I know that you must have plenty of worries on your hands. Still I thought I must keep you posted on the unfinished part of Chief Justice Warren's visit. As you will no doubt remember, I had promised to cable Athens, in order to enable him to see the arrival and departure of immigrants, as you suggested at the meeting we had at the Sheraton. I have now been informed by our Diplomatic Mission in Greece that they contacted the Chief Justice through the United States Embassy and he accepted the suggestion made by the people on the spot as to when and where he should visit the immigrants. When the day came, however, he excused himself, through the Counsellor of your Embassy, who explained that the Chief Justice was very fatigued. Anyway, we have done our best. When he gets back to the United States, at the beginning of September, you will know best what if anything should be done to approach him on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal. You may remember that in spite of his keen interest he was very reluctant to get involved in what he called "international affairs". I am sure you will talk to Abe on the subject. 4 September, 1962 Mr. Gideon Saguy Ministry for Foreign Affairs Jerusalem, Israel Dear Gideon: I have just come back from a long campaign trip through South Africa, which was very rewarding. It was hard, and the moral was low, in view of the peculiar situation in which the Jews find themselves down there, vis-a-vis Israel's vote on the South African censure resolution, but it was richly rewarding in terms of trying to life their morale and the campaign got started with a real bang. More money even was pledged at the opening meetings than in the last campaign, and this surprised the leadership no end. They were very enthusiastic. Upon my return, I found a whole stack of mail including your letter about Chief Justice Warren. I am delighted that you carried through in Greece the way you did and that he had the chance to see everything that he saw. We will now have to discuss, very delicately, exactly how to involve him on behalf of the UJA. It may very well be that we can do nothing more than to obtain his moral support. On the other hand it might be that he could make some appearances for us. We will be guided by the over-all diplomatic considerations involved, and certainly will do nothing without consulting Abe. I'm sorry this note has to be so hasty, but I'm simply swamped.  - A. Get communities accept fair share both goals
 - B. Get extra gifts from everybody
 - C. You and I must give extra here and now.

- 1. The first thing I think you must know is that Israel is facing its third year in a row of above normal immigration. "Normal immigration" for Israel means about 30,000 newcomers a year. Last year, Israel received 62,000 people. (We also moved 9,000 additional people to other countries, like United States, Canada, Australia, etc.) In 1961, Israel received 48,000 immigrants. And the immigration for 1963 could bring the three year total to anywhere from 150,000 to 175,000 immigrants most of them penniless and needing all kinds of help.
- 2. The second thing you should be aware of is that there also was heavy movement by Jews to other countries last year -- and that this promises to continue. In the neighborhood of 200,000 Jews were on the move hast year in one of the greatest Jewish refugee movements since the war. About 110,000 of them were Jews from Algeria who fled in the four months of February through May into France. There also was an appreciable movement, of Jewish refugees from Cuba into this country, and of Jewish refugees from Egypt and certain European areas to Western countries, including this one.
- 3. The third thing you should know is that the UJA told you last year that we would have to move at least 60,000 Jews to Israel and other areas. The fact is that we had to move 72,000. (We did not have to move the Algerian Jews. They came into France, as French citizens, mostly on their own. But, as you will see, they are going to be an increasing responsibility upon us).
- 4. Now the fourth and most important fact you should know is -- that the UJA set out to raise \$95,000,000 in 1962. We raised \$65,000,000. That is an enormous achievement. But I don't have to tell any of you, in the light of the immigration figures I have just given you -- it was nowhere near enough.

- 5. What happened as a result? Well, there was suffering and there was trouble. But by and large all those people our fellow Jews were taken care of at least on a minimum basis. They were taken care of largely because Jews who are in no position to give what American Jews can give made increased sacrifices. I mean the two million Jews of Israel. I mean the Jewish community of France most of them refugees to that country, since the war.
- 6. In 1962, the Jewish Agency which is your instrument and mine for settling and absorbing Israel's refugees asked for \$68 million. It needed that sum for two great reasons: to take care of 60,000 anticipated immigrants, transporting them, housing them, and starting them on the road to a new life. And it needed it for more than 200,000 earlier immigrants who still had to have help farmers, children in youth centers, aged people, and many others. What it received was \$30 million less than it needed as a result it had to borrow \$18 million from European banks at high interest rates because it had agreed not to borrow in this country. And the Government of Israel meaning the peo-le of Israel who pay the taxes assisted the Agency, to the tune of an additional \$12 million.
- 7. Now you can say, it's right that the people of Israel should do something to help the newcomers. But what you need to realize is that the people of Israel were and are already taking care of two thirs of the cost of settling in each refugee who comes to Israel. It costs about \$10,000, spent over a year and a half or so, to settle in a refugee family of four to bring them provide them with modest housing give them a few household goods such as beds, a little stove, etc., give them mdical care, provide

schooling for the children, give them work relief and help the family breadwinner get a job, and many other things. Two-thirds of that \$10,000 is
supplied by the Israel citizen (generally a recent immigrant himself) —
through one of the highest tax rates in the world — through a compulsory
loan — through contributions to the Keren Hayesod — which is the UJA campaign
in Israel. And last year, the citizens of Israel had to make good our failure
to provide even the one-thir share of our responsibility. This was never
intended to be the situation.

- 8. I'm not going to try in this brief time to give you the whole story of this year's needs in Israel. But here are some of the highlights of which you should be aware. The Jewish agency is going to have to:
- A. Transport and receive in the neighborhood of 60,000 new immigrants from Rumania, Morocco, and other areas. Those Jews can't wait and the Jewish Agency can't wait. If there is one thing we learned in 25 years of UJA it is that immigration is always "now or never." The emigration door closed down in Rumania toward the last half of the year but we got some 10,000 people out in the first half. Now we know 14,000 exit permits have been granted inside Rumania and we have to take those people out quickly, as soon as there is movement. We know there will be heavy Amigration from Morocco. The prospect is good. It will be on a very broad scale. But we can't take the chance that it will stay that way, and we have to take as many as we can, while we can. So immigration and absorption must go shead, for which about \$21,000,000 is needed.
- B. The Agency must build 16,000 housing units -- that's the minimum for these people. What's a housing unit? It's a room, or a room and a half for a family of up to eight people. Yes, eight people! There are 30,000 families of six, seven and eight persons in Israel living in no more than a room and a

Mill be \$19 million! That -- with immigration and absorption costs -- adds up to \$40,000,000 directly traceable to handling the arrival of 60,000 newcomers.

- C. But the Agency must also meet the unmet needs of other years. One thing we are never able to do in the UJA -- we can't start each year with a clean slate. The responsibilities attending on this great process of rescue immigration just can't be solved in one year. And so -- we have in Israel more than 250,000 immigrants of other years that have to be aided, by the Jewish Agency -- together with JDC, in many ways. Farmers, old people, young people -- social cases, etc.
- 9. I'm not going to give you all the figures and costs. But I want to give you one example from this group. There are 50,000 immigrants who must be taken care of by Malben the JDC in Israel. These are the aged, the handicapped, the chronically ill -- the people Israel has taken in gladly, because it will not close its doors to any Jew who wants to come in.

There isn't one of you who isn't interested in taking care of the Jewish aged in your own communities. But do you know how many Jewish aged we must take care of in Malben institutions — 4,200! We support more beds for the aged in tiny Israel than does the entire Jewish Federation of New York, in New York City! And never forget — these are the people who suffered the most under Hitler, or Arab oppressors — who lost homes, children, families and health. We are making their declining years happy and useful. Is there anything more wonderful than that?

10. Well -- I can tell you one thing that's just as wonderful -- it's the story of what you and I do for children. Through all the UJA agencies -- through the Jewish Agency -- through the Joint Distribution Committee -- through NYANA and United Hias, we will help more than 150,000 children in 1963.

In Morocco alone -- the JDC will give 30,000 shbool children their one hot meal a day. That meal costs us 5 cents -- because its supplemented with US surplus foods. It's a fine meal, a wonderful meal for those kids. But our nutrionists have decided it's short of certain vitamins and proteins. We need to spend another 2 or 3 cents on that meal. But we won't be able to, unless you help us meet our goal!

11. I want to round out this "arithmetic" lesson with just a few words on the JDC. I've told you about that it is doing in Israel through Malben.

But outside Israelthe JDC is still going what it has been doing for nearly 50 years — saving Jewish lives in Europe. And it is saving Jewish lives in Moslem countries too — more than 200,000 — in Europe and in Moslem lands.

There is one item in the JDC budget that we never tell people about ---

It's an item for \$5,200,000 for something called "Relief in Transit."

Let me translate that title for you -- it means getting in help to Jews behind the Iron Curtain. Yes, behind the Iron Curtain -- even in Russia!

Gentlemen, through UJA, you and I send in food packages to about 125,000 Jews in Rumania, Hungary, Czechoslovakia and the USSR — one or two a year. We don(t send them into Poland because the Polish Government permits the JDC to run an out-in-the-open program for 12,000 Jews in need — half of the remaining Jewish population of Poland.

I can't give you the details. And don't ask me how we do it. But take my word for it -- we are still helping thousands and thousands of Jews in what was once the great center of Jewry -- Eastern Europe.

12. Let me tell you about one more area of need -- France. There are 160,000 Jewish refugees in France today from North Africa - people who came in from Tunis, Morocco and Algiers in the last 18 months. And there are several thousand new refugees from Eastern Europe as well. Just about every other Jew in France is a Post-War refugee.

We have been helping the needlest — those from Tunisia. So has

French Jewry. But because they are French citizens, the main help for the

110,000 Jews from Algeria has come from the French Government. However, that

aid was granted for a single year. Beginning next month, in February —

thousands of Algerian Jews will be going off relief monthly — and JDC's burden

will grow by leaps and bounds. The JDC will need at least \$3,000,000 for aid
in France alone in 1963.

13. Now -- in 1963 -- we can't ask the Jewish Agency to go out and borrow more money. It has borrowed to the hilt, already.

We can't ask the Government of Israel to make up the difference. Israel is facted with an enormour security problem. You've read about it. You know how Israel must try desperately to catch up with the arms that Nasser has been getting from the Soviet Union. You know he now has rockets, and the latest jet bombers. Our Government was so concerned about that, that it changed its fourteen year old position, and agreed to sell arms to Israel. It sold the Hawk ground-to-air missiles -- which are very expensive. Well, any funds at all that the Israel Government can save, or borrow or raise in 1963 are going to go for those missiles, and other arms. Israel must reinforce its defences, so that it can have some assurance of being able to meet the threat posed by Nasser. And Nasser keeps saying that 1963, on 1964 will be the decisive year -- and Israel just can't afford NOT to take him seriously!

In the face of all this — there's only one thing we can do — ask American Jaws to do their full part, and really raise \$95,000,000. And that means, we start with ourselves.

14. We've come a long way from the situation as it was 25 years ago, when UJA was started.

We've saved Jewish lives -- three million of them.

We've resettled a million and a half Jews in free lands, most of them in Israel.

We saw Israel born, and we helped it to get born, and to begin to grow.

We raised, and spent, well and wisely, one and a half billion dollars.

And we have a lot to show for what we've done --

In Israel -- in the refugees who ve made good in this country -- in the reborn Jewish communities of Europe and other areas.

But we can't stop now.

15. I've called this an arithmetic lesson.

Those figures are people, they are Jews. They are the people you and I might have been if we, or our fathers, had remained in the old country, and not emigrated to this blessed land. They could be -- and some of them probably are -- our cousins, our uncles and aunts, actual family members. We must care for them, because we really care, and most of the world has never cared.

16. At the Annual UJA Meeting -- the delegates voted a \$95,000,000 UJA goal -- \$600,000 Regular Fund, and \$36,000,000 Special Fund. This sum is absolutely required.

- 17. 25 years ago we couldn't do much. But if you want to save Jewish lives now, we can do a lot. And this is what we must do:

 As leaders, we must lead.
- A. We must get our communities to accept a fair share of both the Regular Campaign and the Special Fund.
- B. We must get every person we can, to make an extra generous gift to the Regular Fund, and, again to the Special Fund. The giving must be commensurable with the goal.
- C. Above all -- we each of us must set an example and show the way -- by giving our own increased gifts to the Regular Fund, and then to the Special Fund!

Dear Herb,

Dr.Elk and I are at present meeting with representatives of the Haifa Municipality in order to work out the details as to the administration of the French Carmel School.

I am writing you about a different matter:

Our incipient Reform Movement in Israel has grown in recent years to the point where we have organized into a national body. Last year we held a national conference of Progressive Congregations. 120 delegates attended from congregations throughout the country which can be described as non-orthodox. This includes what would be considered in the United States both Reform and Conservative. A Union of Congregations was established at that conference, and representatives of the various congregations have been meeting ever since.

This conference was held through the initiative of an organization of Rebbis which was founded two years ago, called MaRaM (ping, an pise) asym), which comprises the progressive Rabbis. We believe that we have an important task to perform in Israel in order to restore the respect for Religion in general and Judaism in particular here. I do not have to recount to you the problems to which I refer. Bur hands are tied behind our backs not only because of orthodox opposition but because we have no funds to publish periodicals, to print books and to hold national meetings in order to make our liberal interpretation of Judaism known. On behalf of MaRaM I would ask you to consider putting our organization into the scheme of funds distributed to Israel from the UJA. You are more aware than I that a good percentage of the contributions to the UJA and coming from members of Reform and Conservative Congregations. I \$ would never suppose for a moment that all of them give to the UJA merely because they are Reform or Conservative Jews. However, I am sure that they would want to support our struggling movement here through their contributions at at least to the same extent as they contribute to the "official" orthodox institutions which receive money from the Fund.

Without making any specific request I would like to have your reaction and look forward to hearing from you at your earliest convenience.

Dear Ed:

This is to report that I made my two calls. I had a long talk with Erwin Bubhalter, in which I asked him for \$50,000. He said it was not easy and he was sweating and would need some time. I urged him to take all the time in the world if that would help him arrive at the desired figure. My own appraisal is that he is trying. Whether he is trying hard enough, I am not sure. I would say that you should put him on Eddie Ginsberg's list for a visit later this month.

I had an even longer talk with Lester Deutsch. He explained to me the problems they were having with Lockheed. If Lockheed ceases doing business with them completely, they will be stuck with \$1 million inventory on their hands. They hope this will not happen, but they do foresee reduced volume of business.

I asked him for \$100,000. He said that is the amount they were planning to give away totally to everything -- \$50,000 to us and \$50,000 to all the various hospitals, centers, non-Jewish drives, etc. I asked him if he could either increase the amount to be given away in toto, or declare a moratorium on other things and give us the whole \$100,000. He said he would not be able to answer for several months -- probably August.

I had a feeling he was being conscientious and honest. I am not sure that forcing him to see Eddie at the end of the month would help.

If I were you I would indicate to him that you are aware of my conversation with him, and that you will mark your calendar to talk to him in June or July.

I have a feeling that both conversations were helpful.



I shall not be able to use this entire manuscript, since I will not have enough time available. I am not certain which parts I shall use, but give you the entire paper, so that you can excise what you wish for publicity purposes. This address is the one I delivered, in essence, at the emergency UJA meeting last summer at Wernersville, Pennsylvania. It is the one which seemed to have been attractive to Mr. Morgenthau. As you can see, it is rather pithy in style, direct, forthright, and not couched in particularly elegant language. It does not make as good reading, as it does speaking. As you are undoubtedly aware, I was asked recently by Mr. Levi Eshkol, the Finance Minister of the State of Israel, on behalf of his Government, to take responsibility for, and to become the chief executive officer of, a new organization for the sale of State of Israel bonds in this and other countries.

Although it had been my original intention to retire to some less arduous task at the end of the 1955 campaign, I felt that I could not avoid this new responsibility for Israel's continued economic development and consolidation which had been offered to me at this critical moment.

The new organization which I have been called on to organize and head will be a successor in the bond sales effort to the American Financial and Development Corporation for Israel, and my expectation is that I shall assume these duties by mid-May.

As a result of arrangements which were made late last year, Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman of Milwaukee will succeed to the Executive Vice-Chairmanship following my departure. I am happy to announce that Rabbi Friedman will assume the post of UJA Executive Vice-Chairman on June 1st.

I should like to extend to the entire staff of the United Jewish Appeal my sincerest thanks for its excellent cooperation with me over the past four and a half years. It is my greatest hope, also, that every member of the staff will rally around Rabbi Friedman to assure the most vigorous continuity of the UJA's effort in behalf of all who depend on it. I should like to point out that, while the UJA this year is off to its finest start in years - with more money raised in the first two months of 1955 than in any previous campaign year - it will take the utmost effort and dedication on the part of each member of the staff to sustain the splendid momentum that has already been achieved. I feel confident that you will make this effort not only out of your customary devotion to duty, but especially in token of the inspiring leadership which is being given by our new General Chairman, Mr. Rosenwald, and the fine leadership you can expect from Rabbi Friedman.

I am especially pleased and gratified by the knowledge that, while I shall be in another organization, I shall be united with you in a common and historic endeavor in the cause of humanity and freedom.

During the Regional Conference at Del Coronado there were several discussions with Max and myself regarding the scheduling difficulties of the Los Angeles Welfare Fund with the Los Angeles Israel Bond Compaign.

As you know, within a few week period there was an important Bond meeting with Abba Eban as well as the Welfare Fund's opening meeting with Avraham Harman. It seems apparent that both meetings must suffer from competition with each other and the image of both must of necessity be blurred in the minds of the Welfare Fund contributor and the Bond purchaser.

Max and I were made ownre of the fact that there exists an understanding between the Los Angeles Welfare Fund and the Los Angeles Bond organization, as to calendar.

This calendar understanding does not take into consideration the change in the timing of the National UJA and Velfare Fund Compaigns which has taken place in the last few years. Due to the fact that the National Insugural Meeting was held in December this year, the entire National Compaign has been accelerated. This acceleration will continue in the years to come. It is, therefore, important that the Los Angeles Welfare Fund be able to get sufficient breathing time from other communal compaigns to permit it to begin its compaign earlier in the year in line with the National Effort.

I am writing to you in your capacity as a member of the UJA Executive Committee to ask you to attempt to work out a solution of this problem. You are in a unique position to do this due to your leadership in the Los Angeles Welfare Fund as well as the Bond Organization.

Our suggestion is that the Israel Bond Organization be given the months of July through December and that the Los Angeles Welfare Fund be allotted the months of February through June. The month of Jammary should be assigned to neither so that the community can have a respite from public functions. Jammary could be used quietly by both organizations - The Bonds to clean up, and the Welfare Fund to begin personal solicitations.

The United Jewish Appeal is the major American body raising funds for the transportation of Jewish immigrants to Israel and their resettlement there, and to provide humanitarian aid to scores of thousands of refugees and distressed Jews in 30 other countries throughout the world.

Mr. Shane is one of the sponsors of the Denmark School to be constructed in Jerusalem as a project of the Israel Education Fund of the UJA. This comprehensive high school will commemorate Denmark's rescue of virtually its entire Jewish population during the Nazi occupation. In return, Mr. and Mrs. Shane were among the donors received by the Danish royal family in October 13, 1965, a week prior to the school's groundbreaking ceremonies in Israel.

Mr. Shane is a frequent visitor to Israel and Europe as a member of the UJA Study Missions, and is a leading authority on Jewish needs overseas.

As Western Region Co-Chairman of the UJA for the past decade, Mr. Shane has visited practically every Jewish community on the West Coast to help raise funds, and has been to many communities as often as five or six times. He is a past General Chairman of the United Jewish Welfare Fund of Greater Los Angeles, of which the UJA is a major beneficiary, and is a Board member of the Greater Los Angeles Jewish Federation-Council which sponsors the Fund campaign. Mr. Shane also serves on the UJA's top policy making bodies, the National Executive Committee, and the National Campaign Cabinet. In addition, he is a member of the National Council of the Joint Distribution Committee, one of the UJA's chief beneficiaries.

A native of Chicago, Mr. Shane attended Northwestern University Law School, and is currently in the field of investment banking, where he is noted as an authority. He is also a Board member of the Ampal-American Israel Development Corporation.

Mr. Shane is also active in Israel bonds drives, Brandeis University, the Hebrew University and a host of other Jewish philanthropic organizations. He has served as President of the Los Angeles Modern Forum, as Chairman of the Community Relations Conference of Greater Los Angeles, and is a Director of the Center for Democratic Studies in Santa Barbara.

His son John, following in his father's footsteps, is 1965-66 Chairman of the Youth Campaign of the United Jewish Welfare Fund in their community, and was a member of the JDC staff in Paris in 1964.

The United Jewish Appeal is the major American agency aiding immigrants to Israel, and refugees and distressed Jews overseas. We have not been able to connect on the telephone and I am about to leave again for Los Angeles, so I decided to put my thoughts in writing.

You may recall that we sat on the balcony at the Bilton Botel in Tel Aviv some weeks ago and I spoke to you about the possibility of a National Pamily Foundation gift of \$1 million for 1971. I spoke further about the fact that the allocation of this money into various cities in which it is now given was almost as important as the total size of the gift itself. I tried to explain that a large increase in the Chicago portion would be much more productive than a large increase in the Baltimore or Boston portions, for example. The reason for that is that a large increase in Chicago might have a greater possibility of stimulating other large increases, and more so than in other cities.

At any rate, the question of allocation is secondary to the question of total amount. As far as I can ascertain, the 1970 gift was as follows:

This compares to a total during the entire 1970 campaign of only 5 gifts in that category. So you can see that the Jewish leadership of this country does have an understanding of the enormous financial crisis through which Israel is passing at this moment, and is responding. Dear Herb,

Zipporah and I returned Saturday night from an eight days' sea voyage to Venice and back, which was all we could afford by way of a vacation. The escapade was fantastically successful. The sea, by its calmness and limpidity, was beautifully cooperative, and the crew of S/S Theodor Herzl did their full share in making our trip both restful and enjoyable.

Upon reverting to my routine existence early yesterday morning, I found your cable and letter lying on my desk. Many many thanks for both of them. Your generous reference to the traces I appear to have left in some people's minds in South Africa has been deeply appreciated.

I had already had a most glowing account of your own performance in that country. I have sent you copies of Edel Horowitz's letter and of my reply to him. All in all, I am really happy about the way this adventure has come off, both for the sake of that community and for your own sake.

I addressed my inquiry as to the date of my arrival in New York to Irving Bernstein not being sure whether you were already back. I now see the position as to the time-table of the December Conference very clearly, and I hereby solemnly undertake to report for duty in New York on Friday morning, December 7th.

Between you and me, I will be travelling to New York via Dakar, of all places; there I will have to do some talking and listening at what promises to be an interesting international conference on the 3rd, 4th and 5th of December - so I have figured out that if I fly from Dakar to Paris on the morning of the 6th, it will not be difficult for me to reach New York in time.

When we met last, you utterred some ominous words about my having to stay on in New York for 10 or 15 days after the Conference. Is this serious and, if so, what are the exact tasks? I should hate to have to flit from one city to another addressing ddinners. Personal assaults at one end of the scale and regional rallies at another would be much preferable. But I also have things of my own to do in New York - for instance, going a little deeper into the whole problem of Jewish-Hebrew education - so I would not at all mind staying on without taking part in UJA drudgery. To combine both would be difficult, whilst to extend the stay still further would, on the one hand, mean a longer absence from Israel

than I could afford as Chairman and, on the other hand, land me straight into the Christmas week during which nothing much can be done in the USA anyway.

You will appreciate that the sooner you can throw some light on this problem as to what is to happen immediately after the Conference, the better for the person concerned.

Since I am writing, I should like to take the opportunity of clearing up one or two items of the Study Mission's programme, in addition to whatever you or Irving may be hearing direct from Moshe and/or Chayim.

It is all very well for Irving to cable that the President "must" see the Mission on a certain date. Humble and modest as our President may be, both constitutionally and personally, he cannot always be expected to take orders from UJA Headquarters in New York. He will not receive the Mission either on the 29th, or on the 30th, or on the 31st of October, 1962. It is a matter of non-possumus, which fact should be very firmly fixed in your minds. As between friends, I can give you the reasons. On the 29th he ceases to be President because that is the end of his term. On the 30th he will - I hope be re-elected by the Knesset, and on the 31st he will be sworn in. If there are three days in the President's five years! term of office during which he cannot possibly be expected to keep himself available for the reception of guests from abroad, these are the days. So it is no use bandying about "musts" over wires or waves of ether - the thing cannot and will not take place, and that is that. Our suggestion is therefore, that the Presidential reception be fixed for the afternoon of November 1st, and that the big farewell dinner should, for this as well as for other reasons, be shifted from Tel-aviv to Jerusalem and take place the same evening.

As for the Knesset, since it is to be assumed that the visit of the Study Mission cannot be postponed till the new Knesset building, of which so far only the foundations have been leid, is completed, and since you insist that all the 140 members of the Mission "must" be accommodated in the gallery of which feat the present Knesset building is physically incapable - then the whole idea of the Mission attending a Knesset meeting has to be abandoned. Here again, the reality of the situation, which makes it impossible to squeeze into the Knesset gallery more than 40 visitors at a time, has to be faced squarely as a matter of elementary arithmetic - or geometry. But if the idea is not to be abandoned, then only one course seems to be open, which is that only a select ten should come to the Knesset on the day of the reopening of the session, which falls on Monday the 29th of October, to be seated, with all due pomp and dignity, on the floor of the House. This would also obviate the necessity for the entire contingent to travel to Jerusalem twice.

P.S. If this letter, particularly its second part, has turned out to be too breezy, you have the Mediterranean to blame, the salty air of which still tickles my nostrils.

Please note the photograph of a shipload of immigrants arriving in Israel and the immigration figures indicated on the front page for the entire year 1962, as well as the monthly rate. As you know, we have been very strict about mentioning such figures, even to the point of harming our fund raising potential. It is, therefore, frustrating to see this information so openly publicized where such relatively little money is involved. In addition, it is very difficult for us to give any logical and rational answer to the Anglo-Jewish papers in the United States who have accepted voluntary censorship at our request when they see items like this published in a prominent newspaper such as the Jewish Chronicle. Dear Moshes

Just as you wrote me a lovely breezy letter after your return from the Mediterranean in mid-September, I write you an equally breezy answer in mid-October.

Letters which wait that long have a way of requiring no answer. All problems were resolved in the passage of time. I think that the crossings of cables which have occurred in the interim have settled all problems except one, namely, the time-table of your stay in the United States in December.

You suggested that you would fly from Dakar to Paris on the morning of the 6th, and thence to New York. That would be fine. The annual conference will be completed on the 9th. I did hint at the fact that your good services would undoubtedly result in the swelling of the treasury if you could give us some days of work after the conference. At this writing, I cannot offer you an exact itinerary, but do not think there would be much "flitting" from one city to another. Between now and then there would be a few very key meetings which will undoubtedly develop. I refer to such things as selling the Special Fund to Boards of Directors, doing prime soliciting of key leaders, negotiating pre-campaign formulae, or other such top level activity as would help to get the sampaign started.

I appreciate the fact that you have many things you wish to do on your own in New York, and you indicated that you would not mind staying on without taking part in the birth pangs of the 1963 campaign.

Therefore, it seems to me that if you could plan on remaining in New York for a couple of weeks after the conference, we could divide the time between UJA and other duties.

I am leaving tomorrow with the Mission for our first leg in Poland. We will be arriving in Israel early evening of the 22nd and you and I will have full opportunity to discuss all the plans in prospect.

During the last war, whenever you travelled by train in the then so dismal England, what stared you straight in the face was the query: "Is your journey really necessary?"

Exactly this question arose in my mind when scanning the most impressive program you have published for the 25th U.J.A. Annual National Conference. When I see in it, on the Israel side, Golda and Abe for the Government, Nahum and Louis for the Agency, I begin to feel myself a kind of a fifth wheel. The one thing I really hate as regards my public appearances is to be redundant. Or let me put it conversely: unless my participation is absolutely necessary, nay indispensable, I definitely consider it not worthwhile the effort of a journey with all that goes with it in terms of absence from my office in Jerusalem on the one hand, and my immersion in all sorts of worries at the other end.

Moreover, had there been some really important service in the offing which I could perform for the U.J.A. immediately after the Conference, the position would have been different. I might then even suggest that perhaps you dispense with me altogether as far as the Conference is concerned, seeing how abundantly you are provided with other talent, and let me come just for that additional event. Yet I doubt whether the Campaign can get off to a real start between the Conference and the Christmas week which anyhow would put a lid on all activities, even if started.

I should appreciate your immediate reaction to these second thoughts which have started bothering me seriously.



Dear Moshe:

Louis Pincus has by now left the United States and is on his way back home. He had a magnificently successful tour of eleven of the largest communities of the country. The reports were uniformly laudatory. It was the best campaign visit he has ever made. I thought you would be happy to know this.

I am enclosing a clipping from the London Jewish Chronicle News Service. Without being able to wouch for its authenticity, nevertheless I wish to bring up a matter with you based upon the assumption that this item is correct.

Should Mr. Eshkol come to the United States, openly and officially as Prime Minister, it would be vitally important for him to have an open and official meeting with the UJA. I think it is not necessary for me to belabor this point since you will recognize immediately that the status and importance of the UJA would be enhanced if he were to announce that he was attending a meeting with us, and, conversely, serious damage would be done to our image if he were to avoid or ignore us while here.

On Mr. Ben Gurion's previous visits to the United States, the arrangements with the UJA were very, very far from satisfactory. Perhaps it was because of the tentative nature of his itinerary, or perhaps because of some thought-lessness in staff planning. But whatever the reason, there was a residue of ill will after each of the two visits on the part of UJA leadership.

Mr. Moshe Sharett -2-3 February 1964 I am certain that if you take this in hand, Mr. Eshkol would be willing to abide by any arrangements you suggest to him. The most important thing is to achieve the following three objectives: a firm date, enough time to promote a worthwhile meeting, and open publicity about the meeting. If, for example, he were coming in May, and we could know 60 days in advance the exact date that he would give us, we would have the time to plan properly and bring together an attendance from all over the country. If, ' then, we coordinated our announcements so that when it was announced in Israel that he was going to the United States, and included in his plans would be a visit to the UJA on such and such a date, this information would be released simultaneously by us on this side. Well, perhaps I have gone into too much detail. The basic point is that the URA warmly and cordially invites the Prime Minister and hopes that he will accept. I put this matter in your hands, asking for guidance. So far we have written nothing to him. I would appreciate hearing from you as to whether there is any substance to the announcement of his visit and what your reaction is to this proposal of mine. With fondest regards, I am, As ever. Just before coming out to Los Angeles, I was in Washington, where the UJA had its big Inaugural Dinner, like the one last year with President Johnson which you attended. This year we had Vice-President Humphrey. When I went to his office in the Senate to pick him up to bring him over to the hotel, I reminded him that the last time he spoke for the UJA was at the Western Regional Conference two years ago at Palm Springs. When I told him that, his face lighted up in a big smile and he said that he recalled that meeting with a great deal of pleasure because he enjoyed very much going out there.

Then he asked how you were. It was really most remarkable that he should remember you and I told him that I was surprised that he could remember one man, when he sees so many people all over the United States. He said that he remembered you quite clearly because you havenade a tremendous impression upon him with your speech and the story of your life. You will recall that you preceded him on the program in Palm Springs and you told about the experiences that you had gone through. Those experiences, which were so typical of the recent history of the whole Jewish people in Europe, made an impression on him, and you symbolized for him the value of freedom and democracy. You came out of the background of the camps and when you reached the United States, you built a fortune by your skill and ingenuity. This impressed him because it was a perfect example of how a man can forge ahead in a democratic environment.

Mr. Nathan Shapell -2-27 January 1965 I think it is quite remarkable and a great tribute to you, that the Vice-President of the United States should remember you so well and that he should ask for you two years later. This should make you feel good, Nathan, and you should be very proud of what you have accomplished. Dear Herb:

Not at all to repay you with equal coin, is this my reply to your letter of 2.19.1962 delayed; I had to think of a way out from the impass, so obvious from your letter.

My provisional suggestion at this date is the following:

The Jewish War Veterans Ladies Auxilliary, contribution to which are tax-exempt, have been raising money for the hospital ever since 1948. Their first contribution in 1948 was a major one, \$ 150,000 in one lump sum; later on, yearly \$ 20,000-25,000, all for equipment, were raised or rather contributed. They have been able to clear all contributions to our hospital as to an "adopted" hospital, on equal footing with contributions to the various Veterans Hospitals in the U.S.A. as far as taxemption is concerned.

The fact that we are a non-sectorian, non-profitmaking hospital and we also have a voluntary public body, which takes care of new installations in our hospital, the Government only giving us the maintenance budget, I feel, might give us a chance to be acceptable from the fiscal point of view.

One of the most important "Philantropic Development Consultants" in your country who helped raise funds for building universities, has written to me that Tel-Hashomer, by now, has a name all over the U.S.A. and with the Manhattan Guild for New York and the Jewish War Veterans for the rest of your country, considerable funds could be raised.

As it is my duty to start planning the replacement of our huts before they collapse into rubble, and as on the other hand the Treasury of our Government has had to completely ignore our plight, either for lack of funds or also for lack of appreciation of our precatastrophic situation, I cannot sit back in resignation and accept this death sentence to Tel-Hashomer.

I know too well that Mrs. Rose Halpern or Mr. Hemlin and other members of your committee, though sympathetic with my efforts in 1948, fail to appreciate today our being an essential tool for Israel. Even my great friends from the A.J.D.C. Mr. Ed Warburg and Mr. Moe Lewith never thought of what will happen to Tel-Hashomer if its buildings cease to be usable. Imagine how well our need of investing one to two million dellars per year, over a period of 5-6 years, could stirr many fund raisers and many donors to increase their contribution or to maintain it, only because it will serve to make a wareffort with a special flavour like a hespital survive destruction and assist in creating peace and happiness?

For all these reasons I again would suggest you reconsider our case. I am about to write to Mr. Warburg and to Mr. Lewith in the same vein. Mr. A.S. Kay has discussed our case with Mrs. Jessie Gneshin the Executive Director of the J.W.V.L.A. who came specially to Israel to see our work and think whether it would be humane to let us perish, or deteriorate. We pride ourselves today of being the largest general hospital with the greatest number of surgical procedures up to 2,000 per year; we are probably the best in Eye Surgery, equal to anybody in Traumatology, Chest Surgery and Vascular Surgery. All this cannot just go down only because we wrote on our flag to stay uncommitted to any agency or political group? or because we reconciled with huts when money had to go for more crying and more essential needs.

I hope you will discover how much our desperate situation can make us eloquent not only as letter writer, but before andiences, all over the U.S.A. Our having stayed in simple structures could serve as a ribbon on our chests when we come now and ask for "Rehabilitation".

Dear Herb :

Thank you for your letter. Louis Pincus did not discuss with me anything regarding our plight. He has his own headaches, I assume, and a hospital is considered by him, as by you or Moe Lewitt and even my oldest American friend Joe Schwartz, as Mr. Eshkol's holy duty; but what shall I do if Mr. Eshkol has, like Pinkus, a kind heart but pledges towards non governmental agencies which have political strings they can, and do, pull, to get, litterally, millions and tens of millions for treating immigrants and alike justifications for receiving funds.

I know I write like a heretic; but you would not believe it, that I have to find extrabudgetary contributions (nedqvoth), even to pay our understaffed hospital laundry, understaffed cleaning department, not to speak of secretarial work. All my writing I have to do in longhand at night or on Shabbath and to find a lady who volunteers to do a part of our typing on Mondays and Wednesdays when she gives us free of charge her time and her skill to assist the single secretary of the Hospital. Such is the situation; when others, call them Hadassah or Trade-Unions, can indulge in incubating their silken young men to produce scientific work or even clinical work. If I wait 5 years more, as I did ly years, it will be too late.

All one can ask me is to stop complaining and leave the Government Service and go into private practice. My last effort before adopting such a line of admitting defeat is to help myself.

I tried to do it with the help of A.J.D.C. through Malben in 1950-52; it worked partly; later on by finding funds for research. But for building we need large sums. Saul Elgart offered his offices and if to do it myself I shall have to become a private citizen and go out and fight for the survival of just one hospital. And fight means bomparing ours and other's "standard of living".

I know this is not an easy task; but my hands and my conscience are clean and I feel, I can recruit good will to correct an unjustice which is done to us ruthlessly and which one can not endure one day longer.

Mr. Raphael and other politicians might try to lull me into hopes they would do it for me. I do not believe they will nor that they can. They do not carry any power of conviction as medicine and research into biology as I see it, is completely strange to them.

I have a standing invitation form Jow Schwarz to come to the U.S.A. for the Bonds and when I do so I hope I shall be able to decide on the hospital's and my future.

(JCNS) Mr. Levi Eshkol, the Prime Minister, will make an official visit to Washington in the spring. Political observers here said that the invitation was included in the personal message from President Johnson delivered last week by Mr. Sargent Shriver, President Johnson's special envoy during the Pope's visit to Israel.

Although official sources refused to confirm the invitation, claiming that it was unusual to divulge the contents of messages exchanged between heads of State, reliable sources said that Mr. Eshkol had accepted the invitation.

Jordanian sources revealed that King Hussein was also invited to visit Washington and had also accepted the invitation.

This is the first time that an Israeli Premier has been asked to visit the U.S. officially. All Mr. Ben-Gurion's previous meetings with President Eisenhower and President Kennedy were "private".

At yesterday's Cabinet meeting Mr. Eshkol made known the content of President Johnson's message and also reported on his intended reply.

As I told you on the telephone, the UJA is planning a most unusual event for our National Conference. There is in Jewish history a tradition which calls for the honoring of those righteous men among the nations of the world who perform deeds of extraordinary charity, kindness and heroism on behalf of the Jewish people, particularly in times of great stress and difficulty.

During the incredible period of Nazi bestiality, there were righteous men of all the nations, non-Jews, who saved Jews from the Nazis often at peril and personal risk, by hiding them in their homes and in a variety of other ways.

There is located in Jerusalem a central archive which contains the names of such righteous men, and from this archive we have selected four persons whom we shall bring to New York for this Annual Conference, and whom we wish to honor publicly. One of these persons is a Catholic priest from Belgium, Father Joseph Andre. Another is a French woman doctor; another is a German man now living in San Francisco; another is a Dutch man.

It is our desire and hope that His Eminence Clarence Cardinal Cooke would agree to accept our invitation to appear on that program, to present an award to the priest and perhaps one other of the recipients who might be of the Catholic faith, and most important of all to speak for a few minutes to the audience, which will be very large and will consist of people from all over the country, about his thoughts on man's humanity to man.

The exact date, dear Charles, is Saturday, 13 December 1969. We are not yet certain whether the ceremony will be held in the afternoon or the evening, but we shall know very shortly. The location is the New York Hilton Hotel. If you could speak to the Cardinal about this, we would be most grateful. If there is any other information you or he desire, I shall be happy to provide it.

Dear Mr. Simon:

When we met last, I said I would look into the matter of the costs of programs for Arabs now living under Israeli jurisdiction. The following is a brief report:

In view of the assumption by Israel of the responsibility for the fate of approximately one million Arabs living in the areas known as the West Bank and the Gaza Strip, which have been administered by Israel since the Six-Day War, a new financial burden has been created and has been carried by the people of Israel. The Arabs living in the administered territories are cared for by the Israeli authorities in matters of health, education, welfare, employment, and standard governmental services, as are Jewish citizens of Israel. This is a most impressive fact, representing an attitude of humanitarianism, which may be based upon enlightened self-interest, but whatever the motive it is certainly not the usual relationship of victor to vanquished. Actually, the attitude is based on the very long range policy of the Israeli leaders that Arabs and Jews will be living side by side in the Middle East for centuries to come, and must learn to live as friends not enemies, or at least in tolerance and not hatred.

The best time to begin this policy is now, and the best place to begin is in the administered territories which are contiguous to Israel. The cost of this policy this year is \$52.8 million, spent as follows:

In addition, there are two interesting items. In El Arish, in the northern Sinai Peninsula, the Arab hospital is supervised by Tel Hashomer Hospital near Tel Aviv, which is the largest government hospital in Israel. For his work in supervising, Dr. Shani received the Schweitzer Prize.

Secondly, in Gaza, Tel Hashomer built the Rinal Clinic, and operates it with standards equal to those obtaining in Israel itself.

This type of medical service was never before available to the Arabs of the Gaza Strip and Sinai where they lived under Egyptian sovereignty, before the Six-Day War.

You said that I might call to obtain your reply to my request. I shall be arriving at the Beverly Hills Hotel around noon, 7th of October, and will remain that day and the next. I will call upon my arrival, and hope that we will be able to meet again.

Dear Mrs. Slurzberg:

Although I have been aware for many years of the very important contribution women throughout the country make to their community campaigns, I recently had occasion to analyze the exact percentage for which women are responsible and I found this figure — close to 12% of the total raised — even more impressive than most people realize. But 1965 will demand even more of you, Let me tell you why.

For the past four years the monies received by the United Jewish Appeal from the community campaigns have reached a plateau. Our needs, on the other hand, have not remained static. In these four years close to one-quarter of a million newcomers have arrived in Israel, and we have not been able to absorb them satisfactorily because our monetary goals have never been met. We have continued taking the refugees, and have accumulated tens of millions of dollars of debts, because no Jew whose life could be saved was turned down.

Now the situation has become even more complicated. Immigration in 1965 will continue at the same heavy rate, but money which the Joint Distribution Committee has been receiving for the past twelve years from the Conference on Jewish Material Claims against Germany growing out of World War II has now ended. This amounts to \$7,500,000 a year, a quarter of the total budget. How can we close this dangerous gap? American Jows must make up the loss of this money.

Increased giving is one very important way -- and I know you will stress this now that you understand the urgency of the situation.

But an equally important solution, all too often overlooked, is complete coverage. Achievement of our goals is not only the responsibility of a select few - but of every Jewish individual in your community. In Jersey City you have a Jewish population of 13,000. You had 1,220 contributors in 1964. At this early stage of the campaign, when you can still do something about it, I hope you will adjust your plans to build up the largest possible list of additional contributors.

If your community and others will do this, it can mean another million dollars or more. That sum is truly obtainable from new \$10 or \$20 gifts, multiplied by 50,000 or 100,000 additional women who care throughout the country. Can there be a single woman in any American Jewish community who, understanding the needs, would not want to contribute an annual gift of \$10 which actually represents less than three cents a day?

I am grateful to you for having assumed leadership in this critical year. If you have any suggestions which you would like to share with me in order to raise the money we will need this year, I hope you will write to me. In any event, I am counting on you to help us achieve our goal.

THE POSSIBILITY OF A HIDDEN RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE

MIDDLE EAST PEACE NEGOTIATIONS AND THE FREEDOM OF RUSSIAN JEWRY

INTRODUCTION :

When Peace negotiations between Israel and Egypt begin February 5th, the world will watch anxiously for some sign of a break thru between the irreconcilable positions of the two parties. Egypt insists upon Isral's unilateral withdrawal before serious negotiations can commence, and Mrs. Meir states that not one soldier will move until a firm Peace Treaty is signed. Russia sits on the sidelines ready to do all she can to maintain the state of tension. Her only possible interest in Peace relates to the opening of the Suez Canal so as to permit her Naval vessels easy access to the Indian Ocean.

On the other hand the U.S. seems genuinely anxious for the talks to succeed because she feels that she might be drawn into a new Middle East War or that her oil interests might at any moment be sabotaged or expropriated.

Meanwhile, back in Russia three million Jews pray for the chance to emigrate to Israel.

PROPOSAL :

It is suggested that all of these diverse and irreconcilable elements can be brought together to effect a visible break-thru in peace negotiations by linking the opening of the Suez Canal to the freeing of 250,000 Russian Jews.

The proposal entails a secret deal between Tel Aviv and Moscow that provides for Israel unilaterally offering to open the Canal. It also requires Russia, at the same time to arrange to quietly increase the number of Jewish emigration visas from 2,000 to 50,000 annually. (The 250,000 Jews would come out over a five year period). If the mechanics and theatrics are handled properly, there is enough going for everyone involved to insure a reasonable chance of the proposal's success.

ISRAEL:

If someday Peace is ultimately negotiated, the canal will be opened anyhow, and the opening thrown in without any special trade off benefits for Israel. All negotiations will have centered around Jerusalem, the Occupied Territories, etc. Russia will be the largest beneficiary and will have paid no reciprocal price to Israel for this concession.

Only by now separating out what Russia wants, can Israel have any logical basis for requesting something from Moscow in return.

If Israel makes this "gesture of goodwill" and offers to open the Canal, the world will view her act as a "break-thru into phase one" of the Peace negotiations. Enormous pressure will be built up against the resumption of hostilities. Russia herself will not permit fighting

across the Suez (which obviously would endanger her shipping) and a mechanical block would thus be introduced against the resumption of fighting. Israel would be relieved of the external pressure to make further unilateral concessions and Egypt would have no alternative but to keep talking.

Russia's simultaneous release of 250,000 Jews would set the stage for a rapproachment between Moscow and Tel Aviv and could lead to the release of additional Jews once this precedent had been set.

It is true that the Israelis may have to worry about a "double cross" during the five year emigration period. It is unlikely that the Russians would stop the exodus since they fully realize that the Israelis could easily sabotage key installations which control the canal. After all the Russians invented the game of "closing acess highways for repairs".

MERICAN JEWISH

EGYPT :

It seems reasonable to suppose that Egypt would also want the Canal opened providing that her people did not understand the circumstances under which this occurred. (If Israel wishes to cooperate, Cairo can make it appear as though she won this concession thru intimidation at the bargaining table. This claim would be further aided by the fact that Israel under the present proposal is still denied use of the canal). The \$250,000,000. in annual income that the Canal would provide is a powerful incentive to her leaders to accept the Israeli proposal.

RUSSIA :

The Russians would have everything to gain by opening the Suez Canal. Their problem is whether the trade off of 250,000 Jews is too high a price to pay. Khrushchev has in the past argued that the scum of Russia should be permitted to leave the country. (The publication of the Khrushchev papers by the KGB makes it seem possible that there are top people in Moscow who think the same way as Khrushchev).

The key ingredient will probably once again be the issue of "face"
After some soul searching, the Russians may feel that the price is a
cheap one to pay for the opening of the Suez and will accept the proposal providing that no publicity is given to this aspect of the deal.
Moscow could quietly increase the number of visas issued while constantly denying this act.

UNITED STATES :

The United States is probably the one country that would benefit least by the above proposal. The Russian Fleet in the Indian Ocean poses a constant threat to Western influence in that area and any arrangement to make the Russian Navy even more effective would be viewed with alarm in Washington. However, it could be argued that if the U.S. is genuinely interested in Peace, then sooner or later the Suez will be opened. Logically, therefore, the U.S. might just as well now proceed to build her strength in the Indian Ocean in much the same way that she will build her strength three or four years hence when a true Peace Treaty is ultimately negotiated.

The U.S. can take some comfort in the fact that the chance for major hostilities again breaking out in the Middle East will be considerably reduced once the Canal is opened. After all the Russians will do everything possible to prevent gun fire at the canal's edges.

AMERICAN JEWISH ARCHIVES

The people of the Free World will look upon Israel's magnanimous gesture as a positive first step in the long arduous Middl East negotiations. They will then turn to Egypt and expect a reciprocal move and will certainly frown if Cairo attempts to renew hostilities. At the very least World sentiment should shift strongly towards the Israeli side.

CONCLUSION :

It appears that a secret arrangement that links the opening of the Suez Canal to the freedom of 250,000 Russian Jews contains unique benefits for all parties and that its chances for success are, therefore, sufficiently high to warrant careful study. If the proposal fails, it probably will be around trivial elements such as face; timing; theatries; or mechanics rather than because of any fundamental disagreement about the values exchanged.

Dear Mr. Naboitchek:

I am writing to you in connection with the First Day Cover Envelopes that you requested from Rabbi Friedman, with the signatures of Mrs. Meir and David Ben Gurion.

As you are probably wondering exactly whats has happened to these envelopes Rabbi Friedman felt it advisable that we write to you and explain the situation.

We accordingly received the envelopes from Mr. Shalit in Tel Aviv and forwarded them to the Prime Minister's office to have them signed by Mrs. Meir. We received the envelopes when they had already been signed by David Ben Gurion, and this was at the beginning of May. The envelopes stayed at the Prime Minister's office awaiting signature until May 24, when they were sent back to us at the UJA. I then telephoned Mr. Shalit in Tel Aviv and told him that I had received the envelopes and that I would bring them personally to him in Tel Aviv. He, however, said that I should send them registered mail to his office since he could not wait until the following week. I was very reluctant to send them in the post because of their value, but since he insisted I did so. I asked that he call me when he received them. The envelopes were sent on May 25.

I received no subsequent call from Mr. Shalit and, considering their value, I assumed he had received them since had he not I felt sure he would call me to find out what happened to them.

When Rabbi Friedman returned from The States he asked what had happened about the envelopes and I told him all that had passed and he suggested that I call Mr. Shalit just to check up. This I did but Mr. Shalit had already left the country and in speaking to his secretary and his son it transpired that they had know idea where the envelopes were and they are both sure that the Registered parcel had not been received. I am now in the processof trying to trace the parcel through the Jerusalem post office and I hope that there will be some satisfaction. Mr. Shalit's sone is also cencking in Tel Aviv to seeif the parcel was delivered there. I would like to stress that I was most reluctant to send these envelopes through the mail but since Mr. Shalit seemed to think that it was alright I capitulated. I hope to be able to inform mf you of the outcome of our enquiries in the near future.

Many thanks for your kind letter of 2 June. Mr. Field suggested to me that we should offer to take your group on a field trip or two, at a time convenient to their schedule. I appreciate your having enclosed their itinerary. Our office in Israel will discuss with the Director at Meir Shefayah appropriate dates.

My own suggestions would be that the youngsters should witness the arrival of a boat-load of immigrants (we would drive them to haifa and explain the whole process to them); visit an absorption center (there are half a dozen good ones within reasonable distance); be exposed in some way to the military problems of the country (either visit a Nahal camp, or basic training camp, or a town which figures prominently in the news such as Kiryat Shmoneh or Beit Shean). At any rate, everything would be done by mutual discussion, and I will be in Israel during the entire period that your students will be, so that I can keep an eye on the matter myself.

Dear Mr. Soroker:

You may recall that we met sometime ago and I described to you our plans for a closed-circuit broadcast from Israel. You were kind enough to offer your assistance if we were to do something similar in the future. I'm taking you up on that offer as we are thinking of another closed-circuit for January 1971. If you could provide us with the answers to several questions it would be most helpful in determining the feasibility of our project.

- I. Is there now a ground station in Israel capable of transmitting signals to a satellite for direct transmission to New York? If not, is there a feasible way to transmit video signals to Rome for satellite transmission to New York?
- 2. Are there coordinating studio facilities available, i.e., is there a studio in which we can integrate live, video tape and film segments for transmission to the satellite?
- 3. What if any facilities are available to transmit video signals live from various locations around Israel, to your studie?

The answers to those questions will determine to a considerable extent the nature of the program we are now planning.

Sources here have indicated to us that a ground station and satellite facilities are in working order but have not yet been used. I would very much like to know if that assertion is true and if those facilities could be made available for the UJA project.

If anything is unclear about our queries, please send questions back by cable. Dear Irving:

Thank you for your lovely letter of 8 March. I am delighted that the meeting had such a wonderful tone and was so successful. I think the front-page publicity canonly halp to make the Federation more important in the eyes of all the contributors. Congratulations for such good organization as to have the editor of the paper present.

I do understand more fully the various problems you describe in relation to the Community Chest. It simply seems too bad that because of the lack of responsibility in the community as a whole, the Jewish Federation cannot enjoy the same advantages that almost all other Federations in the country have at their disposal. When all is said and done, I am sure you know the local situation better than anyone, and if it doesn't make sense to try to become a beneficiary of the Chest, then just drop it.

We will have to continue to try to raise more money in Atlantic City so that the UJA can receive at least the national average of 50% of the gross total raised, which, I am sure, you and your leadership would really like to allocate to us. If we continue to work together, then perhaps we can push the total fund raising up so that the UJA can receive a larger share.

In that connection, I meant what I said in the closing part of my remarks when I talked about the priority of the Federation and the disproportionate way most of the people distribute their money. You have been kind enough to ask if I could dictate the sum and substance of those closing sentences. It is hard for me to do that, but I can recapitulate the argument in topic sentences as follows:

Mr. Irving T. Spivack 12 March 1965 -2-1. The Federation is the most important Jewish secular activity in any community. 2. The Federation deserves by far the greatest measure of a man's philanthropic giving. If I were asked to be specific I would say that a man should give two-thirds of his total charitable dollars annually to the Federation. 3. Everyone speaks of the great days of fund raising back in 1948, as though this was the peak of achievement. It is not so. 4. Jews are giving away more money today than they did then. They are simply giving it to other things, instead of to their Federations. 5. In addition to giving more money now than they did 15 years ago to Jewish' causes, they are also giving more today to non-Jewish causes. 6. Therefore, it is fair to say that the philanthropically-minded Jews of this country are at the peak of their generosity today. 7. Jews are making a terrible mistake in reducing the proportion of their total giving to their central Federations, because if the central Federations grow weak, then it will be hard to finance all the good causes which the Federations support. 8. It is not enough to applaud a man for his total generosity if the manner in which he has allocated his gifts shows a disproportionate and unbalanced distribution. The truly generous man must be made to understand that he should re-allocate his annual "portfolio of contributions" so that his Federation receives the major portion. 9. The man who is not truly generous must be made to understand that a greater share is required from him, and that simply re-allocating does not represent assumption of full responsibility on his part. Mathilda Brailove spent Wednesday, Thursday and Friday in Houston.

The Houston campaign was started early in January and no emphasis was placed on getting special money for this year's special needs. I finally reached our Board member, Mrs. Harding Frankel, the first week in February to ask what results they had and did she feel they had really made an effort to get the kind of money we need. Mrs. Frankel admitted they had run pretty much a "business as usual" campaign but that since solicitation was practically finished she did not believe they could do anything more at this point. I pressed at great length for re-solicitation and the value of having Mathilda Brailove come in for this. She finally agreed it should be tried, as did Al Goldstein.

Mrs. Frankel, Mrs. Morris Glesby, and the Chairman Mrs. Hershel Rich worked on a list of people to be re-seen. The results were excellent. Seventeen women who had originally increased over 1964 gifts approximately \$900, were re-solicited and gave another \$5,000. In addition, Harding Frankel added another \$1,000 in honor of the work which Lois had put into this. This proved another facet of the possibilities of this plan -- that it is valuable not only for pre-solicitation, but that it can be effective regarding resolicitation if the leadership is understanding, responsive, and willing to do a job. (In Cleveland they still will not.)

Mrs. Brailove felt that letters of thanks should go to Mrs. Harding Frankel (3608 Rio Vista) and Mrs. Morris Glesby (2405 Bellefontaine) who with very little time produced the appointments for her. If you do not want to write them perhaps this could come from Max Fisher, who knows the Frankels well.

The Pittsburgh pre-solicitation, due to be held February 15th and 16th, has had to be postponed since the women that the community wanted Mathilda to see are in the main in Florida.

At the same time that I spoke to Houston I called Mrs. Henry Newman, our past National Chairman in Kansas City, and discussed the need for special handling of this year's campaign -- the extra \$1,000,000 -- etc. On Friday night when I returned from out of town I received a call at home from Mrs. Newman indicating that the women are most enthusiastic about following through with the idea of utilizing our help, and we are accordingly scheduling Mathilda for February 21st, 22nd and 23rd in Kansas City. Their pace-setters function is March 3rd and the groundwork will thus be done before.

I think it might be nice if you either called Mathilda or sent her a note indicating you know what she has done in both Dallas and Houston thus far.

I spoke with Slawson and Epstein. Slawson said they were sending a group to see the West German Ambassador. Epstein sent a long letter to the German Foreign Minister, Brentano. I assume he sent you a copy of it. I am enclosing these clippings just in case you have not seen the New York Times. At the President's recent news conference, he himself took cognizance of the whole matter. A group of Republican Seantors has been raising a fuss, as you can see from the other clipping. I am also enclosing the text of a speech made in the Congress by Congressman Halpern of New York. Let's see what happens now. Shimon Peres, Deputy Minister of Defense of Israel, has been in Washington this past week working on the details of the Hawk sale. I am sure he brought to the attention of the Pentagon and the State Department how Israel feels about this. There should be additional developments. Heanwhile, one of the German scientists now in Cairo, a Professor Wolfgang Pilz, threatened to give up his German nationality if the Bonn Government ordered him to stop working for Egypt and to return to Germany. He made this speech in a television interview in Cairo, when asked to comment on reports that the West German Government had decided to recall all German rocket scientists working for Egypt. I don't think any such decision has been made by the German government but we are all hoping it will be. Let's wait and see. Meanwhile, thanks for your interest, John. As per our phone conversation, I am enclosing an itinerary of the places and the times my wife and I and Mr. and Mrs. Tom Harvey will be visiting.

Our reason for talking with Rabbi Friedman was to get the names of Israeli and American and African personnel who are located in spots where we will be visiting, so that we might talk with them briefly or at length, concerning the problems of the day, and that perhaps we might have sufficient time in some cases to see some of these problems first-hand, by making short side trips from each centralized place.

Mr. Harvey is a Driector of the American Friends Service Committee, and we plan to spend a fair amount of time with Service Committee personnel searching into the problems of the day. Mr. Harvey spends almost full time now with the Service Committee, and has an excellent knowledge of not only their background, but their present feelings as well.

When we arrive in the Union of South Africa, we are receiving some sponsorship through the United States - South Africa Leader Exchange Program, whose General Secretary in this country is Frank Loescher. He has planned our twelve days in the Union, but I rather imagine that there are a number of people who might not be on his itinerary that we might have a chance to talk with.

It would be our hope that Rabbi Friedman would give us the names of people he thinks would have the time and the interest to discuss local situations with us, and, in turn, would write to these people to acquaint them with the fact that we will be arriving in their locale at such and such a date, and that they might expect a call from us upon arrival.

There are several parts of our trip that can be modified, depending upon circumstances. Mr. Harvey wants to go to Port Harcourt in Nigeria, but it may turn out as far as I am concerned to spend the time in Lagos to greater advantage. Also, when we arrive in Kenya, there is a fair amount of time allocated for Kaimosi, if there seems to be a reason to spend more time in Nairobi, itself, this could be arranged.

The rest of the trip seems to be fairly solid, as to where we will be,

and then it will be up to us to work in the people that Rabbi Friedman thinks we should see, as best we can.

I feel very keenly that his suggestions will prove to be most valuable and will expose us to thinking towards Africa, which we probably would not get any other way. As Rabbi Friedman finds time to arrange for these contacts, we would appreciate if you would drop us a copy of any communications which he sends out, so that we will know how to handle ourselves in the future.

I know that the Rabbi is extremely busy at this time, and that you will only have a few brief moments to get his "ear" and explain our requests. But since I did talk with him here in Cincinnati, I know that he can quickly recall the people that he thinks we should see and you, in turn, can probably make whatever arrangements are necessary.

If anything in the above is not clear, please let me hear from you by phone, as we wish to solidfy all that we can before it becomes too late to do so. And may I express my appreciation for your interest, as well as Rabbi Friedman concerning our trip to Africa. Certainly when we return, we should be able to share some of our thoughts with all of you.

I wish you good luck in the coming campaign for 1965, and a Healthy Happy New Year for this and many years to come.

CINCINNATI EXECUTIVE FINDS . . .

fricans Misunderstand Education's Use

BY JAMES ADAMS

Robert D. Stern, executive vice president of the U. S. Shoe Corp., has returned from a seven-week tour of 11 African nations with three major impressions:

- An over-emphasis on classical education is causing the newly - educated classes to leave the land for cities to look for better
- · Deterioration of the nd already has set in and aless remedial steps are sken, the countries are going to face severe agricultural problems in the fuftre.
- It is dangerous to make sweeping generaliza-tions about any one country in Africa.

"You just can't generalize about any part of Africa," Stern says. "And I certainly wouldn't want to pose as an expert after spending only seven weeks there.'

Stern says that every African nation he visited is "trying to achieve as much education as possible for as many people as possible."

He says there is a shortage of qualified teachers and facilities in Africa.

"There are not nearly enough job opportunities for the educated African.' he says. "And many constder themselves educated after attending only three or four years of school.

Education often means not getting your hands dirty.

THE SHOE executive points out that except for government jobs, the African doesn't have any other place to look for work.

"There are no jobs in industry and the people are going to become frustrated when they can't find jobs.

Stern believes that the U. S. should think more in terms of long-range plan-ning for Africa rather than short-term aid.

"At this point young African nations want to avoid entangling alliances with the East and West," he says. "But they are going to take aid from both sides."

Stern believes that the Chinese are supplying arms for rebels in the Congo.

to create chaos rather than come in and take over," he says. He says he saw several Chinese in Tanzania.

STERNS SAYS in counties such as the Union of South Africa, Kenya and Tanzania where there are large Asian populations, mostly from India, race problems are developing.

"The Indians own most of the store and they have been taking advantage of the Africans. Now they are becoming scared because they are not liked in Africa and they can't go back to India."

Stern says that while the South African government has the highest economy of any African nation, it still has two classes of citizenship - one for the whites and one for the Africans.

"Housing, education and health standards all have been improved in South Africa," Stern says. "But Africans still can't own property or vote."

HE SAYS the South African's experiment with autonomous states for Africans called "Bantu Stans" is a failure.

"The government has not put the money in the projects it said it would and the stans are ruled by puppet governments.

"I think the white government wants the experiment to fail so it can say, 'See, the Africans aren't capable

of governing themselves."

Re: Near East Situation

Bear Mr. Ambassadori

I received a letter dated June 28, 1962, from Miss Elinor Green, Public Affairs Officer of the United States Mission to the United Nations. Miss Green wrote me at your request and in reply to my letter dated May 1, 1962, concerning a joint United Kingdom-United States Resolution censuring Israel. I sincerely appreciate the courtesy of this reply and further appreciate the fact that Miss Green was thoughtful enough to enclose your statement dated March 28, 1962, and Ambassador Yost's statement dated April 6, 1962, relative to this matter.

Before I make further comment to the subject matter indicated above. I would like you to know that even though my letter of May 1 and this letter are critical of past ections taken, I realize that the position you occupy is not one to be envied. The responsibilities that you shoulder are indeed weighty, but I am sure that you possess the necessary basic qualifications to remain upright under this enormous weight. I further believe that criticism solely for the purpose of letting off steam is in bad tasts but if intelligent suggestions for corrective or alternative action can be suggested, then it is justifiable.

Due to the fact that I am deeply concerned, as all Americans should be, about the policies of our Republic, I am motivated to express my views.

Due to the importance of your position it is absolutely mandatory that the decisions you make, the actions that you take to implement these decisions, be right. There is no room for error--there is just no room for being wrong. Realizing, however, that you are human, there will be times when you make mistakes. The question that presents itself is what do you do once you realize that you have made a mistake.

I no longer wish to debate the question of whether it was right or wrong for Israel to be censured. For the sake of argument, let's assume that the joint United Kingdom-United States Resolution was proper action. It would appear that Israel did violate Article 2, Paragraph 4, of the Charter. By the same token, Syria's military build-up, with weapons previously prohibited, was also a violation. I am sure that Israel's retaliatory expedition was understandable and justifiable, although possibly not in keeping with the spirit of moral law concerning international affairs. I find it hard to understand, particularly in light of Ambassador Yost's statements, why Syria was not censured along with Israel.

What I am about to say may not be 100% correct. I am sure that you have many more sources of information than I. However, and I say this quite humbly, I am not sure that your sources of information are any more reliable than mine. Why would Israel engage in conduct which would lead to censurship before the world body? After all, Israel is guided by intelligent individuals, and these individuals are extremely cognizant and conscious of world opinion. In part, the answer lies in one of the most perplexing problems with which the Middle East is faced. This is the refugee problem. I shall restrict my comments on this problem to Jewish refugees. I am sure you are aware of the fact that during the last 14 years Israel has absorbed close to two million refugees. This is a rather phenomenal number considering the size and economic development of the State. For the past several years approximately 30 to 40 thousand Jews annually have been coming into Israel. Without going into details, I am sure you are aware of the fact that the vast majority of this number immigrate for reasons of necessity as opposed to idealistic desire. Presently, and for the past ten months, immigration has increased fantastically. The Algerian situation alone presents at least one hundred thousand Jewish refugees. This year, and probably for the next several years, the annual immigration will be close to the six figure mark. The cost of absorption of immigration has in the past several years, accounted for approximately one-third of Israel's budget. This budget has absolutely nothing to do with monies raised by world Jewry for the achievement of various philanthropic projects. This one-third figure represents that percentage of the annual national gross product of this tiny State. This percentage of the budge is based upon caring for and absorbing approximately 40,000 new immigrants each year. A little over 50% of the country's budget goes for defense. This leaves less than 17% of the budget for other items. Israel is facing a very serious economic crisis. With immigration up to 250 to 300 percent, where is she going to get the monies for absorption purposes? This can only come from cutting expenditures for defense, and I might add, drastically cutting its defense expenditures. Can Israel afford to do this? As long as border incidents occur, or as long as tension exists on the borders, Israel must maintain its defense force. This means that her expenditures for defense must continue at a high level. This, Israel's "friendly neighbors" know. The necessity of

keeping the borders secure, the necessity of making the hostile neighbors realize that any action on their part will bring strong counteraction, is fundamental to the problem of absorption and integration of refugees. Parenthetically, it is of equal importance to those who have been citizens of this State for one day, ten years or 50 years.

You might well ask at this point, what is this writer trying to say. I know these facts and have known these facts for a number of years. has told me nothing new. The suggestion that I offer concerns itself with policy and concrete action implementing policy. It seems to me that the actions of Syria were very lightly passed over with the comment that they were "naughty boys". Considering this, and further, the Suez situation, i.e., Egyptian prohibition against Israel's shipping, or shipments carrying goods to or from Israel, which situation President Eisenhower promised to eliminate, and did nothing about, which situation the United Nations in the past, and presently, condones, either by their lack of interest or lack of effort to remedy the problem, leads many people, Jews and non-Jews, Americans and non-Americans, to wonder and question the motives of the policy of the United States and Great Britain in the Middle East. This policy, many believe, is reflected in the United Nations. Is political expediency -- economic expediency -- the rule of thumb by which the game is played? If this be true, then let's come out and say so and guit hiding behind the cliches of Judaic-Christian morality. Despite all that has happened and despite what appears to be on the horizon, I, nevertheless, cling to the belief that the leaders of our country put moral justice ahead of political expediency. I cling to the belief that we realize that in the long run what we view as political expediency is very likely to be our downfall or the downfall of any nation that uses this their basis for policy.

The Arab nations are going to continue creating tensions and border incidents. They are going to do this, because so far they have never been called upon the carpet for their conduct and more importantly, because they realize that this course of action will seriously weaken Israel's economic position. In the long run this will naturally weaken Israel militarily. The Arab States must be made to realize that their aims for the destruction of Israel will not be tolerated and their actions will not be condoned simply because of political and/or economical expediency. Once this is achieved, the Middle East situation will be greatly relaxed. From relaxation will come peace. From relaxation will come reduction in military expenditures which, in turn, will release much needed funds to cope with the immense problem of immigration. By the same token, Egypt and the other Arab nations will be able to divert much needed funds, from military expenditures into correction of the gastly refugee situation they face.

To effectuate this happy conclusion calls for an entirely different approach than that which has been heretofore used. I do not believe that it requires a build-up of U. N. military strength on the borders. It does, however, require that the United States live up to its presidential agreement relative to the Suez Canal. It does require the United States, individually, and through its actions in the U. N. to put moral justice ahead of political expediency. If Nr. Nassar and the U.A.R. are made to realize that the United States is no longer going to condone acts which are repugnant to the sense of international cooperation, world peace and basic issues of morality, only then will we begin to eliminate the problem with which we have been faced for the past 16 odd years.

The policy that the United States formulates and the actions that the United States individually or through the United Nations take to implement this policy relative to Israel-Arab problem is farreaching indeed. It is not isolated to that area of the world. Israel has developed many friends in Africa. Israel, like these many friends, is in an "underdog" situation. Israel is a nation born out of persecution and because of this, there is a great bond of mutual understanding existing between Israel and many of the new nations of Africa and for that matter, many new and older nations in other areas of the world. If we want the respect and allegience of these nations, we had best be correct in what we do in the Middle East as well as what we do everywhere else. As I said earlier in this letter, there is just no room for error or being wrong anymore. There are many more facets to this problem than I have presented and if you desire, I will be glad to go into detail at a later time. I feel that I have greatly imposed upon you by the length of this letter and by many of my personal comments as opposed to factual observations. I, therefore, hesitate to go further and will not do so unless I receive a specific request from you.

Not being sure of the exact data of your return, I am writing this to you in London.
