



MME. SARAH GORBY FOLK SONG EXPERT

On Oct. 31, 1940, Sarah Gorby, contralto, made her New York debut at Town Hall in a complete program of folk songs - the singer's speciality. For her efforts she won praise from reviewers who, nevertheless, had one reservation - that folk songs, being an intimate form of expression, lost a great deal when sung in a big auditorium like Town Hall.

Last night Mme/ Gorby sang again, this time at the Museum of Modern Art's Coffee Concert, HEBRAICA, and reviewers could have no reservations about her singing. It was topnotch. (italics ours)

Mme. Gorby is a Russian by birth who has lived in practically every European country. She has done some lieder singing but her great passion has always been folk songs. She sings them in Hebrew, Russian, Rumanian, Spanish, Italian, French, German, Yiddish, English and Creole in concert and over the radio.

Last night she sang songs of the Spanish Jews, Chassidic songs and Yiddish folk songs from Russia. Her voice is a rich contralto that can reach some pretty high notes, can take on that nasal whine of the orient and can become archly humorous in some of the Yiddish songs.

Mme. Gorby has been in this country for only a year and a half but is already on the way to becoming an American citizen. You'll get a chance to hear her next February when she'll give another Town Hall recital.

It'll be folk songs, of course.



Dear Dr. Silver:

The catastrophe which has struck Cleveland with such devastating force, bringing death and serious injury to many of our fellow citizens and neighbors, and destruction to their homes and possessions, has compelled me to cancel all my speaking engagements.

I regret exceedingly that I am unable to address the Cleveland Zionist Society in person. But I do wish to convey to you and the members of the Society my ardent conviction that Palestine should, as soon as practicable, be established as a free, democratic Jewish Commonwealth.

It is gratifying that both President Roosevelt and Governor Thomas E. Dewey have, in forthright statements, expressed themselves in support of this aim.

In my humble opinion, the question of establishing Palestine as a Jewish Commonwealth is not exclusively a Jewish question. It is equally a Christian problem. There can never be complete tranquility in this world until the two thousand-year-old Jewish question is finally settled. Only the creation of a Jewish state will remove the Jewish question from the agenda of the nations of the world. A homeless people must either die or be a constant source of irritation. The Jewish race possesses an indomitable will to live. It will not die despite all the Pharaohs, Torquemadas and Hitlers.

But to live as a normal people, Jews - the first and foremost victims of every Hitler - must be rooted in a home land. Restoration of Palestine as a Jewish sovereign state will give status to men without a country. More than anything else this achievement will solve the so-called Jewish problem, which otherwise threatens to grow in intensity in Europe after the war.

It is apparent to me that attempts to settle homeless Jews in lands other than Palestine will not serve as the permanent

solution to the problem. The affinity of the Jewish people for Palestine is easily understood. Historical associations, ethical and moral tenure, and actual investment of lives, toil and treasure during the last few decades, which have transformed the wasteland and swamps to fertile fields and teeming cities, should establish beyond all doubt the fact that Palestine is the one spot for this Jewish sovereign state.


The objective for which Zionists are striving, is so fundamentally right and just that it must eventually win over right thinking men and women everywhere.


Dear Rabbi Silver:

LEON ROTH

Professor Leon Roth was born in London in March 1896, and educated at the City of London School, where he became Classical Medallist at Exeter College, Oxford, of which he was senior scholar in Classics. During the European war he served as a private soldier in England and France, and then as a commissioned officer. In the latter capacity he was one of the first to be transferred to the Jewish Battalions, and served with them till the end of the War. On returning to the University he graduated with distinction in Philosophy (1921) and gained a Walker Trust prize at the University of St. Andrews. As a senior student at Oxford he carried off scholarships and prizes in both Philosophy and Hebrew (including the 'blue ribbon' of the John Locke Scholarship) and was awarded the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. In 1923 he was appointed to the staff of the University of Manchester, where he worked under Professor Samuel Alexander, O.M. In 1926 he was created Officer d'Academie in recognition of his services to French literature and learning.

Professor Roth's publications before coming to Palestine included specialist studies in the history of thought as well as contributions to more general problems, and he played a principal part in one of the romances of modern bibliography, when he was called upon to edit for the Clarendon Press the newly discovered collection of Descartes' letters. His work on Jewish Philosophy was summed up in an essay on Jewish Thought in the Modern World in the Oxford Legacy of Israel which appeared in 1927.

In 1928 Professor Roth was elected to the Ahad Haam Chair of Philosophy in the Hebrew University, and together with Dr. (afterward's Professor) Hugo Bergmann organized the Department of Philosophy. He made it as a principal object of his work to provide adequate literature in the subject in Hebrew, and to this end inaugurated (and in great part himself prepared) the series of translations of classical and modern texts which now includes works of the principal philosophers studied in universities from Plato to Bertrand Russell. At the same time he gave annual lectures on the problems of the philosophy of Judaism afterwards gathered in

a volume: In Memory of Ahad Haam.

In addition to his work of lecturing and translation Professor Roth has published since coming to Jerusalem a further two volumes in English (Spinoza and Descartes's Discourse on Method). In Hebrew he has published Introductions to the study both of Greek and of Modern Thought and a volume of Illustrations of Post-Biblical Jewish Ethical and Religious Thought, and he has edited a volume on the Problems of Hebrew Secondary Education in Palestine to which he contributed a number of essays. This year he has returned to the work of translation and published a Hebrew edition of the first two books of Aristotle's Ethics, and has issued a volume of essays and addresses on the Hebrew University and its Function in Modern Jewish Education, Anthology of the Hebrew Scriptures and an edition of Plato's Republic for Hebrew Secondary Schools.

Professor Roth travelled in the United States in the spring of 1939 and made a special study of American Higher Education. He was elected Rector of the Hebrew University in 1940 and re-elected for a third year in 1942. During his Rectorship he made a special effort to introduce changes in the system of teaching in the University and to influence the general educational policy both of the University and of Jewish Palestine as a whole, and he continued to occupy himself with the practical problems raised by his conception of the historical function of the Hebrew University as a centre of the Hebraic spirit and the home of the Jewish mind.

UNIVERSITY'S RECTOR COMING TO AMERICA

Prof. Leon Roth, distinguished scholar, and Rector of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY from 1940 to 1944 will arrive in America some time in November. The object of Prof. Roth's visit is to make a study at close range of some of our leading American universities, with special reference to academic administration and methods of instruction.

Prof. Roth will in addition try during his visit to establish a closer cultural contact between America and the HEBREW UNIVERSITY. Prof. Roth holds that it is an error to believe that the HEBREW UNIVERSITY either as an institution of higher learning or as a centre of Jewish spiritual life is able to maintain itself in isolation. He says "it should aim at penetrating and being penetrated by the educated Jewish world, and in this way it could become what it should become, an asset to its supporters and thus make a direct contribution to the maintenance of world Jewry. The Societies of Friends of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY throughout the world should constitute living channels through which the spiritual lifestream could course—not only from Jerusalem outward, but also to Jerusalem inward."

Prof. Roth was born in London in 1896 and received both his Masters and Doctorate degrees at Oxford. In 1923 he was appointed Lecturer in Philosophy at Manchester University. He comes from a distinguished family, best known of whom is perhaps his brother,

Dr. Cecil Roth, Anglo-Jewish historian. He is the holder of the Achad Ha'am Chair of Philosophy at the HEBREW UNIVERSITY since 1928. In 1935 Prof. Roth represented Palestine Jewry and the HEBREW UNIVERSITY at the celebration in Spain of the 800th anniversary of the birth of Maimonides, famous Jewish philosopher-physician. There he delivered a Hebrew address which was believed to have been the first Hebrew speech heard publicly in Spain since the expulsion of 1492.

Prof. Roth's publications include special studies in the history of thought as well as contributions to more general problems. He has published various volumes on the general significance of the Cartesian philosophy and on Spinoza. His works include translations into Hebrew of some of Aristotle's *Metaphysics* and *Politics*, editions of Hebrew versions of *Philosophical Classics* from the Greek, French and English and an anthology of Jewish Ethical and Religious Thought from the Apocrypha to the 20th Century. He has produced for the first time in the Hebrew language an original guide to the study of Greek philosophy.

Like Prof. Bergmann, the first Rector of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY who visited America in 1937, Prof. Roth will address groups of scholars in his special field at some of the American universities and receptions to be arranged for him in a number of communities. It is expected that Prof. Roth at the conclusion of his visit in this country will visit Canada, Central and South America.

PROFESSOR KLIGLER DIES SUDDENLY

Headed University's Dept. of Bacteriology and Hygiene

Prof. Israel J. Kligler, Head of the University's Department of Bacteriology and Hygiene, passed away suddenly in Jerusalem, Sept. 23rd. Professor Kligler was one of the most distinguished members of the Faculty. The *New York Times* compares his achievement in conquering the mosquito and removing the scourge of malaria from Palestine with the work of General Gorgas in Panama. Because of his quarter century of pioneering work in malaria control, Palestine is the only country

in the Middle East in which this infectious disease is of minor significance today.

Professor Kligler went to Palestine in 1921 where he served first as Chief Bacteriologist of the Hadassah Medical Organization and later as Head of the Malaria Research Unit of the Palestine Health Department until he joined the University Faculty in 1926. Before going to Palestine, Professor Kligler was associated with the American Museum of Natural History and the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research. He was also a member of the malaria commission of the League of Nations.

Last year the Polish Government in Exile awarded Professor Kligler the Golden Cross of Merit for furnishing a typhus vaccine to Polish troops and refugees in Russia in the preparation of which he had risked his own life. In order to facilitate his work on typhus research and control, Hadassah and the University jointly set up a special Typhus Laboratory for him which met requests for the supply of the vaccine from various sources. In the Spring of this year Professor Kligler organized on behalf of the JDC medical relief in Aden among Yemenite refugees among whom a typhus epidemic had broken out.

His sudden death has deprived Palestine of one of the country's most valuable pioneers, and the University of one of its best known scientists.

END OF WAR WILL EXPAND ROLE OF HEBREW UNIVERSITY

In Palestine, as elsewhere, plans are being prepared for the postwar reconstruction period. Fortunately, the term "reconstruction" is something of a misnomer where Palestine is concerned. What actually lies before us is the great work of upbuilding and developing Palestine and in this development the plans for the HEBREW UNIVERSITY must figure prominently.

Academies, Yeshivoth, rabbinical seminaries, libraries and museums in Continental Europe have almost all been destroyed. Only a few institutions of Jewish higher learning remain in the Diaspora,—in England and the United States of America. In the postwar era the function of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY in Jerusalem, as the central institution of learning for World Jewry, will therefore take on far greater significance than ever before. What the University has done hitherto for the furtherance of Jewish learning—advancement of the reborn Hebrew language, intensive research in many fields of Jewish scholarship, publication of works by eminent scholars on its staff—must be doubled and trebled in the future if only to make up for what has been irretrievably lost. Plans are also being made for training young men and women from the Diaspora for service to their communities as teachers and leaders. Many of these young people, it is anticipated, will come from the countries of the British Empire and from the United States of America. It will also be the function of the University to guide and supervise the Hebrew school systems of Diaspora communities after the war.

At the same time, the University will have to assume enormous tasks in relation to the Jewish community of Palestine. With a growing Yishuv, the expansion of the Jewish National Home, and the progress of local industry, trade and agriculture, the need for HEBREW UNIVERSITY graduates in the various spheres of Palestinian life will increase. Its five hundred graduates have already made their mark in the life of Palestine as a whole and of the Jewish community. Future graduates will fill posts in the fields of civil service, education, science, industry and agriculture, which are bound to expand after the war.

AMERICA AND THE HEBREW UNIVERSITY

Henry Morgenthau Pays Tribute to Hebrew University. In a letter addressed to Dr. Judah L. Magnes, Henry Morgenthau, Jr. says, "From several sources I have received reports of the splendid achievements of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY. Please accept my sincere congratulations on your past efforts and my good wishes for the future".

Walter C. Lowdermilk Addresses Southern California Chapter. Dr. Walter C. Lowdermilk of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, author of "Palestine, Land of Promise", addressed the Southern California Chapter of the AMERICAN FRIENDS in Los Angeles on August 30th. The meeting was attended by over 400 persons. A scholarship at HEBREW UNIVERSITY will be established in honor of Dr. and Mrs. Lowdermilk.

Earlier in the year, the Chapter held an all day Institute on the work and significance of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY. Among those who participated were members of the faculties of the University of California, California Institute of Technology and the University of Southern California.

At the Third Anniversary Banquet following the Institute's Sessions, Dr. Emanuel Libman, Vice-President of the AMERICAN FRIENDS of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY, was the guest of honor.

The officers of the Southern California Chapter are: Mrs. Philip Dworsky, President; Rabbi Edgar F. Magnin and Marco R. Newmark, Vice-Presidents; Julian Sieroty, Treasurer; Thomas Mann, Honorary Chairman, Writers Committee; Dr. Lewis Browne, Chairman, Writers Committee; Prof. Paul S. Epstein, Chairman, Academic Council; and Judge Lester W. Roth, Chairman, Advisory Board.

25 Years H.U. Medical Library. Established through American initiative and support. The 25th anniversary of the establishment of the medical division of the Jewish National and University Library by Dr. Julius Jarcho of New York was commemorated in Jerusalem in June. Addresses were delivered by Prof. Hugo Bergmann, the first Director of the Library, Prof. Gotthold Weil, its present Director, and Prof. Aryeh Feigenbaum, Chairman of the University's Pre-Faculty of Medicine. Dr. Jarcho's plan of a central medical library with branches in all sections of Palestine where physicians may have ready access to the latest medical books and journals is being fulfilled. Throughout the quarter of a century, he devoted himself selflessly to its enlargement and expansion.

The American Jewish Physicians Committee, with Dr. Jarcho's active assistance, purchase books and subscriptions to medical journals for the central medical library and its branches. One hundred and eighty medical journals are regularly received by the central library, a much larger number than are on file in most European university libraries.

Prof. Salo W. Baron, Guest of Honor Canadian Friends Dinner. Professor Salo W. Baron of Columbia University was the guest of honor at a largely attended Dinner in Montreal on June 19th, tendered by the National President of the Canadian Friends of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY, Mr. Allan Bronfman. The Dinner was attended by leading members of the professional and communal life of the city. The nation-wide importance of this Dinner Meeting was indicated by telegrams and letters of congratulation received from the leading Jewish communities in all parts of Canada. Messages were received from the National Vice-Presidents on behalf of their various regions as well as from leaders in various Canadian centres who are taking an active part in promoting the interests of the University.

Significance was added to this event by congratulatory messages received by Mr. Bronfman from the following leaders of the University movement in the United States of America: Prof. Albert Einstein, Chairman of the National Council of the AMERICAN FRIENDS of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY; Mr. Salmann Schocken, Chairman of the Executive Council of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY; Dr. A. S. W. Rosenbach, President, and Mr. Samuel B. Finkel, Director of the AMERICAN FRIENDS of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY.

Since the establishment last spring of the Canadian Friends of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY as a National Organization, rapid progress has been made in the leading centres of Canada. President Allan Bronfman reports the appointment of the following as National Officers: Vice-Presidents: Mr. A. M. Shinbane, K.C., Winnipeg; Mr. H. A. Friedman, K.C., Edmonton; Mr. Sam J. Zacks, B.A., Toronto; Treasurer: Mr. Lazarus Phillips, K.C., Montreal; Secretary: Mr. Harvey Golden, B.A., M.A., Montreal.

In addition to the Montreal and Toronto Chapters already in existence, Chapters have been organized in thirteen communities. Dr. Walter J. Fischel addressed gatherings in all these places, where he made a deep impression and stimulated interest and enthusiasm on behalf of the cause. Meetings are being arranged to establish Chapters in a number of additional communities. Membership Drives have been successfully completed or are currently being conducted in practically all of the Chapters. Interest in Scholarships and Endowments has been manifested by a considerable number of leading citizens in the various Provinces.

Dr. Wechsler and Friends Establish Fund in Memory of His Son. Dr. Israel S. Wechsler has established a scholarship fund of \$10,000 at the HEBREW UNIVERSITY in memory of his son, Robert Moses, a medical student at Columbia University, who died suddenly last February. Dr. Wechsler is the neurologist to the Mt. Sinai Hospital and Professor at Columbia University. Several friends of Dr. Wechsler and of his son have pledged an additional sum of \$15,000 toward the Memorial Fund for the award of scholarships and fellowships at the HEBREW UNIVERSITY. Dr. Wechsler is a member of the Board of Governors of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY, of the Board of Directors of the AMERICAN FRIENDS, and of the American Jewish Physicians Committee.

American Soldier Memorialized at Hebrew University. Mr. and Mrs. Philip Feldman and Doctors Aaron, Jacob and Julius Feldman, the parents and uncles of Lieutenant Joseph David Feldman of New York, who died in action on the Burma Road established in his honor a \$5,000 scholarship at the Hebrew University to be known as the Joseph David Feldman Scholarship Fund. This scholarship was established through the suggestion of Dr. Samuel W. Boorstein, and Mr. Leo Wilson, chairman of the Bronx Zionist District No. 13.

American Publications Carry Articles By H.U. Faculty Members. *Psychological Review* (May, 1944) published an article by Dr. Ernst Simon on the late Dr. Moshe Brill, of the University's Department of Education. *The Reconstructionist* (April, 1944) carried an article by Prof. Hugo Bergmann entitled "A Jewish Message to the World". *Jewish Social Studies* (July, 1944) contained a study by Dr. Walter J. Fischel, "The Jews in Kurdistan a Hundred Years Ago." *The New Palestine* published articles by Prof. Norman Bentwich and Prof. Martin Buber.

American Fellowships for Research at Hebrew University. One of the three fellowships offered in 1944 by the International Association of University Women was awarded to Dr. Bruria Feldman-Muehsam of Jerusalem. This is the first time such an award has been made to a Palestinian woman scientist. Dr. Feldman-Muehsam holds a Ph.D. from the HEBREW UNIVERSITY. For the past two years she has been working in the Radiological Department of the University's Cancer Research Laboratories. She will devote her fellowship to researches in the Department of Parasitology.

Dropsie College for Hebrew and Cognate Learning of Philadelphia awarded a newly established fellowship for advanced research to Benzion Natanyahu of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY for the coming academic year.

New York Theater Party by University Guild. The Hebrew University Guild of New York sponsored a benefit theater party which netted \$5,000 for the University. The Guild is engaged in educational work and raises funds for the HEBREW UNIVERSITY. The officers of the Guild are: Mrs. Jill Shulman, President; Harry Liverman, Vice-President; Mrs. Lane Malsin, Treasurer; Mrs. Frances C. Levy, Secretary; and Mrs. Gerson Garb, Chairman of the Board of Directors.

Two New York Merchants Make Bequests to Hebrew University. Philip Maslansky, the son of the late Zionist leader, Zvi Hirsh Maslansky, bequeathed the sum of \$10,000 to the University. A similar amount was bequeathed to the University by the late Julius Schwarz.

Greetings to Dr. Harry Friedenwald on 80th Birthday. On September 21st, Dr. Harry Friedenwald of Baltimore reached his 80th Birthday.

Among Dr. Friedenwald's prime interests in Palestine has been the Medical Faculty of HEBREW UNIVERSITY. In 1923, he established the Aaron and Bertha Friedenwald Fund in honor of his parents, the income of which is being used for the Medical Department at HEBREW UNIVERSITY.

Dr. A. S. W. Rosenbach, President of the AMERICAN FRIENDS, sent to him the following message: "The AMERICAN FRIENDS of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY extends to you its good wishes on the occasion of your 80th birthday. We are proud to know that you share with us our high regard for the University and for all it signifies."

Dr. Friedenwald, like his father Aaron and his son Jonas, is one of the country's outstanding Ophthalmologists. In 1936 and 1937, he was President of the American Ophthalmological Society. He is regarded as an authority on medical history, especially on medieval Jewish doctors.

THE UNIVERSITY AT WORK

Plundered Jewish Cultural Treasures to be Recovered by Hebrew University. The HEBREW UNIVERSITY has initiated steps to recover for the Jewish people the cultural and art treasures of European Jewry that have been stolen by the Nazis and transferred to Germany. The Nazis have stored up in Munich large Jewish libraries as well as considerable booty of Jewish art treasures and archives which they had plundered throughout Europe. The HEBREW UNIVERSITY of Jerusalem is negotiating with the appropriate institutions of the United Nations in London with a view to securing these treasures after the war and transferring them to the Jewish National University Library and the University's Museum of Jewish Antiquities.

Playing Field Inaugurated. The inauguration of the Balfour Park Club Playing Field of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY took place on June 28th in the presence of Mr. Norman Lourie, founder and chairman of the Balfour Park Club of Johannesburg which, jointly with Mr. Lourie and his father, Mr. Harry Lourie, had presented the field to the University. The inauguration of the playing field was combined with the fifth annual Sports Day of the University, which marked the first games between two academic institutions in Palestine. Teams of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY and the Technical Institute of Haifa competed in track and field events, basket ball and football.

Hebrew University Secondary School Graduation. The experimental secondary school conducted jointly by the University and the Vaad Leumi, graduated its sixth class in June. The school now has 218 graduates. The University regards the graduates of the school as its future students. The school was founded by Dr. Alexander Dushkin of New York who was its first headmaster. It affords facilities for teaching practice for the University students of pedagogy.


University Library Expands. The Jewish National and University Library now has on its shelves close to 450,000 volumes. 16,000 packages of periodicals and approximately 6,000 books were received in 1943, despite shipping difficulties. The Government of Palestine, Palestine publishing houses, authors, scientific societies, public institutions, and others continue to send copies of their publications. A gift of 2,300 English volumes was received from the British Council. The AMERICAN FRIENDS OF THE HEBREW UNIVERSITY takes an active part in enlarging the Library.

Government of Iraq Publishes Studies by Professor Bodenheimer. The Ministry of Economics of the Government of Iraq published two bulletins by Dr. F. S. Bodenheimer, Professor of Zoology at the HEBREW UNIVERSITY, containing the results of a mission of the Iraq Department of Agriculture to Northern Iraq in the spring of 1943. These bulletins were prepared by Professor Bodenheimer in his capacity of entomologist to the Iraq Director General of Agriculture while on a year's leave from the HEBREW UNIVERSITY.

British Summer School At Hebrew University. The British Council Summer School gave a course at the HEBREW UNIVERSITY in English drama, fiction, poetry, and history, and also in methods of teaching and learning the English language. Sixty students from many parts of the country, including about 15 from agricultural settlements enrolled.

Vocational Guidance Bureau Opened In Jerusalem. A Vocational Guidance Bureau was opened in the Brandeis Vocational Center of Hadassah in Jerusalem under the joint supervision of Hadassah and the University's Department of Education. Its work is guided by Prof. Bonaventura and Dr. Rieger of the Department of Education. The plans submitted by the Department called for vocational guidance for the pupils of the elementary, secondary and vocational schools in Jerusalem. It is hoped that the Jerusalem Bureau will be able to assemble scientific data which will be of help to the other vocational guidance bureaus in Palestine.

Dr. Max Schloessinger—Tribute by Dr. Magnes. Dr. Max Schloessinger, a member of the Board of Governors and the Executive Council of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY from its very beginning passed away in New York last May at the age of 66. Dr. Schloessinger was an Arabic scholar of considerable dimensions, and one of his chief interests in the University was the School of Oriental Studies, which he helped to create.

At a memorial meeting in honor of Dr. Schloessinger, held at the University in June, Dr. Magnes, who had been an intimate friend of his for over forty years, reviewed his career. "Max Schloessinger", said Dr. Magnes, "was a vigorous, ethical personality. He was modest, even retiring, and without the slightest desire for publicity. He knew the difference between right and wrong without any quibbling, and he was stern and unbending in laying upon himself and others moral obligations which it was not always simple to live up to. It is this type of moral character which the Hebrew University can ill afford to lose."

Speeds Penicillin Output From 10 Days to 1 Hour. A method of speeding up production of penicillin, used for treatment of infections, was presented by Dr. Baruch Levin at the annual meeting of the Palestine Microbiological Society in Jerusalem. The process produces crude penicillin in about an hour, compared with ten days required by the usual methods. In experiments of over a year at HEBREW UNIVERSITY, Dr. Levin and his collaborators used an apparatus which produces subcultures of microorganisms automatically every few minutes.

Russia Receives Anti-Typhus Serum From Hebrew University. In June the HEBREW UNIVERSITY shipped 25,000 cc of anti-typhus vaccine to Russia. The serum was shipped by airplane by way of Teheran. It was prepared by the University's Department of Bacteriology and Hygiene.

The Garden of Prophets and Sages Under Way in Jerusalem Originates in the Hebrew University. The Garden of Prophets and Sages about to be planted in Jerusalem is a striking illustration of HEBREW UNIVERSITY'S foresight and initiative. This Garden, unique of its kind throughout the world will have all the flowers, plants, shrubs and foliage mentioned in the Scriptures, the books of the Talmud and Jewish literature. This Garden will be of great service to research students in Biblical and Talmudical literature and to botanists interested in Palestinian flora.

The initiator of this unique Garden is Dr. Ephraim Ha-Reubeni who in collaboration with his wife for forty years has been studying and collating the tremendous knowledge now available about Biblical and Talmudical botany.

Dr. Ha-Reubeni holds a lectureship in his subject, at the HEBREW UNIVERSITY, where he first established his Museum of Biblical and Talmudical Botany, in which the living plants culled from the soil are kept under glass in the original state by means of a secret preparation injected into the sap, which he and his wife had devised. This was the origin, under glass, of the Garden of the Prophets and Sages about to be planted in the open air.

Over 100 Volumes Published by Hebrew University Press. According to a catalogue of the publications of the Hebrew University Press from 1930 to 1944 which has just appeared, the Hebrew University Press published 109 volumes—103 of them in Hebrew and 6 in English. Among the 103 volumes in Hebrew 32 were listed under Jewish Studies, 7 under Oriental Studies, 19 under Philosophy, Psychology and Education, 21 under Philosophical Classics, 12 under Mathematics, Natural Sciences, and Agriculture, 8 under Bibliography, and 4 under "Miscellaneous". The 6 volumes in English were on Archaeology, Medicine, Nutrition, and Oriental Studies. The University Press also publishes "Tarbiz", a quarterly journal of the Humanities, and "Kirjath Sepher", the bibliographical quarterly of the Jewish National and University Library.

Enrollments In 1943-44. During the academic year just ended, 560 students were enrolled at the HEBREW UNIVERSITY, of whom 325 were men and 235 women. Since more men than women students have enrolled, the percentage of women students has risen from 24.6% in 1939 to 42% in 1944. Of the 560 students, 284 are "majoring" in Humanities and 242 in Science. The remaining 34 attend the School of Agriculture.

In Memoriam Berl Kaznelson.

HEBREW UNIVERSITY through the passing of Berl Kaznelson lost not only an important member of the Board of Governors and of the Executive Council, but one of its best friends.

Berl Kaznelson was one of the most prominent personalities of the Jewish community in Palestine, especially as a leader of Labor in all matters pertaining to culture and education. As a Hebrew writer of high rank and as a person of wide Jewish and general information he exercised great influence in the administration of the University.

His influence and memory will persist for a long time.

GEOLOGY AT THE HEBREW UNIVERSITY



Institute of Physics which houses the Dept. of Geology

Geology is the least spectacular of the sciences. It does not conjure perfumes of coal tar like chemistry, create new fruits and flowers like Botany, or breed dogs to pattern like zoology. It has never done anything bizarre, and probably never will; its concern is only with fundamental human needs like water for irrigation, oil for fuel, stone for building, ores and chemicals for industry.

Here in Palestine the primary practical function of the geologist is to search out the underground water sources urgently needed to supplement the scanty supplies from streams and springs. Most of the underground water is wanted for irrigation because irrigation, so experts say, can multiply the fertility of the soil as much as ten times. Irrigated land can therefore be divided up into much smaller holdings than non-irrigated, and so support a much larger population. The geologist who finds underground water in Palestine therefore directly increases the country's capacity to absorb additional settlers. What this means in terms of the development of the Jewish National Home is plain to be seen.

The records of the Department of Geology of the HEBREW UNIVERSITY, contain a long list of hydrological surveys made in Palestine. Many successful borings for water have been made on the strength of those surveys on indications given by Professor Leo Picard, head of the Department, with regard to certain geological structures.

Large quantities of water have been found, to cite a typical instance or two, in the Valley of Jezreel on the Professor's indications. The Kevuzah of Ginegar, which had fought an all but losing battle with arid soil for twenty years, suddenly found itself in 1943 with ample water supplies welling up from a new boring. At long last the pioneers of Ginegar can irrigate their fields and grow the abundant crops they had begun to despair of ever seeing on their land. In the Tel

Adashim area, again, so much water has been found in the hills that tens of thousands of dunams can be changed over from dry-farming to intensive crops. Such new water supplies are doubly important in wartime because the settlers are enabled to increase their production of the essential foodstuffs now in short supply in Palestine.

The most striking case in the Department's records relates to Beer Tuvia in the south of the Coastal Plain. For forty years one group of settlers after another had struggled to establish themselves there, only to fail dismally because no water was available. Then, in the disturbances of 1929, the village was destroyed. When plans were made for reconstruction, the settlers did not care to return because the lack of ground water in the region had become proverbial. Two borings by Prof. Picard yielded lavish quantities of water for citrus-growing as well as for diversified crops. Today Beer Tuvia is a thriving small-holders' community which not long ago was able to give up a goodly part of its well-irrigated land for the settlement of some forty refugee families. The successful Beer Tuvia borings not only opened up a new future for the village itself, but made possible the establishment of numerous new Jewish settlements in the region south of Rehovoth as far down as Gaza.

The search for underground water goes on unrelentingly and the University is constantly called upon to cooperate with the Colonization Department of the Jewish Agency and the experts of the Jewish National Fund. Surveys are by no means confined to the areas where water is most likely to be found. More arid districts like Jerusalem hill country and the barren Negev are also investigated by the Department in the hope of finding the water that can literally make the desert blossom like the rose.

For many years Jewish industrialists have turned to geologists for help in searching out minerals and chemicals in Palestine and the Middle East generally. Many such requests have come to the Department of Geology, with the result that its staff have prospected—to mention only a few of the larger surveys—for phosphates in the Judaeen Desert, for sulphur in the Gaza district, and in many parts of Palestine for stone and other building materials. The Department's surveys are not limited to Palestine, and have frequently been extended to neighboring countries.

In connection with wartime needs, the Department is making a detailed survey of the mineral resources of Palestine. It has also made a survey on behalf of the Palestine War Supply Board.

Since local substitutes are urgently needed for the large quantities of raw materials imported before the war, many industrialists have asked the Department to make surveys on their behalf in the hope that the particular materials they require might be found in Palestine.

Some very large industries have been developed from local supplies of chemicals and minerals with the aid of the University's Department of Geology. One case where the Department saved the day for a large industry is well worth mention. Some years ago the cement works at Haifa found their supply of raw materials giving out; and not only that, their water supply was running low as well. Fortunately, Professor Picard was able to find abundant quantities both of the raw materials required for the manufacture of cement and of water in the vicinity of the works.

Oil companies operating in the Middle East now regularly send Professor Picard fossils for determination. (The presence of certain fossils in a given area may give the clue to possible new sources of oil).

The academic programme of the Hebrew University's Department of Geology shows that its practical services to the upbuilding of the Homeland, extensive as they are, do not interfere with the pure research in its laboratories or with the teaching in its classrooms. The curriculum includes courses in the geology of Palestine, historical geology, mineralogy, petrography, geological cartography, physical geography and palaeontology. Geology is a required subject for students of biology and agriculture.

The Department's researches are concentrated chiefly on the geology of Palestine, palaeontology (the science of fossils), and petrology (the science of rocks). Its findings are published in scientific journals both in Palestine and in other countries. The Department also publishes its own annual bulletin, which is in great request by leading universities of Palestine, palaeontology (the science of fossils), and petrology (the and scientific institutes abroad. Mr. Julius Fohs, a well known American oil geologist and a devoted friend of the Department's contributes to the costs of publishing the bulletin and of acquiring recent geological literature.

Professor Picard a year ago summarized his investigations of twenty years in an English work entitled "The Structure and Evolution of Palestine with Comparative Notes on Neighboring Countries," which is the first of its kind to appear in any language.





Gorby was presented at the Museum of Modern Art's "Hebraica" program within a series ~~of folk songs and~~ ~~dancing~~ given over to folk music of various peoples.


Russian by birth, Mme. Gorby is a graduate of the Conservatory of Bucharest. Possessor of unusual instrumental and vocal gifts, she early developed so keen an interest in the folksongs of her own and other European peoples, that she decided to devote her career to this special art. Later studies took her to Paris and to Rome, where she had wider opportunities to cultivate her knowledge of ancient and forgotten songs of the people as well as that currently heard. She sang many times in Paris, London, Vienna, Prague, etc., and was heard in Egypt, Palestine, Haiti, throughout Eastern and middle Europe before coming to this country.

In her travels and research, Sarah Gorby has devoted herself particularly to collecting the songs of the Jews, and some years ago in Paris discovered rare treasures in Spanish-Jewish songs of the 16th century. Her general programs include such songs as the early Spanish "Romance

of the Tunes...

of the Turkish Ghetto", settings of traditional Hebrew prayers, ancient Hebrew lullabies, Yiddish and Jewish folksongs and songs of the Jewish children of Russia, Hungary, Roumania, Poland and other lands.

On November 21 the singer opened the folkseries at the Brooklyn Academy of Music, following on her Chicago debut recital of late October. This season will take her in recital and concert appearances to St. Louis, Kansas City, Indianapolis and many other American centers well as as/to Cleveland and ~~in~~ various New York appearances.

MME. SARAH GORBY FOLK SONG EXPERT

On Oct. 31, 1940, Sarah Gorby, contralto, made her New York debut at Town Hall in a complete program of folk songs- the singer's specialty. For her efforts she won praise from ~~many~~ reviewers who, nevertheless, had one reservation - that folk songs, being an intimate form of expression, lost a great deal when sung in a big auditorium like Town Hall.

Last night Mme. Gorby sang again, this time at the Museum of Modern Art's Coffee Concert, Hebraica, and reviewers could have no reservations about her singing. It was topnotch.

Mme. Gorby is a Russian by birth who has lived in practically every European country. She has done some lieder singing but her great passion has always been folk songs. She sings them in Hebrew, Russian, Rumanian, Spanish, Italian, French, German, Yiddish, English and Creole ~~and~~ in concert and over the radio.

Last night she sang songs of the Spanish Jews, Chassidic songs and Yiddish folk songs from Russia. Her voice is a rich contralto that can reach some pretty high notes, can take on that nasal whine of the orient and can become archly humorous in some of the Yiddish songs.

Mme. Gorby has been in this country for only a year and a half but is already on the way to becoming an American citizen. You'll get a chance to hear her next February when she'll give another Town Hall recital. It'll be folk songs, of course.


I am exceedingly grateful to you for your interest.





RESOLVED that THE CLEVELAND ZIONIST SOCIETY, numbering sixteen hundred enrolled Zionists, ~~whose President, since its organization, has been Dr. Silver,~~ expresses its complete confidence in the leadership of Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, who as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the American Zionist Emergency Council rendered such distinguished and universally recognized service to the cause of Zionism.

RESOLVED that The Cleveland Zionist Society whole-heartedly approves his political activities in connection ~~with~~ with the Palestine Resolution which was introduced in Congress and condemns the action of the representatives of the Zionist Organization of America on the *Emergency* Council who forced the resignation of Dr. Silver at a time when his services to our movement were most needed.

We furthermore denounce these same representatives for their obstructionist tactics throughout Dr. Silver's administration.

We are convinced that this unwarranted action does not represent the true sentiment of the Zionists of America and of American Jewry.
