

NOV. 25 IS NAMED FOR THANKSGIVING

Truman Urges Us to Be Mindful of Our Bounties and Generous

in Aid to All Needy

Special to The New York Trees.

WASHINGTON. Nov. 13—President Truman today proclaimed Thursday, Nov. 25, as Thanksgiving Day. He called upon Americans to give thanks for the bounties bestowed upon the nation and to resolve "to render generous assistance to the hungry and homeless in other lands."

The text of the proclamation is

as follows:

"As the traditional day of Thanksgiving approaches, our thoughts incline, as in previous years, to the richness of our blessings. The spiritual endowments of our country are undiminished, we may, as always, walk as free men unafraid. Our leavests have been bountiful, our production of goods abundant. Our resources have permitted us to aid the needy and helpless of other lands.

"We are privileged to partici-

pate in international efforts to advance human wilfare. We are protoundly grateful for the existence of an international forum where differences among nations may be submitted to world opinion with a view to harmonious adjustment.

"We pray this year not only in the spirit of thanksgiving but also as suppliants for wisdom in our approach to the problems confronting this nation. Believing in the dignity of man and his right to live in freedom and peace, we ask divine guidance in helping to safeguard these gifts for ourselves and other peoples of the earth.

NOW, THEFORE, I. HARRY S. TRUMAN, President of the United States of America, in consonance with the joint resolution of Congress approved Dec. 26, 1944, designating the fourth Thursday of November Reach year as Thankagiving Dayl do hereby proclaim Thursday, Nov. 25, 1948, as a day of national thankagiving; and I call upon serve that day by giving thanks to Almighty God for the bounties which have been bestowed upon our nation, and by resolving to render generous assistance to the hungry and homeless in other lands, thus renewing our devotion to the cause of good-will among men."

Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, Temple Emanuel.

"THANKSGIVING - Worship to God and Service to Man"

The first Thanksgiving Day in the New World was observed in the autumn of 1621, under orders from Governor Bradford, just one year after the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock. The colonists went out into the forests, shot a number of turkeys and took them to the settlement to be cooked for dinner. A number of Indians heard of the celebration and they entered the settlement carrying with them several deer. The indians and the Pilgrims feasted together.

Some scholars say that the idea of Thanksgiving Day was suggested to the Pilgrims by the Hebrew Feast of Tabernacles, which was a fall harvest festival in Biblical times. Our founding fathers were deeply influenced by the Bible, and many of the early clergymen read the Holy Book in its original language. They sought to organize their society along the lines suggested by the Old Testament.

But regardless of where the idea originated, the deep spiritual urge to give thanks for God's bounties and blessings became part of the early American pattern of life. It acquired such roots in our culture that the practice eventually came to receive the official approval of the President. Abraham Lincoln issued the first National Thanksgiving Proclamation in 1863.

In the religious sense that all men are brothers, the very first Thanksgiving, when Pilgrims and Indians sat down together, was perhaps the most meaningful ever held. For these two races, the white and the red, illustrated the truth that when men unite to serve higher ends, such as offering thanks to the Lord, their lower and baser motives cannot operate. Only when the spiritual theme is present do men seem

to put aside their guns and tomahawks. The moment that the religious mood evaporates, the other moods of hate and fear and suspicion enter.

If we would only remember this lesson, then Thanksgiving could serve the double purpose of bringing us closer to God, through gratitude, and closer to our fellow-men, through common devotion.


It is this double spirit which we seek to create each year in our Union Thanksgiving Service in Denver, where people of all races and creeds worship together.

U.S. JEMS MUST AVOID DELEGATING CULTURAL RESPONSIBILITIES TO ISRAEL, DR. BARON WARNS

HARRISBURG, Pa., Nov. 15. (JTA) -- A warning that American Jews should not altogether delegate their religious and cultural responsibilities to their coreligionists in Israel was voiced here last night by Prof. Salo W. Baron, of Columbia University, addressing the annual convention of the Middle Atlantic section of the Jewish Welfare Board.

"Jewish living as a religious minority essentially differs from the way of life in a Jewish state," he declared. "It will be up to American Jewish leadership to build ever new creative forms of life not only for this country, but at least also for the entire Western Hemisphere and the countries of the British Empire. By delineating each other's spheres, Israel and American Jewry can surely work together for the enhancement of Jewish culture and the enrichment of all human culture," he added.





According to our understanding, Sunday evening, May 23, at 7: F.M. in St. John's Cathedral Parish House, is a convictient time for you to speak to the youth group known as "The Central Deanry University of Life", on the subject of Jewish Faith and Practice. 


