- 2. This headquarters will shortly issue material for a Four Hour Course of Instruction for Dependents to replace the booklet "Orientation Program for Dependents" (AGL 8-46-5409-1230) which was rescinded by reference 1b, above. Fending receipt of the new material, it is desired that the program of instruction for dependents be continued in conformance with policies expressed in reference 1b, above.
- 3. To assist in this project, there is inclosed herewith a set of outlines for four lectures to dependents based upon material contained in the six issues of the I & E Bulletin, 26 January - 2 March 1947, both dates inclusive. Sufficient copies are furnished to permit 10 copies to be sent to each military community commander, with appropriate instructions to insure continuation of the course of instruction as indicated in raragraph 2, above.

1. Note to the Lecturers:

- a. This pamphlet contains outlines for each hour of the revised Four Hour Information Program for Dependents. The four outlines are based primarily on the revised Six Hour Troop Information Program for Replacements which you have already received. * You will need to study carefully the Six Hour Program for Replacements and, with these outlines, adapt it to your present assignment of giving the Four Hour Information Program for Dependents.
- b. The Four Hour Program for Dependents was established by letter, this headquarters, file AG 350 GCT-AGO, subject: "Orientation Program for Dependents," 9 July 1946. The program is being revised in accordance with letter, this headquarters, file AG 353 GCT-AGO, subject: "Theater Troop Information and Orientation Programs," 30 November 1946.
- c. The four topics of this revised program and a brief discussion of each is as follows:
- Hour 1: "Our Job in Germany" this topic will contain material similar to appropriate parts of hours 1 and 2 of the revised Six Hour TIP for Replacements. Included are discussion of the mission and objectives of the US Army in the occupation of Germany; an explanation of the history and development of US policy in Germany from Yalta through Potsdam and former Secretary of State Byrnes' speech at Potsdam, and an explanation of why the heads of US occupation families are here. A limited non-technical discussion of organization of the European Theater is included.
- Hour 2: "German History and German People" material similar to hour 3 of the revised Six Hour TIP for Replacements. A presentation of German history from the 16th century to the present times, and a discussion of the growth of militarism is included. Recent German history is emphasized to include the Versailles Treaty, the reasons why the Weimar republic failed, and the Nazi rise to power.
- Hour 3: "Progress in Germany" Subject matter similar to that in hours 4 and 5 of the revised Six Hour TIP for Replacements. A presentation of the problems the Army faced immediately after VE-Day, and a survey of the progress in Germany to date is included. A discussion of German institutions and organizations, why we support them and how we can support them, is also covered.

^{*} The revised Six Hour Troop Information Program for Replacements appears in the six successive issues of I'& E Bulletin published during the period 26 January to 2 March 1947, inclusive.

- Hour h: "Americans Abroad" This material embraces appropriate items from hour 6 of the revised Six Hour TIP for Replacements, together with some additional matter particularly applicable to dependents, including a discussion of relations with Germans, DP's and Allies. In the case of Germans, how to watch for false sympathy and propaganda, and the importance of "living democracy" over here in order to teach the Germans to appreciate our way of life is covered. In the case of DP's, the justice theme will be stressed; in the case of Allies, it is pointed out that we will travel in foreign countries and work with Allies here and that we are Americans.
- d. With an audience comprised of newly arrived dependents from 1h years of age upward, plus the backlog of dependents who have arrived since November 19h6 and consequently have not yet received an information program, you will be subjected to a severe test of your adaptability. Until the backlog has been cleared up, your audiences will probably be large. Here one of your main problems is to maintain complete audience interest and understanding, and a degree of audience participation through judicious use of questions and discussion technique. Later on, it is suggested that small groups be formed to insure greater audience participation.
- e. With large or small groups, the customary principles of presentation should be followed. A suitable room with suitable seating arrangements, lighting, acoustics, etc., is necessary. Consideration should be given to the use of visual aids, charts and other means designed to assist in proper presentation of the subject. If a public address system is necessary, it should be tested in the room to be used. It is desired that groups be small enough so that use of such a means of presentation is unnecessary.
- f. Your audience will have considerable information on the subjects you are presenting. The newspapers, magazines, radio and other sources of information have kept it currently informed. This is the time and place to correlate these various sources of information.
- g. Encourage groups to enter the discussions as much as possible. Invite questions from the floor and answer all questions thoroughly. The unfamiliarity and novelty of living in a strange land has already raised obvious questions in the minds of newly arrived dependents, which this information series will try to clarify. Other questions are bound to arise and you must be prepared to supply competent, satisfying answers. It may be found, therefore, that some of the discussion guides in the revised Six Hour TIP for Replacements contain more material than can be presented in one hour. The lecturer should pace his presentation in such a manner that he gets across the most important points. The rest of the material is there to furnish you the answers to additional related questions that might come up.
- h. Just as their family heads the fathers and husbands are here to do the occupation job, dependents also have in their day to day contact with Germans the power to do either good or bad. An understanding of the occupation mission, the history of Germany and the people we have to deal with, will help make them conscious of the tremendous influence for good or bad they can exert in shaping foreign; especially German, impressions of America. In a sense, every American in Europe is "standing inspection" for America.

FOUR HOUR INFORMATION PROGRAM FOR DEPENDENTS HOUR NO. 1 OUR JOB IN GERMANY OUTLINE INTRODUCTION. A. Occupation families should be well informed in order to know why they should and how they can help bring about successful accomplishment of the occupation mission. Each should know: 1. Why we are occupying Germany, and something of occupation policy and how it was formulated. 2. Something of German government, history and people. 3. What problems we faced at the beginning of the occupation and what progress we have made. 4. How the Army wants them to act in Germany. B. The US spent \$200,000,000 last year on the occupation - there were good reasons for spending it: 1. The Germans are our direct responsibility. We learned after the last war what could happen when we failed to meet the responsibility that automatically goes with victory. a. Last time, we took the "easy way" out, occupied only a small part of Germany, and pulled out completely by 1923. b. We failed to punish war criminals and to destroy armed forces. c. After withdrawing, we lost interest in developments in Germany. 2. The US and the Allies are occupying Germany to see that the same thing does not happen again. 3. A formula has been developed for treatment of Germany. a. The Army is the instrument for carrying out American policy in Germany. -1-

I. DEVELOPMENT OF THE ALLIED PORTULA FOR GERMANY.

- A. Problem of what to do with Germany was so big that only heads of state, through international conferences, could decide a policy.
- B. Yalta Four-zone plan for occupation and occupation policies was stated at Yalta in February 1945.
- C. Potsdam Heads of US, Britain and Russia met at Potsdam, near Berlin, and finished planning begun at Yalta:
- 1. Fixed zonal boundaries, decided to treat all of Gornany as a single economic unit.
 - 2. France was given a zone.
- 3. General McMarnoy became Commanding General, European Theater, and Lieutenant General Clay became his deputy as head of Military Government in the US Zone.
 - h. The program of the "Three D's" was instituted.
 - D. The Three D's the negative phase:
- 1. Demilitarization The complete disarmament and demilitarization of Germany was specified at Potsdam.
- 2. Demazification Numbers of the Nazi Party would be removed from positions of influence.
- 3. Deindustrialization Industry that might be used for military production would be removed or placed under Big Four control.
 - E. Re-oducation the positive phase:
 - 1. The German people must be re-educated along democratic lines.
- a. Free elections in the US Zone are part of the program to teach democratic processes.
- b. To learn democratic processes, the Germans are being given more and more opportunity to run their own government.
- 2. There are many older Germans who remember the freedom under the Weirar Republic of the 1920's.
 - a. But many of the older Germans have lost hope.
 - 3. German youth:
 - a. This is the generation we must educate.
- b. German youth is still in formative years and is the hope of a new Germany.

II. IR. BYRNES' SPEECH AT STUTGART.

- A. Former Secretary of State Byrnes cutlined US foreign policy in an important speech at Stuttgart, 6 September 1946:
- I. Schators Connalty and Vandenberg were with Mr. Byrnes at Stuttgart.
- a. One a Democrat, one a Republicar, they showed the world that both rajor parties supported US foreign policy.
 - 2. The main points of the Stutt art speech:
 - a. The US has learned that it is living in one world.
 - b. Germany must be demilitarized and must pay fair reparation
 - c. There is need to unify zonal economics:
- d. Germany must be made self-supporting.
 - e. US wanted the end of unnecessary zonal barriers.
 - . f. The U3 was going to stay in Gerrany as long as other nation
- g. The US aim is to aid the German people in winning an honorable place in the world.

 - 1. MG directs the government of the US Zone:

 - IV. MISSION OF THE ARMY.
- A. The Army carries out a two-fold mission in Germany political and tactical:
- 1. Political mission: "To prepare for eventual reconstruction of German political life on a democratic basis" quote the Potsdam Agreement.
- a. The Army, through 10, is the instrument for carrying out this political mission.
 - 2. Tactical mission: a. To provide security.
 - b. To support MG.
 - c. To care for DP's in the US Zone of Germany.
 - V. THE OCCUPATION AND YOU.

and the same of the same of

- A. Each head of an occupation family has a mission to perform:
 - 1. His immediate mission is to do his job well, whatever it may be.
- 2. His larger, long-range mission is to help recrient the Germans along democratic lines.

B. Other members of the occupation family also have a responsibility in the occupation: 1. They should understand why the Occupation Forces are in Germany. 2. They should help in the work of recrienting the Germans along democratic lines. C. The negative phase of your mission - the "Three D's" having largely been accomplished, the emphasis now is on constructive policy: 1. We are re-educating and rehabilitating the Germans in order that they may again take a place in a peaceful and democratic world.

2. Actions of all Americans, and especially the women, are scrutinized closely by the Germans and conclusions drawn on that basis.

3. In this important work each member of the occupation family can and should play a part:

a. By helping in approved ways, such as with German youth groups.

b. By conducting themselves in such a way as to reflect credit on America, Americans and the American way of life.

4. Each member of the family should adapt his thinking and actions in order to help insure the success of the occupation.

SUITARY.

- A. Well informed occupation families can help bring about the successful accomplishment of the occupation mission.
 - B. Allied formula was developed at Yalta and Potsdam.
 - C. Secretary Byrnes! speech at Stuttgart clarified US aims.
- D. The Arry was designated to govern occupied countries. In Germany it transmits the policies of the US to the German State governments through MG which supervises, but does not run, government by the Germans.
- E. The Army provides security and support for MG and is helping to re-educate the German youth. It provides necessary care for DP's. It will remain here until the German government is democratically run and has proved its peaceful intentions.
- F. As members of occupation families, we have a responsibility for helping to re-educate the German people. This we can do through good personal example and through work with German youth.

GER VAN HISTORY AND GERMAN PEOPLE

OUTLINE

INTRODUCTION.

- A. The German people seem to be a lot like us, but politically and psychologically they are very different.
 - B. If we are going to re-educate the Germans we must understand them.
- C. German people are not warlike by nature; that is, they were not born out way:
 - 1. Environment is a determining factor.
- 2. Many good Americans are of German descent. Some of the influences that have made the Germans act the way they have:
 - a. Geography of Europe.
 - b. Militaristic history.
 - c. Inexperience in democratic government.
 - d. Overly disciplined life.
 - e. Follow-the-leader principle.
 - f. Nazi propaganda.
 - I. GEOGRAPHY AND HISTORY.
- A. Some factors of geography that have tended to make Germany a warlike nation:
 - 1. Smallest bit of land important.
 - 2. Germany in center of Europe no natural boundaries.
 - B. Some factors of history that have influenced the German people:
- 1. Germany dreamed of unity for centuries, finally became a mified state in 1871.

- C. Some of the steps that led to unification of Germany, and some of the outstanding leaders during this period:
 - 1. German states had common culture in the 18th century.
 - 2. They had been united, but weakly, under the Holy Roman Empire.
 - 3. Strongest state was Prussia, rulled by the House of Hohenzoller
 - 4. Frederick the Great set pattern for German militarism.
 - D. Parts of that pattern included:
 - 1. Large and glorified army.
 - 2. Large and efficient civil service.
 - E. There was a liberal, democratic movement to unify Germany:
 - 1. Inspired by the example of the US and France.
 - 2. Failure of the Movolution of 1848-49.
- 3. Prussian armies and Gorman princes together killed or jailed liberal leaders.
 - F. Germany was unified in latter part of 19th century:
 - 1. By Otto von Bismarck.
 - 2. By a series of three wars with Denmark, Austria and France.
- 3. Bismarck's successors came to believe in the success of strength and brute force.
 - G. Kaiser Wilhelm II took over from Bismarck:
 - 1. Developed an unnecessarily strong army and navy.
- 2. Substituted nationalism (in the form of Pan-Germanism) for liberalism.
 - a. Germany to rule the world.
- H. Prussian militarism, coupled with Pan-Germanism, largely responsible for World War I.
- I. German history for the period between the end of World War I and Hitler's era:
 - 1. Germans disillusioned.
 - 2. Coalition of parties ran Weimar Republic.

- a. Weirar Constituion provided for democratic form of government.
- 3. This coalition was confronted with many serious problems:

 - b. Liberal elements lacked experience.
 - c. Economic conditions.
 - d. lack of experience in self-government.
 - e. Inflation.
 - 2. Attempts to save the Weimar Republic:
 - a. Dawes Plan, 1924.
 - b. "Era of Good Feeling."
 - L. Hitler was in the tradition of Frederick the Great and Bismarck.
 - 1. Following that tradition, he developed Mazism, which:
 - a. Did away with individual rights and liberties.
 - b. Perverted arts and sciences for own ends.
 - c. Hade robots out of human beings.

- 2. How the Mazis came to power:
 - a. So-called "legal" nethods.
- b. Supported by middle and upper classes, industrialists and militarists.
- c. Working classes initially opposed Mither's rise, but later accepted and supported the Mazi regime.
 - M. German ideas of government differ from ours:
 - 1. They prefer an all-powerful type of government.
 - 2. German democratic governments so far all unsuccessful.

- A. Victorious Allies confronted with a Germany reduced to rubble and ruin:
 - 1. Cities in ruin, public utilities inadequate,
- 2. Industry crippled, transportation and communications systems
 - 3. Threat of starvation and disease.
 - 4. No responsible government able to run the country.
 - B. Long-range problems included:
 - 1. Re-education of a defeated people in whom the spirit that created Nazism had not been defeated.
 - 2. Establishment and nursing along of a German government to help us do the job of running Germany.
 - 3. Revival of trade and commerce; hand-feeding German economy in order to enable Germany to pay her own way.
 - I. CLEARING THE GROUND.
 - · A. Potsdam meeting during the summer of 1915:
 - 1. Allies called for complete re-education of the German people, but decided, before there could be any large scale reconstruction physical or political, Germany must be cleaned of her war making power and war leaders.
 - 2. They formulated the now famous "Three D's" which were to clear the ground for re-education:
 - a. Demilitarization.
 - b. Denazification.
 - c. Deindustrialization.

- B. I at we've done to carry out the "Three D's".
 - 1. Domilitarization:
 - a. Of weapons and equipment of war -
- (1) By July 19h6, 98 percent of 8,000,000 US-held prisoners of war had been discharged, uniforms and wer insignia forbidden, and military or ma-relitary or maintains outlawed.
- (2) Military installations and equipment were given priority for destruction; this regran is still going on and will continue until all German military installations and war equipment are destroyed.
 - b. Of organizations that furnished the army with manpower:
- (1) These included the Mitter Youth, Storm Troopers, Gestapo, the labor corps, various bunds and Teutomic brotherhoods, etc., all of which have been outlawed.
 - 2. Demazification:
- a. Nazi Party declared illegal, and whole Cerman opoulation investigated to determine party nambership.
- b. At first MG operated denuzification courts, but later turned over to the Garans full responsibility for denazification.
- (1) Of Gormans reviewed for denazification thus far, 4,000,000 found "not chargeable," and roughly 3,000,000 "chargeable" under German Law of Liberation from National Socialism.
- (2) lajor "offenders" lose civil rights, and are subject to hard labor sentences ranging from two years upward.
- (3) Lesser "offenders," punishable to varying degrees and generally limited, in regard to employment, to immuni labor jobs.
- pardon to 300,000 "s all fry" Nazis.
- d. The pageantr, and symbolism the swastika, imperial eagle, golden dagger, death's head, etc., that went with harism, no longer visible.
 - 3. Doirustrialization and recen ersion:
- a. Var plants that could not be converted to peacetime uses without leaving a war potential are being dismuntled or destroyed.
- (1) This includes the Krupe, Pesserschmidt, Mauser and many other arms plants.

- b. Tany plants, on the other hand, could be used for peaceful production:
- (1) US policy is to encourage reconverstion to peaceful production in order to make Germany self sustaining (quote Ir. Byrnes), and to help in the economic recovery of Europe as a whole.
- (2) Morging of US and British zones expected to increase peaceful production.
- (3) Economic rehabilitation now beginning to be noticeable (see text for examples).

O. "Restitutions":

- 1. Restitutions are the return of property to rightful owners.
- 2. Ins been going on since warts end, and has been limited to United Nations which were, during the war, occupied in whole or in part by the Nazis.
- 3. Concerned with various kinds of property ranging from art treasures, to toothpaste factories, to railroad rolling stock.

II, BUILDING A NEW POUNDATION: PHYSICAL.

- A. Firsical and noral gains:
- 1. Preceding discussion has dealt with negative phase of occupation.
- 2, On the positive side we have nade both "physical" and "moral" gains in rehabilitating the German people.

B. Physical gains:

- 1. Starvation, food riots prevented:
- a. Germans supply most of their own food; we have helped to increase German production.
- b. US has also distributed food to help prevent Germans from starving.
- (1) In 10-month period preceding June 1946, US distributed more than half a million tens of food in Germany.
- (2) This included mostly flour, wheat and cereals, also seeds.
 - 2. Railroad system back in operation.
 - 3, Communications system salvaged.

- 5. Housing situation inadequate, but there are no roofless people.
- a. 40 percent of livable rooms in Germany either totally des
 - b. Families doubled up.
 - 6. Epidemics averted.
 - 7, DP problem mot:
 - a. Those who wanted to go home have been repatriated.
- b. Remaining half million, known as "hard core" of DP problem, housed in carps.
 - 8. The Arry has assisted in relocating "refugees" and "expellees."
 - 9. Recommic margar of British and American zones.

III. PULLDING A MET POURDATION: INDAL.

- A. Roturn of self-Government:
 - 1. Political parties authorized in August 1915.
 - 2. Generate (community) level elections held in January 1946.
 - 3. Landlereis (county) elections held in April 1946.
 - 4. Stadt'reis (large city) elections held in May 1946.
 - 5. Constitutional Conventions elected June 1946.
- 6. Constitutions ratified (approved) by the German people in Movember and December 1946.
 - P. Lacadorrat, or Council of States:
- 1. Set up in October 1965; composed of Minister-Presidents of three states of the US Zone, together with their staffs.
 - 2. Purpose: to coordinate work of the separate state governments.
- 3. Until June 1946, all Laenderrat proposals were submitted to O'GUS for approval; now Council has authority to make final decisions on natters of German civil administration not involving major policy problems (see text for examples).

4. Directorate:

- a. Permanent representatives of limister-Presidents form Directorate which meets weekly to handle problems that cannot wait for monthly meetings.
- b. Their decisions are binding if unanimous and if not vetoed by any of the three Minister-Presidents.
 - C. German Policy another feature of self-government:
 - 1. Boing a job American soldiers would otherwise have to do.
 - 2. We have established police schools.
 - D. Re-opening of schools:
 - 1. At war's end almost all schools bombed out or closed.
- 2. Under the Nazis, schools were factories which transformed young minds into robots.
- 3. Nost pressing job was to get kids off the streets so schools were opened immediately.
- h. Then began the process of screening teachers roughly 65 percent of pre-occupation teachers removed; pre-Hitler and newly trained, young teachers now running schools.
 - 5; Nazi textbooks scrapped.
- E. Youth Program set up to supplement schools, to teach democracy and fair play, to lower delinquency rate:
- 1. Youth program has official Army backing, including use of excess supplies.
- 2: Americans take part through discussion groups, teaching sports and games, hobby groups, etc. Yany Youth Centers established.
- 3. Both youth and soldier participation steadily increasing half a million youth and 40,000 soldiers by late fall of 1946.
 - F. Rebirth of Trade Unions:
 - 1. Trade unions before Hitler were centers of liberal thought:
 - a. Among first to suffer under Mazis.
- 2. With Army assistance, Trade Unions are pulling themselves up by their bootstraps.
 - 3. Shop Steward elections.
 - h. Works Councils. -5-

- G. Sources of information and truth:
 - 1. Free press being restored to Germany by degrees.
 - a. All German newspapers (and radios) licensed by MG.
- b. No censorship prior to publication, though no criticism of occupation policy is allowed, and 16 does review papers after publication to see that this regulation has been carried out; offenders reprinanded, and if offense is serious, license can be revoked.
 - c. DENA the Germans! own news agency.
- 2. Radio, books, ragazines and other media of information rapidly assuming proper place in German life.
 - 3. Discussion groups.
 - H. Theater, Art and Music also regaining proper place in Germany:
- 1. Tusic, tritings and works of "inferior" people banned by Nazis, now appearing in Germany again.
- 2. These works of art help demonstrate fallacy of Aryan myth literature, music and art are all above race, color or creed.
 - I. Freedom of Religion:
 - 1. Churches suffered greatly under Hitler.
- 2. Pany clerguen offered heroic resistance to Nazis; others supported Nazis; therefore churches have not escaped denazification.
 - IV. MAY WE SUPPORT THESE ORGANIZATIONS AND INSTITUTIONS.
 - A. The Arry stands behind these organizations and institutions.
 - 1. First reason a purely practical one:
 - a. To take the burden of government off the Army's back.
- b. If Gormans didn't run their our affairs, American soldiers would have to do it.
 - 2. Health is second big reason:
- a. If German health, sanitation and food distribution systems collapsed, disease and famine would spread.
- . b. The Army does not want to needlessly expose itself to the disease or unrest which would result from famine.

- 3. Final big reason is that these organizations and institutions represent the beginnings of a post war Germany based on democratic principles:

INTRODUCTION - LIVING ABROAD.

- A. You have come abroad mainly to re-unite your family, but living abroad will also be valuable experience. It gives you a chance to:
 - 1. Visit historic places.
 - 2. Broaden your view of life.
 - 3. Learn a foreign language.
 - B. Living abroad also carries with it cortain responsibilities:
- 1. The relative handful of Americans in Europe represent America; in a sense, we are "standing inspection" for America and American ideals before all of Europe.
- . a. What we few do will be interpreted as official acts representing the will of all Americans.
- b. The example we set in our daily life in Germany will help determine whether or not the Germans can be taught to appreciate our form of life.
- c. The example we set in our travels throughout foreign countries, and in working with Allied nationals in Gornany, will have an important effect on our country's foreign relations.
- d. The example we set through our attitudes toward, and relations with, DP's will better or worsen the American people's reputation for being fair, just and understanding.
- 2. In addition, the impressions we get here will influence American public opinions and policies.
- 3. Let's duscuss more fully first our relations with Germans, Allies and DP's, then the importance of our own impressions.

- I. THE GER AND US.
- A. It has been suggested we bring each German to America for a while to show how our way of life pays off:
 - 1. Such a plan is obviously impossible.
 - 2. Next best thing is to bring America over here
 - a. That, in effect, is what our presence here amounts to.
 - B. Gornan misinformation about US:
 - 1. Germans never did get much information about America.
 - 2. That they got came chiefly from:
 - a. American tourists.
 - b. American movies.
 - c. Nazi-approved books.
- 3. None of these sources give particularly true impressions of America.
- C. Our presence in Germany adds up to a new source of information about America:
 - 1. Americans will be here a long time.
- 2. The lasting impressions we leave behind will have a lot to do with the future peace of the world.
 - D. Americans through German eyes:
 - 1. Look for the bad.
 - 2. Like ripples in a pond, word of our bad actions spreads.
 - a. Black market.
 - b. Reckless driving.
 - c. Wastefulness.
 - d. Unfairness in dealing with German help.
- 3. Good deeds are expected but they carry little weight, therefore it takes many good deeds to erase one bad.

- a. Good deeds don't mean false sympathy.
- b. They do not mean, either, that we should be taken in with propaganda or efforts to please.
- c. They do mean work with German youth, encouragement of liberal, democratic elements in Germany, fair and square relations with the Germans who work for us.
 - E. Thy it is important that we do nure what the Germans think about us:
- . 1. All the high-sounding phrases in the world won't mean a thing if we can't prove ourselves better persons for having lived the American way.

II. THE PROPIE OF EUROPE.

- A. Americans abroad may visit some countries and will come in contact with citizens of many.
 - 1. These countries may be visited easily:
 - a. Great Britain.
 - b. France.
 - c. Luxembourg.
 - d. The Low Countries Balgium and The Metherlands.
 - e. The Scandinavian countries Norway, Denmark and Sweden.
 - f. Czechoslovakia.
 - g. Switzerland.
 - h. Italy.
- 2. In addition, we are likely to neet people of other nationalities - Russians, Greeks, Poles and Yugoslavs, to name a few.
- B. Let's step for just a moment and recall what some of these peoples contributed to victory so that we may understand why conditions in Europe are different from those in the ZI:
- 1. Britains bore the brunt of resistance during the early part of the war, withstood the buzzbonbs and bombings, dug themselves out of ruins, tightened their belts because of short rations, and made a comeback with our help.
- 2. The French were arong the first to suffer under German occupation; the French underground fought stubbornly for freedom; French forces were fourth strongest on the Allied team.

- 3. The Russians defended in depth, burned their own houses and crops. In three years they lost more than five million soldiers killed, missing or captured, plus heavy civilian losses. The hercic defense of Stalingrad is considered by many the turning point of the war.
- 4. Other Allies to a comparable extent, the same sort of contribution and effort and suffering applies to our other war Allies.
 - C. It is important that we know those facts:
- 1. They will help us to understand better the problems of Europe while we are on the spot.
- 2. This understanding will lead to better relations, enhance the cause of peace.
 - 3. The US policy is to support UN.
 - D. We should make an attempt to understand the people we meet:
- 1. We should understand why such conditions as geography, economics and history influence the living standards of continental nations.
 - 2. We should realize that much of US culture comes from Europe.
- 3. We should realize that to many Europeans the US is a "young country."
- E. While the impressions we get of Europeans are important, the impressions they get of us are equally important in creating good, friendly relations.
- 1. Our attitudes toward Europeans will be reflected in our bearing, in our dealings with them, in restaurants and stores, in private conversations. We must avoid:
 - a. Boisterousness.
 - b. "Mnow-it-all" attitudes.
 - c. "US won the war" attitudes.
 - d. Grabbing for scarce commodities.
- 2. From associations with us, Europeans will form their opinions of Americans as a whole.
 - III. THE DP'S A PAOBLET IN MULANITY.

- 1. Six million DP's in Germany under SHAFF control at the war's end:
- a. One half million remain known as "hard core" either don't want to or can't go home, for various reasons.
 - 2. Situation of Jews especially difficult:
 - a. Nazis wiped out six million European Jews.
- b. Nazis reduced number of German Jews from 600,000 in 1933 to about 15,000 by war's end.
- B. Why it is important we try to understand the DP's and their problems:
 - 1. Tany suffered profound psychological and physical shock.
 - 2. Some have grown to hate or distrust all officials:
 - a. Because of recollections of Gestapo and other Mazi agencies.
- b. Comparatively few DP's have been arrested for violations of various sorts.
- all DP's.
 - 3. We are trying to re-educate the Germans by our example:
- a. If we are arrogant toward, or show lack of understanding for DP's, the Germans will wonder if our way of life differs so much from the Hazi ideology.

IV. YOU'RE THE EXPENT.

- A. Americans who have been abroad will be looked upon as "experts" people who know:
 - 1. We've had opportunity to visit foreign countries.
 - 2. We've seen the occupation from close up.
 - B. For these reasons our opinions will count for something:
- 1. Will influence the thinking of people we know at home in other words, will influence public opinion.
- 2. Ultimately will influence the policies of our government, because policies of government depend on public opinion.

- C. We will be considered experts on:
 - 1. The occupation the sort of job the Army is doing.
 - 2. What the Germans are thinking and doing.
 - 3. Our Allies.
 - 4. The way permanent world peace is shaping up.
- D. Our responsibility to give friends and family a reasonable true picture of problems facing Europe and the world. To do this we should not:

We would like the permission of your Congregation to have him travel with me during the remainder of the month of June for the relief of the destitute millions overseas. Will you lend him to the nation until July 1st?"

I, of course, told him that such permission would have to come from our Ritual Committee. After discussing the matter with them, it was unanimously decided to grant the request with the understanding that he would fulfill his engagement in Denver to address our people on June 17th. Mr. Morgenthau agreed, and said that he expected to be here with him.

Arrangements have been made with the reform Rabbis of Colorado Springs and Pueblo to serve our congregants in case of need during the remainder of this month.

You, your family and friends are urged to attend the mass-meeting next Tuesday evening, June 17th, 8 o'clock, East High Auditorium and hear this vital message of our beloved Rabbi and pay tribute to Mr. Morgenthau, the most highly honored Jew in American history.

The Allied Jewish Council advises us that there will be no solicitation of funds.





The story of how I got them out is long and exciting. The packing cases wound up in the Hebrew Nahomal Library on Mt. Scopus. We thought they were lost forever after 1948.

Decades later, Professor Sholem told me that they had been successfully smuggled down from Scopus in the bi-weekly change of guard, one item at a time, slowly and carefully.

When I read your article the whole remarkable episode came back to me. I found in my files a copy of the U.S. Army paper "Stars and Stripes", and herewith enclose a xerox copy.

Specifically, I would like to meet someone who was intimately connected with that change of guards and who might know the details of how the books and manuscripts were brought down. You mentioned two names in your story, Dov Levin and Menachem Scharfmann. Perhaps, there were others.

I will be in Israel from July 30 through August 10, quite busy - but still extremely eager tomeet you and anyone with whom you can make an appointment for me. Would you please write me at this address, or telephone collect, and let me know if you can be of help.

HE MOUNTAIN had secrets that only the king and the king's mennew - and not even they always, new.

Superficially, the mountain's regmen was bared for all to see in the prosaic paragraphs of the cease-fire greements in 1949 detailing how nany Israelis were permitted to crive there and in what conditions. But Mount Scopus would remain trapped both in mystique and in arthly secrets from the time it betame an Israeli enclave inside Jorlan in the War of Independence.

The mystique was attached to the adtural acropolis floating dreamlike I kilometre inside enemy territory—for Israelis an anchor to the past and, who knew, a line to the future. This vision was realized dramatically in the return to Scopus in the Six Day War and the reconstruction of the Hebrew University campus and the Hadassah Hospital.

But the mountain's secrets did not end with the war. Military censorship dictated that they be kept. Until now. A recent gathering in Beit Turjeman Museum of a few dozen of the key people who had served on Scopus between 1948-67 marked the first time some of these secrets were uttered aloud. But even these revelations were only part of the story.

It was not until the opening day of the 1967 war – 17 years ago this week – that the Jordanians discovered that Scopus had any secrets. Under the cease-fire agreements, the 120 Israelis serving on the mount could be armed only with the World War II British rifles and sten guns that the original garrison had carried. But atter the Jordanians opened fire on June 5, 1967, the Israeli garrison responded with the weapons of a modern battalion including heavy machine-guns and recoilless rifles on jeeps which had somehow been smuggled onto the hill over the years.

THE ISRAELI reservists and draftees who had done month-long stints of duty on Scopus over the years were aware, of course, that weapons and an incredible variety of other materials were arriving on the hill; but they did not know how.

"Some thought it was Arabs who brought it up on donkeys," says Dov Stern, who served as a field security non-com on Scopus for seven years. "Some were convinced we had a tunnel to the Israeli side of Jerusalem. Some thought it was smuggled in by UN people we had paid off. Some thought it was brought in the armoured buses that took the replacements up. I told them all separately that they were right."

Periodically, the reservists – officers as well as men – on guard duty at the northern entrance of the enclave near Hadassah Hospital were told to leave their position at night and to stay under cover. Their places were taken by regular army personnel from the small permanent garrison. At first light, the reservists would see the regulars trundling loads of ammunition boxes and other materiel towards the storage bunkers on carts.

All this, however, was only an elaborate scenario of disinformation. There had indeed been an attempt about 1954 to get a convoy
through to Scopus at night through
the wadi below today's Ramat
Eshkol, but it had been spotted. The
Israelis managed to scramble back to
their lines but had to abandon the
materiel.

Another system of smuggling was spotted at the Mandelbaum Gate in 1952 by a UN officer who pushed a rod into a barrel of fuel oil designated for Scopus and struck an ob-

ject midway. The Israelis refused to empty the barrel as he requested and he refused to permit the Israelis to take the barrel back to their lines.

It was locked in the building at the Mandelbaum Gate until the UM commander in the region returned to Jerusalem. In the presence of Jordanian and Israeli officers, he stuck a rod into the barrel and said: "The manifest says this drum is supposed to contain 200 litres. I say there are not 200 litres. This is apparently not the right drum. Bring the right drum."

The Israelis gratefully rolled out the barrel – one that contained less than 200 litres of oil but included a radio set, well wrapped.

IT WAS in the late 1950s that some still unsung genius came up with the idea of transporting materials by the one means that ensured access to Scopus and in virtually undetectable form – sending them with the regular convoys.

These convoys went up every two weeks carrying 60 men to replace half the Scopus garrison being rotated. There were two armoured buses for the men as well as trucks carrying supplies and UN escort vehicles. The convoy left from the Schneller camp serving as Jerusalem Brigade headquarters and halted at the Mandelbaum Gate, the one crossing point between Israel and Jordan. Under the armistice agreement, the Israeli garrison was supposed to be made up of policemen, as was the Jordannan contingent in the demilitarized area adjacent to Scopus. For the occasion, the Israeli soldiers donned police uniforms.

In the no-man's-land of the Mandelbaum intersection, the Israeli convoy was inspected by Arab Legion and UN officers. The "policemen" opened their kitbags and spread the items out before them. The supplies on the trucks were offloaded. The legionnaires were not permitted to touch anything, but any item they pointed at – from a soldier's tefilim bag to a sack of flour – would be opened by the Israelis and closely inspected by the UN official.

After everything had been cleared and reloaded, the soldiers boarded the buses again and sat on the benches running along the sides of the vehicles and the ones running down the centre. All were unarmed since the armistice agreement did not permit additional weapons to be brought to the hill. Two armed legionnaires followed them inside and posted themselves in the front and rear stairwells. Between the legionnaires and the Israelis, stood UN officers. In this fashion, the buses set out on their kilometre-long run through Jordanian Jerusalem to Scopus.

There were no windows on the buses and only the driver had narow slits to look out of. The legionnaires were there to ensure that the Israelis did not attempt any skulduggery while passing through the Arab city, and presumably to protect the unarmed Israelis from any repetition of the massacre of the Hadassah convoy to Scopus in April, 1948, when more than 70 people were killed. That massacre had occurred in Sheikh Jarrah a few days after the massacre of Arabs in Deir Yassin.


At the British war cemetery near the entrance to the Israeli enclave, the Jordanians descended. The UN officers accompanied the convoy to Scopus and stayed there until the afternoon, when the convoy returned to Israeli Jerusalem with the 60 men who had completed their tour of duty.

THE SPECIAL unit assigned to

come up with a smuggling method apparently contained men who had been expert in devising "slicks" – hiding places for weapons and other objects – for the pre-State underground. Their solution was to convert the two buses into gigantic, movable slicks. Without any discernible change in their appearance, a narrow space was provided between the armoured plating and the inside walls of the buses sufficient for regulation-sized ammunition boxes. The space was revealed by lifting the strip of plastic backing against which the soldiers sat along the walls.


The seats themselves, unknown to the soldiers sitting on them, hid compartments containing Uzi submachine-guns, each with a loaded magazine alongside it, and grenades. At the front entrance there was a fire extinguisher as ordinary in appearance as that in any bus. However, when it was removed, the wall behind it could be swiftly dismantled to reveal a sack of grenades.

Much of this weaponry was to be used by the convoy itself if it were ambushed. With the trauma of the Hadassah convoy still fresh in Jewish memories, the military was determined that its men would never be caught defenceless passing through Sheikh Jarrah.

However, the slick of slicks was intended solely for Scopus. Before each convoy set out, the larger of the two buses would be rolled into a special shed in Schneller to which only a handful of men had access. Two fans attached to the roof of the bus, one in the front and the other at

the rear, were removed, revealing in each socket three screws. These were removed in turn to reveal rods which two men would simultaneous ly begin turning with wrenches. The roof that had been fitted onto the burned a hollow space half a metre high. When the men turned the rods, the upper part of the roof rose another half metre. This permitted accessint to the space from the outside buclimbing onto the engine cowling.

Hunched over in the narrow space, the men on top would lay out the materiel passed up to them and then pad it with blankets and four rubber to ensure that the legion naires and the UN officers in the buses would not hear any clanking. The space was wide enough to taleven jeeps which had been dismantled, and recoilless rifles. After the

loading, the roof would be lowered, the screws replaced and painted over and the fans returned to working order.

The doors and windows of the shed were kept closed for security reasons, and in summer the men often hauled materiel into the cramped roof in stifling conditions.

ONCE THE CONVOYS reached Scopus, the men were let out inside the entrance to the enclave, the UN officers were escorted to a UN club which had been specially fitted out for them and offered a civilized assortment of drinks until the return convoy was ready

Meanwhile, the buses were driven into the main entrance hall of Hadas-sah Hospital. Guards quickly took position at the approaches to keep

away visitors, including other soldiers, and the secret compartments were opened. Sometimes, defective equipment was sent back in the slicks on the return run.

The men responsible for loading and unloading the buses were among the permanent staff members on the hill - not all of whom were in on the secret. There was always one of the insiders on every bus going up or down so that if there was an ambush, someone could open the secret arms caches. The men would drill frequently so that they could open them within seconds. The permanent personnel played the role of university or hospital personnel permitted on the hill by the cease-fire agreement and they wore civilian clothes

The isolated nature of the Scopus garrison gave it an independent

character so marked that its commander came to be called King of the Mountain and his authority was vir-tually sovereign. There was no getting off the hill between convoys except for emergency medical attention, in which case the UN would intercede.

The "kings" came to serve for as long as two years, spending one month on the hill and one month off. During their absence, their place would be taken by the deputy commander. The permanent staff, about 20, were the "king's men." They generally served one month on and two weeks off.

THE GARRISON'S vulnerability made secrecy a prime concern, and sometimes the "kings" themselves were not aware of all that was going on. The secrecy was not only towards the Arabs and the UN but towards the Israeli soldiers as well. since loose talk in a small country could easily reach hostile ears. Thus, to further blur the connection between the convoys and the arms deliveries, only half the mail "that arrived with the convoys would be delivered to the men that day. The other half would be withheld for distribution the day after the mysterious pulling back of the guards at the northern entrance - thus convincing most doubters that materiel was getting up between convoys.

The materiel smuggled included thousands of mines, which were planted on the approaches to the enclave under cover of darkness. Barbed wire - kilometres of it - was manufactured on the hill itself with materiel sent up from Schneller and dispersed around the hill's approaches over the years, gradually enough not to be noticed by the other side.

Various scenarios were conceived for Scopus in the event of war, including the possibility that it might be reinforced by helicopter-borne troops or that an armoured force might break through to relieve it. A helicopter landing area was prepared within a sheltered courtyard of the abandoned Hadassah compound (but it was never used). Likewise, enormous supplies of fuel were laid in for refuelling tanks - the fuel estensibly being sent up for the hill's "We had electrical generator. enough weapons up there for more than a battalion and enough ammunition for a division," Barukh Waldman, who was for a ong time in charge of supplies at the Schneller end.

Known to even fewer men was a secret communications device variously described as using laser or infra-red rays which had been developed late in World War II by Germany and which permitted direct line-of-sight radio communication between Scopus and Schneller that was impossible for anyone to overhear. A special room atop the Schneller headquarters building, with a window facing towards Scopus, was set aside for this device, which still bore a Nazi swastika when it arrived. Even ranking officers were barred from that room.

The line-of-sight between Scopus and Schneller, three kilometres apart, was also utilized in another way for communication. Two 200-watt bulbs above Schneller headquarters would be switched on and off whenever headquarters had a communication for Scopus outside normal listening hours. Lookouts on Scopus with powerful telescopes which had a magnifying power of 80 could easily see this signal.

TO THE PERMANENT staff, Scopus duty was a rich experience filled with responsibility, secrets and the feeling that the garrison was fulfill-ing a vital national role. "Anything that entered Arab Jerusalem we would see and report," says Stern.

But for the reservists it was a claustrophobic experience which passed with agonizing slowness. The hill was divided into five sectors and the men were housed in the hospital or university buildings, sleeping on old hospital beds.

The principal task was guard duty at night. The men would either serve in fixed positions or engaged in foot patrols. A major task of the latter was to make sure that the former stayed awake. The exposed position of Scopus makes it a cold place to pass a winter's night out of doors. A favoured position was the one overlooking the Arab village of Issawiya, abbutting the Scopus perimeter on the east. Here, at least, the guards could find something of interest in village life and follow festive celebrations. On the opposite slope, the windows of the Palace Hotel on the approaches to Augusta Victoria also offered targets of opportunity for bored soldiers using binoculars.

Periodically over the years, boredom would give way to tension and to shooting incidents. In 1958, four men on patrol through the botanical garden were killed by Jordanian fire. A UN officer who attempted to extricate them was also killed.

Sometime in the late 1950s, two reservists driven to distraction by their confinement reportedly slipped off the hill one evening and made their way through the minefield on a cleared path, passing without detec tion through the Jordanian streets they crossed no-man's land and got to the Zion Cinema in downtown Israeli Jerusalem in time for the second showing. They then made their way back to the hill the same night.

Although the story sounds aporryphal, many of the senior Scopus veterans insist that it is true. "I saw the movie tickets they brought back with them to prove it to their friends," says Stern. The pair were reportedly shipped off the hill with the next convoy, sentenced to several weeks in military jail, and then sent back up to Scopus to finish their allotted reserve time

One Friday night, a woman was spotted walking casually through one of the buildings. This is God's house, isn't it?" she asked of the astounded soldier who stopped her The UN was invited to escort her off The woman was identified as a mentally disturbed Christian lady living in Wadi Joz, at the foot of the hill. She had somehow made her way through the minefields without in


To compensate somewhat for the isolation, the garrison was provided with abundant food well prepared by a civilian cook working on Scopus for the army. A civilian baker also provided fresh bread every day. The convoys brought up movie reels which were shown twice a week with Hebrew subtitles hand cranked separately onto the screen, more or less simultaneously, depending on the operators' knowledge of the language spoken. The abandoned university's sports facilities were avail able for those who wanted to play basketball or soccer. Other morale boosters in those pre-television days were a ping-pong table, a well-stocked Shekem canteen and an army library. The National Library on Scopus - which had been the main library in the country - was strictly off-limits to the soldiers, as were most of the university and hospital facilities. These two institutions, in fact, each maintained a watchman on Scopus to guard against the army guarding them.

SCOPUS - the Greek word for look out - indeed served as an important Israeli intelligence periscope. Care ful logs were kept of all military vehicles entering Jordanian Jeru salem from the main roads to the east and north and reported in code to Schneller.

The Jordanians were apparently unaware of the steady accretion of Israeli armaments on the hill. In 1958, following the wounding of an Israeli soldier on patrol, the command on Scopus decided to tap into a telephone wire seen leading from the Jordanian position that had done the firing and the Jordanian command post in Augusta Victoria.

Permission for the operation was granted by the commander of the

Jerusalem Brigade in Schneller, Aluf-mishne Matityahu Peled, who is now seeking to run for the Knesset on a Jewish-Arab list. A patrol made its way through the minefield at night and linked in to the Arab line. A few nights later, the Israelis staged a routine drill of manning all positions on the hill's perimeter. The listener on the tap heard a forward Jordanian observer reporting with some alarm to his commander that il yahud (the Jews) were taking up firing positions. "Don't worry," the commander assured him, "all they can put into them are brooms and hoes."

On the eve of the Six Day War, the garrison began moving its most modern weaponry into those positions. King of the Mountain was Menahem Scharfmann, a moustachioed regular army officer from Haifa who had been on the hill two years. As tension mounted, he received permission from Schneller to place 700 additional mines on the Scopus approaches. The cries of "Slaughter the Jews" could be heard rising from mosque loudspeakers in the Arab city and a friendly UN officer asked Scharfmann if he would consider evacuation of the hill in view of the fate that would befall the garrison if war broke out. "If war breaks out, we'll be in Jericho in two days," Scharfmann replied.

Less confident was the commander of the central front, Aluf Uzi Narkiss. "Scopus is a big hill and despite all the fortifications that had been made over the years, the garrison couldn't stand against a serious attack with tanks," said Narkiss recently. "There was a real danger of such an attack. I wasn't afraid of

Jerusalem falling but I was afraid for Scopus."

When then defence minister Moshe Dayan came to visit Narkiss at his advance command post at the Kastel, at the opening of the war, the latter asked what forces would be available if the Jordanians launched a major attack on Scopus. Dayan told him he would have to grit his teeth because no forces could be spared until the main encounter with the Egyptians in the south had been decided.

In the opening hours of the war, Jordan Radio announced the capture of Scopus. No attack had been launched but the broadcast seemed a clear indication of intent.

Narkiss' strategy in the battle for Jerusalem was based on his determination to save Scopus. Thus, the 10th Armoured Brigade was sent on a flanking movement to the north of Jerusalem in order to reach the Scopus approaches before a Jordanian armoured brigade arrived in Jerusalem from the Jordan Valley. When the paratroop brigade commanded by Motta Gur arrived in Jerusalem on the first night of the war, its primary objective was not to reach the Old City but to link up to Scopus via Sheikh Jarrah and Wadi Joz.

In the opening hours of the battle, heavy fire was opened on Scopus from French Hill and Augusta Victoria and from artillery batteries in the Hizme area. The hill provided adequate cover and no one was hit. During the night, the roar of tanks could be heard rising up from the Judean Desert to the east where Jordanian armour was coming up the Jericho road. Following the report of the movement from Scopus, Israeli aircraft rocketed the tank convov



Royall said the amount he asked was for minimum needs, and would the "year ending June 30, 1948."

"This is a thought-provoking amount, yet a careful study of our task has convinced me it is a neces-sary sum," Royall told the Senate Appropriations Committee

Of the amount requested, Royall said the \$237,000,000 was required because the British were unable to maintain their payments of one half the cost of occupying Germany,

The remainder was needed because of many factors, principally the "devastating drought in Germany and considerable crop damage

Your street car conductor might be batty but the chances are he'll never be locked up.

"Eight hundred thousand insane people are in institutions," the psychiatrist went on, "but 8,000,000 more are on the loose wandering the streets.

"That's because unless a psy-choneurotic becomes violent, his

family and friends just consider him a harmless eccentric and let it go at that."

But a lot of them should be in padded cells. Many of these people, the doctor explained, are responsible for driving accidents, robberies—and murder,

beries—and murder.

How do you go about spotting a guy with a screw loose? If the fellow sitting next to you looks depressed, chances are he might be suffering from metancholla. But if he's cheerful, happy, and has a sense of humor he's not normal either. Probably a victim of brain paralysis.

But there's one bit of cheer. Most nuis think they're right and everyone else is wrong.

Complains of Duty Charged on Personal Gift

Approximately six weeks ago I mailed a wedding gift to my brother-in-law in the U.S. To that package I had attached WD AGO Form 156, and to my knowledge it was filled out correctly.

When my brother-in-law received the gift he had to pay a duty of \$2.70. I purchased the gift in Paris for 700 French francs and stated so on the Form 150.

I have been unable to find anyone who can explain why there was a customs tax on the gift. As I understand it, a member of the Armed Forces may send a gift duty free if it is valued at \$50 or less.

An explanation of this may enable others to avoid the embarrass-ment of forcing their friends or relatives to contribute towards the payment for their own gifts.—Captain, APO 173





Similarly, if their pre-Nazi owners resided in Germany, there is no provision for restlings.



Between 1944 and 1948 some 200,000 survivors left Europe for Palestine, then a British Mandate. Incredibly, the killing of Jews had continued in Poland for more than two years after Germany's surrender (opposite). It was this Polish anti-semitic violence that gave a strong impetus to the 'Bricha', or flight of the Jews to Palestine. Thus, after the killing of two young Jews in Biala Podlaska, all 30 survivors left. In Lublin, Leon Felhendler, one of the leaders of the Sobibor revolt (page 173), was likewise killed; also killed in Lublin, on 19 March

1946, was Chaim Hirschmann, one of only two survivors of Belzec death camp.

The flight to Palestine gained its culminating force with a pogrom in Kielce in which 41 Jews were killed. But the 'Bricha' itself had begun with each region's liberation Thus, shortly after the liberation of Vilna, Dov Levin, a young Jew from Kovno who had fought with the Soviet partisans, embarked on a typical, but nevertheless remarkable journey (above). The war ended while Levin was in Bucharest. But he continued his journey to Palestine.

Rabbi Friedman Is Lauded For German Morale Work

High tribute to the work of Rabbi Herbert Friedman, on leave from Temple Emanuel to work with Jewish displaced persons in Frankfurt, Germany, was paid in a letter received by Henry Winter from I. L. Kenan, executive secretary of the American Jewish Conference.

Rabbi Friedman is acting as aide to Rabbi Philip Bernstein, civilian adviser to General McNarney, on Jewish affairs.

Jewish affairs.

"What impressed me most about Rabbi Friedman was the way in which he had dedicated himself to his task, his love for his work and his affection for the people whose lives he is helping to rebuild," Kenan wrote.

He described a visit with the Denver rabbi to a camp in Ziegenheim, where thousands of Jews newly come from Poland were living under "the most impossible conditions."

"We all experienced a sense of helplessness because we came empty-handed," Kenan said. "We brought merely sympathy and greetings from America. It was Chaplain Friedman who was equal to the task. He was spokesman for all of us.

"For some 15 minutes he told them what they wanted to hear. He lifted their morale, encouraged them, gave them grounds for hope, instilled them with a desire for seld-help and made them proud of their determination. What he said could not have been said better."

Kenan added that, having come to know his capacity for leadership

and inspiration, he knew that Rabbi Friedman must be greatly missed by his congregation.

I am taking the liberty of returning to you herewith the letters from the congregation, from Rachel Schwartz, Governor Vivian, Mayor Stapleton and from Charlie Rosenbaum, which you returned to me some time ago.

With no attempt to persuade or dissuade you in any manner, I am doing this simply with the thought that if you should at any time change your mind and feel that it was proper to make use of them, I wished you to have them in your possession for that purpose at that time.

I am in receipt of a reply from Rabbi Granison, in which he fails to offer any suggestion as to steps which might be taken in this country. Needless to say, I have made inquiries of every available source and although I do not yet despair, I should advise you that as of this date I have found no encouraging leads.

Two of our board members who are recently returned from service, George Seeman and Stanley Shubert, seem to disagree with your conclusions. I assume that you will hear from them directly, and so I will not attempt to state their theories, other than to mention that their Army experience seems to have taught them that there is nothing in any way improper about your making a request which is based not on your own wishes but upon the wishes of your congregation and community, as expressed in the enclosed letters.

I have told you before, and I repeat again that it is not my privilege nor my wish to dispute with you what you feel to be the right thing for you to do. This is and should be a matter for your judgment only. The thought occurs to me that in the event you should be returned, it is inconceivable that your post would remain vacant. Certainly someone else would be assigned to handle this same work.

I know that you are kept posted on events here, and I will not bore you with the details. We had quite a hectic

meeting last evening in which all of the members of the board let their hair down and tried their best to clarify the atmosphere by bringing differences out into the open. Where the attempt will lead no one knows, but the situation is definitely not healthy.

I have just heard a rumor that Elaine is leaving soon to join you. I hope with all my heart that the story is true, because I well know how much this would mean to you. Give her my very best regards, and as for yourself, be assured that we are all thinking of you constantly and sending you our very best.

Dear Rabbi Friedman:

The undersigned represent a Committee appointed by the Board of Trustees of Congregation Emanuel in Denver for the purpose of calling to your attention certain matters concerning your congregation which we feel warrant immediate action on your part.

At the time you expressed your feelings that your duty called you into service with our Armed Forces, your Board of Trustees unhesitatingly approved your request for a leave of absence. We have learned of the invaluable services you have rendered to our country, and we have been proud that you represented our congregation and that we have been able indirectly to render this contribution to our Nation. At the present time, however, certain conditions have developed which in the opinion of the Board of Trustees and of the committee writing this letter make it highly advisable, and, we feel, imperative, that you utilize the authority of War Department Circular 290, 22 September 1945, to initiate action for your immediate return to your pulpit in our congregation.

It is needless for us to explain to you the great importance which our religious school plays in the welfare of our congregation, our community, and in the proper development of our youth. During the years you spent as our Rabbi, the respect and affection in which you were held by the children of this religious school was one of the outstanding facts of your tenure of office. As a result of this respect and of your inspiring leadership, this school was well on its way to become one of the outstanding institutions of the country. Unfortunately, during your absence this condition has rapidly deteriorated. It is only fair to advise you that in several instances, particularly with reference to the upper classes, the condition in this school has been approaching a point of actual chaos and insubordination.



As you have been advised, one of our most outstanding teachers for these classes, Sara Fine, has recently passed away. Her untimely death has left a vacancy which is almost impossible to fill, and has further aggravated this difficult situation. We have hesitated until this time to advise you fully of the extremely poor health of the Sunday School Principal, Rachael Schwartz. Through perseverance and determination alone, she has continued to do her best to hold this school together until your return; but during recent months doctors' orders have made it impossible for her to spend the time required of her, and it is extremely doubtful that we will be able to look forward to continued service from her such as is necessitated by your absence.

Your temporary replacement, Bernard Baskin, has unquestionably done his very best, but he has not yet completed his studies and naturally cannot operate the school as efficiently as an experienced educator. We do not criticize his efforts; we mention this only to emphasize the immediate urgency of your return prior to the commencement of the next religious school year.

Rabbi Bernard Baskin was released from his studies originally upon an agreement that he would return by June of 1946 for his last year of Rabbinical training. Because of our critical need, the Jewish Institute of Religion has been kind enough to permit him to remain with us temporarily for a short extension of time. Actually, our agreement with the Institute has now expired, and it is impossible for us to know how long we will have any religious leader in our midst. We have made conscientious efforts to employ an ordained Rabbi to serve on an interim basis, and to that end had sent a delegation to a recent conference of rabbis in Cincinnati, with instructions to interview and if possible employ such a spiritual leader. This delegation has returned to Denver and has advised the Board of Trustees that this is impossible, and that no qualified interim replacement is available.

The Temple membership now comprises over 600 families, representing considerably more than 2000 members of this community. Our religious school alone now has an enrollment in excess of 350 students. It is essential that this large community have competent spiritual leadership and guidance. As you know, this is the largest, and for 50 years has been the leading Reform Jewish congregation between Kansas City and the Pacific Coast. Leadership must originate from this, the leading congregation. In these critical days, the long expected surge of racial and religious prejudice which seems to

arise naturally at the end of a world conflict makes more important than ever the assertion of such proper leadership for the best interests not only of our own congregation but for that of the community as a whole.

As we stated at the outset, it was our preference to accede to your request to volunteer for service to our government. We have purposely delayed until the last possible moment forwarding the present request to you, because we are cognizant of the importance of your present duties and of the need of those whom you are now serving. However, because of the reasons we have mentioned, we feel it imperative to request you now to take such steps as may be possible to insure your return to your congregation no later than the early part of September, so that you will be able to prepare for the High Holy Days and the opening of the next religious school year.

As principal of and teacher in the Religious School in Temple Emanuel for over forty-five years, may I indicate to you the desperate need for your early return to take charge of the Religious School.

Our school is growing and now has an enrollment in excess of three hundred and fifty children, excluding the youth group, and is doing a fine piece of work in religious education and character building.

Due to the tragic death of Sara Fine, teacher of our highest classes, three weeks ago; the fact that another teacher is to have a baby in about six weeks and will not be able to continue teaching; and that Mrs. Joseph Friedland, a very able instructor, cannot continue her work as she must assist her husband who recently returned from overseas serivce, in his medical office, we are badly handicapped.

As principal and teacher my position has been most difficult and arduous without your invaluable guidance and help. I have been struggling to continue this most important work against the advice of my physician, and in the face of a serious physical difficulty, rheumatoid arthritis, so crippling and painful that the effort taxes me to the limit.

Having served the school for forty-five years I am deeply aware of the value of the work being done and the tremendous need of just such education for our youth in America. Were this need at present not so great this request would not be made.

I am asking on behalf of the Allied Jewish Council and its numerous affiliated agencies that you call the attention of your Commanding Officer to the need for your presence here prior to the Fall of 1946 so that you can throw the weight of your personality into this great humanitarian undertaking.

Returned from Poland few weeks ago. Jews there in panic.
Average of three killed daily. Roads caaged with refugees fleeing toward US Zone Germany for safety. Have seen with own eyes three sick hungry Jews shoving a cross border. Now coming in at rate of 1000 daily. Have personally accompanied refugee trains from Austria here. DP camps in Germany badly overcrowded. New tent camps being established. Have great fears for coming winter. Tent camps have no heating. Food is short. Army has been doing wonderful job but budget and personnel have been cut. American Jews must absolutely give as never before. Events here are beyond imagination. As your rabbi and one who has spent almost whole year working here I say one word. Please.

Dear friends,

I wish I could be with you to tell you att-the the whole story of what has been happening here - tell it to you so that you could actually feel the pain and anguish, and the yearnings and frustrations of the Jews in Europe, but that is not possible, so this is the next best way. I'm going to talk fast, so please listen hard, and try to let my words sink deep into your heartts.

Almost a year ago, when I came here, there were about 30 or 40 thousands Jews living in DP camps. They were the remnant left over from the concentration camps, the ones who were liberated by the victorious Allied armies. They came out of the Dachau and Buchenwald as skeletons, and feel in the streets outside of the gates. They were gathered in DP centers, and slowly brought back to life. You know that whole story - you've seen the pictures.

But then something else began to happen. We noticed that the Jewish DP population began to increase. Where were all these extra people coming from? Gradually it-b the picture became clearer and clearer. There was a mass migration taking place - Jews were moving out of Poland, at first slowly then faster and faster - gathering speed, momentum, until at last it became a regular flood. Today there are not 30 but be hundred and 30 thausand Jewish refugees crowded into the American Zone of Germany.

what's the story? what was happening inside Poland to cause this flow? Mabbi pernstein, of mochester, had come overseas to be General McNarney's Advisor on Jewish Affairs. Rabbi Bernstein and I went to Poland the last week in July, just after the Kielce pogrom, to find out what was causing the exodus, to get the answer if we could.

We learned that a terrible struggle was taking place there, in which Jews were caught in the middle between various contending forces. Jews were being murdered steadily at the average rate of 2 to 3 each day. Killing was taking place all over the land. People never went out after dark. Large-bleeks-ef-houses-is-which-Jews The Jews had armed themselves and armed guards stood around Jewish houses. People were being dragged off trains and busses and asked to show their papers. Men were forced, at the point of a gun, to take off their clothing, so that it could be seen whether they were Jewish or not. This is not a pleasant thing for me to tell you, but it's true, and I want you to know it.

The Polish government is trying its best to stop this campaign of terror and murder, has issued a law making anti-semitism illegal, but it doesn't help. We talked with the prime minister and are convinced of the good will of the government, but the murdering in the villages and the woods continues.

That is why Polish Jews are running. They are running for their very lives. There was an actual state of panic and hysteria. It was Hitler all over again. My God, but it was sickening to see the fear

and terror in their eyes.

Rabbi Bernstein and I stood there in a little town on the Polish-Czechoslovak border one night, and watched a group as they made ready to cross the border. They fought and clawed to get a place in the truck. A little baby started wailing in the pitch darkness. More and more people tried to crowd in - nobody wanted to be left behind. Baggage was thrown out to make room for people. A woman cried out. Off they went, absolutely empty-handed, into the uncertain unknown future - perhaps to jail if they were caught trying to make the illegal crossing; The best they had to hope for was some DP camp in Germany, if they could get that far. But they were going anyhow, because they couldn't stay in Poland.

Central Constitution

They have been coming in now at the rate of 1000 daily. They make the last leg of the journey under the auspices of the army. They travel in cattle cars or box cars from Austr Salzburgato any camp in Germany where there is room. I have travelled with them on one of those trains. Have you ever travelled three days in a box car? There are no seats - everyone is on the floor. There is no hot food - a piece of cheese or bread makes a meal. The JDC has a station set up at the Austrian border, where hot water or hot chocalet can be given the children, but that's all. There is no time - another thousand are right behind.

The Army has set up tent camps for these infiltrees. Some 10000 are living now in these tent cities. There are no floors to the tents, no stoves, just six cots, nothing else. There are 30 outdoor latrines for one camp of 2000 people. No water, except one cup each day for drinking.

The Army cannot be blamed for this - they are doing the very best they can, under the pressure of this what amounts to a mass shift of population from one country to another. They are trying to move the people out of the tent cities as soon as possible into more permanent camps. But the army is short of personnel for this work, and in addition the budget has just been severly cut by congressional action, so that the army is going to be handicapped in the future. They are going to do the best they can, and-have-already as they have in the past, but a load is going to fall on you, the American Jewish community 10 times heavier than any responsibility you have evr been asked to bear before.

With this new group of infiltrees from Poland, we are right back where we were a year ago, with the concentration camp victims. We're right back to the basic problems of food and clothing and housing, again. That means money. The Joint Distrbiution Committee must have behind it a ceaseless flow of money, which is poured out like water to keep Jews alive. The problem is just as simple as that.

All the Jewish money in Denver won't put a smile back on the face of the woman I saw in Lodz whose husband was shot and whose body was trampled on before her eyes. All your kindness and-desire-te-help willingness to help your Jewish brethren won't erase the pain and sadness from their memories.

But your funds will get the feed-an canned milk and the stockings, and the bread and the underwear which are needed here. This much you can do. I'm not going to beg for those sitting so hopelessly in the DP camps - they wouldn't either. I'm not going to degrade them by stretching out a pleading hand to the rich American uncle.

All I am saying to you in these few words is that Jews over here are in desperate, desperate need. If you want to help, you have your chance now.

Dear friends.

Since I wrote you last, at Confirmation time, the summer has slipped by and many, many things have happened. Perhaps, the most notable of those was the trip I sade to Poland as side to Pabbi Philip S. Bernstein.
Rabbi Bernstein occupies a very important position here in Europe as the Special Advisor on Jewish Affairs to General McNarney, Commanding General of the European Theater.

Rabbi Bernstein went to Poland a week after the Kielce pogram in which forty-two Jews were murdered, as you will recall. General McMarney wanted a first-hand report from his Jewish Adviser in order to have a clear picture of what was happening inside Poland. Pubbi Bernstein asked me to accompany him on this trip as his aide.

The Polish mission was one of the most exciting things that ever happened to me. We flow from herlin to Eureaw on the American Embessy plane. As much as I have ever written to you about the destruction of German cities, and Barlin in particular, I find it impossible to describe what Marsaw looks like. Marsaw makes Berlin seem like Denver. The city is pitiful and pathetic in the makedness of its destruction. There is such an absolute lack of any facilities whatsoever that the American Embassy considered it a great triumph to have secured for us two beds in the Hotel Polonia. This hotel is absolutely faccinating in the type of people accommodated there. It is full of international correspondents, Russian officers, UMPRA workers from all over the world, Jews, Americans, French and British. The Hotel Polonia in and of itself would make a wonderful plot for an international apy movie.

In Wareaw we had two long conversations with the American Ambassador, The Honorable Arthur Bliss lane. He was well informed and gave us much background material on the internal political situation and the effect which this has on the Jewish population. The Polish government, leftist in character, is trying most desperately with all of its energies to step the terrorizing and daily murdering of Jews which is taking place in that unfortunate land. He spoke with the Prime Minister of Poland, her. Edward Osobka-Moraweki, as well as many lesser officials, and he explained to us that there is a large underground movement, seeking to overthrow the government, which is using Jew-baiting in the same manner that Hitler did when he sought to take over control of Germany. This underground coalition consists of Passists, Bussia-beters and similar groups. Their

explanation is that the Jews are running the present "Communist" Warsaw government; the great bulk of the people hate this government; therefore, we'll marder the Jews and overthrow the government. The fact that
there are only three Jewish ministers out of a total of seventy odd
doesn't embarrass them in their propagands. They don't rely on the truth,
of course.

Jews are being killed in Poland at the average rate of three per day.

More than one thousand Jews have been killed, according to official government figures, since the end of the war in Europe fifteen months ago. You can just imagine the state of punic that prevails among the Jews of Poland today. We found the Jewish communities all over Poland in a state of near-hystoria. They are leaving their homes, their shops, the little stores that some of them managed to acquire since the defeat of Fitler . Jews are leaving Poland and running, running.

I can't begin to describe in detail all the things we saw, the hundreds of people with whom we spoke, the places we visited. Sabbi Bernstein has written a detailed report of this trip to Poland, which is classified by the Army as a secret document, and it is being distributed only in the highest State Department and military offices. The one inescapable conclusion he reached was that approximately sixty thousand Jevs might be expected to be fleeing from Poland within the next three months. Be transmitted this conclusion to General hollarney with the advice that the United States Zone of Germany should expect to receive this number of refugees, fleeing for their lives from Poland. Ceneral McMarney as cepted this recommendation and agreed to give haven to the people who some streaming across the borders.

And, so, Germany today is in a state of turnoil and confusion, with the Army trying to make place to absorb this flood of poor, miserable, terror-stricken Jews. New DP camps are being opened every day, train-loads of a thousand people each have been pouring in from Austria during the last ten days.

But to return to Poland. We went from Warraw to Lodz, where we saw the leaders of the various Jawish groups, ranging all the way from the right wing religious groups to the left wing workers groups. We saw their faces, beggerd from the long trip many of them had made when they were repatriated from the depth of Russia several months ago. We listened to their pleas and added up the sum total of their stories.

From Lods we went by Polish plans to lower Eilesis where there is a concentration of some eighty thousand Jews. We were taken to the Edigh-Czechoslovak border where, one night, we see hundreds of infiltrees streaming across the border without baggage, without papers, in a sad flight to safety. It was hearthreaking and nerve-wracking to witness the indignity of this flight. Harassed and hounded, these people, the few survivors of the long terrible years under Eitler, Mc. again found thouselves insecure, frightened, in danger of their lives - and once again assuming the role of the ever-wardering Jew.

We flew back to Warsaw and, before leaving Foland, visited the Warsaw Chetto for a second time. Bear friends, anything you may have beard or read about what happened in the Marsaw Chetto is baby-talk compared to the sinking feeling in the pit of the storneh which comes to one who stands on the bricks and actually looks at the square mile where half a million Jews met their death. In the spring of 1943, just about Passover time, the Germans started exploding the Chetto. They exploded one house at a time, methodically and deliberately. After one house had been blown up and the debris had ceased to fly, they moved next door and blow up the second house. If the people inside did not know that the house was being mined, they were blown sky-high with it. If they did know, they fled from the doomed building and doubled up with other families elsewhere. The exploding went on day and night for six weeks, with the Germans gradually closing in toward the center of the Chetto. The last group of houses was mined, the plungers were pushed down, and the last 25,000 Jews, caught in the closed circle as in a rat trap, were buried under the rubble.

The Shetto today consists of one squere mile of loose bricks, piled about ten feet high above the street, with some needs beginning already to grow out of the maked brick. It's terrible how quickly the jungle claims that which is deed and pulverized. There are two buildings still standing, to be seen as one gazes across the level brick plateau. One is a price building, in the courtyard of which are still to be seen human ashes and bone, and the second is a church, one wall blown out, looking mutely over the Chetto as it rebuking the Christian world which did nothing to stop this tragedy.

After returning from Poland, Rabbi Bernstein asked me if I would come to his office at headquarters in Frankfurt to serve as his side. I agreed, thrilled and honored at the invitation to work with him on his level, which is the very top level in the Army. It meant leaving Perlin, to which I had become very much attached - leaving the BP camp with those leaders and population I had become intimate. I stayed in Berlin long enough to help organize and set into operation a second camp, which we were forced to open because the flood of infiltrees from Poland was beginning to arrive in large numbers. Berlin now has a population of 10,000 Jewish DPs, compared to the 1,200 it had ten short weeks ago. By successor in Berlin is Chaplain Mayer Abramovitz, whose civilian congregation was in Montreel and with whom I had come overses lest fall. "Mike" and I have come to be excellent friends, and I was happy to turn Berlin over to him, for I knew his spirit, enthusiasm and shility.

I have been with Pabbi Bernstein in Frankfurt now for some two weeks.
This office operates on a policy-making level. I can now see the total
DP picture in Germany. Memoranda and directives are suggested by this
office to General McMerney bimself, and policy is set throughout the whole
Theater as a result. For example, when the big flood started from Polend,
I was assigned the responsibility of mobilizing all the Jewish chaplains
in Germany, sending them to Austria to accompany the infiltree trains back

into the new EP camps being opened up here in Garmany. Here we work with maps and statistics. It is quite different from working out in the field directly with the EPs themselves, as I have done up to now, but, from another point of view, it provides an even greater opportunity for service because I can see the results of my work on a broader level than simply in one city or in a few camps.

last week we received a delegation of five leaders of the American Jewish community who came to Frankfurt to pay their respects to Separal McMarney and to express their thanks to him for his sympathetic handling of the DP problem. Dr. Stephen S. Wise, whom we in Denver certainly remember, was the leader of the delegation, representing the World Jewish Congress, and accompanying him were Dr. Maham Goldmann of the Jewish Agency for Pelestine and one representative each from the American Jewish Conference, the American Jawish Cosmittee, and the American Joint Distribution Cosmittee. Together with Babbi Bernstein, these five men had a conference with General McMainey, following which a luncheon was tendered them. At the table were all the top generals of Europe - I never saw so many stars outside of heaven before. You must understand the Army to supreclate has a paltry little first lieutepant felt at that table. I was like a saud-lot bell player who suddenly finds himself in the Big Isagne. But these are the people with whom Pabbi Bernstein associates, and I suppose I shall have to get used to it.

In the midst of the daily tension here in this office, I have had little time to think about the approaching high Roly Days. Rosh Hashonah has always been, to me, a favorite holiday on the Jewish calendar, because of its message. Rosh Hashonah preaches a sermon of hope and strong optimism. At the time of the blowing of the Madfar, we recite the prayers which say that God really is the Ming of the universe and that some day mankind really will be united into one happy, peacoful family. We repeat and repeat these prayers on Rosh Hashonan Day, seeking to strengthen our faith that this Messianic dream will come to pass.

You might think that those of us working over here, suid sorrow and suffering, would tend to take those Bosh Pashonah hopes rather cynically. You might think, especially, that the PPs themselves, homeless, without future, living on a sarginal standard, would be the first to be bitter and disillusioned.

Deer friends, the opposite is true - the exact opposite. The Jewish DPs in Germany today have a strength of spirit, a measure of courage which I have never seen anywhere clas. They sing songs, fiercely and proudly - they resisture themselves by every means possible that they will not be forgotten, that they will eventually be resettled in a home of their own. I tell you that, no matter how much any of us give to them in the way of our efforts, we receive tenfold more. They understand, better than any of us, the inner meaning of the Rosh Bashonah message, and I hope to be able to transmit to you some of the fire and spirit which I have captured from them.

May the year 5707 bring you strength and happiness and a deep thankfulness that you are in a position to help with all your resources those who are greeting this Rosh Hashomah in the barracks-symmgogues of the DP camps.

THE SILENCE AT BABENHAUSEN
by Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman
Exec. Vice Chairman, United Jewish Appeal

On the morning of October 1, 1946, I stood at a railroad siding at Babenhausen, near Frankfort in Germany, faced by a trainload of silence. Peering fearfully and questioningly out of the boxcars of the train were 1200 infiltrees from Poland.

My assignment, from the office of the Advisor on Jewish Affairs to the European

Theater Commander, was to persuade them to enter the improvised DP camp at Babenhausen.

Baily trainleads of infiltrees were arriving in the U.S. some in Germany from Salsburg in those days. After the violent 4 July 1946 pogrom in Kielce, Poland, appeals had been made to General Clay and President Truman to allow panic-stricken Polish Jews to cross into the U.S. some in Austria. Down the chain of command, the word had gone out: the border is green. The infiltration went on steadily all summer. Dosens of Jewish chaplains were recruited and assigned to escort the incoming trainloads. Almost as fast as camps could be opened, they were filled. Babenhausen, a former PW enclosure, was the latest... and at Babenhausen, the infiltrees were balking.

For these travel-weary Jews who had crossed two borders hoping for better things, the prospect at Babenhausen was foreboding: an area of tents, a cluster of stark and severe stables furnished only with three-tiered PW bunks... and, hardest of all to smallow, yards of barbed wire. The eyes steadily staring above grimly-set mouths in the train on the siding were eloquent with arguments I was to hear constantly for forty-eight hours: "The Germans packed us in box-cars and brought us to barbed wire camps, toe... the Poles wouldn't let us live... we're sick of being ordered around by men in uniform... tired of being kicked around... conditions in the American some should be better than this... how can our youngsters and pregnant women live in such a place... did we flee for our lives... for this?"

This was the kind of deeply-ingrained distrust and bitterness which could

to open riot — a riot nobody wanted. The Army could not and would not "get tough" with these recalcitrant victims of history. For their part, they instinctively felt the compassion and good will of the American Army. But, having yielded to outrage for so long, they would not now willingly submit to what looked like more indignity — even from Americans...

In this delicate crosspatch of emotions, my position — as a Jew and as an officer in the American Army — was equivocal. I could not seem to be throwing my uniformed weight around to force them to move — but I could not let them stay where they were. My sympathy for their plight must be clear to them — but must not reinforce their stubbornness and inaction...

All this charged the silence in which I was standing that early October morning at Babenhausen. But although the situation was obviously critical and explosive, I was sure it was not hopeless. A heartening precedent had been set the day before, when a previous trainload of infiltrees had arrived at Babenhausen. Daylong pleading at a microphone by two Third Army chaplains — Captain Herman Dicker, a rabbi, and Lt. Col. Edward Martin, a Catholic priest — and by Captain Abraham S. Hyman, legal consultant to the Advisor on Jewish Affairs had persuaded all but a handful of them to enter the camp...

Hepefully, therefore, I made the rounds of the boxcars, accompanied by two Area DP officers, Lt. Col. Leller and Lt. Gol. Manner. We tried our best to persuade the new arrivals that, while accommodations at Babenhausen were far from perfect, the Army which had accepted their technically illegal infiltration and was providing a haven for them would do all in its power to improve conditions as soon as possible. The faces listening to us remained impassive for the most part. When they spoke, it was to voice their catalogue of bitterness, or to ask:

"Will we be stuck here — or will you help us get to Palestine?"

Obviously unable to give guarantees about Palestine, we managed to convince only 120 people to move into camp before nightfall. At 7:30 P.M., I took to the microphone to renew my pleas.

"What choice do you have?" I asked them frankly. "Can you live on the train? Do you want to go back to Peland? What choice do you have?" This was the logic, I assume, which mitimately solved the impasse — but that first night they would not let it move them. When I left the microphone, not a single other infiltree had stepped down from the train. I slept fitfully in the camp that night.

Through the early morning hours of the next day, Oct. 2, the anguished suspense went on. Since that day, I have stood at countless other misrophones facing many other assemblies, but no other speaking situation I have been in has appreached it for tension, anxiety or the scope of what was at stake. For the sake of the drama of this soccunt, it would be fitting to report that the back of the resistance was broken by some momentous event, some single bold stroke by the persuaders. Actually, it was a series of things which finally succeeded in emptying the train and filling the camp.

First, a group I organised of about a hundred inhabitants of the camp came out to persuade their new comrades that the camp could be made livable; they took several hundred back inside the gates with them. Later, Rabbi Schechter of the <u>Vand Hatsala</u> persuaded another hundred or two among the orthodox on the train to debark. And in mid-afternoon Lt. Gen. Keyes, Commanding General of the Third Army, arrived and took the microphone. As I translated his words, sentence by sentence, for the people standing on the embankment in front of their train, they were more quiet and attentive than they had been all day. When he finished he drove into the camp... and behind him trudged most of the remaining infiltrees.

and and the state of the state

That was the end of the great DP silence at Babenhausen. At day's end, all but 105 were in the camp and most of those entered the next day when room was made for them, Of the 39 holdouts who left on the morning of October 3 for the Austrian border transient center at Freilassing, a majority eventually agreed to return to Babenhausen. All that day, personnel of the Army and of the American Joint Distribution Committee did a magnificent job of feeding, registering and billeting the DP's and daring for the sick among them. Morale sourced and the sounds of hope and busyness superseded the grim stillness of the previous 48 hours.

When I left at 10 PM that night to return to my other duties, everyone had a cot and a blanket and had been fed... and the camp was quiet once more. But this time it was a guietness born of comparative calances, not the heavy silence of disillusion and latent hysteria. The situation seemed stabilized...

But, as the days and weeks passed: wherever I went, I kept hearing the name "Babenhausen". Over-orowding at Babenhausen... not enough food — or cots — or medical supplies at Babenhausen... grievances and demonstrations at Babenhausen... growing restlessness at Babenhausen. The restlessness turned more and more on one persistent question: "When will we get to Palestine?"

Later in 1946 I was able to help supply them with an answer. David Ben-Gurion, then Chairman of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, was in Paris en route to Basle, Switzerland for the first World Zionist Congress since the start of the war. He wanted to see a DP camp — not a "model" one, but one in which he could see the true rough fiber of DP life. Inevitably, I took him to Babenhausen.

His appearance produced an electric wave of excitement in the packed camp.

They crowded around him, this dynamic white-haired man who was their link with
a history they thought had forgotten them. For the first time, there were smiles
inside the gates of Babenhausen. And then came the question: "When, Mr. Ben-Gurion?"

When will we get to Palestine?"

Hasenoke quietly but firely to them. "I come to you with empty pockets, I have no certificates for you. I can only tell you you are not abandoned, you are not alone, you will not live endlessly in camps like this. All of you who want to come to Palestine will be brought there as soon as it is humanly possible."

In this way, the people of Babenhausen finally understood that their unloved camp was not the end of the line but a way station on the road to freedom. The distrust and bitterness I had faced that day in October finally gave way to patient hope. Post-war Jewish history was proceeding once more along its true, though troubled, DP course.

Many of the men will be going home, no replacements are coming over, and so it is necessary to evaluate the whole picture and plan some shuffling, so that at least the most strategic places will have coverage. My guess is that within the next 90 days, several of the men will be going home which may leave us with a total force of eight or nine chaplains at most. Rabbi Bernstein's son Steven is going to be Bar Mitzvahed here next Saturday, 25 January. This is the first Bar Mitsvah to be held in Frankfurt in over six years. The remnant of the German Jewish community together with a large segment of the DP population is planning to attend the ceremony which will really have historical significance. General Mc Narney is also planning to attend. Since most of the chaplains scattered a ound Germany and Austria are coming to the Bar Mitzvah, we have called a chaplain's conference to be held the following day in order to determine what is going to happen during the next few months. Many of the men will be going home, no replacements are coming over, and so it is necessary to evaluate the whole picture and plan some shuffling, so that at least the most strategic places will have coverage. My guess is that within the next 90 days, several of the men will be going home which

may leave us with a total force of eight or nine chaplains at most.

I think that is about all, Sam -- will try to get the next long news letter out as quickly as possible. Elsine sends her fondest regards.

In the passage from the Holy Scripture which has just been read we found those most famous lines, "Thou shalt not hate thy brother in thy heart, but thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

I should/to tell you the story this morning of a man who practiced that Biblical edict more faithfully and more sincerely than any man I have ever known. It is the story of Father Andre, a Catholic priest, in the little town of Namur, Belgium, and it took place during the years when the brutal armies of Hitler occupied that courageous little country of Belgium.

The story begins with a tired little man with the name of Mensieur Burauck, one of the few Jewish survivors of Nazi terrorism.

We met M. Burauck when we first were stationed in Namur and he very proudly took us to the dingy room behind an empty store where the synagogue was located. He showed us the treasures of the Holy Scrolls which had been saved from the Germans and as we looked about the room we noticed a very strange sight on one of the walls. There was a picture of a Catholic priest, around the frame of which was a faded garland of/flowers and underneath was the inscription "This man is one of the saints of the world".

It was indeed most unusual to find the picture of a Catholic Father on the wall of a Jewish synagogue and we inquired of M. Burauck as to the reason for this phenomenon. He bade us be seated and over a glass of tea told us the almost fabulous story.

Father Andre was the local parish priest of Namur. His parish house was located in the center of town right next door to the Hotel Horscamp. When the German armies overran Belgium in 1940, the Hotel Horscamp was requisition by the dreaded Gestapo, the German secret police, and used by them as headquarters. Approximately forty officers of the Gestapo lived and worked in that hotel and many

next door. In an effort to win his confidence and friendship they exchanged visits with him, inviting him to their quarters and in turn forced their presence upon him in his refectory. Father Andre permitted these intrusions and accepted their invitations for he had a very well hidden motive of his own. It can be told now that he was one of the leaders of the underground in that part of Belgium and so his apparent friendship with the Gestapo was a marvelous disguise for his real activities.

One of the most important aspects of the work of the underground was to help refugees escape from the clutches of the Nazi torturers. Father Andre's parish house became a way station on the underground railroad for people seeking escape from Europe. Under the very noses of his Gestapo neighbors Father Andred did give refuge and food to the terrified victimes who had been directed to the haven of his four walls.

It became his custom to shelter these persons in flight right in his own bedroom. Once he had twenty-two refugees in his house waiting for nightfall before they could move on to the next underground station.

Unexpectedly in the middle of the afternoon three of the Gestapo officers entered his house without warning, seeking a bottle of cool wine. With calm courage Father Andre stalled them at the entrance hall for those few precious seconds which would enable the refugees to hustle into his bedroom, and for an hour the three officers sat in his courtyard drinking the wine and he stayed with them occupying their attention so that they would not go wandering through the rest of the house for if they had found the luckless creatures it would not only have meant Father Andre's death, but the destruction of another link in the chain of underground workers who

were fighting for the freedom of mankind.

On another occasion, some months later, there were some fifteen officers sitting around the table in his dining room, carousing and drinking when a servant slipped up to him and whispered that there were five Jewish children waiting at the back door who would have to be smuggled into the house and kept over night before they could be passed on in safety. Father Andre excused himself from the table, brought those children through a corridor in the cellar, took them into his own bedroom where they found a few hours of surcease and reast and managed to fall asleep in spite of the drunken shouts of the Gestapo officers in the very next room.

When Belgium was at last liberated and the accursed Nazis were driven out, Father Andre could finally admit the work which he had been doing. After the secret was tabulated, it was found that he was personally responsible for having harbored in his own home over two hundred refugees, most of them children under the age of fifteen. Shortly after the end of the war Father Andre's birthday came around, and the little Jewish community of Namur who knew of his work, gathered together to think of what would be a suitable birthday present for him. The finally made their decision and one beautiful sunny morning they carried to his house on a cart their present. It was a new bed and in presenting it to him they explained that it was a symbol of their appreciation of the fact that for almost two years he had never slept in his own bed, but had always given his room to the refugees at the risk of his life. And now they felt that he should have a brand new bed to mark the coming era of freedom and peace.

As a final gesture they begged him for his photograph and placed it on the wall of their little synagogue. He came to the services the day that they hung that picture and as they thanked him with tears in their eyes for what he had done, he turned and said

that he had simply been doing the will of the Lord in helping his neighbors.

When M. Burauck finished his story, I had tears in my own eyes for to me it represents one of the most beautiful ideals which mankind has ever cherished - the ideal of true friendship and genuine brotherhood, A Catholic priest helping Jewish children escape from their Nazi tormentors.

If we did but learn the moral of this story we would carry over into peace time living what some people learn to do under the pressure of war time experiences. We would have Jew helping Catholic, white helping Negro, Protestant helping Spanish-American - with ultimately all these titles and designations disappearing and people just helping other people.

Working humbly in the spirit of the Lord, without hatred but only with love we can all be as fine as was Father Andre.

Dear Mr. Winters

Several weeks ago, in the company of Dr. Wise, Dr. Goldmann, Mr. Blaustein and Judge Forman, I was privileged to visit General McMarney in Frankfurt and to inspect some of the essembly centers for Javish displaced persons. Our hosts were Rabbi Philip Bernstein and Chaplain Herbert Freedman. I thought you might be interested in knowing something about the work that Rabbi Freedman is doing.

As you know, Rabbi Bernstein is civilian adviser to General McMarney on Jewish affairs. He has the rank of Major General, and an even higher rank in the opinion of the Army, which greatly respects his judgment and accords him generous cooperation. Rabbi Freedman acts as side to Rabbi Bernstein and is an extremely devoted and tiraless worker. He is an able executive and is responsible to a considerable extent for the success of Rabbi Bernstein's mission.

But what impressed me most about Pabbi Freedman is the way in which he has dedicated himself to his task, his love for his work, his affection for the people whose lives he is helping to rebuild.

This was apparent from the beginning, for he approached every task and problem with an intense seal, with high enthusiasm, and when we began our visits to the camps we discovered just how much this meant to the people there. We came to Ziegenheim one afternoon, and there we found thousands of Jews, newly come from Poland, living under the most impossible conditions. It was a new camp, opened in an emergency, to care for the new refugees. We were all deeply distressed by the conditions there and we all experienced a sense of helplessness because we came empty-handed. We brought no cortificates for Palestine, no visas for America. We brought no help. We brought merely sympathy and greating from America. And I for one felt inerticulate and helpless. While I thought before I came that I might have a word to say to these unfortunate people, I found it impossible. But soon we noticed that the refugees were not particularly interested in the American civilians. They were swarming about Habbi Freedman; he became the center of a huge crowd which followed him as we walked through the camp. Many of them remembered his from Berlin where he had greeted them a short time before upon their arrival from Poland. They plied him with questions -- he had an enswer and a sympathetic word for them all.

Since Chaplain Freedman does not know that I am writing to you, I am not in a position to transmit his New Years greetings to you, but I feel that I must write this letter nevertheless. Having come to know his capacity for leadership and inspiration, I am conscious that you and your fellow congregants must miss him greatly. If it is compensation, you have the assurance that he is performing a truly great service for his people, of which you may be deeply proud.

SUBJECT: Information to Be Read by Officers Prior to Start of Processing For Separation.

TO : All Concerned.

- 1. The following information is submitted for all officers to facilitate their compliance with all phases of separation requirements:
- a. Assignment to Roster: Each officer will be assigned to a roster, numbered according to date of completion of separation. Take your copy of this roster home with you and refer to same in event of communication with this Head-quarters. Groups are started twice daily.

b. Steps in separation processing are as follows:

(1) Screening: Officers separation orders checked for proper authority for separation and adequate copies of same.

(2) Compution of Terminal Leave: A maximum of 60 days terminal leave is authorized. Officers who carried 60 days accrued leave forward from 1 September 46 and have not taken leave since that date lose accrued leave in excess of 60 days, Ordinary leave cannot be granted an officer prior to separation once he has arrived at Separation Franch with proper orders for separation. An officer who has less than 60 days accrued leave will accrue leave on terminal leave at the rate of one day leave for each 11 days of terminal leave provided such accrual of leave does not extend his total terminal leave in excess of 60 days. Ordinary leave, delays en route, emergency leave, unless otherwise specified in orders, count as leave. Rest and Recuperation Leave, Convalescent or sick leave are not charged against an officer. Temporary duty, if specified in orders at "convenience of the government" is not charged as leave. An officer is responsible for keeping record of leave taken. Record of overseas service, dates of departure from and return to U.S. will be needed.

(3) Report of Separation: Information for Certificate of Service covering officers present tour of duty-date entered active duty as officer, etc., required.

(4) Appointments or Re-appointments in Officer' Reserve Corps:

(Male Officers Only). Officers desiring appointments in ORC are appointed at this headquarters on final day of processing in highest AUS grade, including terminal leave promotions if eligible for same (WD Circulars 140 and 270, 1946).

(5) Initial Finance: Forms including all information necessary to filing vouchers for terminal leave and final pay completed.

Information and procedures incident to filing claims for movement of household goods and dependents, per diem, claims for pay in bonds and cash for leave in excess of 60 days as of 1 Sept 46 (as Officer or EM) are given at this time.

(6) Classification and Counseling: Under supervision of Officer,
Separatees complete worksheet.for WD AGO Form 100, which gives
official summary of an officer's civilian and military education
and his civilian and military occupational specialties. Job
descriptions of his primary civilian occupations and his primary
military occupational specialty will be written. Officer gets
original copy of Form 100 on final day of processing. Duplicate copies are sent to Veteran's administration. If time permits, prior to processing, write brief outline of duties performed under your primary specialties, such as: Professional
Soldier, Lawyer, Physican, Murse, accountant (Civilian); and
Adjutant, Military Personnel Officer, Intelligence Officer
(Military). Questions regarding G. I. Bill, Income Tax,
Veterans' rights, etc., will be taken up at this time.

- h. Proper address for mail directed to Separation Branch: Commanding Officer, Headquarters Camp Kilmer, New Frunswick, New Jersey.

 ATTENTION: Officers Section, Separation Branch.
- i. Cooperation: Your promptness and complete cooperation with officers and enlisted personnel who assist you with separation procedures are requested. All phases in separation processing are required for all officers. Your failure to appear promptly at designated places in accordance with your processing schedule will result in your being scratched from roster, necessitating your repetition of phases completed. Flagrant violations will result in appropriate disciplinary action.

I. ACCRUED LEAVE.

- l. Under the Armed Forces Leave Act of 1946, each member of the Armed Forces shall be entitled to leave at the rate of 2½ calendar days for each month of active service, but not to exceed sixty calendar days continuous leave granted at any one time and that an individual may not accumulate in excess of sixty days leave subsequent to 31 August 1946.
- 2. It has come to the attention of this headquarters that personnel are reporting to Separation Centers claiming more than 60 days terminal leave. Personnel reporting to Separation venters are there for the purpose of separation and the granting of terminal leave to exceed 60 days is not authorized. No leave other than terminal leave will be granted by separation centers to separatees.
- 5. War Department has ruled that no authority exists whereby individuals returning from overseas for separation with excess accrued leave may be granted more than sixty days terminal leave.
- 4. Provisions of AR 600-115 as amended and War Department Circular 325, 1946 will govern in all cases. AHFKA

Dear Mr. Winter:

Several weeks ago, in the company of Dr. Wise, Dr. Goldmann, Mr. Blaustein and Judge Forman, I was privileged to visit General McNarney in Frankfurt and to inspect some of the assembly centers for Jewish displaced persons. Our hosts were Rabbi Philip Bernstein and Chaplain Herbert Freedman. I thought you might be interested in knowing something about the work that Rabbi Freedman is doing.

As you know, Rabbi Bernstein is civilian adviser to General McMarney on Jewish affairs. He has the rank of Major General, and an even higher rank in the opinion of the Army, which greatly respects his judgment and accords him generous cooperation. Rabbi Freedman acts as aide to Rabbi Bernstein and is an extremely devoted and tireless worker. He is an able executive and is responsible to a considerable extent for the success of Rabbi Bernstein's mission.

But what impressed me most about Rabbi Freedman is the way in which he has dedicated himself to his task, his love for his work, his affection for the people whose lives he is helping to rebuild.

This was apparent from the beginning, for he approached every task and problem with an intense seal, with high enthusiasm, and when we began our visits to the camps we discovered just how much this meant to the people there. We came to Ziegenheim one afternoon, and there we found thousands of Jews, newly come from Poland, living under the most impossible conditions. It was a new came, opened in an emergency, to care fot the new refugees. We were all deeply distressed by the conditions there and we all experienced a sense of helplessness because we came empty-handed. We brought no certificates for Palestine, no visas for America. We brought no help. We brought merely sympathy and greeting from America. And I for one felt inarticulate and helpless. While I thought before I came that I might have a word to say to these unfortunate people, I found it impossible. But soon we noticed that the refugees were not particularly interested in the American civilians. They were swarming about Rabbi Freedman; he became the center of a huge crowd which followed him as we walked through the camp. Many of them remembered him from Berlin where he had greeted them a short time before upon their arrival from Poland. They plied him with questions -- he had an answer and a sympathetic word for them all. Then we went to a large hall where the refugees were gathered to hear a word from America. It was Chaplain Freedman who was equal to the task. He was spokesman for all of us. For some fifteen minutes he told them what they wanted to hear. He lifted their morale, he encouraged them, he gave them grounds for hope, he instilled them with a desire for self-help, he made them proud of their determination for survival and reconstruction. I had the feeling that what he said could not have been said better. All of us told him so.

It was the same the following morning at Bensheim. Judge Forman, Mr. Blaustein and I were guided through the barracks of a former Nazi training school by UNRRA officials. Outside, in the courtyard, hundreds of refugees stood in rapt attention as Chaplain Freedman told them who we were, relayed our message and gave them hope, confidence and determination.

Since Chaplain Freedman does not know that I am writing to you, I am not in a position to transmit his New Years greetings to you, but I feel that I must write this letter nevertheless. Having come to know his capacity for leadership and inspiration, I am conscious that you and your fellow congregants must miss him greatly. If it is compensation, you have the assurance that he is performing a truly great service for his people, of which you may be deeply proud.

Dear Herb:

Today is exactly one month since our arrival in Sofia. It is only 17 the days that Pep and I have been alone with the operation; Manny Siegel, my predecessor, departed for home on Aug 1st. It is still much too early to be able to give you more than a series of first impressions. The situation here is made up of complex factors whose dynamic relationshops are still unknown to me. The conflicting groups, their strength and their real goals, as well as their respective relationships to one another and to the new communist government is something which time alone will make clear to me, if at all. The tempo of work is as unlike that of Berlin as Tel Aviv is from Transjordan. While I like the change I do miss the significant drama of our work in Germany.

There are approximately 50,000 Jews in Bulgaria, about 2000 of them Ashkenazim, the remainder Sephardim. They live in 34 communities thruout the country with the main concentration point in Sofia. 27,000 of them live here; the next largest group, about 6,000 live in Plovdiv, 170 kilometers away. In the remaining communities the groups range from as little as 25 to about 1,000. 1500 of the Ashkenazim live in Sofia, the remaining ones are scattered thru

ten of the provincial cities and towns.

The Ashkenazim and the Sephardim maintain separate Gemeinden as well as separate synogogues. Bulgarian Jewery, I have been told, is not a very religious group. Not a single request was made for Matzos last Passover! It is difficult to believe that I am working with Jews; they are, as yet, indistinguishable from the Bulgarian people. Those special characteristics and special qualities which the world likes to label as Jewish are conspicuous by their absence. It is interesting to note that many of the Jewish communities operate their own schools, the I am told the curricula differ in no respect from that of the Bulgarian schools. I know nothing yet of the extent or quality of Jewish education or Jewish culture, but I do know that ZZONO Jewish children attending camps subsidized by the Joint are being indoctrinated with an intense Bulgarian nationalism.

The conflict between the Ashkenazim and the Sephardim is petty and of no real significance. I anticipate no difficulty in that area. I shall do my best to hammer home the thought that they are Jews and must learn to live in peace or at least to learn to tolerate each other. The picture is different I think, as regards the struggle between the Communists and the Zionists. Here we have a real conflict with real issues at stake. With the Communist government a in power and the fairly large following among the Jews, (number as yet unknown) the Zionists must contend with all their power to maintain their position. One of the young Zionist leaders told me that 14,000 Zionists look forward to eventual emmigration to Palestine. He also told me that in the last two years about 1600 Bulgarian Jews emigrated to Palestine. The Zionists publish their own newspapers, maintain two Hachshorat and have three of their own children's camps. Officially the Zionists have not yet made any demands on me but I do know that they have attempted to obtain support from the Joint, independently of the Jewish community. They have not been given this support since it has been the established position of the Joint here to operate thru the community. They are not very happy about this and I think they will soon begin to test the new director to establish to what extent they can count on him for sympathy and help.

It must be emphasized that the present government is openly friendly and sympathetic with the Jewish minority. Restitution of Jewish property and wealth

has made greater strides in this country than in any other country that I know of. In many other ways is the government sympathetic with its Jewish group. For example, anti-semitism is punishable kxxxxxxxx in any form, by severe penalties. Many Jews have been invited to participate and to lend their talent to the government's administrative and executive branches. On the other hand it must also be strongly emphasized that it is not easy to obtain an exit permit from this government. It has been said that should Palestine eventually grant certificates to Bulgarian Jewery, the government would not place obstacles in the way of those wishing to emigrate. When that time comes the 14,000 Zionists allegedly wishing to start a new life in Palestine, will be given an opportunity to translate their convictions into concrete action. It is unnecessary to add I am sure, that a Jewish Agency representative could do much valuable work here.

The Joint is conducting an extensive relief and rehabilitation program. As I see it however, the emphasis shall have to undergo a change and more and more stress be put upon reconstruction program in order that the Jewish people be made self-sufficient and self-sustaining. In this connection particular emphasis is being placed upon the reg creation of cooperatives. Already about 30 cooperatives are now functioning, providing a living for several hundred families. There is however and an interesting contradictory process taking place, namely, numbers of Jewish merchants are being squeezed out of their occupations as the state nationalizes more and more their previous activities. This throws a continuing number of specialized merchants into the ranks of the unemployed and adds that number to the lists of those requiring assistinge from the Joint. The hope and plan is to re-orient these people toward skilled trades and toward participation in cooperatives. Naturally many of these new unemployed find it difficult for psychological and physical reasons to accept their new status in this society. It must be remembered that most of these people have been maxexax merchants for many years and the thought of working in a factory or in a cooperative is still abhorent to them. The tendency in force in this society is such however that they will eitherhave to adjust or suffer the consequences.

Pep and I have made several trips into the provinces. In particular we have visited threexexexexexexexexexities two of our communities on the Black Sea, Bourgas and Varna. We have also visited 6 of our children's camps, of which latter we have 15. These trips have afforded us an opportunity to see the rugged quality of the Bulgarian mountains. Bulgaria is a country poor economically but rich in rocky mountainous scenery. The peasants are primitive as they are picturesque. Not once did we see a modern plow or a piece of modern agricultural machinery. It is not uncommon to see wheat being threshed under the hooves of a team of horses as they circle monotonously, trampling the wheat underfoot. Oxen and burros appear to be the only means of transportation. All this throws an interesting light on the frantic efforts being made by the government to industrialize Bulgaria. For the last two years this country has had severe droughts. As if the war and its devastation were not enuf, the weather has added its share to the misery of the people.

- Died at 84 - reached 30/26 - he was 1/26 a hero

- Devoted Zionist from earliest youth

- Director of Chaplaincy program for JWB -over 300 rabbis in uniform (we first met).
- Advisor on Jewish affairs to commanding general European

- Chairman of AIPAC 1954-1968 and honorary chairman thereafter. He led it to the heights it enjoys today.



He led a creative, powerful, effective, life--absolutely influenced the course of history -and the difficult years of suffering at the end were a strain on his family and him, but in no way alter the historic nature of his life.

Let me analyze in detail the one chapter of his tenure as

Advisor in Germany -for this period in microcosm, exemplified all

the basic ideals and motivations of his entire life.



BERNSTEIN'S GREATEST ACHIEVEMENTS

- I. OBTAINED A CHARTER OF RECOGNITION FROM the U.S. ARMY

 FOR THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF LIBERATED JEWS IN GERMANY.

- A. At the beginning of June, 1946, Dr. Zalman
 Grinberg, Chairman of the C.C., brought the good

 fitidings from Paris, where he had been meeting with
 Ben Gurion, that Rabbi P.S.B. whom the

 Palestinians held in high esteem, was en route to
 Frankfurt.
- B. Several members of the C.C. met the new Advisor at a reception in Munich on June 6, given by General Mickelsen, Assistant Chief of Staff for G.5.

 Mickelsen asked how recognition would help the DP's.

The committee members replied:

"Practically, it would allow us and our regional and camp committees to carry out our social, cultural and religious program without the present obstructions. As an example, consider the problem of the new refugees. We have not only helped to receive them, but to find places where they can settle, and in many instances we are sharing our quarters and food with them. If we could assist as an officially recognized organization, many errors could be avoided and their problems could be handled more adequately. This is even more true of other serious issues, such as that of employment. We know the people and how to handle them. If they knew we had the Army's

blessing and co-operation, I am sure that we could launch a large-scale work program which is already being prepared by our experts. Recognition would also have an incalculable effect on our morale. It would help to increase a feeling of freedom and independence."

Bernstein supported these contentions, and closed the conference with the assurance that he would personally intervene with General McNarney upon his return to Frankfurt.

C. On September 7, in a simple but moving ceremony in the great War Room of General McNarney's headquarters in the I.

G. Farben Building, the commanders of the most powerful nation on earth shook hands with the Sheerit Hapletah, and signed a charter recognizing the C.C. as a free legal institution representing the DP Jews in Germany and Austria.

General McNarney spoke with feeling:

"Since the defeat of the Germans and the liberation of the oppressed peoples. the United States Army has accomplished much in behalf of persecuted Jews. It is now permitting the entry of refugees, supplying them with food, dwellings and clothing. Today the Army is recognizing the free, democratic representation of liberated Jews in the American Zone for the purpose of helping the Army fulfill its tasks, to advise the Army and make suggestions to improve conditions and to elevate the moral and cultural status of the people. We must never forget, however, that the Army has many other obligations in Germany. A primary task is the maintenance of law and order.

Zone and many must remain longer than we or you would wish.

Those who chose to live outside the camps must live among Germans and strict supervision must be kept to prevent incidents and clashes. There is a legal way to settle all disputes, and that is through the United States Military Government. Whether or not our laws meet your approval, as long as you are here they must be grant obeyed. The Army will do all it can, and is prepared, whenever possible, to confer with the Central Committee and improve these laws.

"The Army will also help materially, as it has in the past. In the matter of rations and clothing, Jews have priority over the Germans. But we must remember that we are living in a postwar era of shortages, and aid must be distributed all over the world. In addition, because of political commitments, the American Zone must now receive millions of racial Germans from the East. America, wealthy as it is, cannot provide for all. It is my earnest wish that by extending the Army's recognition to the Central Committee, greater mutual aid and understanding will result in the attainment of the maximum that present political and economic conditions will permit."

III. BAD REICHENHALL CONGRESS, FEBRUARY 1947

Author Leo Schwartz describes the scene:

Advisor Bernstein made a brief statement--simple, direct, but rich with feeling. His vigorous espousal of the people's cause had won the admiration of the whole assembly. He had established a reservoir of good will in pivotal Army circles and was largely responsible for the constructive policies of the McNarney regime. He had been the architect of the open-door policy toward the hundred thousand refugees from the East, traveling to the capitals of Europe as well as to New York and Washington to interpret and advise. His pronouncements in behalf of the people in the press in Germany and abroad had defended their integrity and honor. Only a few weeks previously, he had induced General McNarney to declare publicly that the only solution to their problem was a full-scale emigration to

Palestine. Above all, his championing of their cause had strengthened their instinctive belief that the stage was not too big for little men to challenge fate and circumstance.

IV. UNSCOP COMMITTEE IN MUNICH, AUGUST 1946 1947

A. This committee was crucial in determining the destiny of the DP's and Palestine. Their experience in Germany, among the camps, colored their decision. Bernstein's testimony was vital:

Advisor Bernstein stated the case for the people.

Though not a fullchested orator, his powerful personality engrossed his listeners. He gave a thirty-minute presentation of the status, background and aspirations of the Sheerith Hapletah, speaking not only as an advisor to General Lucius D.Clay, but also as a rabbi and warm-hearted Jew, who identified himself with his people's plight and aspirations.

Bernstein was subjected to searching questions, to which he replied pointedly and without hesitation. If the gates of Palestine were to be opened, how many of the people in the camps would emigrate there? Ninety percent. If both Palestine and the United States offered unlimited emigration, where would the people go? Seventy percent to Palestine and 30 percent to the United States. If Palestine were to refuse to open its gates and the United States were willing to receive them all, what would happen? Fifty percent would go to America and the other half would fight their way to Palestine. Is Zionist propaganda being conducted in the camps? The people have a natural desire

for Zion, and, having experienced the bitterness of exile and persecution, they have no need of propaganda.

All the delegates were busy making jottings in their notebooks. One of them noted: "B. talks like Father Abraham pleading with the Lord not to destroy Sodom." It was Bernstein's farewell gift to the people. Having welcomed his successor, Judge Louis E. Levinthal of Philadelphia, he flew to the United States to the bedside of his dying mother who held onto life by sheer will just long enough to be sure he was back safe."

V. PRINTING of THE TALMUD

A. The Holocaust destroyed people, communities and books. It was the dream of Rabbi Samuel Snieg of the C.C. that The Talmud should be printed in Germany as a symbol of the continuation of the Jewish people in spite of Hitler.

"The rabbi's whole being was suffused with joy.

He was realizing a dream that had come to him in the dread winter of 1945. For six years he remained under its spell: to print an edition of the whole Talmud—the greatest monument of Judaism after the Bible—would be at any time and in any country a bold enterprise. His idea of a Sheerith Hapletah edition, created in the land of book-burning and cultural destruction, had a touch of genius.

It will be recalled that the idea had captured the imagination of Advisor Bernstein and General Clay in 1946. But the practical difficulties were immense. To reprint nineteen

large folio volumes required the use of a major printing establishment over a number of years, mountains of scarce paper and vast funds. Part of the expenses were quickly guaranteed by JOINT, and the balance amounting to 213,750 Reichsmarks, was guaranteed by the Army out of the German economy. It took time, patience and persuasiveness to overcome these and other cobstacles.

By 1947, part of the paper was made available and a printing firm in Stuttgart began setting the type. The rabbi commuted from Munich to supervise and correct the proof sheets. The first volumes were bound in 1949. The completed 750 sets of nineteen volumes, dedicated to the United States Army of Occupation, were shipped to notables and the great libraries of Europe, the United States, Canada and Israel in 1951.

This task completed, Snieg made a last pilgrimage to Dachau and St. Ottilien to bid farewell in prayer to the dead and left Germany.

When all the physical evidence of the Sheerith Hapletah will have disappeared from Germany as water in the desert, this sixty-first edition of a spiritual monument will stand as a symbol of an invincible spirit.

And in the , The Introduction,

Rabbi Bernstein's name is inscribed, a tribute to his

Jewish soul.

Rabbi Snieg wrote:

"As time passed we longed to produce the complete
Talmud but it was beyond our capacity to do so.
Therefore, we turned to the authority of the American
army in Germany that they should enable us to produce
the Talmud. This wish succeeded thanks to the help of
the Advisor on Jewish Affairs to the Army, Dr. Rabbi
Philip Bernstein, and our request was fulfilled, with
the help of God. And this day is a day of good news in
Israel."

What does it all add up to? (A quote from Governor Cuomo).

"Our state and our nation are bereft and diminished by the passing to his eternal reward of Rabbi Philip S.

Bernstein. This prince and great leader of his people was a deeply committed Jew who represented his faith with honor, dignity and effectiveness. He was one of the architects in the establishment of the State of Israel. His concern included all humankind and he was a mighty and eloquent voice on behalf of human freedom and dignity. He served his country brilliantly both in war and in peace. The legacy of his noble life will be written as a bright chapter in the history of our nation."
