A conference of representatives of all local Zionist groups last night agreed to support a slate of nine Zionist candidates for the American Jewish Conference.

Besides yourself, the slate includes:

Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner, Rabbi Armond Cohen, Rabbi Rudolph Rosenthal, Rabbi S. M. Zambrowsky, Mrs. A. F. Mellman, Ezra Z. Shapiro, either Dr. I. Milcoff or Mrs. Rose Kauffman (labor will decide tomorrow night) and myself.

The conference unanimously instructed me to request each of the nominees to respond to the following three questions:

Will you consent to stand on our slate? Will you attend the conference if elected? Will you pledge yourself to support the Biltmore platform unconditionally?

The conferees intend to work for all nine candidates, to secure the nomination of these nine in as many organizations as possible and to campaign for their election among the organization delegates. A committee headed by Mrs. Mellman is in charge of the canvass.

Dear Rabbi;

The autographed copy of your most inspiring address arrived a few days ago. It will remain a treasured possession. The news that a great many of your freends were drafting you for the presidency of the Z.O.A. sent a thrill of enthusiasm through me, and I am sure effected every true friend of the Zionist Movement. The time for a change in the tactecs as well as the personnel of the leadership is long past due. I hope and pray that nothing will happen to interfere with your acceptance of the responsibility of the leadership at this time.

For years I have been agitating for an aggressive policy of education among our own people as well as among the general public, for a better understanding of the Zionist problem. Only recently have I begun to see any support to these ideas. It appears necessary to-day that all the resources of our movement be concentrated in an effort to win over the public opinion of the American masses, for the main street of America controls the destiny of the world.

One of the first things the American Jewry should do, is to show the/grepugnance at the appointment of Mr. Sulzberger as head of the American Red Cross. Under the sanctimonious cloak of a life-saving movement, this man has already condemned, and is daily putting to death, literally, thousands of human beings, by his policy and intrigue against the Jewish Homeland. It is most disgusting to see the indifference of the Jewish press and leadership towards this impossible situation. If a petition were circulated among the liberal element in America demanding his removal, it would be a political act of the first importance, as it would reveal the anti-Zionists in their true light. inhuman supporters of a policy that is working hand in ghove with Hitler's extermination program. This, supported by flimsy excuses which are really based off their own selfish desire to maintain a certain social prestige.

PS. I have just finished reading the J.T.A. bulletin of August 10th, and noticed the movement to bar further discussion on the Palestine situation. This strikes me as being a diplomatic non-intervention program similar to that enforced by the Spanish War. Behind the official screed of this program, the opponents of liberty could interfere freely without the embarrasment of their dark deeds being brought to life. It would be very easy to liquidate Jewish problem with the sanction of official secrecy, as were the Iraci Christians, about 10 years ago.

A spontaneous movement through the Civil Liberties League, and the Press, could easily squelch this attempt to rob the freedom of speech, one of the four freedoms, from the people of America.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

Thank you for sending me the release from the Independent Jewish Press Service. I am not at all surprised for Mrs. Goldman was not exactly confused, saddened or fearful. She was just furious.

In the first place she has not any Jewish background that would give her a sympathetic understanding of what was involved in the whole Conference. She represents the Assimilationist Group which abhors everything that smacks of Oriental custom. I am sure she does not know the difference between Hebrew and Yiddish. I am sure that she read the translation in the Conference Record just as I did and found that there was some very fine material in some of the Yiddish addresses.

Had the same addresses been given in French or any language other than Yiddish, methinks Mrs. Goldman would not have been so horribly embarrassed. I am looking forward with a great deal of interest and misgiving to the sessions of the Triennial to be held in Chicago next month. Katherine Bang and I are delegates from Cleveland and while it will be very difficult for me to get away at this time, I feel that the Palestine Resolution will need a protagonist to face the kind of sentiment that Mrs. Goldman has expressed in the San Francisco address.

From Edgar Kaufman, I get a very different expression of interest. He is definitely worried about the implementation of the proposed plans. Before answering him, I want to spend a short time with you so that the information I give him will be authentic. He took exception to my statement that I felt that the establishment of Commonwealth was the answer to the Jewish problem. He thinks it is only one of the answers. I shall discuss this with you later.

RESOLUTION ADOPTED AT MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL OF UNITED SYNA-GOGUE OF AMERICA ON NOVEMBER 9th, 1943.

WHEREAS the American Jewish Conference was convened for the purpose of creating a common instrument of action for American Jews in dealing with the problems of the rights and position of Jews in Europe and Palestine, and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the United Synagogue of America that it express its keen disappointment and regrets in the action of the American Jewish Committee in severing its relations from the body of American Jewry at a time when unity and harmony are vital, because only through unity in action can we best serve and save the Jewish people, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United Synagogue of America withdraw from affiliation with the American Jewish Committee. November 12, 1943

My dear Rabbi Silver:

The story of the Sulzberger matter here is as follows: Jonah Wise on his own, arranged for an invitation, without placing it before the Committee on Public Relations, to go to Arthur Hays Sulzberger, to be the chief speaker at the Maccabean Rally, to be held in Temple Emanuel on Sunday afternoon, December 26th. The delegates to the Federation of Reform Synagogues asked that the entire matter be referred back to the Committee.

When the Committee met, I was disposed to cooperate in securing the consent of a speaker known to be a Zionist. Just before the second meeting of the Committee, however, I learned of Sulzberger's letter to you, and therefore declined to take any responsibility with respect to the meeting whatsoever. It was arranged, however, that Nathan Straus be the "offset" speaker, and Straus accepted Jonah's invitation.

Wednesday of this week, however, we were called into Committee session again, and informed that Sulzberger, in view of the circumstances, did not wish to speak. The Committee is apprizing Nathan Straus of the situation. It was decided to ask a Chaplain to be the speaker at the Maccabean Rally. It is regrettable that, any invitation in the first instance should have been issued, without the approval of the Committee in charge. Now, however, Sulzberger is out of the picture, with respect to the Maccabean Rally, at least.

I suppose you know that some time ago, he presented his resignation as a member of the Executive Committee of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, because of its decision to participate in the sessions of the American Jewish Conference. My dear Mr. Goodman:

Permit me to thank you for your kind letter of November 24 and for bringing to my attention the meeting addressed by Mr. Morris D. Waldman in your community to explain the reasons why the American Jewish Committee has withdrawn from the Conference. A complete answer to the charges of the American Jewish Committee which Mr. Waldman reiterated at this meeting has been given by the Conference itself. It is now available in booklet form and can be sent to the men who attended the meeting if they are interested in receiving it. I will therefore refrain from commenting on Mr. Waldman's arguments which are covered in the Conference rejoinder.

I feel, however, that I should make an observation on a statement which you reported as having been made by Mr. Waldman to the effect that "the leaders of the American Jewish Conference including yourself (meaning Dr. Silver) had been informed prior to the Conference by Judge Proskauer that the Administration in Washington felt that if the Conference passed the Palestine Resolution it would consider it a 'very unfortunate thing at the present time'", and that furthermore, "when Mr. Waldman was asked what was the attitude of the Administration when the Conference Committee actually presented the Resolution to Washington -- Mr. Waldman said that the 'State Department was very much perturbed'".

All of which, my dear Mr. Goodman, is I am afraid made out of the whole cloth. There were all sorts of rumors circulating during the Conference to the effect that this man or that man in the Administration had said this or that about the attitude of the Administration towards the Palestine Resolution. As chairman of the Commission on Palestine, I made a particular effort to trace down the authenticity of these rumors — who in the Administration had said it, and Mr. Goodman

what it was that was said. The closest inquiry by myself and by others of the Palestine Commission yielded absolutely no authentic information that we could put our fingers on. When I was in Washington on Tuesday, October 12, I had an hour's conversation at the White House with Judge Samuel J. Rosenman who told me quite categorically that he was not authorized nor did he speak for the President at any time on matters connected with the American Jewish Conference, nor to his best knowledge had the President expressed any opinion about the American Jewish Conference whatsoever.

As far as the attitude of the Administration when the Conference Committee actually presented the resolution to Washington. which attitude Waldman characterized as being "very much perturbed", I can only say that I was a member of that Conference Committee which called upon Secretary of State Hull and which included Dr. Solomon B. Freehof, President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Mr. Louis Lipsky and Mr. Goldman. National Vice-President of the B'nai B'rith. Secretary Hull was not only not disturbed, but was most friendly and sympathetic, and our intimate half hour conversation in which the Palestine Resolution was discussed in great detail was carried on in a most cordial spirit. The Secretary asked for additional. data especially on the absorptive capacity of Palestine which we have since made available to him. I have had other contacts since with the highest officials of our Government, and I have yet to find one unfavorable reaction to the Resolution on Palestine which was adopted by such an overwhelming majority by the American Jewish Conference.

You may make this letter of mine available to the men who attended the meeting and you may also send a copy of it to Mr. Waldman.

DRAFT OF LETTER TO DELEGATES TO THE AMERICAN JEWISH CONFERENCE

Dear___:

At a meeting of the Interim Committee of the American Jewish Conference held in New York on November 23, 1943 the following resolution was adopted, summoning the Jewish communities of America to effective action to bring about the abrogation of the British White Paper on Palestine which is due to go into effect on March 1, 1944. The White Paper is in clear violation of the intent and purposes of the Balfour Declaration and the Palestine Mandate which calls for the establishment of the Jewish National Home in Falestine.

> The Interim Committee of the American Jewish Conference directs its Palestine Commission to undertake immediately a program for the mobilization of American public opinion against the British White Paper of 1939 on Palestine.

The Palestine Commission is authorized to set up such machinery and to take such steps as will reflect the unanimous decision of the American Jewish Conference as expressed in its Palestine Resolution, to use its utmost resources to bring about the withdrawal of the White Paper.

All delegates to the American Jewish Conference are urged in the local communities to bring about the most effective cooperation in order to achieve this result.

An Emergency Committee on Palestine has been formed in your community which will be charged with the responsibility of defending the rights of the Jews in Palestine and the interests of the Jewish National Home. If you, as a delegate to the American Jewish Conference, have not already been coopted in the membership of this Committee, may we suggest that you make known your willingness to serve so that the benefit of your counsel may be placed at the disposal of the local Emergency Committee.

From time to time the Falestine Commission of the American Jewish Conference will communicate with you and inform you of any future action which the Commission deems advisable to undertake.

Frankly, I believe this would get better results than anything else, as it seems to me that the White Paper can best be combatted by people who are strongly opposed to it getting in touch with their senators and congressmen, and possibly by getting the help of their non-Jewish friends in this matter, which might be a very effective approach, in addition to the other.

Doctor, I am afraid that I still cannot entirely agree with you in the matter of ignoring the non-Zionist and the Anti-Zionist in this fight against the White Paper. After all, it has not been won yet, by a long-shot, and it seems to me that we should concentrate all of our efforts on winning this fight and on knocking out this White Paper before making the attack for recognition of a Jewish Commonwealth. Of course, I realize that I am not fully informed about this whole matter, and if I were, possibly my views might be different, but from what I do know about it, I personally feel that now is the time to get together and knock out the White Paper and not to be fighting among ourselves as to the status of a Jewish Commonwealth. Both you and I know that if the White Paper is knocked out and full immigration restored, that the Commonwealth will come along in a natural way and no one can stop it.

Therefore, I am again taking this opportunity to urge that we take these non-Zionists and Anti-Zionists at their word that they are opposed to the White Paper and will help to destroy it by requesting this full help immediately, and let's see just how sincere they are.

As you know, these people, while comparatively few in number, are really quite vocal and in many cases representative, as far as our non-Jewish friends are concerned, who consider them good, representative Jews, whether or not they are.

The above is my reaction and I am giving it to you for whatever it might be worth, as I feel that you are entitled to know how I feel about it, even though I may be entirely wrong. However, regardless of whether we should call these people in or not, I still feel that a lot of good could be accomplished by holding a regional meeting and possible another on the coast and in one or two other regional spots, and if this is done, it should be done quickly, so that we can get in touch with our representatives and senators while they are at home for the holidays.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

In reply to your letter of December 8th, I have the draft of the letter which you turned over to Mr. Montor. I believe that it will be possible to send it out next week.

Neither of the two Committees you appointed have, as yet, met. Mr. Lipsky is away in Mexico at this time, and as soon as he returns his Committee will meet to draw a list of suggested names for cooption. May I personally submit to you some suggested names, and I should like to have your reaction:

Milton Kutz, Wilmington, Deleware. He is a non-Zionist, an important official of Dupont and the key person in Deleware. To my knowledge he has shown an open mind in recent months to the problem of Palestine. You probably know him yourself.

Israel November of Richmond, Virginia; President of the Community Council, a member of Dr. Callish's Congregation, a delegate to the Conference, and he has developed positive Zionist viewpoints. He is being developed as the center of opposition to Callish domination in Richmond.

I further suggest David M. Watchmaker of Boston who, I am sure, you know. Would it not be advisable to bring into the Palestine Commission Mr. Edwin J. Schanfarber of Columbus? I also suggest that Detroit be brought into the picture, either through Rabbi Glazer or Henry Weineman.

The other Committee you named - the Committee on Program will probably meet following the Interim Committee meeting on Wednesday. I felt it rather important that Judge Levinthal participate in the discussion of this committee, and inorder that he may definitely be at such meeting, I thought that since he is coming to the Interim Committee meeting, we might conveniently have this committee meet in the evening, so as to have a full attendance.

You will note that in presenting these suggestions for the Palestine Commission, I have in mind bringing so-called non-Zionists in who, none-the-less, to my knowledge have shown a healthy appreciation of Jewish aspirations in Palestine. - 2 -

The draft of a statement in expose of the Emergency Committee to Save the Jewish People of Europe is now in p reparation, and since we are so close to the Interim Committee meeting, it will be presented to that meeting and released immediately thereafter.

Incidentally, the official statement to the delegates is also in preparation, and that too will go out immediately following the Interim Committee meeting. After mailing this official statement to the delegates, the Palestine Commission Statement will follow.

I regret to advise you that Judge Steinbrink definitely declined to accept the co-chairmanship of the Palestine Commission. I understand he indicated a definite preference to serve on the Rescue, Relief and Rehabilitation Commission. Both Dr. Wise and Mr. Shulman are of the opinion that there is no hope for a change of mind on his part. May I then suggest to you that you offer your own suggestions for the co-chairmanship and wire me, so that I may present your suggestions to the Administrative Committee which is meeting jointly with the Co-Chairmen on Tuesday afternoon, December 14th? We should name and obtain the acceptance of the co-chairman as quickly as possible. Is it necessary to have a co-chairman from New York for the Palestine Commission? Would it not be desirable to have someone from the "interior"? How do you feel about a man like Edgar Kaufmann of Pittsburgh?

This is all for the time being. I shall keep you advised and please do not hesitate to communicate to me any thought pertaining to the Commission.

My dear Mr. Fishman:

I am sorry that I did not get a chance to see you in New York early this week. I wanted to ask you to take over the chairmanship of the Press Committee of the Zionist Emergency Council. This, as you readily realize, is a tremendously important part of our activities. The professional set-up of the Press Committee is rather satisfactory. We have at the head of it a very energetic and capable newspaper man, Mr. Manson, who stepped in when his predecessor, Mr. Kenen was lend-leased to the American Jewish Conference. But we need a lay-chairman and a small but active lay committee of newspaper men to guide him on general policies and to explore areas of greater usefulness. The committee should include some leaders in the field of English, Anglo-Jewish and Yiddish journalism. The committee needs to be built up although we already have some acceptances.

I know of no one better qualified to take over the direction of this responsible service than you. It will not involve you in day by day activity. The committee need meet no more than once or twice a month, but Mr. Manson will have someone of experience to consult whenever he needs advise and counsel. Here's the dope on Gottold Ephraim Lessing., born Jan. 22, 1729 requiescat in pace.

"The enlightenment of the 18th century did not take hold in Germany as it did in France. There are few German names that can be placed along side those of the great French thinkers such as Motesquieu, Diderot and Voltair. I haps the one German writer and thinker who deserves to rank in the company of those is Lessing, who in the range of his interests and in his firm beli f in the power of human reason uxpx upheld a point of view similar to theirs.

Lessing was born of Jewish parents in Kamenz, Baxony. While studying at the U. of Leipzig, he became interested in drama, to which he was later to devote a part of his energies. Lessing's range of interests was wide. His greatest influence probably resulted from his criticsm, especially from his ideas on poetry and its relations to the other arts.. His dramatic criticism clarified certain preconceptions taken over from the French cramatists, and opened the way to a freer development. He was also a creator--three best-known plays, Minna von Barnhelm, Emilia Galotti and Nathan the Wise, he introduced characters from everyday life, a distinct innovation in the Garman literature of the time. In Nathan the Wise he developed some of his most cherished beliefs on racial and religious tolerance. The words that Lessing placed in the mouth of Nathan need to be emphasized in Garmany today even more than when Lessing first wrote them:

> "What is race forsooth? Are Jews and Christians Christians and Jews Rather than men?--oh, if I've found in you One more forwhom it is enough to be A man".

That's the background dope I have on him. It should lend itself beautifully to commentary by Silver or Kenen. Carry out the line that in addition to the fact that freedom of thought and freedom of people is the Allies paramount aim, we also admire the music, art, and literary contributions of the really great free-thinking Garmans. Hence we have no idea of carrying on war against the people of Germany once their rabid militarist leaders and the Master Race idea are obliterated.

Please send on Silver's proper title, and if you can remember, just what that mission was that took him to England last year. Also what books he has authored. Does he not hold a position, honorary or co-chairman or something of that peace committee in Cleveland headed by Philip Smead Bird?

You're sell to do it--thanks loads. Told you I'd callon you when I saw a good opening, and will again. I appreciate your cooperation, on behalf of me and Elmer Davis. Tell Silver this will go out in 26 languanges, shrot wave and cable.

eleg sign when gol, affice of war information From the darkness, intolerance and brutality which is Germany today, it is a relief and a hope for the future to turn to another Germany, whose inspiring symbol is Gotthold Ephraim Lessing, the anniversary of whose birthday occurs on January 22nd.

. . .

The Nazis have had the books of this world-famous poet, critic and humanist burned, for they feared what was in his books - the great soul of a gloriously free human being. Lessing despised and excoriated in his day - the middle decades of the 18th century - what the Nazis have come to represent in our day, - vicious bigotry, social reaction, false pride of race and national aggression.

Lessing was a rarely endowed artist and used his literary gifts to preach liberalism, freedom for the human mind and human brotherhood. Every form of injustice and prejudice aroused his mighty spirit and he valiantly championed their victims. His noble and extraordinary defense of the Jewish people in such plays as "The Jews" and "Nathan the Wise" marked a decisive turning point in the attitude of Christian Europe towards the people which had for centuries been misrepresented and subjected to all the indignities of the ghetto. Lessing's lifelong friendship with the pious Jewish sage and philosopher, Moses Mendelssohn - an interracial friendship as rare in those days as it was beautiful was prophetic of a new comradeship which would come to exist among good men everywhere, regardless of their ancestry or different religious creeds.

Lessing maintained that all religions are good and true if they lead their adherents to a life of goodness and truth. Conversely, all religions are false if they lead their adherents to hatred, fanaticism and meanness of heart. Of this exalted teaching of Lessing, and her great German poet, Goethe, said: "May this absolutely divine idea of tolerance and forbearance ever remain holy and dear to the nation." Unfortunately, it has not! A vicious generation, led by men of violence and darkness, has shamelessly desecrated this divine idea and has made of Germany, the land of Lessing, Schiller and Goethe, a land of torture chambers and concentration camps, wherein scourges have been set over the free mind of man and wherein the cruelest forms of racial persecution have been macticed.

If Germany is ever to be saved, it will be saved only by Germans who will some day recapture for it the prophetic spirit, the broad humanity and the gracious tolerance that was the genius of Gotthold Ephraim Lessing.

Dear Dr. Silver:

You undoubtedly have learned by this time that a resolution on Falestine has been introduced both in the Senate and in the House of Representatives. I am enclosing herewith a copy of the resolution. The Senate resolution was introduced by Senator Robert F. Wagner of New York and Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, and the House resolution was introduced by Congressman Ranulf Compton of Connecticut and Congressman James A. Wright of Pennsylvania. The resolution is nonpartisan and has been endorsed most warmly by the majority and minority leaders of both Houses of Congress.

This is an event of utmost significance and the passage of the enclosed resolution will be of tremendous importance for the securing of Jewish rights in Palestine and for the opening of the doors of the Jewish National Home to unrestricted Jewish immigration. The American Jewish Conference at its great gathering last September adopted a Palestine resolution by an overwhelming vote of the delegates. It's principal ideas are reflected in the resolution now introduced in the Congress of the United States.

May I in my capacity of Chairman of the Palestine Commission of the American Jewish Conference urge upon you to write immediately to your local Congressman and Senators bespeaking their support for the resolution. It would be helpful, too, if you wrote letters of appreciation to the above mentioned Congressmen and Senators who introduced the resolution. We would also suggest that you meet with the Zionist Emergency Council in your community, if there is such a Council, or with the heads of Jewish organizations, to mobilize support for the resolution by the adoption of appropriate resolutions by your local community and its several organizations and the transmission of these resolutions, as well as of individualized letters, to your local Congressmen.

Time is of the essence and quick action is highly desirable.

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

AN OPEN LETTER TO DR.ABBA HILLEL SILVER.

I read with a mixture of chagrin and dismay your recent testimony before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and wonder if there is really no rational argument to sustain the plea for a Jewish National Homeland. All the sentimental eyewash of the professional fanatic could be easily ignored, but when a man of your intellectual stature stoops to the same trite and evasive phrases, we must pause in astonishment. You proclaim in one breath that you have "no desire to set up a theocracy in palestine, but to create a Jewish state like that of the French and the English." In this statement you imply the same hackneyed argument that Judaism is a nationality temporarily dispossessed of its homeland. In the comprehensive treatise on Judaism by the Encyclopedia Britannica there is nowhere the slightest implication that Judaism is a nationality. I quote, "Judaism, therefore, denotes a religion maintained by the Jews and offered to the world. It is nothing but the declaration of the function of the Jew and the duty assigned to Judaism".

Thus it is apparent that Political Zionism attempts to convert Judaism into a nationality contrary to the age-old acceptance of its function. Now then, if that is your aim, well and good. But please explain to me as one of the millions of Jews who are frankly confused, how you propose to solve the question of a dual nationality for the American Jew. If Judaism becomes a nationality then you and I automatically owe allegiance to the Jewish State, and, by the simple rules of logic, cannot simultaneously owe allegiance to the American Constitution. On the other hand, if we prefer to remain loyal to our American citizenship we must automatically renounce our Judaism, if it be a nationality and not purely a religion. I know you are about to tell me that the Irishman can be a good American and still be loyal to his homeland. But such a silly argument smacks of the tricks of a political spellbinder, who is always ready to distort the truth in order to stir the emotions of the befuddled masses. The plain truth is, as every child knows, that the Irishman renounces all allegiance to his homeland the moment he takes the oath of allegiance to our constitution. He may still retain his brogue, but by nationality he is an American and no longer an Irishman.

If, God forbid, England could be induced to set up a Jewish State, and America were to become embroiled in a war with Palestine, pray tell me to whom the American Jew would owe his allegiance. Before we try to convert the ancient mission of Judaism into a chauvinistic state these simple questions must be answered clearly, without equivocation or mental reservation. Unless you can reduce your proposals to an appeal to reason rather than the emotions you will continue to aggravate the dissensions among our people, and progressively increase the jeering and scoffing among our enemies the world over.

I shall deeply appreciate your elucidation without rancor or recriminations as a respected teacher in Israel.

Dear Sir:

My attention has been drawn to a letter you addressed to Mr. H. L. Meites. Editor of the Chicago Jewish Chronicle enclosing an "Open Letter to Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver" ; and as a Zionist I feel impelled to convey to you my reaction upon having read your communication.

You say in your letter to Mr. Meites that you are sure he will render the Zionist Cause a genuine service by urging the Zionist Leaders to answer the questions you have posed, and that your repeated trials to procure answers have only succeeded in evoking vicious abuse and name-calling. Yet it appears to me that your OPEN LETTER to DR. SILVER is of the character which your foregoing remarks condemn.

Your last sentence in your OPEN LETTER says that you would appreciate "elucidation without rancor or recriminations". May I endeavor to offer some "elucidation" without rancor or recrimination?

First, your letter states that an assertion by Dr. Silver, referred to in your letter, implies "the same hackneyed argument that Judaism is a nationality temporarily dispossessed of its homeland." I am sure that you will not find in any Zionist leader's speech or assertion the reference to "Judaism" as a nationality; you will find the statement that the <u>Jewish</u> <u>People</u> is a nationality. In the very quotation from the Encyclopedia Brittanica which you refer to, you can note the distinction that "Judaism denotes a religion maintained by the <u>Jews</u>" and in the last sentence of your quotations- "It (Judaism) is nothing but the declaration of the function of the Jew and the duties assigned to <u>Judaism</u>". Note the distinction in both sentences between the Jew and Judaism.

While purporting to ask questions, your OPEN LETTER asserts strong argument, the logic of which is challenged by every Zionist exponent in history. Your statement that "Political Zioniam attempts to convert "Judaiam" into a nationality contrary to its age-old acceptance of its functions" is fallacious and historically untrue. Zioniam attempts to do nothing with "Judaiam" but to preserve it; and attempts to create a Jewish Commonwealth where the Jewish People may be free to practice Judaiam without the economic, social, political and other handicaps which compel wither the abandonment by the Jew of the observance of Judaiam or its distortion into such observances and practices as necessitates modification of the character of Judaiam by such adjectives as "Reform", "Conservative", "Orthodox", and the like.

When you refer to yourself as "one of the millions of Jews who are frankly confused", I believe you are overmodest. I am convinced that there are not so many of you as your exaggerated figure would indicate.

The question of a "dual nationality for the American-Jew" is one that persists at being raised from time to time with the persistancy and periodic recurrance as the story of the "Protocols of the Elders of Zion". The late Justice Louis D. Brandeis, the late Judge Julian W. Mack, every president of the United States from Woodrow Wilson to Franklin Delanc Reosevelt, the United States Congress in 1922, the leaders of both parties in both Houses of the present Congress have all found no problem of <u>dual nationality</u> in the adherence to or endorsement of Zionism in its aim for the establishment of a Jewish Commonwealth in Palestine.

You states- "If Judaism becomes a nationality, then you and I automatically owe allegience to the Jewish State". That statement is absolutely untrue. You and I owe allegience to the state of our citizenship. Only Jews whe shall become citizens of the Jewish State will owe allegience to the Jewish Commonwealth in Palestine. You says- "If we prefer to remain loyal to our American Citizenship, we must automatically renounce our Judaism if it be a nationality not only a religion". Again you are wrong. American citizenship gives us the right to retain our Judaism which is a religion. The Jewish Commonwealth in Palestine should also be a democracy where religious freedom will prevail and where Judaism may be the predominating religion as Christianity is the predominating religion in America.

Your paragraph about the Irishman, calling the argument "silly", uses phraseology such as you condemn in your complaint about name-calling, etc. For isn't it true that no American has ever found fault with the patriotism of an Irish-American who campaigned in this country for <u>Home Rule in Ireland</u> in earlier days and for Irish Independence at this present time? Whoever insinuated that an Irishman who became an American citizen was obliged to abandon the religion that was his as an Irishman, or, whoever would think that the Irishman's Oath of Allegience to our Constitution would bar him from actively interesting himself in Ireland or the Irish People?

It seems trite to be obliged to say that in the event of war between one country and another each individual owes his allegience to the land of his citizenship; we constantly have instances of brother fighting brother. In prior wars, Jews were among the fighting forces of contending belligerents and Germans of American nationality have proven themselves patriotic citizens in our war with Germany. I venture to say you will find American citizens of Japanese descent in our fighting forces today.

If you would but remember that Judaism is a religion, that the Jewish People should be the exponents of that religion (many of them forget that they are or should be) and that the establishment of a Jewish Commonwealth in Palestime for the Jewish Feople is not an attempt to "convert the ancient mission of Judaism into a chauvinistic state", as you so sarcastically assert, but to ereate a Homeland where the "mission of Judaism" may find more free expression than is possible in surroundings where Jews constitute a minority of the population, then you would understand that you have been laboring under a confusion of terms; that is to say, you have confused the term "Judaism" with the expression "the Jewish People". Please stop and find among your own acquaintence how many define "Judaism" or its requirements for due observance, in the same manner. I venture to say your acquaintance, taken individual by individual, may Tun the gamut from extreme famaticism, through Orthodoxy, moderate and immoderate, Conservatism, Liberal, Reform and even unto Agnosticism and Atheism; not to speak of Christian-Scientists, Ethical culturists and apostates to other religions. All of these are of the Jewish People. To all of these I could not attribute the religion of Judaism nor trust them with its mission."

I hope you will find the foregoing to be an endeavor at "elucidation without rancor or recriminations". On that level I will be pleased to pursue the discussion.

Dear Mr. Kaplan; -

Thank you very much for taking the trouble to express your reactions to my recent letter to Dr.Silver, but regret that I have long ago given up hope of trying to debate this vital and highly controversial question with a devout Zionist. One may as well try to debate religion with a devout Catholic. You expect me to believe in the infallibility of Brandeis, Roosevelt, Wise, Goldman &c., just as the Catholic is expected to believe in the infallibility of the Pope. Unfortunately I happen to be an inveterate iconoclast and no hero-worshipper, and expect a controversial question to be answered on the bAsis of simple logic, refusing to be guided by what others say or think.

Only for that reason I asked Mr.Meites to allow the subject to be debated in his columns. Allow him to print both sides of the controversy and let the reader form his own conclusion. That is the democratic way. Unless perhaps you prefer the totalitarian methods of the Daily Worker or the New Deal, who will allow only their side of a question to be published. If you really believe that your logic is sound why not allow the reader to judge in open forum ? Such an attitude certainly weakens the Zionist cause, just as in any debate a one-sided argument would fall flat if its propenent refused to allow the other side to be heard.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I am writing to you now about an item concerning the transactions of the Palestine Committee at a Conference Session.

At the last meeting of the Palestine Committee, Habbi Heller asked about the disposal of the Union and the Non-Partisan resolutions. To this you replied, "I believe I am authorized to answer that the second resolution introduced by the Reform religious group has been withdrawn." As for the third resolution, Mr. Schaffer said that it, too, had been withdrawn. You also stated at the Plenary Session that these two resolutions had been withdrawn. In a communication from Rabbi Eisendrath to Miss Evans, I found that the Reform resolution was not officially withdrawn. I am sending you herewith a copy of Rabbi Eisendrath's letter. As you will see from this letter, the Union feels very strongly about this matter. Would it then be advisable to add a footnote in the proceedings, somewhat as follows:

"Rabbi Eisendrath, Director of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, was not present at this meeting (referring to the last meeting of the Palestine Committee) and did not, himself, officially withdraw his resolution."

ASK: FS Enc: Note: Copy sent to 342 Madison Avenue, New York City. EXCERPT FROM LETTER OF RABBI EISENDRATH TO MISS EVANS DATED MARCH 17, 1944:

I hasten to reply to your specific inquiry concerning what actually took place with regard to the Union resolution presented to the American Jewish Conference. It never was actually officially "withdrawn" by any of the Union delegates. What really took place was this: Just prior to the presentation to the Palestine Commission of the final draft of the Palestine resolution, Mr. Rosenberg and I were in conference with Dr. Silver in his room. Following the lastminute emendations, Dr. Silver went down to the Palestine Committee meeting, while Mr. Rosenberg and I remained in Dr. Silver's room to discuss just what action we would take when the resolution was presented at that final session when the resolution was actually presented, although I do think that Mr. Goldman was there at that time. In reading the stenographic report of that session, I see that Dr. Heller specifically asked whether the other resolutions were withdrawn, and I note that the sponsors of the non-partisan resolution answered to the effect that they had withdrawn their resolution. No further question was asked, and no definite word was spoken regarding the Union resolution.

I don't think that the point is terribly important, as it really doesn't matter to the Conference itself, or to world Jewry, whether the Union did or did not withdraw its resolution; but I do think that within our own Union family it is rather important to stick to what actually did take place, in view of the fact that a formal withdrawal might seem to indicate acquiescence in the final draft of the resolution. This was certainly not the case, as both Mr. Rosenberg and I indicated that we were not satisfied with this particular resolution and that we would refrain from voting for it. Consequently I do believe that any report of the Conference should omit any specific reference to the withdrawal of the Union resolution.

Dear Rabbi:

In connection with the matter we discussed relative to Mrs. Fryer's substitution, I enclose herewith two copies of the rules governing the situation which I just received from I. L. Kenen of the American Jewish Conference. The present Rule 30, as amended by the Interim Committee on May 12, is slightly different from the old Rule 30, which is as follows:

> "30. In the case of a vacancy occurring for any reason in any election district or region, a delegate elected to the American Jewish Conference may choose his successor from among the other nonelected candidates on the ballot; or if there are none, then from the organization which he represents."

As I remember it, the Council of Jewish Women, as such, nominated only Mrs. Fryer so that there were no non-elected candidates on the ballot nominated by her organization. Under the circumstances, Mrs. Fryer could cause her organization to propose someone. I presume they would follow her suggestion. In the event she failed to do anything about it, the Local Election Committee would be empowered to fill the vacancy.

It would seem reasonable for Mrs. Fryer to designate Mrs. Mellman, especially in view of the fact that she herself heartily and fully endorsed the Conference Palestine Resolution.

RULES GOVERNING THE FILLING OF DELEGATE VACANCIES for the SECOND SESSION OF THE CONFERENCE ADOPTED BY THE INTERIM COMMITTEE MAY 12, 1944

- <u>Rule 30:</u> In the case of a vacancy occurring for any reason in any election district or region, a delegate elected to the American Jewish Conference must choose his successor from among the non-elected candidates on the ballot nominated by the same groups or organizations; or if there are none, then a person to be proposed by the organizations or groups which had nominated him; in the event the delegate cannot or will not act, then the local Election Committee shall be empowered to fill the vacancy.
- RULE 30A: If the vacancy be due to death of the elected delegate or in case the delegate vacating his seat shall fail to act, and name a successor within the rules, not later than 5 days before the American Jewish Conference, the vacancy shall be filled by the local Election Committee, by a majority vote of its members with due regard for the intent and purpose of Paragraph 30.
