





SCENARIO 1

THE TWO MOSQUES AND WAR

- 1. A Gush Emunim underground terrorist cell blows up the Mosques of Omar and El Aksa at midnight. Their purpose is to reclaim the Temple Mount, rebuild the Temple and thus hasten the coming of the Messiah.
- 2. Arabs in East Jerusalem react immediately and violently, bringing out secret caches of arms, and start shooting Jews. The police cannot handle it. The army is called in. Street fighting escalates.
- Within the hour, attacks start in the West Bank, against Jewish settlements; and in Gaza hundreds of thousands of enraged Arabs quickly overwhelm the few Jewish settlements nearby. The Army is now fighting on three fronts, as it were.
- 4. The Government is called into session. The Chief of Staff reports that Arab warplanes may be expected at first light, in the next few hours. He asks for permission to launch a pre-emptive strike immediately, on all Arab airfields, to destroy their planes on the ground.
- 5. The Government announces its horror and revulsion at the destruction of the Mosques, and orders the police and army to arrest all known leaders of the Gush.

- 6. It is now 7 p.m. in Washington and New York. The news breaks open on the evening news broadcasts. The President of the U.S. telephones the Prime Minister of Israel and asks for an explanation plus a statement of intent as to Israel's next immediate moves.
- 7. American Jewish leadership is in shock. American public opinion, including Jewish, congeals very quickly against Israel for "this outrageous act of religious fanatacism." The White House issues a statement calling upon Israel to apprehend the criminals; to exercise restraint in handling the Arabs; to refrain from military action; not to fire on Arab civilians; and immediately to initiate some diplomatic moves to mollify Arab world-wide opinion.
- 8. Jewish leaders from every community in America are called to an emergency meeting for the following morning, in Washington, D.C.
- 9. At midnight, New York time (7 a.m. in Israel) the news breaks that all-out war has started: Israel has destroyed 300 Arab aircraft on seven airfields; aerial dogfights are taking place in all the skies of the Middle East; four Israeli airfields have been bombed, as well as Tel Aviv and Jerusalem, where damage is extensive. News commentators report rumors that missile exchanges

against major population centers will shortly begin.

- 10. At the Jewish leadership meeting the next day, what conclusions and actions would you recommend in order to:
 - demonstrate condemnation for the original act
 - b. rally U.S. Jewish opinion behind Israel
 - c. persuade U.S. government not to uncouple from Israel



SCENARIO 2

THE RISE OF THE AMERICAN SUPREMACY PARTY

The date is November 9, 1994. America is in the fourth year of an economic recession/turned depression. Unemployment exceeds 10%. Inflation is running rampant. Interest rates are approaching 20%, luring Japanese investors. Taxes have reverted to pre-Reagan levels to make-up for the revenue shortfall of a depressed economy.

The nation's morale has sunk to an unprecedented low point, not only because of the economic morass, but because of the realization that America might never be able to recover sufficiently to compete against economically dominant Japan. The nations at the rim of the Pacific Basin have become America's permanent creditor and "big brother" -- keeping America from economic collapse in return for higher and higher interest rates and control of ever greater portions of American equity.

A social-backlash, which began in late '91, has picked up steam. People are frustrated, angry, seeking radical change and a suitable scapegoat. The American Supremacy Party (ASP), begun at the turn of the decade by a group of skinheads, Klan and Neo-Nazi members, has broadened its appeal to embrace the masses of unemployed and the black and Hispanic communities which have been most directly affected by the adverse economic situation. Coming almost out-of-nowhere, this fledgling party captures 6 Senate and 31 Congressional seats, plus numerous local offices in the '94 elections -- primarily in the South, Midwest and California.

The party's slogan is "American for Americans", by which they mean to exclude all Asians; their flag is a black cross superimposed over the Stars and Stripes, by which they mean to exclude all Jews -- the group they deem responsible for undermining America's strength through their endemic lust, greed and corruption.

Their platform is straightforward and simple: bring America back to its nativistic, Christian roots and America will return to its former greatness. To do this, the party advocates:

- the boycott of all Jewish and Asian businesses and enterprises; the support, instead of all true Christian business ventures.
- 2. the expelling of Jewish and Asian students from the Universities (which "everyone knows" they have dominated via a nationwide conspiracy); the admission of Christian-true students only in their stead.
- the passage of laws prohibiting the marriage of true-Christians with Jews or Asians and,
- 4. the cutoff of trade with the countries of the

 Pacific Basin and the cutoff of trade and aid to

 Israel.

In addition, True Christian Americans are "urged" to identify themselves by displaying the party's flag prominently in front of their homes and businesses and by wearing an ASP armband to social functions.

Although the party does not publicly call for violence or vigilante action against Jews or Asians, an increasing number of violent incidents have occurred nationwide reportedly led by the skinhead troopers of the American Supremacy Party.

An added element in the national and Jewish nervousness is the trauma of an unconnected but relevant fact -- namely, the assassination of President Bush by a deranged South American drug dealer and the elevation of Vice-President Quayle to the Oval office. The press has made much of the fact that Quayle's grandparents, who exerted a strong influence on young Quayle, had close connections with the John Birch Society -- a group whose fundamental views were not so disimilar from the ASP.

The North American network of Jewish Students has organized a group of young, armed Jews to protect the members of the Jewish Community. The ADL, AJC and AJCee is challenging the constitutionality of this new political party and has condemned the Armed Jewish Student Network for sinking to the levels of their enemies. The Conference of Presidents has appointed a special committee to study the rise of this party and to come back with recommendations within 90 days. Rabbi Meir Kahane is travelling across the length and breadth of the United States urging Jews to liquidate their assets and come on Aliyah "before it's too late".

Your community is in an uproar. As President of your Federation, you must decide what course of action to take and which group or individual to support. What course of action would you urge your community to take and why?

SCENARIO 3

WHO COMES FIRST--THE YOUNG OR THE OLD?

I. THE SCHOOL

A. A 44-member blue ribbon "Commission on Jewish Education in North America" issues its report after two years of study (1988-1990). The report is totally devastating. While applauding the increasing acceptance of the basic belief that education is the only antidote to assimilation, the report contains the deepest criticism of the present Jewish educational system in the U.S. and Canada.

It provides shocking details on the small percentage of children receiving any form of Jewish education; the vast ignorance even of those youngsters who are enrolled; the low salaries and standards of the teachers in the system; the anemic curricula; the blurred attitudes of the students; the weak sense of Jewish identity and pride; the minimal amount of factual knowledge of Bible and history; the lack of familiarity with the Hebrew language.

B. The local Federation's long-range planning

committee, which has spent a year searching for the key program which will enhance the sense of Jewish identity, is suddenly galvanized by the blue-ribbon report and a decision clicks into place: education is the key to identity and the committee will therefore concentrate on analyzing the community's overall educational system, from kindergarten to adult, looking for areas in which major improvements can be effectuated.

Another year's hard work produces a series of specific recommendations for all the various K-8 schools day, afternoon, congregational, communal. These recommendations involve deep and serious changes in curriculum strengthening, salary improvements, management, parental involvement, etc. And the corner-stone of the whole program is a proposal to build a boarding school for grades 9-13, according to a plan developed by an American-Israeli educator.

The Boarding School plan is based on the construction of a high-quality Academy, similar to Andover, Exeter and the great public schools in England, in which a future leadership can be shaped. The student body would be international

and the languages of instruction would be dual - English and Hebrew.

Such a school might take 5 years or more to plan, fund, construct in stages, recruit students and teachers carefully, and shape the curriculum toward a completely integrated Jewish and secular course of study.

AMERICAN IEWISH

The proponents of this idea believe that one such school, if it really were to achieve the quality described above, would revolutionize the whole system. Many communities would envy it and duplicate it. Middle and primary schools would copy some of its features: small classes, better teachers, more demanding curriculum, etc. The entire level would rise.

The long-range committee concluded its work with a ringing affirmation to the Board of the Federation that this was the path to the future, for it was the only method by which to inculcate the students with a maximum Jewish education (including Hebrew, love for Israel, knowledge of history and religion, understanding of Bible and Mishna, a strong sense of Jewish values, and a commitment to work for the preservation of the community and the

people) and a maximum general education which would enable them to be admitted to the finest universities in the world.

II. THE HOME FOR AGED

A. Simultaneous with the long-range planning committee, another local Federation committee had been dealing with a complex problem which had surfaced as the result of a recent tragic death in the Community Home for the Aged. The living alone, over-80, father of one of the prominent families in town had choked to death in his room on a hard crust of bread, which could easily have been dislodged and his life saved had there been someone near who could have performed the Heimlich maneuver.

It had been felt for some time that the Home, built 40 years earlier, was obsolete in many ways. There were no emergency call buttons for summoning aid; no medical orderlies permanently stationed on every floor; no ramps for wheelchairs; no modern fire prevention systems or alarms; and a host of other deficiencies. It was obvious that new structures should be built, incorporating all the new devices and methods which were available today. But the hesitation and constant

discussion over the funding question resulted in paralysis and nothing was done.

The death galvanized the town, and action followed swiftly. The Federation Committee on Aging summoned experts, and a completed plan was prepared for the Federation Board. The land was available on the large campus which the Federation had wisely acquired a decade earlier. The leading architectural firm offered, pro bono, a most attractive scheme, including high and low rises, cottages, a synagogue and recreation halls. All that was needed was formal Board approval, plus a fund-raising plan and construction could start. The death, while tragic, reversed the previous paralysis.

III. THE CONFLICT

A. As a result of very poor planning, both reports were presented at the same Federation Board meeting. This could easily have been avoided by an alert and politically sensitive director.

Unfortunately, he did not check the agenda, or did not foresee the potential conflict.

The Long Range Planning Committee spoke first and presented its proposal by invoking the whole

weight of past history and Jewish future existence. Several members spoke about the responsibility of stemming the wave of assimilation leading to disappearance. Their words resonated with the call of the Biblical Prophets.

The Committee on Aged, shocked by the sudden realization that they were in an adversarial position, discarded its carefully prepared presentation, which had been crafted in a low-key fashion, based upon the premise that everyone understood a new facility was needed, and rebutted instead with passion and vigor, invoking the memory of the funeral which hundreds had attended, demanding that sanctity of life must take precedence over education of children.

The conflict was so shocking - the advocates of each position so vocal - that it was obvious no decision was possible that night. Threats were made involving withholding of contributions; tenets of Judaism were hurled, reminding everyone that a town without a school was a town without God; other tenets, rooted in the commandments to honor father and mother, were hurled back. It was like a verbal artillery duel. No previous

meeting had ever escalated so quickly and sharply into such a polarization. It was clear that something very deep was happening - perhaps it was the Freudian generational struggle. The community began to tear itself apart. Obviously, both projects could not be undertaken simultaneously. One would have to wait.

IV. The Resolution

- A. A small group of lawyers, accustomed to mediation, published its opinion that there were three possible ways to deal with the problem:
 - Defuse the tension by tabling the projects for a year, to allow a cooling-off period.
 - Fix a date, preferably within 60 days, for a vote by the Board, allowing advocates on both sides to lobby as hard as they wished, in an effort to win a majority.
 - 3. Let the entire Jewish community decide, by means of a referendum, to be held within 6 months, which provides time to establish a set of rules - i.e. who may vote, how to phrase the questions, etc.
- C. Do you have any different suggestions.

SCENARIO 4

WHO WILL BE "THE JEWS"?

The year is 1999. You live in the imaginary metropolis called Lahadam, located in the far west of the United States. This city experienced a major economic boom in the 80's and 90's which attracted a massive inflow of professionals -- many of them, Jewish. The intermarriage rate for people under the age of 35 averaged 65% in the past 2 decades. Approximately 45% of non-Jewish partners converted, 95% of them did so through the liberal movements. At the present rate of intermarriage and family formation, it has been statistically projected that on December 31, 1999, the majority of this Jewish community of Lahadam will consist of people who are accepted as Jews by the Reform, Reconstructionist, and Liberal wing of the Conservative movements, but are not accepted as Jews by the Orthodox and Traditional wing of the Conservative movement.

In 1997, seeing this eventuality coming, the Rabbinical Council of America (RCA) and the Union of Traditional Conservative Judaism (UTCJ) appeal to the Reform and Reconstructionist movements to repeal their decisions regarding patrilineal descent and to use halachic standards in their conversions. Both latter movements reject this appeal as constituting unacceptable interference with their internal policies.

The RCA (Orthodox) and UTCJ (Conservative) vote that as of January 1, 2000, Jews from Lahadam shall lose the presumption of being Jewish since the statistical majority of the community is not halachically Jewish. They rule that no Orthodox or Traditional Rabbi may perform a marriage for Jews from Lahadam without an exhaustive genealogical check to prove that they are Jewish by halachic standards (as interpreted by the Orthodox and Traditional movements). The Conservative movement splits on the issue — the Traditional half siding with the Orthodox stand and the Liberal half aligning themselves with the Reform and Reconstructionist communities — who feel they are effectively being cast outside the camp of the Jewish people.

The national, international and local reaction to this impending communal split is vindictive and swift:

- The non-Orthodox camp form a unified national coalition calling for complete withdrawal of community funding for Orthodox and Traditional institutions in the United States and in Israel and the de-facto segregation of the Orthodox community.
- Orthodox position, write an open letter to American Jews
 warning them that if conversion is not given over to the
 exclusive domain of the Orthodox Rabbinate, they will issue
 a ruling that any non-Orthodox individual from the United
 States wishing to immigrate or marry in Israel, will have to
 go first through a conversion procedure under their

supervision or prove <u>conclusively</u> that they are Jewish, as defined by Orthodox Halachah.

- The Chairman of the National UJA, Mr. Amos Levtov, in a panicky atmosphere, telephones the Executive Director of the Lahadam Federation and tells him that the entire national campaign is in danger of collapse because of the enormous resentment by major givers of all the denominations at the sequence of events taking place in Lahadam.
- As the conflict escalates, local non-Orthodox Rabbis urge their congregants to withdraw their children from the community Hebrew Day school and enroll them instead in their own Congregational or like-minded denominational school.

 They condemn the Orthodox bahavior as schismatic and sectarian following the tragic examples of the Karaites and Saducees of ancient times. They warn that the Orthodox will be responsible for any split in the Jewish people which results.

Local Orthodox Rabbinic leadership, angered by the rhetoric of their non-Orthodox counterparts, issue a halachic directive calling on their constituents to deal henceforth with non-Orthodox Jews on the assumption that they are not, in fact, Jewish, thus:

- (1) limiting social intercourse with them,
- (2) banning marriage with them,
- (3) denying them burial in the local, Orthodoxcontrolled, Jewish cemetery.

Meanwhile, committees of the various local agencies in town,

such as the Jewish Children and Family Service, the JCC, the Old Age Home and The Jewish Hospital - not to mention the Federation - begin to find it impossible to conduct normal communal business because of the ugly mood resulting from the denominational polarization.

The alumni/ae members of the Lahadam Wexner Heritage Foundation seminar call an emergency one-day session to attempt to deal with this impending civil war. The following proposals are put on the table:

- 1) Allow and even encourage the denominational polarization to take place with all its fallout, so that a more honest albeit fragmented - realignment can arise in its wake. Two distinct Jewish communities - one Traditional and one Liberal would then form.
- Exercise their collective lay power -- in collaboration with other Wexner alumni around the United States -- to pressure the RCA and UTCJ to rescind their decision and to force the Liberal community to call off its retaliatory cut-off of Orthodox funding. These steps would at least restore the status quo ante.
- 2) Exercise their lay power to demand that the local rabbinic leadership of all denominations convene at a secluded site to hammer out a joint conversion standard and process. The role of the Wexner lay leaders at this "Camp David style" conference, would be to prod their own respective Rabbis

towards principled compromise, thus creating a breakthrough which could hopefully be a model for the rest of the country.

4) Start an international movement with appropriate Israeli and European counterpart groups to reconvene a "Sanhedrin" consisting of 71 leaders from all the denominations throughout Israel and The Diaspora, in order to attempt to realign Jewish life with Jewish law for the entire international Jewish community.

The Good Seminarian

everend Lee Hancock, the seminary pastor of the Union Theological Seminary, may work behind the scenes, but she can still fundamentally change other peoples' lives. She does it through the ministry, by confronting the powersthat-be. "I like the expression 'talking power to power,' " she says. "I don't perceive the ministry as a powerless institution. I think we have a responsibility to be a voice of rationality, unity and conscience."

The thirty-seven-year-old Presbyterian minister gets people to listen. "She has a lot of access to people who are making the decisions, people in the mayor's office and on the state level," explains Fred Davie, associate executive director of the Brooklyn Ecumenical Cooperative and a former colleague of Hancock's. "She has a lot of power at her fingertips, and she's not afraid to use it."

A few years ago Hancock used that clout to convince the city to open a residence for homeless PWAs (people with AIDS). She began negotiations with Victor Botnick when he was special assistant to the mayor for health and finished them with his successor, Caryn Schwab. Her calls to highly placed friends throughout the process unstuck the often logjammed talks. In September 1985

the city agreed to acquire the River Hotel on Christopher Street and to provide at least 50 percent of its operating budget. Bailey House opened in December 1986 and today is operating at 97 percent capacity.

Hancock credits the awesome if ambiguous presence of the Church behind her as key to her success with the city. But as Doug Dornan, executive director of the AIDS Resource Center, explains, Hancock is more than a church representative. "Lee is an incisive and articulate thinker," he says. "And she combines that with a profound sense of what is right and a way of [getting] people to share her sense of mission. In the corporate world, it would be called buying in."

Hancock's ability to forge coalitions and her wide network of contacts, achieved during ten years in the New York ministry (at Central Presbyterian Church, Judson Memorial Church and the Presbytery of New York City, the regional organization of 110 churches), are her trademarks. To find housing for PWAs, for example, Hancock cofounded the AIDS Resource Center in 1983 with a group comprising clergy of different faiths and the West Village bar crowd-including porn stars and guys in leather. "[She] asserted that it would be possible to work together," explains Dornan, and then, by tapping a variety of sources, she found spare rooms and apartments.

For the last two years Hancock's focus has been on education. At the presbytery, where she held the number two position of Lee Hancock, associate executive for educational ministries, she restructured

Orthodox Paradox

n ardent feminist who is also a dedi- Blu cated Orthodox Jew, Blu Greenberg Greenberg knows what it's like to embrace disparate worlds. Her essays and lectures on how to bridge the gap have won praise from women's rights advocates and Orthodox leaders alike. der Jew "She has emerged as a role model," says Susan Weidman Schneider, editor of the Jewish women's magazine Lilith.

But not everybody likes what Greenberg has to say. Orthodox Judaism is a faith that denies women the same rights as men-in prayer, education, community leadershipand Greenberg's call for equality is seen by some as threatening. Her first book, a collection of essays called On Women and Judaism (1981), was heresy to many Orthodox Jews, some of whom went so far as to label Greenberg a "Jezebel" for her viewsamong them, the belief that every woman is entitled to abortion. How to Run a Traditional Jewish Household (1983), Greenberg's best-known work, is a very untraditional guide to the Orthodox way in everything from prayer to birth control.

Greenberg prefers to remain a pioneer within the community rather than become a dissenter outside it. A rabbi's daughter, she was born, raised and schooled in Seattle's tightly knit Orthodox community; later she married Rabbi Irving Greenberg and had five children. "I'm continually reenergized by the Orthodox way of life," Greenberg says. "It has made me what I am. I always want to stay connected to that."

Though some consider her influence strongest among non-Orthodox Jews, Greenberg has lately felt greater acceptance from her own community. "I'm encouraged by signs of progress," she says, and rattles off some specifics-the emergence of women's prayer groups, the "tremendous growth in women's institutions of learning"-then stops, looking sheepish. "These sound like small signs," Greenberg says. But she adds that in the context of a 2,000-year-old tradition of rabbinic Judaism, they add up to something revolutionary. ELLEN RAPP

Healing Spirit

hen Paul Cowan died of leukemia in September 1988, Rachel Cowan lost not only a husband but a professional partner. Paul, once a nonpracticing Jew, and Rachel, a Unitarian who'd converted to Judaism, had been contemplating the effects of interfaith marriage since the Seventies, when the birth of their children led them to question their religious traditions. Although they became committed to Judaism (in 1982 Paul chronicled his religious growth in An Orphan in History and in 1985 Rachel became one of the few converted Jews to enroll in rabbinical school), they were concerned that interfaith marriage might cause other couples to ignore their religious heritage. So the Cowans, who were instrumental in revitalizing the Upper West Side synagogue Anche Chesed, began interfaith workshops at the 92nd Street Y. And in 1987 they coauthored Mixed Blessings, a guidebook to help couples resolve the conflicts in an interfaith marriage.

Alone, Rachel still runs the Y workshops, lectures for New York synagogues and Jewish community centers and writes. Once her rabbinical thesis is completed this month, she'll finish a book that Paul had been writing about living with a life-threatening disease. "It was work we developed together," she says unfalteringly, "as much mine as his." Dr. Norman J. Cohen, a dean at New York's Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, agrees. Praising the "outreach vision" Paul and Rachel modeled, he Rachel says Rachel's "stature as a Jew and a human being is still very much in evidence."

During Paul's illness, Rachel experienced the full strength of the Jewish community. "Jewish people cook," she says, still thankful. "They visit the sick, stay with the to become grieving." Once again she's learned how a rabbi religion can heal. JENNIE NASH

RABBI SUSAN SCHNUR gave up a pulpit, but she hasn't abandoned rabbinical work. As special projects editor at Lilith, a quarterly magazine for Jewish feminists, she says she aims to articu-

late a "Judaism that becomes a possibility for disenfranchised women." Schnur says she left the rabbinate because "clerical life is so overwhelming. Once I started having children, I wanted boundaries."

Art and prayer, body and soul meet in liturgical dance-a form of dance that results when movement is integrated into almost any part of a religious service. CARLA DESOLA, founder and director of the ten-vearold Omega Liturgical Dance Company (which is in residence at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine), was trained as a dancer and later converted to Catholicism, "Dance is one of the best ways to express that aspect of God as beauty," she says. DeSola pioneered the field of liturgical dance in America, but she points out that sacred dance, one of the earliest forms of prayer, is a part of worship elsewhere in the world and only Western tradition separates body and soul.

HEALTH CARE SERVICES



Rather than relying on tradition, some in health care tend to look for ways to make the system newer, more responsive. Sister

GARET SWEENEY, president and CEO of St. Vincent's Hos-

pital and Medical Center of New York since 1980, is leading the hospital into the twentyfirst century without losing its commitment to the community. Last year it completed a \$150 million building-and-renovation drive. making St. Vincent's one of the most modern medical centers in the city. At the same time, it continues to be known for, among other things, its AIDS unit and AIDS community outreach program. Sister Margaret's vision? To make the health care system a "responsive public trust."

It's a Christian tenet that the body is the temple of the holy spirit, but Seventh-day Adventists take that reverence one step furtherthey believe strongly in preventive medicine. As head of Seventh-day Adventist Community Health Services, JUANITA KREI-

SCHMAR supervises the "van ministry." She directs three to five blood-pressure screening units that circulate in the city Sunday through Friday as well as a food-sharing program that feeds 2,000-3,000 homeless and hungry people each week. Kretschmar brings her own agenda to the mission-"To show there's a God out there that cares about people."

SOCIAL WORK



SISTER BARBARA LENNIGER feels that she's been called to represent the children living in welfare hotels. As executive director of the Thorpe Family Residence, transitional housing for six-

teen homeless women and children that is slated to open in February 1989 in the Crotona section of the Bronx, she is motivated by what she calls the justice model of helping people. "In the charity model," she says, "you get people their soup. But in the justice model, you empower people so that they can get their own soup." The residence will provide tutoring, job training and counseling, as well as tie into already existing community services such as child care. She aims to succeed where the city has had trouble-in getting families out of the welfare hotels and into permanent housing.

"I am a woman of faith," says SISTER ALBER-TA CAREY, director of Incarnation Childrens Center (ICC), a transitional residence for HIVpositive children that opened in January. "What we really need to get through this AIDS dilemma are people who are grounded in faith and able to hope that something good will happen." ICC, located in Washington Heights, has space for twenty-five children between the ages of six months and four and a half years. Training of staff members, many of whom live in the neighborhood, brings an added benefit to the project, says Sister Alberta-"We're empowering the community."

SISTER MARY NERNEY's faith in God is inseparable from her commitment to women. As founder and director of STEPS (services, training, education, prevention, self-help) to End Family Violence, a program for battered women who fight back, Sister Mary does everything from helping those women find good lawyers to providing them with support groups and counseling. But Sister Mary would rather see STEPS do more preventive and educational work than pick up the pieces after the damage has been done. "I want to take direction from the women themselves," she says. "In the end they'll be our biggest affectors of change."

Cowan, a converted Jew who's

The Chosen

t was the High Holidays at the Kane Street Synagogue in Brooklyn, and Rabbi Debra Cantor faced a crowd of curious worshipers, whispering and pointing. Afterward, someone complimented Rabbi Cantor on how well she recited Hebrew—"which is really an absurd thing," she says. "Of course I'm competent in these areas, but what they're really saying is 'She doesn't look like a rabbi, but she sounds like one.' "Cantor is one of the first female Conservative rabbis (there are seven others, but only two of them have their own congregations). "As a woman, I was scrutinized," she says flatly, "in a very literal way."

Cantor, who is thirty-two years old and is married to James Beede, an officer at Chase Manhattan Bank, graduated from the Jewish Theological Seminary of America and was ordained last May. She applied for only one pulpit—the Kane Street Synagogue—attracted by the congregation's reputation for social activism and political awareness.

Born in "deep Connecticut," Cantor was the only Jewish girl in her high school class.

"I wanted to marry a rabbi," she recalls. "As a part of my job as rebbitsin, I thought I would do all of these mitzvoth [good deeds] and Synagogue discuss the sermon with [my husband]..."

It was the closest a young girl could imagine coming to the center of the Jewish faith.

But while a sophomore at Brandeis University she had a friend who was trying to decide whether to become a rabbi or bow to parental pressure to become a doctor. Angered by her lack of options, Cantor said to him, "Well, if I were you, I would be a rabbi in a minute." She went on to apply to graduate school at the Jewish Theological Seminary—despite the fact that women were not yet being admitted into its rabbinical school nor ordained as Conservative rabbis. While in school, Cantor helped organize the Group for the Rabbinical Ordination of Women (GROW), which began to lobby the seminary faculty by organizing rallies and letter-writing campaigns and sending speakers around the country. In 1985 the Seminary Faculty Senate voted to admit women into the rabbinical school. Cantor entered that year.

While attending school, Cantor supported herself by developing and teaching courses on Judaism especially designed for the disaffected, the undereducated and potential converts. Her classes were often filled with women hungry for knowledge about their faith. "If I had to characterize what I do best, [I'd have to say] I'm a very good teacher," Cantor says. Since her arrival at Kane Street, she has introduced an extensive adult-education program and incorporated a lecture series on the philosophy of Conservative Judaism into the Saturday service.

Cantor's support staff at the 500-member congregation is small, and she is often up late pasting up flyers; upon her arrival at the synagogue she even organized the kitchen. "I never heard of a rabbi doing that," her mother said. And in fact Cantor has found that the role of rabbi, like many traditionally male roles, depends heavily on a supporting player—the rabbi's wife. "She performed a lot of the pastoral functions," says Cantor, who sees herself combining both roles but perhaps not accomplishing as much. "I don't want to burn out. I'm married, I want children. And I want to be a role model for my congregation."

Recently a former classmate said to Cantor, "Isn't it great being a rabbi? You get to study different texts, think of some idea and follow it up." Cantor had to laugh because just last year in school they had complained about those same activities. "But I didn't get satisfaction writing papers," she says. "I thought of it as throwing paper airplanes into the abyss. Now even when I write a bulletin article, I have the opportunity to touch people."

Spiritual Leaders

Under the outspoken leadership of Rabbi Balfour Brickner, the Stephen Wise Free Synagogue continues to be the citywide champion for the down-and-out it has been since 1907. Because of Brickner's frenetic schedule, Associate Rabbi HELENE FERRIS administers the community outreach programs for which the synagogue is known, among them: a weekly dinner for people with AIDS, a shelter for homeless men, a summer camp for underprivileged kids and a monthly breakfast forum for working women.



The Church of the Heavenly Rest is neither the biggest nor the richest of the moneyed Fifth Avenue churches, but it is one of the most important. Led by Reverend Hugh Hildesley,

the church generously donates its outreach money to organizations located north of 96th Street, runs a holiday-meals program and maintains a successful school. JANE HENDER-SON, the associate director at Heavenly Rest, is influential beyond the congregation's confines. She was one of seven people—and the only ordained woman—on the Nominating Committee for the Diocese of New York, which chose a new bishop last year.

Judson Memorial Church in Greenwich Village rushes in where other churches fear to tread. While some clergy may judge prostitutes, Judson ministers to them. While other churches refuse to hold funeral services for AIDS victims, Judson welcomes them. MARGARITA SUAREI, assistant pastor at Judson, is interested in gay and lesbian rights and urban ministry. She's the first self-described lesbian to receive a "call" to a local parish in the United Church of Christ.



suzan D. Johnson's heart may be with God, but her eye is on the press. This media-savvy pastor has turned Mariners' Temple Baptist Church from a fifteen-member parish to a thriving

community of 500. Since arriving at the church in 1983 at age twenty-six, she's started a Lunch Hour of Power, a weekly service that draws 500 people who work in nearby offices; opened the Multi-Ethnic Center, an after-school program for community children; and undertaken a \$2.5 million fundraising drive to renovate the church for landmark status. Johnson was the first black woman to be named senior pastor of an American Baptist Church.

Protestant Power Broker

Joan Brown Campbell has practiced global diplomacy. Now she's ready for New York.

oan Brown Campbell, executive director of the U.S. office of the World Council of Churches, is no Church Lady. Earthy, open, almost irreverent (she laughingly refers to her office building, which houses several religious organizations, by its colloquial name-the "God Box"), Campbell, 57, is about as close to tightlipped, old-time religion as Tammy Faye Bakker is to Mother Teresa.

Instead, she's an international power broker without a portfolio, an ordained minister who is helping to define the agenda on such issues as world hunger, human rights, the anti-apartheid movement and disarmament. As the voice of 60 million World Council of Churches congregants, she

is heard by international leaders in negotiations, conferences, treaties. She's like George Shultz with a moral mandate doing God's work in the guise of global diplomacy.

Campbell's territory stretches from Switzerland to Zimbabwe, from the Sudan to South America and, of course, includes U. S. headquarters in Washington, D.C. "I remember negotiating with George Bush about human rights in Nicaragua," Campbell says. "We told him we knew what the people wanted. He pointed to his guy and said, 'He also knows what the people want.' His guy turned out to be Oliver North."

Religion has traditionally been a maleorganized business, with women serving in administrative but not leadership positions; Campbell is the first woman ever to hold her position. "Women have moved up in—I hate to use the term—bureaucratic positions.

Campbell hadn't originally planned to become one of the world's most powerful women in the Church. Holding a job—let alone becoming a minister—was not what

women of her generation were raised to do. A corporate lawyer's wife and mother of three in Cleveland in the Fifties, she first applied her degree from the University of Michigan to community volunteer work.

Attracted to the burgeoning civil rights movement, she soon had Martin Luther King, Jr., and other national figures dropping in as guests at her home. Today Campbell quickly dismisses the serious risk she engendered by bringing the leaders of the movement to her manicured, well-to-do neighborhood and to a husband who put together multinational corporations in countries including South Africa. Even without the ministry, she had found her calling.

Her involvement with civil rights and "the historic black Church" drew Campbell to

the anti-Vietnam War movement and politics. While she was working as a campaign manager for Cleveland's Carl Stokes, the first black mayor of a major U.S. city, several of her fellow activists suggested that she enter the ministry. "Women haven't traditionally been ministers in the Protestant

> Church, but in the black Church there is a history of women clergy. I became an assistant pastor in a small Baptist church while I took theology classes," she explains. At the age of forty-five Campbell became a minister. Her divorce papers came through the day of her ordination.

If there's a difference between her activism then and now, it's that she's backed by a three-page, single-spaced résumé that reads like a corporate chief's. She sits on the boards of five church organizations, frequently lectures and, although currently without her own church, keeps her preach-

ing skills honed by giving guest sermons.

What she would like to do is become more involved in New York City politics, which has so far eluded her, "It's hard for the Protestant Church to have a voice in New York because there are so many groups competing for attention. I've found it easier to get things done at the top in Botswana than here.

"It's also harder for a Protestant to get noticed," she adds. "We're a coalition, not just one single-focused group. When Cardinal O'Connor speaks, he has authority from the top. I represent Episcopalians, the historic black Church, the orthodox Churches... a lot of very different people. If I tried to speak for them, they'd all say, 'What do you mean, "That's how Protestants think"?'"

If the Church is to have relevance into the twenty-first century, it must redefine and reestablish its leadership position. By focusing on flesh-and-blood issues as well as the spirit, on global instead of parochial concerns, Campbell is creating new opportunities for an old institution. She may never unite heaven and earth, but meanwhile she's trying to conquer the world. BONNIE ALLEN

Mishnah and Modernity

Professor Michael Chernick

Mishnah is the central core of Jewish teaching. Though almost 2,000 years old, it grew up in a world reminiscent of our own. Its compilers lived in the midst of a world empire, at the crossroads of major cultures, in the maelstrom of social upheaval and change. They, as we, had experienced Jewish defeat and destruction followed by national and cultural rebirth and renewal. They led their people through all this and set the agenda for Jewish life and survival in the future. has a great deal to say to modern Jews. Though Mishnah's point of view may be different from our own, to understand it is to understand the roots of our Judaism today.

The Dynamics of Covenant Rabbi Yitz Greenberg

This seminar will trace the development of the core of Jewish religion. The covenant may be the most influential idea of all time for it is at the heart of Judaism -- yet it shaped Christianity, Islam and modern Western culture as well. The covenant is the partnership of God and humanity, of Israel and its Lord; the goal is to perfect the world (tikkun olam).

How does the idea develop? What is the human role in history? Can you believe in covenant if you don't believe in God? Is there one Jewish political philosophy or economic system? How do we judge? Are the Holocaust and the rebirth of Israel new turning points in the covenant? We will explore the answers.

Mystics Who Make Sense

Rabbi Danny Landes

We shall explore the social-political theories of those Jewish Mystics who are especially engaging and accessible. Our emphasis will be on those ideas that -- for better or for worse -continue to shape the Jewish mind.

The Genesis of Genesis

Dr. Shalom Paul

We will discuss some of the basic elements of early "Israelite religion" on the backdrop of comparative and contrasting stories of origin from the Ancient Near East, e.g., the revolutionary concept of God, man, sacrifices, time and nature. The roles of man and woman and the origin of sin and evil will be set in their correct perspective from the Biblical viewpoint. The unique relationship of man and God and the existentialistic problems of mankind will be highlighted by an in-depth study of the early chapters of Genesis.

Rabbinic Responsa from the Holocaust, Israel and America

Rabbi Jonathan Porath

A study of rabbinic responsa (questions and answers asked of rabbis) from the modern Jewish experience in various settings, including the Kovno Ghetto during the Holocaust, the ranks of the American Army in World War II, Israel from the 1948 War of Independence to the Israeli scene today, and the contemporary American Jewish home and family. Topics to be discussed will include the rights of the individual vs. the group, Jewish tradition vs. modernity, power vs. powerlessness, and questions of Jewish identity, medical ethics, intermarriage and conversion. No prior Jewish background is required.

Holidays

Rabbi Shlomo Riskin

What does it mean to live in two worlds -- to be both a Jew and an American, a person with strong ties to a traditional culture yet a full-time participant in modernity? How does one negotiate a viable way between the old and the new, the values of community and those of individuality, a sense of the self shaped by history and one that wishes to be free of the claims of the past and open to a new, unencumbered future? These questions and others like them have been central to much of Jewish writing in America in the twentieth century. In reading and discussing representative selections from this literature, we shall see how some of our most thoughtful writers have tried to describe and understand the peculiar experience of living in or between two cultures -- an experience that, on the one hand, is full of dilemmas, and, on the other, rich with possibilities that may not be found so readily elsewhere.

Public Policy and Jewish Values Dr. Sidney Schwarz

One of the basic mandates in Jewish tradition is that of tikun olam, healing the world of its moral wounds. Our sages applied their minds, with the guidance of Jewish texts, to many of the most troubling issues they saw in the society in which they lived. While our world and the problems confronting it have become increasingly complex, Judaism does provide many valuable insights that are all too often ignored by Jews interested in public policy. This course will look at five pressing domestic policy issues in which there are inherent value conflicts growing out of divergent political worldviews. Participants will be challenged to apply classical Jewish sources and values to these contemporary issues. The materials used in this course have been developed by The Washington Institute for Jewish Leadership and Values and will be taught by the Institute's founder, Rabbi Sidney Schwarz.

The Arab States in the Middle East

Dr. Haim Shaked

The Middle East has been likened to a powder keg which may explode into a third world war. It constantly makes headlines in the world media. This seminar is designed to provide an in-depth understanding of this important world region, its recent history and current problems.

The Shabbat and Holiday Prayers Rabbi Levi Weiman-Kelman

Biblical spirituality, medieval mysticism and modern dilemas are just some of the areas involved in the study of Shabbat and the Jewish holidays. The holidays are rooted in the Bible and the sacrificial cult of the Temple. They were transformed by the rabbis who lived in an agrarian society. The liturgy they compiled is "theology for the masses". The major prayers that characterize Shabbat and the Holidays are mini-lessons in Jewish history, theology, Israeli agriculture and poetry. We will study these texts and some tunes as well. Through this kind of study we can better understand our tradition and respond to the challenges these ancient prayers pose to the modern urban Jew.

Current Israeli Security Issues General Aharon Yariv

The overwhelming subject of War and Peace in our region is usually seen through a political perspective, and it is understood that all the major issues regarding Palestinians, PLO, intifada, West Bank, etc. must ultimately find a political-diplomatic solution.

At the same time, there is an obvious military implication which runs through these very issues. I should like to concentrate in this course on the military aspects because they are less well understood by the lay person and are at least as critical as the other factors which are regularly exposed and explained by the pundits in the media.

A Half-Century of Fire and Glory Rabbi Herbert Friedman

Seldom has human history witnessed such an era as passed between the time Hitler ascended to power (1933) and the Israeli war in Lebanon ended (1985). Crisis after crisis, all relentless, implacable, ferocious, bombarded the planet. Two nuclear weapons seared man and earth; an unparalleled murder-machine flamed onethird of world Jewry into the air as smoke and ash; time stood still for a breathless three years; and then the miracle of Israel's rebirth swept millions into a new future filled with hope; followed by decades of pounding energy which created food and shelter and weapons and babies, all providing home for the unwanted of Europe, Asia and Africa; and all this occurred simultaneously with the growth in the U.S. of the largest, strongest, richest Jewish community ever seen in the entire 4,000 year span. What a half-century!

Who is a Jew? Five Religious Responses to Modernity

Dr. Reuven Kimelman

This series will explore how the varieties of Judaism result from varying responses and strategies of dealing with modernity. It will discuss the beginnings of Reform, Modern Orthodox, Conservative/Reconstructionism, along with the Mussar and Hassidic movements. Finally, it will ask the question whether there can be commitment without dogmatism, or pluralism without ambiguity.

Toward the 21st Century: From a Rabbi Irwin Kula Community of Survival to a Jewish Community Once Again

What will "our Talmud" be? We are living in a transformational moment in Jewish history. We have built a state and have acquired power. We have achieved political and economic success and have established a network of philanthropy unprecedented in Jewish history. We have insured our physical survival, but survival for what?! How do we define our Judaism that has moved from powerlessness to power, from closet community to open, from victim to maker-of-history? We will discuss the views of five contemporary thinkers who are drafting the blueprint for the 21st century Jewish community.

Five Problematic Books of the Bible

Dr. Shalom Paul

The following books presented specific problems to the Rabbis of the Talmudic period who discussed and argued the propriety of including some of them within the Biblical canon. Their problem and ours will be discussed. Session I will present the dilemma of a woman faced by two men: one wicked, the other, a simpleton, and the female strategy to overcome both. Session 2 will deal with the ideal picture of a "perfect" woman then and now. Session 3 will preview Freud by discussing "female" love poetry. Session 4 will concern itself with the profound question of "Is Life Worth Living?" and if so, "How?" and "Why?". Session 5 will delve into the perplexing and eternal problem of the righteous man who suffers, from Job to modern day.

Basic Judaism -Everything you always wanted

An intensive study and personal excursis into five basic components of Jewish knowledge in the modern world. The selected topics include: (a) the Jewish calendar—the ebb and flow of the Jewish year: What Jews do and when; (b) the Jewish life cycle—what happens and why; (c) Jewish ritual and ceremony as it relates to our physical surroundings (clothing, food, day of rest, sexuality); (d) Jewish ethics and values particularly on the human and interpersonal dimensions; (e) Jewish beliefs—the Jewish view of God and man, the World to Come, the Messiah: Questions of "Ultimate Destiny" and "What Are We Doing Here, Anyway?"

The acquisition of a shared basic Jewish vocabulary will be stressed.

Literature of the Holocaust

Professor Alvin Rosenfeld

The Nazi attempt to destroy European Jewry has produced a large and still growing body of literature that aims to record and interpret the crimes against the Jews during World War II. Some of the writers of this literature personally experienced the Holocaust; others did not. All write out of deep reflection on Jewish fate under the Nazis and help us to understand the terrifying ordeal that the Jews of Europe were forced to undergo. In reading and discussing representative selections from this literature, we shall attempt to grasp the magnitude of Jewish suffering a generation ago and to discover its implications for us today.

Israel in the Middle East Dr. Haim Shaked

Most references to the Arab-Israeli conflict are deliberately or inadvertently distorted. Biases and ignorance have combined to cause misunderstanding and confusion. The course is designed to provide an in-depth, comprehensive analysis and overview of this important issue.

The Book of Numbers: Moses and Leadership

Regina Stein

Moses is the paradigm of leadership in the Bible, but it is a leadership which is repeatedly challenged. Why? We will examine the qualities which made Moses both suitable and unsuitable for his role. By analyzing five episodes from the Book of Numbers, we will see Moses' leadership challenged and the very existence of the Jewish people threatened.
