Dear Dr. Silver:

I am enclosing herewith the Minutes of the Meeting of the Joint Committee on Chaplains and Emergency Placement.

You will be interested to know that, at the meeting of the Central Conference of American Rabbis in Chicago, the recommendation of our Committee on Emergency Placement that it be discharged was approved by the Conference.

Chaplains now applying for pulpits will be referred to their respective rabbinical seminaries. The rabbinical seminaries will be charged with the duty of giving prior consideration to returning chaplains. The Conference also voted that men who were physically disqualified are to come next in the consideration of the seminaries in placement.

The Conference voted to continue our Committee on Chaplains for the purpose of procurement.

While there were a large number of chaplains present at the Conference, they did not vote as a unit with regard to protecting the rights of the chaplains. There were quite a few of the chaplains who thought, the war now being over, nothing be done to differentiate between rabbis who served as chaplains and those who refused to serve.

My dear Dr. Silver:

You will recall that a number of months ago at a meeting of the Jewish Welfare Board offices in New York, a committee was appointed, representing the three rabbinical associations, to study the matter of relationship with the JWB and to make report to the Boards of the three rabbinical associations.

The committee consisted of Rabbi Louis M. Levitsky of Newark, representing the Rabbinical Assembly; Rabbi Simon G. Kramer of New York, representing the Rabbinical Council of America; and myself, representing the CCAR.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I trust you will not mind my suggesting a subject to be included in your presidential message to the CCAR with reference to the chaplaincy.

We are confronted with a very serious problem of procurement of chaplains. From forty to fifty full-time chaplains are needed now for the Army and Navy. If universal military training is voted by Congress, then our problem of procurement will continue as long as universal military training will be in operation.

The members of this year's graduating classes of the various seminaries who were approached with reference to enlistment as chaplains have not reacted favorably. We all recognize that the glamour of war is not present as the incentive. Had the War Department changed its regulations last year so that the graduating classes of 1946 could have been approached for the chaplaincy, some of those men would have volunteered and the difficulty with the 1947 classes would not have been so great.

Something has to be done about this matter because we cannot lay ourselves open to the charge that we are not providing for the spiritual life of our men in the Armed Forces. Our Committee on Chaplains has suggested that possibly the æminaries may be approached and urged to make a condition with the men who are being enrolled in the seminaries to serve a few years in the chaplaincy on graduation before accepting a pulpit.

All this will be presented in the report of the Committee on Chaplains, but something on that subject in your presidential message would be most helpful in centering attention on this problem.

I was indeed very much interested in the undertaking which you discussed with me in my office the other day, and I do believe that you are to be commended upon the fine spirit with which you are pursuing this significant enterprise.

Although I am more than happy to lend you my personal support, I do wish to repeat the reservation which I voiced when you were with me, concerning certain preliminary steps which I then felt were imperative for me to take before I could take it upon available to use the name of the Union officially in this connection. I indicated to you that my one reservation concerning this laudable endeavor grew out of previous differences which we have encountered relative to the Central Conference of American Rabbis' interest in the publication of liturgy and liturgical music. I indicated then that I would like to contact some of the officials of the Central Conference before going ahead in my official capacity on behalf of the Union.

From such preliminary contacts as I have made, I have been counselled to take up this matter with the Central Conference at its Executive Board meeting, which is to be held in Montreal shortly. It is felt that before committing the Union, the ground should at least be cleared with the Central Conference.

Consequently, I am asking the Conference for the opportunity of discussing this matter at its forthcoming Executive Board meeting, and if the action is favorable, I will be more than happy to pursue the course that I indicated would be possible for me to follow.
