Dear Heinz:

One of the most important leaders of the United Jewish Appeal, Edward Ginsberg of Cleveland, is planning to visit Berlin for five days between October 23rd and 28th. I will find out the exact flight number and arrival time as well as hotel and will let you know these details.

I would appreciate your arranging for him a very complete schedule. I would like him to meet the leaders of the Jewish community. I would like him to have a chance to go into East Berlin for a day. I would like you to find someone who can tell him what it was like in the old days of 1945-47 when the city was filled with DPs. And then, of course, I would like you to arrange for him to see the sights of Jewish and general political interest. Can he make a tour of the Schoneberg Rathaus? Can he be shown through the Kommandatura building? I do not have to spell out for you all the details. I am sure you will know what to show him. Another good idea might be to introduce him to interesting American Jewish military officers. In other words, I want him to see the importance of Berlin from a political and Jewish point of view.

For your own private information, I would like you to know that he contributes about \$40,000 each year to the UJA, is one of our half dozen top chairmen, as you can see from where his name is placed on the letterhead, and that he travels around the United States to many meetings making speeches. His wife will be with him and they are both very interesting and friendly people. They have travelled all over the country, but this will be their first trip to Berlin.

Dear Herb:

As much as we hated to rush back, we had no choice, and it was fortunate that we did. My mother-in-law failed very rapidly, and passed away recently.

You had indicated to Larry that you would be happy to help in any way, if necessary. I appreciate your offer, but I doubt that there is a great deal that can be done. I have been in touch with the travel agency about cancellations and reimbursement, but have not heard anything as yet. Larry advised that they were very reluctant to do anything, but agreed that they would try. Arkia Airlines and American Colony both agreed that they would make reimbursement to our agent, but we do not know as yet whether they have done so. We doubt that the Shulamit in Haifa and the Avia Motel in Lod will cooperate because there is apparently some rule that there must be at least a week's notice of cancellation.

I assume that there is a bureau of tourism or some department which controls rates and policies concerning these matters, but I hate to bother anyone unless I feel that there is come chance of doing something. If is, of course, my feeling that under emergency conditions such as ours, there should be some consideration, if possible. Incidentally, there was nothing we could do with TWA and we simply had to tear up our return tickets and purchase new one-way tickets, which was rather costly. We had no choice, and, under the circumstances, money, of course, could not be a consideration. We are thrilled that we were able to get back in time to at least communicate with my mother-in-law and report on our trip, which, of course, gave her considerable pleasure in the midst of her pain and agony.

If it is not too much bother for your office to check on the

Last night I ran into Mr. Fredric R. Mann of Pholadelphia, whom I met in Vienna, and was introduced by him to Mr. and Mrs, Gering, Chairman Heman of the Board, Suburban Bank of Livingston,

Naturally the matter under discussion was our activities. Mr. Gering gave me quite a tough time in accusing and argueing against the need for the U.J.A.. The arguments went on for quite a long time, but by the end of the night Mr. Gering gave in and told me that he realised that it is the U.J.A. who is the source which enables to carry out the tremendous rescue operation.

As he made the point that he lives in Newark and knows Alan Sagner very well and, of course, knows you very well too, I thought that it would be only proper to let you know about our recent discussions and lets hope that when he will be back in the U.S. his high feelings will be translated into a decent pledge.

I would very much appreciate it if in due course you will let me know of any developments.

Dear Herb, I do hope that things are fime at your home and that everything is perfect.

Zvia joins me in wishing Mrs. Friedman and you the wery best, a very pleasant Pessah and hope to hear from you soon.

DAVID GARCY One of the Israeli soldiers who was killed by enemy action over the weekend was Sergeant David Garcy, the only son of Zvi Garcy, director of the Jewish Agency's Haifa office. David, aged 21, was killed during an Egyptian artillery barrage over the Suez Canal. He had only recently returned to the Canal after convalescing from injuries' received there a few months ago. Zvi Garcy, his youthful looking father, is known to countless immigrants who have entered Israel through Haifa port in recent years. He is also known and deeply liked by many people in Britain, where he has become a popular speaker in the annual Joint Palestine Appeal campaigns. He was one of the most recent speakers in the 1969-70 campaign. A Youth Aliyah ward from Nazi Germany, Zvi himself saw service in the Hagana, the British Army, and in the War of Independence a he Sinai Campaign. We extend our he delt sympathies to Zvi, his wife Zivia and to their 15 year-old daughter Yael in their hour of sorrow. The Defence Army of Israel Unit D.Z. 304 May 17th, 1970

My dear Family Garcy,

We are in mourning full of sorrow and pain in memory of your son and comrade, David of blessed memory, who fell in the Suez Canal area - south of Firdan - on the 16th of May 1970 during heavy bombardement on a patrol under his command.

I knew your son intimately through direct contact in our daily work together during his service in our unit.

Your son became known as an excellent commander, possessing qualities, which each of us would wish to be blessed with, bravery, perseverance in his duties, a personal example in devotion to his soldiers.

I remember when he was wounded last month - the end of April 1970, and he stubbornly insisted on returning to his unit and once again in the line of fire at the Canal. This act reflects the fighting qualities which were rooted in him and the clear knowledge that ZAHAL (the Israeli Army) needed him.

There are no words that can console the parents and family whose dear son was taken from them, but perhaps there is some consolation in the knowledge that your son did not fell in vain but for the honour and defence of his country.

Dear parents - your son was a hero and be a symbol to his comrades in arms.

Sergeant David Carcy

Sergeant David Garcy was 21, when he was killed last weekend at the midsector of the Suez canal.Yesterday he was brought to burial at the military section of the Carmelbeach cemetary.The burial was attended by his family and a large crowd, consisting of relatives, comrades-inarms, officials and also teachers, students and undergraduates of Ziv school and secondary school "Aleph", which the deceased had previously attended.Present among others were the Director of the Aliya Dept. of the Jewish Agency Gen. (rtd) Uzi Narkiss, the Police Commissioner of the Haifa area Chief Inspector Mordecai Ron and the Townmajor of the mifa district Lt. Col. Tepler.

The funeral procession left Rambam Hospital, led by an army command car, bearing the flag bedecked coffin and being flanked by a Guard of Honour. Lt. Col. Gad Navon, the army chaplain of the Northern Command, stressed in his eulogy of the deceased, that "Sergeant David Garcy was a symbol of cur homeland's soldiers, having been ready to make the supreme sacrifice for his country." The Rabbi added, that "the deceased had been wounded a few weeks ago in the canal area.He, however, reported back on active service to his fighting unit, before he had completely recovered, not heeding the advice of his attending army phisicians.

Lt. Col. Navon continued, that "in his father's home Sergeant David had learnt the meaning of Heroism as well as a deep love for his country." (His father had previously fought in the Carmeli Division). The army cantor chanted the prayer for the deceased after which three rifle volleys were fired over the grave by the Guard of Honour. He left a father, mother and sister. His father, Zvi Garcy, is one of the senior officials of the Jewish Agency and was for many years Director of the Vienna office. Dear Family Garcy,

In the worst of my dreams I did not imagine that I would have to write you - you of all the people! - a letter like this. But it was the bitter fate - and David fell.

To no Jewish family I could wish such a tragedy, but you were the last who deserved a blow like this. David was a centre of your life. You lived from one phone-call to another and from one leave to the second one he got. Younalways tried to appear selfconstrained, contrary to the other hysterical and crying parents, but your eyes could not conceal the extreme worry and your deep anxiety for David's wellbeing. You were always proud of him and of his deeds.

I had the opportunity to serve together with David on some "lines" and came into close contact with him especially during the night-patrols. How much satisfaction and self-confidence he got out of it! It was the centre of his world! I watched his movements when he lead the armoured vehicle on the road of patrols, every step in full selfconfidence and each order without hesitation - his only aim to bring the patrol to its successful finish. Each night he got enthusiastic again about everything he did, with energy and joy.

The maintenance of weapons and the platoon-vehicles was for him above everything, and he frequently "dictated" his soldiers to bring their arms to perfection. He found satisfaction in everything, even in a cold cup of tea we had in one of the strongholds at three o'clock before morning; and in addition to the tea there were always the sweets which his mother never forgot to send with one of the soldiers who were on leave.

He was always proud of his parents and sister and knew that he had a safe home and family who never let hom down. And suddenly, in a split of second everything ended and only the emptiness remained with the deep sorrow. I know, this wound will never heal even when peace will come, which seems so far away. Nothing whatsoever will bring David back.

May his memory be blessed !

Dear Jaeli,

A few days ago I returned to the army and slowly I am getting used again to the whole military routine.

In the meantime I managed to meet one of the officers of David's unit and asked him to tell me about David and his behaviour as a soldier. I also met some of my soldiers, who spent several days with David in the stronghold during the heavy shellings, prior to his short and last vacation.

Jaëli, you had a brother who was a hero! And I don't say it just of politeness, but in the full sense of the word. Even I, who was his closest friend, did not know it.

I was told that David was moving about between the posts during all the bombardement. He was running from one to another to encourage the soldiers holding out there while the shelling lasted. He brought them at the same time food and supplies. When one of the soldiers asked him if he was not afraid and why he does not take shelter in the bunker, he replied: " I passed already so many shellings and got away with it, so I don't believe that anything will happen to me". And David fell from a bomb's splinter which hit directly his heart - as he was carrying supplies to a position.

Jaëli! I appreciated very much your strength to overcome the sorrow and pain, so as not to cause still greater pain to your parents.

Please, let me know how are your mother and father and write me if I can help with something your parents and you to ease this awful feeling.

Jaëli, I'll finish now with hope that I and the others who remained alife, will get over the grief and pain. You'll have to be now everything for your parents at your home to fill out the empty space left there and I'm sure you will do it well.



Dear Rabbi:

Morton Wishengrad has his heart set on writing a new play. And I, for one, have become exceedingly interested in this piece he proposes to write. First of all, because Mr. Wishengrad, in having done yeoman's work for the Jews of America as the author of scores of Eternal Light programmes and of the Broadway play, "The Rope Dancers" has proven himself to be a highly skilled playwright. And secondly, because the theme he has chosen for his play is a dramatically important one, which can have a wide beneficial influence on the audiences of this country.

His theme is the beautiful and inspiring story of Rabbi Levi Yitzchok of Berdichev, a tale which sheds interesting light on many of the nooks of faith, as well as on the crannies of frustration. Levi Yitzchok's life is a personal history which peers with gentleness and clarity into the problems of reconciling critical intelligence with religious conviction, and it is relevant, therefore, to these, our troubled times. It seems to me that a play about the rabbi of Berdichev could be popular both on Broadway and on the road, both at home and abroad.

As yet, the play has not been written, although much of it has been thought out. But in order to make it possible for Mr. Wishengrad to write the play, to give the composition his single-minded concentration, and to set it down with artistic order, I am organizing a group of rabbis. One may well ask why exclusively rabbis?

Since Levi Yitzchok was a rabbi whose life characterized the rabbinical calling at its best, it is only fitting that a play about him should be given birth through the efforts of his successor colleagues and spiritual descendants. There is a poetic justice, if you will, to the spectacle of to-day's rabbis making it possible for a play to be written about a saintly rabbi of yesteryear, so that the message of his life can be brought to the laymen of our time.

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With this idea in mind I am inviting a group of rabbis to join in a limited partnership, the same kind of arrangement that is made for any Broadway production, and to invest \$100.00 apiece in Mr. Wishengrad's proposed play. The immediate proceeds will be used to advance Mr. Wishengrad enough funds to make it possible for him to devote his full working time to the writing of the play. This advance will be held against royalties when the play is in production.

In order to facilitate the arrangement, because I am a private business man and not a theatre person, it has been agreed that in this initial stage no investor will be invited to invest more or less than \$100.00, and for this advance that will bring the play into being, all the investors will be rabbis.

For your \$100.00 investment there are three possibilities. First, if our group produces the play, you will have equity in it, or have a piece of it, as they say, or "angel" it to the extent of this participation. And although you will share in the profits, you will have no personal liability, because it is a limited partnership arrangement. Secondly, if some other group produces the play, then the playwright has undertaken to pay back your investment from his royalties. And thirdly, if the play is never produced, you lose your \$100.00.

Since Morton Wishengrad is a highly successful writer whose dramatic works have been capturing the imagination of audiences on radio, TV and stage, I, for one, anticipate that his play on the moving episodes of Levi Yitzchok's life will be produced for the enlightenment and entertainment of large audiences. And I urge you to sign the enclosed cheque made out to "Asher Lans Special" which is our attorney's escrow account, and send it in the enclosed envelope.

Dear Morris:

Some time ago I sent you a note containing a fact sheet with all the figures relevant to the 1971 campaign. Those figures were intended to demonstrate the fact that there was an enormous need in 1971. I know you are a person who is interested in specific data, and I hoped that you would read that fact sheet with a fine eye.

Because of the huge defense problem of Israel, which is taking almost 25% of the GNP, over 40% of the total budget, and 92% of the revenue from taxation of the people of Israel, there has never been a more stringent financial situation.

Besides this defense burden there is a humanitarian burden of bringing in approximately 50,000 immigrants during this year of 1971.

The defense burden of about \$15 billion has been somewhat eased by the granting of \$500 million of credits by the United States Government to Israel. That still leaves a defense burden of over \$1 billion.

The humanitarian burden has not diminished at all. It will run close to \$600 million for 1971.

The purpose of this letter is to ask you if it is possible for you to give \$100,000 to the campaign in 1971. You have often been accustomed to give out of capital and I would hope you are prepared to do so again. You gave \$57,000 in 1969 and \$25,000 in 1970. The market has turned upward again and I hope that you will make it easier for you to meet the request I am making. Israel is moving through a very dangerous period. The slogan of the campaign this year is "Survival Means Sacrifice." I think that \$100,000 would require a genuine sacrifice on your part. I hope you would be willing to consider it.

You may recall that a Cincinnatian, Dr. Schneider, has organized a very inexpensive tour of Israel which has attracted, and continues to attract, substantial numbers of Cincinnatians-to the point, in fact, that it is by far and away our biggest competition (regardless of our own perceptions) for Operation Israel.

We have had intensive discussions about the best way to use this tourist experience as an aid in the Welfare Fund campaign. We have tried to set up something on the tour for a UJA orientation but this has not been successful.

We now think that the most effective indoctrination method would be to have the tour guide-they use the same person for each trip-include in his spiel some of the same material as we use in Operation Israel concerning the social needs. On this last trip which just returned to Cincinnati last Monday, the guide talked extensively about Hadassah and ORT. A member of the group with whom we had discussed this problem prior to the trip finally pulled the guide aside and gave him some of our UJA orientation material, which he then did use.

The guide's name is Jacob Taxon, 31 Reney Street, Tel Aviv, 440513. The tours are sponsored regularly by the Amberley Swin Club group. Each tour, which flies Swiss Air, includes about 20 couples.

Can somebody be given the responsibility for meeting with the guide on this basis?

I would appreciate knowing what happens so that we can make best possible use of the situation for campaign purposes.

I am writing on behalf of the Jewish community of Philadelphia to invite you to speak at the closing dinner on Wednesday, May 20 in the ballroom of the Warwick Hotel.

Honorable Abba Eban addressed the opening dinner some weeks ago, and the community unanimously desires you for the closing dinner. This will not be a fund raising dinner. There will be approximately 250 persons present. The meeting serves as a target for concluding the campaign and there are final announcements made.

The chairman of the campaign this year is Leonard Goldfine who went to law school with you. Another chap whom you might remember is Sylvan Cohen. He is serving in a very important post in the campaign. The leaders feel that you will see lots of old friends there, and that it can be a pleasant evening for you.

Let me quote just one paragraph from Lenny Goldfine's letter:

"The community regards the closing affair as one of great tradition and we generally have an overflow audience. It is important that our speaker be of major calibre and we think that Mr. Feldman would be a most happy choice."

If at all possible, I would urge that you accept this, Mike. It is not so far from Washington, and it is entirely possible that you could get back the same night. In other words, we could have you driven from Washington to Philadelphia in the late afternoon, have the car wait for you, and drive you home again at the conclusion of the meeting.

Dear Sam:

Is Fink has asked me to reply to your letter of 22 April addressed to him. My reaction to your thought that there are two factors which might inhibit the flow of cash this year is that you are possibly correct on one, but I do not think you are right about the second.

As far as the matter of bonds is concerned, the fact that we will not take these new Third Development Issue Bonds might cause a delay in some contributors' rate of payment. I would think it would be important to inform the larger contributors immediately that these bonds are not acceptable for at least two years, and that they must begin to think of other ways of meeting current pledges. As you know, we will continue to take earlier issues. You indicated the hope, in your letter, that the UJA might develop some plan for the utilization of these bonds. We have tried, but have not succeeded. Our beneficiary agencies cannot operate with frozen bonds. They need cash - either pounds or dollars. Since these bonds will yield neither pounds nor dollars for two years, they are unusable.

And so, it seems to me, some intensive explanation is required for the larger contributors, to enable them to understand that they must pay current pledges with cash or older bonds. If we cannot so educate them jointly, then you are right in suggesting that there might be a diminution of the cash flow on this account. As far as your analysis of the effect of the proposed education fund, I would like to make the following comments:

 The Education project is not to be viewed as a Special Fund. It is an independent campaign addressed (as you point out) "to a limited number of potentially or actually more important contributors to the various campaigns." To be more specific, the Executive Committee of the UJA has ruled that only gifts of \$100,000 and above will be accepted by the Israel Education Fund.

2. A gift will not be acceptable to the Education Fund if it is made by a contributor at the expense of the regular campaign gift.

3. All solicitations for the Education Fund will be handled on an individual basis. No public meetings will be held. The nature of the campaign is such that all solicitations will have to be individual and private.

4. We are fully aware of the fact that "all beginnings are difficult." The specific purpose of the Inaugural Education Conference is to establish the validity of the secondary education project as a responsibility, separate and apart, from the ongoing needs of immigration and absorption presently assumed by the UJA.

You are right, of course, when you say that your comments on the Education Fund are conjectural. Frankly, all of our opinions on this are of the same nature. A year or two of experience will show us whether we are correct or not. Let us hope that we can find support for this new project without harm to the central campaign. At any rate, that is the intention.

I know you will do your best to maintain a flow of cash, which was the original reason for Is Fink's letter, for you do appreciate the needs. For your private information, the figures for immigration for the first 3-1/2 months of this year are 14,555. This is as high as it has been any time during the past four years.

GIVING TOO LITTLE AND TOO LATE:

THE TRAGIC ROLE OF THE JEWISH PEOPLE

It would be amusing were it not so tragic to witness how the Jews throughout history fail to give nearly enough to meet the needs of their stricken brethren. With many exceptions they have given hand outs or tips instead of adequate sums.

Sometime after this one and only meeting with Baron de Hirsch Herzl wrote to him telling of his failure in getting funds. All the tycoons failed him as the Baron predicted. Herzl wrote by way of explanation "The Jews are at present not to be helped. If one showed them the Promised Lond they would scoff at him. Yet I know where the cause lies; in ourselves - - - we must sink still deeper, be abused still more, spat at, despised, flogged, plundered and beaten until we are ripe for this idea - - we are not desperate enough".

Let that prophecy of Herzl's sink into your minds indelibly.

Was it not tragically fulfilled by the pogroms in eastern Europe early in the twentieth century and ending in the holocaust in the forties?

Think! Never, never forget this!

HAD THE RICH JEWS HAVE LISTENED TO HERZL IN 1895 WE COULD HAVE PURCHASED IN 1896 FROM THE SULTAN OF TURKEY A JEWISH HOMELAND IN PALESTINE AT LEAST FIVE TIMES THE SITE OF THE PRESENT STATE OF ISRAEL AT AN INFINITESIMAL COST COMPARED TO OUR INVESTMENT IN THE PRESENT STATE. WE COULD HAVE HAD THAT VAST AREA FOR PENNIES INSTEAD OF DOLLARS.

I WENT TO BED THINKING I WAS A "PAUPER" AND AWAKENED REALIZING I WAS A "PRINCE"

It was in 1952 at the Shoreham Hotel in Washington. 1700 among America's foremost friends of Israel were in attendance for the Bond Drive.

The night before the last day of the conference it was past midnight when Charlie Gutwirth and one or two others were pressuring me to buy \$25,000 bonds. I was adamant and told them my business prospects were cloudy and \$10,000 was my limit. Sam Rothberg passing by soon learned of the matter and pointing his index finger at Charlie said "It's not right to pressure men like Sam Goldfarb. He is a self starter. He pressures himself."

I told Sam he was wrong! No one should have a special dispensation to avoid being pressured. We should all pressure one another so as to keep from getting out of practice so long as the need in Israel exists.

While shaving the following morning I had a brain storm! I recalled that when I gave \$50,000 to U.S.A. in 1946 it was mostly out of capital and my net worth was about \$210,000.

Now just because business didn't look so good I failed to consider that my net worth was close to a million dollars.

When after breakfast I entered the grand ballroom where the final meeting of the Conference was held I sent a note up to Henry Montor Founder and Head of Bonds for Israel. I told him a three minute talk by me might help the conference.

At a propitious moment he called on me to come to the dais.

I told the 1700 guests how I went to bed thinking I was a "pauper" and awakened realizing I was a "prince".

The audience was electrified. Montor who founded U.J.A. in 1939 told me he had never before experienced such remarkable response as that which followed my remarks.

In 1970 God willed it that I made a solid recovery from a cancer operation and that our business which lost money for the decade 1960 thru 1969 also had a recovery.

In the decade when our business was "sick" our giving to Israel . had to be nominal. Hence in 1970 we could only give \$7,500 to U.J.A and buy \$5,000 Bonds. For 1971 we will give \$50,000 to U.J.A. and buy \$100,000 Bonds.

Now I sympathize and understand those who lost almost everything in stocks and their business too. "You can't squeeze blood out of a turnip". I hope and pray for them to recover.

However, to the great majority who have been slightly dented or mildly bruised and have reason to expect a comeback I ask that they condider what was their net worth in 1933? 1953? and compare it with their present net worth.

This kind of thinking brought me to my senses and gave me the proper perspective back in 1952 to make my first \$100,000 bond purchase.

This is the only same, mature approach to make one realize the absurdity of not having a heart filled with gratitude for one's great, good fortune. On topy of that consider our luxurious mode of living in contrast to what inmates of Auschwitz and Treblinka had to endure. What kind of living have our brethren in Israel with three wars in 20 years and the bleak, dark uncertainty of the future?

When we realize how fantastically well off we are is it not our moral duty to share some of our fortune to help largel survive?

The greatest insurance for the survival of the U.S.A. and the free world is that Israel eventually live in peace and security.

Rabbi Stephen Wise, writing to Ludwig Lewisohn on April 1, 1938 had this to say "I am not hopeful at all that there is such a thing as a Christian conscience to be aroused. That prostitute (Cardinal Innitzer) sold himself into the arms of Hitler.

But on the other hand, we Jews are worse. We do not care. We give one hundredth of one percent of our possessions (not income) and we think we have done our duty. I confess an almost fiendish glee in the thought that all of them will yet have to yield up to $92\frac{1}{2}\%$, as do the German Jews today whom I saw on the homecoming ship. I almost despair of doing anything for our people because our people simply wish to go on, to live from day to day, and from hand to mouth without feeling, without sacrificing. In that way no people can live.

Gentlemen, when in February 1970 1 wrote a message titled "Plain Talk on the Subject of Giving" I had never read this statement from Rabbi Wise. My basis for condemning Jewish giving was predicated on the fact that Herzl went to his grave at an early age worn out and aggrieved when he discovered that Baron Maurice de Hirsch was 100% right in predicting failure for his plans to get financial assistance from rich Jews.

When in 1891 the Baron made a single contribution of \$50,000,000 to colonize east European Jews in Argentina it did not come out of income. It was 100% out of capital and left him with less than \$10,000,000. Before dying he gave away all that remained but kept a modest sum on which to live out his years.

Today despite the economic set back of the past 20 months I can submit an incredibly large list of Jewish names whose net worth ranges from \$10,000,000 to \$50,000,000 with several above the \$100,000,000 mark.

The mass of Jewish entrepeneurs are in the needle trades and in retailing. Not even during the depression have there been so many failures in these fields as have occurred in the past 9 months and seem likely to occur in the year 1971.

That is why I direct my plea to those with entrenched wealth among us. The giants in the food business - - - Consolidated, Food Fair, Stop and Shop and dozens of others - - - real estate mogols and builders - - - Uris, Minskoff, Meyerhoff, Weiler & Swig, and hundreds of others. Conglomerate heads - - - Norton Simon, Bludhorn, the Tisch Brothers, the many department store owners and discounters - excepting the extraordinary Charlie Bassine and his associates. There are many in the toy business - - Mattel, Ideal and others.

Just take the time to look over the names in the N.Y. Stock Exchange - - - Crown Zellerbach, Fishbach and Moore (good givers) Witco Chemical. Even in the hard hit garment field while hundreds such as Botany, Villager are losing money there remain, thank God, such dazzling successes as Hart, Schaffner and Marx, Kayser Roth, Jonathan Logan, Russ Togs, Aileen, Bond Clothing, Meyer of Norwich, and still 100 others, United merchants and Lowenstein and 50 others in textiles are doing nicely - - -Don't you agree?

If those I mention together with the hundreds I failed to mention -with Bronfman and the rest of the distillers thrown into the pot gave at least 10% of their net worth in this one year 1971 it would inspire the masses and those comfortably well off" poor millionares" to bring about the \$1,000,000,000 so desperately needed.

I will never agree with the deceased giant Rabbi Wise that he would get satisfaction in seeing rich Jews have their fortunes taken from them. Heaven forbid!

I am truly grateful that we have many great successes in commerce and finance as well as in all professions. May it ever be so. Only my experience of a lifetime causes me to share Baron de Hirsch's opinion in 1895 that "The rich Jews give nothing" also Shmarma Levin's opinion back in 1910 "The rich Jews in America believe in tithing. Only 10% of those who can give --- Give --and they give 10% of what they can and should give".

From 1895 to 1970 - - - after the holocaust there has been improvement.

Before I die I'd like to see it improve that in such a critical time as 1971 the super rich give 10% of their net worth to insure Israel's survival, the betterment of the U.S.A.'s position vs. the Soviets and their own peace of mind.

I'd like to go to my grave saying "Alas - -about the rich Jews it can no longer be said that "Riches make men sons of bitches".

One feels like wearing "sack cloth and ashes" in considering the nightmarish tragedy our people are undergoing.

I may ask, therefore, that you forgive me for such happiness as personal circumstances warrant. It can only be in a philosophical sense.

May God speed the day when it becomes possible for us to be happy in the full, unadulterated sense of the word.

CIVING TOO LITTLE AND TOO LATE:

THE TRAGIC ROLE OF THE JEWISH PEOPLE

It would be amusing were it not so tragic to witness how the Jews throughout history fail to give nearly enough to meet the needs of their stricken brethren. With many exceptions they have given hand outs or tips instead of adequate sums.

Baron Maurice de Hirsch only four years earlies -- 1891 wrote out a single check for 10,000,000 pounds (\$50,000,000) to help colonize the Jews in Argenting. The Rothschilds with far greater wealth and prestige were pygmies by comparison with this man of super vision, magnanimity and largesse.

Sometime after this one and only meeting with Baron de Hirsch Herzl wrote to him telling of his failure in getting funds. All the tyccons failed him as the Baron predicted. Herzl wrote by way of explanation "The Jews are at present not to be helped. If one showed them the Promised Land they would scoff at him. Yet I know where the cause lies; in ourselves - - - we must sink still deeper, be abused still more, spat at, despised, flogged, plundered and beaten until we are ripe for this idea - - - we are not desperate enough".

Let that prophecy of Herzl's sink into your minds indelibly.

Was it not tragically fulfilled by the pogroms in eastern Europe early in the twentieth century and ending in the holocaust in the forties?

Think! Never, never forget this!

The objective difficulties for the year ahead are very great and I would not minimize in the least the fact that we have a very, very hard campaign ahead of us. The start is encouraging. There were over 2000 people present at the banquet Saturday night and Truman said to our man who escorted him to the airport the following morning that it was the best organized meeting he had ever attended in his life.

At the Anniversary Service on Friday night there were 1800 persons present and at all of the business sessions there were somewhere between 1000 and 1500 delegates. It was really most remarkable. Norton Berman sat through most of it and I think you could get a very clear eye-witness report from him.

With reference to your letter of 6 December concerning dates that you will be in New York, I have noted those dates which are already pre-empted. May I ask you please to save the dates of March 5, 6 and 7. We will see what the campaign calendar produces and whether there are one or two profitable assignments, which would warrant your time. We will not know this for several weeks, but please reserve those dates for the UJA and as we come closer we will be able to give you more definite and precise information.



Dear Herbert:

In the course of the dinner last night, Irving Bernstein handed me the printed and bound copy of the speech which you delivered at the United Jewish Appeal National Conference on December 8th, with a comment that there had been some changes, and indicated that he would be glad to have me call him this morning after I had again read it. I had read the mimeographed copy which he was good enough to send me, at my request, two days ago.

As you undoubtedly know, I have been involved in the matter of exercising every possible caution and care in preserving the rights of our related agencies to their tax exempt status and have participated in a number of conferences on this subject when the Madison Square Garden Rally was held last summer, and both before June and since, when Washington inquiries into our activities, inspired, we think, by well known critics of our organizations, led to consultations with Ed Goodell, Maurice Boukstein, Mr. Rapp of Simpson, Thacher & Bartlett, and Mr. DeWind concerning matters which warranted most careful consideration. It was because of this relationship that Louis Broido suggested that you might clear with me with respect to material that would undoubtedly find its way into the hands of representatives of the Internal Revenue Service when there was as broad a distribution of the material as is now proposed with your address.

The speech breathes fire, as it was undoubtedly intended to, and does it excellently, but I feel that it does it so fully and effectively that there should be more definite references to the purposes to which the funds for which you are appealing are devoted.

So large a portion of the speech is devoted to war threats, the re-arming of Arab countries, the continuance of hostilities, the Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman

acquisition of Arab land, the Jews' determination for survival and, in general, the deliberate effort to persuade your listeners or readers that the end is not in sight because of the Arab determination to wipe out Israel by a continuance or renewal of war that, as I have indicated above, it is my opinion that more definite references to the purposes to which the funds you ask for are to be devoted should be more clearly stated, and this notwithstanding the section entitled "Priorities In Israel's Human Needs", and particularly the last two sentences in the first paragraph of the section headed "Humanitarian Needs Are Our Responsibility".

I have asked for and Ed Goodell has shown me a number of changes which he suggested on what is now the last page of the print of your speech. I think that they were important enough to warrant their adoption, especially in view of my comment above with respect to the failure to state in clear and explicit terms the purposes to which U.J.A. contributions are devoted and the area of responsibility for immigrants brought to Israel by our organizations.

In short, I would recommend that there is sufficient question with respect to a possible misconstruction of certain portions of the speech and the absence of a clear definition of the purposes to which the funds which are appealed for, both emergency and increases in the regular annual contributions, to warrant the submission of the speech to Mr. DeWind for his comments. I suggest Mr. DeWind since, as you know, he has not only been previously consulted on the general subject, but we have all looked to him to represent and advise our organizations when appearances are necessary at the Internal Revenue office, as well as in connection with inquiries made by committees of the Congress.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Edward Goodell and Louis Broido. Lou has solicited my opinion, and Ed is entitled to it.

Finally, I would repeat what I told you at Charlie's house a few nights ago so that there may be no misunderstanding. There is no need of direct clearance with me of material for advertising or general circulation because of J.D.C.'s interest in the matter. I have suggested to Lou Broido that we may well rely on Ed Goodell's judgment, but would request that where his advice is not taken in a matter which he deems of sufficient importance, he refer the subject to Lou Broido, who will consult with me or Mr. DeWind, or both of us, as he may wish.

Dear Lazure:

I have your letter of 23 February, which I have not had a chance to answer until now because I have been on the road almost constantly with campaign conferences and openings.

Let me give you my personal reactions, as follows:

1. I think your analysis of the campaign is correct. The greatest bulk of the money must come from the smallest number of top contributors. I think it is absolutely splended that you are willing to try to stimulate these top contributors by matching their increases with a 1/3 increase of your own. I think what you did in the 1964 campaign was marvelous when you said you would increase your pledge to the extent of 10% of all pledges made and paid above \$405,000. As you pointed out, this increased your liability by \$6000 above your basic pledge of \$25,000, which you were happy and willing to do. This year you are making an even more generous offer, and I think you are greatly to be commended for it.

2. I do not think you are correct in saying that if you increase your basic pledge of \$25,000 it will not affect the giving by others. I would strongly urge and recommond that you do make some increase, as a definite commitment. You know, and you hope very much that it will come to pass, that your offer to match will result in costing you more money. Last year, it cost you an extra \$6000. We do not know what it will cost you this year, but you are obviously willing to give something more in order to stimulate others. Therefore, my recommendation is that you take a fixed amount, let us say \$5000 and increase your gift by that definite commitment from \$25,000 to \$30,000. This might serve to inspire some of the other top 25 or 50 contributors, which is exactly what you want to see happen. I think you will help it to happen by making a small definite commitment increase. 3. The 1965 campaign has started out with some increases, but I do not see this campaign spurting abhead of last year's in the same proportion that last year's went ahead of the year before. In other words, 1964 showed almost a \$60,000 increase over 1963. I do not see a \$60,000 increase in 1965 over 1964. There will be some increase but I do not see it in the same dimensions. It might be that your plan has not been fully communicated to the top 25 or 50 individuals.

4. Therefore, I would like to make another suggestion, namely, that you write a personal letter to the top 25 or 50 men, explaining your willingness to match them, and urging them to increase their gifts. I think it is entirely possible for the Welfare Fund to reach a figure of \$500,000 if you spur the men forward. I realize that you cannotibe active in the campaign because you are adhering to your doctor's advice. On the other hand, writing a letter such as I am suggesting would not be too strenuous a task. I am sure that Frank Newman at the Welfare Fund office would be glad to have the typing done individually (it should not be a form letter by any means) and all you would have to do would be to sign your name 25 times. That you could do at your leisure in the evenings.

It is just wonderful to think that there are people like you who care so much about raising the level of the campaign. The thought you gave to these various plans and schemes makes of you more than just a contributor -- you are really a creator of ideas.

Please let me know what you think of my suggestions. Meanwhile, keep in good health.



Dear Dr. Grayzel:

I have received a copy of a book written in Hebrew by Mr. Abba Gefen, entitled "The Barrier Breakers", dealing with the period of the underground immigration of Jewish refugees to Palestine immediately following World War II.

I understand that you have the volume under consideration for possible publication in English.

It would seem to me that there would be a good deal of interest in this subject, particularly since there appears to be a new slant in this book. Gefen deals with the role which the American Army played in that whole period. There are not many books available in English on the <u>bricha</u>, and there is none I know of which pays proper tribute to the compassion and understanding displayed by the American Army, particularly its top echelon.

I served as a Chaplain for two years in Germany at that time, of which one year was spent as Deputy to Rabbi Philip Bernstein. I do not think Phil has seen this book as yet, but I am certain he would be interested in doing so.

I would not know, of course, the criteria by which your publication policy is operated. Nor do I wish to be presumptuous in any way. I simply thought that I would bring to your attention the fact that the book seems to me to deal with a subject in which there is perennial interest.

I delayed answering your letter for a few days because I wanted to investigate the mystery of the few pages of the book you wrote about. I saw those pages and I sent them on to a reader---as our regulations require---received his report, and apparently sent them on to another reader who still has them without having given me his impressions. At least this is the only way I can account for my inability to locate the brief portion of the book which came into my hands.

My readers report, and my own impression, was that, while there are differences between Mr. Gefen's approach and those of others (Leo Schwartz, for example, in the "Redeemers"), the differences would not strike us as sufficiently clear cut and important. But, as I say, my own impression is based on only a cursory examination. It would be most helpful, if the book has already been published in Hebrew, if we could receive a copy so that the total approach could be gaged. We have enough Hebrew readers on our Publication Committee for no one to fear that it is a forlegn language for us.

If you will be good enough to transmit this to Mr. Gefen or his Hebrew Publisher I shall be most grateful. Moreover, I want to thank you for your interest in us and our work.
