Dear Dr. Silver:

I postponed answering your recent letter until the Committee on which you asked me to represent the Central Conference had met. It appears that there has been extensive correspondence, chiefly between representatives of the Rabbinical Assembly and the Synagogue Council on one hand, and officials of the New York Federation on the other hand, regarding alleged practices of the Federation and its agencies which imposed a hardship on employes who are Jewishly observant. At the committee meeting I attended, representatives of the New York Board of Jewish Ministers and the Rabbinical Council were also present. The facts are still not entirely clear, and it was decided to try to secure fuller information both as to agency policies, and to as to the attitude of the unions to which these workers (or most of them) belong. The members of the committee seemed to be in substantial agreement as to what they desire: namely, wherever possible, employes of Jewish communal agencies should be able to refrain from work at all times when Jewish tradition forbids work. This would mean that offices would be closed on Sahbath and during the winter months the closing would be one hour before sunset on Friday afternoon and on all the major holidays, including the Yom Tov Sheni. It is understood of course that no such rulings could apply to hospitals, aged homes, and the like. Just how far the Committee will get with such efforts is not entirely clear to me. Though for the present it is working on the rederation problem, it is also concerned with similar manifestations in JWB, UJA, etc.

You are certainly aware that such meetings are marked by more schmuss than action, and I can proudly aver that on behalf of the CCAR I contributed no more action and no less schmuss than was presented by any other of the groups represented.
