

Dear Herbert:

It was good seeing you and Elaine the other night. I have had you in mind, but things having been popping so fast around here lately that I haven't had a good chance to write you a note as per agreement.

What I had in mind that you might do for my class in philosophy and contemporary culture is to use Judaism as a kind of case study in a cultural orientation. I suppose one of the fundamental elements of a culture is that a people have a sense of belonging, and that that sense of belonging is fixed by some fundamental values to which a people adhere. Just as a suggestion, the question might be addressed in two different but related ways: 1. What are the basic values to which traditional Judaism has been dedicated, and 2. How in view of this dedication does the Jew come to have status in society.

You may recall that Crum in Behind the Silken Curtain makes much of the fact that the Jew must have some kind of status, and that he could not find a life for himself in post-war Europe. It was something of this sort that seemed to motivate him in pressing for a national homeland, such that Jewish values might be put into practice, and that individual Jews could be accepted and have a sense of belonging to a community.

The youngsters have a hard time in understanding such a notion, I suspect primarily because they have been so inured to traditional individualism. I feel that a treatment of Jewish culture could help to get through their heads the idea that cultural inheritance is a powerful way of bringing about a degree of solidarity that makes a society into an on-going affair, and that there is some minimal unity required on various aspects of waiture a culture (religious, economic, political, technological, etc.) if people are to get along together at all.

The above represents a mere suggestion. If you wish to approach the thing in quite different terms, I am sure what you will do will prove to be quite satisfactory.



Dr. Simon Greenberg, provost of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America in New York, attended the University of Minnesota and received his B.A. Degree from the College of the City of New York. In 1932, he received his Ph.D. from Dropsie College. Dr. Greenberg has served as president of Avukah, the national college Zionist Organization of America, and from 1941 to 1944, headed the Philadelphia Zionist Organization of America. He has contributed papers to the Conference on Science, Philosophy and Religion, the Institute for Religious and Social Studies, as well as to Jewish and general education publications. As a rabbinical student, Doctor Greenberg studied at the Hebrew University and the American School of Oriental Research in Jerusalem in 1924-25.

Dr. Robert Baldwin, Professor and Head of the Department of Philosophy at the University of Connecticut, took his Bachelor of Arts Degree, magna cum laude. in 1929, and his Master's Degree in 1930 (both at Wesleyan). Yale awarded him the Ph.D. in Philosophy in 1932. At the present time he is president of the Realistic Philosophers of America. Dr. Baldwin's major interests are in the fields of history of philosophy, ethics, aesthetics, and philosophy by way of literature.

Rev. Gray M. Blandy is Director of College Work at the University of Texas and the Provincial Secretary for College Work in the Southwest Province. At the University of Texas, he is teaching courses in Marriage and Morals, Old Testament Prophets, and the Life of Christ. He is especially interested in history, philosophy, and sociology. At the present time he is working on his doctorate at Columbia University.

Rev. Francis W. McPeek, Inclustrial Relations Secretary, Council for Social Action, Congregational Christian Churches, has served as Chaplain at the New Jersey Reformatory and Federal Detention Headquarters, Chaplain of the National Training School for Boys (federal) in Washington, D.C., and as Director of the Department of Social Welfare of the Washington Federation of Churches. For the past four years he has published a weekly LABOR LETTER, containing news and comment in the field of labor-management relations.

Dr. E. S. Hjortland is Senior Pastor of Central Lutheran Cathedral Church, Minneapolis, Minnesota, which is one of the largest Lutheran congregations in the United States. In 1948 Dr. Hjortland received an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from his Alma Mater, St. Olaf College. He has traveled extensively both in America and in Europe. During World War II, he was Post Chaplain at Camp Patrick Henry, Virginia, and received a special citation for his work among the troops. In March 1949, Dr. Hjortland was selected as one of "Minnesota's Hundred Living Great."

AMERICAN JEWISH

The Rev. Harold H. Viehman joined the Board of Christian Education staff in 1949 as Associate Director of the Student Work Department. A graduate of Yale University Divinity School and of the University of Pittsburgh, Rev. Viehman also has studied at Western Theological Seminary in Pittsburgh. He attended the World Conference of Christian Youth in Amsterdam, Holland, in 1939, and meetings of the World Student Christian Federation in both Europe and the U.S. His major fields of study include political science, economics, theology, and problems of higher education.

Rev. Robert G. McMahon was appointed pastor of the newly established Sts. Peter and Paul's parish in Wheatridge, June 30, 1949. He was, for three years during the last war, Auxiliary Chaplain to the preflight Cadets at Denver University and part-time Chaplain at Buckley Field. He received his education at Regis College and St. Thomas Seminary. Rev. McMahon's fields of interest include theology, philosophy, and speech work.
