American Zionist Emergency Council, Roosevelt, Franklin D., 1944.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt authorized Dr. Stephen S. Wise and Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, on March 9, 1944, to issue the following statement:

"The President authorized us to say that the American government has never given its approval to the White Paper of 1939.

"The President is happy that the doors of Palestine are today open to Jewish refugees and that when future decisions are reached, full justice will be done to those who seek a Jewish National Home, for which our government and the American people have always had the deepest sympathy and today more than ever, in view of the tragic plight of hundreds of thousands of homeless Jewish refugees."

The desperate plight of many millions of refugees of all nationalities and creeds has aroused the compassionate interest of the American people. The War Refugee Board was created by me in order to secure the immediate rescue of as many refugees as can still be saved.

The attention of the world has especially been directed to the terrible calamities which have overtaken the Jews of Europe. Hitler's program, designed to accomplish their complete extermination, has already resulted in the death, under conditions of incredible brutality, of millions of men, women and children.

Bundreds of thousands, perhaps millions, of those who will survive will wish for the opportunity to rebuild their shattered lives among their own people in Palestine. Fortunately, that country has already demonstrated its capacity to absorb large numbers of Jews as the result of the remarkable pioneering effort of Jewish settlers during the last several decades, assisted by the generous material contributions of their fellow Jews throughout the world. This work of upbuilding, which has been a magnificent example of what can be achieved only by men dedicated to an ideal, has been of benefit not only to the Jewish but also to the Arab inhabitants of the country.

Our people and our Government have long had the deepest sympathy for the age-old aspiration of the Jewish people to reconstitute their National Home in Palestine. We can never forget that our Government was consulted and gave its full support and approval to the Balfour Declaration. This was later confirmed by the action of the Congress of the United States in a Joint Resolution unanimously adopted on June 24, 1922. The Mandate for Palestine, which was approved by the 51 member nations of the League of Nations, was also

confirmed by the British-American Convention of 1924. By this agreement our Government gave its assent to the designation of Great Britain as the Mandatory Power charged with the obligation to facilitate the immigration of Jews into Palestine and their close settlement on the land.

The new policy which was announced under the British White

Paper of 1959 would prohibit in the near future all further Jewish

immigration into Palestine and places drastic restrictions on Jewish

land purchase and settlement and perpetuates a minority status for

Jews in their own National Home. This policy has never been accepted

by our Government. It is my condent hope, shared, I believe, by

Prime Minister Churchill, whose deep and sympathetic interest in the

upbuilding of the Jewish National Home is a matter of record, that

the doors of Palestine will be opened for the free entry of Jews into

that country and that there shall be full opportunity for colonization

and economic development so that they may continue the upbuilding of

their National Home in accordance with the intent and purpose of the

Balfour Declaration and the Mandate for Palestine.

The distinguished British and American statesmen who participated in the framing of these historic documents have made it indubitably clear what their intent and purpose were. President Wilson stateds "I am persuaded that the Allied Nations, with the fullest concurrence of our own Covernment and people, are agreed that in Palestine shall be laid the foundations of a Jewish Commonwealth." This remains the fixed purpose of the American people.

Message to the President of the United States.

befallen the Jews of Germany, of Poland, of Czechoslavakia and of the
Baltic countries, also threatens the Jews of Hungary, the largest remaining Jewish community in Europe.

The Government of Hungary, in response to an aroused world opinion including that of our own people and Government, has shown itself ready despite Nazi pressure, to permit the departure of all Jews in possession of immigration certificates for Palestine, and of all children up to the age of ten with visas for unoccupied Europe and overseas. But even these concessions will be useless unless immediate action is taken to give effect to the prospects of rescue thus opened up. We therefore respectfully urge that the following steps be taken without delay.

1. That the Government of the United States assume the initiative in formulating forthwith an effective rescue program which will facilitate the removal of Jews from Hungary, also if possible from other Hitler do minated lands, by all available means.

2. That the Government of the United States use its good offices to secure the immediate grant by Great Britain, irrespective of previous policies, of immigration certificates into Palestine for all Hungarian Jews who can be rescued. Pending their permanent settlement in Palestine rescue camps should be established for them there, and we urge further that our Government be empowered to finance the transportation of such refugee immigration and to provide all facilities as may be in its power to offer.

The oppressed Jews of Europe look to you, Mr. President, for salvation; they look also to non-Jewish Americans like ourselves for such aid as we may give them in their distress. We are confident that under your leadership a rescue program can be carried out which will provide this tortured people with new life and hope.

And we urge further that our Government assist in financing the transportation of such refugee emigration and provide all facilities as may be in its power to offer.

We are confident that under your leadership a rescue program can be carried out which will provide this tortured people with new life and hope.

COPY DEPARTMENT OF STATE Washington In reply refer to September 16, 1944 American PalestineCCommittee. 41 East Forty-second Street, New York, New York. Sirs: I have received by reference from the White House your communication of August 18, 1944 addressed to the President urging that this Government formulate a rescue program for the removal of Jews from Hungary and from other Hitler dominated lands and use its offices to secure a grant by Great Birtain of immigration certificates into Palestine for all Jews who can be rescued from Hungary or other Nazi dominated countries. There is attached for your information a copy of the joint declaration of the Governments of the United Kingdom and the United States dated August 17, 1944 accepting the offer of the Government of Hungary for the release of Jews. All possible arrangements for the care of such Jews have been made pending definite information from the Government of Hungary as to the numbers whose departure is to be permitted. For your information substantial numbers of Palestine certificates have been issued to Hungarian Jews but unfortunately no efidence is yet available to this Government that the holders of these certificates or the children under ten years of age included in the Hungarian offer are actually to be permitted to depart. I can assure you that the Department and the War Refugee Board will continue their efforts to rescue these victimes of Nazi oppression and to do everything within their power to care for those who may succeed in leaving Hungary. The International Committee of the Red Cross has communicated to the Governments of the United Kingdom and the United States an offer of the Hungarian Government regarding the emigration and treatment of Jews. Because of the desperate plight of the Jews in Hungary and the overwhelming humanitarian considerations involved the two governments are informing the Government of Hungary through the International Committee of the Red Cross that, despite the heavy difficulties and responsibilities involved, they have accepted the offer of the Hungarian Government for the release of Jews and will make arrangements for the care of such Jews leaving. Hungary who reach neutral or United Nations territory, and also that they will find temporary havens of refuge where such people may live in safety. Notification of these assurances is being given to the governments of neutral countries who are being requested to permit the entry of Jews who reach their frontiers from Hungary. The Governments of the United Kingdom and the United States emphasize that, in accepting the offer which has been made, they do not in any way condone the action of the Hungarian Government in forcing the emigration of Jews as an alternative to persecution and death.

DEAR BOB:

KNOWING THAT YOUR ARE TO ATTEND THE FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE ZIONIST ORGANIZATION OF AMERICA, I ASK YOU TO CONVEY TO THE DELEGATES ASSEMBLED MY CORDIAL GREETINGS.

PLEASE EXPRESS MY SATISFACTION THAT, IN ACCORD WITH THE TRADITIONAL AMERICAN POLICY AND IN KEEPING WITH THE SPIRIT OF THE FOUR FREEDOMS, THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY AT ITS JULY CONVENTION THIS YEAR INCLUDED THE FOLLOWING PLANK IN ITS PLATFORM:

"WE FAVOR THE OPENING OF PALESTINE TO UNRESTRICTED JEWISH IMMIGRATION AND COLONIZATION, AND SUCH A POLICY AS TO RESULT IN THE ESTABLISHMENT THERE OF A FREE AND DEMOCRATIC JEWISH COMMONWEALTH."

EFFORTS WILL BE MADE TO FIND APPROPRIATE WAYS AND MEANS OF EFFECTUATING THIS POLICY AS SOON AS PRACTICABLE.

I KNOW HOW LONG AND ARDENTLY THE JEWISH PEOPLE HAVE WORKED AND PRAYED FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF PALESTINE AS A FREE AND DEMOCRATIC JEWISH COMMONWEALTH. I AM CONVINCED THAT THE AMERICAN PEOPLE GIVE THEIR SUPPORT TO THIS AIM AND IF REELECTED I SHALL HELP TO BRING ABOUT ITS REALIZATION.

WITH CORDIAL REGARDS AND BEST WISHES-FRANKLIN D ROOSEVELT. Since the publication of "America and Palestine," two notable statements on Palestine by the Democratic and Republican candidates for the Presidency of the United States have been issued.

Statement by President Roosevelt

In a Letter to Senator Robert F. Wagner

"Knowing that you are to attend the forty-seventh annual Convention of the Zionist Organization of America, I ask you to convey to the Delegates assembled my cordial greetings.

"Please express my satisfaction that, in accord with the traditional American policy and in keeping with the spirit of the Four Freedoms, the Democratic Party at its July Convention this year included the following plank in its platform:

'We favor the opening of Palestine to unrestricted Jewish immigration and colonization, and such a policy as to result in the establishment there of of a free and democratic Jewish commonwealth.'

"Efforts will be made to find appropriate ways and means of effectuating this policy as soon as practicable. I know how long and ardently the Jewish people have worked and prayed for the establishment of Palestine as a free and democratic Jewish commonwealth. I am convinced that the American people give their support to this aim and if re-elected I shall help to bring about its realization."

October 15, 1944

Statement by Governor Thomas E. Dewey

"I heartily indorse the Palestine plank in the Republican Party platform. Again I repeat what I previously stated to the great leader of the American Zionist movement and distinguished American Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, that I am for the reconstitution of Palestine as a free and democratic Jewish commonwealth in accordance with the Balfour Declaration of 1917 and the resolution of the Republican Congress in 1922. I have also stated to Dr. Silver that in order to give refuge to millions of distressed Jews driven from their homes by tyranny I favor the opening of Palestine to their unlimited immigration and land ownership.

"The American people have time and again declared themselves in favor of these principles. The Republican Party has at all times been the traditional friend of the movement.

"As President I would use my best offices to have our government working together with Great Britain to achieve this great objective for a people that have suffered so much and deserve so much at the hands of mankind."
