

STATEMENT BY: NAHUM SHAMIR
Economic Minister of
Israel to the United States
TO: Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds Meeting
June 3, 1967

The Prime Minister of Israel has announced that the Israel Emergency Fund of UJA has full primacy to provide in free dollars the assistance that Israel so urgently requires to meet vital human needs.

The Prime Minister has called upon all Israeli social and educational institutions to urge their American friends and supporters to stop forthwith all special fund raising efforts for their institutions, and to give complete and unlimited support to the Israel Emergency Fund of the U. J. A.

The Minister of Finance has reiterated this primacy above all forms of aid.

In addition to the largest possible gifts people can contribute to the Israel Emergency Fund of U. J. A., Israel is calling upon its friends to invest in State of Israel Bonds, and has asked the Israel Bond Organization to intensify its efforts.

The U. J. A. and the Israel Bond Organization have agreed to coordinate their actions fully in keeping with the above statements of the Prime Minister and the Minister of Finance.

In order to achieve the results essential to Israel and its people, the U. J. A., the Welfare Funds, and the Israel Bond Organization will have to mobilize their manpower and resources for the most intensive and rapid activity in their history.

RESOLUTION ON ISRAEL

ADOPTED BY BOARD OF DIRECTORS
Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds

June 4, 1967

Deeply moved by the critical needs of this perilous hour, the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds expresses to the people of Israel its profound commitment of the utmost support.

Our community organizations, their leaders and members, have made clear and will continue to make clear to President Johnson, to Secretary Rusk, to their Senators and Representatives their complete conviction that our Government must bring to bear the full weight of its great power to assure Israel's territorial integrity and political independence, and its fundamental right to free and innocent passage of its ships through the Straits of Tiran. These assurances and their effective implementation are essential for the basic interests of America and the free world. We fervently hope that this will be achieved in peace and with justice.

In this crisis, the people of Israel can no longer maintain their financial commitments to the existing welfare, health and educational programs; such needs are further increased by the mobilization of the family breadwinners, and they must look to us to finance more of these vital services. We therefore call upon our Federations and Welfare Funds to:

- 1) Mount a massive collection effort to turn all past and current commitments to the UJA into cash.
- 2) Provide the imperative, additional aid required by giving unprecedented, extraordinary support to the Israel Emergency Fund.

LONDON ENGLAND JUNE 6 1967

THE FINANCIAL MOBILISATION OF BRITISH JEWRY IS UNDER WAY. FROM EVERY COMMUNITY IN ENGLAND, SCOTLAND, WALES AND IRELAND COMES A MESSAGE OF SOLIDARITY WITH OUR PEOPLE IN ISRAEL AND THE DIASPORA. SINCE THE LAUNCHING OF THE JPA'S EMERGENCY APPEAL ALMOST EVERY DISTRICT HAS HELD A MASS MEETING IN WHICH SUPPORT WAS PLEDGED AND DONATIONS GIVEN. WOMEN HAVE TAKEN OFF THEIR RINGS, UNPINNED THEIR BROOCHES, WHILE MEN HAVE COME FORWARD WITH THEIR WATCHES. INSTITUTIONS SUCH AS THE KING DAVID SCHOOL IN MANCHESTER HAVE RELEASED SUBSTANTIAL SUMS FROM THEIR FUNDS. IN PALMERS GREEN, LONDON, THE SYNAGOGUE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT RELEASED 15,000 DOLLARS FROM ITS BUILDING FUND, AND THE OLD PEOPLE'S FRIENDSHIP CLUB FORFEITED THE 750 DOLLARS SAVED FOR ITS ANNUAL OUTING. THE CURRENT TOTAL RAISED IS 18,000,000 DOLLARS. BUT IT IS NOT JUST THE JEWS WHO CARE. DEMONSTRATIONS OF SYMPATHY COME FROM ALL SIDES. AUDIENCES AT 'FIDDLER ON THE ROOF' SHOWING IN LONDON, HAVE DONATED TO THE FUND. JPA WORKERS HAVE HAD BANKNOTES PRESSED INTO THEIR HANDS FOR ISRAEL FROM COMPLETE STRANGERS. HEADQUARTERS OF JEWISH FUND-RAISING ORGANISATIONS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY ARE BESIEGED BY VOLUNTEERS WHO WANT TO GO TO ISRAEL, HELP WITH CLERICAL WORK, GIVE BLOOD, DO SOMETHING, ANYTHING, FOR OUR COUNTRY.



Notes on conversation with Herbert Katzki, JDC Geneva office - 10:30 A.M. New York time and Harold Trobe, Tel-Aviv

1. He managed to get through to Howard Trobe at 1:30 Geneva time and was permitted to speak for three minutes. 900 calls were backed up waiting to get through. Everything is O.K. and Harold is preparing a cable reporting on the situation. In Jerusalem, our Old Age Home was in line of fire and our people went down to the cellars, but they are now back in their rooms.

Machme Israel is re-established as a Military Hospital. I understand that our people moved out before hostilities began. It was contemplated to enlarge Pardess Katz as a hospital, but it has been found that it is not necessary.

They have heard nothing about bombing Natanya and as far as our Old Age Home - nothing was necessary. Also, it had been contemplated that it would be necessary to move people around to make space for wounded. Fortunately, this was unnecessary.

2. On the question of finances, Harold said that they would check and let us know.

3. Supplies -- the same is true on supplies

4. Beds, mattresses -- here too he did not know what the situation was, but since there may be a need, Herman Goldsmith has been instructed to be informed as to availability and purchase price

5. Jerusalem -- He said that he spoke to the Horwitz's and Jerusalem went through a "terrible time."

6. Red Cross Plane -- one is leaving tonight for Tel-Aviv although it had been scheduled for yesterday or even the day before and bandages will be put on the plane, although Harold did not actually seem to need these, but since they had already been purchased, based on the previous request contained in Harold's letter and in any case, since it was a token, they decided to go ahead. The Red Cross people are taking mail to Harold on the plane and at Herb's request will see him and bring back more complete news and information about him and the situation.

7. On June 6, a cable from Tel-Aviv, sent at 14:00 hours read: "All well here including Israel Malben Institutions' personnel Stop Telephoning first possibility today or tomorrow Stop" (Katzki obviously got through to Harold Before Harold could contact him)

II TUNISIA

1. He spoke to Sheldon, who informed him that all is quiet and that such rampaging as took place, was only in the city of Tunis and not in the interior.

2. Three government ministers, yesterday, contacted the Jewish community and apologized for the destruction of the previous day and indicated that they will try to find means to reconstruct the Synagogue as well as the stores sacked. However, no technique has been worked out -- how to compensate for this and may take some time. In this connection, Sheldon contacted Jouie and indicated that certainly JDC Welfare would be amenable to conversation as to possibility of being helpful to the small merchants who lost their income.

3. Herb indicated that Sheldon had told him that volunteers from Tunisia are leaving for the Middle East. He also said that troops are in the streets of Tunis and helping to maintain order. In various conversations which he

had with different people, the feeling exists that, should Israel win, there is no way to estimate what the reaction of the Tunisian man in the street will be to the Jewish community.

4. Planes to Paris are crowded with Jewish people who seem to be seeing "the handwriting on the wall". These people are making their own arrangements.

Dear Herb:

I have requested clearance from the Minister of Finance in Jerusalem in reply to your questions and additionally questions that have come to the fore, particularly in respect to various articles that have appeared in many newspapers and especially those in the Los Angeles Times and the Wall Street Journal on the effects of the war upon the economy of Israel.

The Minister has instructed me to inform ~~to inform~~ you that the reports circulated in respect to the damage done to the Israeli economy in the past weeks are neither correct nor are they based on facts.

The direct damage and the indirect effects are a complete loss of tourism, reduction of ~~exports~~ exports, a stoppage of necessary services for the population, a marked decrease in production and directly the casualties received by many workers who are our reserve soldiers, arrives at many hundred of millions of dollars.

A ~~subcommittee~~ special committee of economists and various experts have been appointed by the Minister of Finance in order to determine the extent of the damage and to develop emergency programs. The Committee will study how to counteract the effects in particular of the destruction of Jerusalem, to the settlements on the borders and in other areas and the implementation of various necessary services such as social, medical, public, etc. As soon as we will have the findings based on these studies, I shall not fail to advise you and your colleagues.

It must also be understood that in respect to the foreign currency reserves, a final accounting cannot be made as yet, and only in the coming weeks and months will we be able to establish a total picture.

It is correct that we attempted to maintain industrial production in essential industries, however, this was not done with complete normal productivity. The work force was made up, in the main, of women, old people, and the youth, and there still remain delays and ~~diffic~~ difficulties in almost every branch of industry.

Notwithstanding our fervent wish to be partners to the optimistic conclusions drawn by others, we ~~a~~ cannot agree. We are certain that in the near future we shall be able to supply our friends with the particulars of the damage which has been occasioned and the extraordinary problems which stand before the State of Israel.



ABBA EBAN: "NOT BACKWARD TO BELLIGERENCY
BUT FORWARD TO PEACE!"

(Full text of the address by Israel's Foreign Minister, Mr. Abba Eban, in the United Nations Security Council on 6 June 1967.)

Mr. President: I have just come from Jerusalem to tell the Security Council that Israel, by its independent effort and sacrifice, has passed from serious danger to successful resistance.

Two days ago Israel's condition caused much concern across the humane and friendly world. Israel had reached a sombre hour. Let me try to evoke the point at which our fortunes stood.

An army, greater than any force ever assembled in Sinai, had massed against Israel's southern frontier. Egypt had dismissed the United Nations forces which symbolized the international interest in the maintenance of peace in our region. Nasser had provocatively brought five infantry divisions and two armoured divisions up to our very gates; 80,000 men and 900 tanks were poised to move.

Plan To Encircle Israel

A special striking force, comprising an armoured division with at least 200 tanks, was concentrated against Elath at the Negev's southern tip. Here was a clear design to cut the southern Negev off from the main body of our State. For Egypt had openly proclaimed that Elath did not form part of Israel and had predicted that Israel itself would soon expire. The

proclamation was empty; the prediction now lies in ruin. While the main brunt of the hostile threat was focussed on the southern front, an alarming plan of encirclement was under way. With Egypt's initiative and guidance, Israel was already being strangled in its maritime approaches to the whole eastern half of the world. For sixteen years, Israel had been illicitly denied passage in the Suez Canal, despite the Security Council's decision of 1 September 1951. And now the creative enterprise of ten patient years which had opened an international route across the Strait of Tiran and the Gulf of Aqaba had been suddenly and arbitrarily choked. Israel was and is breathing with only a single lung..

Jordan had been intimidated, against its better interest into joining a defence pact. It is not a defence pact at all: It is an aggressive pact, of which I saw the consequences with my own eyes yesterday in the shells falling upon institutions of health and culture in the City of Jerusalem. Every house and street in Jerusalem came into the range of fire as a result of Jordan's adherence to this pact; So also did the crowded, and pathetically narrow coastal strip in which so much of Israel's life and population is concentrated.

Iraqi troops reinforced Jordanian units in areas immediately facing vital and vulnerable Israel communication centres. Expeditionary forces from Algeria and Kuwait had reached

Egyptian territory. Nearly all the Egyptian forces which had been attempting the conquest of the Yemen had been transferred to the coming assault upon Israel. Syrian units, including artillery, overlooked the Israeli villages in the Jordan Valley. Terrorist troops came regularly into our territory to kill, plunder and set off explosions; The most recent occasion was five days ago.

Peril Confronted Israel All Around

In short, there was peril for Israel wherever it looked. Its manpower had been hastily mobilized. Its economy and commerce were beating with feeble pulse. Its streets were dark and empty. There was an apocalyptic air of approaching peril. And Israel faced this danger alone.

But not entirely alone we were buoyed up by an unforgettable surge of public sympathy across the world. Friendly Governments expressed the rather ominous hope that Israel would manage "to live". But the dominant theme of our condition was danger and solitude.

Now there could be no doubt about what was intended for us. With my very ears I heard President Nasser's speech on 28 May. He said:

"We intend to open a general assault against Israel. This will be total war. Our basic aim is the destruction of Israel."

On 2 June, the Egyptian Commander in Sinai, General Murtagi, published his order of the day, calling on his troops to wage

a war of destruction against Israel. Here, then, was a systematic, overt, proclaimed design at politicide, the murder of a State.

The policy, the arms, the men had all been brought together. And the State thus threatened with collective assassination was itself the last sanctuary of people which had seen six million of its sons exterminated by a more powerful dictator two decades before.

Blockade Could Not Be Passively Suffered

The question then widely asked in Israel and across the world was whether we had not already gone beyond the utmost point of danger. Was there any precedent in world history, for example, for a nation passively to suffer the blockade of its only southern port, involving nearly all its vital fuel, when such acts of war, legally and internationally, have always invited resistance? This was a most unusual patience. It existed because we had acceded to the suggestion of some of the maritime States that we give them scope to concert their efforts in order to find an international solution which would ensure the maintenance of free passage in the Gulf of Aqaba for ships of all nations and of all flags.

As we pursued this avenue of international solution, we wished the world to have no doubt about our readiness to exhaust every prospect, however fragile, of a diplomatic solution. And some of the prospects that were suggested were very fragile indeed.

Israel's Margin of Security Diminished

But as time went on, there was no doubt that our margin of general security was becoming smaller and smaller. Thus, on

the morning of 5 June, when Egyptian forces engaged us by air and land, bombarding the villages of Kissufim, Nahal-Oz and Ein Hasheloshah we knew that our limit of safety had been reached, and perhaps passed. In accordance with its inherent right of self-defence as formulated in Article 51 of the United Nations Charter, Israel responded defensively in full strength. Never in the history of nations has armed force been used in a more righteous or compelling cause.

Even when engaged with Egyptian forces we still hoped to contain the conflict. Egypt was overtly bent on our destruction but we still hoped that others would not join the aggression. Prime Minister Eshkol, who for weeks had carried the heavy burden of calculation and decision, published and conveyed a message to other neighbouring States proclaiming:

"We shall not attack any country unless it opens war on us. Even now, when the mortars speak, we have not given up our quest for peace. We strive to repel all menace of terrorism and any danger of aggression to ensure our security and our legitimate rights."

Israel Had No Desire To Expand Conflict

In accordance with this policy of attempting to contain the conflict, I yesterday invited General Bull, the Chairman of the Truce Supervision Organization, to inform the heads of the Jordanian State that Israel had no desire to expand the conflict beyond the unfortunate dimensions that it had already assumed and that if Israel were not attacked by Jordan, it would not attack and would act only in self-defence. It reached my ears

that this message had been duly and faithfully conveyed and received. Nevertheless, Jordan decided to join the Egyptian posture against Israel and opened artillery attacks across the whole frontier, including Jerusalem. Those attacks are still in progress.

To the appeal of Prime Minister Eshkol to avoid any further extension of the conflict, Syria answered at 12.2 yesterday morning by bombing Megiddo from the air and bombing Deganya at 12.00 with artillery fire and kibbutz Ein Hamifrats and Koordani with long-range guns. But Jordan embarked on a much more total assault by artillery and aircraft along the entire front with special emphasis on Jerusalem, to whose dangerous and noble ordeal yesterday I can bear personal witness.

Heavy Bombardment of Israel's Capital, Jerusalem

There has been bombing of houses; There has been a hit on the great new National Museum of Art; There has been a hit on the University and on Shaare Tsedek, the first hospital ever to have been established outside the ancient walls. Is this not an act of vandalism that deserves the condemnation of all mankind? And in the Knesset Building, whose construction had been movingly celebrated by the entire democratic world ten months ago, the Israeli Cabinet and Parliament met under heavy gunfire, whose echoes mingled at the end of our meeting with Hatikvah, the anthem of hope.

Thus throughout the day and night of 5 June, Jordan which we had expressly invited to abstain from needless slaughter became, to our surprise, and still remains, the most intense of

all the belligerents; Death and injury, as so often in history, stalk Jerusalem's streets.

When the approaching Egyptian aircraft appeared on our radar screens, soon to be followed by artillery attacks on our villages near the Gaza Strip, I instructed Ambassador Rafael to inform the Security Council, in accordance with the provisions of Article 51 of the Charter. I know that that involved arousing you, Mr. President, at a most uncongenial hour of the night, but we felt that the Security Council should be most urgently seized.

Israel Disconcerted by U.N. Role

I should, however, be less than frank if I were to conceal the fact that the Government and people of Israel have been disconcerted by some aspects of the United Nations role in this conflict. The sudden withdrawal of the United Nations Emergency Force was not accompanied, as it should have been, by due international consultations on the consequences of that withdrawal. Moreover, Israeli interests were affected. They were not adequately explored. No attempt was made, little time given, to help Israel surmount grave prejudice to its vital interests consequent on that withdrawal. After all, a new confrontation of forces suddenly arose. It suddenly had to be met. And at Sharm el-Sheikh at the entrance to the Strait of Tiran, legality walked out and blockade walked in. The peace of the world trembled. The United Nations had somehow been put into a position of leaving Sinai safe for belligerency.

It is not a question of sovereignty that is here involved. The United Nations has a right to ask that when it

assumes a function, the termination of that function shall not take place in conditions that would lead to anti-Charter situations. I do not raise this point in order to linger upon that which is past; but because of Israel's general attitude to the peace-keeping functions of this Organization. I confess that my own attitude and those of my colleagues and of my fellow-citizens to the peace-keeping functions of the United Nations have been traumatically affected by this experience.

The United Nations Emergency Force rendered distinguished service. Nothing became it less than the manner of its departure. All gratitude and appreciation is owed to the individuals who sustained its action. If in the course of the recent combats United Nations personnel have fallen dead or wounded then I join my voice in an expression of the most sincere regret.

Future U.N. Role Problematic

The problem of the future role of a United Nations presence in conflicts such as these is much debated. We must ask ourselves a question that has arisen as a result of this experience. People in our country and in many countries ask: What is the use of a United Nations presence if it is, in effect, an umbrella which is taken away as soon as it begins to rain?

Surely, then, future arrangements for peace-keeping must depend more on the agreement and implementation by the parties themselves than on machinery which is totally at the mercy of the host country, so totally at its mercy as to be the instrument of its policies, whatever those policies may be.

We have lived through three dramatic weeks. Those weeks have brought into clear view the main elements of tension, and also the chief promise of relaxed tension in the future. The first link in the chain was the series of sabotage acts emanating from Syria. In October last year, the Security Council was already seized of this problem. A majority of its member States found it possible and necessary to draw attention to the Syrian Government's responsibility for altering that situation. Scarcely a day passed without a mine, a bomb, a hand-grenade or a mortar exploding on Israel's soil, sometimes with lethal or crippling effects; always with an unsettling psychological influence. In general, fourteen or fifteen such incidents would accumulate before a response was considered necessary. And this ceaseless accumulation of terrorist incidents in the name of what was called "popular war", together with responses which in the long run sometimes became inevitable, were for a long period the main focus of tension in the Middle East.

But then there came a graver source of tension in mid-May, when abnormal troop concentrations were observed in the Sinai Peninsula. For the ten years of relative stability beginning with March 1957 and ending with May 1967, the Sinai Desert had been free of Egyptian troops. In other words, a natural geographic barrier, a largely uninhabited space, separated the main forces of the two sides. It is true that in terms of sovereignty and law, any State has a right to put its armies in any part of its territory that it chooses. This, however, is not a legal question: It is a political and a security question. Experience in many parts of the world,

not least in our own, demonstrates that massive armies in close proximity to each other, against a background of a doctrine of belligerency and accompanying threats by one army to annihilate the other, create an inflammatory situation.

We were puzzled in Israel by the relative lack of preoccupation on the part of friendly Governments and international agencies with this intense concentration which found its reflection in precautionary concentrations on our side. My Government proposed, at least two weeks ago, the concept of a parallel and reciprocal reduction of forces on both sides of the frontier. We elicited no response, and certainly no action.

International Waterway Closed

To these grave sources of tension -- the sabotage and terrorist movement, emanating mostly from Syria, and the heavy troop concentrations accompanied by dire, apocalyptic threats in Sinai -- there was added in the third week of May the most electric shock of all. This was the closure of the international waterway consisting of the Strait of Tiran and the Gulf of Aqaba. It is not difficult to understand why this incident had a more drastic impact than others. In 1957 the maritime nations, within the framework of the United Nations General Assembly, correctly enunciated the doctrine of free and innocent passage through the Strait. Now, when that doctrine was proclaimed -- and incidentally, not challenged by the Egyptian representative at that time -- it was little more than an abstract principle for the maritime world. For Israel it was a great but still unfulfilled

prospect. It was not yet a reality. But during the ten years in which we and the other States of the maritime community have relied upon that doctrine and upon established usage, the principle has become a reality, consecrated by hundreds of sailings under dozens of flags and the establishment of a whole complex of commerce and industry and communication.

A new dimension has been added to the map of the world's communications. On that dimension we have constructed Israel's bridge toward the friendly States of Asia and Africa, a network of relationships which is the chief pride of Israel in the second decade of its independence.

All this, then, had grown up as an effective usage under the United Nations flag. Does Mr. Nasser really think that he can come upon the scene in ten minutes and cancel the established legal usage and interests of ten years?

There was in this wanton act a quality of malice. For surely the closing of the Strait of Tiran gave no benefit whatever to Egypt except the perverse joy of inflicting injury on others. It was an anarchic act, because it showed a total disregard for the law of nations, the application of which in this specific case had not been challenged for ten years. And it was an act of arrogance, because there are other nations in Asia and East Africa that trade with the Port of Elath, as they have every right to do, through the Strait of Tiran and across the Gulf of Aqaba. Other sovereign States from Japan to Ethiopia, from Thailand to Uganda, from Cambodia to Madagascar, have a sovereign right to decide for themselves whether they wish or do not wish to trade with Israel. These countries are not colonies of Cairo. They can trade with Israel or not trade with Israel as they wish, and President Nasser is not the policeman of other African and Asian States.

Here then was a wanton intervention in the sovereign rights of other States in the eastern half of the world to decide for themselves whether or not they wish to establish trade relations with either or both of the two ports at the head of the Gulf of Aqaba:

A Blockade Is An Act of War

When we examine the implications of this act, we have no causè to wonder that the international shock was great. There was another reason too for that shock. Blockades have traditionally been regarded, in the pre-Charter parlance, as acts of war. To blockade, after all, is to attempt strangulation -- and sovereign States are entitled not to have their trade strangled. To understand how the State of Israel felt, one has merely to look around this table and imagine, for example, a foreign Power forcibly closing New York or Montreal, Boston or Marseilles, Toulon or Copenhagen, Rio or Tokyo or Bombay harbour. How would your Governments react? What would you do? How long would you wait?

But Israel waited because of its confidence that the other maritime Powers and countries interested in this new trading pattern would concert their influence in order to re-establish a legal situation and to liquidate this blockade. We concerted action with them not because Israel's national interest was here abdicated. There will not be -- there cannot be -- an Israel without Elath. We cannot be expected to return to a dwarfed stature, with our face to the Mediterranean alone. In law and in history, peace and

blockades have never coexisted. How could it be expected that the blockade of Elath and a relaxation of tension in the Middle East could ever be brought into harmony?

Three Main Elements of Tension

These then were the three main elements in the tension: the sabotage movement; the blockade of the port; and, perhaps more imminent than anything else, this vast and purposeful encirclement movement, against the background of an authorized presidential statement announcing that the objective of the encirclement was to bring about the destruction and the annihilation of a sovereign State.

These acts taken together -- the blockade, the dismissal of the United Nations force, and the heavy concentration in Sinai -- effectively disrupted the status quo which had ensured a relative stability on the Egyptian-Israeli frontier for ten years. I do not use the words "relative stability" lightly, for while those elements of the Egyptian-Israeli relationship existed there was not one single incident of violence between Egypt and Israel for ten years. But suddenly this pattern of mutually accepted stability was smashed to smithereens. It is now the task of the Governments concerned to elaborate the new conditions of their coexistence. I think that much of this work should be done directly by these Governments themselves. Surely, after what has happened we must have better assurance than before, for Israel and the Middle East of peaceful coexistence. The question is whether there is any reason to believe that such a new era may yet come to pass. If I am sanguine on this point, it is because of a conviction that men and nations do behave wisely once they have exhausted all other alternatives. Surely the other alternatives of war and belligerency have now been exhausted. And What has

anybody gained from them? But in order that the new system of interstate relationships may flourish in the Middle East, it is important that certain principles be applied above and beyond the cease-fire to which the Security Council has given its unanimous support.

Israel Welcomes Appeal for Cease-Fire

Let me then say here that Israel welcomes the appeal for the cease-fire as formulated in this resolution. But I must point out that the implementation depends on the absolute and sincere acceptance and co-operation of the other parties, which, in our view, are responsible for the present situation. And in conveying this resolution to my colleagues, I must at this moment point out that these other Governments have not used the opportunity yet to clarify their intentions.

I have said that the situation to be constructed after the cease-fire must depend on certain principles. The first of these principles surely must be the acceptance of Israel's Statehood and the total elimination of the fiction of its non-existence. It would seem to me that after 3,000 years the time has arrived to accept Israel's nationhood as a fact. Here is the only State in the international community which has the same territory, speaks the same language and upholds the same faith as it did 3,000 years ago.

And if, as everybody knows to be the fact, the universal conscience was in the last week or two most violently shaken at the prospect of danger to Israel, it was not only because there seemed to be a danger to a State. It was also, because the State was Israel, with all that this ancient name evokes, teaches, symbolizes and inspires. How grotesque would be an international community which found room for 127 sovereign units and which did not acknowledge the sovereignty of that people which had given

nationhood its deepest significance and its most enduring grace.

Israel's Successful Resistance Evokes Relief

No wonder, then, that when danger threatened we could hear a roar of indignation sweep across the world. No wonder that men in progressive movements and members of the scientific and humanistic cultures joined together in sounding an alarm bell about an issue that vitally affected the human conscience. And no wonder that a deep and universal sense of satisfaction and relief has accompanied the news of Israel's gallant and successful resistance.

But the central point remains the need to secure an authentic recognition by our neighbours of Israel's deep roots in the Middle Eastern reality. There is an intellectual tragedy in the failure of Arab leaders to come to grips, however reluctantly, with the depth and authenticity of Israel's roots in the life, the history, the spiritual experience and the culture of the Middle East.

This, then, is the first axiom. A much more conscious and uninhibited acceptance of Israel's Statehood is an axiom requiring no demonstration. There will never be a Middle East without an independent and sovereign State of Israel in its midst.

The second principle must be that of the peaceful settlement of disputes. The resolution now adopted falls within the concept of the peaceful settlement of disputes. I have already said that much could be done if the Governments of the area would embark much more on direct contacts. They must find their way to each other. After all, when there is conflict between them they come together face to face. Why should they not come together face to face to solve the conflict? On some occasions it would not be a bad idea to have the solution before, and therefore instead of, the conflict.

Not Backward to Belligerency - But Forward to Peace

When the Council discusses what is to happen after the cease-fire, we hear many formulae: back to 1956, back to 1948 - - I understand our neighbours would wish to turn the clock back to 1947. The fact is, however, that most clocks move forward and not backward. This should be the case with the clock of Middle Eastern peace. - Not backward to belligerency, but forward to peace.

The point was well made this evening by the representative of Argentina, who said: "The cease-fire must be followed immediately by the most energetic efforts to find a just and true peace in the Middle East." In a similar sense, the representative of Canada warned us against merely reproducing the old positions of conflict, without attempting to settle the underlying issues of Arab-Israeli coexistence. After all, many things in recent days have been mixed up with each other. Few things are what they were. And in order to create harmonious combinations of relationships, it is inevitable that the States should come together in negotiation.

Another factor in the harmony that we would like to see in the Middle East relates to external Powers. From these, and especially from the greatest amongst them, the small States of the Middle East -- and most of them are small -- ask for a rigorous support, not for individual States, but for specific principles; not to be for one State against other States, but to be for peace against war, for free commerce against belligerency, for the pacific settlement of disputes against violent irredentist threats; in other words, to exercise an even-handed support for the integrity and independence of States and for the rights of States under the Charter of the United Nations and other sources of international law.

There are no two categories of States. The United Arab Republic, Iraq, Syria, Jordan, Lebanon -- not one of these has a single ounce or milligram of Statehood which does not adhere in equal measures to Israel itself.

Balanced Attitude Required From Other States

It is important that States outside our region apply a balanced attitude. They should not exploit temporary tensions and divergencies in the issues of global conflict. They should not seek to win gains by inflaming fleeting passions and they should strive to make a balanced distribution of their friendship amongst the States of the Middles East.

Now whether all the speeches of all the great Powers this evening meet this criterion, everybody, of course, can judge for himself. I do not propose to answer in detail all the observations of the representative of the Soviet Union. I had the advantage of hearing the same things in identical language a few days ago from his colleague, the Soviet Ambassador in Israel. I must confess that I was no more convinced this evening than I was the day before yesterday about the validity of this most vehement and one-sided denunciation. But surely world opinion, before whose tribunal this debate unrolls, can solve this question by posing certain problems to itself. Who was it that attempted to destroy a neighbouring State in 1948, Israel or its neighbours? Who now closes an international waterway to the port of a neighbouring State, Israel or the United Arab Republic? Does Israel refuse to negotiate a peace settlement with the Arab States, or do they refuse to do so with it? Who disrupted the 1957 pattern of stability, Israel or Egypt? Did troops of Egypt, Syria, Jordan, Iraq, Lebanon, Kuwait and Algeria surround

Israel in this menacing confrontation, or has any distinguished representative seen some vast Israeli colossus surrounding the area between Morocco and Kuwait?

I raise these points of elementary logic. Of course, a great Power can take refuge in its power from the exigencies of logic. All of us in our youth presumably recounted La Fontaine's fable, La raison du plus fort est toujours la meilleure. But here, after all, there is nobody who is more or less strong than others; we sit here around the table on the concept of sovereign equality. But I think we have an equal duty to bring substantive proof for any denunciation that we make, each of the other.

These are grave times. And yet they may have fortunate issue. This could be the case if those who decided three weeks ago, to disrupt the status quo would ask themselves what the benefits have been. As he looks around him at the arena of battle, at the wreckage of planes and tanks, at the collapse of intoxicated hopes, might not an Egyptian ruler ponder whether anything was achieved by that disruption? What has it brought but strife, conflict with other powerful interests, and the stern criticism of progressive men throughout the world?

Israel in recent days has proved its steadfastness and vigour. It is now willing to demonstrate its instinct for peace. Let us build a new system of relationships from the wreckage of the old. Let us discern across the darkness the vision of a better and a brighter dawn.

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



8. We are not releasing this figure to the press and we urge you, insofar as possible, to avoid ~~xxx~~ releasing totals raised.

NEW YORK, JUNE 12, PUBLIC RELATIONS GUIDANCE NO. 1

TO ALL EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS, PUBLICITY DIRECTORS AND OTHERS PUBLICIZING THE ISRAEL EMERGENCY FUND THROUGH THE PRESS, TV, DIRECT MAIL AND OTHER PUBLIC MEDIA:

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY AND DO YOUR BEST TO OBSERVE BOTH THE LETTER AND THE SPIRIT OF THE FOLLOWING PUBLIC RELATIONS GUIDE LINES:

1. The ending of actual fighting in the Middle East has not brought an end to the need to meet great humanitarian welfare and relief responsibilities through the Israel Emergency Fund.

If anything, these needs have been greatly increased. The shelling of Jewish Jerusalem's new immigrant quarters, the air raids on communities in which UJA supported installations were located, the disruption of production in immigrant farm villages and the dislocation and interruption of welfare services in behalf of unabsorbed immigrants, aged persons, young people, and others, have undoubtedly added many new needs to already existing ones. A full account of these greatly enlarged human requirements should be available in the near future, as communications are restored and reports are received.

2. Meanwhile, it is most important that the Israel Emergency Fund drive be pressed forward without let up. You have all contributed magnificently to the most remarkable fund raising achievement in American history. More was raised in a week for UJA than in last year's entire campaign. But the great force which you hoped to set in motion must not be permitted to come to a halt -- contributors must be asked to understand that the emergency needs will be with us for some time. Those who have not given yet must be asked to give.

3. At the same time you must also recognize that the ending of hostilities makes it mandatory that you be more careful than ever about the manner in which the aims and accomplishments of your local Jewish community and your emergency fund efforts are publicised.

A week ago -- the majority sympathy in your community -- among all Americans -- was on the side of Israel.

Now, the complex process of securing the peace -- of explaining the issues involved -- may result in a flagging of such support. And it will certainly be the aim of Israel's enemies, and anti-Semitic forces in America, to bring this about -- through massive propaganda efforts which they have already mounted.

4. Therefore the following guidance is recommended:

- A. Continue to emphasize and make clear that funds collected in the Israel Emergency Fund are for humanitarian aid to newcomers brought to Israel over the years. They are not for aid to "Israel" or the "Israel Government" or even the people of Israel. They are for aid to "people in Israel." -- some 500,000 immigrants in need whom we helped to bring there over the years."
- B. Avoid references which link Israel's military or political actions with the aims of the emergency fund. Do not say "the emergency funds are needed to free government funds for defense." Do say "America's Jews helped Israel's people give haven to a million and a half immigrants who sought freedom there since 1948. Formerly, Israel's people paid two-thirds of the costs of providing humanitarian aid to nearly 500,000 of these newcomers who needed it. Now Americans have had to take over the entire financial burden of maintaining the welfare programs on which there half million immigrants are still dependent -- especially the aid programs for young, aged, ill,

handicapped and unabsorbed newcomers."

- C. As much as possible avoid giving totals raised by your emergency funds to the press, or TV and Radio. Do, however, stress the fact that your community emergency fund has had the support of Americans of all faiths. Without giving names unless these are cleared, do give examples of this support to the press.

- D. Avoid a comment, and the reporting of statements by leaders -- Jewish and non-Jewish -- on political problems: Arab refugees, boundaries, etc. These do not belong in stories on the progress of your Emergency Fund. Do however, make the point that humanitarian aid -- of whatever kind -- can help to secure the peace -- and that the object of your emergency funds effort is to help build a peace through meeting human need.

Further guidance will be issued as seems advisable.


Dear Eddie,





FAREWELL MESSAGE TO AMERICAN JEWISH COMMUNITY BY LOUIS A. PINCUS,
CHAIRMAN OF JEWISH AGENCY FOR ISRAEL:

"ON THE DAY OF MY DEPARTURE FOR HOME AFTER 14 MEMORABLE DAYS IN THIS COUNTRY, I WISH TO GIVE YOU MY WARMEST AND DEEPEST THANKS FOR THE INCREDIBLE MANNER IN WHICH YOU HAVE RESPONDED TO THE CALL OF ISRAEL'S NEEDS.

"OUR PRIDE AND GRATITUDE AT THE OUTCOME OF THE WAR SHOULD NOT OBSCURE THE FACT THAT ISRAEL STILL FACES A GRIM POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC STRUGGLE. FORCES HOSTILE TO ISRAEL WILL STRIVE BOTH DEVIOSLY AND DIRECTLY TO UNDERMINE ISRAEL'S POSITION. DURING THIS PERIOD WE WILL NOT BE ABLE TO DEMOBILIZE AND WILL HAVE TO STRAIN EVERY EFFORT TO MEET THE CHALLENGE, AND ENSURE WHAT WE GAINED ON THE BATTLEFIELD WILL NOT BE LOST AT THE CONFERENCE TABLE.

"I HAVE NO DOUBT THAT ISRAEL WILL SHOW THE SAME FORTITUDE AND DETERMINATION IN THIS PERIOD THAT SHE DISPLAYED IN THE DEFENSE OF HER LAND AND PEOPLE. THIS SHE WILL DO WHILE TURNING IMMEDIATELY TO THE TASK OF RECONSTRUCTION - A TASK WHICH CANNOT WAIT UPON THE CONCLUSION OF A STABLE PEACE. THE RAZED SETTLEMENTS IN GALILEE MUST BE REBUILT; THE SHELLED HOUSES OF JERUSALEM MUST BE MADE LIVABLE; THE INJURED MUST BE HEALED AND THE WAR-SHATTERED ECONOMY RESTORED. A HUGE PORTION OF THIS BURDEN MUST OF NECESSITY FALL ON THE GOVERNMENT OF ISRAEL AND ITS CITIZENS. THEY HAVE PAID THE PRICE OF WAR WITH THE BLOOD OF THEIR SONS; THEY WILL CONTINUE TO PAY IT NOW WITH EVEN GREATER TAXES AND LOANS.

"IN THIS STRUGGLE THE SUPPORT OF AMERICAN JEWRY CAN BE DECISIVE. IN THE HEALING OF WOUNDS OF WAR, IN THE RESTORATION OF HOMES, FIELDS AND FACTORIES, IN THE CONTINUED CARE FOR NEWCOMERS, WHOSE ABSORPTION AND INTEGRATION INTO THE COUNTRY WAS CRUELLY INTERRUPTED BY THE OUTBREAK OF WAR, THE AID OF AMERICAN JEWRY IS URGENTLY NEEDED. 

FRIEDMAN RECEIVED FOLLOWING MESSAGE FROM ECONOMIC MINISTER REGARDING RECENT NEWSPAPER SOURCES CONCERNING THE ECONOMY IN ISRAEL

"I HAVE REQUESTED CLEARANCE FROM THE MINISTER OF FINANCE IN JERUSALEM IN REPLY TO YOUR QUESTIONS AND ADDITIONALLY QUESTIONS THAT HAVE COME TO THE FORE, PARTICULARLY IN RESPECT TO VARIOUS ARTICLES THAT HAVE APPEARED IN MANY NEWSPAPERS AND ESPECIALLY THOSE IN THE LOS ANGELES TIMES AND THE WALL STREET JOURNAL ON THE EFFECTS OF THE WAR UPON THE ECONOMY OF ISRAEL.

THE MINISTER HAS INSTRUCTED ME TO INFORM YOU THAT THE REPORTS CIRCULATED IN RESPECT TO THE DAMAGE DONE TO THE ISRAELI ECONOMY IN THE PAST WEEKS ARE NEITHER CORRECT NOR ARE THEY BASED ON FACTS.

THE DIRECT DAMAGE AND THE INDIRECT EFFECTS OF THE WAR ARE: A COMPLETE LOSS OF TOURISM, REDUCTION OF EXPORTS, A STOPPAGE OF NECESSARY SERVICES FOR THE POPULATION, A MARKED DECREASE IN PRODUCTION AND ESPECIALLY THE CASUALTIES SUSTAINED BY MANY WORKERS WHO ARE OUR RESERVE SOLDIERS--THE ACCUMULATED LOSS AMOUNTING TO MANY HUNDREDS OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS.

A SPECIAL COMMITTEE OF ECONOMISTS AND VARIOUS EXPERTS HAVE BEEN APPOINTED BY THE MINISTER OF FINANCE IN ORDER TO DETERMINE THE EXTENT OF THE DAMAGE AND TO DEVELOP EMERGENCY PROGRAMS. THE COMMITTEE WILL STUDY HOW TO COUNTERACT THE EFFECTS IN PARTICULAR OF THE DESTRUCTION OF JERUSALEM, TO THE SETTLEMENTS ON THE BORDERS AND IN OTHER AREAS AND THE IMPLEMENTATION OF VARIOUS NECESSARY SERVICES SUCH AS SOCIAL, MEDICAL, PUBLIC, ETC. AS SOON AS WE WILL HAVE THE FINDINGS BASED ON THESE STUDIES, I SHALL NOT FAIL TO ADVISE YOU AND YOUR COLLEAGUES.

IT MUST ALSO BE UNDERSTOOD THAT IN RESPECT TO THE FOREIGN CURRENCY RESERVES, A FINAL ACCOUNTING CANNOT BE MADE AS YET, AND ONLY IN THE COMING WEEKS AND MONTHS WILL WE BE ABLE TO ESTABLISH A TOTAL PICTURE.

IT IS CORRECT THAT WE ATTEMPTED TO MAINTAIN INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION IN ESSENTIAL INDUSTRIES, HOWEVER, THIS WAS NOT DONE WITH COMPLETE NORMAL PRODUCTIVITY. THE WORK FORCE WAS MADE UP, IN THE MAIN, OF WOMEN, OLD PEOPLE, AND THE YOUTH, AND THERE STILL REMAIN DELAYS AND DIFFICULTIES IN ALMOST EVERY BRANCH OF INDUSTRY.

NOTWITHSTANDING OUR FERVENT WISH TO BE PARTNERS TO THE OPTIMISTIC CONCLUSIONS DRAWN BY OTHERS, WE CANNOT AGREE. WE ARE CERTAIN THAT IN THE NEAR FUTURE WE SHALL BE ABLE TO SUPPLY OUR FRIENDS WITH THE PARTICULARS OF THE DAMAGE WHICH HAS BEEN OCCASIONED AND THE EXTRA-ORDINARY PROBLEMS WHICH STAND BEFORE THE STATE OF ISRAEL. GINSBERG SAID: "UNFORGETTABLE UNBELIEVABLE EXPERIENCE TO BE ABLE TRAVEL TEN MILES INSIDE FORMER SYRIAN MOUNTAINOUS BORDER AND SEE RUSSIAN-BUILT FORTIFICATIONS, CONCRETE PILL BOXES AND ARTILLERY POSITIONS FROM WHICH SYRIANS BOMBARDED PEACEFUL ISRAELI KIBBUTZIM DOWN BELOW. WE VISITED SOME OF KIBBUTZIM AND SAW HEARTBREAKING DAMAGE TO SCORES OF HOUSES, FARM BUILDINGS AND AGRICULTURAL EQUIPMENT. MARVELED AT HEROISM OF KIBBUTZ MEN, WOMEN AND CHILDREN WHO STUCK TO THEIR LAND DESPITE MONTHS AND YEARS OF SHELLING AND TODAY CAN SLEEP IN QUIET, SECURITY AND PEACE OF MIND. FLEW OVER SINAI DESERT TO SHARM EL SHEIK AND GAFGION AND SAW MONUMENTAL WRECKAGE OF RUSSIAN-MADE TANKS, GUNS AND OTHER WAR MATERIEL AIMED AT TOTAL DESTRUCTION OF ISRAEL. WE STOOD AT STRAITS OF TIRAN WHERE ISRAEL SHIPPING PASSES UNHINDERED TO EILAT."

MRS. JONES SAID: "WE FULFILLED THE PRAYERS AND DREAMS OF OUR FORE-FATHERS BY STANDING BEFORE THE WALL OF THE ANCIENT TEMPLE OF SOLOMON IN THE OLD CITY OF JERUSALEM, DROVE THROUGH JERUSALEM TO THE BIBLICAL CITIES OF PALESTINE, STOOD BEFORE RACHEL'S TOMB IN BETHLEHEM."

BELL SAID: "WE SAW THE GRIM WRECKAGE OF WARFARE, BURNED OUT TANKS, TRUCKS AND GUNS, REMINDER OF THE PRICE IN BLOOD PAID FOR LIFTING ARAB THREAT TO EXTERMINATE ISRAEL AND ITS PEOPLE. THERE IS UNTOLD COST FOR MAINTAINING PEACE AND ORDER, RESTORING ESSENTIAL SERVICES TO THE NEW AREAS, AND HEALING THE WOUNDS OF WAR FOR ALL WHO ARE INVOLVED."

UJA DELEGATION FINDS SHARPLY INCREASED HUMANITARIAN NEEDS IN ISRAEL..

NEW YORK, N.Y. JUNE 20--IN THE FIRST EYEWITNESS ACCOUNT OF CONDITIONS IN ISRAEL SINCE THE CEASE-FIRE, A UNITED JEWISH APPEAL DELEGATION OF THREE TOP LEADERS TOLD A NATIONWIDE AUDIENCE ON A RECORD TELEPHONE HOOKUP TODAY THAT THE NEEDS OF UJA'S IMMIGRANT AID, RELIEF AND WELFARE PROGRAMS IN ISRAEL HAVE BEEN SHARPLY INCREASED BY WAR DAMAGE AND BY AN ECONOMIC DISLOCATION WHICH WILL CONTINUE FOR SOME TIME TO COME.

THE COST OF MAINTAINING THESE HUMANITARIAN PROGRAMS IN THE FORESEEABLE FUTURE IS PRESENTLY UNASCERTAINABLE, THE DELEGATION REPORTED TO SOME 500 COMMUNITIES FROM COAST TO COAST, BUT IS CERTAIN TO BE IN THE HUNDREDS OF MILLIONS. THE AMERICAN JEWISH COMMUNITY MUST PROVIDE THE BULK OF THE FUNDS NEEDED, THEY DECLARED, THROUGH A CONTINUED HEAVY RESPONSE TO THE ISRAEL EMERGENCY FUND OF THE UNITED JEWISH APPEAL.

THE DELEGATION, CONSISTING OF UJA ASSOCIATE GENERAL CHAIRMAN EDWARD GINSBERG OF CLEVELAND, WOMEN'S DIVISION CHAIRMAN, MRS. HARRY L. JONES OF DETROIT AND YOUNG LEADERSHIP CABINET CHAIRMAN LEONARD D. BELL OF LEWISTON, ME., RETURNED LATE MONDAY FROM FOUR DAYS OF INTENSIVE STUDY IN ISRAEL. IN ADDITION TO KEY BATTLE POINTS OF THE RECENT WAR, THEY VISITED MANY TOWNS, VILLAGES AND SETTLEMENTS AND SAW EVIDENCE OF SEVERE DAMAGE AND DISRUPTION DIRECTLY AFFECTING THE LIVES OF IMMIGRANTS WHO HAD BEEN BROUGHT TO ISRAEL BY UJA FOR RESETTLEMENT.

POINTING OUT THAT MOBILIZATION WILL HAVE TO CONTINUE THROUGH A LONG AND UNCERTAIN PERIOD OF PEACE NEGOTIATIONS, MR. GINSBERG DECLARED: "THE PRICE OF PEACE MAY BE MORE COSTLY THAN THE PRICE OF VICTORY. THE SEVERE DISLOCATION TO ISRAEL'S ECONOMY, THE LOSS OF TOURISM ALREADY INCURRED, THE LOSS OF INDUSTRIAL AND AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTIVITY, THE COST OF REBUILDING AND REPAIRING PHYSICAL DAMAGE CAUSED BY WAR, OF CONSTRUCTING NEW IMMIGRANT HOUSES TO REPLACE THOSE DESTROYED, OF REBUILDING AGRICULTURAL SETTLEMENTS, AND THE LOSS OF CROPS BURNED IN THE FIELD. . CREATE AN ECONOMIC BURDEN OF IMPOSSIBLE DIMENSIONS FOR ISRAEL'S PEOPLE.

"THEREFORE THEY TURN TO ALL JEWRY, ESPECIALLY THE AMERICAN JEWISH COMMUNITY, TO TAKE OVER COMPLETELY THOSE FUNCTIONS AND PROGRAMS FOR WHICH THE UJA HAS ALWAYS BEEN RESPONSIBLE."

THE FIVE GREATEST AREAS OF NEED, HE SAID WERE HOUSING, ABSORPTION, AID TO AGRICULTURAL SETTLEMENTS, HEALTH SERVICES AND EDUCATION. IN ADDITION TO REBUILDING AND REPAIRING IMMIGRANT HOUSING, NEW QUARTERS WILL BE NEEDED FOR AN INCREASED NUMBER OF IMMIGRANTS EXPECTED TO ARRIVE FROM VARIOUS COUNTRIES. COMBATING UNEMPLOYMENT CAUSED BY ECONOMIC DISLOCATION WILL BE A MAJOR ABSORPTION TASK. LOSSES SUSTAINED BY THE AGRICULTURAL SETTLEMENTS - IN BUILDINGS, LIVESTOCK AND EQUIPMENT AS WELL AS LOST CROPS - WILL HAVE TO BE MADE UP. CARE OF WAR VICTIMS, THE NEWLY ORPHANED AND THE AGED WHO NOW HAVE NOBODY TO SUPPORT THEM WILL SWELL THE HEALTH SERVICE NEED. INTENSIFICATION OF AID TO IMMIGRANT EDUCATION, FROM PRE-KINDERGARTEN THROUGH HIGH SCHOOL, HAS BECOME MORE ESSENTIAL THAN EVER.

ALL THREE LEADERS DESCRIBED EVIDENCE OF SEVERE SHELL DAMAGE IN JERUSALEM AND IN THE SYRIAN BORDER VILLAGES. MRS. JONES, NOTING THE COURAGE OF A CIVILIAN POPULATION UNDER FIRE CONSISTING MAINLY OF WOMEN AND CHILDREN, REPORTED THAT WOMEN'S VOLUNTEER SERVICES WERE CRUCIAL IN MAINTAINING ORDER AND MORALE.

You have requested our opinion as to the effect, if any, for Federal income tax purposes, of the solicitation of funds for the so-called Israel Emergency Fund (the Emergency Fund) of the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. (UJA) on the tax-exempt status of UJA and United Israel Appeal, Inc. (UIA) and on the deductibility of contributions to the Emergency Fund.

It is understood that the Emergency Fund is not an independent organization but is merely a term used to designate a special fund-raising effort on the part of UJA, the purpose of which is to raise additional monies to enable UJA and UIA to meet the urgent need for the enlargement of their existing charitable programs due to the present emergency in Israel. The Emergency Fund is to be used for the same humanitarian causes for which UJA customarily conducts its fund-raising campaigns and which furnished the basis for the tax-exempt status heretofore accorded UJA and UIA. The customary procedures for the distribution of such funds will also be followed. The increased need for funds arising out of the present emergency in Israel is accentuated by the fact that the government of Israel, because of the military crisis affecting that country, has withdrawn the financial support which it had previously given to resettlement and rehabilitation programs in behalf of immigrants to Israel.

UJA is strictly a fund-raising organization which distributes its receipts among a number of other tax-exempt charitable organizations, the principal beneficiary of which is UIA. UIA in turn carries on its charitable activities in Israel through an operating agent, The Jewish Agency for Israel in Jerusalem (the Agency), an Israeli legal entity, to which it transmits funds for specific, previously approved projects. UIA receives each year from the Agency a proposed budget of needs for carrying on its activities in the field of

financing refugee immigration to Israel and the relief, rehabilitation and resettlement of immigrants to that country. The Agency also receives and administers funds derived from charitable donations made in other countries, all of which are expended in connection with refugee resettlement work in Israel as a unified operation.

We are advised that upon receipt of the Agency's proposed budget, the Board of Directors of UIA, after examining the same and after receiving reports from its own staff and from its representative in Israel, decides (a) on the particular proposed programs in which UIA will participate and (b) on the amount to be allocated to each such program. Thus UIA exercises complete supervision and control over the expenditure in Israel of the funds raised by UJA and by it turned over to UIA for distribution through the Agency. No part of the funds previously dispensed by UIA have been, and it is understood that no part of the Emergency Fund will be, used for any projects other than the humanitarian purposes upon which UJA's and UIA's tax exemptions are based.



In response to numerous inquiries concerning articles which have recently appeared in the Wall Street Journal and other newspapers, Mr. Nachum Shamir, Economics Minister of the State of Israel in New York, has sent the following cable in an effort to clarify the current economic situation in Israel:







Dear Friend:

Baruchim Habaim - Shalom Yehudim - "Blessed be those who come" - "Greetings Jews". These words were said to us as we approached the Wailing Wall in the Old City of Jerusalem, two days ago. We, too, had come home. All Jewry had come home after 2000 years.

Today the most important concern of Israel is Shalom - Peace. The peace they have sought for 20 years - the peace that has evaded their grasp.

You walk the streets of Israel. There are no joyous celebrations, no mass demonstrations of victory, of glorious conquest. Just a quiet, somber seriousness. Look into the faces of the people of Israel - look into their eyes. You see a sense of relief, a sense of gratitude that they have won a military victory, but you feel their deep over-riding concern lest they lose the most precious of all - the peace - the peace they were willing to die for and did die for; the peace which would give them their right to exist as a free people.

There was one mass demonstration - the day after Jerusalem was liberated - a spontaneous march to the Wailing Wall by 200,000 Jews who wanted to give their thanks to God. They had come home. They had come home but at what great cost and what high price, both in terms of the loss of lives and physical damage and economic hardship.

Israel lost many hundreds of her best youth and leaders; many hundreds killed in addition to the thousands of military and civilian wounded. Their losses would correspond to approximately 90,000 men in the United States killed in less than one week's time.

In the three days we were there, we talked with many people - civilians, military, government - the Prime Minister, the Minister of Defense, the Chief of Staff, the Finance Minister, the Chairman of the Jewish Agency and others. We saw the damage inflicted to the border settlements and to Jerusalem. I travelled north to Kuneitra in Syria, south to Sharm El Sheik guarding the Gulf of Aqaba, to Bir Gifgafa deep in the Sinai near the Suez Canal, to El Arish along the Mediterranean. For me, and I'm sure for all of us, it was an awakening - a sudden and full realization that this tiny, badgered people, literally the little David, took on Goliaths and slew them and broke the yoke.

I stood at Kuneitra after driving through 14 miles of the Syrian "Maginot Line", built by Russian technicians. It made the so-called French impregnable barrier look like papier-mâché - miles and miles of pill boxes, gun emplacements, tank traps, concrete fortifications - 5 stories deep. All this existed on Israel's northern border above Dan, Gadot, Tel Katzir and other settlements, and her people lived in these border settlements for 19 years, looking into the mouths of the Syrian guns. I had no idea - no conception - I'm sure neither did you - what these people lived through - what guts and determination - what loyalty - devotion - love of country to subject their kids and families to this kind of existence. But they never budged. They fought off the Syrian attacks with machine guns and mortars in hand to hand combat. Help came from surrounding moshavim until the army could get

there. The Israeli army attacked - going through mine fields - tank to tank battles, suffering untold losses at great sacrifice to break through the initial defense - to get to the tops of the hills - they had to be cleared - and then through 14 miles of hell to Kuneitra. Then came the cease fire. Talk to the people and hear them say: "Never again. Tonight my children slept in their own beds, in their own rooms and not in shelters 15 feet underground for the first time in 19 years. Never again."

We met with General Rabin, the Chief of Staff, who reviewed the military campaign for us. The most significant thing he said was: "Israel went it alone - no country, no friends except one ally. The greatest ally she had was the American Jew". All over Israel I heard this. Mr. Sapir and Mr. Pincus reported to the people of Israel the truly magnificent response of American Jewry and of World Jewry. Everywhere we went - when we talked to people on the street - we heard the same response: "We know what the Jews of America are doing to help us - without you we couldn't have done it - without your help we won't be able to go it alone - we are going to need you more than ever before."

My friends, the price of peace may be more costly than the price of victory. Israel cannot demobilize. She has to keep large concentrations of troops in these areas until peace has been assured. This may take months - she will not retreat - she will not give up short of peace because three wars in 19 years is enough.

This war has cost her hundreds of millions of dollars, and she must keep her army mobilized and ready. Israel must stay strong. This will require vast sums but it will be done. She can't drop her guard.

The severe dislocation to her economy, the loss of tourism already incurred, the loss of productivity - industrial and agricultural, the re-building and repairing the physical damage caused by the war, the building of new housing to replace that destroyed, the rebuilding of agricultural settlements, the loss of crops burned in the fields, make her economic burden almost impossible.

Therefore, she turns to all Jewry, and especially to us - the American Jewish community, and says - find the means to help us - to take over completely those functions and programs for which you have always been responsible. And what are they?

1. Housing - to rebuild and repair the war damage; to provide housing for new immigrants. We can expect larger immigration from Arab Moslem countries. As we left Lydda Airport, a plane load of 120 Jews arrived from Aden with only the clothes on their backs, their homes, synagogues, and shops burned and destroyed. Many of them were injured by Arab rioters and they were forced to leave behind their dead.
2. Absorption - Included are relief payments to immigrants, payment of rent subsidies and assistance to the unemployed. Regardless of what you read, there is and will be severe unemployment due to the economic dislocation already caused by the war and by the continued mobilization. We will have to spend money to combat unemployment for these people we brought to Israel. You can't expect a man to risk his life - ready to die for his country - and come back to idleness.
3. Agricultural Settlement - We shall have to rebuild the agricultural settlements which suffered great losses, replace their buildings, their livestock, their equipment and continue to assist those which weren't yet viable among the 480 settlements. In addition, we will have to provide the funds for new settlements.

4. Health Services -

- A. The care of the orphaned - the Youth Aliyah program is already being expanded.
- B. Care of the handicapped and rehabilitation of the handicapped who are war victims - among the new immigrants.
- C. The additional burden of care for the aged. It is estimated many additional beds will be needed in JDC-Malben homes to care for the elderly whose sons are no longer here to support them.

5. Educational Programs - The continued implementation and expansion of education for the children - pre-kindergarten - vocational training - and secondary education.


The comment was made that the main difference between the Jewish soldier and the Arab soldier was education. The Jews were educated, disciplined, trained, responsive - this was the great difference. The Arab tanks had heavier armor, heavier caliber guns. The MIG 21's were as good as Mirages. The difference was the human element in the individuals flying the planes, manning the tanks and shooting the guns. The enemy was superior in numbers, armor, artillery, planes - but inferior in human quality and devotion. Israel's strength is her people and they must continue to be an educated people.

But what does all of this cost? I am not being facetious when I tell you that as of the moment, no one in Israel knows. I can tell you that based upon preliminary budgets made at the end of May with mobilization, but before the war, it ran into the hundreds of millions - almost one-half billion dollars. What it will now cost, you can well imagine - staggering sums. There can be no cease-fire on humanitarian needs. Our work must go on.

Friends, I can only tell you one thing - the people of Israel believe this is the beginning of a new era for Israel and the Jewish people. Very few feared it was going to be the end - extinction after only 19 years. Almost everyone knew Israel would win. They had to win. They had no alternative. I say to you it is our moment - we have no choice, no alternative. It is also the beginning of a new era for us. Hopefully it will be an era of peace, when the law shall once more go forth from Jerusalem.

Together they and we - we and they - shall write the glorious chapter of Jewish history and life that lies before us. I am sure that we - you and I - shall give of our hearts and our love to these brave and determined people. Frankly what is so sorely needed is that we give of our substance and of our wealth beyond all previous dimensions or scope. If you have not already made your contribution to the Israel Emergency Fund of the UJA, please do it now. If you have already contributed, please try to increase it. One day the day will come - no matter when - no matter how long away - the day will come when we can say with pride that our help, our giving, our love and understanding played a vital role in the survival and rebirth of the Jewish people.

A FABRIC OF FULFILLMENT

June 20, 1967

Dear Friend:

I have thought of you many times these last days and wished you could have been with me in Israel. Five days after the cease fire, I was privileged to see first hand the miracle that Israel had wrought with her own hands, her daring courage, her inspired morale, and her brilliant military leadership.

In my wildest dreams I never could have imagined being in Syria or in Sharm El Sheikh, whose guns dominate the Strait of Tiran, or flying over the Sinai Peninsula, and seeing the devastation and the billions of dollars of Russian tanks and military equipment lying abandoned.

One morning we entered old Jerusalem through the Mandelbaum Gate and visited the Wailing Wall, where over 2000 years ago, according to legend, angels descended and cried. It was a thrill to visit Rachel's tomb in Bethlehem and the tombs of the Patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob in Hebron.

Jerusalem had over 20,000 holes and hits by shells. Windows were broken, plaster walls crumbled, and homes damaged. The Room of Remembrance in the Jewish Agency, just a few feet from Louis Pincus' office, was completely destroyed by a huge explosive shell. Families lived in shelters in basements for three days and three nights. The women drove buses and ambulances, entertained children in shelters, helped the sick and old, and were cooks and nurses. The story is going around in Israel that it is a good thing the war was of short duration, for in another week the women would have killed the men with all the cakes they baked.

Girls in the army serve from eighteen till twenty years of age and are in the reserve till thirty-five, if they do not have children. In hospitals, in communication areas, as secretaries, and on duty as aides in military camps deep in the desert and in dangerous border areas, the women's army corps serves with the greatest of distinction.

In small towns, teams of boy scouts helped women, whose men were gone, to bring in the crops, build air raid shelters, and act as mailmen, milkmen, or wherever they were needed.

I shall never forget the slit trenches in the settlements that connected one house with the other. These ran into deep air raid shelters many feet underground, equipped with little cribs, play pens and food, where the children spent six days and nights as Syrian shells rained over them.

Every person we met had a special story to tell, and a pride that the morale on the home front was so high. On the war front, General Rabin said: "The command and the soldiers decided the fate of the battle, not the planes and the tanks." The spirit of the boys in the hospitals was unbelievable, for it was the amputee and the boy who lost his sight, and others who were seriously wounded, who cheered the others on and made light of their wounds to their families and friends.

Yes, the war is over and war brings many losses of dear ones. One mother lost two sons, another three. There was no rejoicing in the streets for the cost of war was high and everyone seemed to know everybody, especially those who were missing.

I was proud to tell Israelis of the reactions of our women in the United States, and the dignity and the stature that we gained because of their courage and achievement. I also told them in how many American communities women were giving "plus" gifts to the Israel Emergency Fund. But the more, I saw, and the more I heard, the more I realized that the part we have played in this country is small in comparison to the many sacrifices the women of Israel have made and will continue to make.

The needs are still so great in the absorption towns, for education, health services for the sick, the old, the retarded and the disturbed. Agricultural settlements that were in the line of fire need to be rebuilt and re-equipped. And, of course, wars leave many social and rehabilitation problems.


I think that all of us must re-examine the part we have played and the magnitude of the opportunity to help not only our brethren, but more important, ourselves. Such a chance comes once in a lifetime and we can't afford to miss it.

Dear Friend:

I have just returned from a trip to Israel with Edward Ginsberg, Associate General Chairman, and Mrs. Harry Jones, Women's Division Chairman. We did not go to celebrate a victory. We went to see the problems, to assess the needs, and to determine the dimensions of our responsibility.

This trip proved beyond any doubt that we are partners -- the Jewish communities of Israel and America -- and the events of the past few weeks renewed the agreement -- especially for our generation. Our financial response to the Israel Emergency Fund served as our signature to this partnership. Without us they stand exposed -- badly exposed.

We fought the fundraising battles via phone and in airconditioned offices, or in plush hotel dining rooms.

They fought their war going up the rocky hills in Syria -- through the hot deserts of Sinai -- down the narrow streets of the old city of Jerusalem.

We signed our checks with pen and ink. They signed theirs too -- but in a different way. Paratroops were given the task of taking the old city of Jerusalem and did it fighting house to house. And after the battle, they hastily put together a small but memorable monument to their fallen -- and they signed it with the blood of their wounded and dead.

All of us can relate easily to this army.

This army -- of civilians --

of doctors, professionals, young executives, students, bus drivers, clerks, laborers and 18 year olds -- with no two uniforms looking alike.

This army --

that travels in mobilized civilian vehicles, sight-seeing buses, milk trucks and taxicabs.

This army --

whose number of dead is many, many hundreds -- in less than a week -- made up primarily of officers -- highly educated young men. Because, in this army the officer's command is "Follow Me."

So, this then was the demand made upon them by their Emergency and even after the cease fire, the demands are still upon them -- mostly hidden from easy view --

For example --

Sunday night -- while we were meeting with the Chief of Staff -- armored cars from Syria violated the cease fire and fired on an Israeli unit at Kuneitra which we had visited on the previous day. The son of the waiter at the King David Hotel was knifed in the back in the old city of Jerusalem where he had gone as a volunteer to deliver milk to Arab children. Two Israeli soldiers died when their jeep ran over a mine near El Arish in the Gaza Strip, after hostilities had ceased.

You don't have to be an economist to know that the country and its people are hurting when the Hilton and King David Hotels are only one-third full in June -- and shops are closed because the owners are in Sinai or Jericho or Gaza.

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This must all be rebuilt.

All of the people we met with, from the Prime Minister in Jerusalem to the Secretary of Kibbutz Dan, said to us: -- "we can all be proud but we have to start to rebuild from today."

Israel is still licking her wounds -- every day revealing new wounds to lick.


So, in speaking to my generation -- the new Young Leaders of America -- we must address ourselves to studying Israel's problems and knowing them well -- in order to be able to interpret them to the American Jewish community, as well as Americans of all faiths. For now that the dust of war starts to settle, the economic and diplomatic pressures are starting and will be most difficult -- indeed.

From our generation must come the messengers that will help Israel tell her story and help raise the funds to carry out the programs which are our American responsibility.

In a tent in the Hills of Galilee, among the Syrian fortifications, General Peled, the Commander of this region, told us his troops moved across militarily unconquerable positions because "they had no other choice."

I know I speak for all Young Leaders when I say that we too have no other choice -- and want no other choice -- but to give to and work for the Israel Emergency Fund. I ask that you give in the proper dimension -- and then make certain that all your friends do the same.



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

We are, of course, very appreciative of the effort you are making on behalf of the Israel Emergency Fund of the United Jewish Appeal and of the thoughtfulness and generosity that prompted it.

At the same time, in order to avoid any possible misunderstanding of our position in this matter, we would appreciate your acknowledgment of the fact that this advertisement was published without our consent or approval.

As Mr. Goldwater and Mr. Goodell explained to your representatives in conversations with them prior to the appearance of the advertisement, the United Jewish Appeal had decided after careful consideration of your proposal, that it could not and would not endorse or sponsor the making of either the record or the publication of an advertisement concerning them.

We are concerned that despite this and despite the fact that we did not know that the advertisement would be published that the inference may nevertheless be made that we did endorse or sponsor the making of the record or gave our consent and approval to the publication of the advertisement.

May we ask you to also be good enough to obtain for us the acknowledgment of this concern that UJA was not requested to nor did it give its authorization for or approval of the publication of that advertisement.

However, it was our understanding that advertisements regarding our intent to donate proceeds from the sale of these albums to the Israel Emergency Fund of the United Jewish Appeal would not require the approval of the United Jewish Appeal since such an advertisement would not constitute an endorsement or sponsorship of the records simply because of the donative intent expressed.

With respect to your request for letters from Liberty Music Shop and Sam Goody, Inc. confirming that they did not request or receive specific authorization or approval for the advertisements in question, I suggest that you communicate directly with these dealers.

You will probably remember us from your Congregation at Temple Emanuel in Milwaukee. Since retiring several years ago - we moved to Tucson - where the climate is more agreeable for us.

He claims to have been told that in Mexico City alone some organization connected with the U. J. A. collected in cash with no receipts issued approximately 4 million pesos. 

5. I have no scientific way to estimate the total amount of cash that will be collected on the IEF. All I can do is make an educated guess. At the present moment, we have collected \$108,400,442. New York City has an amount of \$18,700,000 in collections which are not yet analyzed but which have already been paid to UIA. Discussions with Ingram Bender and Eli Schwartz indicate that this sum will result in approximately \$13,000,000 for the Emergency Fund. In view of the above, based on a total raised figure of \$175,000,000, it is my feeling that by the end of the year our collections on the IEF will be between \$155,000,000 and \$160,000,000.

Dear Ted:

Please express to Mr. Frenkel my thanks for his cooperation in the picturesque interview held with me in Jerusalem on 13 July 1967. He certainly captured the flavor and sense of excitement which pervaded the Emergency Campaign in the United States.

There is, however, one major oversight in the article which I should like to bring to your and his attention, in the hope that some remedial action can be undertaken. I refer to the fact, which I tried to make in the interview, and perhaps failed to stress adequately, that the vast outpouring of support for the people of Israel came as a result of the tremendous unity which exists in the organized American Jewish community. While the UJA is the national instrument, it is obvious that the funds are raised in each and every individual community by the unbelievable zeal and dedication of the local Federations and Welfare Funds. Not enough can possibly be said to describe the harmony, cooperation and beautiful teamwork which existed between the national UJA, under the leadership of Max Fisher, and the national Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, under the leadership of Lou Fox. It was an inspiring period in American Jewish history.

At the height of the operation, lay and professional leaders, national and local, worked together with such smoothness, identity of interest, and lack of bureaucratic frictions, that this very fact, I am convinced, is one of the most important contributory factors to the success of the campaign.

I tried to express this opinion during the interview and am sorry that it did not come across forcefully enough.

The remedial action that I would like to suggest is an additional interview, which can be held during the next few days, with Mr. Max Fisher, Chairman of the UJA, who will be in Israel between August 8 - 10, together with members of the Delegation of the Council of Jewish Federa-



This letter is in reply to your letter to us of July 20, 1967 in which you request a report showing funds raised by us through our emergency campaign during the second quarter of 1967 and remitted to Israel in cash or in goods. You also request the same information for the third quarter of 1967 and a statement of our goals for similar collections and remittances during the third and fourth quarters of 1967.

The United Jewish Appeal, Inc. is organized and functions as a fund raising agency for the following charitable organizations, all of which are domestic charitable corporations: United Israel Appeal, Inc., The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, Inc., United Hias Service, and New York Association for New Americans. The funds raised by us are distributed among these organizations in various percentages determined by agreement between us and the beneficiary agencies. Such beneficiary agencies, in turn, expend the funds in the United States, Israel and elsewhere in accordance with their approved budgetary requirements. All of such beneficiary organizations, other than the New York Association for New Americans, remit some portion of the funds received from us, together with funds derived from other sources (e.g. bequests), for expenditure in Israel.

It is our understanding that the United Israel Appeal, Inc. and The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, Inc., which together receive in excess of 98% of the funds raised by us, have periodically, as and when requested by your department, furnished to you information in connection with remittance of cash outside of the United States.

In view of these facts, our specific response to your inquiry is that we do not directly remit cash or ship goods to Israel and suggest that you refer to reports of the United Israel Appeal, Inc. and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, Inc. submitted to your department for the information requested.

Dear Herb:

No one knows better than you the extent of the outpouring of interest and funds which followed upon the Israel crisis preceding, during and after the War. On the other hand, no one knows better than the Hillel Directors and Counselors of the similar response in the academic community on the part of both Jewish students and Jewish faculty. We have three thick file folders of reports from campuses of the many ways in which support of Israel was demonstrated: faculty members, some of whom had never before contributed to a Jewish cause, brought checks to Hillel Directors to be forwarded to the United Jewish Appeal; they volunteered to go to Israel as physicians, as technicians; Hillel faculty groups organized Israel emergency campaigns; and tens of thousands of students volunteered funds and themselves in Israel's behalf. Things moved so fast, and the spring semester came so quickly to an end, that we have been unable to render the above into statistical form, but we do know without any shadow of a doubt that there is a new spirit abroad on the campus in the emergence of which the Israel crisis served as a catalyst. Its overflow and implications can lead in the future to identification with Jewish life, the Jewish community, and the Jewish people by the erroneously-named "alienated Jewish intellectual" on the university campus.

In my opinion this phenomenon could not have happened simply as a product of Israel's crisis, but only as the fruit of years of what may have appeared to have been at times futile efforts to deepen in the academic community knowledge of and identification with Israel as a State and as a people.

I hope that you will agree with me and with my colleagues, when I say that one of the incontrovertibly major factors in preparing the groundwork for this phenomenon was the UJA-Hillel Speakers Program which over the years has brought scholars and distinguished figures from the State of Israel to lecture in university classes to Jewish students, Hillel faculty groups, and others, on issues of concern to Israel and the Jewish people. They were not here as fund-raisers, but as educators and cultural emissaries. And now I think we have before us a conclusive and gratifying justification of the philosophy of the program which you conceived and initiated and in which B'nai B'rith Hillel and UJA have been mutual partners. I am sure that many people must have asked whether the investment the United Jewish Appeal has been making in this program is a valid one; today we know without a shadow of a doubt that to call it valid is a grand understatement. It was an indispensable prerequisite to the reengagement of the university community with Israel and the Jewish people and the Jewish tradition, for the continuance and support of which the United Jewish Appeal so nobly functions.







Because of the prevailing emergency in Israel caused by the war and by the persistently critical economic conditions of the country, the need for free dollars is more urgent now than ever before. Mr. Louis Fincus, chairman of the Jewish Agency, joined me recently in requesting the USA and the CJFNF to continue the Emergency Fund. These two bodies, after serious discussions, have wholeheartedly passed the appropriate resolutions. The continuation of the Emergency Fund into 1968 is crucial, and the willingness of American Jewry once more to undertake a grand and historic response warms our hearts.

In recognition of the primacy of these free dollars so desperately required to meet life saving work, and in order to enable the Emergency Fund, which is starting now, to achieve maximum results, I respectfully request all organizations and friends who raise funds on behalf of Israel to limit their efforts, from this moment on, to their previous normal levels; to engage in no special campaigning; to refrain from using slogans and appeals which refer to the war; to hold no major dinner meetings and undertake no extensive advertising programs which would conflict with the Emergency Fund campaign.

I also urge these organizations not to call upon members of the Israel Cabinet or generals of the Israel army to address meetings from now on, because such separate appearances will affect the primacy of the Emergency Fund, which must have a clear image in the minds of all good Jews as the major channel for help to Israel at this time.

I am confident that every organization will fully and selflessly cooperate as it did during the fateful days of June, 1967. I am further confident that every organization in the

United States will do its utmost to support the continuing
Emergency Fund. The officers of the UJA will be in touch with
you immediately to indicate ways and means by which you can help.

All of us working together will see Israel through the
difficult days ahead, and I am convinced that the future months
will show us to be as united once more as we were in the great
days of June.





We are, therefore, writing to call to your attention a fact that may be pertinent to your inquiry, that to date all of the distributions of the funds raised through the emergency campaign have been made to the United Israel Appeal, Inc., one of the beneficiary agencies named in our letter of August 8th, and that as yet no distribution of such funds have been made to any of our other beneficiary agencies.

Dear Mr. Friedman:

I just read your heartwarming letter of August 29th, addressed to the president of my company, Mr. Kurt Weinhold. I am the senior Columbia officer on the West coast and booked the Israel Philharmonic in Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Denver. It was a great privilege to be associated with the orchestra and with your dedicated associates in respect to this project.

Virtually all of the United Jewish Appeal affiliates in this area gave us every possible cooperation. This was notably true in Seattle, where the Jewish Federation Council sold over \$20,000 of special sponsors tickets. We also received excellent cooperation from your groups in Portland and Denver.

I could not possibly overstate the extraordinary and imaginative help given us by the Jewish Federation Council of Greater Los Angeles. Mr. Carter, Mr. Sobeloff, and their staff, bent every effort to make the Los Angeles - Hollywood Bowl engagement the crashing success it turned out to be. Special praise must go to Mrs. Marjorie Pressman, who was chairman of the committee, and worked tirelessly, day and night, for weeks.

This brings me to the one sour apple in the barrel. I refer to San Francisco. Whenever possible, we like to deal on a technical level with our experienced, local, professional impressarios. Therefore, I asked Mr. John Kornfeld to present this concert and to donate his services free of charge. Mr. Kornfeld has presented almost all of our visiting foreign orchestras and other major attractions. He agreed

to take the Israel Philharmonic at no profit to himself, subject to his receiving cooperation from the Jewish community. Several days later, he told me he had been in touch with a Mr. Tregaboff, who had given him a very hard time on the telephone, questioning the validity of the tour, its association with the Israel Emergency Fund and most particularly, his own function as local presenter. I told him that I would be glad to come to San Francisco and sit down with Mr. Tregaboff and Mr. Kornfeld and explain to him the financial arrangements under which the tour was organized. I asked him to arrange for a meeting the next day in Mr. Kornfeld's office, with Mr. Tregaboff. I flew up from Los Angeles, arriving at Mr. Kornfeld's office at 3:00 P.M., only to be informed that Mr. Tregaboff declined to attend the meeting. I then called Mr. Tregaboff.

This was certainly a remarkable conversation. Mr. Tregaboff told me that he had no time to attend this kind of meeting and would in no event get involved with the project unless told to do so by yourself. He further told me he had tried to reach you, to no avail, and was not about to try again. He also stated that he would not enter into an agreement with Mr. Kornfeld without a full review of the propriety of the project by his attorneys.

I told him that the tour had your blessings and was under the patronage of Abba Eban and all of us were donating our services to the fund. I also told him that our company was guaranteeing the orchestra something under \$300,000 and that each local auspices, throughout the country, was in turn guaranteeing us something between \$10,000 and \$20,000, in order to spread the risk around. He rudely informed me that such a guarantee on his part was completely out of the question and that the guarantee, if any, would have to be met by Mr. Kornfeld. I explained to him that Mr. Kornfeld had no financial interest in the engagement and was merely donating his services and therefore he would certainly have no motive for putting up the guarantee. Mr. Tregaboff stated categorically that any guarantee was completely out of the question.

It was apparent to me at this point that it would be impossible to secure Mr. Tregaboff's cooperation on this project. I, therefore, asked him to hold the line while I discussed the situation with Mr. Kornfeld. I asked Mr. Kornfeld, if under the circumstances, he would be willing to guarantee \$10,000 himself and take the concert on a purely commercial basis. I offered him terms of 70% to the orchestra and 30% to himself, and pointed out that he could make a substantial profit from his share.

Although Mr. Kornfeld's motives were originally of a charitable nature, he agreed to take the concert as a personal money making venture, in view of the total lack of cooperation from Mr. Tregaboff.


Fortunately, other members of the Jewish Community did cooperate with Mr. Kornfeld, most notably, the Israel General Consul. The concert grossed nearly \$40,000 and Mr. Kornfeld's personal profit was considerable.

If Mr. Tregaboff would have been more cooperative, the results for the Israel Emergency Fund would have been much more substantial. Firstly, the fund would have received the profit which Mr. Kornfeld rightfully earned for himself. Secondly, with the help of the Jewish Community, we could have sold a number of tickets at \$50.00 as in Los Angeles, or \$25.00 as in Seattle, which would have brought somewhere between \$15,000 and \$40,000 in additional funds to the Israel Emergency Fund.

I am sorry that we had this unfortunate association with your San Francisco affiliate in what was otherwise a most stimulating and happy occasion.

MILITARY EPISODES

12 June to Present

- 18 June First cease fire violation - Syrians fire on Israelis at Kuneitra.
- 2 July Egypt attacks across Suez in company strength, followed by two mortar barrages. Egypt begins to install heavy ground-to-ground missile launching sites on west bank of canal.
- 4 July Egyptians shell Israeli positions at Suez. Syria fires on Israeli positions at Kuneitra.
- 8 July Egyptian tanks and artillery open fire on Israelis at Ras al Eish (east bank of Suez) and Kantara. MIG fighters cross canal and are shot down.
- 11 July Egyptian bombers fly over Israeli occupied positions in Sinai - one shot down, one driven away.
- 12 July Two Egyptian torpedo boats attack Israeli patrol cruising Sinai coast; both boats destroyed, eight Israelis injured.
- 15 July Algerian forces take part in Suez Canal fighting.
- 16 July Israelis shoot down five MIGS and one Sukoi 7 in air battle over southern end of Suez Canal. Israel loses one plane, seven killed, 22 wounded, two missing.
- 26 July Mortar and machinegun fire in Suez Canal area.
- 3 August Jordanian troops fire across Jordan River for third day in a row.
- 6 August Armed Egyptian soldiers patrol west bank of Canal in violation of agreement that neither side is to use Canal for one month.
- 6 August Arab infiltrators fire on automobile carrying Israelis near Efar Rupin in the Beisan Valley. Car was hit, but no injuries. Footprints found leading to and from Jordanian border.
- 23 August Jordanian forces exchange fire with Israeli patrol 12 miles north of the Damiyah Bridge across Jordan River. No Israeli casualties.

MILITARY EPISODES (con't.)

- 26 August Russian built Sukhoi 7 fighter bomber flown by Egyptian pilot shot down by Israeli anti-aircraft fire at Bir Gaggafa. A second Russian plane escaped.
- 4 September Battle flares up at Suez Canal: one Israeli killed; one wounded. Started with Egyptian artillery against Israeli vessels near eastern shore.
- 4 September Egyptians fire on Israelis in Port Tewfiq area and six miles south in Sinai; continue firing despite two separate UN cease-fire orders. UN officially places blame on Egyptians.
- 5 September Two Israelis wounded in flare up on west bank near Damiyah bridge as result of Jordanian small arms and mortar fire.
- 5 September Two members of El Fatah and one Israeli killed in clash inside Israel territory; two terrorists taken prisoner. Renewal of guerilla operations directed and inspired by Syria.
- 6 September Heavy damage done to Ismaeliya on west bank of Suez during artillery duel provoked by Egyptians.
- 7 September Twenty minute exchange of fire across Jordan River south of Allenby Bridge. Jordanians opened fire on Israeli patrol moving along west bank. No casualties reported.
- 10 September Mines explode under two Israeli tractors in fields of Kibbutz Sa'ad; two drivers injured, one seriously.
- 12 September One Israeli wounded in renewal of shooting across Suez from Egyptian positions on west bank. Clash started by Egyptian anti-aircraft fire on Israeli plane over Israel held Sinai.
- 13 September Israeli tractor driver wounded in Golan Heights when he detonated mine near Tewfiq as dismounting from tractor.

The 1968 Budgetary Requirements
of the
American Joint Distribution Committee

Mid 1967 presented the American Joint Distribution Committee and the world Jewish community with the most severe challenge in more than a decade and one that will substantially effect the JDC program and budget in 1968 and for some years to come.

The violent outbreak of war between Israel and its Arab neighbors in June of this year and the disturbing events in its wake mark yet another dramatic chapter in the struggle for Jewish survival. The uneasy peace following the six days of hostilities has brought new disasters and emergencies for Jews, including imprisonment, physical violence, property losses, economic boycotts, expulsion and flight. The crisis in Israel has had particularly serious repercussions in the Arab and Moslem countries, France and Italy. These events have added to the sizeable problems and burdens, ante-dating the war, which confront the JDC.

Over the years the traditional generosity of the American Jewish community and associate groups has permitted the JDC to carry out annually life-saving operations involving the care, maintenance and re-settlement of hundreds of thousands of unfortunate Jewish victims of war and persecution.

It is evident that the resources available in 1968 will fall short of meeting the needs of the many thousands of families currently dependent upon the JDC as well as the additional requests which will result from the uncertain political and economic climate in areas of JDC concern. JDC has therefore closely scrutinized anticipated requirements in terms of the most urgent priorities. On this basis, the minimum essential budget totals \$ 24, 551, 000 distributed as follows:

The bulk (approximately 80%) of the JDC funds will be spent, in almost equal amounts, in three major functional areas: Care of the Aged and Sick, principally for handicapped newcomers to Israel; General Relief Assistance, mostly cash grants but also feeding, clothing, etc. to indigent and handicapped families in Europe and North Africa including the many thousands who have fled Arab countries since June of this year; Education, Cultural and Religious Activities, mainly in support of secular, religious and vocational training programs for Jewish children in Moslem countries (for whom few alternative facilities exist) and for yeshivoth and ORT schools in Israel. The remainder of the JDC budgetary requirements relate to a variety of smaller programs and to the functional and social service costs of the JDC headquarters in Geneva and New York. Altogether, JDC continues to meet needs of one kind or another in nearly 30 countries scattered throughout the world.

ISRAEL

Because of the effects of the war, in the past few months Malben has had to meet not only the routine on-going needs of thousands of aged and sick but emergency allocations as well for such civil defense expenses as shelters, evacuation facilities, stockpiles and other protective measures. In addition, planned program consolidations which would have resulted in

savings have had to be postponed. Lastly, and most important, expected income from usual local sources will not be available and will need to be replaced by the JDC.

At present, JDC Malben assists about 40,000 individuals, mostly aged and sick, through its various institutional and non-institutional services and comprises well over one quarter of the global budget. JDC subventions to yeshivoth and to refugee rabbis will assist about 22,000 persons; the ORT program, likewise receiving financial aid, will train over 25,000 young people. Thus, altogether, JDC beneficiaries in Israel will aggregate more than 87,000 persons.

Financial difficulties because of the recent war have seriously affected the religious and cultural activities in Israel subventioned by JDC. During the war several yeshivoth in Jerusalem were damaged. Moreover, income from regular sources (both local and U.S.) has been deflected. These effects of the war must be added to the on-going day-to-day expenses of the yeshivoth.

ARAB AND MOSLEM COUNTRIES

The war has had its wide ranging effects in the Arab and Moslem countries, particularly Morocco, Tunisia and Libya where circumstances have forced thousands of Jews to flee, mostly to France and Italy. The cost of providing emergency aid to these unfortunate families will amount to nearly \$ 1,000,000 in France and \$ 350,000 in Italy for 1967 alone. While the 1968 Libyan requirements are expected to decline, the aid programs in France, which must meet the continuing North African influx, will call for at least \$ 1,000,000 next year as well. Events in Libya were particularly serious and dangerous. Out of an estimated Jewish population of a little over 4,000, all but a few hundred have departed. Close to 6,500 Tunisian Jews and nearly 5,000 Moroccan Jews have come to

France, and more are expected to follow. A few Jews have escaped or have been deported from Egypt while others (for the time being at least) must remain, many having been imprisoned. The residual few thousand Jews in Iraq and Syria are subjected to oppressive restrictions. The JDC is making every effort through all possible channels to bring aid and comfort. At the same time, JDC must maintain its normal extensive program commitments, mainly in Iran (virtually untouched by the Middle East crisis) and in Tunisia and Morocco for those remaining behind.

Barring further dramatic events in the Moslem world, JDC will assist more than 50,000 individuals in 1968 or roughly one in every three persons.

EUROPE

This year almost 30% of the JDC global budget will be distributed in some 15 European countries where JDC will assist more than 225,000 individuals. This includes welfare services in Eastern Bloc countries.

In Eastern Europe the major innovation is that for the first time in eighteen years JDC is once again bringing assistance in a systematic fashion to the Jewish remnant in Rumania. A basic relief program will aid the most needy through the Federation of Jewish Communities in Rumania.

In Western Europe, with the exception of France, Italy and Belgium, the programs are minor ones dealing with small residual caseloads which are gradually disappearing. The largest country program involves France where more than 50,000 persons will benefit from various services (an estimated 1 out of every 11 Jews in France). The serious problems already facing the French Jewish community have been multiplied as a result of the recent influx of Moroccan and Tunisian Jews, most of whom

are settling in the Paris area where temporary housing, financial assistance, food and clothing are being provided.

Until now the French Jewish community has had relatively little difficulty in absorbing movements from North Africa. This year, however, both the considerable numbers and the depressed economic conditions in France will intensify the burden on the community. The newcomers, many unskilled or semi-skilled, will find few opportunities in France's job market, already registering dangerous unemployment rates. Additionally, it is only now that the special situations of the recent arrivals are beginning to emerge: there are many ill, aged and alone, all of whom will require long-term help from the community.

The recent refugees will further aggravate the lack of communal facilities such as Jewish schools, homes for the aged, children's homes, synagogues, centers, etc. to meet the needs of a population which has exploded from less than 300,000 to well over half a million in the last ten years.

It must not be overlooked that these new requirements come on top of the on-going commitments and programs of the various welfare agencies, already very extensive. For example, these agencies give monthly cash grants to more than 4,500 persons, medical services reach 3,500 individuals monthly, more than 700 children are cared for in homes, etc.

ITALY, which until the recent war had only a moderate residual caseload, now presents a special case for future programming. Since the beginning of hostilities in June, approximately 3,500 Libyan Jews have made their way to Italy, staying temporarily in camps and pensions in and around Rome and Naples. More than half this number have received various forms of JDC assistance throughout the summer. At the present time it is

estimated that about 700 to 800 of these have left for Israel. However, many of those remaining require assistance, and there is evidence that more of the few hundred Jews remaining in Libya will come to Italy this Fall.

In BELGIUM JDC will assist some 4,000 persons, a high percentage of whom are former Nazi victims in need of cash assistance and medical care; AUSTRIA will continue to be the major reception center for Eastern European refugees.

In 1938, for some 375,000 Jews in Israel, Europe and the Arab and Moslem countries, the relief and rehabilitation work of the JDC remains a vital and indispensable pre-condition for survival in some cases or for a minimum of well-being in others.




Back at my desk in Jerusalem I wish to thank you once again for your kind assistance during my recent tour.



What does this document really accomplish?

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

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After the Six Day War Jewish history will never be the same again. There can be no return to 'business as usual' for either the Jewish State or world Jewry: the changes wrought by the victory are too momentous. Their full implications may take many more months, even years, to emerge. But it is not too early to attempt a preliminary assessment for the leadership.


7 On the face of it, the gains are tremendous. Israel has proved its mettle for all to see. Its prospects for physical security have improved beyond recognition. Despite obstinate Arab refusal to face realities, re-inforced by great power politics, there can be no question that Israel is prepared to yield at the conference table what it has won in the field of battle.

Public opinion has rallied to its support in many and varied quarters. There have been remarkable differences on this score between the people and their governments in some democracies. Even totalitarian regimes have met with unprecedented restiveness in regard to their Middle Eastern designs. Politics apart, never has there been a greater outpouring of spontaneous sympathy with Israel.

None of course has reacted more splendidly than world Jewry. The results of the emergency campaigns, and even more so the spirit in which they were conducted; the immediate response to Israel's call for advice and assistance to its development projects, as evidenced by the Economic Planning Conference in Jerusalem; the stream of young volunteers from the most un-expected places —all these are but the first signs of a revolutionary process. They reveal Jewish solidarity to a degree never before experienced.

They open up vistas for the future not yet fathomable.

It might then seem that Israel and the Jewish people have weathered the storm. But this would be a premature conclusion. In fact, the emergency is far from over. The war has been well and truly won, but not yet the peace. Paradoxically, this will be the greater challenge. It will be less dramatic, less glamorous, less stirring emotionally. It is bound to call for sustained efforts, intellectual resilience, unflinching resourcefulness. It will not make headlines, nor hit the **TV** screens. It will not be a matter of six days, not even six years. The plain truth is that Israel's basic problems, economically as well as socially, have NOT been solved by the war. They loom as large as ever. The following presentation is an attempt to summarize them in their bearing on fund raising and similar philanthropic support.



BASIC ABSORPTION PROBLEMS

Future generations, possessing the benefit of hindsight, may well judge that what the first generation of Israelis, and indeed their forerunners, tried to do was to defy all laws of history. They may marvel at the boldness with which the builders of the Jewish State exerted themselves to telescope within a space of years or decades what is normally a task for generations, if not centuries. They may discover that in their desperate race against time these Don Quixotes succeeded in some respects, but failed in others. It is this co-existence of success and failure, and the resulting tensions, which determine our current problems as well as future challenges.

The Economic Struggle: Progress Checked

Next to physical security the basic test for viability is of course a sound economy. On this score Israel had reached something of an impasse on the eve of the Six Day War. After a period of hectic expansion — some say over-expansion — a marked change occurred in 1966. The hitherto dynamic pace of growth, which showed first signs of retardation in 1965, came to a halt during 1966, when the gross national product in real terms rose by less than 1 percent to \$ 3,954 million. This was a sharp drop from the 10 percent recorded in 1964, and the 8 percent of 1965.

Explain
All the facets of economic life were affected by the slowdown in tempo, but the building trade was the most severely hit, largely as a consequence of reduced immigration. Repercussions on the labour market were inevitable. After years of full and over-full employment a weakness made itself felt in late 1965, and deepened into full-blown unemployment in 1966. Whereas the proportion of registered job-seekers had been 3.5 percent of the

total labour force in the former year, it rose to double that figure in the latter. During early 1967 the slowdown became even more pronounced and unemployment assumed the proportions of a social problem. It was then that the government and the Central Bank decided to embark on a mildly inflationary policy in order to counteract the recession.

Prices Stabilized

The index of consumer prices rose by 7.8 percent in 1966, compared with 7.1 percent in 1965 and only 4.5 percent in 1964. However, there was a distinct change of trend recorded during 1966, which is hidden by consideration of the overall figures only. Whereas the index advanced by 6.1 percent during the first half of 1966, this rapid increase was brought almost to a halt in the second half, when the index rose by only 1.6 percent. The tendency to price stabilization gained added momentum during the last quarter of 1966 and continued into 1967. A lengthy period of inflationary pressures thus came to an end.

A significant by-product of this slowdown was decreased need for administrative controls on prices. As demand slackened, competition grew and manufacturers stopped passing on cost increases to the consumer. Administrative restraints therefore became superfluous.

Balance of Payments Improved

From the angle of orthodox economics this development was welcome, desirable, and indeed intended. Its beneficial effect on the balance of payments was unmistakable. The improvement on current account which began in 1965 continued in 1966, and became even more pronounced in early 1967. During 1965 and 1966 the deficit in the trade balance decreased by almost \$ 120 million to \$ 452 million. All this was of course a reflection of the general slowdown previously described.

The rapid growth in consumption which had been a feature of earlier years was greatly restrained in 1966. This affected imports of consumer goods as well as raw materials. In addition investments were on a much lower level than in the early 1960's, so that import of investment goods declined

substantially. While overall imports therefore remained practically constant, exports of goods and services increased considerably. It cannot however be claimed that large-scale exports were substantially more diversified than in the past. There remained over-dependence on citrus and diamonds — commodities which are subject to wide annual fluctuations.

This note of caution must be reinforced by a further consideration. As Israel's economy again moves into a more dynamic phase, imports will increase and the balance of trade is again likely to deteriorate. The hoped for increase in foreign investments is bound to bring in its wake a worsening of the balance of payments position.

More serious still, Israel's foreign currency balances dropped in 1966 despite the improved trade balance, while foreign debt rose by some \$ 100 million. The good luck of earlier years, when the deficit on current account was more than offset by unilateral transfers and capital imports, no longer held in 1966. For the first time in roughly a decade, foreign exchange reserves declined, reaching \$ 576 million net, some \$ 35 million less than in 1965. This contraction was due largely to a fall in capital imports by \$ 97 million, to \$ 493 million. Of this decline \$ 20 million was accounted for by the reduction of US Government financed loans. Unilateral transfers went down by \$ 42 million, of which almost half was caused by the termination of German Reparation payments.

Decline of Investments

The major reasons for the slowdown have already been referred to — the decline of immigration, reduced investments, monetary contraction, flagging demand and falling production. To this must be added a mood of hesitancy and a feeling of uncertainty which gripped the public. This, coupled with official announcements of "economic moderation", unavoidably contributed to the process of recession.

Total investment in the economy during 1966 continued on the downward slope first recorded in 1965. Two consecutive years of falling investments were a novel feature for the Israel economy, which had grown accustomed to constant

expansion. And there was the significant fact that whereas the annual investment decline had been only 1.7 percent in 1965 it exceeded 18 percent in 1966. Although the contraction was first felt in building, it eventually reached all major sectors of the economy. One of the undesirable consequences was the extent to which industries producing for export markets were hit.

The authorities had indeed welcomed the economic slowdown, and in a measure planned for it, but the effects turned out more severe than anticipated. To redress the balance steps were subsequently taken to stimulate expansion once again through an amendment of the Law for the Encouragement of Capital Investment. Approved investments in development areas now get grants of 20 to 33 percent of the capital cost and all new investments in industry are entitled to double depreciation rates.

Rise of Unemployment

From the social point of view the most alarming development occurred on the labour market. The average number of gainfully employed declined by one thousand in 1966, but the civilian labour force grew by 34,000, so that the unemployment figure reached an average of 35,000 during the year. There has been controversy over the figure in the country, for different bodies use different definitions of the term. The Central Bureau of Statistics recorded the number of these "out of work" by the end of 1966 as 90,000, in contrast to the much lower figure of the Labour Exchanges reflecting only those registered as job-seekers. None have argued about the fact that unemployment spread rapidly in the course of the year.

The positive effects of Israel's slowdown — especially in narrowing the trade deficit — continued into 1967. But so did the dangerous proportions of unemployment. It may indeed be said that what progress the economy achieved in 1966 was bought at least in part at the cost of unemployment. This realization in due course led to a certain reversal of government policy. A deliberate attempt is now being made to relax monetary restrictions and reflate the economy, even at the price of a large budgetary deficit (details of which will be discussed below).

Absorption Delayed

To make out a prescription for curing the economy is one thing: to administer the bitter draught is quite another. Any policy maker, in Israel no less than elsewhere, could tell a story of this. And it may well be that in this infant state, beset with such formidable problems and made up of so heterogeneous a population, the human cost of rational solutions is quite exceptionally high. Indeed, the social background to economic planning is here a factor of paramount importance. There can be no hope for sound economic development unless rapid progress is achieved in human engineering.

The basic fact is that a substantial proportion of Israel's immigrant population must still be described, by any standards, as unabsorbed. Upwards of 200,000 persons, out of 2,360,000 Jews living in the country are not yet either economically independent or socially integrated. In April 1967 there were about 90,000 cases under the care of social welfare bureaux, including 22,500 on permanent relief, 25,000 receiving other financial assistance and close to 43,000 in need of counselling and referrals, making a total of at least 200,000 persons — over 90 percent of them immigrants since 1948. And it may well be asked to what extent even the others can be considered truly absorbed. (Professor Israel Katz, head of the Paul Baerwald School of Social Work, puts the number of Israelis living under the poverty line as high as 300,000.)

When does a Refugee Cease to be a Refugee?

The question keeps cropping up: how long may an immigrant be legitimately regarded as eligible for assistance as an immigrant? This is not a purely academic issue: it has very practical implications for the measure of aid required from world Jewry. The normal experience in the older countries is, of course, that to integrate an immigrant takes a relatively short time. The newcomer will not find it too difficult to secure a place in the nooks and crannies of a highly developed economy; in a few months, a year or at the utmost two will generally be a sufficient period. This is indeed fine for a country like the United States where annual immigration amounts to less than 0.2 percent of the settled population; or where the influx since

1948 (to use a convenient date) accounted for only about 3 percent (see chart in the Appendix).

But not so in Israel. Quite apart from its dearth of natural resources, the shortage of skilled manpower, and the consequent backwardness of its economic development, there is this fundamental fact — more than two out of every three Jews in the State today were not there in 1948. The Jewish population grew from 650,000 persons in 1948 to 2,361,000 in June 1967, including 1,240,000 immigrants and 471,000 due to natural increase. Nothing remotely comparable can be found in any of the classical countries of immigration. No justification therefore exists for expecting the accepted rules of economic integration to apply to Israel. With its make-up of population, and considering its other material handicaps, the Jewish State must be viewed as a very special case. There is nothing unreasonable in claiming that a family who has been in the country for as long as five years or even a decade and more may still be entitled to substantial aid; that the native population cannot be expected to shoulder the full burden of absorption; and that the moral responsibility of world Jewry extends well beyond the brief initial period after the arrival of immigrants.

The Twin Aspects of Absorption

Economic development and social integration thus become two closely inter-related sets of problems. Neither can be solved in isolation. Above all, one must beware of a mechanistic approach. It is true that economic development is the indispensable basis for independence, that without reasonably full employment there will be no genuine social progress, that without a constant rise of living standards the State cannot hope to attract the kind of immigration it needs. It is equally true that economic development has no chance of getting off the ground until and unless social conditions are created which will be conducive to successful enterprise. It would be a gross oversimplification to say: take care of economic developments, and social developments will take care of themselves. For an example of the fallacy of this reasoning it may suffice to point to the United States economy, the most highly developed in the world, with its well-nigh intractable Negro problem. Apart, however, from humanitarian considerations there are very practical reasons for attending to Israel's social needs with determination and dispatch.

One or Two Israels?

The history of Jewish immigration has scattered our people over vastly different countries. The return to Israel has brought homecomers from correspondingly contrasting backgrounds. At the end of 1966 the Jewish population of Israel numbered 2,344,877 persons. Of them 652,391 had immigrated from Asia and Africa and 438,429 were Israel born of families from those continents, making a total of 1,090,820. The corresponding figures for other parts of the world were 716,873, 537,184, and 1,254,057 respectively. ?

The significance of these figures is obvious. Almost half of Israel's Jewish population (46.7 percent) hails from countries of a Moslem background, either directly or barely a generation removed. Through no fault of their own, but by accident of birth, they start life in the Jewish State with tremendous handicaps. They have ^{EVERY} expectation of, and indeed every right to, full equality of opportunity. Huge efforts are being made with this end in view. But it is a task which takes some doing.

To illustrate the dimensions of this problem a few statistics may be of help. At the end of 1966 of the adult immigrants to Israel from Asia and Africa (aged 18 and above) 27.9 percent had no schooling whatsoever, 10.0 percent went to school for up to four years and only 25.4 percent for nine years and above. (In contrast, the corresponding figures for immigrants from Europe and America were 3.1, 9.5 and 53.0 percent.) Illiteracy of adult immigrants in development towns, practically all from Moslem countries, today ranges from 20 to 50 percent and sometimes even more. As a result the percentage of illiterates aged 14 and above exceeded 11.0 percent of the total Israel population at the end of 1966. For a long time to come the social consequences of this are bound to be keenly felt. ?

In 1965 of immigrant families from Asia and Africa close to 13 percent numbered five persons and 26 percent seven persons and above. As against this the corresponding figures of newcomers from Europe and America were nine and one percent respectively. To take a slightly different angle, from

the average number of children per Jewish married woman, aged 40-49 years, from Africa and Asia was 6.1 percent in 1961 and from Europe and America 2.2 percent. These are facts of life; they will call for extraordinary exertions until the aim of a truly united Israel society is attained.

The Focus: Development Towns

The effects of these conditions can of course be discerned all over the country. But they stand out most starkly in the so-called development towns, where at least 80 percent of the population have come from Moslem countries, and where the local labour force amounts to only 28 percent, compared with 37 percent for Israel as a whole. For obvious reasons the focus for economic development in Israel today are the development towns. To industrialize them in a modern way — and no other approach makes sense — can only be done with suitable manpower. This in turn presupposes the evolution of socially viable communities, but for the time being these preconditions are far from being met. Housing, general education, vocational training, nutrition and social welfare services as well as cultural amenities all leave much to be desired. To achieve acceptable standards must take a good many years, quite apart from the heavy financial efforts involved.

The Housing Bottleneck

In many respects housing is the basic deficiency of life in a development town. The close to 250,000 persons living in these towns have an average floor space of 125 square feet, as against 210 per person for the country as a whole. Part of the dwellings are still the substandard temporary structures put up in the early period. Even the newer houses, with apartments of 613 square feet on the average, are badly overcrowded owing to the large size of families. Density per room in development towns varies from 1.9 to 2.7 persons, compared with 1.0 to 1.4 persons in older communities. Even this comparison understates the seriousness of the problem because average figures tend to be misleading. Not only is the size of the rooms in development towns smaller than elsewhere, but sanitary and other facilities are poorer, workmanship is substandard and maintenance inadequate. Public services for youth are far from satisfactory. The overall appearance of the towns is neglected and dreary,

owing partly to the absence of attractive public buildings and gardens. Such conditions obviously do not make for contented citizens and a positively orientated labour force.

A comprehensive picture of Israel's re-housing needs, in development towns and elsewhere, was presented by the Minister of Housing to the Knesset in March 1967. He stated that no less than 123,000 families — a figure which represents over 20 percent of the total number of Jewish families in the country — are living in dwellings due for replacement within the next few years. This total comprises 60,000 families in old Arab houses abandoned in 1948, 25,000 in asbestos houses and other temporary dwellings, 20,000 in permanent houses in conditions of severe overcrowding, and 18,000 in agricultural settlements. Current plans of the government call for the construction of 61,500 apartments by 1970, which would solve just about half of the slum clearing needs. The net cost involved — after participation of the slum dwellers — would be, at present prices, roughly \$ 370 million.

Backlog in Education

The impact of overcrowding in development towns is compounded by the shortage of educational facilities. Pre-kindergarten projects of the "Operation Headstart" type require substantial expansion. The teaching personnel suffers from excessive fluctuation; it depends in large measure on semi-trained army girls or commuters from the larger cities. There is insufficiency of special aids and curricula for children of the educationally underprivileged large families. Scholastic attainments are consequently lower than elsewhere. Opportunities for post-elementary schooling, especially of the academic type, are relatively limited, or where they exist not adequately exploited. Far too many adolescents neither attend school nor hold any regular jobs, living in a social vacuum pending army service. In these conditions the danger of juvenile delinquency is ever present, although its actual occurrence is as yet remarkably limited. Clearly, unless the educational challenges are met there will be no economic future for the development towns. The more promising young men and women will leave on release from the army and only the weaker elements tend to stay on.

A special facet of the educational problems in these towns is the scarcity of modern vocational skills. It is of course hard to train a man who lacks minimal educational qualifications. There is the added difficulty of imparting modern notions of labour morale and ^ageneral understanding of technical processes — two, ~~two~~ indispensable conditions for an industrial labour force. Experience shows that this aim is not impossible of achievement, but it calls for efforts, time and expenditure.

Health and Welfare Needs

Unavoidably the backward population concentrated in the development towns has health problems of its own. Least important among them are physical disabilities which can be cured comparatively easily. More serious is the relatively high incidence of emotional disturbances — the upshot of the sudden radical change of living conditions. Moreover, nutrition standards are often unsatisfactory, not only because of poor earnings but also owing to the women's ignorance of modern dietary practices. In these circumstances school feeding schemes, against only a nominal charge or free of charge, assume great importance; and there is the allied need for instruction in home economics as well as hygiene. All this calls for specialized staff and corresponding outlay, but it is ^aworthwhile, indeed an essential, investment.

It goes without saying that the demands on social welfare services are exceptionally high in development towns. The large size of families, combined with an excessive burden of aged and handicapped, imposes responsibilities which are beyond the earning capacity of the average unskilled breadwinner. Over and above the humanitarian aspects of social welfare work there are sound economic reasons for improving present services. A depressed, apathetic population can provide no manpower for modern industry. Without industrial development there can be no hope for the growth of local markets and no prospects for the creation of jobs in trade and services.

Raising Cultural Standards

Hand in hand with the economic requirements goes the need to introduce modern cultural notions and values, to develop an awareness of civic responsibility.

local patriotism and a sense of participation in national affairs. Without progress in this direction the existing trend to self-segregation will be hard to overcome and there can certainly be no true merging of the exiles. The practical means to this end will be greatly expanded facilities for community work, which calls for the construction of suitable premises and even more for the training of qualified staff.

In a nutshell, the essential task is to give the population in development towns a sense of purpose. They must be extricated from the dangers of social and emotional isolation. The present drift away from the outlying areas to the urban centres must be arrested. Stagnation in the backwaters must be replaced by vigorous expansion. There is need in these towns for the skilled manpower from the more advanced parts of the country, and even for immigrants from the Western world whose education and training would be of particular value.


This will not come to pass without providing incentives and a reasonably attractive social climate. The success of Israel's development towns depends therefore not only on investments and the physical infrastructure for them, but equally on the simultaneous creation of an appropriate social infrastructure.

Demographic Trends

There is a third dimension to Israel's economic and social problems, as they appeared on the eve of the Six Day War — the growth of the Arab population. This was an important feature even before June 5. In 1961 Arabs accounted for 11.1 percent of Israel's total population. By 1966 the proportion had risen to 11.8 percent notwithstanding the overall growth of the country's population. The net annual growth rate of 16.1 per mill for the Jewish population of Israel, while somewhat higher than the average for Europe as a whole, is lower than in the United States or the Soviet Union. By contrast, the net rate of increase of the Arab population, 45.8 per mill, is the highest in the world. It has been calculated that, on the present rate of natural increase (disregarding the occupied territories), Israel will have over 710,000 Arab citizens in 1985. In other words there will be roughly 20 Arabs to every 100 Jews in the country. These forecasts are based on the present net internal growth of the Jewish

population (38,000 persons a year). They take no account of immigration because of its unpredictable nature, and also because immigration, to make a decisive impact, would have to be on a massive scale.

In view of these trends enhancement of the Jewish birth rate assumes paramount importance. The challenge involved does not obviously lend itself to glib solutions. But this much can be stated: without facing up to the social as well as economic issues sketched above we have no reason for facile optimism. Success in mastering its social problems therefore becomes, in an immediate sense, the precondition for Israel's survival.



EFFECTS OF THE WAR

At the time of writing it is too early to give definite figures regarding the economic impact of the Six Day War. A few preliminary indications may nevertheless be in order.

The physical damage to buildings and in particular agricultural settlements was fairly limited, owing of course to the short period of the fighting and the relative ineffectiveness of enemy action. On the other hand, the general economic dislocation caused by the mobilization prior to the actual fighting and extending to several weeks after the cease fire must have resulted in a substantial drop in production. In the wartime month of June industrial output alone slumped by 21 percent. The full extent of the loss will become clear only when the annual data for 1967 are published.

Slowdown Continues

The latest available information on unemployment shows that after the inevitable fluctuations attributable to the war the monthly average was up by 3.5 percent in August 1967, as compared with April. There seems to have been a moderate decline since, but the overall situation has not changed significantly from what it was in April. Basically, therefore, the relative stagnation of economic activity has not been affected by the war, at any rate not for the time being. This may seem difficult to reconcile with the very substantial expenditure for the war effort, and even more so with the sharp rise of means of payment in the first four months of 1967 set in train by the government to bring about a measure of reflation. But the fact remains. Its explanation must be sought partly in the stiff increase of income tax decided upon in June, coupled with the floating of £250 million Defence Loan (which was oversubscribed by £50 million), and partly by a reduction in the velocity of monetary circulation. In any event, the curtailment of purchasing power among the public, reinforced by a tendency to hold on to cash, or invest in savings institutions and government securities, has a distinctly retarding effect for the time being and the economy continues in the doldrums.

War Expenditures

There again no definite figures are as yet available. All that can be stated is that the direct costs of war were greatly in excess of the funds raised by world Jewry for the help of Israel. In addition, there are bound to be huge expenditures for the re-equipment of the armed forces. According to the Labour Minister, the new equipment would embody innovations of science and technology of the seventies and would cost more than was spent for this purpose in the 19 years of the State's existence. Even before the war defence expenditure took a greater share of the gross national product in Israel than it did in any Western country. Obviously the proportion must have gone up still further in 1967, with economic consequences which are self-evident. (Details will be discussed further on.)

The occupied territories naturally add to the fiscal ~~burden~~ burden. Neither the West Bank nor the Gaza Strip and Sinai were in any position before the war to balance their accounts. Both depended for public services on UNRWA and their central governments. This makes it incumbent on the Israel Government to maintain such services on a reasonable level. It is reported that the budgetary requirements for the West Bank alone, after deduction of tax revenues and disbursements by UNRWA for the care of refugees, will amount to IL 100 million for the 9-month period ending March 1968. It seems therefore reasonable to assume that the cost of running the occupied territories as a whole will add at least \$ 30 million a year to the Israel government expenditure.

These are however relatively minor considerations. The real problem will be the general economic impact of these territories. Naturally no clear view of the implications can be gained in the present unsettled state of affairs. This has not prevented some immediate effects, however limited and spontaneous, from making themselves felt. A rough idea of the factors at work may be obtained by considering the state of economy on the West Bank before the war (no adequate information has yet been assembled for the other occupied territories).

The West Bank Economy

Even the most cursory glance suggests that the economic contrast between the West Bank and Israel are tremendous. Originally this part of the Kingdom of Jordan contained a large number of skilled and semi-skilled Westernized workers - the result partly of the 1948 exodus from Palestine. Owing to the relative backwardness of the area these immediately became surplus manpower and therefore a social liability. At the same time, while the East Bank was even less developed economically, it strongly asserted its political ascendancy; whatever foreign aid and capital imports could be secured were channelled almost exclusively to the politically more reliable East Bank. The result was heavy emigration from the West Bank either to the East Bank or to the oil rich Arab states looking for skilled manpower.

The remaining population was thus impoverished even in comparison with the underdeveloped East Bank. In 1965 agriculture, tourism and services accounted for 85 percent of the area's GNP and industry (mostly small enterprises) contributed a mere 7 percent, mainly for local consumption. The total GNP per capita was only \$ 179 - about half that of the East Bank and lower than in any other Arab country except for Egypt. (The corresponding figure for Israel in 1966 was \$ 1,504.)

Local economic activity on the West Bank in 1965 supplied no more than 78 percent of the goods and services consumed. The resulting import surplus was therefore high even compared with Israel. Exports - mainly vegetable, fruit and olive oil - went almost exclusively to the East Bank. The \$ 32 million deficit in the trade balance was covered to the extent of almost \$ 18 million by private capital transfers from citizens who had left the West Bank and supported their dependants from their new places of work on a fairly regular basis. A further \$ 10 million came from UNRWA and other institutional sources. The balance was made up by net surplus spendings of the Jordanian government. On any reckoning, therefore, integration with the Israel economy, however partial in scope and period it may turn out to be, is bound to create strains and stresses over and above all the other economic problems which Israel has to master.

Resettlement of Arab Refugees

As of this writing the resettlement of Arab refugees is a matter shrouded in complete uncertainty. Even their numbers are in dispute. According to United Nations sources 350,000 left due to the Six Day War and 1,330,000 in 1948; but there may be a measure of duplication since some of the earlier refugees moved on a second time in the wake of the recent fighting. Of the 1948 refugees 340,000 were found by an Israeli census undertaken in September 1967, including 235,000 in camps. No one can foretell how, where and when this problem will be tackled. Whatever the decisions may be, it seems safe to assume that this will affect Israel appreciably and add to its economic burden. In trying to take a comprehensive view of the tasks ahead, one must therefore make at least a mental note of this important unknown quantity.

Social Gains....

Against the manifold economic pressures which continue unrelieved by the war, and to some extent aggravated by it, one can happily set at least two major gains in the social sphere.

The first is the brilliant vindication of sabra youth. For some time past public opinion had grown increasingly critical of the younger generation, accusing them of selfishness, materialism and cynical negation of the values associated with Judaism and Zionism. Doubts were widely expressed whether this generation could be trusted to carry on the building of the State in the spirit of its founding fathers.

These misgivings have been completely swept away. The performance of the common soldier no less than the competence of the officer corps revealed qualities which surpassed the expectations of the most sanguine optimists. Confidence has now been restored that the future of Israel will rest in able hands. While this radical change of climate is not a matter which can be expressed in figures, its positive effects are bound to be felt for a long time to come: they may well give a renewed impetus to economic as well as social progress.

A second major prize of the war was the emotional integration of non-Ashkenazi communities. This was felt throughout the country, and particularly in the development towns. After years of resentment against the old-timers, who happened to be preponderantly of European background, a mood of unreserved identification with the State and the war effort gripped the underprivileged sectors of Israel. Soldiers and civilians alike shared in this elation. Overnight all citizens, irrespective of their origin, had become equals and felt and acted as such in the hour of mortal danger. Israel found itself a united nation.

....Social Challenges

Three months after this momentous experience the question poses itself: will the newly gained self-confidence and sense of belonging last? For the time being the general mood in development towns continues to be one of hopefulness. But sentiments alone are not enough to sustain an underprivileged population. Unless material conditions can be made to improve rapidly and visibly, and above all unless the jobless are provided with productive employment, the present euphoria may give way to keen disappointment. Indeed, there is the danger of a violent backlash. After all, equality in the face of death must be followed by equality for the rewards of life. Economic developments and social betterment have therefore become matters of even greater urgency than they were on the eve of the war.

New Fiscal Needs

To come to grips with these problems the Israel government has decided on a massive dose of regulation. This is in line with decisions taken earlier in the year to reverse the policy of "moderation" and press on with economic expansion, more particularly in the development towns. Through a Supplementary Development Budget, adopted in September 1967, a sum of \$ 174 million is to be pumped into the economy during the coming six months. This will be in addition to the original Development Budget for 1967/68 of \$ 353 million. All that supplementary spending will be financed by loans, including \$ 110 million of Israel Bonds and \$ 17 million excess income for the internal Defence Loan (over and above the original target of \$ 83 million).

Except for \$ 17 million allocated for defence, the entire Supplementary Budget will be applied for constructive economic enterprises. Over \$ 100 million are to be channelled to industrial and allied projects, close on \$ 30 million to the economic infrastructure (water, electricity, roads, public buildings and the like), \$ 10 million to housing and \$ 7 million to agriculture, apart from more routine items. Most of this is intended to provide "natural" employment, in contrast to relief work.

Together with these measures certain tax concessions have been granted to stimulate demand. The emergency surcharge on petrol excise imposed during the war has been cancelled; and the sales tax on a number of basic consumer durables has been slashed. The possibilities are also now being studied of reducing direct taxation in the coming year with a view to further boosting the internal market. The two likely alternatives are to abolish the Defence Levy (ten percent of the income tax) due to expire at the end of the 1967/68 fiscal year, or to terminate the Absorption Loan and Compulsory Savings Levy (18 percent of the income tax).

Besides these various injections of economic stimulants designed to combat unemployment it is recognised that the time has come for enhanced services above all to the underprivileged sections of the population. This would involve substantial increases in the 1968/69 Ordinary Budget as against 1967/68. According to the preliminary calculations requirements for education come to roughly \$ 200 million, compared with \$ 156 million in the current year. Spendings on health should be raised from \$ 55 million to \$ 67 million, and for social welfare from \$ 20 million to \$ 33 million.

To what extent these demands will be met remains to be seen. There can be no doubt, at any rate, that they are based on a sober assessment of needs. It is equally certain that the technical conditions for their implementation exist.

Wanted: more Manpower

The picture of Israel's victory and its aftermath would not be complete without a reference to the problem of manpower. Some indication of the urgency of this matter has already been given in describing the economic and social struggle of the development towns on the eve of the war. Since then 65,000 non-Jews have been added to the State through the annexation of East Jerusalem and, according to a census taken in September 1967, 995,000 Arabs are now living in the occupied territories, besides the 318,000 non-Jews in Israel in June 1967, making a total of 1,378,000. These figures must be viewed in conjunction with the 2,361,000 Jews counted in Israel in June.

It is obvious that for demographic as well as economic and social reasons this imbalance will have to be corrected. Immigration therefore becomes a high priority among the targets now facing the State. Clearly, this challenge is not only one of numbers but of quality, and must consequently be directed above all to the Jewish communities in the Western world. What the response to this call will be only the future can tell. But more than ever the survival of Israel will depend on the readiness of the Jewish people to contribute what is required not only in financial means but in human resources.

THE TAXPAYER'S EFFORT

The physical sacrifices of Israel are universally recognized: not so its material exertions. And yet the latter are no less significant. To provide some idea of their extent comparative data have been assembled for the gross national product, annual government expenditure and defence expenditure for a number of countries (see chart in the Appendix). Their main points of interest may be summarized as follows:-

1. In terms of gross national product per capita Israel should not be called an underdeveloped country. The figure for 1966 is \$ 1,504, which is not far behind those of Holland and England (\$ 1,546 and \$ 1,809 respectively in 1965). But this comparison is misleading and must not be taken at its face value. An exceptionally high proportion, 16.6 percent of Israel's total resources, is spent on investment, most of which is financed by capital imports in the form of philanthropic funds and loans. Moreover, the following important qualifications must be taken into account.
2. The fiscal demands on the Israeli population are disproportionately high. In absolute figures Israel's annual government expenditure per capita (\$ 753) is not far behind that of the United States, Federal as well as States, (\$ 858). It exceeds those of the leading welfare states, England and Sweden (\$ 721 and \$ 639 respectively). It is far ahead of all other countries, and nearly twice as much as in Canada. (\$ 391) This is due to the burden of defence, more fully explained below.
3. Measured in relation to the gross national product — the most appropriate yardstick — Israel's burden is even more crushing. Annual government expenditure takes an unprecedented 50.1 percent of the GNP, as against 39.0 percent in England and 24.1 percent in the United States.
4. From the individual citizen's point of view what matters, of course, is his spending power — in other words, the balance left of the gross national product after deduction of the annual government expenditure.

On this score Israel lags far behind the European countries and even more so behind North America. The average balance left to Mr. Israel is \$ 751, as against \$ 2,700 for Mr. US.

5. This huge discrepancy is explained mainly by Israel's burden of defence — the highest known in the world. According to official figures published for the 1967/68 fiscal year, this accounts for 11.5 percent of the gross national product; and it is expected that on a final reckoning of the cost of the Six Day War it will approach 15 percent. The comparative figure for the United States in 1967 is estimated to come to 9.5 percent; the latest published definite data (for 1965) showed 7.3 percent.

~~6. Expressed as the share of annual government expenditure, spendings on defence in Israel are expected to be practically at par with that of those of the United States in 1967 (around 30 percent) and twice as much as in England (15 percent).~~

These statistics speak for themselves. They give incontrovertible proof of the demands made on the people of Israel. And yet it is a fact that the £ 250 million Defence Loan floated in June 1967, simultaneously with a stiff raising of taxes, was oversubscribed by £ 50 million.

WORLD JEWRY'S CONTRIBUTION

The Israeli taxpayer is not of course alone in carrying the burden imposed on him by history. He has a faithful partner in the Jewish people. From the very beginnings of settlement work in what was then called Palestine world Jewry has given its financial as well as moral support. It has done so through a variety of channels, foremost among which was the Jewish Agency for Palestine, an outgrowth of the World Zionist Organization founded in 1897.

Until the establishment of the State of Israel in 1948 the Jewish Agency was concerned with most aspects of Jewish life in the country, and recognized as such by the British Mandatory authorities. It served in effect as a quasi-government for the Jewish community, which laid the foundation for the State of Israel. With the establishment of the State the newly created government began functioning in those spheres which are normally and traditionally governmental responsibilities such as foreign affairs, security, economic development and other basic services. The Jewish Agency from then on has devoted itself solely to operations of a charitable character — mainly immigration, absorption, agricultural settlement, and allied educational and organizational activities.

The Performance of Campaigns

It is a matter of record, and of pride for all concerned, that the efforts made by world Jewry over the years add up to an achievement unmatched in voluntary fund-raising. It is also true that they have failed to produce anything like the full means required. As a result, the Jewish Agency could discharge its functions only in part and found itself increasingly constrained over the years to fall back on participations from the Israel Government. It thus happened that the mammoth burden of aliya and its attendant financial needs shifted progressively — if perhaps to world Jewry imperceptibly — to the Israel taxpayer.

To gain a meaningful picture of this development one should distinguish between the "normal" years up to the Six Day War and the time since. Clearly the two periods are not comparable. From October 1948 through March 1967 the Jewish Agency received contributions from the UJA in the United States, from Keren Hayesod appeals in other countries and Youth Aliya income throughout the world, totalling \$ 944.8 million. In the four months of June-September 1967 donations to the various emergency campaigns actually transferred to Jerusalem exceeded \$ 280 million and there were further pledges of roughly \$ 50 million.

An analysis of the pre-war figures (see chart in the Appendix) shows that campaign income — of which approximately four-fifths were raised in the United States — accounted for 65.4 percent of the total non-repayable funds received by the Jewish Agency. In addition 16.0 percent accrued from Reparations and other restitution payments of the Federal Republic of Germany, 7.8 percent were participations of the Israel government, 1.6 percent came from various international institutional sources concerned with the relief of refugees, and repayments of loans to immigrants together with similar revenue yielded 6.4 percent. In other words, world Jewry contributed about two-thirds of the non-repayable receipts.

However, the picture looks different when the indebtedness of the Jewish Agency is taken into consideration, as of course it must be. At no time did the income from the above-mentioned sources match the full needs of rescue and resettlement. In order to meet these needs and not miss chances which might never recur, it became necessary for the Jewish Agency to resort to substantial borrowing. The deficit incurred in fact accounted for 18.1 percent of the overall expenditure (\$ 1,766 million) between October 1948 and March 1967 (not counting repayment of debts). Towards this total the Jews outside Israel contributed no more than 53.5 percent.

Share in Immigration Costs

On further analysis the extent of world Jewry's participation in the cost of immigration, absorption and attendant services is smaller still. Even if the entire spendings of the Jewish Agency are taken into account — including, as stated above, those financed from other sources and loans — they do not cover more than one-third of the total expenditure, and probably less.

Two figures may serve to illustrate this point. From the establishment of the State to March 31, 1967, a total of 1,263,010 Jews immigrated to Israel. During the same period the Jewish Agency disbursed for operations directly connected with this influx a sum of \$ 1,542 million, or roughly \$ 1,230 per newcomer. Anyone can form his own estimate how far this amount could have possibly gone in paying for the costs involved in documentation, transportation, resettlement, housing, education, health and welfare services, as well as the creation of employment opportunities, having regard to the small size of the original population and the limitations of its economic resources.

Emergency Campaign Funds: their Uses

The flood of spontaneous solidarity which swept the Jewish world in the wake of the Six Day War was a source of profound encouragement for embattled Israel. The prompt assistance received had inestimable practical effects. It enabled the Jewish Agency to add \$ 282 million to its regular budget of \$ 103 million for 1967/68.

The beneficiaries of this massive aid were and will be precisely those sectors of the immigrant population whose full integration has been so critically delayed and would be jeopardised even further owing to the paramount requirements of defence. Specifically, the major areas of operation selected for appropriations of the emergency funds are social welfare and health services, education, immigrant

housing and agricultural settlement. Not one of these fields could conceivably sustain a cut-back, whatever the fiscal pressures might be. All in fact need additional means with which to tackle the backlog which already existed before the war and has since been aggravated.

As stated above, a problem of immediate urgency is that of employment in development towns. Obviously, to bring about a radical and lasting solution calls for large-scale programs of economic expansion. This is a matter beyond the scope of philanthropic endeavours, and indeed high on the agenda of government responsibilities. But the jobless cannot wait for "natural" investment projects to come to fruition. They are demanding and expect at least interim measures to alleviate their situation. It is with this object in view that the Jewish Agency has set aside in its Supplementary Budget a sum of \$ 15.9 million for work relief in various forms. The bulk of this money is destined for land development and afforestation schemes of the Jewish National Fund, providing jobs for roughly 8,000 breadwinners at daily wages rates of up to \$ 4.48. The remainder will be spent to subsidize the employment of 6,800 elderly and handicapped persons in sheltered workshops, at an average daily outlay of \$ 1.30 per person.

Outright social cases incapable of placement must be supported through direct relief payments. The monthly benefits granted range from \$ 23.66 for a single person to \$ 41.33 for families of three, and for families of four and above to a basic rate of \$ 7.33 plus \$ 10.66 per person. For this purpose \$ 8.7 million have been allocated to take care of approximately 22,700 cases, or more than 75,000 persons.

The wages earned through relief work and grants for the support of social case families are of course only minimal. They must be supplemented by a variety of specific services, above all for the benefit of underprivileged children. For this aim a sum of \$ 7.3 million has been appropriated. This includes \$ 3.3 million for feeding schemes in kindergartens and elementary schools, comprising around 165,000 children, or roughly one third of the school population in these grades, and \$ 4.0 million for the care of the retarded — roughly 4,000 children in day homes and 5,000 in closed institutions as well as 1,230 adolescents in closed institutions.

In addition, an amount of \$ 18.0 million has been voted for a range of other services in development towns whose population lags far behind that of the rest of Israel and is quite incapable of financing the necessary relief programs through local taxation.

In the field of health services the Jewish Agency has decided to cover a proportion of hospitalization costs for the immigrant population unable to bear the full expenses. As far as general hospitals are concerned, the amount involved is \$ 21.8 million. This will make up part of the difference between the \$ 17.00 cost price a day in non-profit making hospitals and the \$ 5.00 generally paid by the various health insurance schemes. It will also cover the full costs of hospitalization of those immigrants, and in particular social welfare cases, not included in insurance schemes. Moreover, a sum of \$ 5.8 million has been allocated to provide for the hospitalization of mental cases from among immigrants who do not qualify for membership in insurance schemes and are not eligible for placement in institutions under law at government expense. The fees payable are up to \$ 10.00 per bed a day.

From a long-range point of view education is of course the decisive instrument for bringing about effective integration for all sections of the Israel population. The Jewish Agency has accordingly appropriated a substantial sum — \$ 67.2 million — in its Supplementary Budget for services in this sphere. They include \$ 2.4 million for participation in the running of pre-kindergartens in development towns and immigrant quarters to take care of over 19,000 children from culturally and socially underprivileged homes; \$ 11.0 million for sundry vocational and agricultural training programs on a secondary level and other specialized schooling as well as adult education in development towns; \$ 8.1 million for vocational training schemes of a less advanced kind and for general youth activities in development towns; \$ 3.1 million for the training of teachers from among new immigrants with special regard to the needs of development towns; and \$ 30.7 million for participation in the maintenance costs of institutions of higher learning.

For immigrant housing an amount of \$ 85.6 million has been set aside by the Jewish Agency in its Supplementary Budget. This will make possible the construction of 3,800 housing units for newcomers at an average cost of \$ 7,500 per apartment, totalling \$ 29.1 million. An additional \$ 36.2 million is to be spent on re-housing projects in development towns to afford at least partial relief to the problem of overcrowding referred to above. Moreover, rent subsidies of close to \$ 28.00 a month will be made available for over 60,000 indigent families in development towns and immigrant quarters elsewhere, involving a total outlay of \$ 20.3 million.

Dwelling conditions in many agricultural settlements are even on a lower standard than in development towns, with over 10,000 houses having a floor space of no more than 45 square metres. To make some progress with this problem it has been decided to enlarge 3,000 of these dwellings and install basic sanitary amenities in them. Further houses must be built for young couples in the settlements as well as for newcomers. For all these purposes the Jewish Agency has voted \$ 17.0 million of its Supplementary Budget. In addition \$ 6.0 million has been appropriated for the final allocations to 212 settlements on the threshold of economic viability; \$ 9.3 million for current development work in 267 settlements still in a less advanced stage; and \$ 2.3 million for initial means of production to new settlements. The overall outlay for agricultural settlement activities under the supplementary budget of the Jewish Agency will therefore come to \$ 34.6 million.


TASKS AHEAD

If the foregoing sketch of Israel's problems has shown anything, it is the extreme complexity of the economic and social challenges facing us. Light and shadow are so mixed in the picture that it is hard to disentangle them. The issues at stake are too involved to be reduced to straightforward business propositions, and planning becomes accordingly difficult. Nevertheless, a purposeful plan of action will have to be devised.

One thing is certain: progress for Israel depends on a kind of partnership with world Jewry never before conceived, let alone attained. Henceforth it will make no sense to speak in terms of senior and junior partners, as it were. In view of the tasks ahead all members of the Jewish people bear an equal share of responsibility and of rights as well.

A first practical expression of this new spirit of being at one will be the Economic Planning Conference which is due to convene next April, and for which some spadework has already been done at the Jerusalem meeting of the top leadership last August. It is clearer today than ever before that economic development and social progress are inextricably bound up. No real headway will be possible for either, unless the other is equally and simultaneously taken into account. This has been realized by men of vision for some time past and it may be confidently expected that intensive thought will be given to its practical implications in the months ahead.

Meanwhile one proposition can be stated: there must be no letting up of the brilliant effort made under the impact of war. The emergency continues and peace has yet to be won.



Dear Rabbi Friedman:

On behalf of the people of Israel I wish to express their most profound and enduring gratitude for the magnificent outpouring of support in the historic weeks of this past summer, when Israel was faced with preventing annihilation of its population, and with protecting its continued existence as a nation. The impact of this massive support upon the needs and morale of the people of Israel has been incalculable.

Peace and security - for which the war was fought - have not yet been won. The emergency continues. The costs are tremendous. The support by American Jews of the UJA Israel Emergency Fund for Israel's human needs, and of Israel Bonds for Israel's development needs, will be most crucially required in 1968, as in 1967.

I want therefore to:

- (1) Reiterate the pre-eminent requirement of the contributed dollars through the UJA Israel Emergency Fund above all other forms of aid. In the field of investments Israel Bonds are the pre-eminent instrument for helping Israel.
- (2) Ask the community Welfare Funds, the UJA and the Bond organization to plan their respective campaigns so that there can be the most effective mobilization of leadership to insure maximum support in contributed gift dollars and in investment dollars. Each must add to the other. In no sense can either substitute for the other.

- (3) Call upon all Israeli social welfare and education institutions to urge their American friends and supporters to refrain from all special emergency and war-related fund raising efforts for their institutions, to limit their fund raising efforts to their normal needs, and to give complete and unlimited support to the Israel Emergency Fund of the UJA.



Dear friend,

History moves with unbelievable speed. We find ourselves, only a few months after the war in June, again facing a period of grave danger which will test the measure of our understanding and the depth of our devotion.

Israel won the war, but there is yet no peace. Look at the calendar of major (by no means all) episodes since the cease-fire was proclaimed on June 10:

- 18 June - First violation - Syrians fire on Israelis at Kunetra
- 2 July - Egypt attacks across Suez Canal in company strength
- 8 July - Egyptian tanks and artillery fire on Israelis at Kantara
- 11 July - Egyptian bombers fly over Sinai - one shot down
- 16 July - Air battle over southern end of Canal. Israelis shoot down 5 MIGs and one Sukhoi, lose one
- 3 Aug. - Jordanian troops fire across Jordan River for third day in row
- 26 Aug. - Egyptian Sukhoi shot down over Israel air base in Sinai
- 4 Sept. - Artillery duel across Suez Canal
- 5 Sept. - Mortar duel across Jordan near Damia Bridge
- 10 Sept. - Mines laid by saboteurs explode inside Kibbutz Sa'ad
- 21 Sept. - Artillery duel at Kantara
- 8 Oct. - Bomb placed in Zion cinema in Jerusalem, luckily found, courageously carried away by police officer, exploded seconds after being thrown into vacant lot. Death toll could have been very high.
- 11 Oct. - Egyptian MIG-21 shot down in dog fight over Sinai desert
- 12 Oct. - 24 members of Fatah gang, thought to be responsible for recent outrages in Jerusalem including abortive cinema bomb, arrested. Gang possessed large quantities of arms, explosives, 5 vehicles, radios, etc.

- 13 Oct. - Two Israeli border policemen wounded when their jeep ran across and exploded a mine, near Kfar Ruppin.
- 14 Oct. - (Yom Kippur Day) - Artillery duel with Jordanians who opened fire near town of Beth Shean.
- 21 Oct. - Egyptian missiles sink Israeli destroyer - 47 men lost and 91 wounded
- 22 Oct. - Eleven saboteurs, trained by Syria, captured in cave near Gilboa
- 24 Oct. - Egyptian mortar barrage provoked Israeli artillery response which shelled two refineries in Suez and destroyed an estimated 80% of Egypt's oil refinery capacity.
- 25 Oct. - Two Israeli soldiers killed and two wounded in clash with infiltrators from Jordan.

The largest UJA Study Mission ever to be organized, almost 600 persons, was in Israel during the time in October that several of these episodes occurred - most notably, the sinking of the Israeli destroyer and the shelling of the Egyptian oil refineries in Suez. The members of the mission handled themselves admirably. Morale was high, everyone adhered to schedule, no one cancelled early and left for home. They went on with their work, travelled to the new territories, and set an inspiring example of serious devotion to duty.

The Mission had a most thorough briefing by the leaders of Israel, who spoke frankly, in the mood of brother to brother, in the mood of the unity and solidarity which has existed since June. Perhaps the best way to summarize what was said is to select some relevant quotations from the speeches.

ESHKOL

"The war is over, but the emergency is still with us.

"The war is behind us - but it has not ended.

"I am not at all certain that the war is behind us and not ahead of us too."

EBAN

"Whereas the first six days of creation were mercifully followed by a day of rest, Israel's six days of battle brought us no repose, but rather the immediate opening of a new and no less crucial struggle for security and peace.

"Never never again shall Israel be brought to the situation that it knew on 5 June. This time we shall not be satisfied with anything less than peace; a specific, overt, public and contractual engagement by each Arab state based upon mutual recognition of sovereignty. No ceasefires, truces,

armistices, states of non-belligerency, but the normal peaceful relations that should apply between sovereign States. This is perhaps one of the strangest wars in history: we find the victors suing for peace and the vanquished calling for unconditional surrender.

"The old lines don't exist, there is only the ceasefire map, and there will never be another map, until the peace map is mutually agreed. Therefore, we shall stay where we are and we shall not move an inch until there is peace; and when there is peace, we shall undertake such movements as the agreed peace dispositions will dictate."

SAPIR

"Unfortunately, our victory has not yet brought us peace, as you very well know. We still have to maintain a security alertness, as these are days of neither peace nor war.

"Israel's expenditure on security is a higher percentage of our gross national product even than the 9½% which is the rate in the United States.

"For many years the UJA helped bring, house, educate and socially absorb, one and one quarter million immigrants who landed here during the previous 18 years of existence. In this 19th year we financed a war, while you accepted, through the emergency fund, the burden of these absorption expenses.

"We still have the burden of long-term absorption. In these trying days this is not a job we can do alone - certainly not in view of the security expenditures awaiting us. We continue to require your help. We cannot carry the burden of the normal economic growth together with the more-than-normal urgent need to replenish our arsenal."

ALLON

"Although we won a tremendous war of survival, we are still at war, from every point of view - exchanges of fire, naval battles, rearmament, casualties, and tremendous investment in new weapons.

"Our policy remains as it was in the past; not to seek a military victory but to avert the war altogether. This can be achieved only if our military strength is obvious not only to us but also to the other side.

"We don't want a fourth war - we are determined to turn the third war into the last one if we can. But sometimes, to avert a war is more costly than even to win it."

PINCUS

"We know that the Arab world and the Arab leadership believe that they can succeed in the fourth round if they time it correctly. Their re-arming has been at a pace that beggars description. 80% of the Egyptian material has already been replaced.

"The harsh reality is that we are faced in Israel with the enormous relief of knowing that there is no knife any longer at our jugular vein, as there was on June 5. But we know, too, that maybe we are on the verge of our greatest struggle, because it may be the decisive struggle.

"All of you know that prior to the war we were in the throes of an economic crisis, which has enormous social consequences. Our unemployment problem isn't over. There are hundreds of thousands of people who are illiterate. There are three hundred thousand people described by a prominent social worker as living below the poverty line.

"You will see gradually - I've already felt it - a running down in the development towns at the kindergarten level, at the feeding level, at the secondary education level. You will see more and more where the weakest members of the community - the hundreds of thousands of new immigrants - are going to be hurt most.

"There is a job for the government to do; defense, arms, all the things that a government is obliged to do. Bringing Jews here, destitute Jews, giving them the right to live, the opportunity to live a dignified life: that's the job of the free Jewish world.

"And the free Jewish world accepted it on paper. After 20 years of statehood, the Israeli taxpayer has taken on a greater share of that work which should have been done by the Jews outside.

"They were at our throats, and we answered. They are readying themselves again. I hope and pray that you will understand that the dimensions of the emergency today are no smaller than they were in June; in a very real sense they are greater."

SUMMARY OF POSITION TODAY

1. No peace - Arabs show not slightest willingness to talk.
2. Arabs rearming rapidly - faster than anyone believed possible. Egyptians already re-supplied by Russia up to 80% of June losses. Syria also. Only Jordan not yet replaced aircraft.
3. El-Fatah gangs of saboteurs constantly infiltrating, planting mines and explosives. Many Israeli casualties. Police continue to round them up. So far 300 captured - but many more may be loose.
4. Boldness of attack on destroyer "Elath," using Russian missiles, is dangerous sign. Ship was in international waters.
5. Cairo has announced evacuation of civilians from towns of Ismailia and Suez - already over 200,000 have been moved - and is preparing to evacuate Port Said. This is another dangerous sign.
6. United States government has reiterated its statement of last 19 June. Eban met with Johnson on 24 October and said it was the best talk he has ever had with Mr. Johnson.
7. Israeli policy is to remain where she is, holding all territory, until Arabs are ready to talk peace. This may mean a long wait.
8. Israel must replace the losses of June war - and even more than that, in order to deter Arabs from attempting fourth round. She must do it quickly in face of Arab rearming.
9. U. S. State Department announced on 24 October that Israel will get Skyhawk fighter planes. These must be paid for. The announcement included Morocco, Libya, Lebanon, Tunisia and Saudi Arabia as being also eligible to receive planes. Jordan omitted.
10. Total cost of Israel military security needs will be a higher percentage of her gross national product even than the 9½% of the United States which includes the tremendous expenditures in Vietnam.
11. Social problems in Israel continue: high unemployment, illiteracy, economic weakness in development towns among new immigrants, poverty.
12. Immigration into Israel continues; many Jews in North African Moslem countries whose lives were affected, even endangered during June, have left those countries and gone to France and Italy, from whence they come to Israel - and many come directly. Estimated that at least 20,000 will be coming in the year ahead.
13. Israel cannot maintain double burden of fantastic security costs and sizeable social welfare costs. Latter job is really responsibility of free world Jewry.

In addition to the overwhelming magnitude of the military-political situation, there are two other aspects of contemporary life which we must not overlook. One is the condition of Jews outside Israel, particularly, in the Moslem countries and the other is the cluster of social problems inside Israel involving a large underprivileged portion of the population.

Concerning the first point, the Joint Distribution Committee has issued a report of the status in various countries:

- Morocco Tension is widespread among Jews, in spite of the friendly attitude of the King. Many are leaving. There are no exact figures -- but approximately 10,000 middle-class people departed as soon as they could. There was a boycott against Jewish-owned business. Trade unions were pressing for the exclusion of Jews from employment in government and private industry. Loss of income has resulted in an increase of relief help required.
- Tunisia There was widespread mob violence on June 5. The chief synagogue was burned and gutted. Over 100 Jewish establishments were destroyed or damaged. Only the intervention of President Bourguiba prevented greater damage. There was an attempt to set the JDC office ablaze.
- Libya Almost the entire Jewish population has fled the country, mostly to Italy, from whence they are moving to Israel and seeking resettlement elsewhere, through the United Hias Service. Most of the Jewish businesses were destroyed by fire.
- Egypt Factual information is scarce - but apparently hundreds of Jews are still in prison, being held under appalling conditions.

There is one new situation in the JDC picture. For the first time in eighteen years, the JDC is now enabled to bring assistance in a systematic fashion to the Jews in Rumania. A basic relief program will aid the most needy through the Federation of Jewish Communities, headed by Chief Rabbi Moses Rosen. The program will assist those unable to work, due to sickness or age; those whose income is below a very minimum standard; and those who have no children to help them, either in Rumania or abroad. Within these very stringent criteria, over 2000 cases received cash assistance in August. Other forms of help consist of meals served in Kosher canteens, winter clothing, wood for heating, religious supplies (for there is complete religious freedom in Rumania) and housekeeping services for the bedridden. The main interest of the Jews of Rumania is to emigrate and reunite with their families, but it is good to know that as a result of the understanding attitude of the Rumanian government, we are also now able to offer these welfare aids.

Regarding the social problems inside Israel, there is a volume to be written. Suffice it to say that there are hundreds of millions of dollars required in the areas of immigrant transportation, housing, occupational training (ORT is doing a wonderful job), education at all levels, health services, welfare needs and agricultural settlements. These areas of work, so broadly categorized, do not describe the human problems at all. An unemployed, illiterate immigrant, with a large family, living in overcrowded quarters, is a statistic, when you describe him as one of the 300,000 people living below the poverty line. But he is a human being, when you describe him as a father, bewildered at his inability to control his children, worried because he cannot feed them well, frightened because they may become school dropouts, anguished at how drab their lives are in the barren town in which they live.

Israel was united in war. Enemy fire killed Ashkenazi and Sephardi boys with equal impartiality. In death there was no barrier or discrimination. They lie peacefully side by side in the National Military Cemetery. But in order for this to be so in life, as well as in sacrificial death, even greater exertions must be made in favor of the underprivileged. There must be one Israel in peace as well as in war.

I think the Mission members understood what they saw and heard. Edward Ginsberg, of Cleveland, Associate General Chairman of the UJA, speaking at the opening session said: "There is a new challenge and a new task to be met. We are coming face to face with the realization that victory has not yet been followed by peace and that until there is real peace there is no victory." Night after night in small groups, he led the discussions, as the mission members sought to understand the realities and grappled with their consciences and their personal responsibilities.

In a magnificent speech at the final dinner, which was interrupted often by heavy applause, Max Fisher, the General Chairman, summed up in stirring words, the feelings of the Mission. Responding to the speech of the Prime Minister, calling for increased help, Mr. Fisher, who made us all very proud by the forceful manner in which he represented American Jewry, said:

"Standing together with you on the great heights Israel reached in June, we not only can look back, but we can also look ahead. The vistas ahead are exciting and inspiring.

"We see a day when Jews will come here from the free world and from places that are now cut off. We see an Israel that is economically strong and independent, and we will work with you to make it so. There was just one Israel in war, and we shall help you build one Israel in peace. We see an Israel of superb achievement in all the accomplishments of man. And finally, we see an Israel at peace at last. We believe that goal can be won.

"Our answer, Mr. Eshkol, is simply this: we who have travelled with you this far, will travel with you to final victory. Everything we can do, we will do. You have said the emergency continues, our answer is the Emergency Fund will also continue. I say this, not only for myself but also for this great audience and the communities they represent, from coast to coast. These communities through the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, have already voted to support UJA by conducting another great Emergency Fund.

"And I pledge you, then, that each one of us here will make it his personal responsibility to see that the Emergency Fund measures up in every way to the great days of June.

"Mr. Prime Minister, we come here because we are very proud of Israel. We will leave happy in the knowledge that you are also a little proud of us."

One hundred and sixty six gifts were made, with the approach of giving more to the regular campaign as well as more to the emergency fund, and the results of these gifts are as follows:



JORDAN EXTENDS SUPPORT TO TERRORISTS

Israel Note to Security Council Lists Violations

In a note addressed to the President of the Security Council on November 6, 1967, Israel has drawn attention to the active support and encouragement Jordan is extending to armed marauders operating in Israel from bases on Jordanian territory. This support, the note emphasizes, constitutes "a flagrant violation of the obligations Jordan had undertaken by accepting the cease fire resolution," and goes on to say that "It is the policy of the Government of Israel to observe the cease fire resolution on the basis of complete reciprocity."

The full text of the note, signed by Israel's Delegate to the United Nations, Mr. Gideon Raphael, reads as follows:

" On instructions from my Government, I have the honour to bring to the attention of the Security Council a new series of cease fire violations committed by Jordan.

In my letter of 20 October, addressed to the Secretary General (AX/6871, S/8202), particulars were given concerning a number of incidents perpetrated by persons coming from Jordan, as well as concerning the belligerent and provocative attitude adopted by the Government of Jordan which actively encourages these armed attacks.

Since that date, a number of further such incidents have taken place including the following:

1. On 24th October, at approximately 0010 hours local time, a group of marauders coming from Jordan, was intercepted East of the village of Tirat Zvi, at a distance of approximately one kilometer from the Jordan River. As a result of the exchange of fire two Israeli soldiers were seriously wounded. The group of marauders consisting of eight or nine persons withdrew to Jordan.
2. The same night, 24th October, at approximately 0130 hours, another group of marauders coming from Jordan was intercepted by an Israeli patrol, near Khirbet as Salih at a distance of 700 meters West of the Jordan River, North of the Damia Bridge. In the exchange of fire two Israeli soldiers were killed and two were wounded. One of the marauders was killed and the others withdrew, leaving behind one bazooka and one submachine gun.
3. On 26th October, at approximately 0120 hours, a group of marauders coming from Jordan was intercepted at a distance of two kilometers from the Jordan River, Southwest of the Umm Shart Bridge. As a result of the exchange of fire two marauders were killed, the others fled to Jordan leaving behind two submachine guns.
4. On the night of 29 - 30th October, two groups of marauders, after having crossed the cease fire line along the Jordan River, were engaged in demolition activities and shooting at Israeli traffic in the Beit Shean Valley, at a distance of 1 - 2 kilometers from Jordan. The marauders withdrew to Jordan.
5. On the night of 30 - 31 October, a group of marauders was intercepted west of the Jordan River after they had crossed it. The marauders withdrew to Jordan under covering fire from Jordanian military forces deployed on the East Bank of the Jordan River.
6. On 31st October, two plastic land mines were found in a farm track near the village of Kfar Ruppin. Footprint of three persons were found leading from the site to the Jordan River, at a distance of less than 100 meters.
7. On 3rd November, a military vehicle struck a land mine planted in a track 2.5 kilometers South of the Allenby Bridge. Another unexploded mine was found in the same area.

8. Today, 5th November, at approximately 0210 hours, three demolition charges were exploded at a silo and grain storage, at the village of Sde Eliahu, at a distance of approximately 3.5 kilometers from the Jordan River, causing extensive damage to both buildings. The group of marauders who laid the demolition charges was intercepted on its way back to Jordan at 0400 hours, by Israeli forces at a distance of a few hundred meters West of the Jordan River. During the exchange of fire the marauders returned over the Jordan River to Jordan. Jordanian military forces deployed along the East Bank of the River gave covering fire to the retreating marauders.

At approximately 0520 hours, Jordanian military forces deployed near the route of withdrawal of the marauders, opened machine gun and recoilless gun fire at Israel forces investigating the incident on the West Bank of the river. Subsequently artillery fire was opened at the village of Maoz Chayim, at a distance of five kilometers to the North. Fire was returned. As a result of the Jordanian shelling, one Israeli was wounded and the cultural center and the infirmary at the village of Maoz Chayim were severely damaged.

In his letter of 18th October 1967, (S/8198), the Permanent Representative of Jordan expressed encouragement to the perpetrators of acts of armed violence against Israel. The incidents now listed indicate beyond doubt that the Government of Jordan is going further, and is giving active support and succour to armed marauders using its territory as their base of operations.

The Government of Israel views with grave concern the continuation of the encouragement and assistance given by the Jordanian authorities to the perpetrators of these armed attacks. This is a flagrant violation of the obligations Jordan had undertaken by accepting the cease fire resolutions.

It is the policy of the Government of Israel to observe the cease fire resolutions on the basis of complete reciprocity.

I have the honour to request that this letter be circulated as a document of the Security Council."

In doing so the Finance Minister emphasized that the organizations are asked to refrain from any reference to the emergency or war related needs in their publicity for their own campaigns "in any form".





Uses of the Israel Emergency Fund

In 1966-67, the UIA allocated over \$34.3 million for programs in Israel. By contrast, in the current fiscal year (1967-68) the allocations by UIA from both regular funds and the IEF will be over \$200 million.

The needs will continue in 1968 at levels similar to those faced in 1967.

Israel still faces the problem of absorption of over 250,000 immigrants, primarily in the development towns -- a problem which becomes more difficult with the passage of time -- and especially so with the arrival in recent months of thousands of Jews who had to flee from Moslem areas in the wake of the Six-Day War.

Welfare Funds will continue to raise funds for the health, welfare and related programs financed through the UJA, the UIA and the JDC.

Sales of Israel Bonds are for investment purposes and do not deal with these needs except insofar as productive investments help make employment possible in the economic absorption of immigrants.

Primacy of Israel's Needs

One of the major factors which aided in attaining the unprecedented gifts in 1967 was the universal recognition by Jewish individuals and organizations alike that Israel's crisis required cooperation in limiting other appeals so that the road would be clear for the major emphasis on the Israel Emergency Fund.

Israel's crisis continues. Cooperation by other Jewish organizations is again needed to assure the primacy of the IEF. Israel's officials have called upon all organizations to refrain from "emergency" efforts.

Self-Support Is Central Aim

The aim of American Jewish aid is to help bring Israel's immigrants to economic and social self-sufficiency.

This means that productive jobs must be created to take the place of relief and work relief, and to train and re-train the partially employable. Those not employable -- the aged, the sick and the handicapped -- are aided by the Jewish Agency, by JDC-Malben and by ORT, with major emphasis on immigrants. The government has generally carried the responsibility of welfare programs for the settled population.

There has never been a neat division between immigrants and others in Israel because immigrants since 1948 constitute a total of 1,260,000 and represent more than half of the Jewish population.

The internal resources within Israel have not made it possible to provide welfare services at the same level to all. The aged immigrants have benefitted from the JDC-Malben program more than the settled population.

As a result, Israelis are looking to JDC for extension of its leadership, in cooperation with other agencies, to strengthen services to all of Israel's aged population, its chronically ill population, the mentally ill and the handicapped.

Israel is beginning to explore how all existing resources for the aid of immigrants can be related so as to most effectively speed absorption.

Debt

The programs of the Jewish Agency have been hobbled by a massive debt of well over \$300 million which requires some \$25 million annually for servicing. This accounts for over 20 per cent of expenditures.

If means can be found for amortizing and liquidating this debt on an orderly basis, there would be available part or most of the \$25 million for programs of immigrant absorption.

Migration

While immigration to Israel in the last two years was at a level below that of preceding years, an upturn took place in the second half of 1967 as thousands of Jews in Moslem areas left the areas of hazard. This movement is expected to continue.

Movement from Eastern Europe, including the Soviet Union, is at a low level but past experience indicates that it can be stepped up with little advance notice if the respective governments decide to permit a higher flow.

Needs in New Areas

Israel is attempting to provide health, education and welfare services in the occupied areas on the same basis as in the pre-June borders.

One of the major problems is the different price levels of the two economies, and the relative absence of tax revenues in the new areas to finance these services.

While it is too early to determine the exact costs to Israel, these needs will cost Israel millions of dollars.

Higher Education

About 27,000 students are enrolled currently -- twice as many as five years ago -- and enrollment is still on the rise.

The government has provided more than half of operating costs, but current stringencies make it doubtful that it can continue to provide support at this level.

Contributed support from the U.S. has always been an important factor in financing these institutions. An even greater proportion of funds will now be sought from contributions.

Major capital fund and special fund drives in the U.S. have exceeded contributions for operations.

All of the appeals except the University-Technion maintenance drives are conducted separately. Welfare Funds have expressed support for the idea of greater coordination and possibly joint fund raising, but specific proposals toward this end have not yet been developed.

Dear Mr. Pincus:

During the last 50 years it has been the historic task of the Jewish Agency, acting on behalf of Jews throughout the world and by their generosity, to play a major role in the task of financing and administering the immigration and resettlement of Jews in this country and of helping them to become self-supporting, productive, citizens. For many years the Jewish Agency contributed also a significant part of the cost of maintaining vital institutions of higher learning and many other cultural educational and recreational institutions and organizations essential in the integration of newcomers into the life of the country, and for the establishment of a civilized standard of living. An important part was played by the Jewish Agency also in providing extensive facilities and services for the hundreds of thousands of persons whom it brought into the country from the DP camps and Eastern Europeans, Asian and African countries where life had become untenable and dangerous for them. It was always the intention of the Jewish Agency to provide all such assistance until such time as the immigrant and refugees had reached economic and educational levels which would render such assistance no longer necessary.

However, despite the continuing generosity and concern of Jews throughout the free world, the resources at the disposal of the Jewish Agency, including very substantial sums of borrowed funds, proved to be far short of the actual minimum needs of the immigrants who came into Israel. The deficiency therefore had to be met by the Government of Israel from its own resources. Thus the Government of Israel and the Israeli taxpayers have in recent years been carrying the major part of the cost of immigrant housing, agricultural colonization, higher education, social services, assistance to the aged and the handicapped although the Government is under no legal obligation to do so, and in the face of very heavy financial burdens imposed upon the Government by the needs of the country's economic development and security requirements.

Due to the responsibilities now thrust upon the Government of Israel, it has reluctantly come to the conclusion that it can no longer continue such assistance. Accordingly, as I have already advised you orally, I hereby notify the Jewish Agency that as of July 1, 1967 the Government will have no funds with which to make any contribution to the Agency's programs of resettlement and rehabilitation, or to make any

subventions to a long list of educational, health, cultural and social welfare activities in Israel which it had hoped to make during the current fiscal year. The prospects are that this situation will prevail for a number of years to come. A list of these items will be furnished to the Jewish Agency.

The Government of Israel hopes that the Jewish communities outside of Israel will place at the disposal of the Agency the means required to meet the needs created by the situation described above. The Government will, of course, carry on the functions imposed upon it by law. For all other needs - immigrant housing, the establishment and consolidation of agricultural settlements, relief and welfare services, pre-kindergarten and post elementary education to the children of needy families; adult training and education, and the support of institutions of higher learning, must, as in years past, become the primary responsibility of the Jewish Agency. We hope that you will fully and frankly inform the Jewish communities and appeal to them for their assistance and cooperation. The Government will, of course, give the Jewish Agency every possible assistance.

Dear Mr. Lowy:

I am writing this letter in the friendly spirit of common concern which motivates the Jewish communities of both our countries to achieve the best possible campaign results on behalf of Israel at this particular time.

All of us realize the urgent necessity of striving for as large an Emergency Fund as possible. In that connection, two matters are significant: the goal and the approach. As for the goal, we have made a decision in the United States not to set a goal. Some individual cities may set local goals for themselves, but there will be no national goal - just as there was no goal set in June 1967.

The second matter - the approach - is to ask each contributor to give more, both to the regular campaign and the emergency campaign. This approach is the technique which will help set the sights. I am enclosing the fund-raising speech I made Thursday night, at the National Inaugural Dinner, in which you can see that this is the specific request we are making.

In many cases, larger contributors to the Emergency Fund, in the five and six figure bracket, have increased beyond what they gave in June; in many cases there is at least a repeat; in some cases there are cuts, but these are less serious, when the starting asking figure is the 1967 level.

Once a lower goal is announced, then it becomes impossible to adopt the approach described above. Therefore, I am bringing this to your attention, in the hope that you in Canada can find it possible to go along with the United States and not announce a goal lower than the actual campaign achievement of June. It will make our work more difficult when it is learned that Canada is being asked for less. Let us at least ask for the largest amount possible and this will help ensure achieving as much as possible.

Third, Justice Minister Shapiro can be most useful after finishing Canada but we must be told his exact dates in order plan for him. Will also put him in as many cities as possible.

Fourth, must have both Dayan and Eban in March for two weeks each. Suggest Dayan first half and Eban second half but could be reversed if necessary.

Fifth, regarding Generals and other army personnel requested previously, must put responsibility for this on you. Complete list of senior officers requested by us is known to army manpower office as well as additional junior officers we also requested.

On December 6, 1967, Mr. Duratt telephoned to the writer of this letter and requested a statement concerning the "Israel Emergency Fund" and its relationship to the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. The following statement is submitted in response to that request:

The "Israel Emergency Fund" is not a separate legal entity, but the name of a campaign conducted by the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. It is the Israel Emergency Fund Campaign of the United Jewish Appeal, Inc.

The Israel Emergency Fund Campaign of the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. (UJA) is no different than prior UJA campaigns conducted by UJA for the purpose of supplementing its regular annual campaigns in order to obtain additional funds to meet increased humanitarian needs. Thus, to supplement its regular annual campaigns in 1956, 1957, 1958, 1959 and 1960, UJA concurrently conducted in each of those years supplemental campaigns called respectively the "Special Survival Fund," the "Emergency Rescue Fund," the "Rescue Fund" and the "Special Fund."

As in the case of the "Israel Emergency Fund" these prior UJA campaigns were not separate legal entities but simply and solely the names given by UJA to supplemental campaigns conducted by it. In each of the years from 1956 to 1960 inclusive in which the foregoing supplemental campaigns were conducted by UJA, contributors were requested to contribute not less than their customary donations to the regular annual campaign and, at the same time, an additional gift to the supplemental campaign for that year. The additional gifts were solicited solely for the reason that they were required for UJA's charitable purposes in order to meet additional humanitarian needs that could not be satisfied on the basis of customary regular campaign contributions. In the years from 1956 to 1960 this method of campaigning proved to be successful in raising needed additional funds for UJA's charitable purposes.

The Israel Emergency Fund Campaign of UJA is precisely the same as the supplemental campaigns conducted by UJA from 1956 to and including 1960. Since June 1967 it has been conducted concurrently with the regular UJA 1967 campaign. Contributors have been requested to donate not less than their customary contributions to the regular UJA 1967 campaign and, at the same time, to make additional gifts to the supplementary UJA Israel Emergency Fund Campaign. These additional gifts have been requested for precisely the same exclusively charitable purposes for which UJA customarily conducts its regular annual campaigns and for which funds raised by it are customarily used.

The funds raised as a result of UJA's Israel Emergency Fund Campaign have been delivered by it, as in the case of prior supplemental campaigns, to UJA's beneficiary, the United Israel Appeal, Inc., which, as previously reported, is a domestic corporation organized and operated exclusively for charitable purposes, with tax exempt status pursuant to Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and which administers the funds so received by it from UJA for its exclusively charitable purposes.

It is intended that the Israel Emergency Fund Campaign will be continued by UJA on the same basis during the 1968 campaign year concurrently with its 1968 regular annual campaign.

As in the case of prior supplemental campaigns conducted by UJA the supplemental Israel Emergency Fund Campaign of UJA is required for UJA's charitable purposes because they cannot be satisfied on the basis of customary contributions to the regular campaign as a result of the following circumstances:

Because charitable contributions from outside Israel, including funds raised in the United States through campaigns conducted by the UJA were insufficient, the people of Israel were obliged to furnish a significant part of the cost of the philanthropic and educational needs of immigrants and refugees.

The support, within Israel, of immigration to Israel and of the care and absorption of immigrants who have been brought to Israel with funds raised by UJA is no longer available due to the events, which are common knowledge, that occurred in June 1967 and that have transpired subsequent to June 1967.

As a result of these events the welfare needs of the hundreds of thousands of immigrants that the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. helped to bring to Israel have enormously increased. At the same time, because of these events, the people of Israel are no longer able to furnish the support that they have given in the past to those welfare needs or to the migration of people in danger and in need who seek a haven within Israel. As a consequence, since the entire burden of immigration to Israel, as


