

Blazing new trails

A century ago, a handful of French Jews founded the Alliance Israelite Universelle — the first organization dedicated to the relief of suffering Jews throughout the world.

There has been hardly one major problem in Jewish life during the last hundred years to whose solution the Alliance has not contributed.

EMIGRATION — The Alliance helped in the first organized efforts to assist the emigration of Jews fleeing the Russian pogroms during the 1880's. This was the beginning of the great migratory movement which eventually transformed American Jewry into the greatest Jewish community in the world.

HUMAN RIGHTS — The representatives of the Alliance to the Berlin Congress of 1867 were the first delegation ever sent to an international conference by a leading organization in order to protect Jewish rights.

EDUCATION — The Alliance was the first to embark, in 1862, on a program to create a network of schools for the Jewish communities of the Near and Middle East and North Africa. These schools have completely revolutionized the lives of millions of Jews.

LAND SETTLEMENT — The Alliance, in 1870, took the first step in Jewish land settlement in Palestine by founding the Agricultural School of Mikveh Israel.

CULTURE - REVIVAL OF HEBREW – It was in the schools of the Alliance that Eliezer ben Yehudah, "the Father of Modern Hebrew," had the first opportunity to teach Hebrew as a living language.

In the early 1880's, Ahad Ha'am, the noted Jewish thinker, saw in Brody, Austria the Alliance representative, Charles Netter, help refugees from Russia to continue their journey. He made these notes on the spot:

... The city was full of refugees from Russia. Charles Netter and his aides stayed there, directing group after group to America . . . I saw Netter, that worthy man, standing in the station and distributing money to the refugees. His face expressed the kindness and compassion he felt for them . . .

As the train started to move, they called out: "Long live Netter! Long live the Alliance!"

600,000 children saved

A hundred years ago, the Jewish communities of the Moslem world – Sephardim and Orientals – were living under sub-human conditions. The life of the children was particularly pathetic.

Poorly fed, afflicted with disease, left to themselves on the dirty streets of the ghettos, they had — many still have — a childhood without joy, and a future without hope.

As there were practically no public schools in the Moslem world and as the local Jewish communities were economically too weak to create adequate schools of their own, Jewish children were doomed to almost complete ignorance. They had no possibility of rising above the abysmal poverty of their surroundings.

In Jewish subjects, too, the ignorance was appalling. Most of the children learned only to recite a few prayers—without understanding a single word.

Ninety-two per cent of those among the Jews in the city who have a trade or profession to provide them with a decent living, are graduates of Alliance schools.

(From a recent survey in a North African city)

The Alliance has created a network of all-day schools for Jewish children from the Caspian Sea to the western coast of Morocco.

These schools have a threefold task:

1 - THEY PROVIDE JEWISH CHILDREN WITH A DECENT CHILDHOOD

For the first time in their lives, the children find themselves in sunny, airy rooms under the care of dedicated teachers.

The children have to be taught everything — even how to play. They are under constant medical supervision. They receive a hot meal daily, often their only such meal on a weekday. They receive decent clothing. It is at the Alliance school that most of them are given their first toys.

2 - THEY ENABLE JEWISH BOYS AND GIRLS TO BECOME PRODUCTIVE MEMBERS OF THEIR COMMUNITIES

Either in their native lands, or, if they emigrate, in those countries where they make their homes — in the Near and Middle East, North

Africa, Israel, Western Europe and the Americas — hundreds of thousands of Sephardic and Oriental Jews now live under social and economic conditions of which they could not have even dreamed had they or their parents not attended Alliance schools.

3 - THE SCHOOLS OF THE ALLIANCE STRENGTHEN THE TIES OF YOUTH WITH JUDAISM.

Study of the Bible, Hebrew, Jewish history, and folklore forms an integral part of the curriculum for both boys and girls.

Modern, efficient teaching methods are used. Teachers are trained at a special seminary.

In the schools of the Alliance the Sabbath and Jewish holidays, as well as laws regarding kashrut and prayers, are carefully observed.

In some countries only the Alliance school stood in the way of the conversion of many Jewish children to other faiths.

These figures do not include those schools which were created by the Alliance and later taken over by local communities, or otherwise separated from its control.

The Normal School in France has for 92 years been training teachers of secular subjects for all the Alliance schools. It has graduated over 2,000 students (about 1,400 young men and 600 young women).

Another Normal School, this one devoted to Jewish subjects, was recently founded by the Alliance in Morocco. It has already graduated 94 young men, of whom 81 are now Hebrew teachers in the Alliance schools of North Africa. Having received extensive training, both religious and secular, these young men have been able to raise the level of instruction of Jewish subjects in the schools of the Alliance. Leading American and European educators consider this school one of the best of its kind in the Old World, outside Israel.

A Normal School to train teachers of Arabic is also operated by the Alliance.

- The Alliance now provides more than 7,000 boys and girls with secondary academic education, vocational training or both. Vocational instruction is often conducted in cooperation with ORT.

THE ALLIANCE MAINTAINS THE WORLD'S GREATEST NETWORK OF ALL-DAY JEWISH SCHOOLS OUTSIDE ISRAEL.

Thanks mainly to the schools of the Alliance, *almost all* the Jewish children in many Mediterranean countries are educated in *all-day* Jewish schools (in the United States, by contrast, only *six per cent* attend such schools).

Forty-nine per cent of the students are girls — perhaps the best measure of the profound changes wrought by the Alliance in the life of the Near Eastern and North African Jewish communities. Never before have girls in these areas been admitted to school in significant numbers.

Over the years, the schools of the Alliance have received financial support from local governments, from the French Government, and, in increasing measure, from American Jewry acting through the American Joint Distribution Committee and the American Friends of the Alliance, as well as from Jewish communities of Canada, Latin America, Europe and South Africa.




Trachoma therapy in the classroom


Alliance schools must often adapt themselves to specific problems confronting local Jewish populations. In Morocco, for example, where trachoma has been prevalent for generations, the Alliance has opened special schools to which its other schools have transferred children who suffer from this dangerous and contagious eye disease.

In the "trachoma schools" the children receive both medical treatment and academic instruction.

The eyesight of more than 3,000 Jewish children has been saved by these schools. Many more thousands have been enabled to escape infection.

The Alliance in Eretz Israel

The work of the Alliance in Palestine began ninety years ago with the founding of the Agricultural School of Mikveh Israel. This was the first step in the Jewish land settlement of the country. Thousands of graduates of Mikveh Israel — which David Ben-Gurion has called "the living nursery of agriculture in Israel" — have become the mainstays of agricultural settlements throughout the country.

At the same time the Alliance founded the Vocational School of Jerusalem — the first such school in the entire Near East.

Both Mikveh Israel (present enrollment: 640) and the Vocational School (240 students) continue to play their important part in the Alliance network in Israel. This system comprises, in addition, three lycées (combination of high school and junior college) and six elementary schools. There is also a special school where deaf-mute children are taught to speak and are given both a general education, from kindergarten through junior high school, and valuable vocational training.

The latest addition to the Alliance network in Israel is the Tel Aviv Lycée, which will eventually have an enrollment of 1,200. It has already won a reputation as one of the finest schools in Israel.

Israel's leaders expect the Lycée not only to contribute to the alleviation of the serious shortage in secondary education facilities in Israel, but also to help strengthen cultural ties between Israel and West European Jewry.

At all Alliance schools in Israel, Hebrew is the official language, and French is the principal foreign language.


In behalf of the dignity of man

Faithful to the tradition which has grown strong in the course of its first century, the Alliance continues its fight for human rights. Together with the American Jewish Committee and the Anglo-Jewish Association, it has formed the Consultative Council of Jewish Organizations which enjoys consultative status with the United Nations.

It is certainly no coincidence that Professor René Cassin, former chairman of the United Nations Commission on Human Rights, who is known as "the Father of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights," is President of the Alliance.

In 1856 an Italian Jewish boy, Edgar Mortara, was forcibly baptized by the Papal authorities and torn from his parents. The indignation created by the Mortara case was in a certain measure responsible for the founding of the Alliance.


At left is the first page of a letter, dated September 27, 1860, from the Alliance Israélite Universelle to Edgar Mortara's father. In translation, this portion reads:

Dear sir and coreligionist:

An association has been created in Paris. You will find the name on the letterhead: the Alliance Israélite Universelle. It is the purpose of this organization to help anyone who suffers because he is a Jew. We who enjoy full freedom of conscience and human rights cannot remain indifferent to moral and physical pain inflicted upon our less fortunate brethren.

Know that the misfortune that has stricken you has moved us deeply, and that our organization has considered ways of helping you to right this wrong. Conditions are now favorable; it is necessary to take advantage of them. With this in view, we have written to several of our French coreligionists who travel to Rome in the course of their duties, as well as to other people of influence in that city. We are certain to have their support when needed. We have also written to Monsieur de Cavour [Count de Cavour, one of the architects of Italian unity, was then a member of the Italian government.—Editor]. We believe that we can count on his friendly attitude toward you. You should ask him for an appointment, if possible, so that you may judge his intentions.



From Istanbul, Teheran, Casablanca to Jerusalem, Paris, New York

The direct beneficiaries of the work of the Alliance in the educational field have generally been Sephardim and Orientals. This work, however, has profoundly influenced Jewish life everywhere:

- The destruction of the great European communities has placed the responsibility for Jewish survival in the Old World on its remaining Jews, especially those who live outside the Soviet sphere. Almost half of these are Sephardim.
- During recent decades, hundreds of thousands of Sephardim from the Balkan countries, the Middle East and North Africa most of them graduates of the schools of the Alliance have migrated to Western Europe, Israel, North and Latin America. Thus they are no longer on the periphery of Jewish life; they have become a part of the *most important* Jewish communities of our time. Through these Sephardim the school of the Alliance in *Istanbul*, *Tetouan*, *Salonika* or *Teheran* affects—indirectly but inescapably—the shaping of Jewish life in *Paris*, *New York* or *Buenos Aires*. To a large extent it also affects the future of *Israel*.
