Dear Colleague:

At the meeting of the Commission for the Revision of the Union Prayerbook held in Chicago. December 19, 1932, it was decided to publish a Union Prayer Anthology for the use primarily of the Rabbi. The purpose of the Anthology is to allow variations in the regular service. It is hoped that this Anthology will be revised every five years or so and will thus be used as a means for making available to the rest of the Conference whatever prayers be written by the various Rabbis.

It is the intention of the Commission to include in this Anthology poetry and prose, prayers and meditations from Jewish traditional sources and original material written for the book.

The Commission is anxious to have this first edition of the Anthology in the hands of the members of the Conference as soon as possible. Will you be so kind as to write a prayer for the Anthology and let it be on any subject that you desire, a prayer or a meditation. I would like to have it before January 15th, if possible. Since it is the intention of the Commission to include as many shades of opinions and moods as possible, I should prefer two short prayers to one long one. Please let me know whether you will be able to do this work for us.

My dear Rabbi Israel: I received a copy of the proposed Holy Day message of the Social Justice Commission for 1933. I am no longer a member of the Executive Board of the C.C.A.R. and I therefore do not know whether my opinion should be given on this message. However, I wish to indicate my general approval of its spirit and to suggest one or two modifications. The whole tone of the message ought to be elevated a bit. Phrases such as "to pump a little altruism," a "trough worth dipping one's hands into," etc. detract a bit from the dignity of the message. I believe that paragraph three might very well be omitted. It is the broadest kind of generalization and criticism of the pulpit which is reminiscent of the katzenjammer indulged in by the "Menorah" and "Opinion." It is not true that the average congregation "wants the religious institution and the pulpit to be the symbols of complacency or reaction." Liberalism and progressivism are quite "de rigeur" in the pulpit today. If I were a cynic I would say that it takes a truly courageous man to be a reactionary today While pointing out the socially desirable implications of the N.R.A., and asking for cooperation, the message should also warn against its possible abuses. It may be the entering wedge for an American Fascism. The Conference ought not to join the universal and uncritical ballyhoo in behalf of an economic experiment whose social utility is still to be established. Very sincerely yours, AHS: BK

June 15, 1933. Dr. Solomon Freehof. 5401 Cornell Ave.. Chicago, Ill. My dear Sol: I have had occasion to run over the draft of the morning services for week days. I have been very crowded with work since my return from abroad and I have not had sufficient time to make a careful study of these services. Generally speaking, they are quite satisfactory although they are far from distinguished. I suppose that you really can't do much with a week day service. Some of the prayers such as those on pages three and six are not sufficiently restrained -- too much of the "klogmutter" motif -- too much "futile tears," too much "disillusionment," too much travils of life" and "barren wastes of suffering and disappointments." I noticed too a strange prayer, "We ask not for absence of pain." Why not? On page seven there is a prayer which begins, "A wanderer among the nations." This is a sermon, not a prayer. The first paragraph of the second service beginning. "The santuary of Israel" should be completely rewritten. It is extremely adkward in style. Somewhere in the service thereshould be a brief prayer of the physical and spiritual welfare of our children and families and our country. With all good wishes, I remain, as ever Yours. AHS: BK
