my students to believe in the world and in man?" and finally concluded, "The survivors are weary; still they will continue. They have no choice."

I deeply regret that another obligation will not allow me to share this Hazkarah. I write to be united with our people at least by means of this message.

We are all of us joined in pain, the sons and daughters of a generation which has been most grievously wounded. In our lifetime -- with our own eyes, as it were -- we saw the annihilation of one-third of our people, the wanton slaughter of six million Jews, men, women, little children, one million children.

We rose from our ashes, determined to live in spite of it all. A state, Israel, a haven of refuge for our people, was created, and we live.

Now these dramatic, traumatic events have filted us with a veritable eddy of emotions: with apprehension - can it happen again; with guilt - did we really do enough to help when help was needed, no we did not. All of these feelings which swirled and swirl within us ultimately coalesced into a determination, an unyielding resolve: We will not allow it to happen again, or we will perish in the effort to avert it.

Wherever there is a Jawish community which is embattled, we will come to its aid. Wherever there is a single Jew in danger, in whatever country, or continent, or the remotest corner of our far-flung globe, there will we find him, there will we reach out to him offering our hand, our heart, our very lives. Never more will it be said: "that we had eyes but did not see, that we had mouths, but that we failed to speak."

### At Warsaw Ghetto Memorial, They Remember

By IRVING SPIEGEL

Governor Carey recalled yesterday before a hushed assembly of men, women and children at Temple Emanu-El how as a young Army infantry officer he stood before the gates of the Nazi Nord-hausen death camp and "inhaled the stench of death, barbaric, calculated cruelty."

There were 3,500 listening silently in the temple's sanctuary, balconies, side auditorium, and 1,500 more standing outside in the cold wind -most of them survivors of the holocaust. Many wept openly during the prayers of the two-hour memorial service for those who had perished in the death camps and who were killed in the Warsaw Ghetto uprising.

"I made a vow," the Gov-ernor said, "as I stood there at Nordhausen—face to face
with the survivors of death
—that as long as I live I
will fight for peace, for the rights of mankind and against any form of hate, bias and prejudice — those things we call discrimination."

#### Candles of Remembrance

As hundreds of candles glowed on the temple's altar glowed on the temple's altar in remembrance of those who had died, Governor Carey remarked that "three decades have passed soince the end of World War II, yet international passions for war and hatred are still with us."

"The lesson of the Warsaw Ghetto uprising is that heroism can stand up against the passions of hatred and sur-

passions of hatred and sur-vive. It is that lesson of cour-age and compassion and hero-

ism which brings us here to-day," the Governor said.

The memorial was spon-sored by the Warsaw Ghet-to Resistance Organization, whose chairman, Benjamin Meed, presided over the cere-

President Ford also emphasized the theme when in a message to the assembly of survivors he referred to the liberation of survivors of the Buchenwald concentration camp by Allied soldiers in which "the world discovered the shocking atrocities that had been committed."

"Time may have dulled the horror of those tragic revelations," the President's mes-sage read, "but the inhumanity suffered there and at other such camps must never be forgotten."

The President concluded with a plea to "let us resolve anew that these horrors of

the past will never occur again."

Mayor Beame also extolled the courage of those who died in the Warsaw Ghetto

died in the Warsaw Ghetto uprising against overwhelming Nazi forces on the eve of Passover in April, thirty-two years ago, declaring: "Their courage and spirilive on in the hearts of Jews all over the world, and also in the hearts of all men and women who love freedom and hate tyranny and oppression... we still remember sion . . . we still remember that courageous moment and renew our resolve to sur-vive." Not Forgotten

On a balcony wall of the temple was a huge sign in Yiddish and English: "We will not forgive."

Opening the service, Rabbi Ronald B. Sobel, spirit-ual leader of Congregation Emanu-El, speaking of those who had perished, remarked "their resting-places in faroff forests and lonely fields are lost to the eyes of revering family."

In rising tones, Rabbi Sobel added "and they shall not be forgotten for we are their family . . . we take them into our hearts and cherish their memories."

As the temple's choristers chanted "Ani Ma-amim" (the religious credo that had been chanted by many of those who perished) six survivors of the Nazi camps walked slowly to the altar and lightbank of six memorial

Each candle represented a million people who perished during the Hitler regime.


For Elie Wiesel, survivor of the Auschwitz camp and noted for his writings on the Holocaust, the observance

had a special significance.

"Let us remember,"
said, "again and again. for that is all they wanted, to be remembered. They wanted to survive and tell the world. They were moti-vated by an obsession—to indict and accuse . . . to for-get now is to betray them."

As they filed out from the temple, one survivor of the Bergen-Belsen camp, showed the tattooed number on her right arm to a friend. "This," she said, "is how I remember," she said, member."
