

General Yaacov Dori, hero of Israel's War of Liberation, first Chief of Staff of its Defense Forces and now President of the Technion, Israel's Institute of Technology, will arrive in the United States on January 14 for a three-month visit, Colonel J. R. Elyachar, president of the American Technion Society, announced today.

Colonel Elyachar disclosed that the 53-year-old Israeli soldier and engineer, known as the "Eisenhower of Israel," will confer with U. S. educators and scientific leaders and tour the country under the auspices of the American Technion Society, which supports the 40-year-old Haifa university. He is expected to address large audiences in key centers on behalf of the \$20,000,000 drive being conducted here and in Israel to rebuild the Technion on a new campus site. The new facilities will enable the institute to graduate annually a minimum of 600 engineers and architects who are needed for the country's industrial and agricultural expansion.

A colorful personality who led Israel's armies to victory over the Arab forces, General Dori resigned his military post in 1949, soon after the establishment of the State, and retired to civilian life. He became Scientific Coordinator to Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion, a position he still holds in addition to his duties as head of the technical university.

The Israeli educator is convinced that the application of modern science and technology can raise the standard of living, not only of Israel, but also of the entire area of the Middle East and southwest

Asia. As advisor to the Israeli Prime Minister, he is credited with the close cooperation which exists between the country's growing industry and its scientific institutions. In a recent statement, he declared, "Now is the time for constructive endeavors. It is my earnest hope that farsighted international diplomacy and the blessings of modern science will unite all peoples in this area to work and live together in brotherly cooperation."

General Dori, a native of Haifa, is an engineer graduate of the University of Ghent, Belgium. He served with the Jewish Legion which fought with the British forces during World War I, acquiring valuable military experience which he used to advantage when he commanded the famous Haganah.

In 1921, General Dori commanded the Jewish Battalion which defended the Jewish communities of Jaffa and Tel Aviv. On completion of his university training in 1926, General Dori became technical director of the Jewish Agency, planning the location and construction of Jewish settlements in relation to their strategic defense positions.

A linguist, he studied military tactics of British, German, Russian and French experts, combining his military duties with those of engineer and advising on all technical projects.

In 1931, General Dori resigned his Agency position to devote himself exclusively to Haganah, holding a secret military post until 1939.

He was appointed Chief of Staff at the outbreak of World War II, but it was not until 1947 that this was made public. He then assumed the direction of the new state's Defense Forces as Commander-in-Chief under Premier Ben-Gurion.



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
