Subject: Church - Industry Cooperation

Reverend Sir:

The National Association of Manufacturers, with headquarters in New York City, has enlisted the cooperation of employers in Cleveland and other cities in an effort to develop a cooperative program for better understanding between the clergy and industry.

Here in Cleveland, the Associated Industries and manufacturers who belong to the Chamber of Commerce have been asked to make the same effort for Cleveland. After some preliminary meetings, a working group of clergymen and employers may see the advisability of inviting the assistance and cooperation of other important interests in the community such as labor, newspapers, professional men, bankers, and others to organize a free and open forum or round-table study of the problems which confront all of us in a city such as this.

At a meeting in New York some months ago, representatives of various faiths and religious groups collaborated in one general meeting, and we would like to hold at least one such meeting here with the similar cooperation of all representative church groups.

I am acting as chairman of the industrialists by invitation of the National Association of Manufacturers and the Associated Industries with the cooperation of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, and on behalf of the manufacturing employers of the city, I am writing to you to present this matter.

The manufacturers are convinced that many of the social and economic problems are the mutual interest of Church and Industry. They will greatly appreciate having you and your associates actively participate in an effort toward better understanding, and hope that you can not only give the movement some personal support, but can also bring into the effort such of your staff and associates as will have a mutual inclination and interest in such cooperation.

Perhaps you would like to delegate some one person to act as liaison officer for your group.

You may be sure of the desire of the industrialists for your cooperation and their deep interest in your reply.
