



My dear Rabbi Silver:--

As a result of the many favorable comments received by the News because of the publication last Saturday of Bishop Waldorf's sermon, the Managing Editor has given me charge of a series of Saturday Evening "Sermonettes", despite the prediction that "the clergy will not bother." Are you willing to dictate a sermon of 500 words to use in this connection? I hope to reach the discouraged men and women, those who think the world has gone to the dogs, those who believe the world is all right but that religion is no good; those who are disillusioned, perhaps through their own folly but none the less bitter. This may be one way of aiding in the combat of Bolshevism, letting people know that somebody really cares for their spiritual development.

Without digesting this, I think these sermonettes should be free from propaganda, doctrine and "timeliness", just the word of God interpreted by His consecrated servants. Without presuming to advise, I should like to ask for a sermon on Daniel who looked ever toward Jerusalem and who was not corrupted by Babylon, that might hit at the present unrest. 

We take pleasure in enclosing herewith the leading editorial of to-day's issue of the American Hebrew which endorses the program of the Palestine Development Council adopted this week at the Pittsburgh Conference.

In order to arouse greater interest among our readers in the work contemplated by the Palestine Development Council, we should like to be able to communicate to them your answer to the following questions:

1. What precisely are the points at issue between you and your associates and the World Zionist Organization? So far as we are aware, nothing has been published anywhere explaining clearly and simply just where you and Dr. Weizmann differ. Your case, certainly, has never been presented adequately to the public at large, the Jewish press--especially the Yiddish part of it--acting almost as a unit in suppressing or giving imperfect versions of your side of the controversy.

2. The World Zionist Organization being designated by the terms of the Mandate as the Jewish Agency in Palestine, will not your work in Palestine come under the authority of the World Zionist Organization in that country? If so, what assurance have you against interference by that body, headed as it is by M. M. Ussischkin?

3. How are you going to avoid duplication between your work and that of the Keren Hayesod?

4. How are you going to get the non-Zionist Jews interested in activities of the Palestine Development Council?

An authoritative answer to these questions will be of great interest to the public and of immense service to your cause, which is also the American Hebrew's. We need scarcely add that any message from you will be accorded the fullest hospitality by the American Hebrew. It will be doubly welcome if it comes to us at an early date.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

The American Hebrew, which reaches many cultured Americans of the Jewish faith, is making every effort to break down the walls of misunderstanding between Gentile and Jew in America and to build bridges of goodwill. As you know, several of our issues have been devoted in their entirety to this purpose during the last few years. The most recent of these has been forwarded to you under separate cover.

Our forthcoming April 18th (Passover) issue which goes to press early in April is to be devoted to the theme: "How Can The Younger American Generation Bring About A Better Understanding Between Gentile and Jew?"

We know your views to be enlightened and progressive and we should very much like to have an article from you of any length on this subject. The animosities and antagonisms which are all too much in the air today must be laid low if the ideals of the American Founders are to prevail; and nowhere is there a better opportunity to allay prejudice and inculcate a spirit of mutuality than during the formative period of character and mentality.

The world would seem to have reached a pass--culminating in the war--where the spirit of Youth in all fields is animated by a sense of revolt against the Old Order. The Elder Statesmen seem to have failed and Youth must lead the way out. Throughout the centuries the so-called Jewish problem has not been solved; perhaps the Younger Generation can be trusted to take a step toward its solution. There is no longer the intellectual deference paid to age, because through the generations the Elders have proven themselves unequal to their task. Youth is taking ahold. What, do you think, it can contribute toward more concord and less discord with particular reference to the Gentile and Jew in America?

Among the contributors to this issue who have already promised articles are: Dr. Chas. P. Fagnini of the Union Theological Seminary, New York, who will write on how Gentile undergraduates can be moved to the sense of a broader humanity which shall dissipate discord. Perhaps you may desire to write on the theme from the angle of Jewish undergraduate ranks.

Material should reach us by March 25th and we shall be glad to know of your disposition in this matter at your earliest convenience. We feel that few men in America are better able to express themselves on this subject than you.



My dear Mr. Bernstein,

I regard the most
vital and pressing problem confronting
American Israel today to be that of
Jewish Education.

America must now become the
Jammia of universal Israel. The great
reservoirs of Jewish thought and learning
in Eastern Europe have either been destroyed,
abandoned, or will be for generations depleted
and impoverished. Schools and academies have
been shut down. Their students and scholars,
their very books and libraries have been scattered
to the four corners of the earth. America must
become the refuge and sanctuary of the Torah, of
Jewish scholarship, thought and learning. With-
out learning and study Judaism cannot survive
and Jewry must perish. This is one of the in-
exorable laws of our existence and there is no
escape from it. Whenever a Jewish community
failed to kindle the lamp of learning and relied
solely on worship, observance and philanthropy, it
ultimately disappeared. Witness the story of the
Hellenized Jewish communities of Egypt after the
destruction of the Temple. We are in the truth the
people of the Book.

We gave life to the Book. It now gives life to us. We must banish ignorance from our midst. Our deadliest enemy is the Am Haretz - the unlettered Jew whom ignorance leads to indifference or to cynicism or to assimilation. More better high schools! More text books and better text books! More educated Jewish laymen! The Torah was not given to the Rabbis alone. We are relegating the priceless heritage of a people - of all the people - of the masses, - to the ordained, and to the professional few. If Judaism is to remain a democratic religion, if it is not to degenerate into an ecclesiastical hierarchy, it must be on the basis of Jewish learning broadly disseminated through all the ranks and classes of our people.

In deference to ourselves let us be frank. Our religious schools are inadequate. Their curricula are rudimentary and faulty. The time allotted to the religious education of our children is all too short. We cannot transmit a heritage of three thousand years the learning and wisdom of thirty centuries, the history, religion, ethics and literature of a people, all in the one or two hours a week during the few years of the child school life. We Rabbis frankly confess our inability to cope with this problem. The Jewish laymen must look to it. It is they who must take the initiative in this tremendously urgent work.

For remember that our religious schools must do much more than impart some elementary historical information and some religious guidance. The school along with the home and the Synagogue must inculcate the essential mental and spiritual qualities of our people, the collective soul and mind, as it were, of our race, the Jewish attitude and the Jewish point of view, the passion of the prophet, the piety of the Psalmist, the dream of the poet, the faith of the martyr, the high hope and sacrificial valor and the morale which makes for victory.

For we have a collective soul and mind which are distinctive and unique. They have been our selective agencies when we encountered alien cultures and they determined our adaptability to them. We have survived in the diaspora because we were able to absorb foreign cultures and not be absorbed by them. We submitted all foreign cultures - the Babylonian, Egyptian, Greek, Roman, Arabic and Western European cultures to the alchemy of our spiritual uniqueness and we gave back to the world a Bible, an Apocrypha, a Talmud, a Philo, a Maimonides, A Gabriel, an Halevi, a Spinoza, a Mendelssohn. We have yet much to give to the world. We are not of the past only. We have not yet uttered our last immemorial phrase. We have yet many startling revelations to vouchsafe unto mankind, many a sacred book to bequeath unto it. We must therefore, for the sake of the world, safeguard the soul of our race.

American Israel may well accomplish this high purpose, for it is most fortunately situated. Economically competent, in numbers great and influential, in texture a blending of Eastern European and Western European in their mutually complementary character, in a land whose ideals are grounded in the mighty themes of our sacred literature and whose doctrines are in complete consonance with our own, we have it in us to fashion, on a heroic scale, a mighty age which shall rival even the glories of the golden age of Spain.

And this will be our answer to Anti-Semitism. This will be our reply to all the heathen ragings of our day.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

Your request "of sometime ago" not to be captioned as "one of the younger Rabbinate" was never brought to my attention, so far as I can recall. Had I been aware of your wishes I should have been only too happy to have followed them. My sincere esteem for your quite exceptional ability led me to emphasize the fact that you were still in the category of younger men in the matter of years, despite your intellectual maturity.

Coming back from the printer quite exhausted with having put a large issue to press following our New Year's issue, I was jolted by your missive and to tell the truth, quite disheartened. The unselfish efforts which we are making according to our lights for the sake of Judaism receive a setback by a letter such as yours. I was under the impression that you had graduated less than a decade ago, and thought I was tendering you extra homage in calling attention to the fact that such fine achievement had come to one still, if I am correct, on the sunny side of thirty. I wish I could say as much for myself!

What particularly grieves me is your gratuitous remark that you do not need The American Hebrew to introduce you to New York Jewry -- that is quite petty for a big man. Almost, I am tempted to say contemptible. You do not need us, but we need you. There are already, alas, too many bickerings among Jews. When I consider that the little group on The American Hebrew is giving of its best without pretense or profit and at great personal sacrifice, I am inclined to the mood, by your letter, that complete severance with all things Jewish would be for me a rather satisfying course.

If men like you have so little appreciation of the endeavors we are making under great difficulty and for no mercenary ends, why waste oneself on the effort to build up a publication for the sake of Judaism.

Louis Marshall belongs to that heroic group of Jewish leaders who at critical junctures in our history, arose to meet the need and the challenge of the hour. He is spiritual kinsman of Gabriel Riesser and Moses Montefiore, of Adolphe Kremieux and Menassah Ben Israel, of Joselman of Rosheimim and Isaac Abarbanel.

Mr. Marshall has left an imprint of his dynamic personality upon the whole generation of American Jewish life and thought.

Not the least of his contributions is the grace and felicity with which he syntatised his duties as an American citizen and his magnificent loyalty to Judaism and to the Jewish people.

Louis Marshall

Louis Marshall is one of the foremost constitutional lawyers in the country, one of its most public-spirited citizens and recognized by a large number of American Jews as their leader and as the champion of their rights against prejudice and discrimination.

On difficult and intricate questions involving interpretation of the constitutions of the United States and of the various States, Mr. Marshall's opinion is frequently sought by legislators and by jurists. He has argued hundreds of cases bearing upon the constitutionality of important laws, such as those concerning bonuses for war veterans, inheritance and special franchise taxes, compensations for injuries in industry, alien immigration, the ownership of land by Japanese, the segregation of negroes, the naturalization of Hindus, the abolition of private and parochial schools, and many others of equal importance.

Mr. Marshall is the first citizen of New York State who has sat in three consecutive conventions for the revision of the State constitution, being elected a delegate in 1890, 1894 and 1913. He was appointed (1902) by Mayor Seth Low member of a committee to investigate conditions on New York's East Side; he was named by Governor Charles E. Hughes as chairman of a State Immigration Commission (1908); he was counsel for Governor William Sulzer in his impeachment trial (....), and for Leo M. Frank before the United States Supreme Court (....). He was the mediator who brought about the settlement of cloak-makers' strike in New York (1910) when he drew up a protocol which was the basis of many subsequent strike settlements, and he was a member of the arbitration committee which settled the New York clothing workers' strike in 1919. Mr. Marshall has also appeared before numerous committees of the United States Congress in support of a liberal and humane immigration policy.

Mr. Marshall was born in Syracuse, N. Y., in 1856, of immigrants who had come to America several years before without means. To his mother who awakened in him a love for good literature and a sense of loyalty to the highest ideals of service to humanity, Mr. Marshall credits in large measure his success. He attended Syracuse High School and was graduated (....) with high honors. For two years he read law in the office of Nathaniel B. Smith, after which he studied at the Law School of Columbia University, obtaining his LL.B. Degree in, whereupon he returned to Syracuse and became a clerk in the office of a law firm headed by William C. Reiger, later Chief Justice of the Court of Appeals; two years later he was admitted to the bar and became a member of the firm. In 1894 he became a member of the New York City firm of Guggenheimer, Untermeyer and Marshall.

In the Jewish community of the United States, Mr. Marshall is an outstanding figure. His interest in the welfare of his race extends to every phase of their life, but he is devoted chiefly to educational institutions and to defending them from any infractions of their civil rights. He was the leader in the movement which brought about (1911) the abrogation of the Treaty of 1832 with Russia, because of the long-continued non-recognition by that country of the American passport in the hands of Jews, Catholic priests, or Protestant missionaries. He has been president of the American Jewish Committee since 1912, and was chairman of the Committee des Delegations Juives aupres de la Conférence de la Paix (1919) whose efforts resulted in treaties with Poland, Roumania, Jugoslavia, Czecho-Slovakia and other countries in which the equal rights or racial, linguistic, and religious minorities were laid down, and made obligations of international concern and placed under the guaranty of the League of Nations. Mr. Marshall was also the leader in the various efforts to raise funds for the relief of Jewish sufferers from the World War, which have resulted in the collection of over \$75,000,000.

The degree of LL.D. was conferred upon Mr. Marshall by Syracuse University (1913), that of L. H. D. by the Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati (1920); he has been a trustee of Syracuse University since 1910, and he is president of the New York State College of Forestry.

On May 6, 1895, Mr. Marshall married Florence Lowenstein of New York (died May 27, 1916).

My dear Mr. Dingol:-

In reply to your kind letter of December 9th, permit me to say that it is my belief that the Jews have enough holidays of their own that they need not borrow any from other peoples and other religions.

Christmas is an essentially Christian holiday as much as Yom Kippur is essentially a Jewish holiday. The fact that Christmas is the religious holiday of the vast majority of the American people and that Jews are brought in close contact with the occasion through social intercourse or business, does not in the least alter the fact that it is the supreme and most significant festival of Christianity and that therefore Judaism has no share whatever in it.

I see no reason in the world, why a Jew cannot extend felicitations to a non Jew on the occasion of a Christian festival or receive felicitations from him on the occasion of his own festivals.

I do believe however, that it is preposterous and rather humiliating for Jews to exchange Christmas gifts or for Jewish children to sing Christmas carols as they are asked to do in many of the public schools. An act which does not emanate from real conviction and does not derive from the historical or cultural experiences of a people, is at best worthless and at worst a mockery.
