Dear Gordon,

Your note jogged me into a realization of how rapidly time flies. You said that you had not had any news of me for the Alumni Magazine in over a year. I guess the reason is that this past year has been one of tremendous activity for me and I have not been aware of how rapidly time has passed.

As you know, I am the Executive head of the United Jewish Appeal. During this past year we have had an unprecedented flood of refugees and immigrants to care for. I guess I must have made half a dozen trans-Atlantic flights, was in Israel three times, Norocco, Austrian-Bungarian border, etc., etc. I was in Israel during the fighting last Fall at the time of the Suez effair; was in Maples on New Year's day to help receive the first shipload of Jewish refugees brought out of Egypt by the International Red Cross; was in Austria to help set up some machinery for the reception of the Hungarian refugees; and have flown many tens of thousands of miles around the United States visiting communities in the interests of our fundraising activities.

I dare say that during this past year we have had to take care of upwards of 100,000 people, including everything from food and shelter to eventual resettlement all over the globe. About 85,000 have gone to Israel and 15,000 to other countries, including United States, Canada, South America and Australia.

We live in Westport, although I must say that I don't get home very often. I hope I will be in the country when we have our 20th re-union next summer, but I certainly wouldn't lay any bets on that.

Thanks for writing. It was good hearing from you.

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MRS. FRIEDMAN DIES; FUNERAL SLATED FRIDAY Active Member in Jewish Community Life Victim of Heart Attack



MRS. ISRAEL FRIEDMAN

Mrs. Israel Aaronson Friedman, 62, of 167 Fountain Street, an active member in Jewish community life, died today of a heart attack.

Mrs. Friedman was born in Courland, Russia, and came to this country a an early age. She came ts New Haven in 1917 and has lived here since. She was married to Israel Friedman on Jan. 1, 1918, and the couple were planning to celebrate their 40th wedding anniversary next January.

Member of Board

Very active in community life, she was a past vice president of the Sisterhood of B nai Jacob Synagogue and a member of its board for the last 25 years. She was a captain of a Red Cross team in the annual drive, worked for the Jewish Home for the Aged and Home for Children, was a team captain of the New Haven Jewish Welfare Fund, was an active member of Hadassah, the Jewish Community Center, and many other organizations.

At the outbreak of World War II, she offered her home and took in as foster children two young German-Jewish boys who lived wi'h her for many years.

Besides her husband she is survived by three sons, Rabbi Herbert Friedman of Westport, Stanley Friedman of Orange and Samuel Friedman of Chester, Pa.; two sisters, Mrs. Milton Salman of Hamden and Mrs. Rose Tobey of Hartford, and seven grandchildren.

The funeral will take place from the B'nai Jacob Synagogue, 347 George Street, Friday at 11 a.m., Burial will be in the B'nai Jacob Cemetery, Wee ville. The Weller Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Dear Mr.Biele.

Thank you for your letter of Dec.18th and a special thanks for the whiskey. In these cold days in Jerusalem it is the best medicine.

The day before their departure, Dr. and Mrs.Friedman asked me to go into the matter of finding a summer camp for their children for the months of July and August in Israel. It took me a long time to do this as preparations are starting only in January or February. However, I have got this information and I enclose a prospectus for last year at a youth village called Hadassim. I would also like to add some of the information I received from Mr. Walter Frankel, the camp director at Hadassim.

1.The camp opens between 10th-15 of July for 6 weeks.
2.Hadassim rent their campus to Mr.Wlater Frankel for this period.
3.The price for the full six weeks is about \$300 for a child.
4.This includes being received at the place of arrival; 5 meals daily; 5 days of touring Israel; medical supervision and medical treatment; washing and pressing; entertainments, cinemas,Israeli theatres etc; for each 6 students there is a person in charge; the children are returned to their point of departure.

I have already tentatively booked a place for Dr.Friedman's children for this period. If they agree to this they have to send in a quarter of the sum by the 15th of April. If, however, they change their minds, this deposit can be refunded till until a week before the school opens.

To you dear Mr.Biele, I want to say again that I am missing you and your conversational powers. My wife and my friends talk a great deal about you and we hope that by June you will be with us again.
