My dear Rabbi Brickner,

I endeavored to reach you last night but you were evidently too busy. I wanted to speak to you in connection with the article which appeared yesterday afternoon in the Cleveland Press in reference to the eightieth anniversary of your organization. Mr. Salsburg 's article contained so many inaccuracies that I cannot imagine that any one of your congregation supplied him with the information. I speak of it only because the name of The Temple was mentioned in the article.

In the first place, the title of the article, "City's rirst Synagogue Started 80 Years Ago", is not true. Cleveland's first Synagogue was started in 1839 and was known as The Israelitishe Society of which Mr.Simson Thorman (who later headed the Tifereth Israel group) was president. It was this congregation which bought the first cemetery on Villet street. Anshe Chesed was organized as a result of the secession of a group of members from this body. These men later on returned and reorganized into The Israelite Anshe Chesed Society (1846). Four years later another group of men seceded and organized Tifereth Israel Congregation (1850). It is therefore erroneous to speak of the Anshe Chesed Congregation as the "Mother Congregation" of Cleveland.

In the article of the Press it is stated "The Congregation," (Anshe Chesed) is not only the oldest in this part of the country but the mother congregation of several other Cleveland Temples and Synagogues started by groups which seceded from time to time as they disagreed with the reforms introduced. Most notable is the Congregation Tifereth Israel, better known as The Temple, East 105th Street at Ansel moad". The reason for the secession of the men who formed Tifereth Israel was of course the reverse of what is here stated. It was because Anshe Chesed did not introduce desired reforms that the secession took place. The members who seceded were "liberals" or "progressives".

I refer you to page ten of The Cleveland Society Book, Volume 2, which gives the early history of Cleveland in which you will find this statement, "Tifereth Israel was regarded as the Reformed and Anshe Chesed the Orthodox Congregation". This is of

May I also call your attention to another inaccuracy. The article states that "the Sunday School of Anshe Chesed. the largest in the country, has twelve hundred children". You realize, of course, that this number of children does not make your Sunday School the largest even in Cleveland. You undoubtedly receive our Bulletin in which the record of our school (1388 this week) is given week by week. It may interest you to know that the Detroit Sunday School has sixteen hundred pupils. There are a few other inaccuracies in the article which do not particularly interest me. I trust that you will understand that this is written in the friendliest of spirits prompted only by the thought that the facts of history ought to be respected. My dear Max:

At your request, I am putting down in writing the outline of the statement which I made Friday evening.

On my return from the West last Wednesday evening, I heard from one or two people that a rumor was abroad that WTAM cancelled the broadcasting arrangements with Rabbi Brickner and that I was responsible for it.

On Thursday morning, I got in touch with Jesse Solomon. He called at my study and told me in greater detail what the rumor was that was circulating through the community, viz., that I had called Mrs. Norberg into my study and told her that inasmuch as she was a loyal member of The Temple and her husband an official at the Willard Storage Battery Company, the broadcasting privileges should have been extended to me and not Rabbi Brickner. In Mr. Solomon's presence, I called up Mr. Norberg and repeated the rumor to him. He laughed and of course stated that it was preposterous. I asked him to send me a letter to that effect. Again in Mr. Solomon's presence, I called up Mr. Zimmerman of the WTAM station with the same result.

I asked Mr. Solomon where this rumor originated. He stated that everyone seems to be tracing it back to Mr. Fred Frankel who had in charge the broadcasting arrangements for Rabbi Brickner.

asked him point blank whether he had made that statement and he refused to give a definite answer over the telephone. I requested that I see him in person. I suggested that I call upon him with three members of my Board. He refused to see any members of my Board. I repeated this request on Friday morning. He again refused.

At 11:30 Friday morning I called upon him in person. I told him what the rumor was and that he is being quoted as having made the statements to his committee. He catagorically denied them. He said they were a lie; that he had never mentioned my name in connection with his report; that all that he stated to his committee was that Mrs. Norberg had called up Mr. Baldwin of WTAM and stated that she had read in the Euclid Avenue Temple Bulletin that WTAM had requested Rabbi Brickner to broadcast. This being clearly a misstatement of the facts, she resented it and thought that it should be corrected.

I asked Mr. Frankel to put his version into writing. He refused. I again asked him to appear in person before a meeting of the Mempde Board which was to take place Friday evening. He again refused. I left him.

I appreciate the spirit which prompted you to write it. I feel, however, that a great deal of harm has been done by some irresponsible statements made by members of your congregation, either at your Board meeting or outside. I have particular reference to Mr. Fred Frankel, whom I charge with deliberately broadcasting a falsehood. I feel that you owe it to me and The Temple as well as your own institution to correct at the next meeting of your Board, the wrong impression which some of your Board members seem to have and which they have unfortunately spread through the community. I would request, too, that the letter sent by WTAM on April 15th to me and to Rabbi Brickner, a copy of which I include, herewith, be read to your Board members.
