



BROTHER BALSIGER departed this life September 30, 1949, at the age of 70 years. He had faithfully served the Fraternal Order of Eagles for more than 25 years, and as Financial Advisor since January 1st. 1944. His last living hours were among friends and associates. That undoubtedly is as he would have ittelie down to that last long sleep, we say of the struggle, among his friends.

Today the autumn leaves rustle softly over a mound, strewn with flowers, that contains the earthly remains of this mars of great mind and character, and whose life interests were his family, his friends and his work. 

AMERICAN JEWISH ARCPREAMBLE VES

In the interests of striving for maximum Jewish content in our lives in Pueblo, we, the members of the two currently existing congregations, B'nai Jacob and Temple Emanuel, do resolve to merge our forces and develop a pattern of Jewish living which shall serve to perpetuate our people and religion in this region.

We come to this merger for the sake of preserving Jewish tradition and law within the framework of modern conditions. It is our desire to effectuate these purposes in a spirit of Torah, Peace and everlasting Harmony.

To that end, we dedicate ourselves to the following precepts of religious life and practice and agree that these shall serve as

forward as the United Pueblo Hebrew Congregation, and with the being help of God will be a living credit to the generations to come in our community.

AMERI PRAYERS JEWISH

Prayers are to be conducted both in Hebrew and English. Such prayer-books are to be used as will permit all worshippers to follow the services. Prayer-books are to be provided in such quantity as to enable everyone to worship together.

II. SABBATES and HOLY DAYS

In order to accomodate the various degrees of observance which will be demanded on the Sabbath and on the Holy Days, the service will be so arranged that both the long and short form thereof will have a definite starting and concluding time. Those who wish to observe the full service with all its inclusions, will start earlier

than those who are accustomed to observing an abridged form.

III. DECORUM

This principle is very important. Judaism should not be observed in any manner other than with the utmost dignity. Services should begin and end in common. Conduct in the synagogue should be in conformity with the finest kind of good manners.

IV. MUSIC

An organ shall be present in the House of Worship, but shall not be used for Sabbath or Holiday services (except for Purim, Chanukah, and Confirmation, which should be observed on the Sunday nearest to Shavuous). The organ may be used for weddings and other special family functions, as well as for any special services (i.e. interfaith, memorial, civic, etc). If possible, the organ console is not to be visible.

choir
An a cappella/shall be used for all the above-mentkoned services

in which organ music is not acceptable. On High Holy Days, the music shall be cantorial, if possible, and if not a male a capella choir.

V. COVERING OF HEADS

At all services where heads are to be covered, skull-caps and not hats are to be worn. At High Holy Day services, the covering of heads is mandatory. At Sabbath evening services, the covering of heads is optional. At occasions, other than services, i.e. family affairs or meetings of general nature, covering of heads is optional, provided the ark is not opened.

VI. MAXIMAL PROGRAM

The fullest possible program of religious activities will be made available. Early Friday evening services; daily minyan for Yahrzeit purposes; and such other special requirements for particular needs shall be fulfilled.



Mister Chairman, Honored Colleagues, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I regret very much not being able to express in person my joy and happiness at the Israel Day Celebration here in Denver, but at this very moment I am attending a similar celebration in New York being given by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of Israel.

It was a great honor to have been invited to Dr. Weizmann's party, and although I would have liked to have rejoiced in my own community, still I felt that I did not want to refuse Dr. Weizmann's invitation.

You may be wondering why Dr. Weizmann is in America on Yom Ha-atzma-at, The Day of Independence for Israel. He has explained this strange fact in a telegram. He said that by all rights he should have been in his own country, and wouldn't have dreamed of being elsewhere (any more than President Truman would think of being away from the U.S. on the 4th of July), except for the fact that he had received such alarming and disturbing reports from his prime minister, Ben Gurion, that he felt it was more important to remain in America and try to do something to help the situation.

The disturbing reports from Israel are due to the threatened break-down of the machinery set up to absorb refugees. You will be amazed to know that 23,000 olim (immigrants) came into Israel in the first 16 days of April. That is a perfectly fantastic figure. Can you imagine what is required to take care of these weary travellers, who are at last coming home after years of misery? They need doctors, nurses, social workers, psychiatrists and teachers - to say nothing of food, shelter, employment and schools.

At last the State of Israel is free and independent - at last she can welcome with open arms her homeless and tired children who have suffered so much. But, alas, the eagerness and willingness of Israel to take all who swarm to her shores is not enough. Israel needs money.

The whole process is this very day in extreme danger of collapse because the millions of dollars which can be provided only by American Jews are not forthcoming in the full measure necessary.

Such was the nature of Ben Gurion's message to Weizmann, and on the basis of this urgent and desperate report, Dr. Weizmann decided to stay in America and utilize the opportunity of Independence Day to call together in New York all the leaders of American Jewry to impress upon them how drastically Israel needs money.

Dear friends, six weeks ago Denver sent one-quarter million dollars, which we borrowed in advance on our 1949 Allied Jewish Campaign. Today I carried to Dr. Weizmann only another \$50,000. It was all we could raise quickly. I beg you, on this day of the first anniversary of freedom and statehood in Israel, to do two things. If you have not yet paid your pledge on last year's Allied Campaign, please, please do so immediately. We need every dollar.

And secondly, when our 1949 campaign opens who has do your utmost, strain your resources, extend yourselves to the limit, to give as much as possible, much more than last year, to help keep the doors of Israel open.

Our celebration in Denver, and similar celebrations all over the world, will be very hollow indeed if we celebrate with mere words and speeches. We must express our sense of joy and happiness on this historic day in concrete terms; if the day is to have any real significance. Independence Day, with the doors of Israel closed because of lack of funds, would be a tragic mockery.

I am confident that the Jews of Denver will show, by their deeds, that Independence Day strikes into their hearts and evokes the answer we must have if Israel is to fulfill her historic mission of the in-gathering of the homeless. Let us empty the camps and fill up the Holy Land in a spirit of true religious consecration.

Said Rabbi Fishman: "I wish to make it clear that there is nothing in our religion which strives to impose theocratic rule on the State of Israel. There is nothing to justify any fear of casuistry. Our scholars have always explained the duty to safeguard independent thought by the maxim

> "Though thy brother sin Still he is a Jew. Though he sin Yet is he a man in Israel."

I was indeed glad to hear the Minister express himself in this way and thus to still the doubts which have arisen abroad.

"There is no ground whatsoever for these fears," he repeated. We WILL NOT rule the State with the power of religion, but we WILL use the spirit of religion to uplift our people and our land and to raise its place as a moral force among the nations of the world. We will not force our way into the private life of the individual, either by religious law or religious taxation; but we do want to see to it that the taxpavers' money will not be used against religion, or against its guardians, or keep those who so wish, from fulfilling their religious duties. Our religion is replete with examples of how our fathers stood guard over the spirit of freedom, liberalism, and tolcrance in every sense. What other ancient law gives a bastard full inheritance rights with legal offspring? What law places the worth of the scholar above that of Kings? Even the stupid claim, bruited about abroad, that the irreligious in Israel would be deprived of citizenship, has its reply in the Gemorrah itself, wherein it says that even if a Jew changes his religion he still remains a man of Israel."

Strengthening the Bond

The Rabbinical Council of America, at its last convention, gave earnest consideration to our future relationship with the new State of Israel and adopted the following resolution, designed to establish close spiritual ties between American Jewry and the State of Israel:

"The R.C.A. regards the creations of the State of Israel not alone as the most momentous event in the last 2000 years, but it views this historic happening as an opportunity for the reestablishment of religious authority in Zion for world Jewry.

"The tragic division within the religious ranks of American Israel, the confusion and discord which is daily increasing among our people with various sects laying claim to full authority in spiritual affairs—all this clue to lack of central authority in world Judaism of the present. There was a time when Palestine was the center of supreme religious authority in all Israel. Whether a Jew lived in Babylonia or in Rome or in Greece, he always looked to Zion for spiritual guidance and regarded its religious authority as supreme and bind-

"The R.C.A. therefore resolves to create a strong link between the religious leadership of American Jewry and the highest religious authority in the Holy Land. It calls upon American Jewry to regard the Chief Rabbinate of the State of Israel as a beacon of Torah light for all our people to follow. It proposes to send a message to Chief Rabbi Isaac Halevy Herzog, at the right opportunity, inviting his guidance and blessing for effecting religious unity in American Israel through Torah authority to be centered in the Land of Israel. Then we shall hope to see the fulfillment of the ancient prophecy of

"'For out of Zion will go forth the Torah, and the word of G-d, from Jerusalem'."

The more orthodox may seek to establish again a central religious authority in Israel as in the days of old, with the Chief Rabbinate of

Israel at its head, in the same manner as the international Catholic community has its religious center in Rome. If such a center is ever reestablished, it will, of course, have authority only over those who will voluntarily recognize its authority, either in Israel or outside. will not be a theocratic state, but for all Jews-that is, for all those

who wish to remain Jews-Israel will continue to be the land of treasured memories as well as of unfolding social and cultural realities which, if nobly conceived achieved, will be eagerly welcomed as stimulating influences in their lives. Is not this expressed in the ancient prayer of our people: "O, cause Thou a new light to shine over Zion, and may we all be worthy to enjoy its light speedily". A.H. Silver

REALITIES AND VALUES

THE RABBINICAL COUNCIL of America has announced that steps have been taken for recognizing the Chief Rabbinate of Israel as the supreme religious authority for all Jews.

Who delegated to the Rabbinical Council of America the authority to speak for

all American Jewry?

And what precedent is there for elevating the rabbinate of Israel to a position of authority over the rabbinate of the diaspora? The Babylonian Amoraim never regarded their authority as inferior

to that of the Palestinian except in respect to the calendar.

To find a precedent for insisting on association with a particular city or state as conferring religious authority one must look beyond Judaism. The Catholic Church recognizes the supremacy of the bishop of Rome over all other bishops.

Not so the synagogue; the extensive authority exercised by great rabbanim and gaonim always rested on the prestige which they won by their knowledge of Torah and their wisdom in its interpretation, whether they lived in Eretz Yisrael or in the diaspora. It is too late in history to establish a Jewish version of the papacy.





HISTORY OF SHORTER A. M. E. CHURCH

Shorter Chapel, the first Negro church to be established in Colorado, was organized in July 1868, by that pioneer of African Methodism in the west, Bishop Thomas M. D. Ward. The first building was a log cabin erected on the corner of 19th and Holiday Street. This property was given by Major Fillmore who was a Union officer in the Civil War. The church was dedicated with eighteen members by Rev. John M. Wilkerson from Lawrence, Kansas. Gilbert Phelps, Samuel Cook, Irving Williams, Gibble Burrel, Alvin Cummings and Lewis Price were its first trustees. In 1878, ten years later, this structure was sold and a commodious brick structure was erected on the corner of 18th and Stout Streets at a cost of \$2,000.00 dollars. Rev, John M. Morgan was the first pastor of this new church. He died shortly after coming to Denver.

In 1886, the property at 19th and Stout Streets was sold for \$15,000.00 cash, and a site at 24th and Stout Streets was purchased for \$10,000. Meeting opposition toward building a church there, this site was sold at a profit of \$2,000.00. The lots are still vacant to this day.

Brother Lewis Price, a trustee and a realtor, secured another site at 17th and Glenarm Streets for \$10,000, across the street from the wealthy Denver Club. Ground was broken, and the excavation completed. Again the church was confronted with powerful opposition, this property was sold at a profit of \$4,000. The Midland Savings Bank Building now stands on the property that Shorter Church once owned. These hectic times were under the pastorate of Rev. John Turner.

In the fall of 1887, they secured 3 lots on which set two houses on the corner of 23rd and Washington Streets, for which they paid \$9,00. One of the houses was reserved for the church parsonage. Rev. John Turner erected the third church, a commanding brick structure in Gothic lines, at a cost of \$24,000, leaving an indebtedness of only \$7,000 dollars at completion. The corner-stone for this church was laid in 1887.

On March 15, 1888, the church was incorporated to conform with the laws of the state of Colorado, and city of Denver and Arapahoe county. We have on display a copy of the original document. Also a letter written to Rev. P. A. Hubbard in 1891 by Rev. John M. Wilkerson, the founder of the church in Denver.

The Annual Conference sitting at Leadville, Colorado, August 10, 1890, instructed Rev. P. A. Hubbard, who was pastor at that time to call a church meeting to change the name of the church from St. John's A. M. E. Church to Shorter A. M. E. Church, in honor of Bishop James A. Shorter. So, on January 1, 1891, the resolution was presented, voted upon, and passed unanimously by all present.

In reading over some of the old records of the church, we ran across some amusing incidents. Brother Cook was instructed to see that the church was properly heated and ventilated, and fires in the stoves started on Saturday instead ofSunday mornings during the winter season. Also that the hitching rack in the front of the church be extended because the horses usually bit each other while their owners were in the church.

Then came the blackest moment in the history of Shorter Church. On April 9, 1925, the church was gutted by a severe fire that destroyed the entire structure. We were not without a church home long. The People's Presbyterian Church graciously threw open their doors to Shorter, and we worshiped there for nearly a year.

Ground was broken on November 1, 1925, for this present structure. December 6, 1925, the corner stone was laid, and on Easter Sunday, April 4, 1926, just five days less than a year from the fire, the first service was held in the new Shorter Chapel Community Church. A. Wayman Ward was now our pastor, also the builder of new Shorters. Our next pastor was J. M. Brown. He came to us at a very opportune time. We were facing an enormous debt, and the panic of 1929 was felt by many members of the church.

July 15th, 1929, the mortgage had been reduced to \$35,000.00. Thru the efforts of Rev. J. M. Brown this mortgage was extended for 3 year sand twenty-one members of the church signed an agreement with the American Agency Investment Co. guaranteeing the payment of the thirty-five thousand dollars wit hinterest at 6%. Rev. J. M. Brown came at a most critical period of the church life. He has affectionately been called "Father and Saviour" who led the people thru a cruel depression. Then came Rev. Russell S. Brown, a brother to the former pastor. Under his leadership the gigantic deft of \$46,000 was liquidated in five years. The "Mortgage Burning" took place on Sunday, May 22, 1938. There were numbers of our white friends whose sympathy and wise council were invaluable. I mention the three most prominent:—Hon. Ben Grimes, who in memory of one of our active members pledged his assistance to see us through. He not only was one of the largest contributors of money, but gave much of his time. His son, Attorney Irving Grimes, gave free legal service in all transactions. 2. Honorable John Evans, President of the First National Bank, for serving as treasurer of the campaign. 3. Honorable William E. Sweet, former Governor of Colorado, for his tireless and unstinted service, who also burned the mortgage on that memorable day. And to those 40 faithful members of Shorter Church who carried a \$1,000 mortgage on their individual homes for 10 years.

Shorter Church has been the beacon light in all racial and church life from Chicago to the Pacific coast, and is one of the most Cosmopolitan in Denver. Its accommodations for community activities includes the third largest church auditorium in the city, modern electric organ, spacious gymnasium, including full equipment for moving pictures, stage for dramas, showerbaths, nursery, library, reading room, parlors for men and women and young people. Janitor's quarter's, departmental rooms for all grades of church school, pastor's and church offices, kitchen built especially for cafeteria as well as banquet service. The approximate cost of building and furnishing was \$125,000.

Shorter A. M. E. Church has mothered the earlier churches of our group in Denver. Thomas J. Riley, later one of the early organizers of Zion Baptist Church was her first Sunday School Superintendent. Samuel Cook was her local preacher. The name of Shorter has been synonymous with Negro progress in Denver and the west for the past 76 years. Her laymen with that pioneer spirit have achieved nobly.

Of her line of distinguished pastors: 1, Rev. P. A. Hubbard became Financial Secretary of the A. M. E. Church.

2, Rev. Ben F. Watson became Secretary of Church Extension.

3, Joe P. Howard became a national character in evangelism.

4, Rev. O. J. W. Scott became a Chaplain in in the U. S. Army.

5, Rev. Frank Jesse Peck, a college president.

6, Rev. D. G. Hill, Dean of the Chapel, Howard University.

7, Rev. J. Russell Brown, Seminary Dean and 1st Negro appointed a Chaplain as a commissioned officer in U. S. Navy.

There is no telling what may await those yet to follow as pastors of "Historic Shorter."



Mr. A. T. Moore and Rev. John Ford were Denver's first undertakers. Organized the first benevolent burial association. The membership fee was 8 cents a week. The purpose of this association was to provide a \$50.00 burial.

The first realty company. Mr. Lewis Price was the first colored man to own and operate a realty office in Denver. He was the first man to operate a newspaper. The paper was The Denver Star. Today it is the Denver Star.

Mrs. Josephine Cassell and Mrs. Martha Hubbart opened the first skating rink, They were among Denver's pioneers. They were fine business women.

Min's Cab Co, is the first cab company operated by a woman. Mrs. Minnie Schryer, the genial manager, has successfuly operated her company for more than six years.

The varying degrees of second-class citizenship imposed on the minorities is the result of low economic status. Not until they have been accorded the privilege of earning according to ability will minority groups begin to achieve the recognition and equality of treatment now accorded the members of the majority. A higher economic status will bring better health, more education, greater participation and increased production.

The unions have been the greatest single factor in securing and maintaining adequate pay and better working conditions for the wage earner. The economic status of the Negro, for example, has been considerably improved in areas where they have been able to associate themselves with unions as integrated members. Even in the South, Negro union members are paid wages equal to whites doing the same work.

Today we have with us two gentlemen who will interpret the present policies of the unions they represent, giving special attention to policies affecting minority workers. They will also give opinions on local and national legislation.

Colorado Territory was organized in 1861. Our public school system dates back to then,

Denver's first school was a private venture by O. J. Goldrick, a dignified, intelli-gent and well prepared young Irishman. He busied himself to raise pledges and subscriptions to the amount of \$250.00 with which he opened "Union School" in Aurora, October 3, 1859 with 13 children: 2 indian half-breeds, 2 Mexicans and 9 others classified as White.

The progress of educational efforts in the territory was somewhat retarded from 1850 to 1868 due to:

The Civil War Indian trouble

3. Not many children at first, Most of the men were adventurers who came to get rich quick and had left their families behind. After the close of the Civil War, decided improvement began.

In 1866 the Larimer Street School was located on the site where the Windsor Hotel now stands, It had been an old Army Barrack.

The Principal, Mr. D. B. Hatch became dissatisfied when colored pupils were introduced in the school,, and retired from Public School teaching. (See Rocky Mountain News, October 3.

He opened a private School in the neighborhood of 15th and California drawing with him many of the pupils from the Public

C. F. Liemer, a real estate dealer, succeeded Mr. Hatch as principal of the Larimer Street School. On the opening morning of School under Mr. Liemer only one pupil was present. By afternoon, however, thirty more appeared; and by the end of the term he had 197 pupils.

In 1868 some of the people in District No. 1 demanded a separate school for colored children. The xact date is not known, but a small building at 16th and Market Street was rented and the school was established. On February 2, 1869 the African Baptist Church was rented and used as a school for Colored children. Later, the school was transferred to the African M. E. Church at Stout and 19th Streets. This building was so used until the close of the school year in 1873, after which time the color line was abolished, and all pupils went to the Newly finished Arapahoe School.

It was during the above period that the first Negro teacher in Colorado, R. K. Feltoncame on the school scene. He was employed as a public school teacher in 1871 at a salary of \$75.00 per month. The record does not state how long he served. Mr. Felton apparently was very active in community affairs, Social, political and religious. It is quite significant on this accasion to note this announcement in the Rocky Mountain News, November 22, 1871—"The Cornerstone of the New A. M. E. Church will be laid with appropriate religious and masonic ceremon-ies on the corner of "K" and Stout Streets today at 2:00 P.M. Rev. Bishop Ward, Rev. Mr. Vincent and R. K. Felton officiating. The Public is cordially invited to attend."

Our next introduction to colored teachers in Colorado comes when Miss Dolly Branch, Daughter of the Seventh Day Adventist Minister in Denver, was assigned to teach at Parker, Colorado in 1899. She held this position until she decided to answer the call to Missionary work in Africa.

Her successor was Miss Laura Buchanan, the first negro girl to enroll in Teacher's College at Greely. Under the strain of over ambition and overtaxation, Miss Buchanan's health broke and she passed away

The next person chosen for the position was Miss Leona Troutman, daughter of a Denver Contractor and Builder, Howard Troutman and his wife Susie Troutman.

Miss Troutman served two years and then decided to resume her school work at Western, University, Quindaro, Kansas, where in addition to her class work, she taught History and Civil Government in the elementary department.

Information as to subsequent applicants for this position has not been available (to this writer.)

In the summer of 1918 Miss Willa Mae Golson, a Graduate of Spellman Seminary, Selma, Alabama came to Denver, passed the State Board examination, and was appointed to teach at Steam Boat, Springs, near Craig, in Moffat County. She taught one year, and decided she preferred a business career with The American Woodmen and later a home career as Mrs. Thomas Campbell.

Near the beginning of the First World War, Mr. Oliver T. Jackson organized a Colony of Farmers at Deerfield in Weld County Colorado. His unrealized Dream was to build an all Negro Town. It flourished about 15 years, and when the Depression came, the people began moving away. At first there were about 50 Families in the colony, both white and colored. The Town boasted of a Church a Post Office and General Store, A blacksmith shop and a school. The school was a two room building very well equipped and comfortable. In 1931 because of the rapidly dwindling population of the colony, the school was discontinued and the pupils were transferred to the consolidated school at Wiggins.

Among the teachers who taught there were.

Mrs. Kate White-Harris from 1915 to 1918 and 1924 to 1925. started with 28 pupils (24 colored-4 white). She received \$65,00 per month for the first three years, but when she went back in 1924 her salary was \$95,00 per month.

2. Mrs. Odessa Caldwell-Sanders She taught only a partial term in 1919 and took up work in the Juvenile Court in Denver

Mrs. Sarah Russell Fountain Finished Mrs. Sanders unexpired term in 1919 and taught during the school year 1920.

Miss Beatrice Van du Vall Fall 1920 to Spring of 1923. Resigned to take a small school near Colorado Springs, Won a Scholarship to Bryn Mawr and later went to Brookfield Labor College to serve as interpreter and translator for foreign stud-

Miss' Florence Hickman-McFudden served only 2 months in the fall of 1925resigned to accept work in Kansas City. Now teaching at Whittier School in Denver.

Mrs. Viva Bond-Rose Served from Fall of 1925 until Spring of 1931 when the school was discontinued. There seemed to have been a general reluctance to employed Negro teachers in Colo-Although our schools were preparing teachers with excellent qualifications, school authorities seemed not to think it feasible to employ them and they had to seek posi-tions outside of the state. Finally about 1931 some of the more progressive leaders in school circles awakened to the fact that Denver, was depriving herself of the services

of some very fine teachers and set about deing somthing about it. As a result of their activity we now have a number of Negro teachers in Denver schools. The first one chosen was Miss Dorothy Burdine, appointed to Whittier School in 1934 to serve under Miss Lila O'Boyle, principal, to whom much credit is due for the success of the venture. Miss Burdine resigned in 1938.

Times, the afternoon daily, of April 6, 1899:
"There are 20 colored students at East
Denver and Manual High Schools. They
are noted for their preseverance and Cour-

age.

"There are two people to whom the colored public owes much of its education in good music. They are Mrs. R. W. Mosby and Mrs. E. J. Knight. Mrs. Mosby was born in Virginia. She was chorister of Olivet Baptist Church in Chicago for 16 years. She also served at Quinn Chapel, Chicago. For years she was the chorister at Zion Baptist Church, Denver, and she has also labored at Shorter's. Mrs. E. J. Knight, her sister, is a pioneer music teacher of Denver. Her pupils are legion, and those who were her pupils are considered among the best pianists in the city. Her reputation

will live long after in that of her pupils."

MR. HATCH'S RESIGNATION

Denver, Oct. 3, 1867

Board of Trustees, East Denver

East Denver Gentlemen;

Having been officially informed by the secretary of the Board That the distinction heretofore maintained between whit and colored children in the public school, East Denver, will exist no longer,I respectfully tender my resignation as principal of the school. The Board is probably familiar with my reasons for this step but for fear of misconception, I will repeat them. I do not nnow, I ever opposed the admission of nor have colored children as a right, but my convictions were that the true interests of both parties would be served by keeping them separate temporarily The annoyance caused by the bickerings and quarrelings that would continually exist between them would be greater than I choose to bear. My management of the school, if I continued in it, would from the beginning be subject to misapprehension and the crime of partiality would be th least that would be laid to my charge

The impression that prevails among the colored people that I am making efforts to prevent admission of their children will effectually preclude confidence in me, or in my management. Another reason for my resignation is that my salary is not really sufficient to compensate me. Either of these reasons might possibly have been insufficient, but combined they furnish ample

grounds.

In the event of my taking a private school, I shall confine my number to 25, which is sufficient to convince anyone that my intentions are not to injure the public schools.

Rock Mountain News (October 3, 1867) Editorial

"We publish today two letters from Mr. D. B. Hatch, the late principal of the public schools. We are by no means his partisan but are perfectly willing to give him space for his own defense.

The fact is very evident that he did not wish to teach colored children and chose to resign. He did well in so doing and the Board did better in accepting his resignation, from which action I hope they will not recede. We are of the opinion that other teachers can be found equally as competent, and who will have no such ample grounds for resigning. Furthermore, we do not regard his antecedents with enough favor to entrust him with the culture of the minds of the rising generation. Freedom and loyalty are lessons which children should learn young, and we doubt if Mr. Hatch is capable of teaching Them,"

The object was to maintain a home for friendless and deserving girls, and to conduct a day nursery. The nursery is now our main objective. We accept any child regardless of race or creed from two to twelve years of age of working mothers, underprivileged children, orphans and children from disintegrated homes. The children are served a well balanced meal at noon, and a lunch at four o'clock. Special attention is given to health, hospitalization, and dental care.

We use a sliding scale, and charge according to the ability to pay; however, no child is turned away because it cannot pay. Our staff consist of six people including a physician and a dietician.
