American Civil Liberties Union, 1935-1936.

October 21, 1935. Editor San Francisco Daily News San Francisco, Cal. Sir: The Hearst press all over the country has been recently kicking up a great to-do about the alleged Communism of the American Civil Liberties Union, parading the evidence in an editorial entitled "Unmasked". That editorial makes two points; first, that the Civil Liberties Union defends the rights of Communists as it does all other citizens, which is admitted; and second, that the director of the Union, far from being an honest defender of free speech for all, is in fact a Communist, which is denied. In regard to the first point, nothing need be said except that the American tradition of civil liberty demands its application to all groups, whatever their character, and to all utterances or publications, in the absence of acts of violence. The "Americanism" of the hearst press would draw the line short of that historic concept by punishing certain utterances and by outlawing left-wing movements. That is thoroughly un-American. As to the second point, I may be permitted to speak per sonally. I am not and never have been a member of the Communist Party. My goal and method, political and economic, is based wholly on reducing and ultimately abolishing all violence in human relations. I am sympathetic with the economic system being worked out in Soviet Russia. I believe in the economic goal of communism - namely, sharing in common the world's wealth. To my mind there is no higher ethical principle than that which works the ethics, not of political Communism as it is under stood today, but of Communism in its early Christian sense, -- "From each according to his ability; to each according to his needs." The Hearst papers to prove me a political Communist, quote from an article I wrote for a private Harvard Class Book which in explaining my economic philosophy, used one phrase -"Communism is the goal". It was clear by its context that I used the word in its economic not political sense, for it was followed by a clear definition which the Hearst papers were careful to omit: "It all sums up into one single purpose -the abolition of the system of dog-eat-dog under which we live, and the substitution by the most effective non-violence possible of a system of cooperative ownership and use of all wealth."

Editor of the San Francisco Daily News -2-I suppose anyone tempering his language to the winds of reaction these days should never have used "communism" in any sense, even in a private Harvard Class Book. But I am not given to being canny. The main point that the American Civil Liberties Union stresses in answer to such critics as the Hearst press is that their conception of Americanism is disloyal to democratic processes. It smacks of the philosophy of the Fascist state, which suppresses all opposition. The American Civil Libertics Union has never failed to defend loyally the American tradition of freedom of agitation for all, without discrimination. ## UNMASKED

WHENEVER a patriotic bill is introduced in Congress or in a state Legislature, the AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION almost always pops up in opposition.

Whenever a movement is under way to REPEAL such a measure, the AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION will usually be found vociferously DEMANDING repeal.

Whenever a deportable alien falls into Federal custody, and is likely to be shipped back where he belongs, the AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION is generally discovered to be the "organization" that sends lawyers to his aid.

Rather recently, the American Civil Liberties Union published, in its quarterly report, a review of its own activities up to July 1, 1935.

At that time Professor Harry Elmer Barnes published, under his signature, a laudatory comment on these activities, with a sneering reference to "PATRIOTEERS."

We quote from the language of this socialistic sociologist, bemoaning a few of the Civil Liberty Union's FAILURES:

"Among the reverses to civil liberty in the last few months have been the few but menacing acts which were put through state Legislatures, many of them before an effective campaign of opposition could be organized by the Civil Liberties Union:

"1. The passage of bills barring from the ballot parties which advocate "force and violence," "sedition or treason" in four states—Indiana, Delaware, Arkansas and Tennessee.

"2. The passage of teachers' loyalty oath bills in Arizona, Georgia, Michigan and New Jersey.

"3. The passage of a sedition bill in Michigan, considerably emasculated and not much stronger than the present Criminal Syndicalism Act.

"4. The so-called Anti-Nazi bill in New Jersey, by far the most sweeping piece of repressive legislation yet adopted. It will be tested in the courts."

NOW, the purpose of all this legislation which the American Civil Liberties Union OPPOSED was to safeguard the states and the Nation against the subversive "isms" of Europe and of our alien-minded Americans—against FASCISM and NAZISM and COMMUNISM alike.

COMMUNISM—due mainly to the aid and comfort given by such disguised Communistic organizations as the AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION and the AMERICAN LEAGUE AGAINST WAR AND FASCISM—is A REAL PUBLIC MENACE.

Moreover, the Communists and Communist sympathizers HABITUALLY use the outcry against "war" and "Fascism" to PROMOTE COMMUNISM.

WHENEVER you hear a prominent American called a "Fascist" you can usually

make up your mind that the man is simply a LOYAL CITIZEN who stands for AMERI-CANISM; that the Communists hate him for that very reason; and that the name-caller is either an AVOWED Communist or a SNEAK Communist—which really amount to the same thing.

Example: The Communist party newspaper in New York City refers to Representative Hamilton Fish as "That pioneer American Fascist."

How ridiculous—and how mendacious!

Of course, however, the SNEAK Com-

munists will and do DENY that they are Communists.

And thus we find Roger N. Baldwin, national director of the American Civil Liberties Union DENYING that his organization is a COMMUNISTIC organization.

Mrs. Robert Low Bacon of Long Island, N. Y., wife of the distinguished member of Congress, had accused Baldwin of being a Communist in a letter published over her signature in the New York Herald-Tribune.

And so, here comes the revealing part of he story.

In Brooklin, Maine, lives—or sojourns— Donald Parson, an alumnus of Harvard University, as is Roger N. Baldwin himself.

And Mr. Parson, having read Roger Baldwin's DENIAL of Communism in the Herald-Tribune, felt it to be his duty TO SHOW ROGER BALDWIN UP in the columns of the same publication, and IN ROGER BALDWIN'S OWN PHRASES.

WE QUOTE verbatim a letter written by Mr. Parson and published in the Herald-Tribune on October 8, 1935:

"In your issue of October 2, Roger N. Baldwin, as director of the American Civil Liberties Union, signs a statement replying to Mrs. Robert Low Bacon, containing these words:

"'Her assertion that the Civil Liberties Union is a Communistic organization is utterly untrue.'

"Now what is truth? Pilate made the inquiry, and Mr. Baldwin, although a graduate of Harvard, whose motto is 'Veritas,' seems likewise doubtful of the correct answer.

"It happens that your correspondent was A CLASSMATE OF MR. BALDWIN, and in April of this year the usual class book was published, giving IN OUR OWN WORDS AN ACCOUNT OF OUR ACTIVITIES.

"Here is Mr. Baldwin's description of himself:

"I HAVE CONTINUED DI-RECTING THE UNPOPULAR FIGHT FOR THE RIGHTS OF AGI-TATION, AS DIRECTOR OF THE AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION...I HAVE BEEN TO EUROPE SEVERAL TIMES, MOST-LY IN CONNECTION WITH IN-TERNATIONAL RADICAL AC- TIVITIES, CHIEFLY AGAINST WAR, FASCISM AND IMPERIALISM; AND HAVE TRAVELED CONSTANTLY IN THE UNITED STATES TO AREAS OF CONFLICT OVER WORKERS' RIGHTS TO STRIKE AND ORGANIZE.

"'MY CHIEF AVERSION IS THE SYSTEM OF GREED, PRIVATE PROFIT, PRIVILEGE AND VIOLENCE WHICH MAKES UP THE CONTROL OF THE WORLD TODAY, AND WHICH HAS BROUGHT IT TO THE TRAGIC CRISIS OF UNPRECEDENTED HUNGER AND UNEMPLOYMENT...

"THEREFORE, I AM FOR SO-CIALISM, DISARMAMENT AND, ULTIMATELY, FOR ABOLISHING THE STATE ITSELF AS AN IN-STRUMENT OF VIOLENCE AND COMPULSION.

"I SEEK THE SOCIAL OWNER-SHIP OF PROPERTY, THE ABOLI-TION OF THE PROPERTIED CLASS AND SOLE CONTROL OF THOSE WHO PRODUCE WEALTH.

"'COMMUNISM IS THE GOAL.'
"This accurately describes his activities. His DENIAL of them is EYE-WASH."

When a university graduate finds it necessary to rebuke and to expose a college classmate in words as severe as that, not much remains for anybody else to say.

ONE point more, however—a method of the American Civil Liberties Union, like its bed brother the American League Against War and Fascism, is to obtain the use of schools and other public buildings as meeting places to spread propaganda.

THIS IS GOING ON CONSTANTLY ALL OVER THE COUNTRY.

Last December, the American Civil Liberties Union sought the use of a city school building at San Diego, California, plausibly reciting that "it was proposed to have speakers representing different viewpoints address the meeting upon the general subject of 'Constitutional Rights in California.'"

The San Diego Board of Education investigated, and denied the application.

Then the local branch of Roger Baldwin's Civil Liberties Union went to court about it.

In upholding the action of the school

board, Superior Court Judge Arthur L. Mundo wrote:

"All of the members of the Board of Education testified that they had read Pages 56 and 57 of the report of an investigation of Communist propaganda made by a committee of the House of Representatives, which report is commonly known as the Fish report; that they had read this report prior to any action taken upon petitioner's application and that their decision was in part BASED UPON THE STATEMENTS MADE THEREIN

BY MR. ROGER N. BALDWIN, national director of the A. C. L. U. These statements were:

"'THE CHAIRMAN: DOES YOUR ORGANIZATION UPHOLD THE RIGHT OF A CITIZEN OR ALIEN—IT DOES NOT MAKE ANY DIFFERENCE WHICH—TO ADVO-CATE MURDER?'

"'MR. BALDWIN: YES.'

"They knew, AS A MATTER OF COMMON KNOWLEDGE, that in March of the same year the American Civil Liberties Union had ARRANGED MEETINGS in Imperial Valley where ORGANIZERS OF AN ADMITTED-LY COMMUNISTIC ORGANIZATION spoke and urged the agricultural workers TO JOIN A UNION SPONSORED BY THE COMMUNISTS."

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
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




Furthermore, I do not think that the sentence in the first paragraph of the draft beginning "If it were not for the alleged evidence, it would be unnecessary" etc., should be included. Not being a steady reader of the Hearst press, I am not in a position to declare, over my signature, that the Hearst papers have been "notorious for their false conception of Americanism; for their championship of gag legislation; and for their attacks upon every progressive cause." Therefore the undersigned members of the National Committee of the American Civil Liberties Union, responsible for its policies, reply to the charges. If it were not for the alleged evidence, it would be unnecessary to make any answer whatever to newspapers so long notorious for their false conception of Americanism; for their championship of gag legislation; and for their attacks upon every progressive cause.

The documents marshalled by the Hearst press consist of -
(1) quotations from an article by Prof. Harry Elmer Barnes, citing
the Union's recent opposition to sedition and other gag legislation;

(2) a quotation from an article written by the director of the Union
for a private Harvard Class Book in which he explained his economic
and political philosophy;

(3) a quotation from the report of the so-called Fish Committee in Congress in which Mr. Baldwin was made to appear to champion advocacies of murder and assassination.

As to opposition to gag legislation, the record speaks for itself. The Civil Liberties Union always opposed all forms of legislation punishing mere utterances or publications in the absence of acts. That is the traditional American doctrine of free speech. The Civil Liberties Union applies it without discrimination.

The quotation from Mr. Baldwin's article in a Harvard Class Book uses one phrase, among others, "Communism is the goal". Mr.Baldwin is thus made to appear a Communist, although he had said in the same article (composed from replies to a questionnaire) "I am for socialism and disarmament". He used the word "Communism" in an economic not political sense, defining it in a phrase which the Hearst papers were careful to omit: "It all sums up into one single purpose — the abolition of the system of dog-eat-dog under which we live,; and the substitution by the most effective non-violence possible of a system of cooperative ownership and use of all wealth," Mr. Baldwin is not and never has been a member of the Communist Party. His whole philosophy is based upon reducing and ultimately abolishing violence

in all forms of human relations. But whatever his views, the Union is bound only by its own declarations. The officers and members of the Union differ widely in their economic and political views.

The quotations from the Fish Committee report have long since been discredited. They were made to say precisely the opposite of Mr. Baldwin's testimony, which reaffirmed the American tradition of free speech as including all language not associated with overt acts. By the unscrupulous device of selecting and running together unrelated portions of the testimony, the impression was conveyed that the Union encourages advocacies of nurder and assassination.

- (1) quotations from an article by Prof. "arry Elmer Barnes, citing the Union's recent opposition to sedition and other gag legislation;
- (2) a quotation from an article written by the director of the Union for a private Harvard Class Book in which he explained his economic and political philosophy;
- (3) a quotation from the report of the so-called Fish Committee in Congress in which Mr. Baldwin was made to appear to champion advocacies of murder and assassination.

As to opposition to gag legislation, the record speaks for itself. The Civil Liberties Union has always opposed all forms of legislation punishing mere utterances or publications in the absence of acts.

That is the traditional American doctrine of free speech. The Civil Liberties Union applies it without discrimination.

The quotation from Mr. Faldwin's article in a Harvard Class Book, so used as to make him appear a Communist, deliberately ommitted a phrase explanatory of his views:

"It all sums up into one single purpose -- the abolition of the system of dog-eat-dog under which we lieve, and the substitution by the most effective non-violence possible of a system of cooperative ownership and use of all wealth."

Mr. Baldwin is not and never has been a member of the Communist Party.

But whatever his views, the Union is bound only by its own declarations. The officers and members of the Union differ widely in their economic and political views. Of the eighty-five members of the Nation-

alCommittee and Board of Directors, a recent survey of their political affiliations and preferences shows that 22 of them are members of or sympathizers with the Democratic Party; 3, the Republican Party; 28, the Socialist Party, 4 the Communist Party (as sympathizers) and the remaining 28 are non-partisan, except for a few favoring other minority parties.

The quotations from the Fish Committee report have long since been discredited. They were made to say precisely the opposite of Mr. Baldwin's testimony, which reaffirmed the American tradition of free speech as the antidote to violence. But the unscrupulous device of selecting and running together unrelated portions of the testimony, the impression was conveyed that the Union encourages advocacies of murder and assassination.

The purpose of the dearst editorial was to paint the Union as an agency almost exclusively for defense of Communists. The picture is wholly false. Only a small proportion of the Union's work deals with defense of the rights of Communists. Its program covers a wide variety of issues which has no relation to Communist propaganda. It has defended the rights of the Ku Klux Klan and of Nazis, of Pacifists, educators, American Indians, and a whole host of causes which have no relation to radical philosophies.

The American Civil Liberties Union has never failed to defend loyally the American tradition of freedom of agitation for all, without discrimination. It would even defend the right of the Hearst press to attack it, if that should conceivably be necessary. No more exacting test of its loyalty to principle could be demanded.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

Thank you for your letter of Nov.

4th. I agree with you that the explanation of Mr.

Baldwin's article is unconvincing, but the members of the board who criticized our draft all felt that it would be unwise to go into an explanation of the economic or political philosophy of any of our officers other than to enter a denial of the specific charge of communism in its political sense. The Union would not maintain the position that its director could properly belong to a political party and be actively identified with it. Our non-partisanship would be seriously affected. Sympathy with an economic movement is another matter.

Mr. Baldwin explains his economic and political views in the letter attached. Members of the board felt it better not to go into these points, since they would only be confusing. What is your view?
