In a note received this morning from Goldhamer he tells me that you would like to see me immediately upon my arrival in Cleveland. Of course, I shall be only too happy to get in touch with you and in the meantime you will do me the great kindness to indicate in a general or specific way what particular features should, in your judgment, be stressed before this group of people. While I am fairly familiar with conditions in your town, still, there are many features which probably might be stressed on that occasion and on which you could enlighten me.

I am ready to receive congratulations on the arrival of a daughter and trust that within a year I shall also have occasion to congratulate you.

My dear Billikopf,

First of all my heartiest congratulations. I trust that both mother and child are doing splandidly.

I am delighted to learn that you are going to be with us on the 24th. I am quite anxious to spend a little time with you and talk the Cleveland situation over with you. I know of no more hopeful sign for our community progress than the proposed survey. Our Jederation needs a complete new set of ideas. It has not adjusted itself to this swift changing community in twenty years. In philanthropic efforts we have done nothing to bring orthodix and reform groups into some relationship or accord. The proble of education our Federation has completely ignored. It is perhaps this problem that I would like to discuss with you most.

I think the community is ready for a new orientaand realignment. Both groups are ready to meet on some conbasis and a measure of tact, patience and above all technic may yield us a happy solution.

The orthodox groups in this city have not yet evolved competent leadership. There are no outstanding men who are recognized as their spokesmen. Some of the men in control of othodox institutions are utterly incompetent and undesirable, but I suppose that situation is not to be four in Cleveland alone.

June 15th, 1923.

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The big job will be to dissolve an attitude of suspicion and mistrust which years of estrangement and non-cooperation have created in our communal life.
