Dear Alex,

I talked with Steve on the phone yesterday morning and was overwhelmingly pleased to learn that you both have agreed to contribute \$250,000 from UAHC funds for the Youth Center in Jerusalem. The contribution is significant both in terms of the amount and in terms of what it symbolizes, and I am indeed extremely grateful for both factors.

Immediately upon receiving the word from Steve, I communicated with Gerry Daniel, Dick Scheuer and Joy Ungerleider, all three of whom were very moved and impressed. In my extended conversation with Joy, I think we are back on the track. In the meantime, we have also received some additional funds from South Africa toward the Youth Hostel, funds that will eventually total 100,000 Fand, and that is also a good sign. We also have some additional prospects.

As far as Joy is concerned, she is not now talking about asking for a return of her money. The basic question is whether she will make another significar contribution. That we will know when I meet with her on her trip to Israe! next week. Of course, even if she does make an additional contribution, according to Dick Scheuer and Safdie, that will not be enough to complete the Youth Hostel and we shall therefore have to continue the process of solicitation. I will be coming to the States in March, and will be doing everything possible to line up some more contributions. I assume that you will be here in February for the Agency meetings. If so, we will want to have some meetings with some of the "big machers" who are Reform Jews in regard to contributions for the Center. Otherwise, let me know and we can communicate by letter of phone.

Steve Schafer and our staff, Allan Levine, Hank Skirball and Dave Forman, hav been very helpful and will continue to be instrumental in formulating our plans and developing the programs. And we all should be grateful to them for their tremendous dedication and effective leadership. Steve reiterated what you and I have also talked about, that we have to insure control over buildin costs, administrative expenses, etc., so that our expenditures are independent of the College expenses. Also we are making provisions, as per his suggestion, for a feasibility study.

Thank you again. I believe that our dream is one step closer, though we still have a long way to go.

MEMORANDUM

> Pursuant to our meeting this morning, I am sending to you what I believe are the basic needs for a viable Youth Center - Hostel in Jerusalem. This is a revision of Rabbi Smith's memo of March 15, 1982. Also, I am enclosing an estimated budget.

Rabbi Smith and I estimate the cost of the entire building to be \$2,800,000. We know that a four-star hotel to be built now is estimated at under \$1000 a square meter. It will be necessary to impress the architect with the cost parameters.

I have reflected on our conversation concerning program space in relation to dormitory space. Without adequate program space and staff offices, it does not make sense to me to build a youth hostel in the "high rent district." You will note that the facilities include staff offices and program space.

We believe the budget submitted by Mr. David Frishman is unrealistic for the WUPJ project. We believe that the building will operate at a deficit of \$110,000 to \$140,000 per year. Therefore, if we are right about building costs, approximately \$800,000 additional will be necessary to invest for income to cover operations deficit.

Again, I urge you to consult with Rabbi Schindler as sonn as possible, in order to resolve the issues involving the current fiscal relationship of the WUPJ and the UAHC.

I regret that it will be impossible for me to meet with you in Israel during the last week of May. If the meeting can be arranged earlier in May, perhaps between May 15 and May 20, I will be there. If I am not at the meeting, Mr. Dov Gilon will represent me. He is the operations manager for the UAHC Youth Programs in Israel. 'He can be reached at 12 Ma'ayan, Givatyim. Thank you for the copy of your letter to Fred Gottschalk regarding the Ungerleider gift. Just a few comments:

A condition for this gift to the World Union via the HUC Escrow Fund was an undertaking by the World Union to make its best efforts to raise additional funds for the construction of a Youth Hostel for use by young people from all over the world. I gave this undertaking, on behalf of the World Union, without which this gift would not have been forthcoming.

I felt strongly with the representatives of the College, who participated in the talks with Mrs. Ungerleider, that this project should be shared with the UAHC Youth Department since the College has no direct interest in a Youth Hostel. After all, the main but not the only beneficiaries will be North American Youth and most funds would have to come from North American Reform Jewish Contributors.

The gift thus was accepted and received by the World Union and we are delighted that there is a strong interest by the Youth Department of UAHC for this Hostel. A close cooperation, therefore, seems indicated and I look forward to a partnership with the UAHC and a few other World Union constituents in this important project.

MINUTES OF MEETING ON JERUSALEM WORLD CENTER HELD IN PHOENIX, ARIZONA WEDNESDAY, MARCH 28, 1979

Present: Dr. Alfred Gottschalk, Dr. Uri Herscher, Rabbi Alexander Schindler, Mr. Theodore Broido, Rabbi Richard Hirsch, and Rabbi Ira Youdovin.

The matter of the Jerusalem World Center was thoroughly discussed by all who participated in the meeting and after a lengthy discussion the following principles were agreed to:

- 1) That immediate steps must be taken to recast the priority program plans for the World Center with a view towards making any changes since the preliminary drawings were prepared by Safdi.
- 2) That a decision would have to be reached in the near future regarding the choice of architect, i.e. to decide whether to retain Safdi or to find another architect.
- 3) That a decision will have to be reached as to when architectural plans should be revised in accordance with the priorities determined in #1 above.
- 4) It is to be ascertained whether or not a "land use plan" should be presented to the Jerusalem Planning Commission in the near future and whether or not the filing of such a land use plan ties us to using the present drawings and present architect. If the latter be the case, we should delay filing any plans with the Jerusalem Planning Commission for the moment.
- 5) It was agreed that each institution, Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, Union of American Hebrew Congregations, and World Union would attempt separately to raise the funds for their designated separate building needs as will be determined by the propram priority plan mentioned above.
- 6) On a formula yet to be determined as each institution raises funds for a particular building or unit of the Center, two sums of money will be set aside and kept in a joint fund: one amount to be held as an endowment for maintenance of the entire Center, and the other amount to be a joint account for building the common facilities, i.e., underground mechanical work, sewers, electrical work, etc. as is determined necessary.

- 7) Each institution is free to proceed with its own unit or units as the funds are raised, recognizing, however, the need for total and complete cordination and cooperation so that buildings are built and infrastructure completed in a way that is most economical for all concerned.
- 8) Implicit in all the above, is the continuation of a joint World Center Coordinating Committee consisting of both professional and lay representatives who will consult and coordinate every step of the way so that, while each institution will have responsibility for its own units, the end result will not violate the principal of an integrated World Center for world Jewry.
- 9) Once these minutes have been approved by the participants, they should be circulated to the appropriate Boards of each of the institutions for their information.

I talked to Ted the other day on the phone regarding a letter from Gerry Daniel on the matter of the Jerusalem Center.

Gerry had written to me as follows:

"Fred Gottschalk called to congratulate and ask when we could give him our more specific requirements for the Jerusalem Center. He stated that HUC is clear about their plans and they know what they want. He also stated that Alex Schindler would want only a Synagogue (?) for the UAHC part in the complex. They would like to be clear on this subject prior to the Jerusalem Conference. Dick Scheuer is coordinating the work and for obvious reasons (money) Fred is anxious to have us participate in the planning.

I made it clear to him that at this moment the Synagogue Building Program is <u>our</u> money priority. There seems to be some pressure by Kollek to produce finite plants for the Jerusalem Center but we still have a six year time period for building. Fred stressed that soon after the inauguration of the college in New York they would energetically start on a fundraising program for their portion of the Center."

The above is a perfect instance of the kind of difficulty we will be getting in to should separate fundraising drives be initiated. We have all agreed from the very beginning that there should be separate administration of separate quarters. However, I have been and continue to be adamantly opposed to a separate fundraising effort. It will inject a tremendous divisiveness within the movement. We will be at each other's throats and we will tear apart our laymen.

In addition to the question of future contributions, we will also become involved in controversy over previous contributions. For example: the College has received a contribution of \$500,000 from Leon Ell. I have discussed the matter with Leon a number of times and he discussed it with me, thinking I was part of the team. However, the minute you begin the process of dividing up the funds, the College will claim the \$500,000 contribution, and we will be off and running.

I hope the above will persuade you to reconsider your own position on this matter. In any case, you have agreed that before any policy becomes final we will have to have the mutual concurrence of the lay leadership of both the College and the Union. Now that we have a person of Gerry's stature and orientation and interests, I believe that he should become integrally involved in whatever discussions we have. I therefore urge you to set up a meeting with our key lay leadership in which Gerry Daniel will participate. You had talked about meeting with Matt Ross and perhaps Gil Tillis. That meeting should be set up some time during the week of September 9. Ira and Ted have my schedule.



Dear Dick,

Thank you for the copy of your letter of November 28 to Moshe Safdie and Associates.

I was surprised to note that you wrote "the youth hostel was not presently authorized and the plan for the new land will not at this time develop a youth hostel". You will recall that we had some discussion concerning this matter when you were here and we indicated, as per the attached memo, what had transpired. If I remember, you yourself reacted positively to the idea, as did Prof. Spicehandler. I myself do not know whether or not we should include the youth hostel, but at the very least, the matter should be discussed by the full policy committee before we tell the architect that the youth hostel will not be incorporated as part of our plan.

When we met with Attorney Spaer last time, he asked how many square metres we were planning to build. When we told him, he was quite surprised and said that we could not expect the Government to give us so much land for such a small amount of building and we had better think in terms of demonstrating our need for the land by presenting plans incorporating more metrage. If this is so, then I think, whether or not we actually build a youth hostel, we should include something like it in our plans.

In any case I do think this is a matter which should be brought before the policy committee when it next meets.

It was good being with you at the Biennial in New York and I am especially appreciative of your participating in the World Union luncheon. Your support is most encouraging.

When are you coming to visit us?

Dear Fred,

I have your letter of October 1st, concerning the memo received from Moshe Safdie. I also have Alex Schindler's memo to me of October 12th, relating to the same subject.

Unfortunately a misunderstanding has developed due to a lack of communication caused by the war. The sequence of events is as follows: Late in August, after you had left, I met with Hank Skirball and Al Levine to go over the plans for our World Center. They suggested that we think in terms of a hostel for NFTY and other youth. I was impressed with the validity of their recommendation, discussed the matter with Ezra who also wholeheartedly endorsed the idea. Ezra and I met with Mr. Safdie and in Ezra's presence I told him about the idea, stressing that the idea was not approved, since we had not had an opportunity to bring the matter before the policy committee. However I wanted him to know that there was a possibility that we might suggest some such program. It was clearly understood that a decision was yet to be made on this matter and his letter of September 24 so indicates.

In the meantime I knew that Dick Scheuer and Gill Tilles were coming to Israel and in order to discuss the matter with them, I asked Hank Skirball to prepare a memo, a copy of which is enclosed. Unfortunately the war intervened and Gill Tilles never arrived. However, Ezra and I discussed the matter with Dick Scheuer, who also seemed positive about the recommendation.

The next steps is first to discuss the matter with the UAHC staff and then, if they approve of the idea, to bring the matter before the Policy Committee. By the time you receive this letter Ezra will have arrived and I hope that it will be possible to arrange for a meeting of the Policy Committee, sometime during the Biennial. We should also have a meeting of the Jerusalem Building Center Committee.

I assure you that in all actions taken. Ezra and I were fully gognizant of the policies established by the Committee. I am sure that Ezra will compohorate this. He has already informed me that immediately after receipt of your letter he discussed this with you by phone.

I look forward to seeing you in New York.

I.Need: During the summers the availability of space for youth groups and individual youth in the Jerusalem area is becoming more and more scarce. Already in the winter of 1973 we found it impossible to find space for the summer of 1973. Even hotels in East Jerusalem and in the Old City of Jerusalem -- in themselves quite undesireable for our needs-are now becoming booked well in advance. The prices are also going so high as to make it unfeasible economically to hold groups in Jerusalem as long as they should remain there from an educational point of view. There is also a problem of freedom of movement wherein youth are asked to behave like adults with regard to noise, bed time hours etc. Many buildings also have curfews. There has also been a security problem in many buildings wherein thefts and molestation become not uncommon occurrences. The tightness of space is now spreading out to the other seasons of the year as well.

Last year the Conservative Movement purchased a compound of buildings in the centre of the city and made one of them into a youth hostel known as Beit Atid, named after its college age youth movement in the United States. This hostel was used both by the movement and by independents and was full for the entire summer fulfilling a great need within the city. It redounded to the credit of the Conservative Movement and tied many independents into their activities since they were in the physical structure of the Conservative Movement.

II. Basic Proposal:

. . A. . .

It is proposed that a "Beit NFTY" be constructed on the land designated for the new World Centre of the World Union for Progressive Judaism, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Hebrew Union College. The building will be located at the rear "eastern" end of the lot with a separate entrance from the rest of the World Centre. The building would be of rugged simple construction and would contain dormitory space (rooms for 6-10 people each) for 100 people in Stage I. When and if the need arose perhaps another storey or another wing could be added on doubling the capacity. There would be community toilet and shower facilities, i.e. not private ones for each room. There would also be a lounge with snack bar, a game room, a dining room, a very well equipped basic kitchen (perhaps adjoining both buildings so that it could be used for preparing food to be served in either building), a small administrative office, public toilet facilities, public pay phones and public showers. Most probably the need for class rooms and meeting rooms would be met by existing class rooms and meeting rooms in the other buildings of the complex. There also should be quarters for counselors and staff.

III. Usage:

The building would be more than filled by NFTY groups during the summer. This would preclude the need of using the YMCA and would give the groups more freedom for their programming and more privacy. The location of course is ideal being within walking distance both of the centre of West Jerusalem and the Old City.

For the balance of the year the building could be used for housing IFTY conclaves during the vacations of Succot Hannukah and Pesach and would house EIE meetings, NFTY groups during the months of December and possibly early January, the NFTY winter program for high school graduates during the months of February and March and future programs sponsored by the Reform Youth Movements would have priority in the building. This would include perhaps Winter programing for Reform Jewish youth from South Africa and Australia -possibly even South America. Second priority would go to Reform Congregations who have special youth programs throughout the year. Third priority would go to groups sent to us by the Jewish Agency, the Ministry of Tourism etc. Fourth priority would go to individuals in Jerusalem who would use it like a youth hostel. This would include members of the various one year programs and 6 month programs who are in Jerusalem for the weekend. It is estimated that during the early years that total occupancy on a full year basis should run between 60 and 85%.

In addition to the regular youth staff already engaged to coordinate all Reform Jewish Youth Programs in Israel additional personnel would be needed in this building as follows:

-3-

- 1. administrator
- 2. secretary-receptionist
- 3. cleaning staff perhaps combined with food serving staff
- 4. building and grounds staff perhaps combined with security staff
- 5. food preparation staff

During high seasons when the building is full with groups many of these workers will be kept on a full time basis. During lower seasons they will be brought in only as needed. There is a possibility that along with quarters for the groups counselors and teachers there might be permanent staff quarters for a Rabbinic student and his wife or other personnel who would be of a more permanent nature.

V. Budget.

At this point it is difficult to propose a meaningful budget since inflation is proceeding at such a rapid pace in Israel. What can be said is that most youth hostels in Israel run at a profit. This could not be guaranteed in our case and if possible the donor or donors of such a building should include in their gift a substantial maintenance gift the interest of which could be used to defray costs of maintenance, repairs replacements etc.

VI. Open Questions.

There are still of course many open questions such as 1. the elaboratness of food

- whether the food would be purchased and prepared by our staff or brought in by a catered service
- 3. the degree of general programming for individuals.
- 4. the overall price structure --whether discounts will be given to present or past NFTYites etc.

VII. Conclusion

The building could be known as Beit NFTY (providing this met with the approval of the donor/s) and all NFTYites would know that they have their home in Jerusalem. It would be a central place where NFTYites could find out which other NFTYites were in Jerusalem or in the country. It would be a meeting place, a place to pick up mail, a place to take a shower, a place to get help and touring advice. It might be that NFTY in America would like to take this on as a project and even raise some funds for furbishing.

1) Minutes

Re: Hebrew Union College, Jerusalem

For the last few weeks we have been working on the program analysis, site investigation and schematic design for the new buildings in Jerusalem. Before my departure on my trip to China, I wanted to give you a full Progress Report.

Contract:

I received in late July, a draft contract for Mr. Gross. Our attorneys have reviewed it and in early August, I forwarded our comments and suggestions to Mr. Gross. I assume it is now in the works, and that we will receive an amended contract in the near future.

Meetings in Israel:

I had two meetings in Israel at the end of August. One with Dr. Gottschalk, Dean Spicehandler, and Rabbi Hirsh. The second with Rabbi Hirsh and Dean Spicehandler. I was given a memorandum, outlining in detail the Union's program as distinct from the College's requirements. In the first meeting, I was told that a number of work sessions had taken place between the College and the Union to discuss the program. We would appreciate receiving the minutes of these meetings, which I believe are dated May 17th and June 14th.

The Union Program:

There are a number of factors that have emerged in analysing the Union program, on which we would like your comments. Rabbi Hirsh has included as an option, a Hostel and Youth

Center accommodating some eighty to one hundred boys and girls. In analysing the site and in attempting to group the buildings so that both the College and Union have their identities, the location of the hostel raises the following question: Should it be located close to the Reception Centre and other facilities of the Union, or should it be located adjacent to the faculty and students' residences of the College? I am inclined to relate it to the latter. We would appreciate some direction on this.

The other question relates to the double use of the synagogue and the auditorium. I understand that you have now decided to proceed with a hall accommodating 350 people extendable to 500, which would serve both for worship and as an auditorium. In view of the fact that the Union expects the synagogue to become representative and symbolic of a centre of Reform Judaism, this sets rather demanding requirements. On the other hand, a synagogue and auditorium are not really compatible spaces. The synagogue requires volume, height, daylight, possibly view, intimate non-directional seating and accoustics. The auditorium requires good sightlines, directional seating, controlled light, low reverberation accoustics, etc. If the function of the synagogue was not primary, I would think the two functions could be integrated in one room, but in view of the above, it would seem to me that this integration will result in either the synagogue or the auditorium, or both suffering. I, therefore, recommend that the Union and the College should carefully weigh the possibility of separating these functions. I am fully aware that this has serious economic repercussions. A separate auditorium would require approximately 550 square meters, which at 2,000 IL. a meter, as a minimum for the auditorium, would cost 1,100,000 IL. We have space on the site for this duplication. We would appreciate your guidance on this after consideration of all the factors involved.

Program Analysis:

We have made diagrams representing the organizational structure of both the Union and College (independently) shown on the enclosed sketches. These attempt to establish the relationship between the component parts of each institution. We then have made several attempts at integrating the two diagrams as they will be on the site and relate these to our

site constraints. (Enclosed Sketch)

It is apparent that the Administration wing of the College must be related to the public, as is the case for the Reception Center of the Union. Relating this fact to the actual site we are moving towards the conclusion that the Rau building should be converted to accommodate the administrative facilities of the College, rather than reconverted to its original residential use. These thoughts are tentative, but we would very much appreciate having your thoughts.

We are presently carrying out a three-dimensional space allocation analysis, to determine the optimum siting of the components of the total complex. These are being documented and we hope to develop a recommendation by the end of October. At that time, both the subleties of the program and the various alternatives will be discussed in depth with all concerned.

Project Managers:

I understand you will be interviewing Project Managers during October. I will be arriving back from my trip to Israel around the 7th of November, and I would appreciate it if the final decision could be deferred, so that I could review it on my return.

Scheduling:







I trust that this letter finds you well and settling happily into the Arizona sunshine. It was so nice being with you in Nashville and enjoying your wonderful collection of fine art.

It has taken me this long to send detailed information concerning the projected Zinman gift because I wanted to be absolutely sure that we can deliver on what we promise. I am particularly aware of your emphasis on a project that can be undertaken immediately and which can bear the name of the donor.

For a gift of \$1 million, the synagogue in the World Educational Center in Jerusalem could be named. As you may recall, this sanctuary will be erected on the extreme eastern edge of the property, quite close to the walls of the Old City and overlooking that historic capital of the Jewish People. The architects plans contemplate a large window in the rear of the pulpit area through which worshippers will actually gaze upon the Old City during their prayers. No other synagogue in the world will share this location. It is a unique opportunity for a Jew to attach his name, or the name of a loved one, to Jewish history.

A gift of this magnitude would stimulate immediate work on the project.

For a gift of a lesser amount, a memorial could be established in part of the sanctuary, or elsewhere in the Center. Among the other facilities will be a building housing the International Headquarters of the World Union for Progressive Judaism. Located in Jerusalem, this will be the world center of our Reform Movement.

I understand that you intended to proceed with this upon your return to Nashville. If there is anything I can do in the interim, please do not hesitate to ask. As you probably know, the CCAR convention will be held in Phoenix in March. I look forward to seeing you then.

subject: A Summary of our Meeting on Tuesday September 19, 1978, regarding the World Educational Center for Progressive Judaism

1. The monetary situation was reviewed. The following contributions have been received in cash and pledges for the Joint Fund:

Through the UAHC	\$100,000 - Kivie Kaplan \$200,000 - Harry Vise
Through the HUC-JIR	\$100,000 - Iz Milstone (\$25,000 paid) \$100,000 - Feinstein Fund (\$25,000 paid) <u>\$ 50,000</u> - Benjamin Swig
Total	\$550,000

The College will assume responsibility for collecting the remaining funds from those who contributed to the Joint Fund through the College.

In addition there is the Meyerhoff pledge of \$500,000, whose status is questionable. Fred Gottschalk is to follow through on this.

2. Architectural Plans. It was agreed that the architectural plans should be reviewed by the College and the Union-World Union, in the light of developments and program needs which have become manifest during the last five years. A meeting will be held of the joint planning team as soon as possible. Since your travel schedules are not clear and I intend to be in the United States the week prior to the CCAR Convention, I hereby suggest that we meet either in New York or Phoenix some time during the week of March 20 in New York or at the CCAR Convention the following week, when I assume that all of us will be present. Each team should com e to the joint committee with its reviewed recommenda**it**ons and hopefully at that time we will be able to formulate a final plan which can then be presented to the architect.

We also discussed the advisability of continuing to retain the services of Moshe Safdie, since considerable criticism has been heard concerning the exhorbitant expenditures which his plans have entailed in other projects. However, the consensus was that at this time nothing be done to alter our relationship.

It is my suggestion that we continue with Mr. Safdie, at least until after we have gone through the above-mentioned review of plans, and at that time can make a determination. 3. Administration of buildings to be erected. We engaged in discussions concerning the operating and meantenance costs of facilities to be erected. It was generally agreed that the College would assume responsibility for its primary facilities (Library, Administration, Classrooms, Archaeddogy, etc.) and the Union-World Union would assume responsibility for its facilities (Synagogue, Administration, Conference Rooms, Hostel, etc.).

The consensus was that each institution would assume responsibility for its own costs. There would be a system of shared costs worked out for joint use of all facilities, very much along the lines employed by the UAHC with the various affiliates housed at 838 Fifth Avenue.

4. <u>Future fundraising efforts</u>. We discussed the possibility of engaging a professional fundraiser, but it was agreed that it was premature to do so at this time.

There was discussion concerning two alternate ways of raising funds within a coordinated campaign: 1) each institution, the College-Institute and the Union-World Union, would raise funds separately under the umbrella framework, or 2) the present system would be continued of a joint campaign with no division made between institutions in terms of fundraising responsibility.

There was no consensus reached on this question and I therefore recommend that further discussion be held in abegance until we next meet. In the meantime, the present status continues, namely we have one campaign undertaken jointly, as reflected in the board agreements re. Friedman, and in previous memos of understanding.

It is my recommendation that, in addition to those to whom copies of this memo are being sent, when we next meet concerning the building plans and fundraising, we involve some of our key lay leadership. Recommendations for the above additions are Chairman of the Board of the College, of the Union, and Gerard Daniel representing the World Union leadership.

Following our very constructive meeting at the Biennial, I have now reviewed the correspondence by Mr. Henry H. Hersh, September 21, 1977 to Dr. Gottschalk, the letter of J. Jacques Stone to Matthew H. Ross, November 3, 1977, the response of Mr. Spaer, 26 December 1977 to Henry H. Hersh. I have had several conversations with Rabbis Gottschalk and Schindler, Mr. Spaer and Professor Spicehandler and, on the basis of these conversations and correspondence, I have reached the following conclusions, which I am hereby transmitting to you, in the hope that the necessary action will be taken.

1. Now is the propitious time to consummate the lease agreement with the Israel Lands Administration. The Israeli political situation is highly volatile. We have had no direct personal contact with the new administration of the Israel Lands Authority except through Mr. Spaer, and there are liable to be significant changes in the near future, depending on what happens with both the international and internal political situation.

Should a peace agreement be formulated, there will be tremendous pressure for the erection of hotels and other facilities for tourists in Jerusalem. The land adjacent to the College is still the most prized piece of real estate in all of Jerusalem and there will undoubtedly be tremendous pressures for its exploitation, if it appears that we are not serious about its utilisation. Should those pressures come, we are likely to find ourselves in a weaker position later on than now. The present close collaboration between Rabbi Schindler and Mr. Begin can and should be exploited to the fullest. This may change in the future, when Rabbi Schindler is no longer the chairman of the Presidents' Conference.

2. The differences of opinion between the lawyers concerning the interpretation of the development agreement.

Mr. Spaer is the most knowledgeable as a result of his high degree of competency and long experience with the Israel Lands Authority. Both in his letter of 26 December and in his oral communications with us, he has indicated that the few remaining items can be amicably and quickly resolved, both to our satisfaction and to that of the Lands Authority. However, if both the College and Union legal counsellors are still concerned, then it appears that the best way to resolve the matter should be to convene a meeting between the lawyers, either for Mr. Spaer to come to

New York or ask one or both of the representatives of the Union and College to come to Israel to resolve the matter and together to go with Mr. Spaer to the Lands Authority to resolve any remaining differences.

Mr. Spaer has given assurance in paragraph A 1 of his recent letter and also orally that nothing in the proposed new agreement affects the present land owned by the College, except for the period of lease. There is therefore no danger whatsoever that, should we not implement the agreement on the additional land, we would lose the present site. I find it difficult to believe that despite Mr. Spaer's assurances there still remains a question on this matter, but here, too, this can and should be resolved by a thorough discussion between the parties involved.

3. The period of the lease agreement and our implementation of it. After all the negotiations which have been undertaken to secure the eight year period, it would be highly inappropriate for us to ask for an extension. Besides, according to the agreement, we have a period of three years to present development and construction plans and a period of six years to begin the actual building. Mr. Spacer has assured all of us that these dates are flexible and that once we have signed the contract, should a delay be necessary either because we have not raised the money or have not agreed upon the development plans, then an extension can be obtained.

The alternative of signing the lase at this time is to keep procrastinating, using as a pretext the inability of agreeing upon the legal terms of the development agreement. However, we thereby run the risk of eventually losing both this most valuable piece of property and the potential of a major institution which will have a significant impact on the character of Israel and of our movement in the United States and around the world.

When confronted by the above two alternatives, I believe that it would be a tragic historical error if we did not proceed forthwith to resolve whatever differences there are on the legal side and strive to attain the signing of the lease within the shortest possible time.

To reiterate, I think the best way to resolve the problem would be for the lawyers to come to Israel to meet with Mr. Spaer, but if that cannot be done then Mr. Spaer would be willing to come to the United States. I also consider the matter so important that I would be willing to come specially for this purpose, to finalize this and all other matters.

Please consult with each other and communicate with me as to what is your decision.

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 10th November, 1977. Here are my comments on the two enclosures to your letter. Insofar as both enclosures mention the same points, I shall try and refer to it only once.

A. Your letter of the 21st September, 1977 to Dr. Gottschalk.

1. The proposed Development and Lease Agreements refer only to the additional land. The existing lease is a separate document with different conditions, which has already been registered as required in the Land Registry. Nothing in the proposed new Agreements affects it, except for the period of lease which will be the same both for the land originally leased and the additional land the subject of the two proposed Agreements. Since, as stated, long-term leases are registered in this country in the Land Registry, no question or doubt can arise on this score.

2. Para. 1 of your letter concerning the Development Agreement: Taxes and development expenses, present and future, are imposed by law on the holder of a long-term lease and hence the provision in question only repeats what the law provides anyhow. The extent of these taxes and development expenses does not depend on the Lessor but on Treasury assessments which can be appealed if excessive. Moreover, the intended Lessees would be largely tax exempt.

3. Clause 2 of your letter concerning the Development Agreement: Your comment is correct and theoretically the Lands Administration can object to the plans for any reason they may consider sufficient. However, in practice this is not to be anticipated. The main purpose of this clause, which is standard, is to prevent underdevelopment.

4. Clause 3 of your letter concerning the Development Agreement: Para. 6(A) of the Development Agreement provides for a waiver by the promoter concerning claims arising out of the state of the land or otherwise. Obviously this is justified since we are expected to have examined the land prior to signature of the Agreement. It is just a repetition of the rule caveat emptor.

B. Letter of Mr. Stone of the 3rd November, 1977 to Mr. Ross

a) The distinction between the land originally leased and the land now to be leased has already been dealt with above and, to our mind, requires no further elaboration. There is no doubt that any default of our clients under the new Agreements will not have the slightest effect on the existing lease which, as stated, is registered in the Land Registry.

b) Para. 2: This has already been dealt with above. There will be a separate Deed changing the period of the registered Lease so as to bring it into line with the period envisaged by the new Lease. This, to our mind, should be left to the time when the Development Agreement has been carried out and the new Lease is about to be registered.

c) Para. 3: The situation is correctly described. No right to execution and registration of a Lease will accrue before the buildings are completed as per the Development Agreement, as the Lands Administration is not willing to lease vacant land or land which has not been developed in accordance with the project for which it is being allocated.

d) Para. 4: The matter of periods has been negotiated for years and the eight years' perfod was achieved with great effort. We have throughout been urging that planning go ahead without waiting for signature of the Agreements and we are not at all certain that an extension of the period in question can be obtained at this stage. On the other hand, it will probably be obtainable at a later stage when some progress in planning, licensing, prepatations for building etc. have taken place.

e) Para. 5: The only squatters remaining on the land are a family occupying a three-room hut. A judgment for vacation has been given against them some time back but has not so far been executed. There seems to be no reasonable doubt that these squatters can be evicted, at most upon provision of alternative accommodation.

We do not understand what Mr. Stone proposes concerning the Israeli f) Consul. The Consul surely is not at all involved in this matter which has in the past been negotiated on the highest level in the Lands Administration in Jerusalem. Of course it is theoretically possible to reopen these negotiations, however you are no doubt aware that this land situated in the heart of Jerusalem has been coveted more than once by promoters of hotel buildings and that some of it was allocated to this project only with great difficulty after having previously been promised to other developers. The agreement arrived at hardly involves HUC in payment for the land, enables it to use the land for buildings to serve it and affiliated bodies and includes only a minimum of the usual onerous provisions contained in the standard contract required to be executed by parties obtaining public land. If, at some future date, extensions of time become necessary, we do not anticipate that it will be impossible to obtain them, but at this stage we would urge that the Agreement be executed without further delay and, what is no less important, that planning for submission to the licensing authorities be completed as In this respect time is important because one cannot soon as possible. indefinitely keep open an available plot of land in the best part of built-up Jerusalem.

We shall be grateful to hear from you further in the matter and, as far as additional explanations are required, we are, of course, at your disposal.

subject: repaying the debt of the World Union to the UAHC

This is to summarise my understanding of the discussions which took place regarding the debt of the World Union to the UAHC.

The World Union will reimburse, during the calendar year 1976, an amount of \$25,000 to the UAHC.

Thereafter, there will be annual payments on the debt in each of the four succeeding years, with the intention of liquidating the debt by 1980.

The UAHC, on its part, will favourably consider raising its annual contribution to the Union, beginning with the fiscal year 1977/78. (Since I did not participate in the discussion on this latter matter, I do not know what exactly was agreed upon. However, the World Union asked the Union to give full consideration to the fact that for a number of years the UAHC contribution to the World Union was reduced below the original \$25,000 committment. The UAHC is asked to take into consideration the amount of this reduction over the years, and also to give consideration to the inflation. The recommendation is, therefore, that the UAHC contribution to the World Union be raised to \$30,000). Note to Josh Dwork: Would you please review the records and let me know what the UAHC contributions to the WUPJ were for each of the last fifteen years.

An item which has not yet been resolved, is the back-debt of Harel Synagogue, which still remains open on the books both of the Union and of the World Union.

For the record, please indicate to me if this is an accurate summary of the understanding between us. In the meantime, I have started the ball rolling on obtaining the funds for the initial payment of \$25,000.

You should have them no later than the end of the summer. Nog 2.

I just realized I never got around to answering your letter of February 18th and wish to apologize for not having gotten back to you sooner, though I know Fred and Alex have been in touch with you.

As you know, the College wanted to drop our activities except for those "leads" which could be generated quietly and I plan on keeping my ears open in that respect. In view of this, nothing was done on the suggestion of hiring a U.S. director.

I would think we have to build up a committee of lay leaders with some responsibilities spelled out, but I am at a loss for leadership.

The man who I had in mind at our meeting was Ed Bergman who at one time was on the H.U.C. board and who recently merged his business with American Can Company. He is now the largest stockholder of American Can and would not only be capable of a leadership role, but could make a commitment as well. Unfortunately by the time I got back to Chicago, he had been "hooked" by the University of Chicago and would not do anything further at this time.

My present plans are to be in Israel for the World Union meetings in November. I originally was going to take a mission next week but my in-laws, the Schrayers, are going to lead a group of Chicagoans instead.

Dear Matt:

I appreciate your thoughts on how the World Center should be operated. From my perspective, I would prefer Option #2, that is to say to operate the Center without the intervention of a separate entity and it is essentially for two reasons:

a/ We really have separate and distinct activities which only the responsible bodies are competent to administer. The College-Institute program involves rabbinic studies, archeological research and the like, which our people are not competent to administer. Conversely, our programs involve such matters as youth tours, seminars for educators, high school exchange programs and the like, in which we have a good deal of expertise, which we are now operating all over and which should be seen as part and parcel of our larger programs in youth and education.

b/ I am also convinced that if a separate legal entity is established it will take on a dynamic of its own and our history has taught us that such third forces tend to be inimical to the good relationship between our respective institutions. As a case in point, in the last years of the operation of the Combined Campaign-RJA, in which I was involved, while it was still divorced from the UAHC and the College-Institute and operated independently as it were, its leaders played one institution against the other and submitted themselves to the administration of neither.

I'm glad that you will be at the June 4th meeting and this matter will undoubtedly be discussed and we can all put our "2c" in together.

Dear Phil:

It was, as always, a pleasure to see you and, more than that, to have the opportunity of being with you at the meeting dealing with the world Education Center for Progressive Judaism. Your seminal contributions helped to focus our discussion, and for this we are all very grateful.

I was distressed at your distress when you terned, apparently for the first time, that the College-Institute was embarizing upon a Centennial Fund campaign for \$18,000,000, which campaten has been announced and operative for some time, and monies have been collected for it. Herbert Friedman, of course, knew of this; and since we have been clearing names, it was agreed that your name should be one which would be solicited for the World Education Center. 1 am, however, rather estounded that Herb did not see fit to inform you that the Centennial Fund campaign was in progress. Before Herb left for Israel, he and I talked again, and I told him of my unhappiness with his not having mentioned to you the Centennial Fund campaign, since you are the last person in the world that I would want to have surprised in the manner in which you indeed were surprised.

In the same discussion with Herb, he indicated that he did not feel it prudent to include the \$2,000,000 in the College's \$18,000,000 campaign but that we should proceed to raise the sums necessary so that our Jerusalem programs, which we now totally finance and for which we expend over onehalf million dollars annually, could remain adequately funded.

It is clear that history has caught us in a dilemma. As I indicated to you in the earlier part of the meeting, when Herb first was engaged to help us raise funds for this project, it was his belief that he could do this alone, did not require an organization, nor would he find it necessary to tap the Reform Movement for support. Clearly, this plan did not work out due to a number of factors, not the least of which was the advent of the Yom Kippur War which placed our entire fund raising problem for the World Education

Center in a different prospective.

Your recommendation to add \$2,000,000 to the Centennial Fund for the World Education Center Building will be discussed by us at our Board of Governors meeting in February, and we will hopefully reach a conclusion at that time.

I trust to your great understanding and empathy and remain yours as always,



Dear Nat:

Frior to your departure for New York, I would like to congratulate you on behalf of myself and all our friends on the Board of Har-El Synagogue on a great accomplishment: the re-possession of the upper floor in the Unionowned building above Har-El Synagogue.

The agreement with the upstairs tenant, concluded by you, Dick and Mat Ross, during his brief stay here, on behalf of the World Union, means that as of January 1, 1975, the entire Ear-El building and the one dunam plot surrounding it reverts to full Union ownership. You made the right decision at the right moment and as a result, the Union now is in complete possession of a very valuable one dunam downtown plot with a good building and an excellent potential for improvement in the future.

The immediate result is that the upstairs floor can now be rented out at about five times the previous rent, which was a "protected" rent. The long range effect is that the World Union will be able to plan a good sized commercial or residential building above the Synagogue, thus, adding significantly to the Union's assets in Jerusalem and to its current income. As a result of the upstairs tenant's vacating his floor, it has become considerably easier to come to some agreement with the other private tenant in the building adjoining Har-El Synagogue (Architect Brutzkus), and I estimate that it should now be possible to get him to vacate his floor with compensation not exceeding \$ 50,000 - \$ 55,000. That will leave only the two floors in the adjoining building occupied by the Jowish Agency, Youth Aliyah Department and with this tenant, political pressure from New York may be almost as effective as financial compensation. With both buildings, thus, completely in the Union's possession without protected tenants who could submit claims and court cases, you will be able to dispose of a choice corner site of almost two dunams, one block from Jerusalem's Hamashbir's Department Store and largest office building, now under construction; one block from the busiest section of King George Avenue and at the same time, only one block from Yeshurun Synagogue, Jerusalem's largest orthodox house of worship; and two and a half blocks from Mechal Shlomo, the seat of the orthodox chief rabbis. Israel Government Matching Grants to world Education Center for Progressive Judaism.

This memorandum is based upon a letter of Mr. Pinhas Sapir. to Dr. Alfred Gottschalk, dated 5 August 1975; and a conversation of Dean Ezra Spicehandler and Rabbi Richard Hirsch with Hr. Aviad Taffe, N.K., held on 5 December 1975.

Mr. Yaffe indicated that the government would honour the Sapir letter, and stated three operating principles:

a. That the pledges received by the world Education Canter be in amodats over \$100,000. b. That evidence be presented of the transfer of funds to Israel and their conversion to Israeli currency. c. That there be presented to the Treasury evidence in support of claims for matching grants.

Regarding the above principles, it is agreed:

a. That evidence of pledges received shall consist of latters of commitment from doners, cancelled checks of donors, testamentary evidence from wills and bequests, transfers of property (such as stocks, bonds, real estate, Israel bonds, jewellery, works of art.) or any items of real value which are customarily received as pledges and payments. b. That evidence of funds transferred to Israel shall consist of bank deposit slips, telegraphic transfers from banks in the U.S. to banks in Israel, instructions by responsible boards, officers or agents of any of the organisations named below authorising transfer of institutional funds; or any other legal method by which funds are transferred to Israel.

c. That evidence in support of claims for matching grants shall consist of copies of bills paid or receipts of bills paid or bills requesting payment. Claims shall refer to all monies spent in Israel, including land acquistion, architects's fees, construction costs, furniture, administration (i.e. fund-raising and public relations) legal fees, stamps, registration and all other costs mormally involved in the construction of a project of this nature.

Dear Dr. Gottschalk, Re: Lease of additional land for Hebrew Union College

I refer to the meeting held on December 5, 1975 with you and Messrs. Schindler, Hirsch and Spicehandler, concerning the above matter.

I again explained why I have been pressing you to proceed with the early preparation of building plans for this land, when it seems clear to me that a lease will be granted in due course.

As requested by you, I wish to confirm that the object clause of the lease which will be signed with the Israel Lands Administration on completion of the building operations has been agreed upon to be non-commercial user by Hebrev Union College and another body certified by the Ministry of Education and Culture, or being connected with it. That Ministry has already certified in a letter dated the 10th October 1973, copy of which is attached, that the following bodies and organisations are so connected, and they accordingly come within the scope of the above purpose clause:

World Union for Progressive Judaism Central Conference for American Rabbis Union of American Hebrev Congregations National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods National Federation of Temple Youth National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods

As I explained, all material questions outstanding with the Lends Administration have practically been finalised and what remains to do is the formal inawing-up of the lease to be attached to the development contract. Such lease will enter into effect upon completion of the buildings as envisaged by the development contract, the terms of which have already been settled. It was agreed that I will receive final instructions as to whether you are agreeable to the leases of the new property and the old property to run for four consecutive 49 year periods. In this respect we are also still waiting for final approval by the Lands Administration.


