Cronbach, Abraham (pacifism), 1924-1942.

Rabbi Abraham Cronbach, Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, Ohio.

My dear Rabbi Cronbach,

I am in receipt of your statement which you call a Pledge for Jewish Pacifists and which you ask me to sign.

Permit me to refer you to the statement which I made on the floor at the convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis following the reading of your paper. I am not a Pacifist and I do not believe in Pacifism. My people never believed in Pacifism. Judaism is a religion of Activism. Christianity is essentially pacifistic and it therefore has no program for a confused world today.

Peace will never be achieved through pacifism. Mankind will never subscribe to the doctrine that all war is wrong. Human life is sacred but there are things much more sacred than human life. Men have from time immemorial sacrificed their lives for religious, political and economic ideals which to them seemed transcendent.

If any one attacked me or my dear ones I would defend my self or my dear ones with every weapon at my disposal. If any one attacked my country or my religion I would equally defend them with every weapon at my disposal. You too seem to recognize that necessity sometimes justifies murder. In your second clause you say that, "I shall never maim or kill an animal in sport", but why limit it to sport? There is certainly less justification in killing an animal for food when the earth yields abundantly all that man requires for sustenance than it is to destroy an enemy who threatens your life, your freedom, your happiness or your dear ones.

Clause three, five and six could of course be readily subscribed to by any honest man but they have nothing to do with pacifism. Similarly clause seven, eight and nine are irrelevent to the main idea. Altogether your program is utterly unrelated to the main thought of Judaism. I cannot understand why you call it a pledge for "Jewish" Pacifists. Just what is there "Jewish" about it? Judaism believes in organizing social life through law so as to make war less probable, and unnecessary but it has never said "Thou Shalt not Kill", or "If a Man Strike Thee on One Cheek Turn the Other."

Pacifism is a program of apocalyptic visionaries of Buddhists, ascetics and such sects as model themselves on the Messianic program of primitive Christianity.

Judaism is prophetic, and the Prophets were not Pacifists.

Group Formed to Seek Million for Medical Supplies to Help War on Germany

EMBASSY TELLS OF NEEDS

Oumansky Expresses Appreciation for Effort to Coordinate Relief Efforts

Special to THE NEW YORK TIMES. WASHINGTON, Aug. 19-A medical aid program for Russia involving the raising in this country of \$1,000,000 for the purchase of supplies and surgical instruments "most urgently needed in the Soviet Union to aid its fight against the Nazis," was announced today by Edward C. Carter of New York, secretary general of the Institute of Pacific Relations and chairman of the disbursements committee, United China Relief,

Mr. Carter, who is serving as chairman of a group which is organizing the American Committee for Medical Aid to Russia, described the movement as a reflection of the spontaneous desire of many persons in every walk of life to "do something" for Russia.

He said the members of the committee, including Allen Wardwell and C. C. Burlingham of New York, Judge Thomas D. Thacher, former Solicitor General, and others, were "so moved by the Soviet resistance that they felt they should indicate to the Russian people that they are back of them in their fight," and voluntarily had taken the initiative in the formstion of an organization through which the interest and sympathy of like-minded people might find expression.

"Before proceeding with the organization of the Committee for Medical Aid to Russia, we consulted the President's Committee on War Relief Agencies and received from Joseph E. Davies, its chairman, his full approval," Mr. Carter said.

"We confirmed, through the Soviet Embassy, the fact that medical aid was needed and would be most gratefully received, and we have assurances of full support and cooperation from Mr. Oumansky, the Soviet Ambassador, who on the advice of the Russian Red Cross. has provided us with a list of the supplies most urgently in demand.

"Some of these supplies are available in this country and the Soviet Union can provide facilities for their shipment to the U.S.S.R. Others may be purchased abroad.

Together with the list of needed medical supplies, Mr. Carter made public a statement from the Ambassador expressing his "deep appreciation" of the proposed service, and the hope that all Russian relief efforts in this country might be coordinated.

"In view of the magnitude of the war operations, such additional supplies of medicine as you might be able to provide through your committee will be a valuable contribution and a real service to the Soviet people in their fight against the Nazi aggressor," Mr. Oumansky declared.

"The formation of your committee comes at a time when the Soviet Embassy is receiving numerous inquiries from people all over the country as to how they can aid us in this just fight. The offers very but the spirit motivating spirit of the great American peo- | Dr.

"The Soviet people are unshakably confident that this attack will be represented by the result of the result o

ably confident that this attack will be victoriously repelled, that the aggressor is doomed and that Nazi tyranny will be annihilated by the joint efforts of all freedom-loving people."

Mr. Carter made public also an announcement by Dr. Henry E. Sigerist of Johns Hopkins University, head of the committee's medical advisory board, to the effect that a study of the list provided by the Soviet Embassy indicated immediate need of easily transportable anaesthetics for field station surgery, sulfathiazine and other newly developed sulfa-compounds. heart stimulants such as 'adrenaline and caffeine, tannic acid preparations for those suffering flame wounds, serums and anti-toxins, especially tetanus anti-toxin, and instruments and supplies for wound surgery.

Serving with Mr. Carter on the preparatory committee, pending the completion of the national organization, are Joseph Barnes, foreign editor of The New York Herald Tribune; Charles C. Burlingham and F. W. Gehle of New York, Dr. Sigerist, Vilhjalmur Stefansson, explorer and author, and Judge Thacher.
