#### Dear Rabbi Friedman:

I have been thinking about our conversation. I do want to go to Israel and am going to select a date very shortly.

In the meantime, permit me to make the following suggestions. When planeloads of leaders from the Jewish community go to Israel, they should be accompanied by a good selection of professors from our universities, radio, TV and press people, and also ministers, priests and pastors from the Christian community. I think it is very important that the story of Israel be told not only to the leaders of the Jewish community but to other Americans -- business, labor, academic, media, and church leaders. I know you are doing some of this, but really more needs to be done. These college professors would love to go, and so would some of the labor leaders. And by the way, they are our friends and can be very helpful.

I just pass these thoughts along for whatever good they may be.

Regarding your suggestion about adding professors, ministers, media people, to the planeloads of community leaders who go to Israel each week, I appreciate your thoughtfulness and have the germ of an idea from what you wrote.

I am not certain that these people will all mix well together, but I do think that a planeload of people from the academic world does make a great deal of sense. What would your reaction be to our trying to arrange one planeload of academicians? Would Professor Humphrey be willing to go along with that planeload? Let's think of a handful of important names around whom we could build a planeload.
