I intended to send you earlier the enclosed copy of my chapter on Zionism in The United States, but wanted to take advantage of the remaining time before the printer sets up the closing portions of Mr. Cohen's book, to check on certain dates and other points that remained somewhat obscure. I am sorry also that owing to the technical difficulties involved in the typing, this copy is not as clear as the original in so far as certain corrections and inserts are concerned.

in writing this brief outline I was confronted with two difficulties, first, the absence of records and minutes of the early stages of our movement and second, the necessity of condensing into such small compass a pretty long and rather involved history. However I beleive I have given a fairly comprehensive sketch of the development of American Zionism.

I am hoping that when the strain of the present trying events is over and we see some clear daylight again the ZOA will give consideration the publication of a whole volume devoted to American Zionism, not only to the organizational actualities of the movement but also to the intellectual development or the unfoldment of Zionist ideas on this soil. Ohio Dear Doctor Silver: I am herewith enclosing copy of the memorandum that I had Flynn present to President Truman, which I went over with Tuvim and Shapiro before handing it to Flynn. Of course, I took full personal responsibility and Flynn understood that I was talking to him as a Democrat and not as the representative of the Emergency Council, for I may have indicated a possibility of a compromise for which I and not the Emergency Council, in any event, would be responsible. I am writing to you now because it seems to me clear that wewill get nowhere in becoming classified in Washington as "protest Rabiner". I feel very strongly that either we should say - or better still someone else should say - that we might be ready for a compromise, but not a fake Federalism. We should indicate that if a real Federal scheme was offered involving the larger area of Palestine as the Jewish district plus full control over immigration, we might be ready to discuss the matter. You know that I have been a protagonist of the Federalist scheme for nearly a decade and one of my personal grudges against the British is the fact that they are subverting while misappropriating the name. However, that is beside the point. I respectfully urge that we should enlist our best non-Zionist forces, even non-Jewish forces, for the best possible compromise which will insure the Jewish Commonwealth over an area in which the Jews of Palestine would constitute a majority. That last point is of the utmost significance, because even such good friends as Senator Pepper was so impressed in Palestine with Arab majority, that they waivered in support of our cause. This morning's paper carried an account that several proponents of bi-nationalism may appear at the London Conference. I regard this as a dangerous move which may be utilized merely to defeat partition by something much worse, for bi-nationalism inevitably implies limitation of Jewish immigration and consequent minority status of Jews in the "National Home."

It was largely for that reason that I have championed a <u>Federal</u> solution since 1938, when, with the knowledge and consent of the Jewish Agency I appeared before the Woodhead (Partition) Commission in London to present the case on behalf of a "Haifa Committee" on a plan for a "Jewish Commonwealth in a Federated Palestine".

I want to take this opportunity of reiterating that program as it appeared in booklet form, in 1941, which I am sending you under separate cover, in the hope that it may lead to some fruitful discussion at the Emergency Council Meeting.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I received your welcomed telegram this afternoon and put in a phone call to you for which I am now awaiting. I want to tell you that at the UPA Meeting yesterday, I presented the whole legal argument for the right and the duty of the President to intervene, on the basis of the Anglo-American Convention of December 3, 1924, in which Great Britain was made account to the United States with respect to Palestine, and warning that the British are likely to delay it until after the election. I, therefore, called upon the President to act promptly and immediately. Frieda Kirshwey took up that point and made the most of it. You can rely on us here in the office to make that a telling matter in the next few days.

I just received a telephone call from Elliot Janeway, former editor of Fortune Magazine and the campaign manager for candidate for Governor Snow. He offered to endorse the second ad which we will insert and promised that Snow would call for making Palestine a bi-partisan issue in line with Governor Dewey's demand.

Unfortunately, Dr. Wise made a wholly irrelevant talk on "Partition" which, in my opinion, was totally out of place even though it got the headlines.

I now want to make a suggestion to you for very careful consideration as it may give us an opportunity to rescue a good deal of what the London Conferees may have surrendered. The President practically pointed for a compromise between the so-called "Partition" view and the British offer of "Federalism". It seems to me that if we now present what will be the American Zioniwt point of view, we may get considerably more than any possible compromise and yet, in my opinion, it might be practicable for Great Britain to accept it. My thought is this: That two sister states be set up in Palestine (possibly including Trans Jordan) with strictly limited federal authority, under the control of a Federal Council, in which a Jewish Commonwealth and the sister Arab state will be equally represented, under the chairmanship of a British High Commissioner (who would have control over the Holy sites). Each state would control its own immigration policy and have all their autonomous rights except a few like customs, which might be assigned to the federal authority. The area of the Jewish State should be the maximum possible, provided that no less than 51 per cent nor more than 55 per cent of the population within that area would be Jewish. (This would

be an answer to those Liberals who fear that as a minority we would leave down the majority of Arabs, while at the same time, it would give us the opportunity to secure the maximum of territory - in my opinion enough to include the whole of Galilee, the whole of the Negeb, including the Coastal Plain.)

The advantage of such "an American plan" would be that it would not close the frontiers for all time but would give us a chance to develop from time to time by agreements with the Arab state, while it would give us the full opportunity to bring up the population within the Jewish area from 51 percent to 80 or 90 percent by quick and prompt immigration.

If we press for such an American plan as a compromise between the Jewish-Arab plan of Partition and the British plan for Federalism, there may be a chance for our Government to back it since it fulfills all the elements of democracy and self-government.

Please give this your best thought and I shall be glad to discuss it further with you if necessary.

I spent about an hour and a half with Judge Douglas in his chambers and was agreeably surprised to find someone who was familiar with our Zionist movement through long association with Judge Brandeis. Judge Douglas was very sympathetic and offered to help in any way he could provided it would not be anything that would subject him to possible criticism of a pre-election campaign. He inquired particularly as to what we wanted done, and at one point offered "to put on his hat" and go over to see the President and let am explain the situation to him. I told him that this was not the approach and that if anyone should see the President must be yourself as the leader of American Zionism. After considerable discussion we came to the conclusion that because of political effect it might be more advisable that Senator Mead should see the President with that end in view. Judge Douglas was particularly interested to know what we had in mind as the ultimate settlement of the problem. I told him I could not speak officially of such a program, but that we were all agreed that if the 100,000 Jewish refugees could be started moving "before election", it would be an indication that the Administration would be helpful. At this point I suggested that perhaps the President could be induced to appoint him as a special emissary to go to London at once as the presidential representative to solve this problem. (I made that off-hand suggestion because of my knowledge of how close he is to the progressive wing of the Democratic Party and as the "heir" of the Roosevelt tradition). Judge Douglas thought that this would be inadvisable for any Supreme Court Justice on an eve of election and expressed concern whether the Chief Justice would give his consent. In the way this question was answered it left the distinct impression upon my mind

that after election he would be as helpful as possible, and I added that Senator Mead might fill in the gap until that time. I am convinced from the manner of Judge Douglas that this was not a mere political move but entirely the interest of a high-minded jurist who wanted to help to right a wrong. He went on to ask whether we had any proposals for a far-reaching settlement of the Palestine problem. I told him that there were, of course, differences of opinion that refera to "partition", but that there was unanimity on the question of moving the 100,000. I added that I had a personal view about this matter that might be a possible way out that the British might approve, if it had the solid backing of our government, but I emphasized that there was no Zionist decision on the larger aspects for a settlement beyond the moving of the 100,000. I then outlined to him what I conceived as a possible "federalist solution" giving the Jews the maximum territory where they would have 51% of the population, and indicating that this should include Galilee and the Negeb as well as the coastal plain or about 2/3 of Palestine, (along what I wrote you recently).

Judge Douglas seemed to be impressed particularly because this would remove the charge that we were trying to get possession of a land in which we were a minority, while it would permit immediate self-government with the control of immigration in Jewish hands. I emphasized, of course, that this was far from the fake federalism of the British proposals, but he felt that this was certainly something which the American government should approve together with the immediate moving of the 100,000 refugees.

I did not want to pursue this matter further, and told him that I would prefer to get in touch with Senator Mead for a possible meeting for you with the Fresident.

After my brother and I left Judge Douglas, I telephoned to Senator Mead, but he was out of Washington and I spoke to a close associate who was really managing his campaign. I emphasized the importance of time and was promised that I would get an answer within a day or two. As soon as I hear from him, I shall, of course, be in touch with you.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I am rushing this airmail off to you, because of things I learned on the Zionist political scene here, and which you should know. There will be a clear effort at the Congress to line up Palestine vs. America and tie that up with the Partition issue on the theory that Americans can wait and Palestine not. This seems to me to be a dangerous procedure for we shall be the hard-hearted ones who care not how much Palestine will suffer, etc. We must not permit the question of proper procedure and method on the part of the Agency Executive to be mixed up with a fundamental issue which is not before us at the present time.

Beryl Locker reported today his conversation with Harold Lashi, in which the latter was very optimistic, but Locker himself puts little forth in this optimism, but it looks as if the London Conference will be off until January, so there is no hurry for commitment on a fundamental issue. On the other hand, I am sure that the General Zionists here (small as they are) will split on Partition, and there will be an effort to line up Palestine & Labor & Hadassah, as part of General Zionism. Partition, therefore, becomes a red herring on the trail. Would it not be wiser if the partition issue is forced, to confront them with a modified Federalism (which we can argue Britain will be more likely to accept), by which we shall not congeal the Jewish National Home for all time, but on the contrary allow for future readjustments, provided we receive now, at once, a Jewish commonwealth covering the maximum territory possible where Jews already constitute 51% of the population. This would give us Galilee, the coastal plan & the Negeb, leaving the Nablus triangle (as I have called ancient Samaria) to Transjordan to form a sister Arab state, in a federal union of strictly limited powers (restricted to a common currency, custom & Postal system), while giving his control over immigration in the Jewish area.

Weizmann's secretary writes me that he just went thru a fifth operation and may not be able to see me for a few days. I had a talk with Linton, who seems to be the closest to him now, and he insists that the British Government will "come around" ultimately to Partition. My fear is that he may be right, if we offer no alternative should the issue be forced; or, worse still, if partition is turned down flatly the British may resort to a Magus Bi-nationalism, which I always have felt would be fatal to Zionism, for then we would get a hodge podge of a "Jewish Nation" instead of a Jewish State. After all Herzl wrote the <u>Yudenstatt</u> not a mere Jewish nation, which existed even in Galicia, if not in Western Europe or America. I would, therefore, strongly urge upon you that if the Partitioh is forced upon us, we should resort to an American (not British) offer of a federal plan which will give us adequate territory plus immigration. If we can make such an alternative offer at the Congress, I am convinced that we can secure an overwhelming majority, for I know that to Palestine this is far preferable to Partition. You can check on this in your talks with Neumann.

I have talked with others at 77 Great Russel St, which I visit daily. There seems to be general agreement that Goldman forced the partition issue on the Executive, and now Weizmann seems to desire to play as an active party (despite ill health) to carry it thru.

I have written an article for the New Judea—which is circularized among many men of Parliament—explaining the basis for our work, on the legal side, of the Zionist Actions Com., which work, by the way, seems to have made a real impression here, despite the fact that the Press here is under a real "iron curtain" on anything good about Palestine—while, of course "terror" hits the first page everytime. Last few days "The People" (with a circulation, as a yellow journal journal of several millions) carried a huge headline over 1/2 the front page: "Jewish guerillas stand ready in Britain", without denunciation from any quarter.

I cabled a few days ago in connection with a visit of Congressman Baldwin, and received a cable reply from Lourie. It is a pity that these "non-representative" representatives come to London and are able to obtain appointments with the Prime Minister and other Cabinet Ministers, and know literally next to nothing about the Palestine problem. I purposely went to see him and found that he talked like a typical binationalist - indeed worse because he argued even for an "independents Palestine". I finally persuaded him that this must result in "restricted immigration", and would be totally unacceptable to all Jews. He is to see me temerrew and I will knew full results, but it certainly cannot do us any good. Arthur Greenwood has made an appointment for me to meet the Colonial Minister Creech Jones, and I hope to emphasise as I did with Greenwood, the vital interest of American Jews, and Americans generally, have in the Palestine issue. I discussed the situation with Sneh yesterday afternoon, since he is the only Member of the Executive, outside of Brodetsky, who is here now, and you can rely on me to make it strong enough to get the possible maximum commitment at this time. I don't know just when you are expecting to leave New York, but I shall try and send you another air mail letter from here after meeting the Colonial Secretary. I want to make one radical suggestion, which has the approval of Sneh in connection with the work of the so-called Independent Committees.

16th Jan., 1947. Mr. Emanuel Neumann, c/o Palestine Survey, 527 Fifth Avenue, New York City. Dear Emanuel, I arrived in Palestine only a few days ago after a miserable boat trip from Marseilles. I want to take this first opportunity to congratulate you most heartily upon your election to the Zionist Executive and sincerely hope that the whole new administration may be able to speedily lead the way for a solution of our problem. For the present I want to write to you about something that we can do to strengthen the General Zionists' situation in this country. I have just come from a talk that I have had with Mr. Rappaport of the Kupath Am Bank. It struck me that while the Mizrachi have a bank of their own and the Labour Party has the Workers' Bank, the General Zionists in this country are left with no distinct financial institution, over and above the Anglo-Palestine Bank, of course, which serves all interests. As you know the Kupath Am Bank was organized by the General Zionists and still derives its main support from the middle class. In my talk with Rappaport I discovered that because of the peculiar setup they would probably welcome such cooperation which would virtually mean sponsorship by General Zionists of that institution, for under their charter each shareholder is permitted only one vote irrespective of the number of the shares held. Accordingly, their capital of LP 100,000 and the two million pounds of deposit - about as much as the Workers' Bank might be compromised if a strongly organized effective minority would come at an annual meeting and try to seek control, whereas if it was sponsored by the General Zionists movement, I have reason to believe that it would be more than welcomed by the present management. You know Mr. Rappaport and you know that the Kupath Am is a careful, conservatively managed institution and might be a great help for us in building up sentiment for the General Zionists in this country. I would ask you to please think it over and discuss it with Dr. Silver and Dr. Goldstein and let me hear from you if there is anything that I can do to promote anything along this line.

I need hardly add that I have no personal interest in the matter, being only a small stock holder, but occasionally a substantial depositor in the Bank.

If there is anything further you would like to discuss with me please do not hesitate to write as I shall remain at my home at Mount Carmel - 24 Panorama Road, Haifa, until April, when I shall go for a short trip to the States (while Gertrude remains here awaiting my return).

Dear Rabbi Silver:

I am writing to you in regard to a matter that has been on my mind for some time, the organization of boycott against British goods and services. I am convinced that the boycott of English goods would be a powerful weapon in our hands, and if organized and publicized properly on a large scale it would have a tremendous material and even greater psychological effect on the disintergrating English cadaver. -

The consumer rather than the dealer must be convinced of the urgency of boycott. For competitive reasons many dealers would be forced to stock British goods; only if the consumers, will refuse to accept English goods, could the dealers be forced into line. Later, dealers who provocatively patronize English goods could be picketed or black-listed. The boycott movement should be a strictly Jewish and non-partisan affair, although I am sure that many of England's Irish and other "friends" will be glad to participate.

I am sure that there will be a great many difficulties and heartaches in organizing the boycott. Especially do I see

difficulties on the part of our Jewish "moderates" and Jewish super-patriots. We will have to hear arguments like: "How are we going to get back our loan from England", "England is America's ally", "If England withdraws from Palestine, the Jews will be exposed to the violence of the Arabs", and similar nonsense.

Our slogans in promoting the boycott could be about as follows: "Buy British and beat our brothers in Palestine", Britons flog Jews in Palestine, don't buy British", "The English shot a four-year old Jewish girl, if you buy British they will have more bullets for children."

I am convinced that a great deal could be accomplished by a well organized boy-cott. Besides being a moral booster to our fighting brothers in Palestine, it would, I believe, have a definite detramental effect on Britain's international financial position which is already wobbly, to say the least.

I would like to hear your reaction to my suggestions soon and would be glad to cooperate in any way that I can to get

the movement started.

Dear Dr. Silver,

The Land Case, which has kept me in Palestine longer than I expected, has again been postponed from the middle of April until the beginning of May, and while the attorneys and I rather welcome it because it will mean that the Chief Justice will sit in the Case, I have a feeling that the Government has been endeavouring to delay matters perhaps beyond the U.N. Session. In any event, there will be no further delays and I hope to come to America next month with some decision in the Case one way or the other.

I say one way or the other, because frankly I am less interested in a victory than are the local lawyers here, because in any event the Case is bound to go to the Privy Council.

What I would like to do in America, with your very important help, is to make this an issue with our State Department. You know that I have been consistent in the last few years in emphasizing the legal scheme which we can peg out against the British over the Mandate, and the Anglo-American Convention of 1924-25 specifically provides that where there is a dispute between the two Governments, the United States may take the issue before the International Court of Justice. What greater issue can arise than the lives of 100,000 immigrants that President Truman requests and which has been now a matter of dispute for nearly two years? I know perfectly well that the State Department has endeavoured to restrict this Treaty so as to interpret it as affecting only American citizens, but under our system of government it is not any clerk in the State Department who is clothed with the authority to interpret Treaties. Treaties are ultimately interpreted by the United States Supreme Court, and we certainly have a right to insist on the President's interpretation of the Treaty instead of some underling in the State Department. Under the Mandate, Britain is to "facilitate" Jewish immigration and that is why President Truman had the right to ask for 100,000. That is a clear point of dispute in which the Jews of America have the right to call upon their Government, much more than the Irish ever did in the dispute over the Free State, for there no Treaty rights were involved.

If the United States should become the complainant in this matter the initiative will remain in our hands instead of in British hands, as it has in the U.N., and it would be most interesting to get a decision that while the U.N. is debating the matter England as a trustee must carry out her obligations in the interval.

I know that I am right in law, as I am in justice, but you might

In any event, when I come back to the States, I want to get in touch with you and see if we can't make this an issue even more important than the Zionist Actions Committee last year. Dear Dr. Silver,

I am rather surprised that I have heard nothing from you since my arrival in Palestine, after our talks in Basle, but I presume that you have been preoccupied with the political problems rising out of London. Something that I have started last week, however, may have consequences even on the political front, and I feel I ought to inform you about it and give the background.

As you may remember, for some years now I have been urging that White Paper should be attacked also on the legal front, and when I was in Palestine in October 1945, I pleaded with the Agency that the time was ripe for a test case before the Courts of Palestine which could be taken to the Privy Council in London, if necessary, since there was nothing to hope as the result of the London conference that summer. Unfortunately, the Agency took no aution, and when I came to Palestine last month I determined to grasp the first opportunity in order to make that a test of the Land Laws which are clearly in violation not only of the Mandate, but also of the Anglo-American Convention. Last Thursday we concluded a two days argument before the Palestine Supreme Court, sitting as a High Court to pass upon a mandamus proceeding to compelx the Land Registry to register a small tract of 15 Dunam not far from Haifa, from an Arab individual to me, as an American citizen, and "an inhabitant of Palestine", against whom no discrimination may be made both under the Mandate and the Anglo-American treaty of 1924. The crux is that the land in question is situated in Zone "A", the prohibited zine - and if we succeed, it means that all the land-laws under the White Paper become null and void. I have, of course, informed Goldie Meyerson, so that the Agency may join in the action, if it goes to London.

The interesting part in this whole issue is that if even we should be beaten all the way through, I can still insist that our Government should bring the matter before the International Court of Justice in Hague, as provided for in the Anglo-American Convention. That the matter is of wital importance may be understood from the fact that the Chief Justice reserved decision, and that the Court has been studying our case, which was very carefully prepared, for a full week

now.

I shall, of course, keep you advised and would be glad to hear from you for any suggestions that you may make.

Dear Dr. Silver,

I have just returned from Jerusalem where the final proceedings in the Land Case, testing the Mandate and the Ordinance in Council, were concluded. The decision has been reserved, but I can tell you that after two days in Court there is no question in my mind that if the law-suit were in America we would win hands down. Under English procedure where Treaties with the League of Nations or with the United States are simply discussed as "political", there is much doubt as to the outcome, although the Palestine lawyers who ably argued my case feel that even on that score we ought to win.

However, I have laid the foundation deliberately for an appeal fresh the United States and have so informed the American Consul with whom I have been in touch. We have cited the Anglo-American Convention and if the Case is lost here I shall certainly make every effort immediately upon my return to the States to insist that the State Department intervene. This is no longer only a Zionist matter but one involving American rights - as I have argued time and again when I headed the Zionist Bolitical Action Committee in America. However, I shall make it my first business on my return and discuss it fully with you before any action is taken.

Because of the Land Case my return to the States has been delayed in the last few weeks but I expect to sail by the end of next week and should be in the United States by the middle of June, since I may have to go through London for a possible appeal to the Privy Council, if necessary.

I have just learn that the Convention is to be held in the beginning of July. I should like very much to be permitted a short report not only in connection with the Land Case but also with the situation of general Zionism here, for I have made trips to the various outposts and had conversations with all the leaders in General Zionism here. I hope you can afford me the opportunity to say something at the Convention.
