Among those present were Dr. Julian Morgenstern, Dr. Louis Finkelstein, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Dean Sar of Yeshiva University and Dr. Robert Gordis of the Rabbinical Assembly. It was agreed: That the schools and bodies represented approve of the writing, adoption and implementation of a standard rabbinical agreement. That there shall be appointed a nine-men committee representing the five rabbinical schools, the three rabbinical bodies and the New York Board of Jewish Ministers to write such an agreement, and that this agreement shall be submitted for the approval of the several synagogue laymen's bodies. 3. That the presidents of the rabbinical schools agreed that the placement committee; shall exercise their offices and authority to make the contemplated agreement mandatory. That the placement committees of the several rabbinical schools will cooperate closely in situations where injustice has been done to any rabbi or congregation.

Dear Colleague: In view of the crime perpetrated by the British this week in executing Dov Gruner and his three companions, and in view of the deep feelings of dismay and anger that have taken hold of the American Jewish and general public. I wonder whether it is a good idea to hold the Convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis in Montreal this year. Canada is after all a British dominion; it is loyal to the British Crown; in its foreign and colonial policies it adheres to those of the mother country. It seems to me that the Zionist and pro-Zionist members of the CCAR could not very well express their feelings against the British and the CCAR could not very well pass the vehement resolutions that the occasion calls for in Montreal, a city in the land of the enemy. Being in Montreal would give to the anti-Zionists, especially the Council-ites, a Pis-chon Peh; they would say that it is most ungracious of us, as guests, to criticise the palicies of our "host-country". I firmly believe that the CCAR convention should be moved to a city in the States; surely it is not too late to make the necessary hotel arrangements to that effect. And, if it is too late, then the convention should be postponed until after the High Holydays, or if necessary for the convenience of the members, until the mid-winter or so-called "Christmas vacation" period. The fact that we took the Convention away from Montreal would be a vivid protest against the crimes and anti-Jewish policies of the British and would focus whoph upon the Canadians and the British the sincerity and depth of our feelings. As a guide for the final decision in this matter, I think that the CCAR membership should be polled on this question. Best wishes and warmest personal regards. Sincerely yours, aneny Thosofield. April 24, 1947 Rabbi Avery J. Grossfield 1530 E. 17th St. Brooklyn 30, N.Y. My dear Rabbi Grossfield: . Dr. Feldman, the Vice-President of the CCAR, send me a copy of your letter addressed to him, and also his reply. There is very little that I could add to what Rabbi Feldman wrote to you. It is quite impossible at this late date to change the place of the Conference. Furthermore, Canada, while it is a member of the British Commonwealth, has not assumed responsibility for the policies of the British Foreign Office with reference to Palestine. Our friends in Canada have been working very vigorously with the key men in the Canadian Government hoping that Canada will take a friendly attitude towards us at the Assembly of the United Nations. What success they will have, I do not know, but they seem not to have written Canada off or placed that country in the camp of our enemies. We are also trying to get the support of some other members of the British Commonwealth who do sometimes take an attitude in the United Nations independent of Great Britain itself.
