Dear Rabbi Silver:

The decision of the State Department to refuse a visa to Dr. Hewlett Johnson, the Dean of Canterbury, preventing him from entering the United States to make a speaking tour, seems to us to have very grave implications for the American people.

In the words of one of us, we are "not wholly convinced that Dr. Hewlett Johnson has the whole story of eastern Europe, but he has an important part of it, and should have every encouragement within our hitherto remarkably free society, to express his views and to supplement what our newspapers are daily emphasizing."

The State Department has publicly given as its reason the organization which invited the Dean--the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship--but enquiry as to whether a visa would be accorded him for appearances under some other sponsorship indicates that the real objection of the Department is to the appearance of the Dean himself and the presentation of his information and point of view to the American people for their own mature judgment. It is this element of official censorship that disturbs us.

We are not alone in this feeling. The New York Herald-Tribune, the New York Post, the Boston Herald and the Chicago Sun-Times have editorially condemned this decision, and the American Civil Liberties Union has called it an infringement of the traditional American pattern of free speech and assembly.

We feel compelled to take some action. At the suggestion of the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship, it is our purpose to call into being an ad hoc Committee of Welcome to the Dean of Canterbury. We wish you to join us as a member. The one purpose of this Committee will be to assure the extending of our traditional American hospitality and courtesy to the Dean. As the initiators, we pledge to safeguard the independent integrity of this Committee.

At this point, our Committee will necessarily have to address a letter to the Secretary of State expressing concern over the decision to refuse a visa and asking immediate reconsideration. We will tell Mr. Marshall that, in the interest of free speech, we would gladly extend the Dean an invitation to visit the United States, were such a move to make his visit possible. This action does not require any defense of the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship nor of the views of the Dean but only an appeal to our Government to accord the Dean normal access and opportunity to present in the United States his information and opinion, which is a traditional American right we insist upon for ourselves as well as for the Dean. We would, of course, desire to let the people know of our action through normal press release.

Your prompt and favorable response we very much desire.

CITIZENS' COMMITTEE INVITES DEAN OF CANTERBURY

Professor Ralph Barton Perry of Harvard University released today the names of ninety three prominent educators, churchmen and individuals in other cultural fields, who have formed an Ad Hoc Committee of Welcome for the Very Reverend Hewlett Johnson, D.D., Dean of Canterbury Cathedral.

Dean Johnson had been invited to visit the United States by the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship for a country-wide tour under its auspices. A visa was refused him on the ground that the sponsoring organization was on the Attorney-General's list.

The Committee of Welcome has extended to Dean Johnson an invitation to come to the United States under its independent auspices in November and December of this year, and to speak at such public gatherings as may be arranged on his behalf.

Pointing out that the Dean of Canterbury was accorded a hearty welcome to the United States in 1945 when he spoke in many cities and was received at the White House by President Truman, and that a visa was again granted him in 1947 for another countrywide trip which the Dean's illness canceled at the last moment, the letter of invitation said that "many American citizens were shocked to learn that a visa had been denied you."

"In the light of a public statement made by the Secretary of State", the letter continued, "we are encouraged to believe that there is no official objection to your entering the country under other auspices." The Committee has extended this invitation "in the interest of maintaining the traditional American patterns of free speech and hospitality to outstanding personalities from other lands."

Professor Perry also released the text of a letter to Secretary of State George C. Marshall informing him of the formation of the Committee of Welcome and the invitation sent to Dean Johnson. "We wish to see Dean Johnson accorded the right to tell his story to the American people for them to accept or reject, as they themselves choose. We do not by this invitation indicate our personal agreement with him."

The letter declined to pass any judgment on the action of the Secretary of State in citing the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship as the reason for the refusal of the visa. "Our membership embraces persons of divergent views as to the policy of the organization in question", stated the letter. "What concerns us is the abridgement of the American tradition of free and open discussion involved in the exclusion of the Dean and his consequent inability to present his information and point of view to the American people for their mature consideration." As to the message of the Dean, although indicating disagreement with him on the part of many members of the Committee, the letter quoted one of the members as saying, "we are not wholly convinced

that Dr. Hewlett Johnson has the whole story of eastern Europe, but he has an important part of it, and should have every encouragement within our hitherto remarkably free society, to express his views and to supplement what our newspapers are daily emphasizing."

Invitations to join the Ad Hoc Committee, said Professor Perry, were issued by himself, Professor William Ernest Hocking of Harvard University, and Dean Christian Gauss of Princeton University. They were sent to 380 selected names and replies are still coming in from distant parts of the country. He anticipates a number of additional signers.

In signing the invitation to the Dean and the letter of notification to the Secretary of State, Prof. Perry pointed out that he was simply acting temporarily on behalf of the Committee, and that if the visa were granted, it would be necessary to work out further organizational details to arrange meetings for the Dean and handle his expenses.

1. LETTER OF INVITATION TO THE DEAN OF CANTERBURY

September 17, 1948

The Very Reverend Hewlett Johnson, D.D.

My dear Dean Johnson,

Many American citizens were shocked to learn that a visa had been denied you to come to the United States to carry out a speaking tour which had been planned for last year and which only your serious illness made it impossible for you to carry out.

It is a matter of common knowledge that when you came to the United States in 1945 you were accorded a hearty welcome and granted, among many courtesies, the privilege of a quarter-hour with the President of the United States in the White House, and the permission was granted you to enter the United States in 1947 for the trip which your illness prevented.

In the light of a public statement made by the Secretary of State, we are encouraged to believe that there is no official objection to your entering the country under other auspices. Therefore, in the interest of maintaining the traditional American patterns of free speech and hospitality to outstanding personalities from other lands, we, the undersigned American citizens, have formed an Ad Hoc Committee of Welcome with the express purpose of extending to you an invitation to come to the United States in November and December of this present year, and to speak at such public gatherings as may be arranged on your behalf.

We have this day informed the Secretary of State, General George C. Marshall, that we are extending this invitation to you, and in our letter to him have urged that the State Department grant you the necessary visa to make your trip possible as our guest.

We express the sincere hope, in the light of the Secretary's public statement, that when you again apply for a visa at the Consulate in London, the matter will be officially reconsidered and you will be accorded the traditional courtesies which were so unhappily denied you when you applied previously.

2. LETTER TO SECRETARY MARSHALL

My dear Mr. Secretary,

The decision of the State Department to refuse a visa to Dr. Hewlett Johnson, the Dean of Canterbury Cathedral, preventing him from entering the United States for a speaking tour, seems to us to have very grave implications for the American people.

In the words of one of us, we are "not wholly convinced that Dr. Hewlett Johnson has the whole story of eastern Europe, but he has an important part of it, and should have every encouragement within our hitherto remarkably free society, to express his views and to supplement what our newspapers are daily emphasizing."

The State Department has publicly stated that the fact that the invitation was issued by the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship was the reason for the refusal of the visa. We are in no position to pass judgment on this aspect of the Department's action and make no comment upon it. Our membership embraces persons of divergent views as to the policy of the organization in question. What concerns us is the abridgement of the American tradition of free and open discussion involved in the exclusion of the Dean and his consequent inability to present his information and point of view to the American people for their mature consideration.

That we are not alone in this concern can be judged from the critical editorial opinion which has appeared in all sections of the country, and from the fact that the American Civil Liberties Union has protested this step as a serious infringement of the traditional American patterns of free speech and assembly. It is this element of official censorship that has disturbed us and moved us to take action. We have joined together to form an Ad Hoc Committee of Welcome in order to assure this distinguished British Churchman the extension of our traditional American hospitality and courtesy.

Since the formation of this Committee was begun, we have noted with interest the statement made by the Press Officer of the State Department, Mr. McDermott, and reiterated in the course of an interview with the Press by yourself, that there is no personal objection to the Dean's coming to the United States for a speaking tour, and intimating that a visa might be granted him, were he to be invited under other auspices.

LETTER TO SECRETARY MARSHALL (Cont.)

We wish to inform you that our Ad Hoc Committee of Welcome to the Dean of Canterbury has this day extended to Dean Johnson, in an air-mail communication to which our names are attached, a cordial invitation to come to the United States in November and early December as the guest of our Committee.

In taking this action, we desire to make it explicitly clear that we are motivated solely by the question of maintaining full freedom of speech and discussion. We wish to see Dean Johnson accorded the right to tell his story to the American people for them to accept or reject, as they themselves choose. We do not by this invitation indicate our personal agreement with him.

We ask that when Dean Johnson applies again for a visa, as we trust he will wish to do, the State Department, in conformity with its public statements, will reconsider his request and grant him the privilege of entering the United States for speaking engagements as the guest of this Committee.
