These suggested itineraries are part of the overall programme for the Solidarity Pilgrimage Year proclaimed at Hanukka 1975 by the Jerusalem Conference. They are designed exclusively for groups, and are offered for the guidance of tour organizers planning trips to Israel.

They are special, out-of-the-ordinary itineraries, additioned to the regular ones, aimed at giving the pilgrim a better knowledge and understanding of the relation between the Land of the Bible and the People of the Book, and of the strong attachment of the people to its land. They will also help the pilgrim witness the revival of the Jewish nation in its rebuilt homeland.

ONE-DAY ITINERARIES (Can be combined with other tours)

Jewish Settlement in the South Departure from Tel Aviv

Morning: Miqwe Yisrael (first Jewish agricultural school in the country, founded in 1870), Rishon Le Zion (visit first synagogue and famous wine cellars), Halperin House at Nes Ziyyona, Weizmann Institute of Science at Rehovot, Yavne (Jewish spiritual centre after destruction of the Second Temple), "Ad Halom" bridge (where the Egyptians were held during the War of Independence), Nizzanim, Ashgelon.

Afternoon: Tour Ashgelon, Yad Mordekhay (see reconstructed War of Independence battlefield and Holocaust Museum), Ashdod port city (future development). Return to Tel Aviv.

2. In the Footsteps of the Bible Departure from Tel Aviv

Morning: Apheq Pass (visit Antipatris fortress and Yarqon springs), Lod, Gezer, Nahshon, Valley of Ayalon — Emmaus — Bet Horon Ascent (battlefields of Joshua and Juda Maccabeus), Givón (visit village and great pool), Jerusalem.

Afternoon: Jerusalem, Valley of Jehosephat and view over the City of David, Mt. Zion, En Kerem, the Valley of Elah (Terebinth Valley, scene of David's duel with Goliath), Beth Shemesh, where the Philistines captured the Ark (tour the development town). Return to Tel Aviv.

Joshua and the Children of Israel Departure from Jerusalem

Morning: Via Ma'ale Adummim to Jericho, world's oldest city (visit the Tel and ancient synagogue), Nahal Gilgal lagricultural settlement at the place where the Children of Israel first stopped after crossing the River Jordan into the Promised Land), memorial to the Jordan Valley fighters, via Nahal Fara's to biblical Shekhem/Nablus (view of Mt. Gerizim "Mt. of the Blessing", and Mt. Ebal, "Mt. of the Curse" where Joshua built an altar, visit traditional tomb of Joseph, Samaritan Quarter), Shilo, Bet El, Ramallah, Mizpa, Giv'on (the great pool), Nabi Samwil, Jerusalem,

The Zealots and the Wars against Rome Departure from Jerusalem

Morning: Wadi Qelt (bld Roman road, with view of monastery built into the mountain-side), Jericho (visit ruins of Herod's Palace). Qumran (home of Essene community, where Dead Sea Scrolls were found), En Gedi and view of the canyons where Bar Kokhba's Zealots sheltered, Mezada/Masada (Ascend by cable car and descend on foot by the Snake Path).

Afternoon: Arad, via Hebron and Bethlehem to Jerusalem.

The Battle for the Road to Jerusalem and the Judean Hills

Morning: Kefar Yassif (near ancient Jewish cemetery), Valley of Zevulun, via Ahihud Junction and Kabri to Yehi'am (see memorial to members of convoy who fell in attempt to break siege during the War of Independence), Ma'alot (tour development town), Peqi'in (see ancient cemetery and synagogue), Zefat/Safed.

Afternoon: Zefat (tour the city of Mysticism). Return to Haifa,

B. Religious Minorities in the Galilee Departure from Haifa

Morning: Issfiya and Daliyat el Karmil (Druze villages on Mt, Carmell, descent to Jezre'el Valley past Yoqne'am, Bet She'arim (visit catacombs), Akko/Acre (Crusader town).

Afternoon: Tour old city of Akko, (time permitting) visit the Bahai Shrine in the neighbourhood. Return to Haifa.

Industrial Development in the Negev and Settlement in Northern Sinai Departure from Be'er Sheva and Arad, arrival at Tel Aviv

3rd day: Riding in Wadi Issia (date palms, gardens, canyon section, Bedouin). Meet cars at end of Wadi. Overnight.

4th day: Travel to Ras Muhammad, southernmost tip of Sinal Peninsula (bathing, skin diving observing corals), Neqiqei Mevokhim, Ophira, Northbound flight.

10.To Southern Sinal: In the Footsteps of the Children of Israel in the Wilderness (6 days)

Departure from Elat







Dear Colleague:

The Israel Commission is offering a unique educational experience - a specially designed seminar in Israel, as described in the attached itinerary. The architecture of the seminar is immediately clear - studying the history and geography of Biblical Israel simultaneously with the problems of contemporary Israel.

During the experimental first year of this program we will handle no more than 21 groups - one every two weeks, according to the attached timetable. A group will consist of one bus-load (38 persons). When these dates are all spoken for, on a first-come first-serve basis, we shall close the calendar. The reason for this apparent rigidity is to enable us to maximize the possibilities for success by concentrating on small and specific numbers. This first year is crucial.

Read the itinerary, see if it interests you; study the dates, take an option on one. We will hold your option open for thirty days. This will give you a chance to get home, talk over the project with your president, men's club, young couples club, adult education groups, or anyone else. If you decide, on second thought, to change your mind, please write and release the date so that we can offer it to someone else. If you decide definitely to go ahead, then we will want to begin to receive actual names of participants by 30 April 1974.

There will be many things to discuss - such as suggested study-course in advance; procedures of the seminar; schedule of payments; use of local travel agent; etc., etc. All this can come as soon as you have made up your mind, and definitely decide to recruit a group.

INTRODUCTION

There are many ways to see Israel. The visitor may be offered a look at Israel, the land of warm sunshine, or the land of fascinating archaeology, or the land of vibrant kibbutzim, or the land of heart-warming immigration, or the land of new factories. He may even be offered a look at the Israel of social problems, poverty and slums, undereducation and underemployment. And he will certainly see the Israel of uncertain borders, constant alerts and military cemeteries.

All the Israels are valid - for these are all aspects of the nation in growth and in struggle. But these are flashes and facets and views.

The best way for the visitor to look at Israel is to see it whole, integrated - at one and the same time an ancient land where the Jewish people was formed and the Jewish faith evolved; and a modern land where the same people is reviving its national life and culture. To appreciate Israel the visitor must be enabled to telescope time and space - history and geography - so that he can find the valley where David fought Goliath and reconstruct that ancient scene in his mind, while with his modern eye, he looks at the Telstar communications satellite station now standing in that very valley. He must travel the same road Abraham took through Schechem, Beth El and Shiloh, as told in the book of Genesis; while realising at the same moment that he is travelling through the West Bank of so-called "Administered Territory".

The best way to see Israel is for someone to show it to you in an integrated manner - so that everywhere you go, you will learn both the Biblical and the modern significance of each particular place.

That is exactly what this unique tour will do. Since it is confined to 14 days, some of which must be left free for friends, shopping, rest, the entire range of Jewish history cannot be covered. We will start with Abraham in the year 2000 BCE and only be able to go as far as the Destruction of the Second Temple in 70 CE.

We will actually visit Mount Sinai in the bleak desert, where Moses confronted God; and follow Joshua to his conquest of Jericho; and trace Samson in his struggle with the Philistines; and witness Saul's death on Mount Gilboa; and see David dancing before the ark from Kiryat Yearim to Jerusalem; and marvel at Solomon's fortress of Hazor; and see Yochanan Ben Zakkai's school at Yavne.

All the places where these seminal events occurred are to be found, and around them are things of today. The purpose of this tour will be to achieve the magic feeling of losing track of time and space, so that the whole of Israel blends into an unbroken stream in your mind, with past and present forming a unity. Over one shoulder you will see the village where Jeremiah lived, and over the other shoulder you will see the village where new Russian immigrants live. And you will know and feel that the Jewish people is eternal, from that time to this, in its own land.

This special tour is being organised by the Reform Movement, hence it is natural that we will look at the forms of religion in Israel. You will gain an insight into problems you never dreamed of - such as, the danger of an Israeli form of assimilation. Does that sound strange?

There will be no packing and unpacking - the bane of every traveller's life. You will stay in one hotel in Jerusalem all thirteen nights.

But don't worry - you will see everything. Our planning is just a bit more organised and you will have the best of it both ways.

There will be some reading for you to do before you embark, and some more after you disembark back home. You know it is to your advantage so you will do it.

The Jewish people and the Jewish faith were born in the Jewish land. That is the central theme behind this tour: to sense our roots and origins, and to realise that today, even as in the Messianic vision, Israel, the land, the people and the faith are one.

Subject Israel Tours

Gentlemen:

Approximately sixty of our congregational leaders recently participated with their Conservative counterparts in one-week, fact-finding missions to Israel. You all received copies of Harry Gutmann's letter so you know the details.

On the basis of this experience, Dick Hirsch and I are convinced that we should be doing more in the area of structuring tours. There seems little point in offering packages already being offered by every other Jewish organization and every travel agent. On the other hand, almost nothing has been done to use Israel as a vehicle for strengthening commitment to the local synagogue, and as a resource for authentic and intensive Jewish education. In effecting this, he will be working in close collaboration with the Department of Education.

At the staff meetings scheduled for early March, we are hoping to receive your recommendations concerning how this program might be best structured. In the meantime, could you give some thought to the following questions:

- Certain "themes" suggest themselves (archeology, social problems, the various ethnic communities of Israel, etc.). Are there other topics that might serve as the basis for "specialized tours?"
- 2. Should we also offer a "first timers" tour of a general sight-seeing nature?
- 3. Should we offer each package once or twice a year, opening them to <u>individuals</u> throughout our congregations? Or should we try to put together packages that rabbis could "buy" for use as congregational trips?
- 4. Should we seek to structure full-fledged adult education programs around the trip theme, making the stay in Israel part of a larger experience? How extensive should these courses be (time, reading, etc)?

Looking forward to seeing you all in March.
