Dear Max:

I am writing to enlist your assistance in facilitating an invitation to Vice President Nixon to address the annual convention of the United Jewish Appeal, which will be held at the Waldorf Astoria on December 14.

Yesterday, I had a telephone call from Rabbi Herbert A. Friedman, Executive Vice Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, informing me that the UJA would like to invite the Vice President if he is receptive.

I need hardly point out to you the importance of the UJA since you have yourself served as Chairman of the Government Division here in Washington ever since you assumed office four years ago. I would merely like to emphasize that the UJA consists of the leadership of all segments of the American Jewish community, Zionists and non-Zionists. The UJA is concerned with the rehabilitation of Jewish refugees wherever they may be, in Europe or Asia, and, of course, it helps in the resettlement of refugees who come to Israel. I can think of no audience more representative of American Jewry than the one that will assemble at the Waldorf on December 14.

I am sure that Rabbi Friedman would like to come to Washington to meet with the Vice President if he believes that he can consider such an invitation. I do not know who else will be addressing the conference that night. Generally, the Saturday night session is addressed by the top-ranking Israel diplomat who might be in the country at the time, whether it be the Foreign Minister or the Ambassador, and the audience always overflows.

I was very glad to hear that you were personally planning to visit Israel, and I do hope that you have a wonderful trip, and, of course, I do wish you a very happy New Year.

Dear Mr. Chief Justice;

On Saturday and Sunday, December 15th and 15th, the United Jewish Appeal will hold its Annual Mational Scavention. Its primary purpose is to provide inspiration for the 1958 United Jewish Appeal campaign. This meeting will be attended by American Jowish leaders from every part of our nation.

In view of your extensive knowledge of communal life in the United States, there certainly is no need to provide detailed information here on the nature and objectives of the United Jewish Appeal. Its record of achievement on behalf of the oppressed and the needy is one with which the Jews of the United States proudly identify themselves. The December meeting will derive added significance from the fact that the United Jewish Appeal stands on the threshold of its twentieth anniversary. This occasion should give us the opportunity to recall what already has been accomplished—particularly, the rescue of more than one million souls—, and to address curselves to the immediate problems that hie shead involving the rescue and resettlement of Jews streaming out of Eastern Europe, Egypt and North Africa.





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

As you have been informed, the United Jewish Appeal will hold its 20th Annual Conference on December 14th and 15th at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City.

This Conference will have the responsibility of making major policy decisions with respect to the 1958 UJA campaign. In this connection, you and your colleagues should know that the flow of Jewish refugees from areas of persecution, tension and uncertainty continues. The best estimates are that in the forthcoming year, about 80,000 Jews from these areas will have to be resettled, of whom 70,000 will have to be absorbed by Israel. Unforeseen events may cause this figure to be exceeded. A large portion of the new refugees are made up of the tragic remnants of Polish Jewry whom we are now privileged to rescue and replant in Israel where they can live in dignity and freedom.

For the past two years, the American Jewish community, represented at the annual conferences of the UJA, rose to its full moral grandeur and voted special funds to provide for the wave of new Jewish refugees who had to be rescued and resettled. At the forthcoming Conference, we shall have to decide whether a special fund should be launched in 1958 and make other decisions in line with our responsibility to those who will be newly resettled in 1958 and to those who have not yet been fully absorbed in Israel. To have real meaning, these decisions, once made, will require the full support of the American Jewish community.

The Steering Committee is the leadership and decision-making body of the Annual Conference. Only if the communities, through their representatives, participate in the deliberations of this important Committee, can the decisions of the Conference reflect the collective will, and be regarded as the mandate, of American Jewry. Representation on this Committee is according to the following formula:

If your community has a Jewish population up to 15,000, you may designate one delegate and one alternate to represent it on the Steering Committee.

If your Jewish population is from 15,000 to 40,000 your community is entitled to two delegates and two alternates - while those with Jewish populations in excess of 40,000 are entitled to three delegates and three alternates.

These, together with 15 delegates from the Greater New York areas, 16 delegates representing the 8 regions of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds; 25 delegates representing the country at large, and the national officers of the UJA constitute the Conference Steering Committee.

Please act at once to designate your delegates and alternates. As soon as you notify us of their names, we shall send them their credentials as Steering Committee members.

It is essential that your community be well represented at the Conference sessions on December 14th and 15th. I am confident that we can count upon you for your help in making the forthcoming Conference the success it must be.

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



Subject: National Annual Conference

The following is a brief review of some of the sessions scheduled in connection with the National Annual Conference of the UJA next month. This review should be of some assistance to you in discussing Conference plans with your lay leaders.

CABINET MEETING -

Thursday, December 12, 1957 - 10:30 AM - Perroquet Suite at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel

The Cabinet Meeting, which will start at 10:30 AM, will run through luncheon and will probably end about 3:30 PM.

Joseph Meyerhoff, the Chairman of the National Campaign Cabinet, will preside. The Agenda includes a report on the 1957 campaign by William Rosenwald, an address by Ambassador Abba Eban and a report on the current emigration picture as seen through reports of the Study Mission, the sub-committee to Vienna and the tour of Poland which Mr. Friedman plans to make early next month together with several lay leaders.

SPECIAL SESSION -

Friday, December 13, 1957 - 9:30 AM - Sert Room, Waldorf Astoria Hotel.

This is the special session to which only a selected group of lay leaders has been invited. This session is not part of the regular National Annual Conference. The main subject for discussion will be a special fund for 1958.

Mr. Dewey D. Stone will preside at the morning session. The Agenda will include a report on the tour of Jewish communities in Poland, an address on overseas needs by Mr. Friedman, an address by Mr. Moshe Sharett, a statement on special fund needs by Sen. Herbert H. Lehman.

The afternoon session will be chaired by Mr. Morris W. Berinstein. Following a report of the Resolutions Committee, the afternoon session will be devoted to general discussion.

CONFERENCE STETRING COMMITTEE -Saturday, December 14, 1957 - 2:30 PM - Jade Room, Waldorf Astoria.

Mr. Jack D. Weiler will preside at this meeting. This is the first session of the regular National Annual Conference of the UJA.

The Agenda will include a report on JDC needs by Mr. Charles H. Jordan, a statement of the needs in Israel and the programs of the Jewish Agency by Dr. Dov Joseph, a report on the 4th UJA Study Mission by one of the Mission members, the presentation of the UJA goals, problems on fund raising techniques, etc. by Mr. Sol Luckman and a discussion of the various matters arising out of this statement. It is likely that a panel will be appointed to participate in this discussion.

BANQUET SESSION -Saturday, December 14, 1957 - 6:30 PM - Starlight Roof, Waldorf Astoria.

Mr. William Rosenwald will preside.

The program will include the lighting of a Menorah built by students at the ORT school in Warsaw and brought to New York especially for this purpose, as a symbol of renewed contact with Eastern Jewry. There will be an address by Mr. Edward M. M. Warburg. Ambassador Abba Eban will introduce Moshe Sharett and there will be a major address by Mr. Moshe Sharett.

BUSINESS SESSION -Sunday Morning, December 15, 1957

Mr. Samuel Daroff will preside.

The Agenda includes the presentation of Cash and related matters. At this session there will be awards to be presented to some 30-odd communities that raised more money in 1957 than they did in 1948. There will also be several other awards to outgoing officers. The Nominating Committee will then report and new officers will be elected. Dr. Nahum Goldmann will deliver the closing address.

Dear Friend,

After a long interval I am renewing my practice of addressing personal letters to you. I devote my present letter to two subjects, namely, the difficulties which have arisen in regard to departure to Israel from Eastern Europe and the financial problems of the Jewish Agency in drawing up the budget estimates for the second half of the current year.

As yet there has been no change with respect to the prospects of emigration to Israel from Roumania. With few exceptions the Hungarian Government also persists in denying permission to Jews to migrate. Our main efforts today are concentrated upon ensuring continued immigration from Poland. Thirty-six thousand Jews have come from Poland in the course of the past year. No more than 30,000 to 35,000 Jews remain in that country and, according to our information, at least 15,000 of them desire to come to Israel. In addition we must reckon with another 10,000 candidates for immigration among the Jewish repatriates from Russia during the coming year. Thus we must take into account a potential immigration of 25,000 Jews from Poland.

It is true that six weeks ago the Polish Government discontinued the issuance of passports, but we are unrelenting in our efforts and hope to surmount this obstacle. The main difficulty is the decision of the Polish Government to permit no longer the payment in Polish zlotys of travelling expenses from Warsaw to Trieste or Genoa. It insists upon payment in dollars. Negotiations on this point are at present in progress between the Israel Minister and the Polish Government. We trust that these conversations will prove successful and that at the beginning of 1958 we shall witness renewed immigration from Poland. We may assume that following the resumption of the issuance of passports there will be an increase in pressure by Jews, fearful that exit gates will be closed again.

There is no doubt whatever that the influx of immigration will be influenced in no small degree by the reports of the 36,000 Polish Jews who have already settled in this country. With every month that passes it seems that despite all the difficulties we are succeeding in finding somehow a solution to the problems of housing of the immigrants and of their employment. Consequently the volume of favourable letters sent abroad is increasing. We must not, however, ignore the influence of the comparatively few who have not settled down and whose stories of their hardships and difficulties are not without some effect in dissuading potential immigrants from coming here. This aspect acquires a special importance when we recall that in the event of the renewal of the issuance of passports by the Polish suthorities they will insist upon the departure of the Jews in the shortest possible time. We must take into account the fact that the Arabs are pressing for a prohibition of emigration from Poland and that this pressure is not confined to the Polish Government but is being brought to bear also upon the Russian Government.

The vital importance of an intensified absorption effort, which constitutes a guarantee for the continuation of immigration, brings me to the question of the budget. Two days ago the Permanent Finance Committee of the Zionist General Council approved the budget estimates totalling over IL.120 million for the current six months from October 1957 through March 1958. The income items in these estimates are by no means assured. Indeed it is not certain that the necessary funds will be raised. At the same time it must be stressed that even if the money is found the budget does not meet our most urgent needs.

There are three major problems for which the estimates do not offer any solution:

- 1) The position of 150,000 thousand settlers in 480 villages founded in the past nine years has not yet been consolidated. Up to the present IL.580 million have been invested in these settlements, but at least IL.400 million is still required to ensure their consolidation. This sum must be invested within the next three or four years. The endurance capacity of some of these settlers has almost reached the limit and indeed the weaker elements may desert their holdings and seek other easier and more profitable means of livelihood, unless we provide them in good time with the necessary equipment and livestock to enable them to support themselves on their farms.
- 2) There are still some 20,000 families in the Ma'barot. We cannot erect housing for newly arrived immigrants as long as provision is not made for the housing of the immigrants who came several years ago and are not prepared to put with any discrimination against them.
- 3) The immigrants from Eastern Europe have been absorbed in part in the cities but not in the development areas. There are still many thousands of families who must be placed in diverse branches of our economy by fostering industrial enterprises, expanding the Ulpanim, increasing loan funds to assist them, etc.

85,000 immigrants will have settled in Israel during 1957. Originally we announced that we intended to bring 100,000. There is little doubt that had the funds been available we would have attained this figure. It has become evident that even the absorption of 85,000 newcomers is an excessive burden. None of us can say what the figure will be for 1958. We wish to establish an average of at least 60,000 to 70,000. To attain this figure, however, it is essential, first of all, to integrate those who have already come to Israel.

We hope that the Jews of the Diaspora, seeing the efforts being made in this country to solve the problems we have encountered in this sphere, will share our concern and evince a proper understanding of the gravity of the situation. We trust that on the threshold of the State's Tenth Anniversary they will make a major effort to enable us to bring to Israel all those Jews who wish to come.

Dear Joe,

First of all, I am sure you will be pleased to know that Herb Friedman and Maurice Saltsman finally arrived in Warsow yesterday. They had a very difficult time getting out of here in the storm on Wednesday, spent many hours in Shannon and then finally landed in Lyon, where they had to take the train to Paris. Of course they missed their connection on Tursday to Warsow, and I was beginning to think that because of the fog and bad weather in Europe they would not be able to get to Poland at all, but they finally made it. Now we are keeping our fingers crossed that they will be able to get out and back here in time for our meetings.

I know we have been sending you a good deal of information regarding the conference and yesterday I sent to you and the other officers and members of the cabinet a schedule of the various meetings that are set. At this time, however, I thought you would like to have, for your own information, some details on what is being planned for the different sessions.

The most important matter to be taken up at the officers breakfast, Thursday morning, will be the resolution that was passed by the Study Mission in Jerusalem with regard to the need for a Special Fund in 1958. I am sure we are going to have a full and frank discussion of the matter because, although most of the officers are informed, I do know that there are some defferent points of view and the purpose of this particular meeting is to get all these points of view out in the open and then come out of the meeting with the officers united as regards the need for a Special Fund next year.

The officers meeting, incidentally, is going to be very well attended. Practically every one of the 19 officers invited has said that he will be there. Two other items that will be taken up at this meeting, before the discussion on the Special Fund which will be the last item, are: plans with regard to the General Chairman-ship for 1958 and plans for the June Anniversary Conference in Jerusalem next year.

The next meeting will be that of the Cabinet which will be held at 10.30, with Joe Meyerhoff presiding. Enclosed berewith is the detailed agends we have arranged for the meeting of the cabinet, which I am sure is self explanatory.

The meeting to be held on Friday, December 13th, is, of course, the so-called "Special Session". At this point it appears that we will have an excellent turnout. Almost all the important cities are sending delegations made up of some very top people. All inall, we have about 350 definite reservations for this session. A copy of the agenda for this meeting is enclosed. The Resolutions Committee will be made up of about 30 people. If Phil Lown does attend -- and he said that he will try very hard to do so -- we will name him as chairman of the Resolutions Committee. If Phil Lown does not come, then we plan to appoint Joe

Mazer. Mex Fisher's wife is due to give birth to a child some time next week, but he said he would do everything in his power to show up for the Friday meeting. Our tentative plan at this time is also to have 5 or 6 of the top officers lunch together near the room in which the Resolutions Committee will meet at luncheon. The reason for this is to enable these officers to go into the Resolutions Committee meeting as and when necessary. We will work out the details on this just before Friday.

The so-called "Steering Committee" will meet Saturday afternoon. The agenda for this meeting is also enclosed and I think that this should be a very good meeting because it will be based on Dov Joseph's address on the needs in Israel. At this meeting this year we want to give those present an opportunity to discuss ways and means of raising the kind of money we need in 1958. Heretofore we have done this Sunday morning, but there will not be the time for it next Sunday.

The agenda for the Saturday evening banquet is also enclosed. I am sure you have heard of Maryan Filar, the pianist, whom we have invited to play for some five or six minutes. Filar, as I am sure you know, is a Polish Jew, a product of the DP camps of turope and we thought it altogether fitting to have him at this banquet. The menorah that is to be lighted is one that was just made in the ORT school in Warsaw and was brought to us specially for this purpose last week. Fred Forman will explain the meaning behind the lighting of this particular menorah at this time, symbolizing the new opportunity given to us to help the Jews of Poland and the renewed contact between us and those Jews. The candles will then be lit by Mrs. Eats of Kansas City, who was on the Study Mission

After Moshe Sharett speaks we will want you to reply on what the UJA and the American Jewish community plan to do next year, by reading the resolution passed the previous day on the Special Fund.

The Sunday morning session will begin with breakfast at 9.00 a.m. and I am attaching a copy of the agenda. We want you, as you know, to make the presentations to the communities that raised more money in 1957 than in 1948. There are about 30 such communities but I don't think more than 15 to 20 will be represented at the conference. These communities are to receive scrolls acknowledging the record they set. After that, Elkan Myers will present the report of the Nominating Committee for 1958 officers. You will note in this connection that Joe Meyerhoff has agreed to become a National Chairman. A Bible is being presented to him in recognition of his services as chairmen of the Campaign Cabinet. Fred Forman, of course, will be the chairman of the Cabinet for 1958. OUTLINE OF REMARKS for Sol Luciman

at OFFICERS! MEETING, DECEMBER 12

This is a private meeting of the officers of the UJA and I want to report on a matter of great importance that has been going on inside the family for the past six months or so. This is one of the most important matters on which we have to decide.

Last June Bill Rosenveld definitely made known that he could not continue as General Chairman after the end of this year. The National Chairman discussed the matter end the feeling was unanimous that the next General Chairman should be someone intimately connected with the UJA. They felt that it would be a mistake to reach outside the organization just for the sake of obtaining an illustrious name for the post. It was felt that the General Chairman in 1958 should be selected from the active and tried leadership of the UJA, and that he would work closely with a team that would give him all the necessary support.

I was asked by the National Chairmen to speak with various people in order to find the proper person to be invited to serve next year. There were a number of people who have given of themselves over these years, who would be eminently well qualified for the post of General Chairman in 1958. I talked with a lot of people. Finally I found that there was one person on whom there was almost complete agreement. Those with whom I spoke pointed to the long period of time he has been part of our leadership group, and the outstanding effectiveness, warm devotion and great practical understanding he has shown. It became definite that Morris Berinstein was the person to be asked to lead the UJA in 1958.

I spoke with Morris and at first he said that it would be too much for him.

But after we talked about it for a while he felt that he could depend upon the

leaders in the UJA and in the country to help him and together they could form the

kind of team that could share the responsibility and run the best possible campaign.





Dear Friend:

This is my first communication to you as General Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal.

Conscious as I am of the honor of being elected General Chairman of the UJA for 1958, I am even more conscious of the responsibilities which this office carries -- responsibilities which I can hope to discharge only with your help and with the help of the millions of fellow American Jews like you.

I follow in office Mr. Rosenwald, whose years of devoted service in behalf of the UJA have won for him the respect and admiration of the entire American Jewish community. I know that you will be pleased to learn that at the UJA Conference in Miami which will be held March 2, 1958, we shall honor Mr. Rosenwald at a testimonial dinner in recognition of his distinguished service in behalf of the UJA, and particularly, for his superb record as General Chairman for 1955, 1956 and 1957. The most fitting tribute we could pay him would be to be able to report on that occasion that the 1958 campaign was definitely headed for an outstanding success.

I should like to tell you very briefly about the Annual UJA Conference which we just concluded.

It was a conference both of substance and of great inspiration. From several authoritative sources we learned that during the forthcoming year we may reasonably expect a new influx of 70,000 Jews into Israel from Poland, Egypt, North Africa and other areas, and that, additionally, we will have to provide for the resettlement of 10,000 in other free lands. We received stirring reports from our Executive Vice-Chairman, Mr. Herbert A. Friedman, and Mr. Maurice Saltzman of Cleveland, who had just returned from a flying trip

to Poland, portraying the tragic life of the small remnant of the once distinguished Polish Jewish community and why Polish Jewry is now in the process of self-liquidation by emigration to Israel.

From Mr. Charles Jordan, JDC Overseas Director, we learned of JDC's global program of relief and rehabilitation and of the recent expansion of this program to meet the mounting economic crisis facing Moroccan Jewry and to assist the Polish Jewish repatriates from the Soviet Union. From Israel's former Prime Minister, Moshe Sharett, Dr. Nahum Goldmann and Dr. Dov Joseph, Chairman and Treasurer, respectively, of the Jewish Agency, we received full and frank reports on the effect of the recent influx of immigrants on Israel's economy, an economy already under tremendous strain due to Israel's defense requirements.

To be specific, last year alone more than 80,000 new immigrants came to Israel from Egypt, Hungary, Poland and North Africa and 20,000 Jews were resettled in countries other than Israel. Inasmuch as a minimum of \$1000 is required to provide for the initial absorption costs of a single immigrant, we undertook to raise \$100 million in the Emergency Rescue Fund in 1957. By any standard, the 1957 campaign was a great success. Yet, the fact is that we succeeded in raising only about \$30 million in the ERF as against the \$100 million needed for the emergency rescue program. In Israel alone the resulting deficit is reflected in staggering debts incurred by the Government of Israel and the Jewish Agency and in the radical curtailment of the development program for new immigrants. For the first time in a decade Israel's representatives spoke of the threat to future migration to Israel and to Israel's economy that this situation -- the great disparity between the amount raised and the number of people resettled in Israel -- presented.

Confronted with these facts and figures, more than 1400 leaders of American Jewry who attended the Conference unanimously confirmed a resolution adopted by an extraordinary session of 500 communal leaders which preceded the Conference, calling upon the UJA to launch a Rescue Fund for \$100 million to provide for the anticipated 80,000 new immigrants who will have to be resettled this year and to cover the unmet needs of those who have been previously resettled. This is in addition to the \$102 million goal fixed as the sum to be raised in the Regular Campaign. Many of the 500 people present at the special session seconded the resolution by eloquent endorsements and by announcing gifts which reflected unprecedented generosity and full appreciation of the continuing emergency confronting us. A copy of the resolution is enclosed.

I am confident that those who attended the Conference represent the conscience and the heart of American Jewry and that successful as the 1957 campaign was, we shall this coming year live up to our responsibilities by surpassing what we did in 1957.

I pledge you my full energies in our common cause and derive strength and encouragement from the knowledge that I shall have your full support.

TO CABINET ON 12/12/57 CABINET MEETING

I am sure those who could not attend the momentous Cabinet meeting on December 12th -- preceding the Special Leadership Session and the UJA Annual National Conference -- will want a summary of it. I also hope the following will prove useful for those who were there.

Reporting on the 1957 campaign, Bill Rosenwald pointed out that the Emergency Rescue Fund is expected to raise a gross sum of about \$30,000,000, over and beyond some \$55,000,000 brought in by the regular campaign. He added that, although this represents a fine response, the Jewish Agency had to go deeply into debt to meet its obligations because the goal of an extra \$100,000,000 for the rescue of 100,000 refugees was not realized. One consequence is that thousands of older immigrants in Israel are still housed in sub-standard Ma'baroth dwellings because funds to improve this situation had to be used to save new refugees.

In a most significant address, Ambassador Abba Eban stressed that the strengthening of its economy is the primary present aim of the Government of Israel. Ambassador Eban commented that those who can come to Israel now and in the months ahead from North African countries as well as those of Eastern Europe may not be able to do so later on, for the exit gaps are narrowing. He said that, in view of the military threat of its Soviet-armed enemies and its financial condition, the word "emergency" definitely applies to the situation Israel faces now. It would be a terrible irony if, during the celebration of Israel's tenth anniversary year, when a great demonstration of solidarity with Israel by Jewry everywhere might be expected, a position of economic weakness should manifest itself.

Only the day before the meeting, Herb Friedman and Maurice Saltzman, Cleveland's 1957 Campaign Chairman, returned from a tour of Poland. The situation can be described openly -- and accurately --, Herb told us, by saying that Jews in Poland have come to realize the

can't live a Jewish life in Poland, and therefore want to leave. All evidences of the rich Jewish past in Poland are fast disappearing. It is expected that a minimum of 30,000 Jews will be brought out of Poland in 1958. Presently 500 additional exodus-hungry Polish Jews are being repatriated from Russia every month. They cannot go to Israel now, but when the Polish-Russian repatriation agreement expires next year, several thousand probably will be able to leave Poland for Israel.

The recommendation that the 1957 UJA Study Mission made while in Israel to continue a special fund was then considered. Many speakers affirmed the need for a fund, and asserted that sufficient money to meet the stated needs could not possibly be raised in 1958 without it. The general attitude was summed up by Morris Berinstein when he declared that we must have the additional cash raised through a special fund to assure that Israel's back is not broken economically through the great effort to save Jews in distress anywhere in the world -- the effort to which the UJA is dedicated. I am very happy to note that following a report by Sol Luckman, Morris was named at this meeting as the Cabinet's unanimous choice for the UJA's 1958 General Chairman. His election at the Conference was one of the most thrilling high points of the meeting.

I can't conclude this letter, my last to you as Cabinet Chairman, without noting what a really stirring experience it has been to have worked so closely together during these past two years in this capacity with you and all the other members of that great team known as the UJA Cabinet. I doubt if there is a group of more dedicated leaders anywhere, and I certainly shall enjoy continued inspiration -- and, I am sure, needed support -- from this leadership in the new post I have assumed as one of the 1958 National Chairmen.

Surely one of the most vital factors in making the Cabinet, and indeed the UJA, as remarkable as they are has been the devoted leadership of Fred Forman, a wonderful person, who is taking over as 1958 Cabinet Chairman. His ability has been well demonstrated over the years and I know that all the members of the Cabinet will support his leadership in every way possible.
