My dear Abe:

I cannot tell you how dreadfully sorry I am at being compelled to miss the meeting this evening. As I told you when I phoned you this morning, my appointment with Secretary Marshall cane through this morning. I had been waiting for it for two weeks. It is set for tomorrow morning at 10:30 and there is no plane that would get me there in time for the appointment since New York time is an hour ahead of ours.

Inasmuch as the U.S. delegation will probably make its official position on Palestine known next Nonday or Tuesday, it is of critical importance that we see Marshall tomorrow. I am sure that the members of the Executive of the Cleveland Zionist Society will understand and will forgive my absence.

We are in the midst of the most decisive period# in the history of our movement, one of the most decisive periods in Jewish history. We have a fighting chance to win through to a solution which while not giving us all that we need or are entitled to, will yet give us a Jewish state and opportunities for free Jewish immigration. I say a fighting chance because it is not at all sure that the majority report of the United Nations will be approved. Everything will depend upon the attitude of our own Government, and the position of our own Government has not yet been made fully clear and unequivocal. As of the moment, it seems to be favorable to us. But there are powerful forces inside and outside the State Department which are working against us, not to speak of the Arab bloc and Great Britain. We will need to use our maximum strength,

skill and organization to fight through to victory.

It is of utmost importance that our ranks be strong and united, that a maximum number of American Jews be enrolled in the Zionist movement and that adequate financial resources be made available to carry on our political work. Our enemies are heavily financed, and have strong governments behind them.

Whatever we can do locally to strengthen the Cleveland Zionist Society and to support the Expansion Fund of the Zionist Organization of America is a significant contribution to the total effectiveness of our movement in the country.

I hope that the Cleveland Zionist Society will have a good and prosperous year. I always look forward to those meetings with the keenest pleasure. I hope to be able to report to you at your next meeting about our work at the United Nations.



Dear Doctor Silver:

I hesitate to intrude this matter upon your time and thought, busy as you are with more urgent affairs.

I do so because I feel that the prestige of the Cleveland Zionist Society is suffering seriously because of its vacillation and indecision whether or not to give financial support to Zionist Youth Commission. As a member of the Society's Executive Committee during this past year, I know that you have always maintained a close interest in the welfare of the Society no matter how pressing your other labors might be.

Of course, a decision as to whether or how much financial support the Youth Commission should get is one for the Executive Committee. It is true that the Society's funds are limited and the Executive Committee could quite properly decide that its available funds should be spent in ways more advantageous to the cause than is the Zionist Youth Commission. However, the subject has been discussed at a meeting or two during the past year but no decision reached. In the meantime, the Youth Commission, having incurred heavily increased expense with the appointment of an executive director, is unable to plan how to meet its budget without a decision from the Society. While it already has pledges for the coming year of \$500 from each of the two Districts and \$750 from Hadassah, the Society has failed not only to give any indication of its support during the coming year but has not even fulfilled last year's pledge. This is manifestly unfair to the Commission and I hope you agree with me that it would have been more befitting the prestige of the largest General Zionist society in the country to have given the Commission long before this a definite decision one way or the other.

As a representative of the Society to the Commission, I have attended most of its meetings during the past year. In order to resolve

the uncertainty of the Commission regarding the Society's position, I had suggested to Dr. Falkman several times during the past few months that an early meeting of the Executive Committee be called in which I hoped to present the matter and urge definite action. No meeting has yet been scheduled. In the meantime, nomination and election of officers and board members for the coming year has taken place. When I found that I was not renominated to the Executive Committee I called Dr. Falkman and asked that I be permitted to attend the next Executive Committee meeting for the sole purpose of giving a report as the outgoing representative of the Society to the Commission. It seemed to me a reasonable request since I had been the only representative of the Society to have attended most of the Youth Commission's meetings. Dr. Falkman rejected this request, stating that it was irregular. While Dr. Falkman and I have differing views regarding the Youth Commission and have not always seen eye to eye on other matters, such as the manner of recruiting veterans as members, I respect his sincerity and long labor of love in the Cleveland Zionist Society.

So, while I accept his decision that it would be irregular for me to attend the next board meeting for the purpose of giving an outgoing report or for the expression of my views, I feel constrained in good conscience to address this letter, asking that an early decision be obtained which, I hope, will permit the Youth Commission to receive continued financial support from our Society, commensurate with that received from similar organizations in the city.

Although no longer a member of the board, I still hope to serve the Society and the Zionist cause in every way possible.

My dear Friend:


I have discussed the matter of the financial support of the Zionist Youth Commission very fully with Mr. Evans. The position of The Cleveland Zionist Society on this matter is quite clear. The Society will make this year the same contribution which it pledged last year. Beyond that it is unable to make any additional contribution. The Zionist Youth Commission should raise its funds in the same way as any other organization engaged in Zionist work, not by appealing to other organizations for subsidies, but by soliciting directly in the community from individual Zionists who could be interested in the work.

As a former member of the Board of the Cleveland Zionist Society you must know that its income based on \$1 per member plus the small amount raised through its Cultural Fund is hardly sufficient to cover the operating ex enses of The Cleveland Zionist Society and the Scholarship to the Hebrew University to which it is committed.

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



BARON HANS DE MEISS-TEUFFEN



BARON DE MEISS-TEUFFEN has lived by the following creed: "I Want To See For Myself". It was this spirit of wanderlust that caused him to give up his cushiony job as General Manager of a Swiss Bank and blaze a footloose trail around the world. One of the areas with which he is most intimately connected is the explosive Middle East. In Palestine, Baron de Meiss-Teuffen is equally at home in an Arab bazaar, Jewish settlement or Citron House-home of British officials.

SUBJECTS

How I - A Christian - Would Solve The Palestine Problem

Having lived with both Jews and Arabs in Palestine, Baron Hans de Meiss-Teuffen has studied the Palestine problem at its source. Since peace in the Middle East hinges so directly on Palestine, Baron Hans de Meiss-Teuffen's views on the subject are most important at this time. In Palestine he has many friends among the Arab fellaheen, the Jewish pioneers and British officials. At this crucial moment in world affairs, Baron Hans de Meiss-Teuffen's views on Palestine and the Middle East will prove valuable to all Americans.

The "Cold War" in The Middle East

Baron Hans de Meiss-Teuffen has made his home in every important city in the Middle East. Here, indeed, is a man who can speak with authority on the inter-play of political and economic forces in that part of the world.

Biography of Baron Hans De Meiss-Teuffen

THE HAPPY LIFE of young Baron Hans de Meiss-Teuffen - world traveler, nav-1 igator, war correspondent, newsreel cameraman and plantation owner - sounds like something out of "Sinbad the Sailor". This young scion of a prominent Swiss banking family has been everywhere and has seen everything. The Baron hardly gives the travel labels on his trunks a chance to dry, for he is off to the far corners of the world at a moment's notice. Only recently he returned from his fourth trip to the Middle East, devoting most of his stay there to an up-to-the-minute study of the everchanging Palestine situation.

When the war was raging in Abyssinia, the young Baron threw up his plush job behind the desk of a Swiss bank and set off for Addis Ababa. Although he never quite reached the Ethiopian capitol, he touched just about every other spot on the globe along his wanderlust trail. Converting most of his capital into a tiny fishing boat, he lifted anchor at Brindisi and sailed to Corfu, Corinth, Piraeus, the Dodecanese Islands, Smyrna, Cyprus and Beirut.

In the Syrian capitol, the ex-banker hired himself out to an Arab trader and taxied him across the desert to Bagdad. In this mystical oriental city he went to work for a Persian transportation service as a truck driver. This led to journeys throughout the length of the Iranian Peninsula - from sun-bleached Teheran to wild Kurdistan, deep into the far reaches of the Caucasus.

On a dark October evening in 1935, Baron de Meiss-Teuffen slipped into the harbor of Haifa in Palestine, without the benefit of visa or passport, thus becoming one of the earliest "illegal" immigrants in the Holy Land. Two weeks later the police caught up with him - he was working as an engineer on a Government farm - and threw him into prison. Released through the efforts of friends in the Swiss diplomatic service, de Meiss-Teuffen toured Palestine on a bicycle, working as a farmer, electrician, ditch-digger, truck driver and laborer in the open mine-pits of the Dead Sea. Although a non-Jew, the Baron was permitted to join Histadruth - the Jewish Federation of Labor in the Holy Land.

After Palestine, the young adventurer sailed through the Suez Canal as far as Port Sudan where he shipped out as an ordinary seaman on an Arab-owned sailing dhow. From this vessel, he traded and bartered with the natives of ancient Arabia, pushing on, after a while, to the Persian Gulf and India. Thence to the Seychelles Islands and Madagascar. Shoving off once again, Baron de Meiss-Teuffen plied the seas to Beira in East Africa, and then to the copper-mine district of Northern Rhodesia. He stayed here long enough to amass sufficient funds to purchase a 36,000-acre plantation in the Belgian Congo. He subsequently built his famous Tiger Fish Hotel deep in the big-game territory of his estate. As a hostel-keeper, the young Baron endeared himself to big-game hunters who came to track down hippos, leopards, elephants and giraffes. His steaks fried in hippopotamus fat are a family specialty, according to the Baron.

When World War II broke out in Europe, Baron de Meiss-Teuffen hurried to Switzerland where he joined the military service of his native country. In 1940, upon his transfer to the military reserve, he took a job with the United Press, and was immediately assigned to cover the Italian-Greek war. At the end of this campaign, this young world sightseer bought himself another sailing ship and, despite the war, sailed through submarine-infested waters to Portugal, Casablanca, the Canary Islands and various small ports on the Sahara coast.

A shipwreck off Liberia resulted in holding up de Meiss-Teuffen in Sierra Leone for more than six months. Joining a convoy that was headed south, he was temporarily halted from his travels when his ship was torpedoed four days out at sea. Picked up by a British convoy that was heading north, de Meiss-Teuffen finally ended up in England. While in the British Isles, he worked for the Ministry of War Transport. It was during his English interlude that Baron de Meiss-Teuffen went to work for Pathe Pictures in London - an assignment he still holds on a freelance basis.


