Group Is Heard at Town Hall in First of 3 Concerts

The Vinaver Chorus, under Chemjo Vinaver's leadership, gave the first concert of its second annual series, sponsored by the Friends of Choral Art, Inc., last night in Town Hall. The program, like the two others which will follow, was in four sections, illustrating "Music of the Synagogue," "Music of Israel," "The Bible in Music" and "Music of the Hasidim." The third section was devoted to two Italian polyphonic works of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries; Palestrina's "By the Waters of Babylon," sung in English, and Orazio Benevoli's "Laudate coeli," a masterpiece which, it was announced, had not been previously heard here in public.

Of the Jewish works, which occupied the major portion of the evening, three were arranged by Mr. Vinaver. The synagogue music included two works: "Ve-Shomru" and "Omnom Ken," by nineteenthcentury composers A. B. Birnbaum and Boruch Schorr, and Hirsch Weintraub's arrangement of "Kol Nidre."

Mr. Vinaver's group is composed of expert choristers. The unity and precision of their singing, the color and timbre of their combined tone and their expressive responsiveness to his interpretative direction were a tribute to his ability as a trainer and leader; the tone qualty of the soloists, like that of the ensemble, was appealing. There were striking dynamic contrasts as well as fine shadings of sonority, some quasi-instrumental vocal effects; a lucid musical medium allowed thorough revelation of detail. At times prolonged periods of soft singing, despite noteworthy delicacy of dynamic nuance and of a deliberate pace, limited the element of variety, but this seemed to depend upon the requirements of the music itself. The performance of "Laudate coeli" was admirably was admirably outspoken and spirited, as well as deftly executed.

Ranging from liturgical music to folk song, the Jewish works performed represented diversity of origin and influences, Oriental and European, but also a certain community of flavor and atmosphere, in music and in emotional color. The Hasidic works, representing a kind of music distinctly unfamiliar to concert, audiences, included "Yishemu," rising from meditativeness to ecstacy; A. B. Birnbaum's "Talmudic Rhapsody" engaging, if extensive, in its musical treatment of the chant of Talmudic recitation, and "Az Moshiah vet Kumen," described as one of the few cumulative songs in Jewish literature.

First of Its 3 Concerts at Town Hall Includes Performance of Benevoli Composition

The Vinaver Chorus, under Chemjo Vinaver, opened its second annual series of three concerts, last night at Town Hall, under the sponsorship of the Friends of Choral Art, Inc. Mr. Vinaver, a leading authority on Hebraic music had arranged an elaborate program, interesting in itself and admirably sung by the ensemble of mixed voices.

The first part of the schedule was devoted to music of the Eastern European Synagogue and offerings of Yemenite origin from Israel. Later, the choristers were heard in contributions by Benevoli and Palestrina, based on Biblical texts, and a final group of Hasidic compositions.

A special feature of the concert was the first New York performance of a "Laudate Coeli" by Orazio Benevoli, the seventeenthcentury Italian master of polychoric choral music, whose vocal works seldom receive a hearing. The example selected by Mr. Vinaver was a five-voice setting of the hymn of praise, remarkable tor its contrapuntal skill, exuberance, and richness of texture.

In the presentation of this contribution the chorus had opportunity to display the opulence and resonance of its tone when employed at full power. But the group was equally successful in pianissimo singing, which proved uncommonly effective because of the ethereal delicacy and subtle nuances found possible of attainment in the subdued parts of many of the works.

All of the varied numbers were delivered a cappella, with positive adherence to true pitch. The sharp dynamic contrasts demanded by the conductor in many of the compositions were most ably provided by the choristers, who also enhanced their singing with a wide range of color effects. Their tone was well unified, their attacks and releases as sharp as need be and in the sacred, as well as the folk items presented, the mood and meaning of the content was invariably vividly projected. Vinaver Chorus In Second Concert By HARRIETT JOHNSON

The Vinaver Chorus, conducted by Chemjo Vinaver, and sponsored by the Friends of Choral Art for the public significant Jewish music, gave its second concert of the season last night in Town Hall. Richard Tucker was the chief soloist on a program that included Mr. Vinaver's Sacred Suite from "The Seventh Day," a Sabbath eve service for cantor, choir and organ. Before this work was performed, the conductor announced that due to circumstances beyond his control, it would be impossible to use the organ in the auditorium. Consequently, Ashley Miller, the organist, officiated at the piano which was obviously less well suited as an adjunct to the music's solemn mood than the organ would have been.

Mr. Vinaver's ensemble is composed of unusually good voices, including a rousing tenor section. With this excellent material, the conductor has developed a chorus that sings with unusual beauty of tone. The group's quality has a floating lightness which all choruses aim at but few achieve. These singers also have further assets such as precision in attack and the ability to vary their quality with imagination.

Mr. Tucker and the chorus performed Mr. Vinaver's impressive "Service" with fervor. The composer, according to the program notes, set himself the task in this work of "restoring the traditional melodic line to its purity and piety, and clothing it in forms, and harmonies, and counterpoints, to convey its dignity and meaning to the modern ear." Besides several other compositions based on traditional Jewish themes, the concert included "Who with Grieving Soweth" by Johann Schein, and "The Lamentation." of Jeremiah," by Alberto Ginastera.

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
